Classes are scheduled to begin Nov. 15, stated Mr. Grigg, who recently received his MBA degree at the University of California, Berkeley.

Grigg said he will be a variety of real estate and investment subjects, and several classes in the Federal income-tax laws, the income-tax laws will be taught.

## Hoover Says U.S. Wears Yoke of Hate

**WASHINGTON** (AP) — FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said today the United States "wears a yoke of animosity...a yoke of mutual suspicion...a yoke of apathy and lawlessness."

In a message to the FBI's monthly Law Enforcement Bulletin, Hoover assailed demagogues who "are too often noisy, shouting, belligerent, and always citing some for what he called a 'criminalistic burden' that grows heavier from year to year."

"How is the cause of equal justice suffered?" he asked. "How is the cause of equal opportunity suffered? By noisy, riotous yelling street gags, denying the free exercise of constitutional rights of other citizens, and turning whole communities into martial law jungles of looting, firing and assault?" he asked.

"Can we seriously consider even for a moment, that this is the precious right of all Americans to assemble as a peaceable assembly to petition the government for a redress of grievances?"

Hoover said, also, that too many well-meaning "men and women" guided Americans not only support the doctrine of lawbreaking for a worthy end but also oppose penalties for violators."

In many instances, he said, the opinion was held "it's obscured and lost in a maze of procrastinating technicalities and legal jousting. Many times, truth, which often excuses guilt, seems to be obscured by the main search is for error or a technical loophole for the murderer or hoodlum."

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# Nothing Official Yet, But Alabama Will Be One Of Teams in Sugar Bowl

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Alabama will play in the 1967 Sugar Bowl. Of course, nothing official can be said for at least two weeks, but when the teams go on the field here Jan. 2 one of them will be the Crimson Tide. Officially the New Orleans Mid-Winter Sports Association has made no overtures to Alabama's Paul (Bear) Bryant, because a new National Collegiate Athletic Association rule prohibits bowl groups from discussing post-season appearances with a college until the third Monday in November.

The Sugar Bowl will formally open its doors to the public on Dec. 27. In Tuscaloosa Monday, Bryant was asked whether overruled about the official unofficial word.

"We won't even be worthy of being mentioned," he said. "I don't know what we did. Saturday we went to get to one," Bryant said. His "Crimson Tide" national collegiate champions in 1964 and 1965 defeated Mississippi State 27-14 in Tuscaloosa Saturday, while Alabama finished after six games this fall and ranked fourth nationally. "We have not been approached by the Sugar Bowl or by any bowl," Bryant said.

"One of them laughed, winked and replied: 'Now you know we can't say anything like that now,'" Bryant admitted eating lunch with the Sugar Bowl representatives but added: "I didn't see them after the game."

# Daugherty Calls For Elimination Of Bowl Games

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Duffy Daugherty, whose Michigan State football team is ineligible for the Rose Bowl this year, called Monday for elimination of postseason bowl games. Instead, Daugherty proposed an eight-team NCAA playoff involving six major football conferences and two ranking-independent teams. Daugherty said his plan has received favorable response from fellow coaches, but he added he has not pressed for adoption of the idea.

"The players," he said, "could be asked to play in a bowl game." The Big Ten, of which MSU is a member, the Big Eight, Southwestern, Southeastern, Pacific Coast and Atlantic Coast conferences, plus two at-large teams.

Woodrow Wilson, chairman of the Springfield (Mass.) College philosophy department, says he will challenge Vinson Massif, the highest peak in Antarctica, 17,000 feet of windswept, icy rock.

Sayre, 25, will be the first to climb the 14,000-foot peak. He has trained for short range attack missiles. He called it a major new development in strategic weapons.

**Commercial Contact Set Via Satellite**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Scientists will try again this month to establish commercial communications via satellite over the Pacific Ocean — but the Canadian satellite failed to accomplish.

Instead of settling into a hovering orbit above the mid-Pacific Gilbert Islands, the "Lani" bird-layed-in-a-pineapple-shaped ring ranging from 240 miles above the earth to about 23,000 miles.

Its communications system still works, but it is useful only for short periods when it drifts into the line of sight of earth stations.

A kick motor fired Sunday was supposed to boost the satellite into the proper orbit, but it didn't.


## Third Victim of Slayer Dies

WASHINGTON (AP) — The

Government has awarded a \$228-million development and production contract for an air-to-ground guided missile designed to carry nuclear warheads.

than \$1 billion. The \$228-million contract includes the purchase of a specified number of missiles

in January 1967. The SRAM missile is designed to be an all-weather, short range attack missile. It is a major new development in strategic weapons.
