## Civil Rights Concern Seeps Into Meeting

KENTUCKY DAM VILLAGE (AP) — The Deep South concern over civil rights has seeped into the Southern Governors' Conference—which customarily excludes it from the agenda.

Despite plentiful topics ranging from tourism to transportation, the news conferences of four governors Monday were dominated by racial themes.

Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace, denouncing racial integration into segregated school systems, said he is seriously interested in running for president in 1968 as an independent.

South Carolina Gov. Robert E. McNair proposed a resolution calling on President Johnson to soften—federal guidelines on school integration. He said Monday night he had the support of

all the Southern governors.

Louisiana Gov. John J. McKeithen said Johnson should make a stronger stand against "lemonade"—"anarchy—in the South."

Mississippi Gov. Paul Johnson Jr. said he is at a disadvantage in coping with occasional violence stemming from integration "burden placed on the South's back."

Wallace drew the most attention because he is in the forefront resistance to federal integration moves.

The other governors hedged about Wallace, merely acknowledging he would be a powerful contender if conditions remained the same in 1968. Wallace avoided comment on whether he has

been drumming up their support.

McKeithen announced for the first time that if Louisiana voters approve a constitutional amendment allowing two terms for a governor, he will seek re-election.

Wallace denounced the federal government for "completely obliterating local government" and "destroying neighborhood institutions."

"He said his state's bicameral legislature by next month will have reasonable encroachment on its

legislative powers," helping foster good race relations—but that "radical Negroes" might destroy harmony if they came into power.

McNair said his resolution has a good chance of passage. He is resolutions committee chairman and, if the proposal receives the go-ahead, would go on a speaking tour for a vote of all 17 governors Wednesday when the sessions wind up.

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
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



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## Man Is Hurt In Accident Near Bliss

BLISS — Harvey Groesema, Mountain Home, was reported in satisfactory condition late Monday with back injuries incurred in a Monday afternoon accident near here.

Investigating officer, Gooding County Sheriff Vern Royse, said Groesema was injured in a one-car accident about 3 p.m. yesterday west of town. He said a 1965 Oldsmobile driven by Vera Teutsch, also Mountain Home, went out of control, traveling off the south side of the highway.

He said the car then angled off the north side, traveling down a 15-foot embankment and rolled over before it came to rest upright, about 130 feet off the highway.

Groesema was asleep in the back seat of the vehicle when the accident occurred. Royse said seat belt worn by Miss Teutsch was probably the reason she escaped injury. The car was demolished. Royse said investigation is continuing.

## Red Guards Ransack Private Home

HONG KONG (AP) — Arrivals from Red China reported today that Red Guards ransacked the Shanghai house of Mine Sun Yat-sen, widow of the founder of modern China, and demanded that she hand over all her property.

The travelers said wall posters accused Mine Sun, who is a vice president of the Communist Chinese regime, of leading a luxurious life in contrast to that of the poor workers.

The travelers did not know whether Mine Sun was in her Shanghai house when the militant young Chinese invaded it or whether anything was taken. Nor do they know—when the invasion occurred—whether the former Soong Ching-ling is a sister of Mine Chang Kai-shek, the wife of Nationalist China's president.

She has been a staunch supporter of the Communist regime and her prestige, Dr. Mao's widow has meant much to the Reds.

CHICAGO (AP) — Albert Rabby, aide to Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., was convicted Monday night of disorderly conduct and resisting arrest.

A Circuit Court jury returned the verdict.

Rabby, 31, was arrested June 28, 1968, at a downtown street corner where he was staging a sit-down after leading a march protesting against the policies of Benjamin C. Willis, then superintendent of the Chicago school system.

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## U.S. Doesn't Plan Weapon Removal

BONN, Germany (AP) — The U.S. government has no intention of pulling its nuclear weapons out of Europe, the American Embassy declared today.

The unusual official statement was issued, a spokesman said, because there had been numerous inquiries and considerable misinformation on the subject. The spokesman, who did not name the embassy, was authorized privately from Washington — to deny that the United States has any plans to "denuclearize Europe" or change its policy of making nuclear weapons available for the defense of the Atlantic alliance. Noting that the administration had no intention to change the deployment of the weapons, the embassy said.

## Tax Tipsters May Soon Be Replaced

WASHINGTON (AP) — Computers may soon put paid tax-tippers out of business.

A bill in Capitol Hill would bar the Treasury Department from awarding a \$10,000-a-year tax-the-filer—the tipster who tattle to tax collectors about their neighbors or fellow employees.

Its sponsor, Rep. Richard H. Fulton, D-Tenn., cited Internal Revenue Service computers as one reason for ending tips for tippers.

Action this year on the bill is unlikely because of the little time remaining before Congress adjourns, probably next month.

The bill undoubtedly will be reintroduced next year.

The Treasury Department is now drafting its formal position. Even if it does oppose the bill, it is not expected to take a strong stand.

"We would rather have a lot of other bills passed first," said one Treasury employee who has been working on President Johnson's anti-inflation plans.

One source said today the government might hesitate to give up any legitimate tool for enforcement, but that IRS officials show that only about one in every 20 tipsters actually claims a reward.

IRS has also placed great faith in its computers, which began Jan. 1 will check ev-

ery income tax return.

The service has said that fear of the computer is often enough incentive for tax offenders even without the threat of a citation.

Rewards to tipsters have been only on request and only after IRS decides how much the informant's tip was worth.



George Jr. said he thought he might be able to play some quarterback and do the kicking for Miami, but nothing further than signing when he got out of college.


So when his father took over the Dolphins job, he called coach Joe Collier at Buffalo and asked:

Sunday's victory made it six straight for the home team this season—including five exhibition wins over Western Division teams.

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

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## Lincoln Commissioners Approve 1966 Tax Levies

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
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

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
