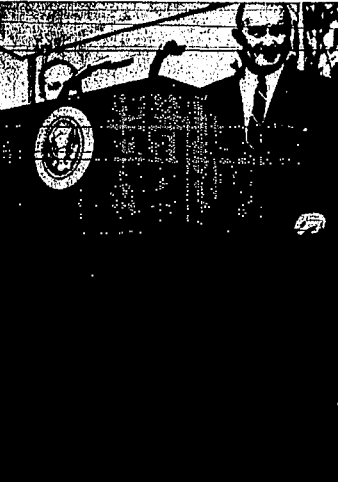

Johnson Calls for Action By Congress to Increase Social Security Benefits

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP)—President Johnson called today for congressional action next year to increase Social Security benefits an average 10 per cent. He said that the new Social Security law, which took effect Jan. 1, 1968, would provide for a 10 per cent increase in benefits to become effective Jan. 1, 1968.

The 10 per cent increase he proposed would average \$8.50 a month for each pensioner. He suggested also a minimum monthly check of \$400 compared with the present \$44 for anyone with 25 years of coverage.

McNamara Tours Quieted Viet Nam Battle Sectors

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U. S. Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara toured quieted battle sectors of South Viet Nam today as 4,000 fresh American combat troops arrived in the country. The new troops, the last contingent of the 4th Infantry Division, brought the American force in Viet Nam to 325,000 men. As the buildup continued, ground fighting subsided into small skirmishes. But on the political-front-dissension flared between northerners and southerners in Premier Nguyen Cao Ky's cabinet.

850 Tons of Hay Burned at Feedlot

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Minor Ills Take Marines From Field

DONG HA, South Viet Nam (AP) — An assortment of conditions paralyzing minor ill is taking Marines from the field as surely as workers are kept from the factory and children from school.

Medical men at an advanced field hospital near the demilitarized zone say an average of five Marines a day are evacuated with scrapes, breaks and maladies either aggravated by the tropical climate or caused by carelessness.

After five to seven days of treatment the men are usually well enough to return to combat, the doctors say.

A typical Marine must stay on his toes.

He can slip jumping from a helicopter or climbing a muddy trail. Under 50 pounds of pack and weapons, this could mean a strain of badly wrenched knee.

A brush against a thorny vine or elephant grass slashes the clothes or cuts the skin.

They're dirty, real dirty. After two days in the field the bacteria count on their skin is tremendous. Minor cuts get badly infected, a doctor said.

If the Marine fails to pace himself, he faces exhaustion or possible heat stroke.

Infection lurks in the water the trooper splashes through.

The water is contaminated by human feces and corpses a lot of the time, too. This infects and aggravates athletes foot and ingrown toe nails. A Marine should take his boots off at night to help things, the doctor says.

A drink of bad water almost certainly causes worms in the stomach, as well as diarrhea.

Even if the Marine keeps clean, he runs the danger of contracting the commonest crippling malaria.

And there is always the enemy.

ARREST DISCLOSED

BOISE (AP) — Arrest of an Idaho Falls man, William F. Johnson, on a charge of federal income tax evasion was disclosed Tuesday by the U.S. marshal's office.

Johnson was accused in a complaint filed in U. S. District Court and signed by U. S. Atty. Sylvan Jeppesen.

It charged that Johnson "did willfully and knowingly fail" to file income tax returns for four years, 1960 to 1963, inclusive.

The complaint said Johnson had gross income of \$24,432 in 1960, \$16,945 in 1961, \$36,747 in 1962 and \$8,972 in 1963.

ACQUIRE POND

BOISE (AP) — The state has acquired a 250-acre mill pond site in North-Teton, complete with fishing, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game announced Tuesday.

Department Director John R. Woodworth said Winchester Lake had been obtained from Potlatch Forests, Inc., of Lewiston in a three-way land trade and payment of \$15,000.

The 75-acre pond will be treated to remove present fish and then stocked, Campgrounds will be built at the site.

Senate Passes

Public Works

Fund Measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate passed today a complete congressional action on a compromise \$4.1 billion public works appropriation bill. The House passed it Tuesday.

The measure carries funds for Army Engineers and the Reclamation Bureau to plan and build water projects throughout the country.

It also provides for the Atomic Energy Commission's operations in the fiscal year that started last July 1.

The total is \$190 million less than last year's appropriation, and \$12.5 million less than President Johnson budgeted.

Senate Okays Appointment Of Rostow

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate confirmed today Eugene V. Rostow as undersecretary of state for political affairs, the third-ranking post in the State Department.

Rostow, a Yale law school professor, is brother of special presidential assistant Walt W. Rostow, a top adviser to President Johnson on foreign policy.

Others approved by voice vote included:

Foy D. Kohler, a career foreign service officer who currently is U.S. ambassador to Moscow, as deputy undersecretary for political affairs.

Sol M. Litowitz, chief executive officer of Xerox International, as U.S. representative to the Organization of American States.

Llewellyn E. Thompson, former ambassador to Moscow now serving as ambassador at large, to return to Moscow, as successor to Kohler as ambassador to the Soviet Union.

Eltworth Bunker, 72, a veteran American diplomatic, troopship shooter who has been U.S. representative to the OAS, is succeeded by Thompson as ambassador at large.

BITES ASSAILANT

POCATELLO (AP) — A sharp bite on an unidentified assailant's finger and a piercing scream saved a 17-year-old girl from possible harm here Monday night.

The incident was reported to police by the girl's father. He said the girl had been visiting at a residence on North 17th street and that when she left the house, a man appeared out of the shadows.

The man reportedly grabbed her around the shoulders and put his hand across her mouth. At this point, she bit his finger, screamed and dropped a pan she was carrying. The man fled.

GROUP CHARGED

LEWISTON (AP) — Lewiston School Superintendent Andrew L. Smith charged Tuesday night that the North Idaho Anti-Sales Tax Committee is "trying to intimidate us and I resent the intimidation."

Smith made his statement in remarks prepared for a talk to the Sacajawea Junior High School Parent Teacher Ass'n on the Nov. 8 sales tax referendum.

It came in response to a resolution passed Monday night by the anti-sales-tax group cautioning against the use of school facilities and children for political activity.

DEATH TOLL RISES

GRANGEVILLE, Idaho (AP) — Idaho's traffic death toll was at 215 today, which is three fewer than had been killed by this time last year.

Rudolph Herzog, 62, Cottonwood, Idaho, died Tuesday from injuries he received in a car-tractor accident Monday. Herzog was driving the car, police said.

Herzog's son, Dean, died almost exactly two years ago in another tractor-car accident.

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho-U.S. Conference meets in Boise next Wednesday morning to discuss recommendations to the 1967 legislature.

John Grant, conference chairman, said the group will prepare a legislative policy on proposed highway tax increases in keeping with federal highway safety laws and costs to the state.

State Sen. Lloyd Barron, R-Camas, chairman of the senate highway committee, is to speak at a conference luncheon.

ORFORD, Idaho (AP) — Jess Lockard, 22, of Pocatello, Idaho, escaped from the Clearwater County Jail late Tuesday, Sheriff's officers said.

Lockard, who had been charged with first-degree burglary and carrying a concealed weapon, allegedly pushed a table and janitor when they opened the door, and ran out.

Sheriff's officers said there were no deputies on duty at the time.

In these commercials for Republican candidates for the House and Senate in the Nov. 8 elections, the tattered-haired Illinois senator is putting forth his usual entertaining jargon.

As a practicing thespian who quotes from the Bible and Shakespeare at the drop of a hat, Dirksen is an eye-roller and a hand-waver who never fails to claim attention. He also is a very practical politician who knows where the votes are, when to go along with President Johnson and when to fight him.

Johnson, O'Connor Campaign in New York

NEW YORK (AP) — President Johnson campaigns here side by side this Columbus Day with gubernatorial candidate Frank D. O'Connor and other Democratic nominees.

The President's schedule includes speeches on Staten Island and in Brooklyn, a short stay at the review stand for the Columbus Day parade on Fifth Avenue and then a helicopter hop from Central Park for a late afternoon speech in the suburban community of East Meadow on Long Island.

Democrats hope the President's appearance will spark O'Connor's campaign. He faces Republican Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller; Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., Liberal party candidate; and Paul Adams, the Conservative party nominee, on the ballot in the Nov. 8 election.

Folls taken by the Democrats and Republicans show that Roosevelt could get from 15 to 17 per cent of the vote — close to a million votes in the state. Most of Roosevelt's gains are believed at the expense of O'Connor.

O'Connor, who didn't even chat with Johnson when the President was here last Friday, said he was "delighted" when the White House confirmed O'Connor to be at his side today.

O'Connor said, however: "I maintain that a candidate wins or loses on his own, and no one can brush off his popularity on a candidate."

Johnson's schedule leaked out in greater detail than usual for presidential visits since the assassination of John F. Kennedy. A police source said about 3,000 men would be deployed to protect Johnson.

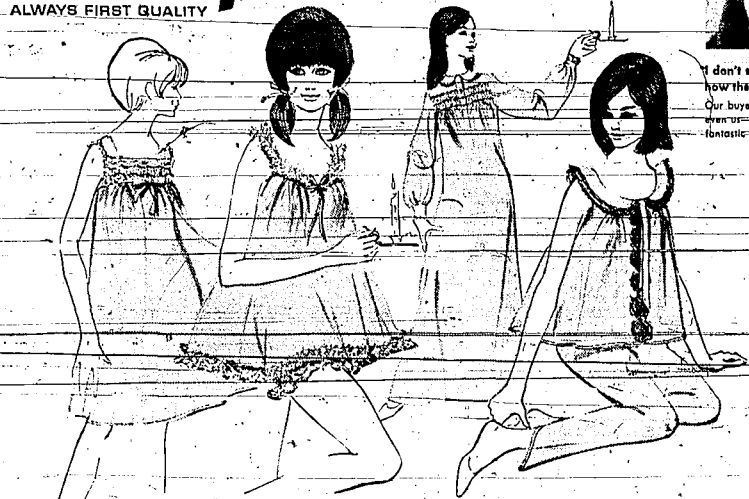

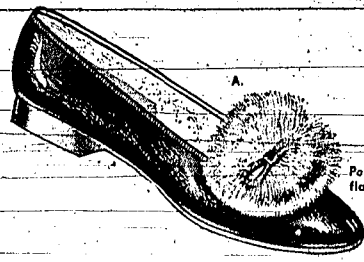

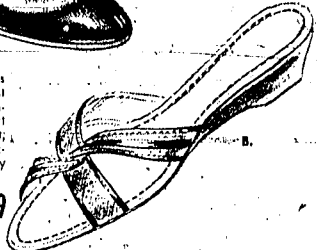

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Draft Call Is Decreased for November

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon today cut the November draft call by 6,100 men to 37,600 and announced that 12,100 men will be inducted in December, the lowest total since March 1965.

The Defense Department announcement said the original draft call of 43,700 for November was being reduced because of a greater than expected number of enlistments and re-enlistments in recent months. The December call involves only half the month.

The Pentagon said no men will be inducted between Dec. 16 and Jan. 1, 1967, because of the Christmas season.

All inductees in November and December will go to the Army.

The Pentagon said it expects next January's request in the Selective Service to total about 33,500, based on the average taken in during the past six months.

Ohio City Sets Special Celebration

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Another Santa Maria floats down the Scioto River into the downtown area today, kicking off a four-day Columbus Day U.S.A. celebration in the largest of 22 American communities named for the famous explorer.

A stand-in for Christopher Columbus will be met by a tribe of "Indians," made up largely of mayors and beauty queens from several of those cities.

A wreath-laying ceremony at a City Hall statue of Columbus will follow the parade. The day's observance of the holiday — 474 years to the day after Columbus set foot in the New World.

Many of the festival's major events are scheduled this week-end, including a beauty contest pitting queens from cities named Columbus for the title "Miss Columbus U.S.A."

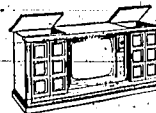

Australians Feel Same as Americans About Viet Nam

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — When President Johnson comes here, he will find Australians think much the same as Americans about the Viet Nam conflict. Many "dislike it." Some think Australians just have to be in it, others that they should be out of it.

Australia has 1,500 men in South Viet Nam, including two infantry support forces and headquarters staff. Advisers have been there since 1962.

Australians have been through Saigon and of these 73 have been killed in action, one is missing and 327 wounded.

Among those in Viet Nam are draftees conscripted at the age of 20. This is especially a sore point with many Australians, who traditionally believe only volunteers should be sent out of the country.

Even in World War II, only volunteers were sent farther away than New Guinea and other nearby islands that shielded Australia from direct attack.

Newspapers have said in editorials in the past few days that Johnson will find a strong majority of people opposed to America's policy in Viet Nam.

Johnson almost certainly will see demonstrators against the war. The feeling is especially strong among those who have a stake in it — those liable to draft, and those close to them.

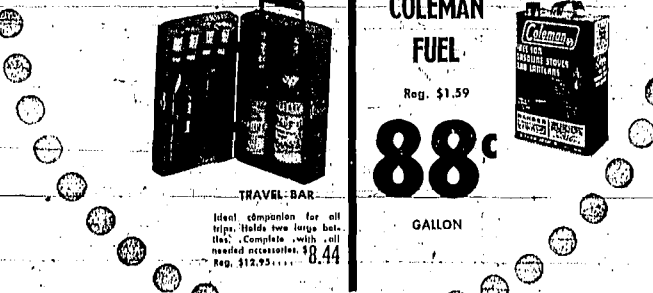

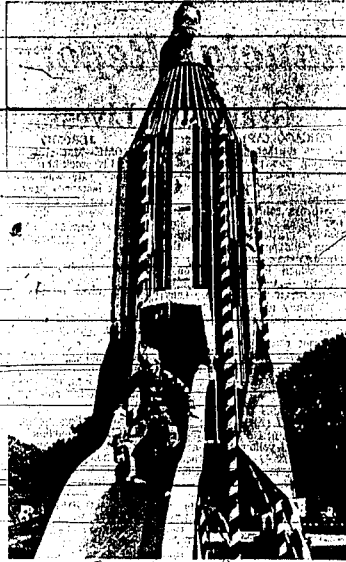
The students took over the streets for three hours, accusing Sukarno of leading the attempt to divide and disunity of the past three years in tribal elections Nov. 15-16.

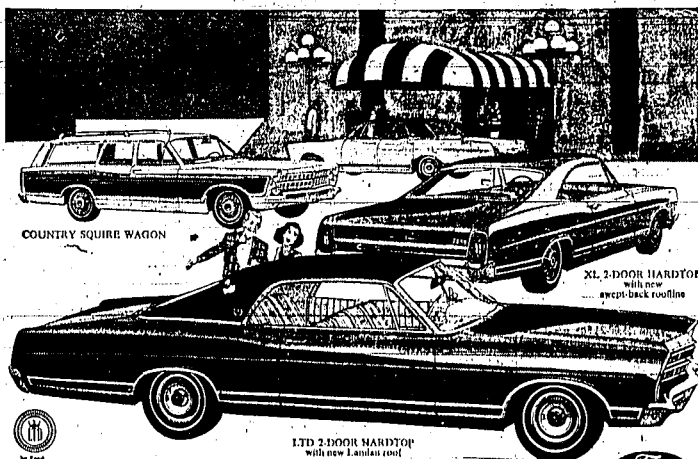

Olympic Preview Gets Under Way In Mexico City

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A pint-sized preview of the 1968 Olympic Games gets under way here Wednesday triggering a three-week sports spree that will have this 1 1/2-mile-high Mexican metropolis panting for breath. In addition to the Little Olympics, a competition among 500 athletes from 22 nations, there will be two world amateur golf tournaments, a championship flight, a Grand Prix auto race and the first world soft-ball championship—cramped into a 20-day span.

The Olympic preview, opening with cycling and gymnastics with swimming scheduled to begin Thursday and track and field Oct. 18, is aimed primarily at checking athletes' reaction to Mexico City's altitude.

More than 70 doctors have poured into the city to determine whether the thin air affects the lungs, cuts down resistance and causes nose bleeds.

The United States is represented with a small but blue ribbon token force of swimmers and track-and-field specialists. Seven girls and seven men, including 13 national champions, make-up the water squad while the eight-man track team has Al Oerter, three time Olympic discus champion; broad jumper Ralph Boston; Bob Seagren in the pole vault and world record sprinter Tommie Smith.

The swimming team is headed by Claudia Kolb of Sunnyvale, Calif., world record holder in the 200 meter medley, and Cathie Ball of Jacksonville, Fla., the world's best in the women's 100 and 200-meter breaststroke.

Don Schollander, winner of four gold medals in the 1964 Olympics at Tokyo, had to pass up the event because of the pressure of studies at Yale University.

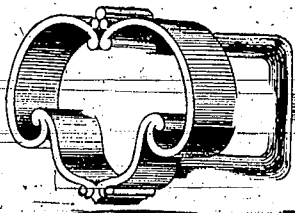


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Red Guards Are Active In China

TOKYO (AP) — The reactor and eight teachers at Hsinshu University in Peking were denounced by the Red Guards as reactionary and now are janitors at the school, members of the militant youth group told Japanese correspondents Tuesday.

"They are sweeping the floors and growing vegetables and other labor reform jobs," Sung Pat-in, 18, told the Japanese in the Red Chinese capital.

Fifty of the Red Guards, in a meeting with the correspondents, also confirmed what has long been evident in the West: That Defense Minister Lin Biao, described by party Chairman Mao Tse-tung as "close comrade in arms," is heir apparent to Mao.

The said Lin Shao-chi, president of Communist China, is unsuitable for leading the cultural revolution or purge against those opposing Mao's thought.

Sung said the Red Guards did not want war with the United States but if America invades China "we will fight to the very end."

The Red Guards are the reserve force of the liberation army. They are to be ready to fight a people's war and are not afraid of nuclear arms, thought with Mao Tse-tung's slogan, "The Red Guard will kill 10 Americans."

The Red Guards are teenagers.

Japanese news described the group including some girls as the "angry young men and women" of Communist China.

Sung said there were only 4 members in the Red Guards now. It was voluntarily launched at Hsinshu University May 28. The Red Guards now list 255 students out of an enrollment of 1,200, Sung said, and 10 teachers out of a faculty of 150, he added.

He told Japanese newsmen, "Our anger exploded when the reactor and other reactionary teachers interfered with our attempts to study the thought of Mao Tse-tung and to carry out a proletarian cultural revolution in cooperation with laborers, farmers and soldiers."

Discovery of New World Is Disputed

ROME (AP) — Christopher Columbus and Leif Erikson were only also-rans in the great stakes, according to a new claim Tuesday in the old controversy.

Dr. Mario Gattolli Celli, secretary of an International Academy for Mediterranean Studies here, said either the ancient Etruscans or the even more ancient Pelagians got to the New World first.

If it was the Etruscans navigators in their felucca-rigged, red-sailed ships they did it in the 7th century B.C., more than 2,000 years before Columbus, according to Dr. Gattolli Celli.

And if it was the old Mediterranean-roving Pelagians they did it in the 12th century B.C. and beat even the Etruscans by 500 years.

This sort of sour note is often heard hereabouts on the eve of Columbus Day. Up in the old navigator's home town of Genoa celebration were going ahead.

Dr. Gattolli Celli said the academy had heard from at least two foreign research experts who agreed that both Columbus and Erikson were latecomers to America.

He said Margaret Simmons, a graduate of Trinity University, San Antonio, Tex., and Prof. Rodolfo Turchi of Valencia, Venezuela, had found similar indications of very early Mediterranean influence on the Central and South American civilizations.

The Etruscans flourished in central Italy hundreds of years before the Romans, sailed over trade routes throughout the Mediterranean, and passed on much of their culture to early Rome.

The Pelagians were an early Caucasian people who spread across Greece to southern Italy and Spain before the days when the Greeks started establishing colonies in Sicily.

Dr. Gattolli Celli cited a similarity in the polygonal walls of early Italy and some in Peru and Colombia, and similar burial urns like the form of a head found at Hied in Italy, Cuzco in Peru, and Augustin in Colombia. He said there were other striking similarities in jewelry, pottery and tomb designs in the two regions.

But whether it was the Vikings, the Japanese or some sources say they crossed to what is now Alaska — the Etruscans or the Pelagians, the supporters of Columbus are treating all claims with dignified skepticism.

"The most surprising thing about all these claims is that Genoa Mayor Augusto Pedullia, 'is their monopoly.'"

2 Gubernatorial Candidates In New York Have Problems

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Gov. Rockefeller and Frank D. O'Connor are struggling with image problems as they spar across New York State in their race for governor.

The chief concern of Republican Rockefeller is that he may have worn out his welcome after eight years in office, during which he has made unpopular decisions — notably to raise taxes.

Democrat O'Connor has the opposite problem. Outside of New York City, he is largely unknown.

After four weeks of campaigning, there is little evidence that either candidate has captured the enthusiasm of the state's eight million voters. Some private polls purportedly show O'Connor has a narrow lead but, says an O'Connor strategist, "I guess nobody really likes anybody yet."

"You might say that the campaign really hasn't gotten going yet," says Rockefeller. "So far it's been a campaign of personalities rather than issues."

That seems to suit him fine. The graying, 55-year-old governor figures that the charm and uninhibited campaigning that made him a national figure less than a decade ago eventually will overwhelm his less glamorous opponent.

O'Connor, a veteran politician, makes no attempt to out-baby-kiss Rockefeller. The 56-year-old lawyer prefers to campaign from the speaker's stand, where he displays a skillful if somewhat old-fashioned oratorical style.

O'Connor's technique won impressive victories in his campaigns for district attorney of Queens and for president of the New York City Council, the office he now holds.

"I can't be anything but myself," he tells advisors who urge him to inject more color into his campaign.

O'Connor has been campaigning with one eye looking over his shoulder — at the formidable image of Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., the Liberal Party candidate for governor.

The son of the late president, denied the Democratic nomination, has charged that O'Connor is the hand-picked candidate of New York City Democratic "bosses."

If for no other reason than his famous name, Roosevelt Jr. is expected to poll much more than the 250,000 votes the Liberal party usually attracts, but he has given little chance of winning, O'Connor calls him a "squaller."

A fourth candidate is Dr. Paul

Kremlin Careerists Prove to Be Stable, Silent, Serious Group

MOSCOW (AP) — The group of Kremlin careerists who took Nikita S. Khrushchev's power away from him two years ago has proved to be unusually stable, silent and serious.

Communist rule in Russia has a history of one man — a Lenin, a Stalin or a Khrushchev — concentrating all power in his hands.

When Khrushchev was kicked out Oct. 14, 1964, precedent indicated another power struggle and the emergence of another period of one-man rule.

Up to now, however, there has been more stability than struggle visible to Kremlin watchers here.

A major reason for this is also a major reason that enough Soviet Communist party leaders got together to oust Khrushchev: They were tired of being dominated by one man. They agreed then that in the future the jobs of party boss and premier should not be combined.

NEW YORK (AP) — Ernest Nemeth returned Tuesday night from six months imprisonment in Hungary where he was convicted on charges stemming from a traffic violation.

"I'm glad to be back in the United States—there's no country like it," he said on arrival at Kennedy Airport after a flight from Vienna.

Nemeth, 34, a former Hungarian Freedom Fighter who came here in 1956 with his wife, was released from prison Sunday and taken to the Austrian border where he was left without money.

"I hitchhiked to Vienna and the American Embassy gave me a good meal and money to come home," he said.

"Oh, am I glad to be home. I thought I never would get out."

He and his wife and son, Ernest Jr., 6, went to Hungary on March 12 to visit his parents.

On April 9, Hungarian police arrested Nemeth while he was driving his station wagon at night.

According to Nemeth, police charged him with driving with his high-beam lights on. Nemeth said he paid a fine of about \$5 at the scene and then found that he never had his high-beam lights on.

When he protested, the police made him drive to the police station at Győr and held him in jail to await trial.

He was found guilty June 17 on a charge of inciting riot and sentenced to nine months in jail. He appealed and on Aug. 10 another trial was held and the sentence was reduced to six months.

Nemeth said he was not beaten, but that he spent 63 days in solitary confinement.

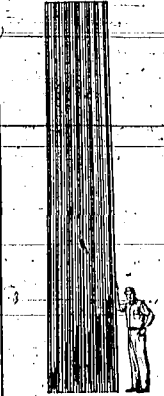

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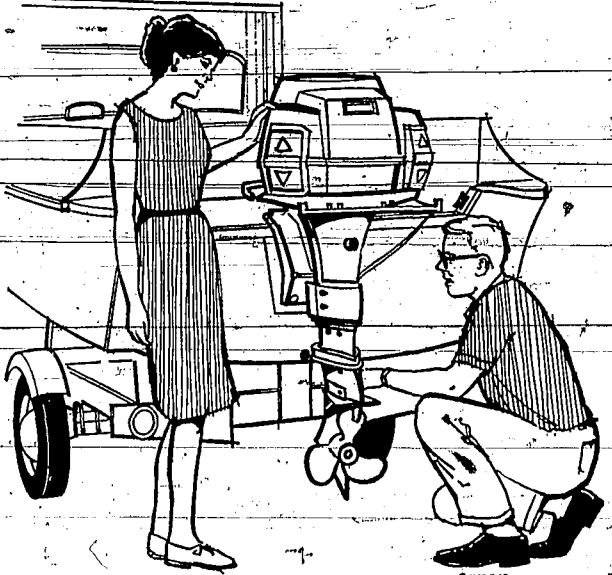
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
