Astronauts Fly To Cape Kennedy And Thank Crews

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Flashing broad grins, the Gemini 12 astronauts flew back to Cape Kennedy today and thanked the launch crews for the perfect blastoff that enabled them to end America's Gemini project with a record-sharing space flight. Navy Capt. James A. Lovell and Air Force Maj. Edwin E. (Buzz) Aldrin Jr. landed here in separate planes about 11 a.m. (EST) after a two-hour trip from the aircraft carrier Wasp, which plucked the astronauts from the western Atlantic Ocean Tuesday.

Their four-day orbital journey concluded the historic Gemini program and opened the gate to the Apollo man-to-the-moon project. As America's newest heroes bounded onto solid ground for the first time since their fiery rocket departure Tuesday, the astronauts were greeted by a large red, white and blue sign which listed all 10 manned Gemini flights and the Gemini program's success.

Two Trains Collide in Brazil, Killing 38 and Injuring 200

NILOPOLIS, Brazil (AP) — A train loaded with commuters bound for Rio de Janeiro collided head on with a passenger train before dawn today and police said 38 were killed dead and more than 200 injured. Police Inspector Joel Crespo said he counted 30 bodies at an improvised morgue near Olinda station 18 miles northwest of Rio. He said eight other passengers had died in hospitals after being removed from the twisted wreckage.

AP Leader Gives Talk on News Purpose

CORONADO, Calif. (AP) — Newspapers must take up the task of increasing man's understanding of man, William B. Eerdmans, president of the Associated Press Managing Editors Association, said today.

Dickinson, managing editor of the Philadelphia Bulletin, called on delegates to the 10th annual convention to redefine the meaning of news and to do a better job of serving the public that is transforming the world.

"We report the events and we do it especially well if they are important to the world, to the causes and the consequences of those events," Dickinson said.

"We must somehow take a broader view — see events and people in a larger sense, paint our words and pictures on a wider canvas," he said.

"This plan would include a reduction in the emphasis now devoted on coverage of sports news."

"How much sport news is there on a given day that is really important to the world? Can it not be compressed into a page or even less, leaving more room for news?"

"We must see how we can do it better," Dickinson said.

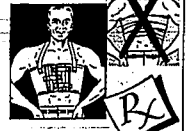

He Knows Talent
Don Samuelson, who will take over the
governor's office Jan. 2, didn't waste any
time demonstrating he can recognize
talent where he finds it. Soon after elec-
tion day, he disclosed he plans to re-
tain Lyndon Shadduck as secretary of the
State Department of Commerce and
Development. Mr. Shadduck has been
outstanding in her job of beefing up the
state's tourist business and making every
effort to attract more industry to
Idaho. Her success has been all the more
spectacular because the department has
operated from its inception with a very
limited budget. Some people involved in
the same general field have wondered
what the State Department of Commerce
and Development could have accomplished
with more adequate financing.
There are bound to be some new faces
in appointive offices around Boise as the
governor takes over. Everyone should
realize the official family was formed
from appointments made by Gov. Robert
E. Smylie during his long tenure. Some
of those who hold office at the pleasure
of the governor might not be pleasing
to the new chief executive. Mr. Samuelson's
announcement concerning Miss Shadduck
indicates there probably will be no wholesale
replacement of appointive officials just
for the sake of replacing them. Mr. Samuelson
outlined his attitude when he said the
future of present appointive officials
will depend on the attitude of the existing
people. A lot will depend on the way
they've done in the past and a lot will
depend on how they fit into my program."
The statement would indicate Mr. Samuelson
plans to be quite careful in lining
up his official family. Naturally, it is
impossible to shift their loyalty to another
governor, they will be replaced. In fact,
the appointees themselves wouldn't want
to remain under those circumstances. But
one would suspect there will be a minimum
of replacement. Mr. Samuelson would
like a general upheaval, at least not at this
stage.
Since the last time there was a change
in the state's chief executive, many state
employees have been removed from the
position. They were not subject to
dismissal because the governor
will take office. Idahoans will see proof
of the wisdom of taking such vital
departments as Highways and Fish and
Game out of politics. It's possible of
course for a governor to appoint new
members of the commission turning
these two departments over to him, but
they can't count on doing his personal bidding.
But the course would be foolhardy in view
of the smoothness with which the depart-
ments have functioned for a number of
years now.

DELAYED TOP LONG
Automobile owners who know of mechanical
defects of their vehicles can't
neglect repairs indefinitely. The 1966 Federal
Highway Safety Law will force the
next session of the Legislature into pas-
sage of a vehicle inspection law.
There's little alternative. State Sen.
Lloyd Barron told the Idaho Highway
Safety Commission not long ago. "If we
don't comply with the act, it is very plain
that the federal government will take
over and do it, including supplying the
point of view," Barron declared.
The act the board is attending to the Highway
Police Committee meeting of the western
division of the Council of State Govern-
ments. Barron is vice chairman of the
committee.
Some citizens have contended for years
that Idaho should require vehicle inspec-
tion. Even though it doesn't necessarily
follow that all older autos on the high-
ways are defective. Some owners take
good care of an auto, realizing that its
mechanical condition can have a direct
bearing on the lives of others as well as
their own safety and even life. It's not
fair to tax to require other car
owners to use at least as much care.
Perhaps in some cases, inspection will
disclose so many defects as to force re-
placement of a car because repair would
cost a prohibitive expense. In those cases,
the automobiles involved shouldn't have
been on the highway in the first place.
Public safety takes precedence.

JUNKS COMEBACK
A plant that will gobble up a thousand auto-
mobiles a day and turn them into high-grade
steel deserves cheers. For it holds out hope for
an ultimate solution of the junked jalopy prob-
lem. The plant, owned by the American Iron and
Steel Institute, has completed such a plant
in Everett, Mass., and the one which built a dif-
ferent type of junked automobile converter in
Detroit, Mich.
How to dispose of unwanted cars has become
a major puzzle in the United States. Every year
in the disposal effort, has not been able to turn
landed on junk heaps. "Auto graveyards" or are
merely abandoned where they broke down, they
are a major problem.
The basic trouble is economic. The automobile
industry, which on the whole wants to cooperate
in the disposal effort, has not been able to turn
the shredded scrap metal from junked cars into
high-grade steel because it contains too much
nonmagnetic material—aluminum, chrome,
copper, and other metals. It is difficult and costly
to pick up the old wrecks without this market.
All this was very discouraging to those who
held up the ideal of "America, the Beautiful."
Both Luria Bros. & Co. in Detroit and the
Prolonged New England Co. in Everett, have
found a way to make a market for the lower
cost. Executives of the latter say their
process will revive the scrap-metal business,
bring back the junk dealer, and free the land-
fill from the junked cars. They claim that
"We wish them well. But to chop up the 5,000,000
cars added to junk heaps annually and market
the scrap as a big order."—Christian Science
Monitor.

pressures on its homeland—and most experts
agree this is so—the credit belongs to Rostow,
the man who argued successfully for the ap-
plication of the word "peace."
Walt Rostow's role in the war goes back to
mid-June, 1961, when as State Department
assistant secretary of the Policy Planning
Staff, he convinced President Kennedy that
the U.S. had every right to regard Hanoi's
operations against South Viet Nam as identical
with the North Viet Nam's support of the
in 1959. A few months later, Rostow joined Gen.
Maxwell Taylor in successfully urging that Ken-
edy establish an American military task force
in Viet Nam for self-defense and perimeter
security. By so doing, Kennedy took the first
irreversible step into the war.

PLANNED OIL BOMBING—More, Rostow
drafted the plan—now operative—for re-
taliating against the North on a scale graduated to
the Viet Cong. As Arthur Schlesinger Jr. reported
in his book "A Thousand Days," Lyndon John-
son accepted that plan in February, 1965, and
then in June of this year set into motion Rostow's
proposal for bombing Hanoi's oil supplies.
Admittedly, Rostow took a calculated risk. His
policy could have brought back the North's
expanded war. But so far it can be said—with
fingers crossed—that his insistence on the mili-
tary option of retaliation has so increased
the North's military support of the Viet Cong
Hanoi's rejection of peace overtures are a touch
less ardent, a little less final. The strife within
the North has been brought back to a stalemate

The Doctor Says

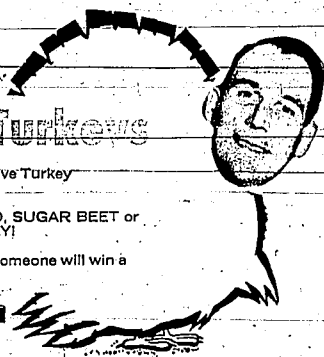

Moderate Republicans May Get Conservative Opposition

WASHINGTON (AP) — Moderate Republicans may encounter stiff opposition in their efforts to get GOP governors to spearhead a move to wrest party control from the conservatives.
 The 25 Republican governors, including 14 first-termers elected Nov. 8, appear to be nearly equally divided between the moderate and conservative camps.
 GOP Gov. Mark O. Hatfield of Oregon, who welcomes the label of liberal, points to a Republican governors' meeting in Colorado Springs, Colo., Dec. 9-10 as a likely forum for the moderates to get together behind a single candidate for the 1968 party presidential nomination.
 "We can't afford to let happen in 1967 what happened in 1964," Hatfield said at a news conference Tuesday.
 The governor, elected to the Senate last week, made it clear he was allying to the moderates' frustrations of two years ago. At that time New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's entry into presidential primaries kept other progressive candidates out of the race until it was too late to defeat conservative Barry Goldwater for the presidential nomination.
 But if the moderates expect to duplicate the 1952 feat former New York Gov. Thomas E. Dewey in rallying nearly all of

delegato-choosing machinery, Hatfield said that to encourage them together among the moderates, speculative candidates ought to make it "crystal clear" that they are not in the running.

Conferring Of Degree Is Planned

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M., (AP) — The specter of two large dams rising on the Colorado River near Grand Canyon National Park in Arizona dominated the opening of a three-day convention of the National Reclamation Association today.

Two opening speakers, one a U.S. senator and the other a top government official, called for fresh approaches to end controversies which have stymied national water development. One such controversy has been over the Arizona dams, they noted.

A third speaker, the president of the reclamation association, also called for more cooperation while at the same time attacking the "lunatic fringe in the conservation movement."

Much talk among the conventioners, most of them from western states, centered on the proposed Huastani and Marble Canyon dams on the Lower Colorado River.

The power-generating dams have been strongly opposed by some conservationists as unnecessary and potentially damaging to wilderness, wildlife and scenic wonders of the Grand Canyon. A bill authorizing the dams died in the 89th Congress.

Research, Material, Hard Work Go Into Costumes

Months of research, yards of material, lots of hard work and ingenuity are requisites for successful costuming of a stage production. The Community Children's Theater has found Mrs. Ross Ward, who has taken over the task of costume designer during the last two productions, a person who can make the most of that combination.

The group is currently presenting "The Emperor's New Clothes" for the delight of youngsters and elders of the area.

This fanciful Oriental production has been the object of much research on the part of Mrs. Ward. She searched for months to find authentic illustrations for costumes. Oriental symbols of good luck, prosperity and those appropriate to the offices of emperor and empress were among the objects of her search.

Designs on the special costumes were hand-painted by Mrs. Donald Lambert, using a polymer plastic paint. She also constructed the Minister's medallion using a peanut butter jar lid and sculpt-metal.

Each costume, said Mrs. Ward, "is meticulously executed and well-made in order to stand up during dress rehearsals and six performances. Fabrics are chosen," she continued, "for their authenticity; we never try to substitute a less expensive fabric and still hope for a rich effect."

"Each costume," she concluded, "gives the children of our audiences a better theatrical experience and makes our entire production more appealing."

More than 200 yards of satins, brocades and cotons chosen for their hand-woven look were used in the nearly 30 costumes required for the production. All special costumes were constructed by Mrs. Ward with the assistance of Mrs. Dale Childs, Mrs. James Alsworth and Mrs. Snowy Briggs.

The actors—in the roles of weavers, members of the royal court and stage crew—were given sketches and material and were responsible for having their costumes made. Members of the on-stage "honorable stage crew" are clad in black from head to toe, and in the trad-

itional Oriental stage manner are supposed to be "invisible."

Patterns for special costumes were not available so each was constructed first of sheeting to insure proper fit and then of the desired fabric. All costumes are symbolic of their roles, from the weavers clad in jackets and baggy trousers to the Emperor in elaborate ensembles featuring emblems appropriate to his position.

More than 300 yards of braided black cotton yarn was required for the Chinese pigtail worn by the actors.

The Emperor's hat, one of the most unusual costume effects in the production, was constructed by Mrs. Ward from styrofoam and fabric. It is sprayed gold and stands 20 inches high.

"The Emperor's New Clothes" will be presented during final performances at 10 a.m., 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Saturday at O'Leary Junior High School.

1967 Sugar Quotas Show Reductions

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department proposed Tuesday to set 1967 sugar marketing quotas—including import shares—at a total of 10,200,000 tons. This compares with 10,375,000 tons which have been provided for the current year.

The department regulates the marketing of sugar, including shipments from offshore foreign countries entitled to share in the U.S. market, for the purpose of stabilizing prices and supplies.

In proposing to set next year's quotas slightly below those in effect this year, the department said inventories in hands of merchants and users have increased somewhat this year. Hence, under prospective conditions, marketings would not have to be quite as large in order to meet domestic needs.

The department gave interested persons until Dec. 5 to submit views on the proposed quotas before making a final determination for the coming year.

Borah's Perfect Season Leads to State Crown, Twin Falls Places Third

There is little doubt as to the No. 1 Idaho prep gridiron club as the Borah Lions finished with a clean 10-0 slate and swept all top place votes for a fifth consecutive year to successfully defend the Associated Press mythical title after winning the honor in 1965. In fact, the 15 voters had little difficulty picking the top four ball clubs, with the Boise Braves holding on to second place despite a 31-12 loss to Borah.

Irish Coach Doesn't Fear No. 1 Ranking

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP)—Notre Dame's coach Ara Parseghian said today he had no qualms about carrying the title of No. 1 college football ranking into the big game with Michigan State Saturday. "I don't think it will be a strong emotional factor in this case," the young coach of the Fighting Irish said. "If it were a one-sided game and if we were favored by two or three touchdowns, it might be different. Like us, Michigan State also is unbeaten. They may regard themselves as the best in the country."

"Personally, there are four overriding emotional stimulants on both sides. It is Michigan State's last game. They are at home. They want to maintain the record of not having lost to us at East Lansing since 1957. On our side, the determination to avenge last year's 12-3 defeat is probably a stronger urge for our boys."

"We have to be No. 1. We want to remain No. 1. The game at East Lansing, to be televised over a large section of the country, means two unbeaten, untied powerhouses in a battle that figures to decide the national championship. Notre Dame is 8-0 and Michigan State is 9-0. They are ranked one-two in that order in The Associated Press poll. The Irish collected all but two of the selectors top vote, which went to Alabama, No. 3 and also 6-0 and Arkansas."

This week's poll, announced Tuesday, placed Nebraska, 9-0 fourth, and Georgia Tech, also 9-0, fifth. The Associated Press said, 8-1; UCLA, 8-1; Georgia, 8-1, and Purdue 6-2.

The contest has been labeled a dream game without a parallel in national interest since the great 1946 Notre Dame-Army game that ended in a scoreless tie.

Parseghian said he wouldn't be surprised if the game turned into a defensive battle. "Both the Irish and the Spartans have big, quick defensive units. Kevin Hardy, who anchors the defense at 260 pounds weighs 270. Bubba Smith, Michigan State's left end, weighs 283 and a guard, Jeff Richardson, 283."

Most fans, however, are expecting an exciting offensive duel involving the Irish's sensational senior quarterback, Jim Seymour on one side and the Spartans' powerful runner, Bob Apisa, on the other.
