Johnson, Erhard Confer on NATO, Trade and Space

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson and Chancellor Ludwig Erhard of West Germany conferred for nearly two hours today on NATO, trade, space and other questions and agreed to fly together to Cape Kennedy, Fla., Tuesday. The trip is a follow-up on their last meeting in November when the two men talked over the possibility of American-German cooperation in the peaceful, civilian exploration of space, so they are going to take a first-hand look at the center of U.S. activity at Cape Kennedy.

This was the fifth meeting of the two. White House press secretary Bill D. Moyers said they conferred alone for an hour and a half and then joined key cabinet and other advisers in the Cabinet room for a joint report on their discussions.

Moyers said Johnson and Erhard went into political and military matters, including NATO, the question of whether Germany will fulfill obligations to buy \$1.35 billion worth of military hardware by next June, trade and space matters.

Erhard went to the White House from a State Department meeting with Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara.

The chancellor, who arrived in Washington Saturday, entered the White House through an entrance out of sight of newsmen.

White House press secretary Bill D. Moyers said the unusual practice had no significance "except to keep the visit informal."

Union Calls For Vote on Airline Strike

NEW YORK (AP)—The Transport Workers Union called today for an immediate vote on whether to strike American Airlines Wednesday morning.

The TWA leadership predicted overwhelming rejection by the membership of the latest contract offer from American, an offer described by the airline as record-breaking.

A union spokesman said the airline workers "are free to strike after midnight tonight after a final cooling-off period under provisions of the National Railway Labor Act."

Results of the voting are expected to be announced here Tuesday, and the strike, if voted, would start at the American Airlines headquarters at 6:40 a.m. Wednesday.

American said in making the latest offer that it was better than the terms won by the AFL-CIO Machinists last month after a six-week strike against five other major airlines.

Judge Throws Out Charge Of Assault

JAYNEVILLE, Ala. (AP)—A judge of state court threw out an assault charge today against a former special deputy sheriff accused of wounding a civil rights worker during an outbreak of race violence in Jayneville County last year.

The decision by Circuit Judge Worth Thigpen means that the defendant, Thomas L. Coleman, cannot be indicted again and cannot be tried for the shotgun attack on the Rev. Richard H. Hester, a white Catholic priest from Chicago.

Immediately afterward, the court got ready for the trial of an Alvin Karpis slayer Eugene Thomas on a murder charge. Coleman was indicted on the charge of the killing of Willie Gregg, Jr., another white civil rights volunteer.

The dismissal of the assault and battery indictment against Coleman came when State Atty. Gen. Richmond Flowers asked the judge to withdraw the charge, which would have meant simply to drop it for want of prosecution, but leave the door open for later grand jury action against another and perhaps more serious indictment.

Japan's Satellite Attempt Fails

YOKOHAMA, Japan (AP)—Japan failed today in its first attempt to orbit an artificial satellite but succeeded in focusing attention on its space and missile program.

Around the country hundreds of thousands stopped work to watch a telecast of the launch from the launch complex of the space center at the southern tip of Japan.

No other nation in Asia has come as close to orbiting a satellite. The shot almost succeeded.

Antipoverty Bill Runs Into Storm of Criticism in House

WASHINGTON (AP)—The administration's \$1.75-billion antipoverty bill ran into a storm of criticism today in the House from opponents who called it wasteful, inflationary and riddled with loopholes. After several months of delay, the House finally decided to consider the bill by almost-unanimous voice vote. The battle over its contents will come after several days of general discussion and explanation of proposed amendments.

Rep. B. F. Sisk, D-Calif., of the Rules Committee started the debate by telling the House "no program before Congress in the last 10 years has been more controversial."

Sisk said that almost every member "has found some good and some bad in it."

Rep. H. Allen Smith, R-Calif., said the program was riddled with amendments to "try to correct this program."

Some communities, Smith said, have been declared "pockets of poverty" without any real changes in the form of the program.

Rep. William M. Colman, D-Miss., said the program "does not fit into the President's desire to curb inflation."

There is little doubt the House would finally pass some kind of bill, late this week, but with some changes in the form recommended by the Education and Labor Committee.

Republicans are ready with their own antipoverty plan which GOP Leader Gerald R. Ford says would cost the government less than half as much.

Burley Man Being Tried In Germany

NÜRNBERG, Germany (AP)—A U.S. citizen, convicted of strangling and raping Beba Agnawic on May 15, 1965, and spat in the face today of an American soldier as he went off to trial for the murder of her 2-year-old child.

The parents were seated just behind P. Ray Martinale, 22, of Burley, Idaho, who is accused of strangling and raping Beba Agnawic on May 15, 1965.

"I'll kill him! I'll take revenge!" the father shouted as he jumped forward and punched Martinale's face. Agnawic was strangled by her husband and pulled him away.

Beba Agnawic was assaulted and killed during German-American friendship week. Her body was found in a daisy room under a flight of stairs at Martinale's barracks near a service club. A German newspaper reported that a television show.

Martinale was arrested shortly after the body was found and investigators reported that he admitted the killing.

German authorities have used their right to claim jurisdiction in the case and are trying Martinale in a juvenile court since he was under 21 at the time of the crime.

The trial is expected to last two days.

The group of educators and others interested in education pledged its support to the Oregon-Bureau of Education.

2 Dead Dug Out Of Debris After Smashing Typhoon

TOKYO (AP)—Hundreds of police and soldiers were pressed into disaster duty today to clean up the debris, restore communications and dig out the dead from the worst typhoon to hit Japan in seven years. Typhoon Ida smashed into the heartland of Japan, the Tokyo and Mt. Fuji area, early Sunday while Typhoon Helen was still beating southern Japan with less ferocity. National Police headquarters said the latest count was 211 dead, 143 missing and nearly 1,000 injured. Damage to military installations was estimated at more than \$6 million.

Pope Urges Theologians To Debate

ROME (AP)—Pope Paul VI, observing his 60th birthday with a normal 18-hour working schedule, today urged 1,200 Roman Catholic theologians opposed to the council's declaration in congress in Rome to debate freely but to respect each other's opinions.

The pontiff also asked the theologians to "show the way to avoid errors" in interpreting Ecumenical Council doctrines—modernizing the Church, in a letter to the meeting, he told the theologians to "infuse their debate with charity to prevent sharp conflict."

"Keep ahead of your eyes the following rules: Unity in essentials, liberty in doubtful matters, charity in all. How many times have we heard of sterile controversies have arisen owing to lack of charity," he said.

"The needs they have planted will not be removed for 100 years," he said.

Rarick ousted Morrison Saturday in the Democratic runoff primary in Louisiana's 6th Congressional District. He will oppose Republican Crayton Hall, a research engineer, in November.

Seventy-four per cent of the district's registered Democrats turned out to vote with Rarick polling 85,242 votes to 80,785 for Morrison, a 24-year veteran of Capitol Hill.

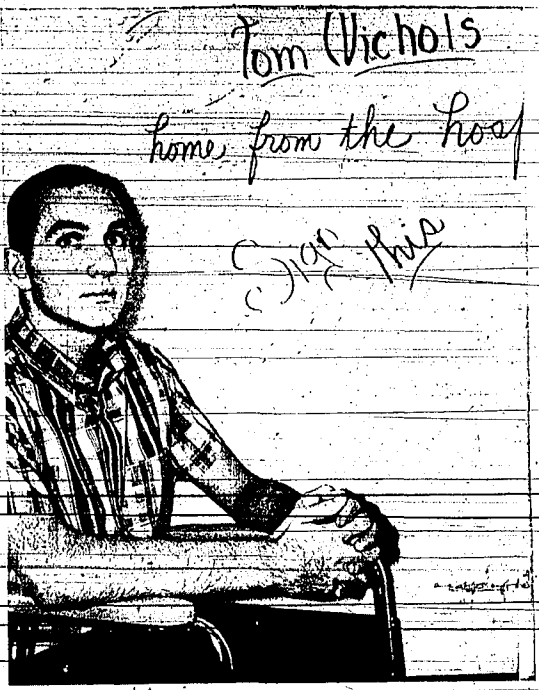
Lynda Bird and Actor Have Date

Rupert Youth Benefits From Kindness of Area Residents

RUPERT — Seventeen-year-old Tommy Nichols has a lot of friends. He even has friends he doesn't know personally — the kind of friends who donated blood for him when he underwent surgery for injuries sustained in a dynamite blast July 19.

Tommy's left leg below his kneecap and his right foot were amputated because of the accident.

Nine pints of blood were given to young Nichols during surgery at Minidoka Memorial Hospital in July and additional blood was administered to him when he was transferred to St. Alphonsus Hospital in Boise for more surgery in August.

Young Nichols is a senior at Minico High School and an enthusiastic sportsman. He vows he will be water skiing next summer. Rupert-area residents who know Tommy are taking bets on it.

Minidoka County residents will have an opportunity to donate and replace blood used by Tommy and other blood recipients during the regular visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile from 2 to 6 p.m. Wednesday in the Rupert Civic Building. A 125-pint quota for the county has been set.

Tommy, a two-year letterman in football and who became a three-year letterman in track during his sophomore year, was working with a construction company as a helper when Paul when the accident occurred. 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South Korean Officials Are Replaced

SEOUL, South Korea (AP)—South Korean President Chung Hae Park replaced his justice and finance ministers today and rejected the resignations of Premier Chung Ik-kwon and the rest of his Cabinet.

Chung and his 16 ministers resigned last Thursday after an opposition lawmaker threw a human excrement on the premier and four Cabinet members during an assembly discussion of a smuggling scandal involving a fertilizer factory.

Park said he held the finance and justice ministers responsible for the scandal over \$11,000 worth of raw saccharine smuggled from Japan in the guise of machinery for a fertilizer company.

The assemblyman who threw the waste resigned and was arrested.

Ship Fire Could Have Been Disaster

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Coast Guard board of inquiry reported today that a fire swept through a German passenger liner four hours before it was due to depart, and that the vessel was at sea when the fire occurred.

"It is the opinion of the board that the vessel's crew could not have successfully combatted this fire if it had occurred while the vessel was at sea," the board reported.

The fire caused by a diesel oil leak in the engine room spread out of control for 8 1/2 hours on the liner Hansatic on Sept. 26 at its berth at a pier on the Hudson River in New York.

A few passengers who had boarded the vessel in preparation for its scheduled sailing were evacuated safely. Two New York City firemen suffered minor injuries. Damage to the vessel was estimated at \$1 million. It had been scheduled to carry 300 passengers.

In deciding that the crew could not have fought the fire alone, the board said that within 15 minutes of the start of the blaze, the heat melted the main power cables causing a total power failure on board the ship. The loss of power disabled two of the ship's three fire pumps and its sprinkler system.

Students in Brazil Return To Classes

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—Students returned to classes here and throughout most of Brazil today after 10 days of strikes, demonstrations and clashes with police.

In Sao Paulo, however, some facilities remained on strike and planned a meeting this afternoon to decide whether they would return to classes.

In Rio de Janeiro, student leaders were scheduled to confer with Raimundo Moniz de Aragao.

The government has been emphasizing the differences between the students' academic demands and the political nature of their demonstration last week.

The students have been protesting free public universities. They also have echoed growing dissatisfaction with the universities' limited capacities.

As the demonstrations raged throughout Brazil, political elements were added to the student protests, with shouts of "Liberty, Liberty," and "Down with the dictatorship."

Goal Is Set For Burley Bloodmobile

BURLEY—A quota of 150 pints of blood is the goal for Cassia County residents when the Red Cross Bloodmobile visits Burley from 10 to 2 p.m. Thursday at the Burley Elks Hall, according to Mrs. Chet Hyllon, county district chairman.

Cassia county residents have used 193 pints of blood since the last bloodmobile visit.

There are several children in the county who receive from one to four gamma globulin shots per week. It takes one pint of blood to make two cc's, Mrs. Hyllon noted.

Blood used by residents of the county in other areas supporting the Red Cross program may be replaced in Burley, Mrs. Hyllon stated. Blood may be transferred to other hospitals under the program upon request, she added.

Blood derivatives are furnished without charge by the Red Cross blood program to physicians and hospitals.

Gamma globulin is used for children in the treatment of infectious hepatitis. Increasing amounts are also being used in treating patients with an absence of gamma globulin from the blood.

Persons with this illness do not have the ability to manufacture their own gamma globulin and, as a result, are highly susceptible to infections of many kinds. Periodic injections with gamma globulin give these patients the protection they need against infection.

It is the direct responsibility of the recipients to recruit blood donors to repay the blood which has been used, stated Mrs. Hyllon.

Persons between the ages of 16 and 59 may donate blood, but unmarried persons under 21 must present a written consent

As long as the girls participate with the boys they are popular. I feel that there are other challenges which will help us to break our local obnoxious habits, in which I have never participated and I never shall.

The three major challenges you name are rather universal, but they are not the leading challenges in many other parts of the country.

Many of the girls find that it is difficult to get summer or part time jobs while they are in their teens. As a result, they have difficulty in dressing the way they want to, and in keeping up their end of their social life with their girl friends.

Another difficulty is that of getting along with their family. It seems that girls do not get along with their mothers, and that boys do not do very well with their fathers. This situation is of great importance because it keeps the teenagers off balance.

Other girls and boys have trouble with their school teachers. Some have difficulty with their lessons, grades and special events at school. Some have trouble at church, and in their community.

Boys have trouble getting transportation, and then keeping it aloft. Girls have trouble with their girl friends, with boy friends and with neighbors over simple and important things.

Life seems to throw challenges to us from all sides. And we presume it is a good thing for us to meet them and learn from them. In this way we prepare ourselves for a happy and successful life.

Most of us teenagers are selfish, and so almost everything becomes some sort of a challenge to us. On the other hand, if we were modest, humble and feminine, things would not throw such a challenge at us and we would be much happier.

One Million Chinook Eggs Are Placed in Selway River System

BOISE—About one million more eyed spring chinook salmon eggs already have been placed in hatching channels of the upper Selway River system near Magruder, and another million eggs from Bonneville Dam on the lower Columbia River are scheduled for planting in the same area next week, the Idaho Fish and Game Department reported Sunday. The first two egg plantings this fall were made in Indian Creek, according to Monte Richards, fishery development supervisor for the department. The remainder of the eyed eggs taken from spring chinook salmon at Bonneville Dam by the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries will be shipped to Idaho for the fish restoration work. They will be planted in Running Creek and Indian Creek hatching channels. Both streams are tributaries of the Upper Selway River.

Richards says that about ten million eyed salmon eggs have been planted in the Selway River drainage as part of the eight-year program to return these ocean-going fish to northern Idaho.

So far, 371 chinook a month have been counted over the ladder facilities at the Lewiston Dam this year, and most of them are believed to be fish that hatched from the eyed salmon eggs that were planted in the Selway River during the first two years of the project.

This is the sixth annual planting of eyed chinook salmon eggs made in the program to return the ocean spawning runs to the Selway River and Selway River tributaries.

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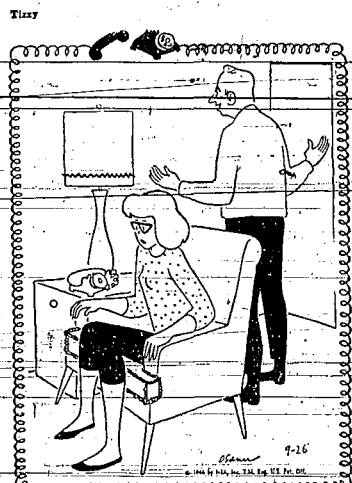
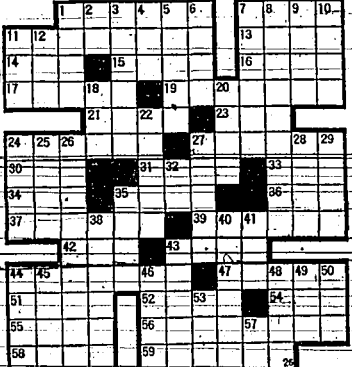

East started proceedings for the defense by capturing dummy's queen of clubs with his king. Then he looked over dummy's carefully and saw that he, East, was in trouble. A trump-lead would allow declarer to let the trump ride around to dummy's jack. A heart lead looked equally bad. Humphrey Speaks About Sen. Kennedy

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey spoke about U.S. Sen. Robert F. Kennedy today as he began a tour of California.

Comparing President Johnson with Kennedy, the vice president said: "President Johnson's view is a little more mature, a little more responsible, a little more in the public interest."

Humphrey talked about Kennedy and his own political future on a television news interview taped for release in Southern California tonight.

It began a two-day tour of the state in which he planned to visit federal installations and help Democratic candidates, including Gov. Edmund G. Brown in his race against Republican Ronald Reagan.

Humphrey took an optimistic look at his own chances for sharing the 1968 presidential ticket with Johnson.

Asked if the President had promised him a place on the ticket, Humphrey said: "In the realities of politics, the President is required to have an opinion. I don't know who he will want as his running mate. I'll give him the full measure of loyalty and I'll do everything I can to help him find the President won't be dissatisfied with me and we'll be walking side by side for many months and years."

Humphrey also said the war in Viet Nam will continue "for some time." He said the only way to end the conflict is beyond the means of the economy by a long shot.

The war, he said, takes a smaller slice of the gross national product than the Korean conflict and "I do not think you can say it is beyond the means of the economy to bear it if we use restraint."

Johnson Is Particular On Haircut

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson is like any other American male in his barber's chair. Sometimes chatting, sometimes reading — but very interested in how his haircut looks.

"He's pretty fussy and very meticulous," says his barber, Steve Martini. "He makes little remarks about his hair. He's also very human and kind. He tries to keep his appointments right on time."

Martini, 32, is the son of Italian immigrants. Barbers have been in his family for several hundred years. He's been cutting the hair of presidents since Dwight D. Eisenhower removed him from the Pentagon barber shop.

"It just happened to be at the right place at the right time," the barber said in an interview. Last week President Johnson said Martini was one of his "most influential counselors." He believes it is not Martini who thinks he's over-rated. "I never talk to him too much, unless he talks to me. He has his own thoughts," Martini said.

Martini has a shop in Washington, but goes to the White House weekly to cut the President's hair. He operates in a little shop beneath the President's west-wing office and also has a hair cut for the executive clip — "European style, with a razor."

He won't disclose his fee, but the minimum union charge for going to a customer is \$2.

He says he thinks some barbers would panic if they had the President in their chair, but adds:

"I don't get nervous when I've someone important. The average barber is afraid to touch him."

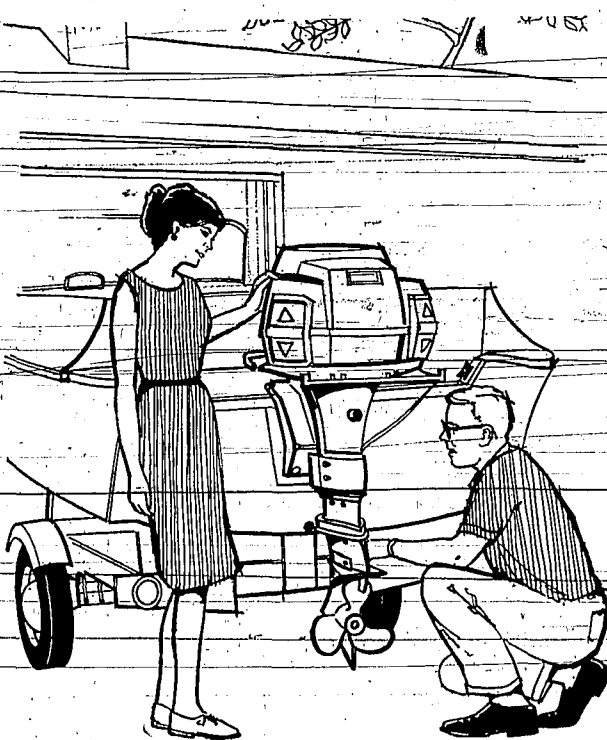

Gov. Romney Endorsed by Teamsters

DETROIT (AP) — Republican Gov. George Romney got enthusiastic endorsement from Michigan Teamsters Sunday, while a "lesser-of-two evils" nod went to Democratic U.S. senatorial candidate G. Mennen Williams.

Teamsters President called Romney "the best governor for the working man since Frank Murphy." Democrat Murphy played a key role in the start of the United Auto Workers in the 1930s.
