Propaganda Charge Made By Newspaper

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet government newspaper *Izvestia* charged today that an Israeli diplomat had passed out a suitcase full of "dirty propaganda" in a recent trip to the Soviet Union.

The suitcase included Hebrew prayer books, Zionist literature, stamps and postcards from Israel, and a pamphlet on the Israeli pavilion at the recent international agriculture exhibit in Moscow. It also included copies in English of the book "Exodus" by Leon Uris. *Izvestia* charged that Ephraim Paz, a third secretary at the Israeli Embassy here, had tried to give this propaganda literature to Soviet citizens of Jewish nationality.

"Calling upon them and agitating for emigration to the Holy Land," he poured dirt on Soviet reality," *Izvestia* added.

The Israeli Embassy here had no immediate comment on the article.

Such articles, however, appear regularly in the Soviet press when Israeli diplomats visit parts of the country with large Jewish populations. Paz was in Kiev, a Black Sea port city with a population of more than 100,000 Jews.

Pair Charged In Chicago Shootings

CHICAGO (AP)—Two young men today were charged with 10 counts each of attempted murder following a shooting spree in which police said they wounded 10 persons.

They were identified by police as Robert Saari, 27, and George Sajnko, 19, both of Chicago.

Authorities said the pair returned to a North Side street on Monday night for a gun game fight and fired shotgun blasts into a crowd.

Judith Walawender, 7, was admitted to a hospital with deep wounds at the right eye and the left leg.

Nine other victims — ranging in age from four to 24 — were released after being treated for superficial wounds.

Police arrested Saari and Sajnko at the hospital after the shootings, they were identified by Louis Johnson, 23, who said he ducked when the shots were fired and avoided being hit.

McNamara Views Chance Of China War

PARIS (AP)—A French business magazine says that U.S. Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara acknowledges some possibility of war with Communist China as a result of fighting in Viet Nam but feels that the danger is of Chinese making.

McNamara's response to questions as reported by the French magazine *Entreprise*, which goes on sale Tuesday.

Asked about the risk of war between the United States and China, McNamara is quoted as saying:

"We have done everything humanly possible — both military and diplomatically — to make it unmistakably clear that there is no justification for Communist China to involve itself in the war in Viet Nam. Just as our policy in Viet Nam is based upon a disavowal of any intervention to destroy the United Republic or to force its territory, our policy rests equally on our more so — upon a rejection of any actions against China."

Depositors Could Not Have Known Of Idaho Savings and Loan Closure

BOISE (AP)—Idaho Savings and Loan depositors, many on July Fourth weekend outings, had no way to know you might go today that the "stage" already was set for IS and L's closure.

It had been set the Friday before, July 3, with the news of heavy withdrawals for vacations, business taxes and long July Fourth weekend trips.

Acting Side Finance Director Tom D. McEldowney has estimated withdrawals from IS and L's offices in Boise, Twin Falls, Pocatello and Idaho Falls totaled nearly \$275,000 that day.

Savings and loan firms expect such heavy withdrawals at the end of June. The strong ones — and McEldowney says all in the state except IS and L — were closing last day and ready to meet them.

But Idaho Savings' cash on hand was severely depleted and its position worsened \$-a-d-a-y when at least four other savings institutions widely advertised interest rate increases to 5 percent.

Tuesday, July 5 — the first day of business after the long weekend — Idaho Savings tried to recoup with huge advertisements of its own announcing percent rates — 5 1/2 percent on four-year bonus accounts.

The effort was unsuccessful. The next day at 1:35 p.m., IS and L notified McEldowney it did not have enough cash on hand to continue business and was voluntarily closing its doors.

any one property to \$25,000 or more, the basic reason for the closure.

McEldowney told a legislative committee this month it had been apparent for "some time" that the firm was in trouble and that his office had been working closely with the situation for six months.

Depositors could not be warned of the threat, he said, because state law prohibits release of information that could lead to a run on a savings institution.

"The reasons for the Idaho Savings closure still are being investigated but McEldowney told the legislators one factor was an inadequate appraisal of the property."

He cited investment of \$3.4 million in southern Idaho farm land appraised at \$1.2 million as an example.

Can such closures be prevented in the future?

McEldowney told the legislators 30 new rules and regulations adopted by his department are an attempt to do just that.

He said the regulations went into effect June 10, too late to affect the Idaho Savings and Loan situation.

Nearly half the new regulations set requirements to make savings firms' loans more secure — and to prevent crippling loss if a loan is defaulted.

The regulations:

- Prohibit associations from making loans they cannot cover either with cash on hand or cash readily available.
- Limit real estate loans on

Skin-Grafting Method Aids Burned Girl

DURHAM, N.C. (AP)—Four-year-old Jennifer Council has survived burns on 50 per cent of her body after physicians used a new skin-grafting technique. It determines the compatibility of the skin of potential donors before the skin is grafted.

Jennifer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Council, left the hospital Saturday for her home in Williamston, N.C., and her mother said, "She's a walking miracle."

Five months ago "she had only a 50-50 chance of living, if that much," said her mother.

Jennifer was burned March 29 when a gasoline-soaked rag she was holding near a fire burst into flames.

Doctors at Duke University Hospital decided to use the new process which speeds up skin grafting.

The matching process was used to screen more than a dozen relatives. Finally, doctors selected Jennifer's mother and her grandfather, Jesse Council of Williamston, to supply skin

When he finished they clapped and cheered.

Sunday, De Gaulle told cheering New Caledonians: "France stands erect again after having gone through immense experiences. Its prosperity, its unity, its peace, its radiance are increasing each year."


Inmates Have Art Show Sale

They paid a record \$18,372 for about 1,000 of the 2,000 paintings displayed by prison inmates, said John T. Torrence, supervisor of education for the prison.


Prices of the paintings ranged from \$1 to \$125. The average was about \$16.

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Remodeling Project Doubles Size of Facilities at CSI Vocational Branch

Facilities at the College of Southern Idaho Vocational Branch on Kimberly Road have been almost doubled in size of fields noted as the vocational school started its second year of operation last week.

Gerald Meyerhoffer, vocational guidance counselor, said the building now contains a 21,000 square feet of learning space, compared to the 17,000 square feet the school occupied last year.

"This was brought about by remodeling the building, originally U-shaped, by closing in the U and roofing it."

The space has been partitioned to provide work areas for instruction in auto body and tender repair and farm machinery, plus three classrooms, a student lounge, bookstore, faculty office and storeroom.

Construction work began in June and was finished in time for fall classes. Twelve as many students can be accommodated by the new facilities.

Student labor was used to a large degree in the modifications. Approximately 20 students worked this summer to build the new rooms. Beams and supports were built by the welding classes.

The new space will allow the school to accept more than 100 more students. An electrical appliance class has been added to the curriculum and second year

The flare, an explosion on the sun which sends a stream of fire trailing in the particles through the earth's atmosphere, began Friday. Physicists at the Institute for Telecommunication Sciences and astronomers at Boulder say it should be about over.

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Cuban Refugees Turning to Churches for Help in Exile

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Cuban Four years ago nearly 70,000 refugees, streaming into Miami at the rate of 4,000 monthly, are increasingly turning to churches for help in getting a foothold in the United States.

The Southern Baptist Convention, long one of the most active in helping refugees, has announced a nationwide campaign for increased contributions of clothing, food and other items.

The Roman Catholic Hispanic Center, opened last since refugees began arriving in 1961, has spent more than \$2 million aiding them.

The Center, directed by Rev. Frederick Vass, has issued permits to 22,000 refugees; food to 76,000; and provided medical care for nearly 100,000.

Refugee centers also are maintained by Methodists, Episcopal, Presbyterian and other churches.

The government-operated Cuban Refugee Center reported that only 11,000 persons — of every 10 exiles in the Miami area — receive federal aid.

NEW YORK (AP) — A crude bomb exploded Sunday at the offices of the Communist newspaper, the Worker, wrecking a basement room and shattering windows, including a number of stained-glass ones in a church across the street.

There were no injuries, Police said the pipe bomb, 10 to 12 inches long and probably filled with gunpowder, was detonated in the basement gateway of the three-story brownstone building.

Newspaper Settles With Craft Unions

NEW YORK (AP) — The World Journal Tribune Inc. has reached a contract settlements with the last of its craft unions and plans to start publishing its afternoon newspaper next Monday.

The corporation will publish a Sunday newspaper also.

Editor Frank Coniff said Sunday, the World Journal Tribune will have a press run of about 500,000 copies at the start of the six-day-a-week paper.

Coniff, who appeared on the WABC-TV "New York, New York" program, said he hoped that "mutually interested" needs of the readers would be sufficient to attract most of those who formerly read the Journal-American or the World Telegram and Sun — afternoon newspapers which were merged into the new enterprise.



WASHINGTON (AP) — New indications that President Johnson can be irritable and temperamental when crossed are given in a just-published book by Pierre Salinger.

In a volume entitled "With Kennedy," Salinger relates how he worked as press secretary for the late president and — for four months — in the same post with Johnson.

For some weeks after Johnson became president he had excellent relations with the press, Salinger writes, but

ment in restoring national unity after Dallas; it was now clearly returning to its normal role.

"In common with JFK, President Johnson would blow sky-high over news leaks from the White House, particularly those involving presidential appointments. But he went further when President Kennedy — in expressing his anger. A few of these hapless choices didn't get their appointments because of the premature announcements.

"Gradually, the President became more secretive with the correspondents. And, because I was his direct contact with them, I began to get less information.

"I had always been able to receive visits and I had no visitors, but one day his secretary said I would have to arrange an appointment in the future.

"This didn't offend me. I had always had to clear with (White House aide) Ken O'Donnell before calling on JFK and until then, I had been the only member of 'LBJ's' staff who had the run of his office.

"A slighting on the latter-day perfect rapport between Johnson and the new Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., is also provided in the book. Salinger said he used to swim in the White House pool with President Johnson and converse. Johnson told him how much he admired John F. Kennedy.

"His admiration, however," the book relates, "did not extend to Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy, who he was convinced attempted to sabotage his nomination for the vice-presidency in 1960.

Cost Listed For Trucking City's Water

YORK, Pa. (AP) — Trucking costs in the southern Pennsylvania city where a prolonged drought has virtually dried up its main source of supply.

"This is the worst," said Mayor John L. Snyder Friday, "with declaring an emergency and asking for help from both the federal and state governments."

Snyder said a flood by Conowingo Creek that caused millions in damage 33 years ago was not as bad.

"It was in August of 1933 when we had four days of heavy rains. The creek overflowed cutting the city in half. Damage was in the millions," Snyder said.

"But this is the worst. You can cope with a flood. You can raise the water by going to higher ground. What do you do when you're on dry ground?"

The York Water Co. said the Conowingo Reservoir was dwindling at the rate of eight million gallons per day. Officials estimated that the current supply would last about a month.

In Harrisburg, the state capital, the Public Utility Commission said the company has been spending \$18,000 a day hauling water from the Susquehanna River, 16 miles to the west. As the situation grew more critical, however, that amount was expected to reach \$25,000 a day.

225-year-old city are going through the long hot summer under rigid restrictions on water use. No washing of cars, sprinkling of lawns, no water served in restaurants, unless requested.

Since June, rainfall has measured a little over three inches in the York area, nine inches below normal. Agriculture officials in Harrisburg Thursday said the situation was a "week-old strike."
