British Aide Asks
U.N. to Support
Plan Ending War

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—British Foreign Secretary George Brown appealed to all U.N. members today to support a six-point British plan for restoring peace in Viet Nam. In a policy speech to the 119-nation General Assembly he also again invited Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko to join with him in a call to reconvene the 1954 Geneva conference. He and Gromyko are co-chairmen of the conference. On the war in Viet Nam, Brown declared:

"There seems to me to be one fundamental and incapable fact: There cannot be, nor should there be, a military solution to this conflict. We believe that the only feasible solution is a political settlement reached through negotiations."

He declared that the Chi Minh's regime in Hanoi had blocked the way to progress through negotiations and a political settlement.

He referred to peace efforts made to Hanoi both by President Johnson and U.S. Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg and added, "So far we look in vain for a response."

Even so, he said, Britain is convinced that the common ground between the 1954 Geneva agreements which both the North Vietnamese and the United States have said can be a basis for settlement.

"This being so," he said, "I repeat to Mr. Gromyko from this world forum the invitation which I made to him from the labor-party conference in Brighton. I invite him to join with me in reconvening the Geneva conference, and to join with me today."

Brown will confer with Gromyko privately late today in the second meeting of the four-nation group in New York late Friday.

Rep. Powell's
Sentencing
Is Withheld

NEW YORK (AP)—A trial judge has withheld pronouncing sentence on U.S. Rep. Adam Clayton Powell Jr. in a federal conviction until he hears Powell's arguments that the case was out of the court's jurisdiction.

State Supreme Court Justice Matthew M. Levy said he would postpone sentencing until he decides on the validity of the federal conviction, which Powell and his attorneys have challenged.

The Negro congressman, four years out of office, was Monday of willfully disobeying five court orders in connection with a \$184,000 libel judgment against him, Judge Levy said in his sentence of 30 days and a fine of \$1,250.

Justice Levy asked Powell's attorneys to leave the courtroom in addition to a pre-trial motion made before the four walked out of court on last Wednesday.

Levy had indicated to the attorneys that their presence during the trial could be considered "contumacious."

They maintain the court has no jurisdiction in a criminal proceeding.

Soviet Chance
For Lunar
Landing Eyed

NEW YORK (AP)—The Soviet Union has a better chance than any other nation to land men on the moon ahead of the United States, says James E. Webb, National Aeronautics and Space Administration director.

The head of the American space program says that estimates made by the Soviet Union in the past year predicted that the Soviet Union would land men on the moon in 1967.

Webb would not elaborate on his prediction but noted the Soviet Union was developing a booster rocket even larger than America's Saturn 5, which has a payload capacity of 200,000 pounds.

However, he would not predict that the Soviet Union would beat the United States in landing a man on the moon.

The NASA chief spoke to reporters before a luncheon address to the New York chapter of the National Security Industrial Association here.

Projects Okayed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Approval of two neighborhood youth corps projects in Idaho was reported today.

The offices of Sen. Frank Church and Rep. Compton J. White, Idaho Democratic congressman, announced today that \$19,950 was allocated by the Department of Labor for a project in Troy, N. Idaho, and \$21,250 for one in Blaine, southwestern Idaho.

Idaho Dam
Funds OK'd
By Conferees

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate-House conferees approved Monday the bill which would appropriate money for the Ririe and Lower Teton dams in eastern Idaho.

Sen. Len B. Jordan, R-Idaho, reported another bill was reported to the Senate floor Monday. The bill would provide \$1.5 million for flood control dams to be constructed on Cottonwood Creek and in Stuart Gulch north of Boise.

Appropriations of \$300,000 for the Lower Teton and \$200,000 for the Ririe Dam would begin construction on the multi-million dollar projects.

Cattleman

Talks on Land Regulations

BOISE (AP)—Constantly changing grazing regulations with each new administration is hurting long term range development, an Idaho cattleman said today.

Milford Vaughn, of Brunau, former president of the Idaho Cattlemen's Association, told a public land law conference the changing regulations also discourage investment by cattlemen.

Vaughn urged statutory controls under which a successive administration would be bound by the same interpretation of the federal land law. He said this would be a great accomplishment.

"I don't mean to imply that an operator should pay for all improvements on federal lands," he said. "The land still belongs to the government and the operator has obligations to improve it."

Supplies for
Mexicans Are
Unloaded

EL PASO, TEX. (AP)—Sixteen trucks of supplies for Mexican soldiers began unloading today at Lafayette, La., residents of the Tarahumara Indians of northern Mexico.

The goods, including food, clothing, medicine, tools and other items, have been refused by the Mexican government.

A representative for Lafayette residents, El Paso attorney Joseph E. White, said the goods would be stored in a warehouse, pending another appeal for a permit to take the goods across the border.

The supplies were donated after a Roman Catholic priest reported that the Tarahumara were suffering from malnutrition. The Mexican government said it could adequately care for the tribe.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal mediators failed again today to budge deadlocked General Electric Co.-labor negotiations and a union spokesman said "As things stand now, at 12:01 a.m. Monday we're on strike."

President Paul Jennings of the AFL-CIO International Union of Electrical Workers said absolutely nothing came out of his meeting today with Chief Federal Mediator William E. Shinkin. "I don't see any optimism," he said.

House Okays
Authority to
Call Reserves

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House voted today to give President Johnson unrestricted authority to call organized Reservists to active duty without declaring a national emergency.

The authority contained in a compromise \$58,067,472,600 military appropriation bill sent to the Senate would continue until June 30, 1968 and would affect an estimated 1,553,000 National Guardsmen and Reservists.

It would apply to individuals not assigned to organized units as well as to entire units.

The President does not now have authority to call out the Reserves unless he declares a national emergency. He is expected to use the new authority under present conditions.

College in
Good Shape
Financially

The College of Southern Idaho is in good financial shape, according to a report made Monday night by college accountant J. Robert Tullis, Buhl.

Tullis, who presented the annual financial report to the board of trustees, said that while some budget items were over-expended, others were under-expended. The audit revealed a total of nearly \$100,000 paid into the college funds by students and tuition paid by students and employees. The school year of 1965-66 saw more than 700 students enrolled at CSI.

Total expenditures for the college for 1965-66 were \$469,753.06. In June, 1966, the board approved a budget of \$585,833 with changes dependent upon the number of enrollees for the 1966-67 school year.

Thus far, enrollment has gone over the 1,000 mark.

Dr. James L. Taylor, college president, noted that while administrative expenses exceeded the budget by over \$4,000, the sum included cost of the bond election and the survey for the college site.

These two items cost the college nearly \$7,000, an expense Dr. Taylor noted, that "no one could have predicted at the time the budget was set."

This statement for divisions of the associated student body showed a profit of \$6,253.97 for the 1965-66 year. This revenue for these groups came from an estimated 100,000 "body" members, per year book, student health services, intramural athletics and mid-management club monies.

Try to Ban Spread

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States and the Soviet Union have agreed to make an effort for early accord on a treaty banning the spread of nuclear weapons, but the key issue blocking the pact remains unresolved. U.S. officials undertook today to downgrade somewhat a burst of optimism set off Monday night by comments made by Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko after talks with President Johnson and Secretary of State Dean Rusk.

Wayne Kildwell, the Ada County prosecuting attorney, said information from the other prosecutors and Dingel, as well as the state Finance Department, indicated a "good possibility" that charges will be filed.

GOODING—Two Gooding County legislators voiced opposition Monday to a proposed special session of the Idaho legislature to amend the sales tax law. They contended that "the only true emergency in Idaho at this time is the Idaho Savings and Loan debacle."

"There is need," said Sen. Don Frederickson and Rep. Vernon F. Ravenscroft, both Democrats, that both chambers restore public confidence in the handling of our state regulation of the monetary system."

A joint statement they said they oppose having a special session until after the Nov. 8 election.

Farm Income
Forecast Is
Increased

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman today raised his forecast of 1966 net farm income from \$15.7 billion to \$16.1 billion and predicted Democrats will pull in the highest farm vote victory since 1948.

"The \$400 million increase was made over a forecast made in July. This new income estimate, he said, would give agriculture its second highest income in history. The highest was reported in 1947.

Net farm income—the amount left after production costs are deducted—was \$14.2 billion last year.

Inscription Found

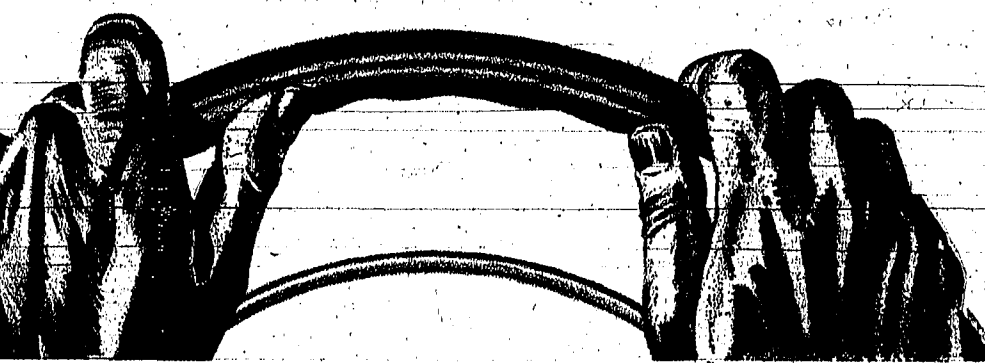

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Red Guards Organized Into Reserves

TOKYO (AP) — Communist China reported today that its fanatic Red Guards have been organized into a reserve force for its army.

"We are a contingent for both combat duties and for study and propaganda work," one Red Guard told Peking's New China News Agency.

The report said the young Red Guards in their nationwide purge had uncovered "weapons and secret accounts kept by the class enemies in anticipation of a hoped-for restoration." The report did not elaborate.

There have been unofficial reports recently that the Red Guards have been organized into military-style units. The Communist dispatch appeared to be official confirmation of this.

Newsman Are Restricted on Trial Stories

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — Judge Francis J. Talty of Common Pleas Court has imposed tight restrictions on news coverage Wednesday of a hearing on a defense motion to move the second murder trial of Samuel H. Sheppard outside Cuyahoga County.

Judge Talty prohibited interviews with witnesses, attorneys, court employees, police and county law enforcement officials "before, during and after" the hearing and issued no credentials to out-of-town newsmen.

The U.S. Supreme Court in an opinion on Sheppard's last June called the first trial "a bad dream." The high court, in upsetting Sheppard's conviction for second-degree murder, held that the one-time osteopath was deprived of a fair trial by prejudicial news accounts and courtroom comment.

The original trial jury found Sheppard guilty of murder in the bludgeoning slaying of his first wife, Marilyn. He served nearly 10 years on a life sentence before his attorneys won his release in 1964 and an order from a U.S. District Court judge for a new trial.

The trial is to start next Tuesday.

Judge Talty's order prohibits use of cameras, recording devices or registering devices in the courtroom.

Elimination Of Head Tax Is Suggested

BURLEY — Possibility of the elimination or reduction of the state's regressive "head tax" without reducing funds for the Permanent Building Fund was suggested here Monday by State Sen. Don Samuelson, Republican candidate for governor.

Samuelson said, "I believe this is a matter which should be considered by the next legislature. It appears from the present predicted surplus in sales tax collections that this may be possible."

The \$10 head tax, he explained, is assessed every person filing a state income tax return. "This money," he pointed out, is dedicated and goes into the Permanent Building Fund to provide for structures at state institutions.

Said Samuelson, "This is our most regressive tax as it requires the low income earner to pay the same as the person who earns much more. It is indeed a burdensome tax for the low wage earners."

Samuelson said he had been informed the predicted sales tax surplus will be about \$2½ million for the 22 months the tax is in effect. "In an luxury tax plan," Samuelson said, "the surplus would amount to approximately \$1 million."

"To continue," he said, "at this rate of sales tax collections it appears some of the surplus could be used to eliminate or reduce the head tax and still provide for the Permanent Building Fund."

According to Floyd West, state tax collector, the head tax produces approximately \$1 million per biennium for the Permanent Building Fund.

Samuelson said, "I would encourage the legislators to look into this matter as another means of providing additional relief to our taxpayers."

Idaho County Treasurers Prepare Tax Notices for Property Owners

By EARLE L. JESTER

BOISE (AP) — Tax notices now being prepared in treasurers' offices in Idaho's 44 counties will bring home to property owners the actual effect of the state's new Uniform Property Assessment Act.

The purpose of the law, enacted by the 1965 Legislature, was to make sure that property of equal value paid an equal amount of tax for each \$1 levied.

Property taxes to most people mean the dollars and cents total that tells them how much they have to pay each year. Tax levies are in mills, and assessment figures mean little.

The tax notices will go to property owners next month and payment of at least the first half is due Dec. 29.

For some, their taxes will be down from last year. For others they will be up.

But, at least theoretically, the person whose tax bill shows a big increase has been paying less than his fair share over the years. And the person who has to dig-up less this year has been paying more than he should have in the past.

The 1965 Legislature said that most property in the state should be assessed — for tax purposes — at 20 per cent of its actual cash value. There is one exception: Property owned by public utilities must be assessed at 40 per cent.

Each county was instructed to make the adjustment to 20 per cent over a four-year period, beginning this year. Harris said.

Chinese Red Guard Survival Indicated by Peking Official

TOKYO (AP) — Where do Chinese Red Guards stand? They are likely to survive as a major force on the Communist mainland.

Organized last spring in Peking, the Red Guards on Aug. 18 won the public backing and sponsorship of Chinese Chairman Mao Tse-tung and military commander Lin Biao. Since then they have run a feverish campaign to remake a nation of 700 million people overnight, through a war on old customs, habits and institutions.

They reached their zenith Sept. 15 when Mao and Lin reviewed a million-of-them-in-Peking's Gate of Heavenly Peace Square.

2 Counties' Ballot Forms Are Studied

BOISE (AP) — Secretary of State L. E. Clapp passed on to the attorney general's office two questions raised regarding the form of the ballot proposed for use in two Idaho counties.

He said Latah County suggested putting the sales tax referendum question at the bottom of the ballot while the names of candidates for state and county offices.

Bonner County listed at the top of the columns for independent candidates the names of two independent aspirants for governor. This put their names opposite those for U.S. senators in the Democratic and Republican columns, instead of opposite the party candidates for governor.

Asst. Atty. Gen. M. Allen Dingel Jr. said the questions are under study.

Soviets Offer Site for New U.S. Embassy

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet government has offered the United States a site in downtown Moscow to build a new embassy but U.S. officials are not keen on it.

They hope they may have some choice of other sites in the same general area, close to the American consulate and the Soviet Foreign Ministry.

American diplomats here and Soviet diplomats in Washington have been seeking to build larger embassies with reciprocity demanded on both sides. Negotiations on sites have been tedious.

The U.S. government came up with more than two months ago for a possible site for a new Soviet embassy in Washington, the 13 p.m. Sunday in the Soviet Union, the M. Alto Veterans Hospital, recently closed.

After Soviet diplomats had looked at it, Moscow suggested a site to U.S. diplomats.

It meets an important American specification by being near the Soviet Foreign Ministry, where the U.S. ambassador lives within four blocks of the Foreign Ministry.

The location apparently is not so large or in such a good neighborhood as the Americans would like.

The present U.S. Embassy building was erected about 15 years ago as an apartment house. Administrative offices occupy the ground floor, apartments for embassy personnel are on the second through seventh floors, and the main offices are on three top floors.

African Battle Hits New Fury

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The African group's running battle with South Africa has reached a new pitch of fury this year, with continuing attacks on white supremacy.

The black nations were incensed over the World Court decision throwing out a legal (technically) their charge that South Africa violated its mandate over South-West Africa by introducing apartheid — racial segregation — there.

Denouncing the ruling as a betrayal of the mandate's half-million blacks, African leaders persuaded the U.N. General Assembly to air their protests on South-West Africa in tandem with attacks on the U.N. Trusteeship Council.

The traditional statements of policy by heads of government and foreign ministers, which were limited to the morning sessions of the 18-nation assembly, afterwards were given over to attacks on South Africa's administration of the territory once governed under a League of Nations mandate.

A parade of speakers denounced the 20-year-old demand that the territory be placed under U.N. trusteeship.

The mandate was under scrutiny in the assembly's trusteeship committee, and apartheid became the storm center of the debate on racial discrimination in the social committee.

The campaign against South Africa's policies will be kept alive by the U.N. session. The issue comes up again when the assembly's special political committee, its No. 2 debating body, considers a U.N. report on apartheid.

The 35 African nations on the firing line are supported by most of the 27 Asian members and the 10-nation Soviet bloc.

Cooperative Satellite Is Proposed

MADRID, Spain (AP) — An American delegate to the International Astronautics Congress today proposed establishment of a cooperative global communications satellite system under United Nations sponsorship.

Dr. Jerome Morenoff, recognized as one of America's first "space lawyers," said in his paper that the "hodgepodge" of satellite systems planned and in existence "can only lead to confusion, conflict and inhibition of the potential of any satellite communications system."

Preliminary steps toward a system of international cooperation have been taken through an international consortium, consisting of almost 50 nations, he said. A handicap of the consortium, however, is the lack of representation of the Soviet-bloc countries.

Morenoff, a scientist and jurist now with the Planning Research Corporation of Los Angeles, Calif., said the Soviets have complained that the consortium is dominated by the United States.

Therefore, he added, the Soviet bloc can be expected to establish its own global system in the near future.

To further complicate the situation, other West European nations have also spoken of instituting their own independent satellite systems, he said, and the U.S. Defense Department has similar plans.

CAP Officials And Regional Aides Meet

Top Civil Air Patrol officials left Twin Falls early Tuesday morning after a conference and business meeting between Rocky Mountain Region and Idaho wing executives regarding Idaho CAP cadet and senior training programs, private aircraft recruiting, information programs and aircraft utilization and safety.

The conference was the second of two such regular meetings held each year.

Col. S. H. DuPont, vice chairman of the CAP national board, met with Idaho Wing Commander Col. Dwight Shaw and the Idaho liaison officer, Capt. William Bradshaw Crewe, Monday night before leaving at 9 a.m. Tuesday.

DuPont was accompanied by Col. Peter J. Markham, USAF-CAP liaison officer for the Rocky Mountain Region; Col. Donald E. Hale, Rocky Mountain Region commander; Lt. Col. W. D. Madsen, Rocky Mountain Region CAP information officer; and Robert H. Fletcher, communications specialist for the Rocky Mountain Region.

The group will continue on to Utah, Montana and Colorado for conferences with CAP regional directors in those states.

The CAP was organized in 1914 after it became apparent that the U. S. would become involved in the war in Europe. It was originally founded as the operational arm of the newly established Office of Civilian Defense. It included individuals and groups with privately owned aircraft and equipment who volunteered their services to the National defense effort.

It was incorporated into the USAF in 1948 by a law which made the CAP a civilian auxiliary of the Air Force. This act also enabled the CAP to receive Department of Defense surplus property and Air Force assistance.

There are currently 52 CAP wings—one in each of the 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. The wing headquarters, with a staff of approximately 50 civilian members, is the top command in each state.

Col. Shaw commands the Idaho wing, which is headquartered in Twin Falls. The wing is assigned to the Rocky Mountain Region, which is, in turn, headquartered at Lowry Air Force Base, Colo.

Americans May Some Day Write Their Ombudsman Instead of Congressman

NEW YORK (AP)—The day other government agencies may come when the time-honored advice "write your congressman" will change to "write the ombudsman."

That's what citizens who feel put upon or neglected by courts or bureaucrats do in Sweden, Norway, Denmark, New Zealand and Britain.

Impressed by the way it works, a joint committee on the organization of Congress is toying with the idea by setting up an ombudsman in Washington to deal with fretful Americans. Meanwhile, small-scale trials are under way in Michigan and New York's Nassau County.

The ombudsman is a Swedish invention. The word translates literally as "a man who is representative," and what the nation represents is the nation's feeble little people.

Sweden incorporated the office of ombudsman in its constitution in 1809, primarily to guarantee civil rights.

It is the function of Sweden's "man who is a representative" to make sure that courts and

other government agencies live up to the law of the land. When he feels they are remiss, the ombudsman takes up the matter with Parliament.

As far as Parliament is concerned, a main advantage of the ombudsman system is that crank complaints are solved out, leaving only those with some merit to be dealt with.

The Swedish ombudsman receives more than 1,000 complaints a year. If he decides to handle a complaint, he has to state his reasons, but the law protects him from any attempt to influence his actions.

A U. S. Senate-House committee considered the establishment of an American ombudsman during hearings last year but took no action.

The Michigan Department of State recently appointed a kind of ombudsman—title, special assistant for citizen complaints—on an experimental basis. He is Gordon Alexander, 26, a Michigan State University graduate in social science.

Secretary of State James A. DuRoi said Alexander would be in charge of receiving and resolving citizen complaints on any procedure or policy now being practiced by various divisions.

Alexander said he was getting complaints, all right, but that so far few of them had anything to do with the functioning of the Department of State.

"Mostly they complain about dogs-chasing-cats, people-burn-ing trash, things like that," he said. "I'm flooded but with the wrong type of complaints."

In June, Nassau County, New York, appointed former Judge Samuel Greason, 77, commissioner of accounts with the added duty of acting as ombudsman. In three months he dis-

posed of 59 cases, including complaints about such things as plugged drains and faulty street lighting.

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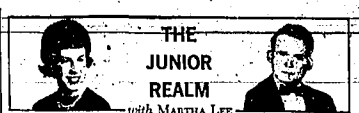

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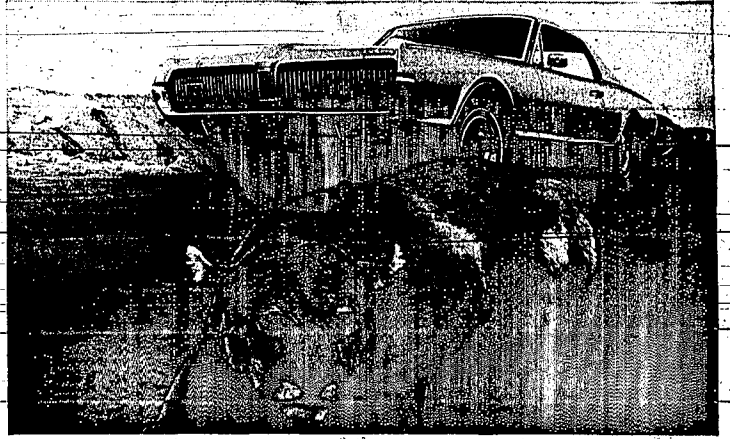

Top 10 TV Shows Listed In Report

NEW YORK (AP) — Only one new television series, ABC's "Pat Garrett," ranked third-appeared in the top 10 shows listed in the national Nielsen report published today.

The ratings of network shows broadcast during the two weeks ending Sept. 25, ABC's broadcast of the feature film, "Bridge on the River Kwai," won the field, building the largest audience of the season, according to the A. C. Nielsen Co. report, unofficial but authoritative measuring tool of the industry.

Other shows in the Nielsen list of "Top 10" were, in order: "Green Acres," (CBS), second; "Gomer Pyle," (CBS), third; "The Dick Van Dyke Show," (CBS), fourth; "The Andy Griffith Show," (CBS); Saturday night movie (NBC); "Lucy Show," (Red Skelton Show); "Vackie and Snee" and "Beverly Hillsbillies," (all CBS) the latter two being for 10th spot.

Three other new shows were in the top 20 list — CBS Family Affair, ABC's "Folsey" and NBC's "Occasional Wife."

The ratings, projected from an audience sample of some 11,000 homes, gave "Bridge" an edge in the averages, 18.4, followed by CBS with 18.3 and ABC, 17.9.

Some new programs winding up toward the bottom of the list included ABC's "Stage 67," "Hawaii" and "Shaw."

Mira, starting in place of \$700,000 quarterback John Brodie who has a groin injury, got the previous winless 49ers a 7-0 halftime lead by throwing a 27-yard touchdown pass to tight end David Crow.

With the 49ers leading 14-13 in the fourth quarter, Mira hit Crow with an eight-yard TD pass after setting up a score with a 35-yard run.

Tech Kicker Also Is Top Golf Player

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Bunky Henry kicks field goals for Georgia Tech with the accuracy of a golfer hitting a nine-iron shot and he is doing it better.

The 21-year-old senior, who has hit on his last 28 conversion kicks and beat Tennessee with two field goals last Saturday, is one of the South's best amateur golfers.

Henry, who won the 1965 Canadian Amateur golf title and was picked as one of the amateurs to compete in the 1966 Masters, has been playing golf since he was a boy, but he is no newcomer to kicking football balls either.

"I've been a kicker since I got hurt playing out as a junior at Valdosta High School," Henry said Monday. "I probably kick 25 times a day during the football season since I don't do anything else."

Henry has missed only twice on extra-point kicks during his college career, hitting 51 of 53. He held the Tech record by kicking 22 straight before a miss last fall, and now is on another record streak of 24 in a row.

The industrial management major has lacked the strength to be a real good field goal kicker, and has missed six of 13 tries with most of the misses coming on long-range attempts. Against Tennessee, however, Henry connected on a 41-yard field goal — the longest of his career — to crack a 2-3 tie and give the Yellow Jackets a 6-3 victory over the Volunteers.

service and lengthy court proceedings followed.

5. Granted a hearing to the Curtis Publishing Co. on its appeal of a \$480,000 judgment given Wally Butts, former University of Georgia football coach, in a libel suit. No date was set for the hearing.


Colts Put Two On Waiver List
