Measures Awaiting Signature

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson is expected to sign into law virtually all the legislation passed in the rush to adjournment by Congress. Much of it is for his "Great Society" program and some is greater than he asked.

Some key programs could be signed by Johnson even before he returns to the United States Nov. 2 from his Pacific-Asian tour.

The lengthy second session of the 89th Congress ended last Saturday afternoon after two years of record spending and government involvement in new fields.

The final outpouring of legislation included a \$6.1-billion elementary and secondary school aid bill for the next two years that is a whopping \$1.7 billion above what Johnson asked.

The President's demonstration cities program designed to show what an all-fronts attack on poverty can do — won't be approved at \$1.25 billion, less than half what he asked.

Lamakers voted each major political party a potential \$10-million kitty for the 1968 presidential campaign.

The program would permit taxpayers to divert \$1 from their income taxes to the campaign.

The adding machines are still clicking away trying to figure out how much Congress went over or under Johnson's budget.

The two-year appropriation total of \$263 billion stands as a record, with the year 1967-68 a close second at \$247 billion set in 1962, the first full year of World War.

After the Medicare and voting rights blockbusters of 1965, this second session of the 89th Congress has been a record.

And there was greater preoccupation with talking about the war in Viet Nam.

President Can Claim .905 Average

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House administration today a .905 batting average in the 89th Congress.

"And that is a pretty fine average in any game," said Postmaster-General Lawrence F. O'Brien, the President's chief missionary, or lobbyist, on Capitol Hill.

He and Joseph A. Califano Jr., White House aide, met with newsmen in the Fifth Room of the White House today to hand out copies of their final report to the President on the two years of the Congress which closed Saturday.

In brief this showed: first session, 87 measures initiated by the administration, 54 passed; second session, 113 measures initiated, 67 passed; grand total, 200 measures initiated, 181 passed, 90 passed; batting average .905.

"In a word," the report said, "this was a fabulous and remarkable Congress. What was not said was the meaning and significance for every man, woman and child in this country and for future generations."

Udall Presses For Control Of Pollution

CORVALLIS (AP) — Secretary of Interior Stewart Udall today said "no research area has been more neglected" than water pollution control.

Udall made the remark in a speech prepared for the dedication of the \$2.5 million Pacific Northwest Water Laboratory at Corvallis, Ore. State University.

Udall said the bill on the research area, "None is more important to the future progress and well-being of our society" than control of pollution.

"I think it is fair to say that the water pollution program now at last getting under way in our country is without counterpart or precedent," he said.

Firm's Restoration Plan Is Completed

BOISE (AP) — A plan for reorganizing and recapitalizing Idaho Savings and Loan Association under "completely new management" is nearly completed, an official of the IS and L Shareholders Association said Sunday.

Philip E. Cook of Boise, vice chairman of the association's executive committee, said the plan has the "strong backing" of State Finance Director Tom D. McDowell.

The reorganized firm would be insured by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp., Cook said. It was not insured when it closed July 6, freeing savings in Boise, Twin Falls, Pocatello and Idaho Falls offices.

Income From Sales Tax Is Reported

BOISE (AP) — Sales tax revenue is running at \$2 million a month, a report from tax collector Floyd West showed Monday.

He said that collections in September totaled \$2,177,250, bringing to \$9,722,102 the revenue received in the three-month period which began July 1.

In the first year of its operation, the 3 per cent sales tax brought in an average of about \$2.5 million a month.

Income tax collections in the three months ended Sept. 30 amounted to \$3,780,410, down from the \$3,018,028 a year earlier.

Charitable tax collections totaled \$1,204,024, up slightly, and motor vehicle tax collections amounted to \$5,584,590, up \$241,001.

Malaysians Put Clamp on Leftists

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Malaysian police are clamping down on leftist elements to prevent a civil war, officials said Sunday.

Police raids on two branch offices of the leftist-oriented opposition Labor party yielded a number of banners in English, Malay and Chinese, some of which said "War criminal Johnson go home" and "Get out, Johnson the murderer."

Bereaved Parents Upset at Inquest

ABERFAN WALES (AP) — Shouting "They killed our children!" bereaved parents brought uproar today to an inquest for young victims of the coal slag slide that buried Aberfan's village school. A man whose wife and two sons were killed in Friday's "black glacier" told the coroner to record a verdict of "buried alive by the National Coal Board."

The board, which runs Britain's state-owned mines, has been accused of neglect in allowing the giant slag heap to grow to the point where it collapsed.

To date, 143 bodies have been recovered, all but 17 of them children.

Sixty parents were present at the inquest for the first 34 victims identified. In the upstairs, women called out: "They killed our children."

Coroner Benjamin Halliday tried to calm the "distracted mothers and fathers" by saying: "I know your grief is such that you may not realize what you are saying."

He reminded the parents "an inquiry will be held at a later date when you will be able to voice your grievances."

"One father," his face twisted in sorrow, replied: "We had an inquiry on Friday night when we stood and saw our children murdered."

The collision occurred early Sunday in a well-marked navigational area during a calm and generally clear night. The 78-ton Philippine vessel sank immediately. The 7,000-ton seagoing freighter Golden State received only a six-foot rip in her side.

The collision was the second tragedy this year for the Philippine Pioneer Line. Pioneer Line's sister ship, Pioneer Celest, sank in a typhoon four months ago and 132 lives were lost.

Sheppard's Lawyer Hints He May Not Take Witness Stand During Retrial

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — Samuel H. Sheppard's lawyer hinted today that the former manufacturer truck equipment may not take the witness stand at his murder retrial, even after any evidence.

Sheppard, 42, is being retried by a U.S. Supreme Court mandate after serving nine years in prison for the 1964 slaying of his wife, Marilyn.

When the first prospective juror was summoned at the opening of the trial today, defense attorney F. Lee Bailey asked:

"If the defendant did not testify, would you feel that he had something to hide?"

"If at the end of the nation's case, the defense says nothing, it presents nothing, would it indicate to you that he had something to hide?"

The prospect heard a reading order.

President Says Boost Unity Will Boost Peace Cause

MANILA (AP) — The U.S. commander in Viet Nam told the Manila summit conference today the war is "far from over" and he will need more troops in the days ahead, but President Johnson said a display of unity by the allies here should provide new fuel for the cause of peace. "Let the bullies of the world know that when they do attack their neighbors, the friends of their neighbors will be there to resist," the President said in this first day of meetings among the leaders of nations fighting Communists in Viet Nam.

Johnson was the last speaker of the day. His remarks came after Gen. William C. Westmoreland, the U.S. commander, reported to the leaders that allied forces are increasingly effective in battling the Communists.

Westmoreland said troop morale was high.

"The troops are the finest ever fielded; they understand the conflict and appreciate their complex role as both fighters and builders."

The session in which Westmoreland and the President spoke was closed to the public, but their remarks were given to newsmen later by U.S. spokesmen.

Johnson summed up what he portrayed as the four main principles which had stood out in the talks of those leaders who spoke before him. He listed them as:

"The determination of all that aggression must fail,"

"The commitment to the job of pacification,"

"Our commitment to and our awareness of regional cooperation,"

"The hope for reconciliation and a peaceful settlement."

Before Johnson spoke, Westmoreland was asked by one of the conferees if he would need more troops in Viet Nam. He replied that he would. But a top military official said that this need is due, at least in part, to plans to put increasing emphasis on clearing and holding government-held areas.

Johnson called this "other war" to improve the living conditions of the South Vietnamese people and to give loyalty to the Saigon government is said to be a step in what President Johnson calls this "other war."

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Prisoner Agreement To Be Sought

MANILA (AP) — The United States is asking the Manila summit conference to make a bid for some agreement to swap prisoners with Communist Viet Nam, it was learned today.

The United States wants to include such a bid in the meeting's final statement, it is being asked by the Manila Officials in Washington believe.

North Viet Nam is holding more than 100 Americans.

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The International Red Cross has been asked to get involved in the talks.

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Protesting Students Dispersed by Police

MANILA (AP) — Police fired shots into the air tonight in the vicinity of the hotel where President Johnson is staying, to break up about 2,000 students demonstrating against U.S. policies on Viet Nam. Swinging truncheons and jabbing with rifle butts, police charged into the demonstrators shortly after they had moved up to the main entrance of the Manila Hotel. Johnson had returned to his suite there two hours earlier from the first session of the summit conference on Viet Nam.

The clash outside the entrance lasted only a few minutes, but the demonstration was continued a short distance away after the students were driven off. It was then that police fired about six shots into the air to "scatter" them.

The noise of the demonstration could easily be heard inside the hotel lobby and the floors above. The students were driven off. It was then that police fired about six shots into the air to "scatter" them.

A handful of students were knocked down by police and an American television cameraman, Tom Remondy of CBS, was bloodied by students who clubbed him with a bamboo pole.

The students had hoped to rally 5,000 demonstrators for the protest against Johnson's Viet Nam policies but police estimated that at most 2,000 were involved.

After the battle small groups of angry students remained in the area and the threat of further outbreaks remained. A crowd of constabulary troops in battle gear "ringed" the Manila Hotel. One group of students gathered in the nearby park where leaders harangued them.

Police in black riot cars carted off 20 students and military field ambulances carried off 12 more.

Texas Ready To Join War On Poverty

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—President Johnson's home state seems finally about to join his war on poverty. The skirmishing is over, the main battle about to begin.

Texas has more families earning less than \$3,000 a year than any other state in the Union. The Texas total is 688,000. New York has 600,000 and California 563,000. Both New York and California have more residents than Texas.

What has Texas done about this Texas-size distinction it would just as soon not have? Relatively little so far, according to the two generals leading the anti-poverty army.

"One of the generals is Bill Creek, 40, the U. S. Office of Opportunity's director for Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana. His bright blue eyes blaze when he talks about those who oppose his army.

"We've had a few brushes, a few skirmishes, but haven't confronted the enemy yet," Creek said.

"Like some manufacturing processes, you see some by-products of the poverty war before you even begin to see the end product," he added.

"We have towns and cities where people are talking about it now," Creek said. "If this can be encouraged and not stifled—as some would like to stifle it—we are well on our way."

Who wants to stifle it? "Those who have a vested interest in poverty," he said. "Loan sharks and landlords and merchants in slum areas."

"The real question is, are we willing to see the poor with power?" Creek said. "They're beginning to say things and demand things. We shouldn't expect them to be grateful to us. We'll be lucky if they forgive us."

Cincinnati Women Prepare for Assailant

CINCINNATI (AP)—There is a killer loose in the streets and his shadow falls menacingly upon this lovely city of the bank of the winding Ohio River. Within the last two weeks, the killer has claimed his fourth and fifth victims. All were women over 50. Each was strangled and raped.

Cincinnati has made runs on hardware stores and sporting goods stores for strong door chains, teargas weapons, hand guns, pepper guns and, in some cases, knives.

Thousands of whistles to be used for summoning help are in the hands of women. Every available large dog in Cincinnati area kennels had been bought or adopted by the weekend.

The mounting fear in the city became widely contagious when Cincinnati's last Oct. 12 of the rape-slaying of Alice Hochhauser, a mother of nine. She had been strangled with the ash of her red bathrobe. Then, to night of Oct. 20, the body of Miss Rose Winstel, 81, was discovered in her home. She also had been strangled and raped.

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Many Cincinnatians have shut themselves behind doors and look with suspicion upon every motorist passing in the street.

A woman living in an 11-room home in fashionable Hyde Park has placed baseball bats near doors and windows throughout her home.

"I would use a bat to defend myself if necessary," she says. "And my children, 17 and 15, have been instructed how to defend themselves."

A widow who lives with a housekeeper in the well-to-do Amberley-Village section has taken her husband's .410 gauge shotgun from the wall.

"It is fully loaded," she says, "and I have it near the entrance

of my home. I also sleep with a .45 automatic Colt pistol next to my pillow and I would not be afraid to use it."

The theory that the rape-strangulations are the work of one man and that he is a Negro is based on evidence police say they have gathered. They believe the killer is the same man who raped and choked a gray-haired woman in the basement of her apartment building on Oct. 12, 1965, a year before the slaying of Mrs. Hochhauser.

The woman recovered and said her attacker was a Negro.

"Half of a Negro-type has been found and there are other elements which lead us to believe one man is responsible," says Col. Henry Sandman, Cincinnati safety director.

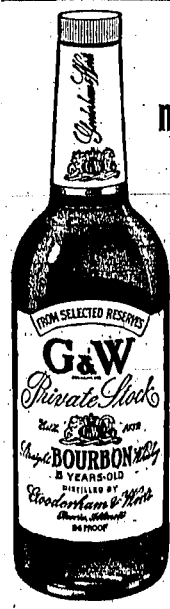

21 Persons Charged in Disturbances

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Twenty-one persons were charged in courts today for disturbances during President Johnson's visit to Melbourne and Sydney Friday and Saturday.

One of them, John Morgan, 21, was fined \$10 after he admitted throwing an egg that hit a press bus in the motorcade. He also was sentenced to four months in jail for vagrancy.

The 21 charged today were mostly young people. The charges were minor, ranging from offensive behavior, drunk and disorderly conduct to using obscene language.

Some pleaded innocent. Others pleaded guilty and were fined.

Moscow and Peking Attack One Another

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union accused Red China today of practicing "an abominable, racist-style communism," and Peking described the Soviet leadership as "a gang of renegades."

An article in the Soviet Communist party paper Pravda attacked Chinese Communist Chairman Mao Tse-tung's "cultural revolution."

It asserted real communism has nothing to do with the type of activities undertaken in China's purge, which it described as "the destruction of monuments of ancient civilization, the destruction of masterpieces of world culture, the manhandling of workers and progressive intellectuals, the defamation of Communist party organizations, the implantation of the Mao Tse-tung personality cult."

The Chinese attack against the Soviet Union was contained in an article in the Peking People's Daily which criticized the U.S.S.R. for expelling Chinese students.

Moscow ordered the ouster of the Chinese students Oct. 7, claiming it was in retaliation for the expulsion of Soviet students from China in September.

Chinese Red Guards demonstrated Sunday night outside the Soviet Embassy in Peking, the Soviet news agency Tass reported.

GRAVES DECORATED VIENNA (AP) — Reports reaching Vienna from Budapest said many graves were adorned with red roses in Budapest cemeteries Sunday, a month after a number of burial places of Hungarians who died in the revolution 10 years ago.

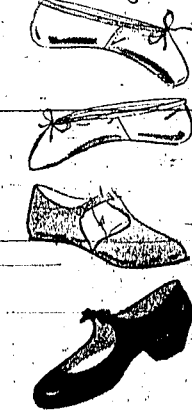

'Great Society' Congress Has Huge Impact

WASHINGTON (AP) — The 1966 session of the "Great Society" Congress will have profound impact on all Americans, who are with the Marines in Viet Nam; Joe, 20, a kind of alienated lad who has failed to get with it (he got a bad conduct discharge from the Army and doesn't work); Nancy, 19, who attends state university, is so-called "conformist" greatly interested in the wide world and what her father fondly calls a "do-gooder"; and, last but not least, Poohie, a pebble.

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Potential of Cities Plan Is Viewed

PITTSBURGH, Pa. (AP) — Robert C. Weaver, secretary of housing and urban development, said today the new demonstration cities program has world-wide potential, even in such a world city as Seattle.

In a talk prepared for a United Nations seminar on urban problems, Weaver said the program would be made available only to American cities but to cities across the world.

"I can think of no better place where a total approach of this kind could apply than in Seattle," Weaver told planning, housing and public works officials from 28 nations that the urban crisis is a world problem and solutions common to U.S. slums and blighted neighborhoods could well be applied in foreign cities.

Along with improved housing would come programs for improved social services. Emphasis would be placed on education, recreation, health and welfare projects.

Khrushchev Dislikes Folk Painting

MOSCOW (AP) — Nikita Khrushchev stood before painting by Soviet artist Robert Falk in 1962 and declared, "I would say that is just a mess."

Falk's paintings are back on exhibit in Moscow for the first time since then, perhaps indicating a slight loosening of controls on Soviet art.

An exhibit of about 100 paintings and drawings by the artist opened Saturday in four rooms of the Moscow Center of the Union of Artists. It is being well attended, especially by young people.

The exhibit is the second officially sponsored display in recent months of works by prominent Soviet artists. Paintings by Alexander Tyshler, 67, were exhibited at the Pushkin Museum here in March.

Khrushchev paid a surprise visit to an exhibit in December 1962. His outburst against the modern art he saw there shook waves through Soviet cultural circles for the next two years.

Falk died in 1955 at the age of 68. He had been subjected to severe criticism in his home country before the Communists took power in 1917 and was expelled from a Moscow college in 1909 for "leftism" — showing a marked devotion to Cezanne and others of the French Impressionist school.

Cash Shortage For Housing To Continue To Continue
