

# Hurricane Inez Kills 5, Pounds At Puerto Rico

SAN JUAN, P.R. (AP)—Hurricane Inez, a killer storm that left at least five dead on the Caribbean island of Guadeloupe, pounded Puerto Rico today with swirling winds, crashing rain and stinging rain. The Weather Bureau raised hurricane warnings for Puerto Rico's southern neighbor, the Dominican Republic, which was in line for a direct hit from the storm's 120-mile winds unless she changed course. And 1,000 miles to the east, the 10th tropical storm of the season, Judith, boiled up with 45-mile winds that were expected to grow much stronger.

Inez struck a glancing blow at Puerto Rico, killing 25 million persons live on one of the most densely populated islands in the Caribbean. But it was enough to flood seaside homes along the southern shore and dash small boats against the docks.

Torrential rains overflowed Lake Guayabal in the foothills of the mountains behind Ponce. Schools throughout the island were closed. Shops in the south were shut and windows boarded up.

"If this storm continues as forecast, there is going to be a great disaster," said forecaster Arnold Sugg of the National Hurricane Center in Miami, Fla.

Virgin Islands, just to the west of Puerto Rico, reported that the roof of a classroom was blown off. Slashing rain caused a minor flooding in the town of St. John across highways. But over-all damage was minor.

# Area Water Project Support Is Sought

BOISE (AP)—Backing of the new Idaho Water Resource Board was asked today for a project intended to provide additional water for the Salmon Falls-Tract south of Twin Falls. Two plans were suggested. One involves construction by the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation and the other under state sponsorship. The board was told the Reclamation Bureau estimates at \$38 million the cost of providing supplemental water for about 35,000 acres now under irrigation and water for about 14,000 acres of acid land.

# Republicans Discount Summit Meet

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Republicans discount the political impact of President Johnson's pre-election trip to the Manila summit conference of leaders in nations battling Communist forces in Viet Nam. They believe the meeting of leaders holds hope of Viet Nam peace initiatives.

Senate Republican Leader Everett D. Dirksen gave this GOP viewpoint in an interview today to the United Nations.

Dirksen, who has supported the President's course in Southeast Asia, indicated he suspects the reversion to Manila meeting in mid-October might wind up with a promise for the extension of the "Great Society" to all of Asia.

# Indonesia Is Back in U. N. Amid Protests

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Amid shouts of protest from demonstrators in the public galleries of the General Assembly, Indonesia returned today to the United Nations.

The demonstrators broke out as Abdul Rahman Pazhwak of Afghanistan, the assembly president, invited an Indonesian speaker to the podium. Foreign Minister Adam Malik to take seats reserved for him in the third row of the blue and gold assembly hall.

With Indonesia's return, the U.N. membership was boosted to 119.

U.N. guards quickly thrust a handful of demonstrators out of the hall.

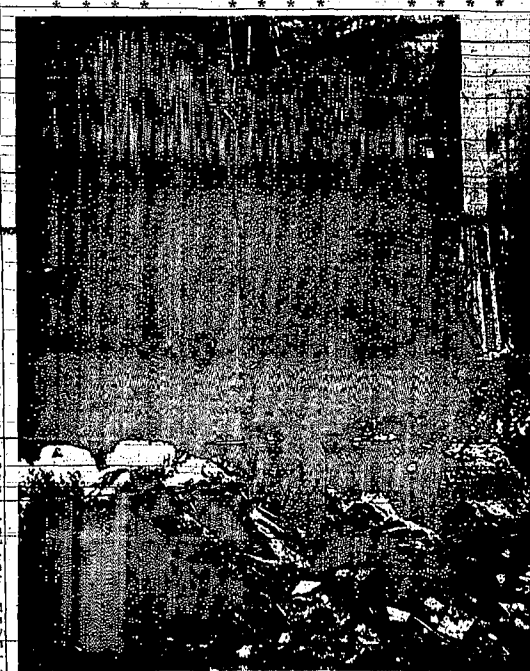
# Survivors of Bombed Village Bitter After Marine Attack

HANSEN — An era ended Tuesday afternoon as the old Hansen suspension bridge was dropped 350 feet into the Snake River gorge. The bridge, designed for horse and buggy use, had survived 47 years of wear and tear from huge trucks and modern cars. Its use was ended Sept. 18 when a new concrete and steel bridge was dedicated for use. The two bridges had stood side by side since then, a stark comparison of the new and the old. Many "oldtimers" from the area, on hand Tuesday to observe the dismantling, added a note of nostalgia to the proceedings.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Incensed because a white policeman killed a Negro youngster fleeing a stolen car, rioting Negroes smashed windows, started fires, looted, overturned vehicles and threw barrages of bricks Tuesday night in two San Francisco districts. Rioting started in the Hunters Point District, where until now there has been no racial violence, and jumped hours later five miles across the city to the Fillmore District where a near riot was suppressed last summer after a Negro patrolman stopped Negro youths from robbing two white couples.

# Smylie Notes Idaho Population Growth

"I want to explode a myth of this campaign year," Gov. Robert E. Smylie said Wednesday morning in Twin Falls. Smylie made this statement to about 150 delegates at the annual convention of the Idaho Association of Commissioners and Clerks at the Holiday Inn. The "myth," Gov. Smylie said, is that Idaho is not growing. Census figures show, Smylie said, the state has increased its population by more than 100,000 in the past 15 years. Continued growth at the same rate, he said, would give the state 780,000 to 800,000 population by 1970.

# Papal Group Denies Trip Is for Peace

SALON, South Viet Nam (AP)—A papal peace mission arrived in Saigon today but its leader denied reports from the Vatican that it was seeking to end the Vietnam conflict.

Archbishop Sergio Pignedoli, the apostolic delegate to Saigon, said the mission would gather information to help the Pope's peace campaign and try to ease the tension between the Buddhist majority and the Catholic minority in Viet Nam as well as study other problems of the country.

# U. S. Proposes Special Satellite

PARIS (AP)—The United States proposed today that the United Nations launch a communications satellite.

The satellite, which could be put aloft as early as 1967, would provide instantaneous military communications between the United States and western Europe and between the northern and southern extremes of the European NATO area.

# Shows Mar Georgia's Runoff Vote

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—Drizzle and showers over much of Georgia marred today's runoff primary election but it still appeared that a moderate voter turnout would decide between Ellis Aronson and Lester Maddox for a Democratic nominee for governor.

Poll workers in Atlanta reported a "surprisingly good" turnout and several areas in south Georgia, where rural voters were expected to go heavily for Maddox, reported balloting might run as heavy as in the first primary Sept. 14.

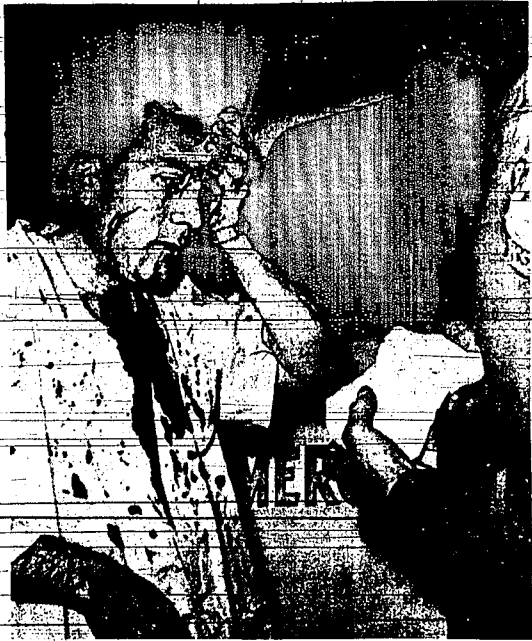

## Reagan Draws Crowds, Applause and Laughter in Campaign for Governor

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Politically, as in his celluloid days, Ronald Reagan is demonstrating that he is "box office."

The erstwhile movie actor, now Republican candidate for governor of California, has been drawing crowds, stirring applause and laughter in speeches, fielding tough questions about government, and generally waging a strong campaign.

This is his first try for election office, although he has been around since the 1930s. For years, he has turned out to be something of a phenomenon.

Reagan won the nomination last June in a contest with former Gov. George Christian, carrying 53 of the state's 58 counties and taking a towering 64 per cent of the GOP vote.

Now, campaigning up and down the 760-mile length of California, Reagan is drawing well. It may be largely curiosity to see him in person that brings out the people. His face was familiar, via movies and television, for years before he cast himself into his present role.

"Ronnie has been in millions of living rooms as a nice guy for a long long time," said a Reagan lieutenant, "and that's one of the big things he has going for him."

There are others. He makes a smooth speech, seldom using a text or pausing to reach for a word. He says he writes all his speeches himself. They are punchy, articulate, a blend of humor, serious discussion of issues, and satirical pot shots aimed at his Democratic opponent, Gov. Edmund G. Brown.

Reagan rattles off statistics to support his arguments on state questions. Discussing such problems informally, he tends to be more incisive than in speeches or news conferences. Neutral observers often remark, "He has been doing his homework."

In the lush, green and gold Napa Valley—the wine country—Reagan stirred cheering and laughter when he ridiculed the special tax on sparkling wines by calling it "the bubble tax."

Reagan, a zealous apostle of private enterprise, says Los Angeles businessmen have provided 4,000 jobs in Watts since the Negro riots in that section of the city last year. With a sense of timing, he paused and added, "and that's almost as many as there are poverty workers there."

By contrast, he was all earnestness at a veterans' home north of San Francisco. No jokes. No barbs at Brown.

Reagan's looks, the trim figure, wavy hair and squinted smile, and his personality—sometimes boyish, more often urbane, bring a warm, dreamy expression to women's faces.

At 55, he looks very much as he did in his hit films. He has a pretty wife, actress Nancy Davis, and two children, Patric, 13, and Ronnie, 7. These are all political assets.

"A lot of people figured he would be the pretty and pretty dumb," a politician said.

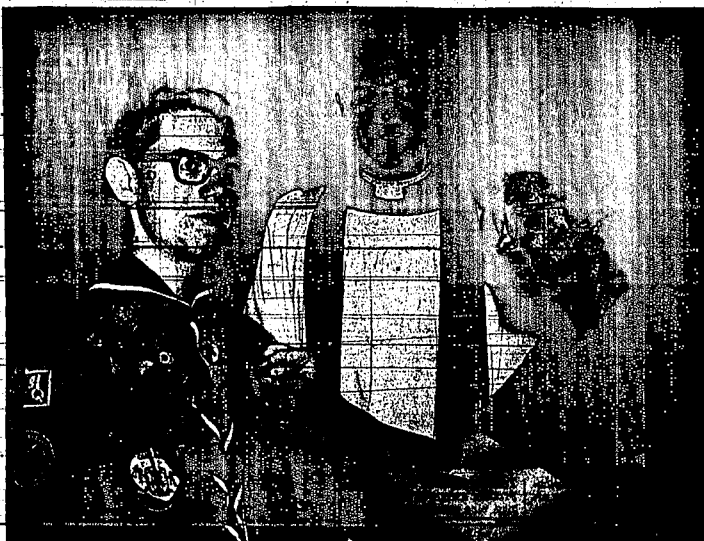

**PHOENIX (AP)**—Leaders of a group of Housewives battling grocery prices meet today with Esther Peterson, President Johnson's special assistant for consumer prices.

"We want her view on our fight," a spokesman said. "We're getting letters from all over the nation about our bread boycott."

The enthusiasm over Mrs. Peterson's appearance at a conference of the Arizona Consumer Council, however, didn't extend to a second housewives group.

A spokesman said it would boycott Mrs. Peterson, adding: "We have no plans to hear her."

The loosely knit group of about 600 housewives, who banded together a month ago to fight for lower grocery prices, decided two weeks later to stop their boycott.

"After checking into it, we found that by boycotting these items, we've been helping destroy free enterprise and we want no part of it," a spokesman said today.

Mrs. C. Richard Kresse said her group, Housewives Organized for Better Living, found big government and not the grocer, Miller, wholesaler or cattleman was to blame.

The housewives found "there are 131 hidden government taxes on one loaf of bread," Mrs. Kresse said, and that 60 million acres of land controlled by the government lies dormant when it might be cultivated.

Another group claims its boycott has brought lower bread prices at grocery stores, saying some loaves of recent weeks now are selling generally for 25 cents.

The larger, 1½-pound loaves of bread haven't changed price and still are an object of boycott by this group which claims 5,000 members and calls itself Housewives Voice for Lower Prices. A spokesman said branches are being set up in St. Louis, Mo., Milwaukee, Wis., and Washington, D.C.

## British Aide

**ENDS VISIT TO RHODESIA**

**SALISBURY, Rhodesia (AP)**—British Commonwealth Secretary Herbert Bowden ended a nine-day visit to Rhodesia today and said he was not optimistic that an agreement would emerge from his talks with Prime Minister Ian Smith.

He said the discussions had helped clear the air.

Prime Minister Harold Wilson sent Bowden to Rhodesia in what he termed "a last attempt" to seek a reconciliation with the colony's rebellious white minority government before resorting to military action.

## Price Fixing Suit Filed Against GE

**NEW YORK (AP)**—The Justice Department has filed a federal court antitrust suit accusing the General Electric Co. of fixing the prices of light bulbs.

The government contended in its action that the company maintained bulb prices at "artificially high levels" through agency agreements with its wholesalers and retailers.

Responding in Tuesday's suit, the company commented in a statement that it was "convinced that this business practice is not only legal but that it has served the public well."

General Electric's light bulb sales were more than \$173 million in 1965, or about 50 per cent of the industry total, according to the complaint.

The suit said GE sells most of the bulbs to about 250,000 wholesalers and retailers on a consignment basis, with the bulbs remaining the property of the manufacturer until sold to users or small retailers.

Thus, the government charged, agency wholesalers and retailers have been prevented from selling the bulbs at "prices and terms of their own choice."

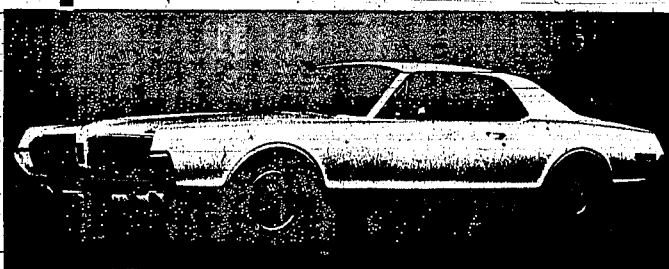

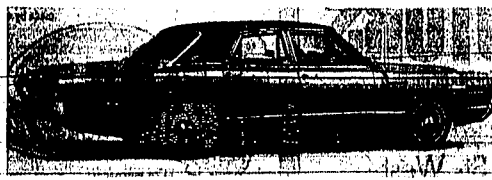

## Denmark Wants in Common Market

STRASBOURG, France (AP) — Prime Minister Jens Otto Krag of Denmark said Tuesday his country wants to become a full-fledged member of the Common Market.

"But it is absolutely clear," he said, "that under present conditions, the Danish government does not want to act alone in adhering to the European economic community," composed of France, West Germany, Italy, the Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg.

## Humphrey Gives Talk in Portland

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, fresh from announcing a truce in the Vietnam war, gave a speech in Portland, told University of Oregon students today that "we persist in our efforts to bring the war to a negotiated settlement."

"Overwhelming military power alone is not an adequate response to the years of national liberation," Humphrey said in his prepared remarks.

He said the recent election "was a recognition that the so-

cial revolution needed in Viet Nam must rest on a solid popular political base."

But he added, progress "will be threatened so long as the war in Viet Nam continues." He said this country's position was clearly for suspending bombing of North Viet Nam in exchange for "reduction of cessation of infiltration by Hanoi."

Humphrey came to Portland Tuesday night from San Diego. Antiwar demonstrators surged around the hotel where he gave a dinner address in support of Rep. Robert Duncan's U.S. senatorial campaign against the Republican Gov. Mark Hatfield.

The demonstrators, chanting, singing and waving banners, were avoided by Humphrey, and three million copies.

## Klansman Found Innocent in Slaying Case

HAYNEVILLE, Ala. (AP) — A Negro-dominated jury has found a 43-year-old steelworker innocent of a murder charge in the slaying of a white woman after the Selma-to-Montgomery march ended.

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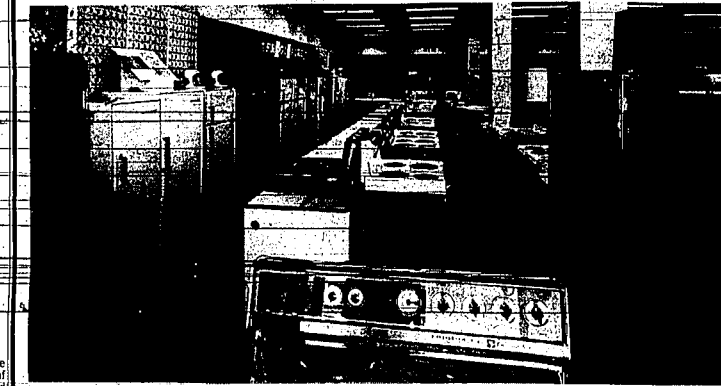

### Air of Distrust Is Created Between Dominican Factors

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — Reports here and abroad of an imminent coup look like part of an opposition plan to create an air of mutual distrust between President Joaquin Balaguer's government and military leaders.

By disrupting relations between the Dominican government and armed forces, the opposition hopes to promote a climate of political unrest such as led to the overthrow of ex-President Juan Bosch three years ago. Another objective is to frighten away foreign and local investment.

Responsible national figures here and other foreign diplomats give the scheme little chance of success, primarily because of the armed forces support of the government.

The more radical wing of Bosch's Dominican Revolutionary party and extreme leftists are apparently behind the coup propaganda. The central theme is that right-wing extremists, some in the army, are plotting to overthrow Balaguer. Havana radio recently broadcast these reports.

While discounting the possibility of an imminent coup, observers here see some justification in fears of right-wing terrorism. But they point out that most of the terrorism and violence in Santo Domingo so far has occurred in that central part of the city once controlled by rebel and leftist forces, and most if not all of the clandestine weapons found so far recovered by national police have been in homes of former rebels or leftists.

## Gromyko's Chastising of U.S. Lacks Zeal

By LEON DENNEN

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — Russia's foreign minister is one Red bureaucrat who survived many purges. He served to castigate American colonialism and imperialism but, according to veteran observers, his words no longer carry conviction. They even lack revolutionary zeal.

Pointing an accusing finger at predatory American capitalism is one thing. Gromyko's Moscow office is the center of his unceasing, left-leaning stock-in-trade. But leaders in Moscow, one must listen to him as he speaks to the United Nations, lestless assaults, they are not delegates in Russian to realize quite sure what Russia's course that the dove-faced man has should be in international affairs. His new image is hardly conveyed by the trained and monotonous, profoundly in the last six years.

It was only at the 1960 session of the United Nations General Assembly that Nikita Khrushchev took off his shoe and banged his desk with it as a gesture of contempt for the Western capitalists.

Then Russia was still the undisputed leader of a monolithic bloc of Communist states. The Soviet version of communism seemed the wave of the future in many of the emerging nations of Africa and Asia.

Today, the Communists are in serious trouble in Indonesia, Algeria, Ghana, Nigeria, Kenya, Malaya, India and the Congo. Algeria's Ben Bella disappeared without a trace. Sukarno, stripped of all power, is little more than a figurehead. He could not even prove Indonesia's role in rejoining the United Nations. Ghana's Kwame Nkrumah is a wandering exile. Even Egypt's President Nasser is struggling hard to stay in power.

In Western Europe, the young generation of Communists, taking their cue from Red China, consider the pro-Soviet revisionists as "dread revolutionists." In their view, the official pro-Russian Communist parties have become "square" organizations. Their leaders are flabby, middle-aged bureaucrats who show all signs of sclerosis, degeneration of their Marxist-Leninist ideological tissues.

This view of the "Muscovite parties" is also held by the "new left" in the United States.

Even more significant is the growing spirit of independence among Russia's East European satellites. Nowhere is this more evident than in the halls of the United Nations.

The Romanians, taking advantage of the Russian-Chinese rift, have decided to go into business for themselves. They are trying to convince anyone who will listen to them that they are no longer Moscow's satellite. Yet Romania was once Russia's most servile satellite.

Some East Europeans make no secret of their belief that the Viet Cong cannot win in Viet Nam.

DUNLAP, Tenn. (AP)—A single-engine plane crashed on a mountain top near here Tuesday, killing three executives of one of the nation's largest toy distributors.

The bodies of Earl Letticey, 41, O.S. Hillman, 45, and Robert Rayburn, 33, all of Columbia, S.C., were found inside the burning plane when officers arrived at the scene of the crash.

A witness said the plane's engine was "sputtering" and "just went straight down," smashing into a dirt road on top of Daus Mountain about seven miles west of here.

The victims were executives of Letticey Distributing Inc. The firm has offices in Columbia, Houston, New Orleans, Miami, Atlanta, and Nashville.

### War Policy Backer Wins Narrow Vote

NEW YORK (AP) — Rep. Leonard Forbstein, who led his campaign on support for President Johnson's Viet Nam policy, has scored a narrow victory over a vigorous administration critic in a special Democratic primary.

The margin in Tuesday's 18th Congressional District rerun primary was under 400 votes out of more than 33,000 cast.

Forbstein, 63, a five-term congressman who has more success in recent years of winning by close elections, polled 17,000 votes in the unofficial tally.

His opponent, City Councilman Theodore S. Weiss, 39, a reforming Democrat, had 16,151 votes.

Forbstein was backed by the regular Democratic organization in Manhattan — Tammany Hall.

The contest was the second for Forbstein and Weiss, who had battled in the regular June 28 primary. Weiss had won by 61 votes in the unofficial tally, but a recount put Forbstein ahead by 151 votes.

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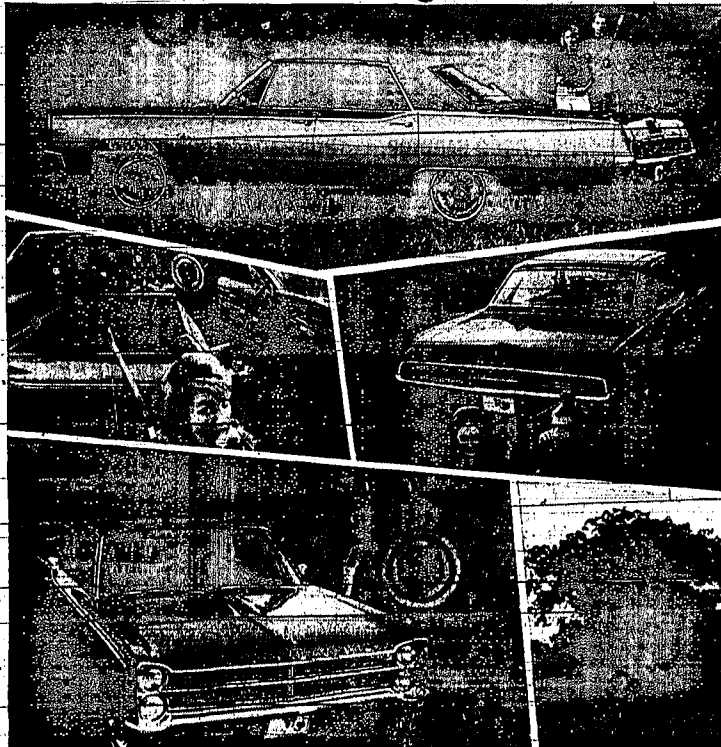

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# Young Stowaway Safe After Long Flight

MEXICO CITY (AP). — A 17-year-old Mexican stowaway was found safe in Queretaro today after a 2,000-mile flight from Colombia in the wheel compartment of a jet airliner.

"I was really scared part of the time," said Francisco Cuevas Garcia, "but I made it, and that's what I wanted to do — get home as quickly as possible."

Francisco said he got home sick after six months in Colombia but didn't have the money to take a plane back to Mexico. He would have taken so long to work his way home on a freighter — the way he went to Colombia.

"It's incredible, but he apparently did ride in the wheel well all the way from Bogota," said Ramon Watkins, the Mexican City manager for Colombia's Avianca Airline.

The four-engine jet flew as

high as 34,000 feet through altitudes as low as 45 degrees below zero, Watkins said. The lad was cramped into the wheel well so tightly that after the plane landed in Mexico City early Tuesday he could not get down. He had to call for help to mechanics servicing the plane. Doctors looked him over, found nothing wrong and turned him over to Mexican immigration authorities. They established his Mexican citizenship.

"He's free now and left for Queretaro as soon as we let him go," an immigration official said Tuesday night.

Watkins said the plane's flight time from Bogota to Mexico City was more than four hours. The plane spent about an hour on the ground in Panama, its only stop.

Francisco said he sneaked into the wheel well about 30

minutes before the plane took off from Bogota Monday night. He squeezed to one side of the compartment and hoped the wheels would not crush him when they were retracted.

"The plane took off and the wheels started coming up and I thought I was going to be crushed," he said. "The wheels came in and I squeezed to one side as far as I could and saw they wouldn't mash me. Then the doors closed in the floor and everything was dark."

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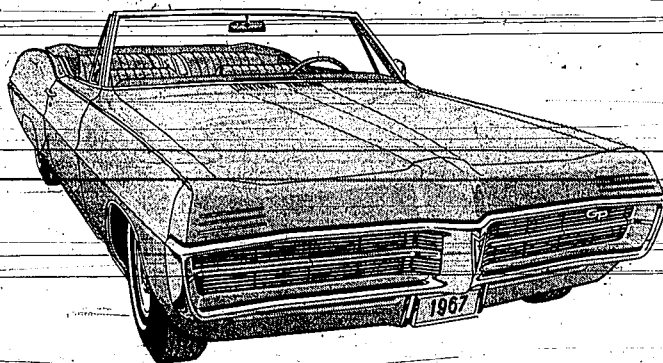
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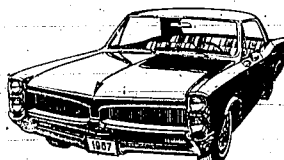

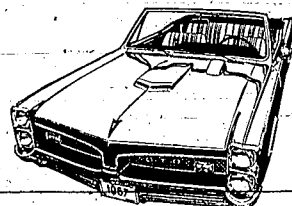

# 25th Infantry Has Black Ace up Its Sleeve

By TOM TIEBE  
NEW YORK (NEA) — The general rule for success in counterinsurgency warfare is that it takes a sneak to catch a sneak. And, fortunately for the United States' efforts in Viet Nam, combat GIs are getting to be as sneaky as anybody in Southeast Asia.

Take the men of the 25th Infantry, for example. Some time ago they determined that the ace of spades, long an ominous symbol in the playing nations of the world, is even more so among some of the enemy. The Viet Cong, they concluded, have a thing about the card and avoid it like a mortar shell.

So the men wrote to the U.S. Playing Card Co. in Cincinnati for "approximately 1,000 aces of spades" in order to use them as a "psychological weapon" in areas where they wanted to put the whammy on the infiltrating Communists. Then more men wrote. Then more.

The result has been that the company now sends out many thousands of such spades "free of charge" for any warfront GI requesting. And so many have been distributed that the indication is whole units of card-carrying soldiers are shuffling through rice paddies like river-

boat gamblers in jungle boots. Does it work? The 25th Infantry says it does.

The VC, of course, aren't commenting. But one thing is certain. Casey American troops are only thought up the card trick they indirectly thought up, the game that goes with it. Until

Yanks brought them into the country, there was no recorded proof of any native fear of the ace of spades.

"We are a superstitious people," says Vietnamese United Nations assistant Phan Huy Bach, "but not of playing cards. At least not before the Americans came."

And now?

"Perhaps some VC do fear the symbol now. They tend to fear all U. S. innovations because so many of them explode. So it could be that the enemy has become afraid of the ace of spades . . . simply because they just don't know what it is." Why the Cong fear the card

is, however, academic. The point is they do. And, further, they show signs of fearing an increasing amount of such GI chicanery.

The "black box" is another example. It is a small empty carton, usually fashioned with several impressive wires. Some U. S. Special Forces types have

used it to considerable advantage when interrogating captured Communist guerrillas.

They will question the prisoner. And he will refuse to answer. They will threaten the prisoner.

And he will shrug anew. Finally, the captive is hooked up to the strange black box. He is told that if he does not talk the container has power to blow his head off. Thus, the victim normally begins to chatter up a storm of information.

"Everybody," explains the

U. S. back, "is superstitious of losing his head."

One other bewitching artifact that has worked on the battle field has been a Polaroid camera. Some VC especially those from ardently superstitious mountain areas, believe that cameras imprison their sacred spirits. Hence, our side has learned that to tear up a photo will often tear down the captive's reluctance to cooperate.

There are other examples. Certain VC wear amulets to ward off American evil, while

others believe Kanks are

poison touch; to take the talismans from the former, or to simply touch the latter is often the most effective weapon in a soldier's arsenal.

For years Americans have tried vainly to overcome the superstitious fear many backwoods Vietnamese have of them. Now they are simply taking advantage of the same existing situation among some of the enemy.

The Viet Cong dealt this game. American troops are only playing all of their aces.

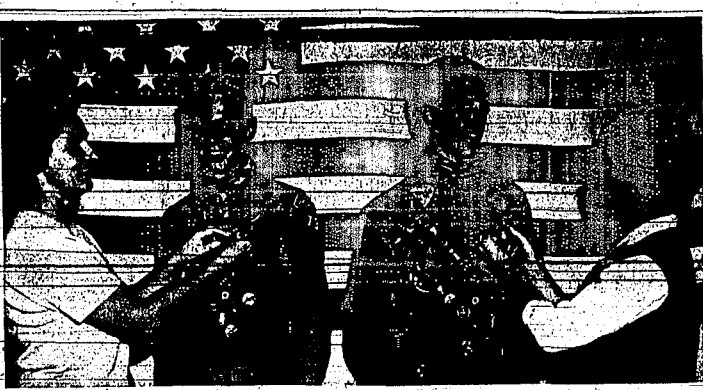

# New Hampshire Sweepstakes Foes Believe Voters Will Approve It

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — New Hampshire's sweepstakes, not quite the winner some had hoped, faces a second hurdle.

While other states are considering legalizing a sweep, New Hampshire voters decide Nov. 8 if tickets may continue to be sold in their communities.

Event's most vocal opponents believe the sweeps will win. "I'd be amazed if it didn't," said Richard Plummer, editor of the University of New Hampshire alumni magazine and a key member of the "Committee of 100," which campaigned against the lottery before the original referendum in 1964. It passed then by a 3 to 1 margin.

The opposition is not organized to any degree that I know of," added Plummer, "and there's no plan to gain a repeal — that's not realistic at this point. I still don't feel the sweepstakes is doing the job."

"It's bringing in a few million dollars that we wouldn't have otherwise — but, because of its perhaps genuine tax reform is being put off."

Edward J. Powers, former FBI agent who is executive director of the sweepstakes, said he would ask the 1967 Legislature to authorize additional sales outlets in the state and provide more money for advertising and promotion.

The sweeps will come closer to reaching its financial potential, he said, "if we can merchandise our product and make it available on a national market."

The 1967 sweepstakes is off to a poor start: Sales during the

first few weeks are more than \$12,000 behind the 1965 lottery. At \$3 apiece, tickets worth \$3.98 million were sold on the 1965 sweepstakes, a drop from the \$3.8 million sold on the 1964 lottery. The first year's lottery, however, was a success.

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# Jerome Tax Levies Are Down in '66

JEROME—Jerome County tax levies are down this year over 1965 as a result of provisions made in Senate Bill No. 246, according to Mrs. Ella McVey, Jerome County Clerk.

Also, income generally is up over 1965, although according to law, revenue from a single source for 1966 cannot be more than for 1965 from the same source.

Jerome taxpayers will find no State Building Fund levy on their tax bills this year. Mrs. McVey explained that Jerome is one of the few counties in the state where this is so. In Jerome's case it is because of a small surplus accrued from prior years which will pay state requirements for this year.

Although several levies are down, the average taxpayer may see a small rise in his individual bill because of the Junior College levy, new this year.

Mrs. McVey said that the county levies include current expense, which is 53 cents, compared to 80 cents last year; charity and relief, 11 cents, down from 50 cents last year; Agricultural, 11½ cents, down from 15 cents; weed control, 7.5 cents, down from 10 cents; county school, 62.3 cents, down from 77.8 cents; and health, 7.5 cents, down from 10 cents. Total county levies are 132.3 cents, compared to 132.3 in 1965.

City of Jerome levies are general, 22.5¢, down from 22.50 in 1965; parks and recreation, 27.2 cents, down from 30 cents; streets and lighting, \$1.359, down from \$1.50; and library, 22.6 cents, down from 15 cents. Total city levies are \$4.12 compared with \$4.55 last year.

Levies for the village of Eden include general, \$1.48, compared with \$1.50 in 1965; street and alley fund, \$1.10; police, 10 cents; and lighting, 80 cents, both the same as last year.

Levies for the village of Hazelton include general, \$2.50; lighting, 70 cents, both the same as last year; disposal plant, 20 cents, down from 30 cents last year; streets, 50 cents, up from 50 cents last year; fire, 16 cents, down from 20 cents; and building fund, 10 cents, down from 30 cents.

Total levies for 1966 are \$4.26, compared to \$4.50 last year.

School district levies are all down. Total levy for district is \$3.20, for 20, \$2.70; \$2.58; \$2.28; \$2.01; \$2.67; \$2.71; \$3.18; \$3.12; \$2.07; \$3.1, \$3.385, and the new Junior College levy, 69½ cents.

Jerome Highway District levy is \$2.7 cents, compared with \$1 last year; Good Roads District, 68 cents, compared with \$1; Hillsdale Highway District, 70 cents, compared with \$1.

The fire district levies all are down, with Jerome Fire District showing 20 cents this year compared to 30 cents in 1965; First Segregation District with 34½ cents, compared to 50 cents; and West End District with 10 cents compared to 30 cents.

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## Safety in Hunting With Scopes Noted

The average shooter who looks to a telescopic sight for added shooting pleasure is apt to think more in terms of accuracy and increased success than anything else. He's forgetting the most important factor in hunting — safety.

There's no guesswork involved when a man hunts with a scope. A mounted rifle, little chance for mistaken identity. When he throws his gun to his shoulder he knows at a glance what his target is. He gets a real close look before he shoots. The same cannot be said for the man who hunts with open sights. He must rely on normal vision to tell him that what he sees is a legal target.

A scope provides the shooter with the means of positive identification. He automatically takes a second or two in which to glaze his target before pulling the trigger.

This safety factor alone is ample reason why any man who hunts with a rifle should want to equip that rifle with a quality scope sight.

There are other advantages to using a scope. This tubular instrument, with its magnifying lenses and light-gathering power, provides a larger, clearer target for the shooter.

Because it does gather and concentrate light, hunters are afforded extra hours of safe hunting in dark, wooded areas and during approaching twilight hours when visibility is poor.

Prove it to yourself. Try identifying an object with the naked eye when light conditions are poor and then scope the same object. You'll see the difference. The results are a brighter picture, larger target and positive identification. They all add up to safer shooting.

When you figure it out, safety is worth a lot more than the cost of a rifle. It's one of the things you buy when you invest in a quality telescope. Don't be with out one when the hunting season opens.

## Fleet Antelope Is One Of Idaho's Top Trophies

The graceful speeding antelope has always proved to be one of Idaho's most popular game animals. Each year hundreds of residents and non-residents hunt the high flatlands, trying to bag one of the elusive trophies.

Much of the best antelope hunting is within a few hours drive of Twin Falls and lies within the area of Southeast Idaho.

The antelope is an adaptable creature, one that has adapted itself to the flat desert areas such as Owyhee, Twin Falls and Cassia Counties and to the higher, more mountainous terrain around Copper Basin, east of Sun Valley over Trail Creek Summit.

Antelope, in the desert regions that are on the boundary of Nevada, are generally in more remote regions and would seldom be seen by the tourist unless he ventured from the major highways.

But antelope in the northern parts, such as Copper Basin, frequently are seen from the highways or good gravel roads that pass through the area.

During the off seasons, like many big game animals, they have little fear, and only a

healthy respect for man. They can be seen at close range from automobiles and frequently photographed without the need for special telephoto lenses.

But they are an intelligent animal and when the first day of the season opens they are prone to virtually disappear, only to re-appear after the season closes.

— But regardless of their good sense and speed, many of the beautiful trophies are taken each year by the careful hunter who is willing to make a careful stalk and who is a good shot.

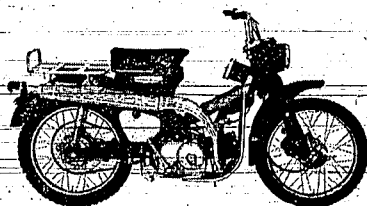
There are two major seasons open on antelope — the controlled hunt where the hunters apply for permits to the Fish and Game Department, and the special archery hunts.

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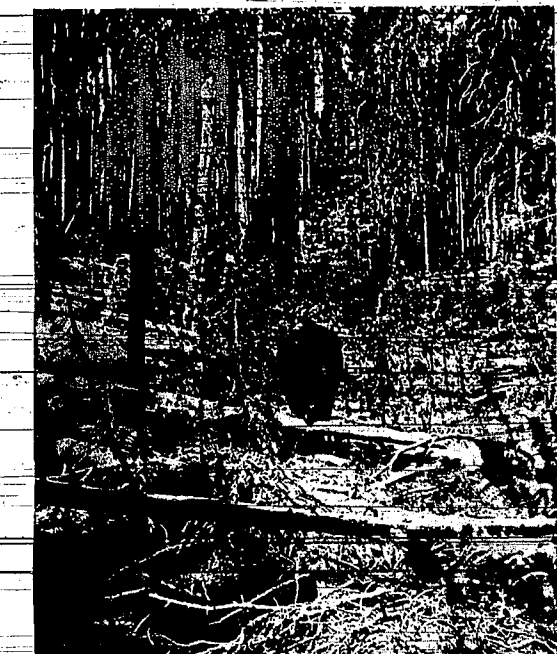

## Hunting Season Increases Camas County Population

FAIRFIELD-Camas County, which has one of the smallest populations in the state, increases many times during the big game hunting season.

Hunters from all over the state and out-of-state hunters converge in this section in hopes of being able to get a deer or elk. They come in all manners of conveyances — automobiles, trucks, pickups, jeeps and other four-wheel drive vehicles, tents, and similar forms of transportation.

Their cargo includes horses, mules and donkeys. Trailers and campers are becoming more popular as the roads have been improved though many still camp in their tents.

The main attraction is the North and South Soldier hunts. The North hunt is a drawing hunt for elk but is open for deer hunting. The South hunt is a controlled hunt for both deer and elk.

Hunters should consult their big game maps for the boundaries and opening dates. The North hunt is hunt area No. 43 and the South hunt is in area No. 44. Both hunts received more applications than there are permits.

The Forest Service have made improvements in the roads and campgrounds during the summer. There is a construction project on the road over Wells Summit and those wishing to enter that section should go over Couch Summit and up Little Smokey.

Willow-creek section on the east end of the hunt is always a favorite spot for many hunters. Many go over Flack Summit to the remote areas in the South Boise drainage. Others go down the South Boise River and Jan out in the many canyons toward Featherhills. The Mono Creek drainage has always been popular with those having horses and pack outfits. Those planning on hunting

should be prepared for bad weather. Camas County Sheriff Paul Cox warns all hunters coming into this area to carry fire chains and cold weather equipment.

In addition to the Soldier hunts, there is an open deer hunt south of highway 68 in Camas and Elmore Counties.

## Four Items Hunters Must Do Listed

Four things hunters must do when hunting, according to the Idaho Fish and Game Department are:

1. To securely attach the appropriate game animal tag to the carcass of a game animal

- as soon as the same is killed.
- To immediately punch tag in the two appropriate places designating the correct day and month of the kill.
- To stop and report at any checking station encountered en route to and from the hunting area regardless of whether or not game are in possession.
- To produce license, tags and all game for inspection when requested by authorized representatives of the Fish and Game Department.

# Pheasant Hunting Brings Into Focus Obligation of Hunters to Landowners

Fish and Game Department  
are definite areas in  
the relations between humans in  
every day living that demand  
a keen sense of individual ob-  
ligation and responsibility to  
one's fellow man.

One area that persistently  
tests human relations is land-  
owner-sportsman relations each  
year when hunting seasons roll  
around. The depth of this in-  
dividual responsibility is brought  
into focus when the sportsman  
using the upland game bird sea-  
son and in particular, during  
the pheasant season.

Close to 80 percent of the  
pheasant hunting activity in Idaho  
occurs on private property.  
Therefore, it is inescapable that  
the 30,000 of us that enjoy pheas-  
ant hunting each year must  
recognize and assume our moral  
and legal obligation to respect  
private property rights.

We have absolutely nothing to  
gain by abusing the landowner  
or his property, and stand to  
lose everything as it relates to  
pheasant hunting. The pheasant  
hunter who truly appreciates  
the sport would be well advised  
to see the example for those  
participants not so closely iden-  
tified with pheasant hunting.

Particularly sub-advised need  
guidance and example to set a  
standard for determining their  
relations with landowners. On  
occasion landowner-sportsman  
relations are aggravated in cer-  
tain locales throughout the state  
because of careless and thought-  
less actions, and out and out  
illegal activities.

It is ridiculous for pheasant  
hunters to permit landowner-  
sportsman relations to degen-  
erate to such a level. The depth  
of pheasant hunting in jeopardy  
can be avoided if the majority  
of the pheasant hunters assume  
their individual obligations to  
the landowner and his property.

Law enforcement pressure  
can be increased, prosecutions  
stepped up, landowners can post  
their properties more intensely,  
but in the final analysis it is up  
to each individual pheasant  
hunter to examine his basic  
philosophy relative to his de-  
portment while hunting on private  
property.

A recent series of meetings  
between 40 to 50 landowners,  
game department personnel,  
sheriff's officers, and other in-  
terested persons in the Rupert  
area regarding unauthorized  
hunter trespass would suggest  
a relaxing of the sense of in-  
dividual responsibility. These  
landowners felt relations were  
at a low enough ebb in this area  
to call the meetings.

The landowners more com-  
monly complained about unau-  
thorized hunter trespass, leaving  
gates down and permitting live-  
stock to escape; driving vehicles  
over wet ground or crops; shoot-  
ing near farm buildings; spoiling  
crops; and walking through un-  
harvested crops, including dog  
damage to seed crops. Probably  
the single most aggravated com-  
plaint was the failure of the  
hunters to ask permission to  
hunt.

The landowners in looking for  
relief suggested remedial ac-  
tion ranging from complete clo-  
sure of the hunting season and  
all lands to all hunting to re-  
quiring written permission for  
trespassing. After taking a close  
look at all the implications in-  
volved, the landowners with the  
Idaho Fish and Game Department  
agreed to cooperate on a mutu-  
ally accepted approach to the  
problem.

Participating landowners  
agreed to post their fenced lands  
with "Hunting or Trespassing  
by Written Permission Only"  
signs. The signs will indicate  
how or where to contact the  
landowner. Personnel of the Idaho  
Fish and Game Department,  
during the course of normal en-  
forcement duties, will check  
hunting on these lands so posted.

If the hunters do not possess  
written permission, the officer  
will contact the landowner. The  
landowner must sign a criminal  
trespass complaint to initiate  
criminal proceedings against  
the trespasser. If he desires to  
take legal action, Idaho Fish  
and Game Department personnel  
will assist the landowner  
through the necessary legal  
steps to obtain prosecution.

Hunters checked by Idaho  
Fish and Game Department  
trespassing on unfenced lands  
that are posted will be advised  
that they are liable for civil  
damage and the officer will add  
the landowner if requested.

Criminal action can be initiated  
in this situation if the landowner  
orders the hunter off his prop-  
erty and the hunter refuses to  
leave.

The Fish and Game Depart-  
ment will solicit the county sher-  
iff's assistance in responding to  
unauthorized trespass cases if  
Fish and Game personnel are  
unavailable. Communication  
network will be upgraded to  
facilitate quick response to land-  
owners having trespass prob-  
lems.

The Fish and Game laws state  
in part, "Any person using the  
land of another for recreational  
purposes, with or without per-

mission shall be liable for any  
damages to property—livestock,  
or crops which he may incur  
while on said property."

The Fish and Game Depart-  
ment will endeavor to enlist the  
aid of sheriff's officers and state  
patrol to increase enforcement  
pressure toward control of il-  
legal road hunting activities.

Specifically this means the  
act of discharging a firearm  
from or across a public road,  
or fence at game birds from a  
motorized vehicle on public  
or private property. Participat-  
ing landowners agreed to aid  
the Fish and Game personnel  
in the identity and prosecution  
of those involved in illegal road  
activities.

Those of us that intend to  
hunt pheasants this fall must  
remember that the mere pur-  
chase of a hunting license does

not permit trespass on private  
property. We would be well  
advised to ask permission to  
hunt on private property. (Post-  
ed or not, fenced or unfenced.)

In fact, contact with land-  
owners that have likely looking  
pheasant cover prior to the  
season would be wise. Make ar-  
rangements where you would  
like to hunt ahead of the season  
opening. Remember, more often  
than not, the simple courtesy  
of sharing your birds with the  
landowner reflects your appre-  
ciation for the privilege to hunt  
and may insure future oppor-  
tunity to hunt there.

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# Game Must Be Tagged Quick, Proper

Quick and proper tagging of big game animals was urged this week by the Idaho Fish and Game Department.

In a plea to hunters who are getting ready for the start of the general elk and deer season, the department listed several things important in validating game tags so that the kill can be legally claimed.

The hunter must carry at all times in the field the proper hunting license and tag for the hunt in which he is participating. Tough-fabric tags are issued for all big game animals except bear.

At the time of the kill the hunter must punch the game tag in three places to show the month and day the animal was bagged and its sex.

At the time of the kill the hunter must fasten the punched tag to the carcass, preferably inside the rib cage or hook.

This can be done with the wire provided for that purpose or by other means.

The hunter cannot legally transport any big game animal except bear at any time if the carcass is not properly tagged.

This includes transportation by foot, horseback, vehicles, as well as in possession at camp, on the road or at home.

The law further provides that the tag accompany the carcass to the locker or to wherever it is processed.

## Field Care For Game Meat Urged

With big game hunting seasons getting under way, the Idaho Fish and Game Department has urged all sportsmen to follow the practices of proper field care of their game meat.

"Wild game meat is nearly always very good to eat, if the sportsman will take time to take proper care of it in the field," a department spokesman said. "Generally speaking, the nearer a hunter can come to packing house methods in the handling of game meat, the better it will taste."

Three common practices which detract most from the quality of big-game meat are failure to cool the meat properly before hauling it home, hauling meat on fenders of cars or any place where it won't stay cool, and in the case of antelope, failure to skin the animal immediately after the kill is made.

The department recommends the following procedure for taking care of game meat in the field:

1. Skin and dress the animal immediately after the kill is made. In the case of antelope, skin the animal before dressing.
2. Wash all blood and hair from the animal before transporting home. Water won't hurt the meat if allowed to drain off.
3. Let the meat cool several hours before transporting it. The meat should be hung or placed on brush so that air can circulate around it.

Quartering and necking the animal in checked cloth bags permits quicker cooling and easier transporting.

Be sure that the meat is cooled before wrapping it up to transport—it is good to stay another day and be sure the meat is taken care of properly.

### MEAT CARE NOTED

An elk should be dressed, skinned, quartered and hung up off the ground as soon as possible after it is killed. Then the meat should be handled until it has cooled thoroughly.

## Search for Prize Horns of Big Horn Sheep Bring Hunters to Salmon Area

SALMON — Hunters take to the wild, tumbled mountains of the Idaho Primitive Area each September in search of prize horns of the Big Horn Sheep or trophy Mountain Goat.

And to assist them in their quest and to see that the game laws protecting the species are not broken, personnel of the Idaho Fish and Game Department take to the trails.

Mountain sheep and goat were hunted last year in the western Idaho primitive area from Sept. 4 to 17.

Conservation officers of the Idaho Fish and Game Department move into the area several days before the hunt opens. The patrols, using a pack string with three horses to ride and three to pack in the necessary gear and supplies, set up base camps out of which to operate during the hunt.

With feed limited in the high country, grain for the horses also is packed in. Food is of the dehydrated kind to lessen the weight.

Weather at the nine to 10, thousand feet elevations usually ruins the scale from sunny and warm to rain, freezing and snow.

Department patrols operate in Big Horn Crags, Middle Fork Peak, Sleeping Deer and Stoddard areas of the Middle Fork.

Department personnel travel the primitive area trails, checking hunters and their game, measuring the horns on the sheep and goat killed to give the sportsman an idea of how they measure up to Boone and Crockett Club standards.

One of the biggest services performed is providing hunters with information on the mountainous country they are hunting in.

Hunters in the primitive area also take advantage of the fishing in the high mountain lakes which are only accessible for a few months in the summer.

Most of the hunters set up a base camp with water, then move up high on a ridge where they think the sheep and goat will be. Sometimes they wait for several days.

Meat and horns must accompany the hunter out of the primitive area. Neither can be taken out separately. Some hunters enter the area on foot, packing enough food and equipment in a 25-pound backpack for 30 days.

Department personnel cover the areas over the trail system which at times proves rough going with slides, rock and fallen trees having nearly obliterated the path ahead.

## Magic Valley Hunters After Soldier Mountain Elk Will Probably Get Them

Hunters who are lucky enough to draw a permit on either hunting units 43 or 44 stand a good chance of getting their elk.

Whether the hunter enters the Soldier Mountain Elk Herd territory through Fairfield or Featherville, he will find excellent camping facilities provided by the Forest Service along the major drainages of the South Fork of the Boise River, Big Smoky Creek and Little Smoky Creek.

Most of the area occupied by this herd is back country with no roads. However, there are many miles of Forest Service trail system which will provide the hunter with good access to the elk country.

There are approximately 340 miles of such trails on the Fairfield Ranger District, and 216 miles of trails on the Snake Creek District.

Last year more than 9,000 hunters visited the Soldier Mountain area to hunt elk and deer. Many of the hunters use horses to gain access to the back country and to pack their meat out. However, there are

many areas that are but a short distance from the road and can be hunted on foot.

The terrain of the Soldier Mountain Elk herd is mostly rough and broken with elevations ranging from 7,000 to well above 10,000 feet. Most of the south exposures are covered with grass, weeds, and brush while the north exposures are timbered.

The elevations from 9,000 to 10,000 feet are characterized by many high rocky mountain peaks. These high mountain peaks form the Soldier Mountain Range and the Big Smoky Mountain Range, well known to many a hunter in the South Fork of the Boise area. From many locations among the high peaks of these two mountain ranges the hunter can view the famous Sawtooth Mountain Range.

After the hunter has traveled by horse or foot far beyond the existing roads, he will find excellent camping spots at such locations as Big Meadows, on the West Fork of Big Smoky Creek, and Ross Fork near the headwaters of the South Fork

of the Boise River.

Big Peak Creek is a favorite spot of many hunters, and here he will camp at the foot of Big Peak, which is well over 10,000 feet high. This is an area where a hunter can enjoy a wonderful experience of back country camping along with the hunting of elk.

The Soldier Mountain elk herd began with the transplant of 75 head of elk from the Yellowstone herd in the fall of 1914 at Barber. Elk were hauled to Barber by rail and fed during the winter of 1914 and 1915. In the spring of 1915, they were hauled to a point above Arrow Rock Reservoir and released.

A portion of the elk crossed the Boise River and established themselves on Great Mountain. The other portion of this herd galloped on northwest onto Mount Helen. About 1922, a substantial part of this herd spread as far east as Smith Creek for summer range.

The first noticeable spread to the north and east of Smith Creek was about 1927 and was limited to a small number and

Whisky Jack, Green Dog and Fall Creek. Small bunches began to winter in Trinity Creek, Roaring River and the Bear Creek drainages.

The winter of 1932-33 was severe in the upper South Fork of the Boise River and forced about 75 elk out of Trinity and Bear Creeks down onto the South Fork of the Boise River above Featherville. Here they spent the winter of 1932-33.

In the spring of 1933, most of this group of elk traveled east. They left their winter ground and summered on the north exposures of the South Boise River from Featherville to Big Smoky Creek. Here they wintered in 1934. This group eventually became the Soldier Mountain herd.

An interesting fact is noted, that in 1932 it was decided cougars were responsible for considerable elk losses. Forest Service—Fish and Game and U. S. Wildlife Service people operated in a test hunt in each of the major tributaries of the Snake of the Boise and South Fork of the Payette Rivers.

This resulted in a take of 92 cougars, at least one from each main tributary drainage on the Boise National Forest. Cougar control was continued thereafter and is no longer a factor in the loss of elk or deer on the Boise River drainages.

From a small transplant of elk from Barber, Idaho, a short distance from Barber, we now have the famous Soldier Mountain Elk Herd.

By 1933, the Smith Creek herd had spread over a large portion of the South Fork and Middle Fork of the Boise River.

Elk were observed in Vaughn Creek, Roaring River, Bear Creek above Rocky Bar, Trinity,

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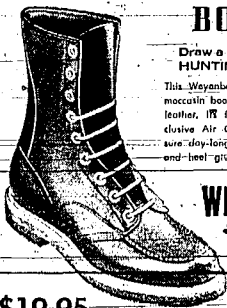

# Road Travel Great Risk For Hunters

WASHINGTON — Approximately 100 million sportsmen will have driven more than 20 billion miles before the year is out, just to enjoy the nation's great outdoors.

Statistics show that many will not survive to enjoy their favorite outdoor pursuits another year. Highway traffic deaths and accidents reached an all-time high in 1965.

According to figures compiled by a leading insurance firm, more than 4,000,000 persons were either killed or injured on the nation's roads last year. It marked the first time the casualty count exceeded the four million level.

The figure includes 48,500 fatalities and 4,100,000 injuries, a one per cent increase over 1964 in the former category and a seven per cent increase in the latter.

Sportsmen can't afford to relax their vigilance while traveling to and from fishing and hunting areas. They must exercise the same amount of caution on the road as they do afield with rod and gun.

Weekends are the most dangerous periods for highway travel. Statistics show that more than 50 per cent of all highway deaths last year occurred from Friday through Sunday, with Saturday the most dangerous of the three days.

Of the 48,500 fatalities recorded in 1965, 21.9 per cent took place on Saturday, 15.4 per cent on Friday and 18.7 per cent on Sunday. Although operators, 25 years of age or under represent only 18 per cent of all licensed drivers, they were involved in more than 30 per cent of all fatal accidents and 28 per cent of all non-fatal last year.

The most dangerous hours for highway travel, according to the latest report, are between 5 and 7 p.m. During this three-hour period in 1965, nearly 20 per cent of all fatal accidents and more than 19 per cent of non-fatal mishaps occurred.

The hunting season is upon us and sportsmen will do well to keep these statistics in mind while on the road.

Hunters are anxious to get to that favorite hunting area, but the idea is to get there safely, enjoy hunting, and return home safely.

## Safety Check Is Urged For Firearms and Gear

**BOISE** — Carelessness about checking gun barrels for obstructions before loading and firing can result in a split barrel or other damage to the weapon — or injury to the shooter.

E. Kless Brown, chief of information and education for the Idaho Fish and Game Department, says hunters may avoid this type of misfortune through regular inspection and cleaning of firearms.

A common obstruction that sometimes causes plenty of trouble on a hunt is a mud plug caused by dropping or resting the gun barrel on the ground.

Failure to inspect the barrel before inserting the shell and pulling the trigger can result in one big bang — and no gun," says Brown.

He suggested that hunters inspect and clean their guns well ahead of the season. Check points should include barrel, safety, receiver, ejector,

screws, firing pin, stock where it joins the receiver (for

cracks), and sight alignment.

Other items to check as insurance for greater safety and comfort while out on hunting trips are compass, knife, binoculars, footgear, shell vest or belt, gloves and other suitable clothing designed for maxi-

mum outdoor comfort and freedom of movement.

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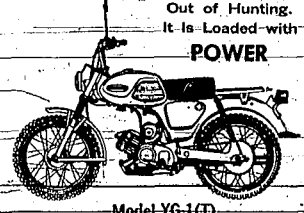

# 16 Unlawful

## Items Are Reported

The Idaho Fish and Game Department says that there are 16 unlawful items to remember when going hunting.

The unlawful items are:

1. To hunt or take game or carry an uncased rifle or shotgun in the fields or forests without a valid hunting license.

2. To pursue, hunt or kill any big game without first having procured the appropriate license and game animal tag and controlled hunt permit if required.

3. To hunt upon private lands without first obtaining permission.

4. To shoot from or across a public highway.

5. To shoot at any game animal from a mechanically powered vehicle, aircraft or boat, or capture or kill big game with pitfalls, traps or snares.

6. To hunt or kill any game with the aid of artificial light or to shine or locate any big game animal with a six-volt or larger light while in possession of any uncased firearm.

7. To wantonly kill or destroy or maliciously waste any game.

8. To hunt, shoot at, kill or attempt to kill any big game animal with a .22 caliber firearm using rimfire cartridges.

9. To hunt big game (except bear) with the use of dogs.

10. To molest, rally, stir up or drive any game animal or game birds with any aircraft, motor-driven vehicle or boat, or sail boat.

11. To spot or locate game of any kind with an aircraft and communicate this information by any signal or means to a person or persons on the ground.

12. To use a helicopter to take game or transport game, hunt-

ers or hunting gear except from and to established landing fields, heliports or landing areas on private ground.

13. To transfer any license, permit or tag to another person or to use another person's license, permit or tag.

14. To purchase more than one license in order to procure

more than the legal number of deer or one bear.

15. To use a nonresident restricted-deer or bear license in conjunction with any other license to take more than two

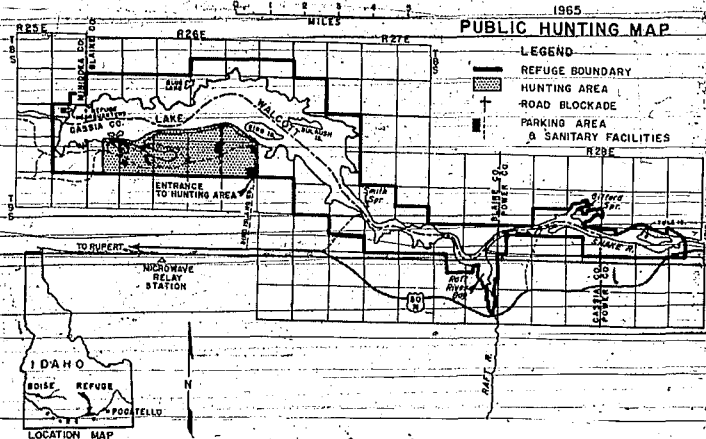
deer or one bear.

16. To take, capture or kill by any means or device whatsoever any big game animals from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise.

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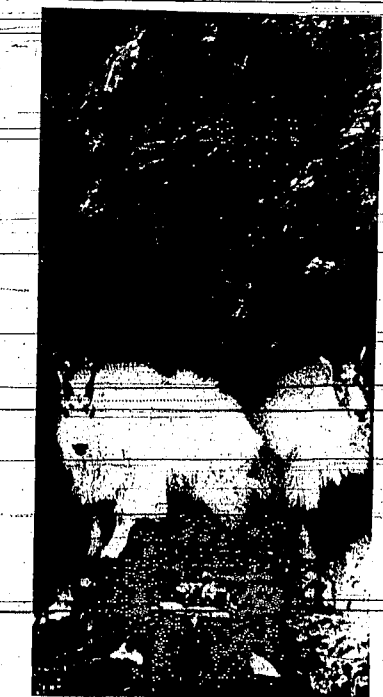

## Experience Is Teacher for Hunting Dogs

So you have a hunting dog. If he's been trained you have some pleasant days ahead of you.

If he hasn't you have a pain coming in your pate.

Experience is a good teacher—even for a pointer pup. But he can't be expected to know all about a hunt if he's never been on one.

If you are going to train your dog as you go along, and avoid the expense of the professional handler, there are several things you must keep in mind.

The dog must learn that he is hunting birds and not chasing cows. He should not be loosed in a first hour storm of buckshot. He should be indoctrinated with care.

It is best to leave untrained dogs in the car until after the hunt settles down. Or they should be held on a leash. After the first shooting they can be allowed to roam to a certain degree and get the feel of the hunt.

Each time a bird is shot, the dog should be given a chance to smell it. He may be taught to carry it. Familiarity with the game bird being hunted has never spoiled a good breed of pup.

It is proper to keep the dog disciplined from his very first hunt. Go slow, encourage him to roam a short distance ahead of you.

Praise and pet him when he does a good job. By the stimulus-response method he will eventually learn his trade.

The best route to good hunting over bird dogs is to turn the dog over to a professional handler for a course in pheasantry. It's the cheapest way in the long run, best for the dog and best for the hunter.

## All Game Meats Must Be Saved by Hunters

BOISE — The Idaho Fish and Game Department reminded hunters today that "wantonly killing, wasting or destroying game animals is a misdemeanor

and punishable under state law.

Quoting from the law, Conservation Enforcement Chief Hawley Hill says that whoever "de-

taches or removes from the carcass . . . only the head, hide, antlers, horns, tusk or tusks, tooth or teeth, or any or all of the aforesaid parts, or captures or mutilates any such animal while alive by removing or detaching a tooth or teeth, or tusk or tusks therefrom, is guilty of a misdemeanor."

Bear is the only game animal species that is excepted from this provision.

Further along, the law states that "the failure of any person to properly dress and care for any game animal killed by such person or persons, if reasonably accessible, within 24 hours, and to take or transport to camp

of such person or persons such carcass and there properly take care of the same, shall be prima facie evidence of the violation of the provisions of this section."

### USE GUN CARE

When putting rifles or shotguns into the car, uncase, make sure the gun is empty and that you handle the rifle by the butt. Also, make sure that no one else in your hunting party is putting a gun into the car from the opposite side at the same time. This puts two lives in danger.

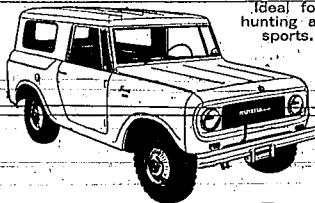

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# No Species Restriction Noted for Duck Hunting

BOISE — Idaho's migratory waterfowl hunters, along with others throughout the Pacific Flyway states, will have more liberal regulations than last year, John R. Woodworth, Director of the Fish and Game Department, reported today.

The season length this year is exactly the same as 1965, but duck limits for Idaho have been increased in a part of the state. The big change this year is that there are no species restrictions in the shooting of ducks, except for the usual limited bag on the scarce wood duck.

Last year, in the counties outside the Columbia Basin Mallard area, hunters could only include three mallards or pintails in the daily bag limit. This had a severe limiting effect on hunters in some areas of the state, where the day before mallards were plentiful.

According to Woodworth, the Idaho season for both ducks and geese opens one-half hour before sunrise throughout the state on Oct. 8. Sunrise and sunset tables for all counties are listed on the back of the official statewide regulations now available from license vendors. Hunters must make their own adjustments by area from sunrise and sunset hours given in standard time.

The duck season for 22 counties within the Columbia Basin Mallard area runs through Jan. 15, 1967.

These counties are Ada, Benewah, Blaine, Bonner, Boundary, Caine, Canyon, Cassia, Gilmore, Gem, Gooding, Jerome, Kootenai, Latah, Lewis, Lincoln, Minidoka, Nez Perce, Owyhee, Power, Twin Falls and Washington.

The daily bag limit for the Columbia Basin Mallard area counties is six ducks, with a possession limit of 12. Daily shooting hours for ducks and

geese start at one-half hour before official sunrise in this area, and end at one-half hour after sunset for ducks, while goose shooting in the Columbia Basin Mallard counties must end at official sunset.

The statewide goose season in all 44 counties runs through sunset on Jan. 5, 1967. The bag limit is three geese except in

the counties of Bear Lake, Caribou, Bonneville and a portion of Blackfoot Reservoir lying within Teton County, where bag and possession limit is two Canada geese.
