Oakland's Racial Unrest Continues Into Third Day

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Two blasts started today by crude fire-bombing brought arrest of three Negroes and a white man in a residential area. The racial disorders continued into a third day. The fires were quickly extinguished. Five other Negroes were arrested on a school playground by police who reported finding them filling bottles with gasoline. Officers said the Negroes had enough gasoline and bottles to make more than 100 fire bombs.

Under heavy police guard, classes resumed today at Castlemont High School, the predominantly Negro school where 250 Negroes, both truants and cutouts, beat up five white teachers and three white pupils Wednesday. The 2,700-pupil school had to close at noon.

A school board meeting Wednesday by a group charging that Negro education in Oakland was inferior, was blamed by the superintendent of schools for fomenting the disorders.

Occasional outbreaks continued in the blocks between 30th and 38th avenues and between East 14th Street and MacArthur Boulevard. At 10 p.m. reinforced police squads moved 400 abreast down J Street enforcing a curfew for juveniles under 18.

The police didn't want to go on the streets at all. Patrol officers led a Negro student at McClymonds High School. They said they were not talking to anyone who was not a Negro. Several young Negroes throwing rocks and bricks at policemen, but added it was Mickey Moore, Oakland's mayor, who was referring to recent rioting along San Francisco's Third Street.

Stuart S. Phillips, superintendent of schools, blamed the Ad Hoc Committee for Quality Education, which had sponsored a boycott of public schools.

The Ad Hoc Committee must bear the blame for everything that has happened, said Phillips. He said the committee broke one law, it is difficult to tell him not to break another.

John George, an Oakland attorney, said a Negro boycott of schools is not a peaceful and educational one. He said the conditions in Oakland which caused the protest. He said he would continue the boycott.

Housewives' Boycott Spreads to 6 Cities

NEW YORK (AP) — The housewives' boycott widened today as shoppers in at least six more cities joined the spreading checkout-counter war. Some 200 women in Division Beach, Fla., announced they would stay away from big chain stores until they called back prices, and similar pledges came from consumers in El Paso, Texas, and Hobbs, Carlsbad, Roswell and Albuquerque, N.M.

A leader of the apparently successful Phoenix, Ariz., bread boycott was in Van Nuys, Calif., helping organize a local chapter of "Housewives Voice for Lower Prices." She said she had received calls from women in Wisconsin and Philadelphia area asking to join. She said she had received reports under consideration in Houston, Arlington and Dallas, Texas.

The developments came as a supermarket executive predicted a possible price rise in November, the scene of the largest boycott, and a chain of stores in Cincinnati announced a series of price reductions.

3 Nations Eye Future Of Alliance

BOONN, Germany (AP) — The United States, Britain and West Germany today began reviewing the status of the Atlantic alliance to determine what strength is now needed to hold off the danger of a Soviet attack on Western Europe.

Top-level officials met privately in the West German foreign ministry this morning. The three major members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization are expected to agree, perhaps by the end of the month, on a new joint American and British strength on the continent. The United States now maintains about 100,000 troops in Europe and Britain nearly 60,000.

To please the British, who had expressed their liking for a troop pull-out by the end of the year, the first report will be due at the end of November. This will be in time for a meeting of NATO's annual meeting of NATO ministers to be held in Paris before Christmas.

Dwindling Attendance, Stack Of Legislation Facing House

WASHINGTON (AP) — House leaders faced the threat of dwindling attendance today as a stack of important legislation stood in the way of adjournment. White House aides said the House could adjourn by Saturday. The House was expected to act Wednesday on a \$6.1 billion school aid bill, a \$1.75 billion anti-poverty measure, a bill that would launch President Johnson's demonstration cities urban renewal program and an anti-inflation measure that includes a rider clearing the way for merger of the National and American Football Leagues.

It didn't get to a single one. All have been rescheduled for action today.

With election day less than three weeks off, House members are leaving in droves to get home for the holidays. There is concern among leaders whether an effective majority, or even a quorum of 218, will be able to handle the bills. On several roll calls Wednesday, only about 200 of the 435 members answered.

Priority House bills in the House were shoved back by a long fight over the wisdom of setting up an ethics committee, a series of minor skirmishes involving public works projects and the naming of a joke on the Chattahoochee River between Alabama and Georgia, as well as votes on a flock of House bills.

The ethics bill kept the House in session until 10:51 p.m. The House finally rejected the idea of an ethics committee empowered to punish erring members and settled for a study committee. The Senate vote to the House Wednesday — a compromise bill on narcotics rehabilitation, the big school aid bill and a veterans making veterans of the Vietnam War eligible for health disability benefits and other benefits.

Johnson Receives Spirited Welcome From Australians

CANBERRA, Australia (AP) — President Johnson arrived in Australia today to an enthusiastic welcome, and declared he was on a mission of hope for peace. But he said the task ahead was not easy because "the securing of peace is not done by miracles." Johnson flew in from New Zealand, where he had been observed pleading allied unity in Viet Nam and called on North Viet Nam's leaders to join in a "nobler war" — on hunger, ignorance and disease in Southeast Asia.

Johnson was greeted by all the pomp and circumstance Australia could muster, including a 21-gun salute and an honor guard. He was welcomed by a small crowd. But the crowds grew into the thousands as his motorcade drove into Canberra.

The weather cooperated fully for the coming of the first American President to visit Australia. A light rain stopped the minutes before the presidential jet landed in Canberra, the capital, and brilliant late afternoon sunshine greeted the dark gray thunderheads that Johnson, followed by his wife, stepped from the plane to be greeted by Prime Minister Harold Holt.

Harking back once again to his World War II visit to Australia and New Zealand as a naval officer, Johnson said he was coming to Australia to see what he had returned — on route to the Manila conference on Viet Nam.

"I cannot say that miracles will occur at Manila," he declared. The hard work of securing the peace is not done by miracles.

"I cannot say that the hunger and injustice of the past will be ended by a declaration of the seven nations (including Australia) which will meet next week. Years must pass, years of dedication and hard work. The men must make the just society of which they dream."

Johnson declared that there is a new vision, "a new vision of the world." "It is a vision of emancipation from foreign domination, from tyranny, from ill-use and ignorance. It is the only vision worthy of mankind. We shall try to capture it. We shall try to make it a reality. A crowd of about 400 that had braved the chilly weather and earlier rain cheered loudly and wildly during the President's speech.

Johnson said he was grateful that the Australian and American people had agreed to join in the task of helping to build a new Asia.

"I feel now — as I did in 1942 — the confidence that comes from Australia," he said. "You must know that we reciprocate that support in full measure."

Together, as we have always been, I know that we shall succeed. Now I look forward to meeting your great people once again.

Heart Pump Aids Mexican Farmer, 26
HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — A heart pump is assisting a 26-year-old Mexican farmer who was given an artificial heart pump after surgery at Methodist Hospital.

The patient, Benjamin Flores, suffered from a potentially life-threatening disease of the heart valve. After his diseased heart valve was replaced Wednesday, physicians attached the artificial device to augment the heart's left pumping chamber.

Flores, a bachelor, is the first patient to receive aid from the heart pump since Esperanza de la Cruz, a 40-year-old Mexican housewife, was treated by the pump in 1964.

The doctor man previously had been employed there, but had left the farm about six months ago. It was reported he had been arrested, pg. 2, col. 7.

Ky Tries to Mend Civilian Cabinet

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Premier Nguyen Cao Ky made progress today toward patching up his civilian cabinet, but two of the seven southern dissidents were reported refusing to withdraw their resignations. Ky told a news conference that while he was at the Manila conference next week Deputy Prime Minister Nguyen Luu Vien, one of the seven who had quit Wednesday, would be in charge in Saigon. A lack of other officials' comment and a spate of contradictory rumors left the outcome of the dispute in doubt. Unofficial reports were that Ky had persuaded five of the southerners to stay on in the cabinet. No informed sources, however, said the premier had ended the basic feud between the southern civilians and the military men from North Viet Nam who had the power.

The southerners have blamed northern officials for "regional divisionism" in the government and have accused National Police Chief Nguyen Ngoc Loan of ruthlessness. In a resignation statement Wednesday, they said the military regime was corrupt, complained of military interference in civilian affairs and said the government was not coming to better the life of the people.

The split did not appear to threaten the life of Ky's 16-month-old regime since civilians in the cabinet are limited largely to administrative functions. But it promised embarrassment for Ky at the Manila meeting next week.

The Education Minister Nguyen Van Trung and Youth Minister Vu Long Triew were said to be determined to resign but "will not do so until cabinet split was fully explained, just before the Manila conference."

Following unconfirmed reports that the other five dissidents were to stay in the cabinet, Ky's press office called a news conference. But Ky read a prepared statement that did not mention the cabinet split, and only answered written questions, and ignored those on the political crisis.

Deputy Premier Vien and Police Chief Nguyen Truong Van Thuan, another of the dissidents, were at the news conference but would not talk to newsmen.

The former Virginia governor and guiding power of the state political organization which has his name for 40 years, died at 8:23 a.m. without having emerged from the deep coma into which he slipped last July.

His physicians said that Byrd was suffering from a malignant brain tumor and offered no hope for his recovery. He retired from his seat in the United States Senate a post he had held since 1933—last November because of flagging health. This year, Byrd Jr. was appointed to the cabinet split.

Although Byrd's political position was anchored to conservatism and an effort to keep a middle ground between the two parties, he held the affection and regard of his Washington colleagues across the entire political spectrum.

"He was a tower of strength, a considerate and gentle giant," said Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield in a eulogy to Byrd.

Rep. Gerald Ford of Michigan, the House Republican leader, said "Byrd's devotion to the fundamentals of free government will remain an inspiration to all of us." Virginia has produced more than 100 members of great America and from Washington to Willyard and from Jefferson to Harry Flood Byrd.

Two Jewish Authors Share Nobel Prize for Literature
STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — The Nobel Prize for literature today awarded the 1966 Nobel Prize for literature today. They are Saul Bellow, a Canadian-born American, and Elias Lönnrot, a Finnish poet who lives in Stockholm.

The Swedish Academy of Letters said it made the award to Bellow for his profound and energetic narrative art with motifs of the Jewish people, and to Lönnrot for his outstanding lyrical and dramatic work, which interprets the

prize's destiny with touching clarity. This is only the second time in the history of the literature prize — going back to 1901 — that two authors have shared the honor. The first time was in 1917 when two Danes, K. G. Pontoppidan and H. Pontoppidan received the prize. The prize this year is worth 300,000 crowns — about \$300,000. And will be shared equally. The prize was established by the will of Alfred Nobel, pg. 2, col. 4.

Autopsy Slated in Hazelton Shooting

Rodriguez was shot about 2 p.m. Wednesday before several witnesses as he sat in a car at a farm owned by William Fowler.

Dr. Lauren Neher, Jerome County coroner, said Thursday morning he will conduct an autopsy this afternoon and officers pointed out legislation will depend upon the coroner's findings. Mrs. Rodriguez, mother of six children, has not been taken into custody.

Witnesses said the victim was shot with a .22-caliber rifle. Mr. Rodriguez previously had been hospitalized after surgery at Methodist Hospital.

Packaging, Labeling Measure Clears Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill intended to protect shoppers packaging bill to deal with packages that the ability of consumers to make value comparisons is impaired.

He said he regarded the House bill as "actually stronger than the Senate's." He was the author and chief sponsor of the Senate bill. Five years ago Hart introduced what he called a "truth in packaging" bill to deal with packages that the ability of consumers to make value comparisons is impaired.

It has been caught by London's street widening program.

"We're desperately hoping that someone will wave a magic wand in our direction," Robinson said Wednesday. He is the circle's official in charge of finding new premises. "We don't care who. But the one in Chan Canasta, the Russian Kid, the Great Levante and Al Koran, just to mention a few."

"What we need at the moment is a jolly good real estate man."

Jobless Men In Britain Number High

LONDON (AP)—Unemployment in Britain jumped nearly 100,000 in the past month, the biggest increase in almost four years — the Ministry of Labor announced today.

It was the fourth successive month of rising unemployment as the Labor government's program of belt-tightening austerity cut more money into the economy.

Today's jobless figures will undoubtedly bring an angry storm in Parliament from the Conservative opposition and left-wing Laborites.

The Labor Ministry announced unemployment rose 97,027 since Sept. 27, to 437,238. That was 1.9 per cent of the nation's work force.

Prime Minister Harold Wilson said in July when he announced his tough deflationary program that unemployment would rise 2.5 per cent. This would mean 500,000 to 600,000 jobless.

Today's announcement came as Wilson was discussing economic policy with his Cabinet.

Charges Are Answered by Frederickson

GOODING—State Sen. Dan G. Frederickson Thursday answered Perry Swisher's charge that he had worked with Ray Barge, former senator of Power County, and Sen. Don Samason, on a legislative bill to keep the tax on power plants within their home counties.

Frederickson said, "If Swisher had his way he would recall the entire Idaho tax base, but like most reformers, he wants to share what the other fellow gets."

"As far as this campaign is concerned," said Frederickson, "I am running my own content and have not participated in any gubernatorial campaign."

Frederickson demanded to know what Swisher proposes to do with Federal Impact funds that come to certain communities, the forest lands, the land from the lead and silver mines in northern Idaho, and the phosphate mines in Blaine, Swisher's home county. The taxes and payments from these sources amount to millions of dollars, he stated.

Frederickson stated, "Each area should develop its own resources, but piecemeal equalization would break several counties and I will never be a party to such a robbery. I am sure that I have been acknowledged as a defender of the local county tax base. Our schools and our county government depend on this support."

Post Office Is Recruiting 150,000 Employees to Battle Christmas Mail

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Post Office Department is recruiting an army of 150,000 temporary employees for its battle against the annual avalanche of Christmas mail.

The objective, in the words of Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien, is to try to insure that our fighting men in Vietnam and all of our people at home will receive at least their Christmas mail on time.

Recruiting of the temporary employees will begin immediately, he said, in hopes that many of them regular 700,000-man work force by Nov. 1. Last year, the hiring of 147,000 temporary workers did not begin until Dec. 4.

The earlier-than-usual hiring candidate Takes Own Election Poll

IDAHO FALLS (Special)—A. W. (Bill) Brunt, Democratic candidate for Congress and Rep. George Hansen have equal shares of the vote, according to a poll made in five towns and cities of the eastern part of the Second District, Brunt said Wednesday.

Tabulation showed Brunt with 44 per cent of the vote, Hansen with 44 per cent, with 12 per cent of the vote unaccounted for.

Polling was conducted in cafes and supermarkets in various parts of the towns and in different towns. Time of day was also varied in order to obtain a random sample, and no effort was made to choose respondents.

A sample ballot was handed to voters who were asked to read the directions and check their choice. The question asked only about Congressional candidates, but also read, "For United States Congressman, whom do you want to win?" Names of the two candidates appeared in changing order from ballot to ballot.

Candidates were identified by no more than party affiliation.

Results of the poll seemed to indicate that conservatives favor Hansen, but workers and wage-earners preferred Brunt. Morning shoppers favored Hansen but afternoon shoppers wanted Brunt to win.

The poll was started when another poll indicated Brunt was behind Hansen in percentage of persons voting for him.

Brunt said he thinks the state shopping center bill is "weak since it catches mostly housewives and doesn't touch at all to different parts of towns and funds within one area. This excludes rural persons as well as wage earners."

Gas Helps to Flush Slayer After Siege

NEW YORK (AP)—Police tear gas flushed a cursing, weeping man from a Bronx apartment Wednesday after a 45-minute siege in which one of four hostages was stabbed to death. Two others were wounded, apparently by police shotguns.

Hundreds of police, newsmen and spectators on the street below heard the man, identified as Robert Philip, shout threats from the fifth-story window that he would kill his hostages.

"I've got a gun and a knife and I'll kill every one of them if you don't get me," he yelled.

Police firing shotguns blasted through the door and tear gas shells through the door and windows wounded Philip from the apartment. They said he was wanted for questioning in two murders and had escaped from a state mental hospital three years ago.

In the apartment they found the body of Mrs. Leslie Thompson, 22, stabbed three times, in the hallway. Her daughter, Tammy, 3, escaped injury except for shock and tear gas burns.

The other hostages — Philip's sister, Margaret, 22, and her daughter, Deborah, 2 — were wounded. Police said the child was in serious condition with a gunshot wound while her mother was hit in the arm.

Area Hunters Are Warned About Fires

Moale Valley hunters are warned to be careful with fires this weekend in the Sawtooth National Forest, states Forest Service officials.

Though moisture from recent rains remain in some areas, Forest Service officials caution that fires can still destroy range, wildlife and watershed lands.

Forest Service officials urge all deer hunters to protect their valid hunting grounds on national forests by leaving fires lit. Hunters also are asked to leave a clean campsite the way they would like to find it.

Destructive forest fires are often caused during the hunting season by careless hunters lighting cigarettes into dry leaves. Campfires for warming fires which are left without being extinguished also are major causes of forest fires.

These fires, Forest Service officials state, often have burned out hunters' camps and destroyed their camping equipment, jeeps, automobiles and even the deer they have worked so hard to dress and hang near their camp.

Sato Claims He Will Not Resign

TOKYO (AP)—Prime Minister Etsuro Sato rejected opposition demands today that he resign as prime minister because of scandals in the Japanese government.

Sato said he would resign only if he lost a vote in the lower house.

One Cabinet minister has been accused of rigging an express train stop, another of using a military bus for a private party, and a third of junketing in America. Sato himself has been accused of the socialist of tax evasion.







A raspy-voiced man seen outside the newly opened United Christian Center at the corner of the Mainway when Dr. Robert W. Spilke, 43, was killed there, became the subject of an intensive search Wednesday.

He turned out to be a plumber's helper working on a construction project behind the center where the victim had helped dedicate Sunday.

Police found the two fingerprints in the guest room where Dr. Spilke was killed.

Dr. Spilke was executive director of the commission on religion and race of the National Council of Churches until last year, when he became professor of ministry at the University of Chicago.

Special Gifts For Soldiers Are Listed

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Ketchup, a money clip, bubble gum, James Bond, peanut brittle and a paper airplane are among the special gifts in a Christmas package, each is an appreciated rarity.

A Dallas organization, Support formed last March as a home-front cheering squad for the boys at war, is recruiting donors for overseas Christmas goodies.

"We're working with anybody whose integrity we feel we can respect," said Mrs. Paul Burns Jr., unofficial spearhead of Support. "We just want to be sure they're reliable."

She has had instances of the boys getting dog food and Communist literature in the mail.

Support promises to match up a company of about 200 soldiers in Viet Nam with any interested group, such as a sorority, Parent-Teacher Association, or civil club. Each group agrees to mail goodies in five-pound packages by Dec. 1.

To help the club members decide what to send, Support talked to a former supply sergeant returned from Viet Nam and compiled a list of what every soldier wants for Christmas.

These include:

- A money clip—Vietnamese paper money comes in bundles.
- Packaged sauce—Vietnamese chun or tabasco to spice up the Creations.
- A ball point pen with a battery-operated light in the tip, so the GI can write home at night.
- Writing paper and self-seal envelopes—regular envelopes slide shut from the top.
- Nuts, canned shoestring potatoes, flavored candy drops, fruit cake or peanut brittle; all must be in vacuum cans to keep out the ants.
- Paperback books—even fighting men crave adventure stories.
- Tea or coffee—Vietnamese drinks; mango chutney or checkers sets or Chinese puzzles for a compact.
- A bubble gum for the GI to give Vietnamese children.
- And a poem or prayer to convey the mother's special thoughts about Christmas.

U. S. Still Using Defoliants, Crop Killers in Viet Nam War

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite recent protests, the United States continues to use defoliant and crop killers in Viet Nam, a war tactic that so far has consumed around \$10 billion in chemicals.

A Pentagon spokesman acknowledged today that U.S. Air Force C-123s still periodically spray heavy jungle and rice-growing areas in Viet Nam to deprive the Viet Cong of much cover and food.

Chinese Boy Defies School Unit's Ruling

BOSTON (AP) — "There are three races in this world," said Walter J. Lee, 17, a high school senior, "white, negro, and yellow."

"I'm Chinese and I'm yellow. So how can the school committee say I'm white?"

The youth was reacting Wednesday to a decision by the Boston School Committee to reclassify all Chinese-American students as "white," thus removing two predominantly Chinese schools from the racialized category.

"It's not only ridiculous," Lee said, "it's unfair to us."

The school committee has been in a long fight with the State Board of Education over racial imbalance in the city's schools, but only concerning Negro children.

Acting under the state's racial imbalance law, the Board of Education has withheld funds from the University of Massachusetts to reduce school imbalance. The law defines an imbalanced school as one with a more than 50 per cent nonwhite population.

The school committee has challenged the law's constitutionality by asking a court to release the state aid.

"Forty-six out of Boston's 131 schools have been ruled racially imbalanced," Lee said.

With the 871 Chinese in the white category, the school committee's census shows 68,000 whites and 24,077 nonwhite students.

Minisarong Makes Upoar In Malaysia

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — The minisarong, used by Malay women to enclose their bodies, is causing such a flap that the government may ban it.

The sarong kebaya is the national female costume for Malay women. It does a lot for the female form from the waist up, but it also reaches to the ground.

When the Miss Malaysia contest came to Kuala Lumpur, the entrepreneur hatched the minisarong, a garment that did as much for the bosom as the sarong kebaya does—but also bared the legs.

Malaya being a Moslem nation officially, a great consternation resulted at the parade of flesh.

One official, Spoh Bin Haji Ahmad said: "Moslem law states that women must be covered from their feet to their heads. Even their faces must be covered with veils."

The minisarong is far from that.

Philippine Leaders Claim Strong Bonds With Asians

MANILA (AP) — Philippine leaders have been making eloquent speeches about the nation's bonds with Asia.

The newspapers would generally approve, the economists would agree, and some intellectuals, notably from the left, would applaud warmly. Then the nation would generally ignore the whole thing and go about its business.

The late Ramon Magsaysay, the most popular man ever elected president, led the nation into the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization only after initial reluctance. Despite this, his appeal in the region, a respected historian notes, "has never seriously entertained the idea of Asian leadership."

After the SEATO treaty in 1954, the Philippines returned to a cautious and gingerly approach toward Asian neighbors. Two years later President Ferdinand E. Marcos aspires now to the role Magsaysay declined in Asian councils.

The seven-nation summit conference on Viet Nam which convenes Monday is the latest step for Marcos.

As host to the United States, Australia, New Zealand, South Viet Nam, South Korea and Thailand—all with troops in Viet Nam—Marcos will automatically be the focus.

"If he succeeds, he will give his nation a stronger position in Asia than it has ever enjoyed. He could tilt the power balance a little more against the Red Chinese in Asia."

New Trial Ordered in Kidnap Case

PARIS (AP) — A new trial has been ordered in the Mehdi Ben Barka kidnaping following the surrender of the Moroccan deputy security chief, Maj. Ahmed Dlimi, hours before the case was to have gone to the jury.

Dlimi was charged with helping to plan the kidnaping here almost a year ago of Moroccan leftist leader Ben Barka, who is believed to have "helped" Paris in the Dlimi case. Morocco Monday he was going to Paris voluntarily to clear himself and his country.

Six persons had been on trial last week in one of France's most controversial legal cases since World War II.

Attorneys said legal moves now could delay the new trial one or two years.

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) — Western Airlines told a Civil Aeronautics Board hearing Wednesday it didn't want the North-South route service Missoula has been seeking, and Gov. Tim Babcock expressed confidence the city will get the service it wants.

Safety 'Tube' Is Installed in U.S. Moonship

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. — (NEA) — It is midsummer of 1969 and America's massive moonship, the Saturn V, is steaming on the launch pad. Inside, three astronauts are flashed a frightening message. "Abandon! The rocket is going to explode!"

At tube's end several alternating layers of frictionized material would act to decelerate the slide and the crew members would tumble out onto the launch pad. The tube is surrounded by rubber walls and covered with a rubber ceiling. Finally, they'd enter a foot-wide steel door, take seats in six-inch-thick, sponge chairs

and wait out the rocket explosion in a coil-mounted, shock-proof room which is equipped with enough food and water to last 48 hours. Total time elapsed—less than four minutes. Is "it" enough? It depends. Cape experts say that a successful egress would depend on

early detection and early warning of a launch vehicle explosion. At the very least, they figure the moon crew would have three minutes grace in which to slide the over 500-foot distance to underground security. And if there was no warning at all?

There is little talk here of such things. But there is one gag sign that sums up the situation. Hanging in the shadow of the 352-foot-tall Saturn, it reads: "Everybody please keep their fingers crossed..."

What do they do? They go down the tube. Happily, however, the tube is part of what space safety people deem the "emergency egress" system. Moon shot officials call it the "earth chute" and believe that, in case of trouble, it will become the astronaut's subway to safety.

Nobody expects trouble with the 6.1-million-pound Saturn, of course, but it may occur anyway. And with the fuel quantity of 500 tons of TNT aboard, a leak or a spark could ignite what would amount to the blast of a small nuclear bomb.

Thus the tube. Actually, this conduit is only part of an overall escape maneuver which would be initiated if the need arose. If, during a launching of the lunar vehicle, a computer detected a serious error in the ship's operation—especially one that might cause an explosion—the mission would be abandoned and egress action instantly begun.

Immediately, the crew would be notified of the situation. Likely, they would receive a verbal command to literally run for their lives.

In 37 seconds the launch tower's retracted access arm (bridge) would swing back out to the rocketship's passenger capsule. Instantly, by the time it locked into position the three astronauts would be unstrapped, unhinged and waiting to flee.

They would then cross the access arm to a high-speed elevator poised in the framework of the tower. The elevator in such an emergency would transport the crew on a breathless descent at 168 yards per minute or eight feet a second.

Once down, the men would leap into the opening of the tube, a four-foot-thick, stainless steel affair which twists along the launch pad and disappears into the sod. The chute naturally is slick as a glass mountain. Much of it is coated with Teflon (just like the Monstiek frying pans) and free of all imperfections. The crew, like jugs in a lumber flume, would slide wildly to the ground. Ten feet... Fifty feet... In all, a 170-foot seat-of-the-pants soljour.

Housewives Run Into Trouble in Organized Try to Cut Food Prices

NEW YORK (AP)—Frustrated housewives are running into trouble with everyone from district attorneys to their own husbands in their organized attempts to cut food prices. In Portland, Ore., the district attorney ordered an investigation of the grocery price war that has seen milk drop to 18 cents a gallon. One store even was giving away a gallon of milk, a loaf of bread and a pint of cottage cheese with every purchase. In Van Nuys, Calif., housewives ran into objections from their husbands when they tried

to organize. The housewives have claimed some victories. In Portland, a group of war on poverty workers organized a car pool to ferry residents of a low-income, primarily Negro area to supermarkets across the Willamette River offering free bread. In New York, the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Co. (the nation's largest grocery chain) expressed sympathy for the housewives and suggested they could save 20 per cent by buying private label brands. Quite aside from the boycotts and price wars, the housewives' in for some good news. Wholesale food prices dropped this week for the fifth straight

week, and now are running only 3.7 per cent higher than a year ago. At one time they were nearly 95 per cent higher. Egg prices are down another 1 cent a dozen in San Francisco and 2 cents in New York. Butter prices are down sharply, and margarine has dropped, too. Beef supplies also are greater, leading to the prospect of price cuts.



U.S. Army Has Shortage Of Captains

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Army, now in the midst of a massive Viet Nam buildup, has a serious shortage of captains—without an immediate relief in sight, it was learned Wednesday.

Officials said there are about 32,000 captains on duty now, 2,500 below the planned strength for this year.

But those figures tell only part of the story, sources said.

The Army would like congress to approve to add upward of 5,000 new captains next year. Most come from the 16,400 first lieutenants now on active duty and the Army isn't sure how many of those officers will elect to extend their obligated duty tours.

"We've got more spaces available to add than we have more into them," one source said.

The shortage is being felt to a degree in Viet Nam, where lieutenants are commanding combat companies, although that job belongs to a captain under Army tables of organization.

Pentagon officials emphasize, however, that most of these officers are only a few months away from promotion to captain.

The officials add also that the Army is meeting its rotation requirements in Viet Nam and no officer is required to serve there more than a year.

To meet its present officer shortage and in anticipation of future needs—sources said the Army has taken these steps:

• It is not letting critically needed officers resign. In the past year, 1,400 officers, most of them captains, have been forced to stay in the service for up to six additional 18-month enlistment periods.

• It has filed federal court suits challenging that order as captains.

• It has cut from 24 to 18 the number of months a first lieutenant must serve in that grade before becoming a captain.

• It has made repeated requests for Reserve and National Guard captains to join the active Army and has relaxed the

Several officers tried to talk to her but the successful one was senior Fire Capt. Jack Moffett. He said she agreed to come back into the hotel if the persons below were sent away.

Moffett said when the crowd was dispersed she inched over to the window and climbed in.

Few Michigan Democrats Believe Governor Romney Can Be Defeated

DETROIT (AP)—Michigan Democrats aren't giving up publicly, but few believe Gov. George Romney can be beaten in his bid for a third term.

Their goal is to whittle Romney's margin to less than the 383,000-vote plurality he rolled up two years ago—and take the show off Romney-for-president talk.

That 1964 victory for Republican Romney came amid a Democratic landslide that won control of the legislature and a majority of Michigan's congressional delegation.

If Romney has White House ambitions—and most everybody believes he has—his standing at the 1968 Republican nominating convention would be considerably enhanced if he could score another big victory and also carry some Republicans into office on his own ticket.

More and more, Romney is ignoring his opponent, Democratic State Chairman Zoltan Ferency, and working harder to help Sen. Robert D. Griffin against the formidable challenge of former Gov. G. Mennen Williams.




