Antiriot Legislation Postponed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Judiciary Committee agreed to postpone action on an antiriot legislation until the next session.

Chairman Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., said a bill dealing with racial riots and also with protecting Negroes and civil rights workers against violence will be the first order of business next year.

In a statement joined in by William M. McCulloch, Ohio, the senior committee Republican, Celler said the committee feels it is too late in the session to try to push through the legislation this year.

The 1966 civil rights bill passed by the House contained a dual provision making it a federal crime to cross state lines to incite a riot, and also to use violence against civil rights workers and Negroes.

Soviets Said Careful With Cosmonauts

NEW YORK (AP) — James E. Webb, head of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, has dismissed conjecture that Soviet cosmonauts have been lost in space.

"As far as I know, they have not lost a single man in flight. They have lost them on the ground, they have lost them in airplanes—just like we have," Webb said.

In an interview in the current issue of Look magazine, Webb said: "Every bit of information we have shows that they have been as careful with the lives of cosmonauts as we have with astronauts."

Once-Timeless India Finds Progress Threatened

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — India slumped too. Massive development plans, once a model for underdeveloped nations trying to leave the India been in such turmoil with the basic democratic institutions and its dream of progress threatened.

In the heady years after independence in 1947, there seemed to be few doubts India was entering a new era.

A turning point came three years ago as Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru slumped into physical and mental exhaustion caused by too many burdens carried too long.

India slumped too. Massive development plans, once a model for underdeveloped nations trying to leave the India been in such turmoil with the basic democratic institutions and its dream of progress threatened.

In the heady years after independence in 1947, there seemed to be few doubts India was entering a new era.

A turning point came three years ago as Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru slumped into physical and mental exhaustion caused by too many burdens carried too long.

Ambitious state and regional politicians began defying New Delhi. Food-surplus states refused to share with hungry neighbors. Language riots erupted. Regional jealousies came to the surface. States began quarreling over boundaries. Separate groups began demanding separate states.

All this revealed a centrifugal force spinning power away from the central government and into the hands of men who might use it for something less than national good.

This force—today threatens Nehru's dream of one powerful

Shastri, to the surprise of many, flowered as a leader during India's war with Pakistan in September 1965. His dedication to the basic problems of feeding and housing his people impressed foreign experts.

India, many felt, was getting its feet on the ground for the first time since independence. But last Jan. 11, while trying to fashion peace with Pakistan at a summit conference in Tashkent, U.S.S.R., Shastri died.

It was a stunning blow. India's political leadership "the syndicate," it is called—

turned to Nehru's daughter, Indira Gandhi. The 45-year-old widow's government experienced was limited to watching her father-in-action plus one brief term as information minister.

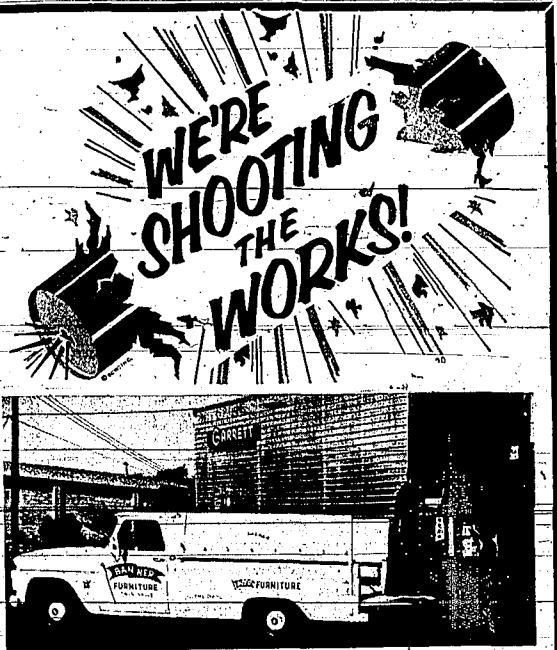

Parliament and state legislatures are hamstringed by a canny leftist opposition. Students have entered the area, rioting, clashing with police, destroying classrooms—becoming ever bolder. The government responds with authoritarian crackdowns, employing emergency legislation passed to defend India against Communist Chinese infiltration.

Plan for Future

All Idahoans should pay close attention to the proposal being aired again by the State Sen. William Roden, Ada County Republican. He is planning a plan whereby all schools of higher education in Idaho would be incorporated into the state-supported system. Presumably the result would be much like the California plan whereby the colleges and universities all use the "University of California" title, then add the location, such as Berkeley, Los Angeles and so on.

The unification plan has some merit and it will draw plenty of opposition, too. The hottest opposition can be expected from the Board of Regents of Idaho and the Idaho State University. On the other hand, Boise College will support the idea. Roden would have a nine-man board of regents, one from each of the new junior college districts around the state and three named on an at-large basis.

It isn't the first time there has been talk of setting up a unified university system for Idaho. And it won't be the last. The avowed ultimate goal supposedly is to establish the University of Idaho at Boise. There would be no attempt to eliminate the schools at Moscow and Pocatello, but they would play a somewhat reduced role in the unified system. One phase of the master plan is to move the law school from Moscow to Boise. There are some powerful arguments behind the proposal, including the fact that Boise is the center of the state's government and has many of the state's firms and courts. The Supreme Court, since its argument court, has been advanced on behalf of establishing the principal university in Idaho's Capital City.

It can be anticipated the Moscow and Pocatello interests will turn thumbs down on any such plan without any consideration. Yet the ultimate plan has some merit. In addition to having the Capitol, Boise has an ever-growing population that is a big asset in connection with a university.

Boise also has industry that could offer work for students who couldn't attend college without earning at least part of their way. The work program has always been important in a college town and in a place like Moscow, it's virtually missing.

Right now it's just something that might be discussed and kicked around a bit. When the serious consideration stage arrives, it should be considered the plan in the light of the state's best present and future students and (b) improvements to the state's system of higher education that might be possible with logical change.

RIPENING PLUMS

In case citizens can't figure why so many persons are out thumping the drums for this or that candidate, they might find the answer in one word, plum. It's been so long since the matter of political appointments has been in Boise that some Idahoans might have forgotten quite a few officials are appointed. Regardless of which candidate finds himself sitting atop the heap come the night of Nov. 8, there's going to be a fairly good turnover in Boise soon after the first of the year.

If Democrat Cecil Andrus should win, the turnover might be somewhat larger. Yet even Dan Rostenburg might not want to keep some of the appointments of Robert E. Smylie. It goes without saying that if one of the Independent candidates comes in first, there will be a wholesale turnover. The loyal supporters will be paid off with whatever state jobs are available on an appointment basis. Those in civil service type spots will be mostly safe.

Unfortunately, down through the years Idahoans have come to realize there should be limitations to the spoils system. Some years back steps were taken to move from politics such vital agencies as the Highway Department and the Fish and Game Department. The new governor might get around to appointing new members of the commissions that run those departments, but the professional help is quite above politics. It wasn't always that way. There was a time when the highway department was one of the largest single sources of political jobs. That was in the days when the department was used to build and mend political fences instead of highways.

With the first big change in many years approaching, one wonders how some of the more competent appointees will fare. There are a couple of spots where the new governor would be well advised to keep the experienced, superior persons who are doing an excellent job. It will be interesting to watch to see if the new governor is more interested in passing out jobs or doing what's right for Idaho.

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON — If fear I cannot join in the occasional meetings from the Middle East. Far left, the House Un-American Activities Committee's decision to investigate the Negro rioting will pay attention to the Communist Party. It is possible that an epidemic of meanness. By now, congressional investigations have become good and bad. And so much cunning is exhibited by both sides that the result is always in doubt.

Indeed, as determined to prove that every rock thrown in a Negro ghetto came from Moscow, the Black Power boys will be without resources both glib and psychological. Years of jousting in Capitol Hill committee rooms have provided guidelines for the investigators which give them a better chance of emerging as persecuted heroes of a just cause.

BRING HOME — The No. 1 rule in this text-book is that of money available for the defense. Aside from the high cost of the witness needs a lawyer who is not only good, and therefore expensive, but who has extensive contacts in town — preferably in the White House and on Capitol Hill. A respectable mouthpiece — that is, one who spends most of his time defending corporations and bankers — is preferred. Civil liberties lawyers tend to bring out the best in the average legislator, especially in the HUAC, whereas congressional investigators feel at home with the elegant pettifogger whose last public appearance was in behalf of U.S. Steel.

THE HANDY FIFTH — Careful study must be given to the use of the Fifth Amendment. Despite its misuse over the past decade, the Fifth remains infinitely respectable, based as it is on the Founding Fathers' distrust of the confessions exacted from men by the rack of the rubber truncheon. It says, in effect, that a cop should be an investigator not a lower-class torturer.

NO SPECIAL SESSION
"It would make much more sense to call a special session to deal with the sales tax after the election and amend the bill in a calm, deliberative manner, not in the present highly emotional climate just before the election," said Sen. Mary Brooks, Republican from Halley, in response to a suggestion by Gov. Robert E. Smylie that a revision session be held before the Nov. 8 general election.

We agree with Sen. Brooks.

There should definitely be a pledge on the part of state and legislative leaders, however, to keep the issue of the sales tax out of the campaign. It is not clear how well meaning the special session proposal may be, it can appear to some as a gimmick. And it certainly is not that. But the anti-sales tax forces have seized upon the legal question of the sales tax to make the sales tax program a disablically contrived thing itself. — Idaho Falls Post-Register.

Q—A few months ago I was found to have a prostate tumor. I am taking Stilbestrol daily and it has helped me. Would you mind one of this drug causing a prostate tumor? I will have to take it indefinitely?

A—If such side effects as nausea, headache, or waterlogging occur, an adjustment in dosage should be made. The drug should be taken indefinitely to prevent further growth of the tumor.

Q—A prostate has been enlarged for several years. Is there any drug that will reduce it? I am taking Gantanol. Is an operation necessary for permanent relief?

A—Gantanol is a sulfa drug that is given to prevent or control the bacterial infection that is an often associated with an enlarged prostate. Under such conditions, your surgeon may want to remove the entire gland or only the portion that is obstructing the flow of urine.

MARQUIS CHILDS WRITES ON WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON — Roosevelt, Taft, Eisenhower, Stevenson — these names are all on the ballot for this November and how they will fare is the subject of a forecast of political fortunes in the year ahead. The name is weighted with overtones of leadership. The name is a controversy, and with casual voters who give little thought to the name, it is a valuable asset.

Of the four Adlai E. Stevenson III has the best chance in the near future of moving into an important place in the national picture. Running for state treasurer in his native state of Illinois, by all reports he is making a highly effective campaign. Observers in Illinois say he will lead the ticket and his enthusiastic backers are convinced he will be the Democratic candidate for governor in 1968.

Two years ago when all candidates were running at large, Stevenson topped the 118 Democratic vote in the legislature. On the other side of the ballot Earl Eisenhower, brother of the former President, led the 118 Republicans. Earl, at 66, is running for re-election and his name is counted on by Republicans to attract voters. His famous brother went out to Chicago for a big fund-raising dinner recently.

Adlai III is 35, eldest of the three Stevensons. He is a legislator, a member of the Illinois House of Representatives, and in his first year he seemed to hard-boiled old-timers from back of the yards to be too much of a go-dooder. But in his current travels around the state he is proving a down-to-earth campaigner, assuaging the issues in terms the average voter can understand.

In his recently published "America's Political Dynasties" Stephen Hess does not rate the Stevensons as one of the dynasties of politics, but they have made a name for themselves. Stevenson was vice president of Grover Cleveland's second term. His grandson was twice the Republican Party for President, 1952 and 1956, and was twice defeated by Dwight Eisenhower. If he is in fact one of the great dynasties, he can establish the dynasty again.

Of the Taft dynasty there can be no doubt. The founder, Al, was the first Secretary of War, attorney-general and minister to Austria and Russia. His son, William Howard, was governor of the Philippines, Secretary of War, president and chief justice. Robert A. Taft of the following generation was twice the nation's No. 1 Republican.

In 1952 he was narrowly defeated for the presidency by John F. Kennedy. He has been a member of the House since 1955 and he died a year later.

Robert Taft Jr. is running for a seat in the House in 1968.

This is a sad commentary on the Roosevelt dynasty. Theodore Roosevelt was the fourth son of a public career but fell short. Two of FDR's sons, James and FDR Jr., got as far as the House of Representatives. James was elected to six terms before he resigned to take a place on the delegation to the United Nations. FDR Jr. was elected to the House of California in 1950. FDR Jr. was elected to two terms. Elliott made it as far as mayor of Milwaukee and the fourth son, John, turned Republican, joining the Hoover administration.

Officers said the blast occurred as Summers and the two victims were unloading part of the explosive cargo. Sixty firemen battled the resulting blaze for nearly an hour.

Kennedy's Reburial Set Next Year

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Corps of Army Engineers, contradicting other Army sources, said today the body of President John F. Kennedy would not be moved to a new gravesite until next year.

Pious word was that the remains would be moved about 40 feet to a new location sometime within five weeks, after darkness has settled on the hills.

That indicated that the reburial would take place by Nov. 22, the third anniversary of the young president's assassination.

However, the office of the chief of engineers said in a statement today:

"The final landscape design proposal for the gravesite area is being developed by the landscape architect. As we have explained, the gravesite will not be completed formally until next spring.

"The transfer of the graves is related to the planting and appropriate hillside grading. No transfer therefore is anticipated this year."

The reburial is expected to take place at night after the cemetery has closed, to insure privacy.

Uncle Sam Is Bartender to Aged, Poor

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Uncle Sam played bartender Monday to the aged and poor inmates of several Northern California institutions. He uncorked 40,000 shots — on the house.

Collector of Customs George Brokaw said part was a scotch-type whisky, part was rum and the rest creme de cafe.

The whisky was confiscated because it was falsely labeled as a product of Scotland. The rest went unclaimed when an importing firm went bankrupt.

Recipients were the Little Sisters of the Poor, and in Oakland, the Jewish Home for the Aged, the Laguna Honda Home and the California Veterans Home at Yountville.

Mother Superior Aurelie, Little Sisters of the Poor administrator, said the drinks will be served as therapeutic hot toddies — whenever one of the charges has a cold or feels ill.

Road Repair Is Urged by Lemhi Representative

SALMON — The Idaho Highway Board has been told that the Carmen bridge near Salmon is dangerous and completely inadequate and that U. S. Highway 93 in portions of Lemhi and Custer counties is as "antiquated as high-button shoes."

Rep. Peter McKinney, Lemhi County state representative, informed the board in a letter sent to Ellis E. Matice, state highway engineer, that the scenic U. S. Highway 93 route has been abandoned by tourists for safer routes.

She asked that improvements be made. "We have been very much neglected here by the Idaho State Highway Board," she said.

The legislator noted that accidents have completely closed the Carmen bridge, hurting the entire economy and that narrow traffic across the span is one-way. U. S. Highway 93 from Salmon to Challis is narrow and winding, following the Salmon River, she noted.

Mrs. McKinney said she also is urging that Idaho Highway 28 be designated as part of the national highway system.

Psychiatrist Says Stress Can Make One Accident Prone

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP)—Are there people who are accident-prone? Sure there are.

According to an expert in the field, you are one of them.

Dr. Orswell Fine, assistant professor of psychiatry at the University of Kentucky, explains that everybody can be accident prone under certain pressures.

For example: Just before leaving for work, a man finds out that he is overdrawn at the bank. While driving his car, his mind is centered on money matters, not traffic. He is an accident looking for a place to happen.

"We're made vulnerable at certain times during our lives, too, such as times of transition, change or stress," Fine said. "For example, when a student leaves school and goes into the outside world."

This type of accident proneness, for most of us, is a temporary thing, Fine said. But there are some for whom it is more or less permanent.

"There are people who by their very character invite accidents," Fine told business and industry representatives Monday at a discussion sponsored by a local mental health group.

Generally, he said, these people fall into one or more of these categories:

—Those seeking self-punishment. This might be a person who has committed what he or she felt was a great wrong and subconsciously wants to punish himself or herself for it.

—Those seeking self-injury to ward off disaster. Fine used an example of a student headed for drafts of World War I meeting an examination he knows he in Boise Saturday.

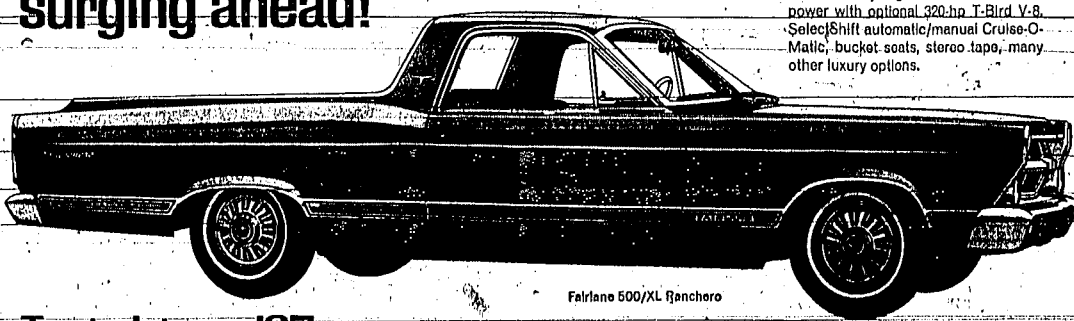

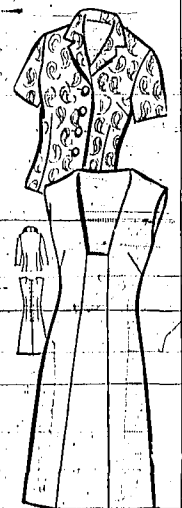

The driver will go from hot to cold for the Ice Wall, an event so hazardous that stunt men operate their cars from the back seat. At high speeds, they throw their cars into a four-foot thick, 6,000-pound block of ice. It's a crazy way to make ice cubes.
