Four Aides Quit West Germany's Unstable Cabinet

BERLIN, Germany (AP) — Four cabinet ministers quit Chancellor Ludwig Erhard's shaky West German Cabinet today in a budget row and Erhard decided to run the country with a minority government. This has never been tried before in the 17-year history of the Federal Republic. Erhard's Christian Democratic party has only 245 of the 498 seats in the Bundestag, but he can be overthrown only if the opposition — Socialists and others — gets together and elects a new man. This has never been done here either.

5 Members of Idaho Family Die in Blaze

VICTOR, Idaho (AP) — All five members of an eastern Idaho family died last night in a fire that swept through their one-story frame home. The County Sheriff Gordon Jones identified the dead as Mr. and Mrs. Howard Rikers, their 14-year-old daughter, and their two preschool age children. The Rikers family lived about one mile north of Victor, a small farming community near the Idaho-Pocatello border. The fire department in the area. Rescuers said by the time they reached the home heat was too intense for them to get into the burning structure. An attempt to recover the bodies was made this morning.

Silver City Mine Blast Kills One Man

SILVER CITY, Idaho (AP) — A dynamite explosion deep in a mine near this historic South Idaho mining city, has killed one man and injured another. Killed in the explosion at Flint Hill Wednesday night was Robert E. Owen, 24, of Idaho Falls. Injured was Frank N. Inama, 35, who lived at the mine site. Owen's body was brought out of the mine early today. Deputy Sheriff C. J. Jurles said the two were hit by flying rock apparently when dynamite detonated prematurely 300 feet into a mine tunnel.

Chrysler Reports Low Earnings

NEW YORK (AP) — Chrysler Corp., the nation's third-largest auto maker, reported lower earnings today for the past three months. The company said it declared its regular 50-cent-a-share quarterly dividend. Chrysler said third-quarter earnings totaled \$68.5 million on 14 cents a share compared with \$18 million or 40 cents a share in the same period last year. For the nine months ending September 30, Chrysler reported \$212.4 million of earnings compared with \$194.1 million of \$24 in the same nine months of 1965.

New Communications Satellite Assigned to Switchboard Post

WASHINGTON (AP) — The newly launched communications satellite got a definite assignment today to a switchboard post over the Pacific. The Communications Satellite Corp. announced that the new spacecraft was in the precise type of orbit required. A three-stage Delta rocket sent it aloft and into orbit Wednesday night from Cape Kennedy, Fla. Newsman promptly nicknamed it "Lamb Bird," the Hawaiian name for bird of heaven. It will be moved gradually to its permanent assignment 22,000 miles above the Gilbert Islands in the South Pacific, where it will provide the first commercial space-communications link between North America and the Far East.

The presidential nominee will hold news conferences at the airport upon his arrival and at 7 p.m. in the Hotel Boise. Nixon's speech will be at 8 p.m. in the Boise Coliseum. He will be officially welcomed by Gov. Robert E. Smylie and introduced by Sen. Len B. Jordan.

Nomination Suit Thrown Out of Court

BOISE (AP) — Judge Merritt S. Young threw out of court today a lawsuit challenging the nomination of Cecil D. Andrus as the Democratic nominee for governor. Young ruled in Third District Court that the courts "may not get involved in political disputes." The parties argued that to do so would "be an invasion of other branches of government."

Boise Women Set Approach To Cut Prices

BOISE (AP) — Boise housewives organized a campaign Wednesday night against high food prices, and set up a canvassing system to recruit new members. Approximately 25 women formed the Boise group for Lower Food Prices. "We will not boycott supermarkets," said Mrs. Jerry Jones. "Neither will we picket. But we will have certain items at a profit of the high prices." Mrs. Jones and Mrs. Harlan Smith formed the Boise group. Among the first items to be banned from member households purchases is commercial baby food. The national group has banned the bread, a series of brand-baking practices and demonstrations are among the Boise group's first planned activities.

"The peaceful solution" proposed by the United States at the Manila conference, said Nhan Dan, organ of the North Vietnamese-Communist party, "is still more cynical and insistent than the conditions which the United States had earlier put to the Vietnamese people and which had been categorically rejected by the latter."



Hirschi Says Idaho Must Keep Pace

MOUNTAIN HOME — "More and more educational opportunities are being offered than ever in the past and Idaho must keep pace in order to stay in step," State Rep. Frank W. Hirschi, Republican candidate for state superintendent of public instruction said in Mountain Home Wednesday.

Hirschi referred to the numerous opportunities available by means of federal grants and other financial aid. "Idaho," he said, "should investigate all of these programs carefully and choose those which will be beneficial."

"However," he continued, "great care must be taken to see that programs financed with other than state funds remain under local control. In any educational program the federal government should be the junior partner. The state should have the final say and control."

Hirschi said he believed many of the federally-financed programs were not feasible for Idaho at the present time and that these should not be attempted.

Government Consolidation Is Suggested

ST. ANTHONY — Consolidation of state government, as recommended by a Legislative Council interim subcommittee was suggested here Wednesday by State Sen. Don Samuelson, Republican candidate for governor.

Samuelson said, "The subcommittee's report calls for decreasing the number of state departments and agencies from more than 100 to 15. This is a suggestion which would provide efficiency and economy. The savings for taxpayers would be tremendous."

Samuelson said he believed steps should be taken to create a Department of Administrative Services, a central data processing center, a central purchasing department and a state motor pool. He also advocated the return of the Bureau of Public Accounts to the state auditor's office, as provided by the constitution, and the establishment of a central payroll division.

He said the next legislature should give every consideration to the consolidation proposals presented by the subcommittee.


Payroll Tax Rate May Increase for Social Security Benefits

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress may increase the Social Security payroll tax rate next year for a worker earning as much as \$7,600, and an equal amount for his employer. 



FUNDS DISTRIBUTED
BOISE (AP)—The Idaho Liquor Dispensary reported Tuesday distribution of \$1.2 million in profits to Idaho's counties, cities and junior college districts.

Supt. Fred Garillon said the distribution amounted to \$125,000 to cities and villages, \$57,900 to counties and junior college districts and \$100,000 to the permanent building fund.

BID ACCEPTED
BOISE (AP)—Ada County Commissioners accepted Wednesday a bid of \$400,500 for the site of the old Western Idaho State Fairgrounds in southwest Boise.

The bid was submitted by the Union-Pacific Railroad, which said it would develop the 43-acre site for industrial use.

The bid was received several weeks ago but by law county-owned property must be offered for sale at auction. The county engineer said there were no other bidders.

GARRETT HONORED
BOISE (AP)—The Idaho State Chamber of Commerce Wednesday announced the naming of Clarence C. Fredling as president of the distinguished citizens of Idaho award.

Garrett of Pocatello, is president of Fredling's highway and was a pioneer in the nation's trucking industry.

The award will be presented at the chamber's all-Idaho congress in Boise Nov. 14.

Harding Is Accused of Distortions

BOISE—State GOP Chairman John O. McMurray Wednesday accused Ralph Harding of "turbo-tactics in his utterly unbelievable attempt to twist the facts of high interest rates and the possibility of a tax increase."

Said McMurray: "Harding must know that it is his party and his administration which has caused high interest rates and which is proposing to tax people and to remove their unwillingness to curb inflation."

"After all, Harding was among the free spending young Democrats who helped bring this inflation upon us. Is it possible he doesn't know what he was doing?"

Soviets Tell Chinese to End Protests

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union protested to China today about demonstrations outside the Soviet Embassy in Peking and demanded that they be stopped.

A note given to the Chinese Embassy said the demonstrations were "another deliberate step by the Chinese side aimed at the further aggravation of Soviet-Chinese state relations."

The Soviet note said the protest Aug. 27 against attacks and demonstrations by the young Red Guards outside the Peking Embassy.

The official Soviet news agency Tass said the note pointed out that the entrance to the Embassy in Peking has been blocked since last Sunday by demonstrations.

"Matters have reached a point at which some foreign diplomats could not proceed from the Soviet Embassy to their residences in cars with diplomatic numbers on Oct. 23 and had to go back to the embassy grounds from the blocked street," the note said.

Japanese correspondents in Peking reported to Tokyo today that Premier Chou En-lai has issued new directives to halt the massive influx of young Red Guards from the countryside into the capital, because they are creating congestion and overtaxing the city's facilities.

BOISE (AP)—Travel on Idaho highways in the first nine months of this year was 4 percent ahead of that a year earlier, Louise Shaddock, secretary of the State Department of Motor Vehicle Development, reported Thursday.

She said visitors to the Craters of the Moon National Monument during the 1965 season showed a 10 percent gain over the 1965 total. The number of campers visiting the monument increased 20 percent.

The board's Thursday session (Nov. 3) will be in Idaho Falls at the Holiday Inn and Friday at the State Tuberculosis Hospital at Gooding.

Both sessions will be open to the public.

A joint meeting will be held Thursday at the headquarters of the state hospital construction advisory council.

PROHIBIT TIRES
BOISE (AP)—Seventeen states still prohibit the use of metal-studded motor vehicle tires on public highways in Idaho, Idaho State Automobile Association reported Wednesday.

In the west, these states include California, Oregon, Nevada and Arizona. All other west states permit use of the metal-studded tires, either by statute or by administrative ruling.

IDEAS REVIEWED
BOISE (AP)—A legislative committee reviewed Thursday suggestions made at a series of hearings on reorganization of laws governing Idaho municipalities.

Rep. H. Ferd Koch, R-Ada, the chairman, said the committee hopes to come up with recommendations which will be presented to the full legislative council at its meeting next month and also by the 1967 legislative session.

The 1965 legislature instructed the committee to review all laws dealing with operation of cities and towns and to propose amendments to remove ambiguities and duplications and put the statutes in as workable a form as possible.

Soviets Tell Chinese to End Protests

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union protested to China today about demonstrations outside the Soviet Embassy in Peking and demanded that they be stopped.

A note given to the Chinese Embassy said the demonstrations were "another deliberate step by the Chinese side aimed at the further aggravation of Soviet-Chinese state relations."

The Soviet note said the protest Aug. 27 against attacks and demonstrations by the young Red Guards outside the Peking Embassy.

The official Soviet news agency Tass said the note pointed out that the entrance to the Embassy in Peking has been blocked since last Sunday by demonstrations.

"Matters have reached a point at which some foreign diplomats could not proceed from the Soviet Embassy to their residences in cars with diplomatic numbers on Oct. 23 and had to go back to the embassy grounds from the blocked street," the note said.

Japanese correspondents in Peking reported to Tokyo today that Premier Chou En-lai has issued new directives to halt the massive influx of young Red Guards from the countryside into the capital, because they are creating congestion and overtaxing the city's facilities.

Buhl—Lumir J. Svancara, former Buhl resident, died Sunday at Grand Junction, Colo.

He was born March 14, 1905, in Wilbur, Neb., and lived in Grand Junction for 10 years. He belonged to the Elks Lodge and ZCBJ Lodge. Mr. Svancara farmed in the Buhl area and once owned a farm equipment store. He also owned a garage in Winnemucca at one time.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Arnold Svancara; Victor Svancara and Edward Svancara, all Buhl; Robert Svancara, Pocatello; Ralph Svancara, Blackfoot; and Otto Svancara, Ft. Ord, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Alice Molander, West Lynn, Ore., and Rosella Roe, Merced, Calif.

CO-HIT "GREAT SIOUX MASSACRE"

Story of Huge Carrier Fire Is Revealed

By JAMES PICKERELL

ABOARD THE ORISKANY, South China Sea (delayed) (AP) — Until flames belched from the flight deck of this 42,000-ton carrier just after dawn Wednesday, we thought there was nothing to worry about.

Only a few wisps of smoke had appeared after a hollow explosion two decks below us. The men were moving with no great rush to man the fire hoses; their hair been smitten with flash fires before.

But the great belch of flame was a startling indication that this was worse, much worse, than anything else previously aboard the huge carrier. Within minutes we knew just how bad it was. A locker room containing 600 magnesium flares had somehow exploded as sailors were replacing some of them. The explosion blocked off the main exit from a labyrinth of corridors leading day in the high school gymnasium from "officers' country," the Navy term for officers' quarters.

There were mostly pilots sleeping in this forward part of the great carrier. Either the initial explosion was not loud enough to alert them to danger, or the flames belched upward and the immensity of the danger was realized, the general quarters alarm was rung, sending the crew to battle stations.

Men poured out onto the deck, some in shorts, others in pajamas.

Thirty-four tons of bombs, mainly 500 pounders, were stacked just 100 yards from where the fire "locker" was burning. Water was poured into the bomb stacks.

An officer explained: "The manual says that you have to wet down a bomb load within three minutes of the start of a fire, otherwise they will be endangered. The whole lot could blow up and take everyone with it. They managed to wet the

bombs down on time on the Oriskany. Sailors' biggest rolling came from two decks below. As the flames belched upwards and the immensity of the danger was realized, the general quarters alarm was rung, sending the crew to battle stations.

The flames in the locker apparently ignited themselves three times, and all burned eventually. Within 30 minutes crewmen in oxygen masks had fought their way into the cabins and were carrying out the dead.





Rev. Sheen Is Promoted To Bishop

NEW YORK (AP) — Pope Paul VI named the Most Rev. Fulton J. Sheen to be bishop of Rochester, N.Y., promoting a man with secular popularity such as few Roman Catholic prelates ever attain.

Bishop Sheen told a news conference Wednesday he will resign as national director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, but will continue the television programs and two syndicated newspaper columns that have made him a national figure.

At Rochester, he succeeds Bishop James E. Keenan, who asked to retire because of his age. Bishop Keenan will be 82 on Friday. Bishop Sheen is 71.

The Pope also announced Wednesday appointment of the Most Rev. Gerald Francis O'Keefe, auxiliary bishop of St. Paul, Minn., as Bishop of theavenport (Iowa). O'Keefe, Bishop O'Keefe succeeds Bishop Ralph Leo Hayes, 80, who also is retiring because of his age.

He will also be named in the footsteps of Bishop Kearney. Bishop Sheen told news men at the residence of Francis Cardinal Spellman that he has done there makes it very easy for me to go.

"I shall miss you very, very much," said Cardinal Spellman. Bishop Sheen has been an auxiliary to Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York.

Bishop Sheen said his new duties will afford an opportunity "to be closer to the people."

"I shall be their servant," he said.

Emergency Shot Given to Postal Unit

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Post Office Department, trying to clear its mail-clogged arteries before the massive Christmas rush, has given its system an emergency injection of \$30 million.

The money is to pay an estimated 150,000 temporary Christmas workers the post office is hiring a month early this year.

The funds are borrowed from the department's budget for next spring, and the department will have to ask the next Congress in January for another appropriation.

The department wants to avoid another mail strike of the type that practically paralyzed the Chicago Post Office for two weeks earlier this month.

Last week, Postmaster Gen. Lawrence F. O'Brien said the department intends to put to work by Nov. 1 as many as possible of 150,000 temporary Christmas employees. Usually, they aren't on the job until sometime in December.

The postmaster general announced the additional borrowing Wednesday.

O'Brien noted that third class mail volume has increased nationally during the last accounting period by 10.4 per cent over the same period last year. In some larger offices, he said, volume increases range up to 20 per cent.

For the first time since the great mass of coal mine waste crashed the village school and 17 homes last Friday killing at

least 145 persons, all work stopped on the disaster site where up to 50 bodies are still missing.

The town was cordoned for the funeral and all traffic stopped.

Funerals of other victims are being held privately.

Queen Elizabeth II is to visit Aberfan Saturday and meet survivors in a hospital at Pontypridd.

A disaster relief fund now exceeds \$200,000 with donations from the queen and other members of the royal family heading the list.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House of Representatives today announced that President Johnson plans a western campaign swing the weekend before the election.

As usual in this campaign, there was no immediate presidential staff confirmation of the reports. The president is expected to be in California around Nov. 5-6, California visit.

The president is still in Asia and has not yet returned from his trip until next Wednesday night.

Wednesday, the political winds of a campaign overshadowed right now by the Johnson trip were stirred by Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey's declaration that Americans should shift the full amount of war spending to domestic programs.

The Democratic presidential nominee Barry Goldwater's claim that what he called lies from Washington will swing the election to the Republicans was another thing else.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., who gave a number of his indirect

boosts to Michigan Gov. George Romney for the 1966 GOP presidential nomination.

Strongest reports of a Johnson western tour came from an aide to California Gov. Edmund G. Brown, who said, "We can't confirm it officially, but President Johnson is expected to visit California before the election."

Brown is running slightly behind, according to pollsters, in his bid for a third term against Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley.

The California sources said Johnson probably would fly to Los Angeles after the election, then to San Francisco, San Diego, and other western states before returning to Los Angeles at the end of the week.

There were reports the stops could include Nevada, Oregon, Montana, Wyoming and Idaho.

Chicago Mayor Richard Daley said he expected the president to appear Nov. 4 for a report on his Pacific-Asia tour.

Report of virtually all Johnson campaign visits this year to the West came first from local sources.

Financing of Campaigns May Alter Election Law Reforms

WASHINGTON (AP) — Approval by Congress of financing presidential election campaigns with tax funds has left conflicting views on whether this will spur or hinder election law reforms.

Some think it will provide an impetus to overhauling the corrupt practices Act. Others regard it as more likely that Congress will wait to see how the new law works before attempting further changes.

One of the last acts of Congress before it adjourned was to approve a plan under which each taxpayer, if he wishes, may earmark for a presidential campaign fund \$1 each year of the federal income taxes he pays.

The amount paid out by the Treasury would be determined by the number of votes cast in the presidential election. For the 1968 campaign this could mean \$30 million each for the Democratic and Republican parties.

Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., chief sponsor of the plan, said a batch of amendments tacked on a foreign-investor tax measure called it "a clean election bill."

This was sharply disputed by Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn. He said it "merely pours more millions of dollars into the political pot" without any tightening of the corrupt practices Act and expenditures.

Farm, Factory Areas Outside Chicago Important to Vote

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — The Democratic Party is downing its farm and factory areas outside Chicago — bulks large in Illinois' contest for a seat in the U.S. Senate.

Ballooning in that area has made the difference between defeat and victory in the most recent elections of the two major contenders.

Industrialist Charles H. Percy, the Republican nominee, counted 44,000 votes in 1964 when he lost his bid for the governorship by 179,000 votes to Democrat Otto Kerner.

Democrat Paul H. Douglas, bidding for a fourth term, held his GOP challenger, Samuel W. Taylor, a Democrat, to a close race in 1960, and built a big margin in Democratic Chicago by winning 437,097 votes.

In 1964, Percy got caught in a Democratic sweep. Douglas, in breezing to his third term, competed against a man who was not well known outside the Chicago area.

This time the senator takes on one of the best known men in Illinois.

Kerner, 47, has been re-elected even or ahead of Douglas, 74, and politicians of both parties profess to see favorable signs in the Democratic sweep.

When Douglas has done in 18 years in the Senate, particularly in social reforms, and can do, against a man who became president of the Bell & Howell Co. (camera manufacturer) at age 29.

Both candidates ceased campaigning for two and a half weeks after Percy's 21-year-old daughter, Victoria, was shot and killed by a sniper's bullet on Oct. 18.

Rhodesian Rebellion Settlement Must Show Gradual, but Certain Progress

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Harold Wilson said today Britain's honor demands that any settlement of the Rhodesian rebellion must provide "gradual but certain progress" toward African majority rule.

The British leader warned that no British government or Parliament will accept any attempt by Rhodesian Prime Minister Ian Smith to retain the right to veto the advancement of Africans toward power.

Wilson's statement, to The Associated Press in an interview, came as the British government awaited the Smith regime's formal reply to what has been portrayed as this country's "final terms" for a settlement.

The Commonwealth prime ministers' conference, held in London last month set out the basis on which we intended to proceed," Wilson said, "and it

also set out the dire consequences which would follow if that agreement could not be reached.

These consequences include a British call to the U.N. Security Council for imposition of certain compulsory sanctions on Rhodesia.

Initial signals from Salisbury suggest the Smith regime is highly unlikely to accept Wilson's outlined settlement, which envisages an African takeover of power no earlier than the 1970s. But there seems to be a possibility Smith may attempt to stage something of a ruse (see in order to stage a decisive confrontation for a while.

Wilson had been asked in the interview:

"Are you and Mr. Ian Smith of Rhodesia, as some countries suggested in the United Nations last week, doing a deal that would abandon the principles of settlement defined by successive British governments?"

"Facing such a white man's deal, African and Asian countries won overwhelming support in the world body for a resolution insisting that final power in Rhodesia be transferred to the 2.5 million Africans, not to the 225,000 whites.

"Wilson replied:

"The answer is no. A flat and decisive no.

"Our predecessors, the conservatives, insisted that independence in Rhodesia could only be granted by Britain—and there is no legal independence for Rhodesia which is not granted by Britain—on the basis of guaranteed and unimpeded progress, mainly as is provided by the 1961 constitution of their country and only on a basis that is clearly shown to be acceptable to the people of Rhodesia as a whole.

Controlled Burn of Diseased Saplings Set

FAIRFIELD—Plans have been made by personnel of the Fairfield Ranger district of the Sawtooth National Forest, for the controlled burning of about 70 acres of slash and diseased saplings in the Soldier creek drainage located about 14 miles north of Fairfield.

After completion of the Soldier creek project, burning of logging slash will begin in the Salt Creek and Little Smokey areas. When burning is completed these areas will be replanted with Douglas fir seedlings next spring.

Purpose of the burn is to rid the previously logged area of hazardous slash, kill the remaining diseased trees and prepare the area for the planting of Douglas fir seedlings. Dwarf mistletoe in remaining saplings now prevent any new establishment of seedlings which can develop into merchantable timber. Smoke from the three projects will be visible from the Fairfield area.

LOGAN, Utah (AP)—A campus physician reported Wednesday that 25 more Utah State University students have been treated for an unexplained illness which afflicted nearly 300 students earlier this week.

Dr. Willis Hayward, director of the school's Student Health Service, said he and some Logan doctors treated the new cases early Wednesday.

Laboratories at the Logan hospital and State Health Department in Salt Lake City were incubating bacteria cultures on food served at the university before Monday, when the outbreak of stomach-maladies began.

Smylic Hits Food Ration Book Rumor

BOISE (AP)—Gov. Robert F. Smylic today said he is "absolutely not" convinced that food ration books have been printed and will be distributed in Idaho after the November election.

"Just the quarter from where these reports come is proof enough that they are part of a political campaign," Smylic said. "There is absolutely no truth to the reports, and I think common decency should cause a halt to them."

Gary Ingram of Coeur d'Alene, Republican Kootenai County committee chairman, claimed President Johnson would attempt to start food rationing and wage-price controls after the November election.

Charles Rountree, Idaho Director of Civil Defense, said printing mats for ration books is part of emergency preparation. He said books may not be printed unless the state and governor declare an emergency.

The federal Office of Emergency Planning (OPEP) has said no rationing is likely to result from the Viet Nam conflict.

Supper Club Fire Damages Are Steep

OREM, Utah (AP)—Fire completely destroyed an Orem supper club today, causing damage estimated by a former owner at between \$100,000 and \$200,000.

The damage was made by Richard Parks, of Orem, who sold the Driftwood Supper Club to Don Gurney of London about a year and one-half ago.

Firemen were called to the fire just after 3 a.m. Blowing smoke from the flames set a pall of smoke over the community and Orem's police dispatcher said it was probably the largest fire in the city's recent history.

The building's roof caved in and only portions of the walls were left standing. The rains were all smoldering four hours after the fire was reported.

Two shifts of the Orem City Fire Department and all Orem firemen responded to help fight the blaze. Heat kept them at a distance for some time, however.

In addition, a unit from the Provo City Fire Department was called to aid in fighting the fire. Fire County Fire Warden Hazel Stanley also assisted.

Plant Cycle Produced Outside Cells

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—Two University of California chemists have succeeded for the first time in producing a high rate of photosynthesis outside the cells of green plants.

Photosynthesis, the chemical cycle in which plants use the energy of sunlight to turn carbon dioxide—released by animals and carbohydrates, is the key to life on earth.

The chemists, Dr. James A. Bassham and Dr. R.G. Jensen, a fellow of the National Cancer Institute announced Wednesday the success of their experiments with material derived from spinach.

They speculated that the experiments one day may lead to development of large-scale methods of increasing the world's food supplies.

They suggested that such methods might be used in the future to enrich the protein and fat content of vegetable crops and convert now useless jungle plants into high-quality animal fodder.

The process of photosynthesis was first duplicated in the laboratory by Prof. Daniel I. Arnow of Berkeley a decade ago. However, the process was slow and primitive.

Bassham and Jensen said, in a report to the National Academy of Sciences, that their test tube process of photosynthesis proceeds at about 65 per cent of the speed of nature.

Utahans Organize for Lower Food Prices

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Housewives in the Salt Lake City and Ogden areas are not asking for help anymore — instead they're organizing it.

The name of their organization is HELP — Housewives Expect Lower Prices. HELP is a local unit of the national organization Housewives Voice for Lower Food Prices.

Heading the local units are Mrs. Clair Redding of Holladay and Mrs. Calvin Speas of Ogden.

Mrs. Redding says she began to circulate petitions to housewives in the Salt Lake City area Wednesday and by evening had more than 300 signatures with promises of many more to come.

"My phone's been ringing off the walls," said Mrs. Redding. "Everyone wants to help and everyone has the same complaint. Food costs too much and we want to find out why."

"We need our prices down. All of the Utah housewives seem to be enthusiastic, ambitious and ambitious," Mrs. Speas says she will begin circulating petitions this weekend in the Ogden area and already women have volunteered to stand in front of grocery stores with petitions for housewives to sign.

Mrs. Redding says they're after manufacturers and "if we don't find satisfactory answers with them then the answer might be Washington."

And the top official of a large western grocers' cooperative says that Washington is to blame.

"Donald P. Lloyd, president of Associated Food Stores, Inc., said Wednesday that the 'real culprit' in increasing food prices is the federal government."

And he says that "marching for Congress in Utah's Second District, and last week he energies against the grocer in a protest against high food prices in the supermarkets."

Lloyd, in a talk to a Granger civic group, said blaming the grocer for high food prices is "like blaming the weatherman for bad weather."

Campbell Soup Company President Takes Issue in Food Prices Protests

NEW YORK (AP) — "The housewife is wrong in the present," Campbell Soup Co. president W. B. Murphy said today.

The president, W. B. Murphy, took issue with housewives who are boycotting supermarkets to protest rising prices.

The presidents of the National Association of Food Chains, and Libby, McNeil & Libby, a food packer, also took issue with the housewives.

"The food store is a handy goat for the housewife," he said. "The guilty party is the rising economy, with its rising cost pressures."

George A. Gray, president of the supermarket owners' association, blamed inflation and food shortages for the increased prices.

Housewives outraged by rising food prices should be taking out their anger on the Johnson administration, not boycotting food stores, Robert Gibson Jr., president of Libby, said.

Gibson said the federal government's curtailment of the use of farm laborers from Mexico had raised costs.

Farmers who couldn't get labor to harvest their lettuce turned to machines. They didn't plant as much lettuce, switching to other crops easier to harvest with machines.

This summer, lettuce jumped to 39 cents a head.

Wages also have added to costs.

There are other factors, too, he said, such as a freeze in Idaho.

The price of potatoes increased this week after bad weather in Idaho.

The price of bread went up this summer after millers raised the price of flour, blaming higher wheat prices. Wheat prices went up following a smaller-than-usual wheat crop and greater export demand.

Supply and demand also have been big factors in prices this year.

Pork went up about 30 percent between October, 1964, and March, 1966, as farmers cut production because of low hog prices earlier.

Last March, retail meat prices were the highest in history. Then more pork moved to market, along with more beef, more chickens and more turkeys.

This week, a major supermarket chain in the New York area is selling pork chops for 75 cents a pound — down 39 cents.

Prices are likely to be lower through Thanksgiving, and then turn up a bit in December, reflecting the holiday demand for hams.

Wholesale butter prices have dropped more than 8 cents this month as supplies increased slightly and consumer resistance to high prices was felt.

Grapefruit prices fell this week as increased shipments from Florida reached the market.

Incurable Disease Kills 4 in Family

STERLING, N.D. (AP) — Mr. and Mrs. William Patterson were trying to return their household to normal today after an incurable disease claimed four victims in their family.

"Norimi" in the Pattersons' newest farm home has meant living with the threat of cyclic fibrosis for most of the last 17 years.

Funeral services were held Wednesday for the Pattersons' 9-year-old daughter, Betty Ann, a pretty little blonde who fought the disease all her life. She died Saturday.

Her brother Richard, 12, also suffers from the disease. He and Betty Ann used to take twice-weekly oxygen inhalation treatments together. The disease has caused frequent pneumonia that has damaged his heart.

The congenital disease involves production of abnormally thick mucus that clogs the lungs and pancreas, causing infection.

Seven of the Pattersons' children have been affected by cyclic fibrosis. Virginia died at age 7, July at age 4 and Donna May — 17 years ago — at age 2.

William, now 16, and La Roy, 15, have shown some signs of the disease, but are not believed in danger. Wilma, Donald and Davis, 22, and Janice, 10, have not been affected.

Debt Settled

U.S. Aid to Africa May Be Rechanneled

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. aid to Africa is to be channeled more through world and regional organizations and sent directly to individual countries, say government officials. The State Department acknowledged Wednesday after months of alliance that President Johnson has approved a new aid policy for Africa which also aims at increasing the number of trained Africans and developing effective communication systems for the continent. No increase is foreseen in the current \$500-million annual rate of aid. The policy is based on a report prepared last summer by the U.S. ambassador to Ethiopia, Edward M. Korry.

Land Claimers Leave Region Peacefully

ABIQUU, N.M. (AP) — A band of Spanish-speaking men defied federal authorities regarding ownership of 500,000 acres of forest in northern New Mexico. They have left the area peacefully. The Federal Alliance of Land Grants abandoned the Carson National Forest campaign without incident Wednesday after U.S. Dist. Court Judge H. Veale Payne in Albuquerque granted a temporary restraining order to prevent possible violence. Members of the alliance took over the campground Saturday. The alliance is re-established the town of Pueblo Republica de San Joaquin del Rio de Chamu in the forest area near Abiquu. The alliance's membership included the rightful heirs under the 1806 Spanish land grant which established the town originally.

Cancer Cure May Be Made Long-Lasting

By ALTON BLAKESLEE AP Science Writer TOKYO (AP) — A woman was in a coma that spread its seeds to her brain. Ten days later she walked out of the hospital. The cause of her recovery: radioactive atoms that struck like guided missiles to strike at her widespread cancer. The benefits lasted two months. A second treatment brought a similar period of temporary good health until she died.


Several patients have won such reprieves from far-advanced cancers for up to a year, and there are hopes this new weapon can be made far more effective and longer-lasting. Dr. Irving L. Spar of the University of Rochester, N.Y., told the Ninth International Cancer Congress today. The treatment is based on a finding that fibrinogen — a blood element that helps form blood clots — concentrates around cancerous growths. The reason may be that a cancer sets up an inflammatory reaction, or because of some reaction between the cancer and the host, Dr. Spar said. Antibodies, or fighters, against fibrinogen are prepared by injecting human fibrinogen into rabbits and then atoms of radioactive iodine-131 are attached to the fibrinogen antibodies. Normal fibrinogen carries the injected antibodies and their anticancer radioactive rays to the sites of cancer in the human body. Reporting for a team of researchers, Spar said tests on 16 patients showed that the radioactive material will go more than half the time to the cancer spots. In most types of cancer, and locally there, it has localized every time in bone cancers.

German Measles Test Developed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Public Health Service has developed a simple test to determine whether ex-poliato mothers are immune to German measles. The disease is a serious danger to women in early pregnancy because it can lead to blindness, deafness, brain damage and mental retardation in the unborn baby. Dr. Harry M. Meyer Jr. of the National Institutes of Health told the American Academy of Pediatrics in Chicago today that the test is simple, speedy, sensitive and reliable.

Ex-Senator Dies at Age 86

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — Former U.S. Sen. H. Alexander Smith of New Jersey died today in Princeton Hospital at the age of 86. Smith, who retired from the Senate in 1959 after serving for 15 years, was admitted to the hospital on Oct. 8 after suffering a stroke at his Princeton home. Smith was a Republican senator from New Jersey from 1944 to 1959. He also served as chairman of the Republican State Committee.

Wounded GIs Can Talk With Families Via Ham Radio

NEW YORK (AP) — A retired Navy captain, manning a ham radio in the basement of his home in San Diego, Calif., is bringing together the voices of wounded U.S. fighting men on a hospital ship off Viet Nam with their families. "It's an unbelievable surprise for the mothers and fathers. They don't know in advance that it's coming and they just can't get over it sometimes," says A. Blair Jones. Jones, an Annapolis graduate who retired from the Navy in 1959 after 30 years, radios daily from his home in Westbury, N.Y., to the island suburb, to the U.S.S. Repose. By making a telephone call, he is able to link the men with their parents or girlfriends in the metropolitan area. Another ham operator, Brig. Gen. James Smith, U.S.M.C. Ret., does the same thing for West Coast families from his home near San Diego, Calif. On Tuesday, Jones hooked up Lt. Col. Leonard McGuire, 23, with his mother Dorothy McGuire in Lakewood, N.J.

Dignified 250 Acres of Trees Burned For Birds

MIJ, Mich. (AP) — About 250 acres of the Huron National Forest went up in smoke — all because of a little bird. The State Conservation Department and U.S. Forest Service burned the acreage near Mij Wednesday to provide a nesting ground for Kirtland's warbler. The warbler is a rare bird that migrates to the Bahama Islands from the forests in Ohio's County, where it summers and nests in low, new growth of jackpine. Two years ago only about 1,000 of the warblers summered here, but the total appears higher now that modern fire-control methods have allowed the burning of forests to provide nesting ground, conservation men said. They raised money for billboards and boarded government officials with letters until the idea of the stamp jelled.

Australia to Continue Aid in War Cause

CANBERRA, Australia (AP) — Australia will continue to give South Viet Nam military and nonmilitary aid as "wars" and as long as may be necessary. Prime Minister Harold Holt said today in reporting to the House of Representatives on the Manila conference. He said no efforts will be spared in the search for peace by South Viet Nam's allies, but that peace will have to be just and enduring.

"We are not engaged in Viet Nam because we want to roll back the frontiers of communism, but because we want to prevent the frontiers of communism from rolling down on Southeast Asia," he asserted.

LESSON TODAY, BID-AND-PLAY.

Today's column is of the scalloped type. It concerns both bidding and play. South felt that his hand was too strong for a stop below game after his

had nothing in diamonds and did have two top honors in hearts, so he returned to three hearts. This solved South's problem about which game to bid.

East won the spade lead with the ace. He noted that his partner's spade lead was surely a singleton. Most players would have immediately led a second spade and, given their partner a ruff but East saw no reason to be hasty.

It looked as if the spade ruff would leave his partner with no satisfactory card to return and that his only chance to beat West's hand, would be to find West with the ace of diamonds.

This might cost an over-trick but East wanted a plus score, not a loss of game and rubber. He led his queen of diamonds. West's ace took care of South's king. A diamond return put East back on the lead with the Jack and a spade ruff became the setting trick.
