Speakers Display Diversified Ideas On Inflation Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—Business spokesmen displayed to Congress today a wide range of attitudes toward President Johnson's anti-inflation proposals, ranging from endorsement to outright rejection of the two key features. In between were a number who asked the House Ways and Means Committee to exempt some businesses or segments of the economy. The administration has asked for legislation across the board, without exceptions, suspending for 16 months both the investment tax credit that allows businesses to recover 7 percent of the cost of new equipment, and especially favorable depreciation rules.

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Grenada's Desegregated Schools Sealed Off by State Officers

More than 300 state officers surrounded a two-block area today in Grenada, Miss., sealing off newly desegregated schools and allowing 83 Negro pupils to class without challenge. Only pupils, their parents and teachers were permitted through the lines of helmeted highway patrolmen and game wardens. The officers, in full riot gear, had orders to crack down hard on troublemakers. The scene was in sharp contrast to the first two days of classes, when jeering white adults armed with axes and pieces of pipe, attacked Negro pupils entering and leaving the school.

Lawman's Son Shot After Auto Chase

SEATTLE (AP) — The 16-year-old son of a Renton Wash. policeman was shot to death Tuesday by a patrolman from here. He was fleeing a few minutes after what police said was a stolen car.

The youth, David McKenney, lived with his grandparents in Seattle.

Patrolman J. E. Armstrong said he called "halt" and fired a warning shot before shooting the boy as he ran through a vacant lot in the suburban White Center area.

Armstrong said he spotted the car in a shopping center and gave chase when the driver took off at high speed. He said the driver ignored his siren and warning red light. The boy abandoned the vehicle after Armstrong forced it into a ditch.

Authorities said an inquest would be held.

"The police always regret anything like this," Police Chief Frank Ramon said. "But these things do happen, especially in attracting the public and the public's property."



Flash Flood Brings Tons of Silt Into Washington Town After Rains

A flash flood brought tons of silt down into the southwestern Washington town of Pomeroy by mud slides which struck in series of cloudbursts.

Fire department crews evacuated one trailer camp next to Pataha Creek which drains hills surrounding the gully-bottom town of 1,700.

No one was reported injured, but Civil Defense authorities set up cots in the new high school gymnasium to accommodate persons stranded in Washington town of Pomeroy by mud slides which struck U.S. Highway 410 to the east and west.

The same storm let loose in the Assin area east of Pomeroy about 8 p.m., washing out portions of dikes recently completed by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Assin Creek was too much for the concrete-reinforced dike, said one rancher who lives along the stream.

The cloudburst struck the Pomeroy area about 6:30 p.m. and continued in torrents for 1 1/2 hours.

"The mud is the worst," said Mrs. Thomas Burch, wife of Pomeroy's police chief. "It's everywhere."

The flash flood brought silt from nearby hills, and along with the silt came broken glass, rusty cans and other debris from the town garbage dump located up Heaton Gulch.

The 32 trailers in the King Trailer Court alongside Pataha Creek were evacuated as the water rose, but the families were returned to their trailers when the creek began receding late Tuesday night.

The Joe Ledgerwood family, which lives on a ranch east of

officers who sighted the flash flood before it struck. All but one irrigation pump was believed to have been removed from the creek before the wall of rampaging water hit.

There have been no reports on how many, if any, cattle were lost.

Mud and rock slides blocked U.S. 410 on each side of Pomeroy, but highways were cleared out of the slides from the town area by late Tuesday night, and were working on the other side.

U.S. 410 is the main east-west route linking Lewiston, Idaho, and Walla Walla, Wash.

Crews in some rural areas were reportedly using snow plows to clear the mud.

In Pomeroy, streets ankle-deep with mud hampered police. The town's two police cars were stalled by the water which ran knee-deep in some places.

Many Supplies Sent Viet Nam Stolen, Damaged, Ruined

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pen- couldn't be acquired until about April, this officer said.

Millions of dollars in building supplies sent to Viet Nam have been stolen outright, damaged in hasty unloading operations or ruined by exposure due to lack of storage facilities.

"A few million dollars worth stolen? Hell, yes," declared a top officer connected with the Viet Nam construction program.

"Well, say below \$10 million, maybe under \$5 million," he added. "We really don't have a fix on it yet."

But a more definite idea of the loss may emerge in November, he said, when civilian contractors complete an inventory now under way at three major depots and 13 warehouses in Viet Nam.

This will be the first accounting of what materials the contractor has used and has in stock — eight months after a gargantuan stream of supplies began pouring into Southeast Asia for U.S. military facilities.

Officials say the delay in getting records up to date could not be avoided because of the vast mobilization undertaken by the private consortium known as RMK-BRJ — now performing nearly \$400 million of work in South Viet Nam.

RMK-BRJ stands for Raymond International of New York; Morris Knudsen of Boise, Idaho; Brown and Root of Houston, Tex.; and J.A. Jones Construction Co. of Charlotte, N.C.

Building the priority installations — temporary quarters for troops, air bases for warplanes, ports for receiving supplies — came first, bookkeeping by necessity was slow — and when there was time.

Vast amounts of lumber, steel and cement were ordered late last year and began arriving in Viet Nam in January. But there were virtually no ports to receive the materials and, further, no place to store them.

Barges dumped the goods on beaches. From there they were hauled — or dragged — to rural areas for open storage while warehouses were built.

Land for the major depots

must be accomplished at 13 hubs and at 76 general warehouses, 71 cement warehouses and over literally thousands of square yards of open storage areas where supplies have piled up.

World-Peace Essay Contest Announced

HAGERMAN — Hagerman youths have been given a challenge by their local Lions Club to develop a plan for world peace, which could earn one of them a \$25,000 educational or career assistance grant.

The Hagerman Lions club, together with Lions Clubs throughout the world, is sponsoring a world-wide essay contest for the world's youth on the subject of peace. The contest, open to young people who will be 14 years of age, but less than 27 years of age as of Jan. 15, 1967, is announced by the president of Lions International, Edward M. Lindsey, Tenn.

The Peace Essay Contest is divided into eight world divisions for the \$1,000 prizes, Kaster stated. The Hagerman club winner will advance to Lions District competition, his or her effort to qualify for the multiple district contest.

The contest, sponsored by more than 20,000 Lions Clubs in more than 130 countries, is the free world, to develop a formula for world peace because Lions feel peace is the key to world progress.

The contestants should submit their entry in essay form, not to exceed 5,000 words. Judging will fall into four categories: 75 percent of the points will be devoted to content, 10 percent to organization, 10 percent to be for style and five percent to mechanics, or grammatical construction.

Three judges will be appointed to evaluate the entries. Application forms for entrants may be obtained at the high school office.

Kaster announced that each applicant would be limited to one entry, with one winner's essay eligible to compete in the Lions District contest. District winner will be entered in state or national contest. Each national or multiple district winner will be entered in one of the eight world divisions. An expense-paid trip to Chicago to attend the Lions International Annual Convention for the final judging will be furnished to the eight world division winners.

The closing date is Dec. 10.

First American Pilot to Escape War Captors Tells of Camp Treatment

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — He was like this for the first American to escape from a North Vietnamese prison camp, and he told the story of his treatment in a book, "The American Who Escaped the North Vietnamese." The author, a former U.S. Army aviator, is now in the United States.

"They held a gun at my head and went click-click — in, ha, ha, ha," he said. "They beat me and changed me upside down, putting me on my face," said Lt. J. Edgar Dengler, who was captured in North Vietnam in 1965. "I was through our hut. Once we caught a snake that had eaten two rats. We cut it open and ate the rats, 1965."

Dengler, a slender, handsome 23-year-old from Pacific, Calif., spoke with a trace of an accent at a news conference here. He was born in Germany and came to the United States in 1947.

Tanned, smiling and weighing 143 pounds, 45 more than when a helicopter snatched him from the jungle after five months in a North Vietnamese prison camp, he described his ordeal.

"In one village I was tied to a tree and used for target practice," he said. "The guards tried to see how close they could come to shooting me. Another time, one pulled a trigger with the rifle next to my left ear. It caused a deafness that lasted for several months."

"But the worst torture was being dragged by a water buffalo. My hands were tied so tightly the nerves were cut off. Dengler said he told his captors nothing except his name, rank and serial number, as he decided to find a river

U.S. Crime Has Increase Of 8 Per Cent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rape and grand larceny placed an 8 per cent increase in U.S. crime for the first six months of 1966, the FBI reported today.

Figures comparing the six months with the same period of 1965 showed that rape, up 12 per cent, made the sharpest increase among violent crimes.

Larceny-involving \$50 or more in value jumped 11 per cent and led the increase in property offenses.

Aggravated assault was up 11 per cent, robbery 6 per cent, and murder 3 per cent as violent crimes increased 9 per cent overall.

Property offenses were up 8 per cent as a group, including a 7 per cent jump for auto theft and a 5 per cent increase for burglary.

All city population categories had crime increases ranging from 3 per cent in cities of 50,000 to a million population, to 12 per cent in cities of fewer than 10,000.

Suburban areas registered an 11 per cent increase while rural areas reported a 7 per cent rise.
