





## **GOP Plans To Recruit Young Help**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Republican National Committee announced today a campaign to recruit GOP workers and voters from among 12.4 million young Americans coming of voting age before the 1968 presidential election.

"This represents a vast reservoir of potential leaders and candidates for our party," said National Chairman Ray C. Bliss. "We must get to them first to convince them that we want and need them as active participants in the Republican party."

Bliss said the new program, called "Opportunities Unlimited," will stage a series of political conferences around the country, the first on Dec. 10 at the University of Wisconsin. He said the conferences will be designed to persuade young people that the Republican party is the best place for them, and to recruit them into GOP organizations.

## **Army Center In France To Be Moved**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon announced today the last major U.S. Army headquarters in France will be moved into existing U.S. facilities in Germany beginning "as soon as possible."

The transfer, third major step in rearranging the U.S. military command structure in Europe, is in line with French President Charles de Gaulle's order for American troops to leave France.

France is withdrawing from the military structure of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

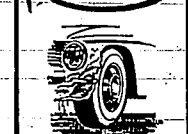
Involved in today's announcement is the headquarters of the Army Communications Zone, Europe (COMZ), being shifted from Orleans, France, to Worms, Germany. A major component of the headquarters, the Army Supply and Maintenance Agency which is now located at Verdun and Malson Fort, will move to Zweibrücken, Germany. The Defense Department said both units will be operational by March '67.

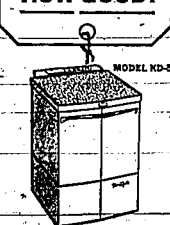

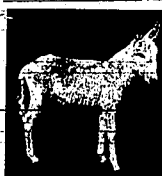

## NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—There is a lot of justified caterwauling about President Johnson's gutsy veto of the District of Columbia omnibus crime bill—and no wonder, when a two-day-dasen-to-two-blocks riot night without the usual attentions of the town's heavily populated community of "muggers, rapists, murderers and footpads." But a rather sacred document known as the Bill of Rights gave Article IV of that piece of paper says in plain English that the citizen shall be secure against unreasonable searches and seizures.

Unreasonable means just that, however, a cop may seek to blur its translation, and Title III of the crime bill was unapreciable to the point of subversion.

**TEN HOURS OF INTERROGATION**—By the provisions of Title III, a policeman would have been permitted to pick up a person and question him for four hours without making an arrest—and would have been allowed an additional four hours of questioning, exclusive of interruptions, after the arrest. Thus, Johnson noted in his message, a citizen could be interrogated for ten hours before he was taken before a magistrate.

Surely, this smacks of the kind of "law enforcement" so efficiently practiced by the Hilters and the Khrushchevs. It would create a situation whereby a free citizen could disappear from public sight, merely because a cop decided that he was guilty of a crime or was a material witness who might try to blow town. To be sure, we must trust the policeman's judgment at the scene of a crime, mostly because we have to choose in the matter. The common sense dictates that a limit be placed on how far that trust is to be extended.

**HAZARD TO LAW ABIDING**—Critics of the veto are fond of complaining that Johnson gives the professional criminal too much rope. But professional criminals are not the only ones who become involved in crimes. The law-abiding citizen frequently finds himself at a law-breaking scene through no happenstance and the law will allow any person at the scene—including the victim himself—to be taken into custody for a material witness and held for four hours before an arrest is made.

The stage was set in the recent election for Barry's return to his old love, the Senate. They not only elected him, they elected him to the governorship Jack Williams, a radio television commentator and columnist on the Arizona Republic, but for the first time in the history of the country they carried the House of Representatives. This is the base from which he can be appointed to a vacancy and then re-elected, at a special election.

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## More Vital

At hand is a 68-page report, "The Short Life of the Electric Light Bulb," prepared by the Government Activities Subcommittee of the Committee on Government Operations and Administration of the House of Representatives. Jack Brooks of Texas is chairman of the subcommittee and points out in the preface that household variety light bulbs "are designed to burn out too quickly."

Many Americans resigned themselves to the idea that no manufacturer would like to have its last. The designed life of an automobile is too short; an electric appliance of almost any description gives up the ghost before the owner is ready to invest in a new one; fur is made of wearing out or becoming obsolete; clothing styles change so rapidly that some persons despair of keeping pace with the changes.

Are these fertile fields for congressional investigation? Perhaps, but there's another field closer to home that might merit a good deal more attention. Money bills—originating in the House of Representatives. During the last session of Congress money bills in the amount of some \$14 billion gained final approval. Why can't congressmen concentrate on cutting down that enormous drain of tax dollars?

It might be nice to have electric light bulbs last another couple of months. The average taxpayer in the nation who wouldn't stand up and cheer if Congress would reduce taxes drastically. Moreover, every taxpayer would be deeply appreciative if congressmen could eliminate governmental waste of tax money. That's a broad field for investigation. It might be approached by taxpayers if members of Congress could guarantee a dollar's value for every tax dollar spent.

Somewhat it seems rather strange to be paying representatives \$30,000 a year to get involved in a 68-page report on "The Short Life of the Electric Light Bulb." It might be a good topic for an exploratory thesis for a university student. It might be included if private industry was concentrating on really gouging the consumer. But there's a suspicion that the company selling light bulbs to the public is giving the public more for its money than the congressman who accepts the \$30,000 to go on and on while taxes continue to go up and up.

It's about time for the public to let members of Congress know they're fed up with all the hanky-panky. Americans are paying billions for governmental services and aren't getting their money's worth. Duly-elected representatives go back to Washington and seem to be involved in the process of taking the taxpayer's money and using it to buy his vote so they can continue in office.

## FISHING FOR FUNDS

Something new is going to be added to federal income tax returns. The last session of Congress passed legislation that would permit taxpayers to contribute \$1 a year each to both major political parties to help finance presidential campaigns. Apparently there will be a space on income tax returns for taxpayers to approve the \$1 donation, if they so desire. The new political fund would be divided equally among the two major parties based on 10 million less than the total number of people who cast their votes in the last presidential election. That formula would provide \$60 million to be split between Republicans and Democrats for the 1968 elections.

The unknown factor at this point, of course, is reaction on the part of taxpayers. If they go for the plan they'll be underwriting a bigger effort by the political parties to raise money. And more persons already resent much of the campaigning and the material that's practically forced on them via the mass media.

Another obvious flaw in the legislation is that funds so collected would go to the two major parties. One of the better points is more of an interest in giving individuals \$1 could ignite the spark that's missing when there's no vested interest of any sort.

It will be interesting to see how taxpayers respond. At first blush the reaction is chance to lose and the chance to gain. Taxes, and especially income taxes, take such a big bite from a person's income that it's doubtful if the average citizen will sleep at the opportunity.

**Q—Is an irritated or nervous condition caused chiefly by laxatives? Is there any fever with it?**

**A—**Although prolonged use of laxatives is a common cause of colitis, it may also be caused by getting too much roughage in your diet, emotional upset, food allergy or chilling the abdomen. It is not associated with fever. Diarrhea with fever may be caused by salmonella infections including typhoid and various types of dysentery.

**Q—Is there a sudden uncontrollable bowel movement common in people who suffer from spastic colon or colitis of any type? Can anything be done for this?**

**A—**Severe attacks of spastic colon or colitis are often associated with a sudden powerful urge to empty the bowels. Although control rather than cure is possible, it cannot be achieved by treatment that requires a careful study by a gastroenterologist to determine the underlying cause and to prescribe a course of treatment that includes, medicine, diet and hygienic living.

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## Adenauer Gives Support To Kiesinger

BONN, Germany (AP) — Former Chancellor Konrad Adenauer today said a telegram to Malcolm A. Tarlov of Norwalk, Conn., president of American Jewish War Veterans, expressing support for Kurt Georg Kiesinger, the Christian Democratic party's candidate for chancellor.

Kiesinger has been criticized by Jewish organizations in the United States because of his Nazi past.

"I have known Dr. Kiesinger for many years as a true democrat who did not make himself guilty of anything during the Nazi regime," Adenauer said.

"This verdict is shared by authoritative representatives of Jews living in West Germany," Adenauer added that he cannot share the fears that have been expressed abroad about the possible election of Kiesinger to the chancellorship.

Kiesinger had been a member of the Nazi party from 1933 until the end of World War II. He worked in the radio section of the Nazi Foreign Ministry's propaganda section.

## Witnesses To Testify In Gas Case

BOISE (AP) — Heating equipment and oil dealers brought in witnesses today to testify against what they call Intermountain Gas Co.'s "giveaway" rental service.

The testimony came at a State Public Utilities Commission hearing on Intermountain's application to rent heating and water heating equipment to its customers for \$1.95 a month.

Intermountain officials Monday testified they decided to offer the rental service after studying similar programs around the Pacific Northwest.

But Joseph Imhoff, attorney for the oil dealers, said the low rental charge "is in the nature of a giveaway as a leader to lure more customers using gas."

"It impairs our right to compete with a utility whom, if they are not making a reasonable profit, can apply later to the Public Utilities Commission for a rate increase," he said.

Imhoff represents the Oil Dealers Institute of Southern Idaho and Eastern Oregon Inc., which he said has 38 oil dealer members in the two states.

Also challenging Intermountain's rental service is the Associated Plumbing and Heating Contractors Inc. The oil and heating equipment dealers asked at the start of the hearing that the rental service be halted pending a PUC ruling. The commission refused, as it had earlier, saying such an order would prejudice the case.

## Viet Nam Soldiers to Get Hearty Thanksgiving Meal

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. fighting men in Viet Nam, described as the best fed in American wartime history, will get a hearty dinner of roast turkey with trimmings Thanksgiving Day.

It ought to be enough to make the Viet Cong cry. In contrast with the Communist's basic diet of rice and fish, American troops in Southeast Asia will be getting a hot holiday meal consisting of:

Shrimp cocktail with crackers. Turkey with giblet gravy.

Bread dressing. Cranberry sauce. Candied sweet potatoes. Mixed vegetables. And assorted relishes, hot rolls with margarine or butter, mincemeat or -pumpkin pie, fruit and candy, plus coffee, tea or milk.

This is the Thanksgiving menu laid out for American soldiers, sailors, airmen, and Marines around the world, including the war theater.

Compare that with the basic fare of the North Vietnamese

and Viet Cong of about 1.5 pounds daily of rice, salt, fish and mung bean (fish sauce). Paul R. Ignatius, assistant secretary of defense for installations and logistics, said over 88 per cent of the meals served in Viet Nam are hot meals with fresh meat, vegetables and other fresh food items. Seven per cent are heated canned foods. Only 5 per cent are field combinations.

He said food is being provided to U.S. troops at a rate of about seven pounds per man per day, including 30 ounces of milk per man.

"I think that without question the troops are being fed better than those in any war in history," Ignatius said.

DAMASCUS (AP) — A boy born in Damascus three days ago with "his heart completely outside his chest" died Monday despite efforts to keep him alive in an oxygen tent, officials at the government hospital said. Officials said the child's working class parents took him to the hospital after he was delivered at their suburban home.

Other presidents elected included Robert R. Glenn, Kelchum, representing Blaine County; John Bahr, Fairfield, Camas county; William Trout, Mountain Home, Elmore county; Fred Reich, Arco, Butte county; Harry Harl, Dubois, Clark county; and Gordon MacRae, Mac's Inn, Franklin county.

All but Franklin and Elmore counties were represented. Members passed a Resolution asking that the state gas tax be raised to bring in enough revenue to match federal monies now being allocated to Idaho.

President Clark said eight miles of road east of Dixie were completed the past summer and that the remaining unfinished 3.9 miles just west of Hill City will be completed next summer and the entire stretch of 12 miles will be eiled.

Clark has been president of the association since 1954.

# Commentator Says Smith to Appear on TV

LONDON (AP) — A British television commentator reported today that Rhodesian Prime Minister Ian Smith has accepted an invitation to appear in London on his program, but high government sources said Smith would be indicted for treason if he shows up.

Commentator David Frost said the Rhodesian leader sent his acceptance Monday. It appeared to be part of a campaign by Smith for a meeting with British Prime Minister Harold Wilson.

One high source said Smith, since he proclaimed Rhodesia's independence from Britain 13 months ago, "is in a state of rebellion against the crown and would expose himself to arrest if he were to come to this country."

Smith lately has spread the word that he is ready to meet Wilson appearing to give the impression of being ready for a compromise.

"Even if the government were to give him the promise of a safe conduct," the source added, "he would still face the certainty of an indictment for treason."

"This is because under British law any citizen has the right to bring charges of treason against a subject of the monarch who may be suspected of this crime against the state. Mr. Smith has many antagonists in this country."

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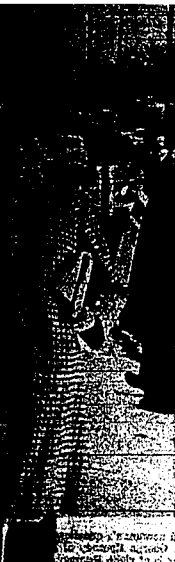
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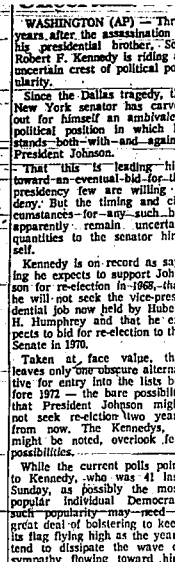

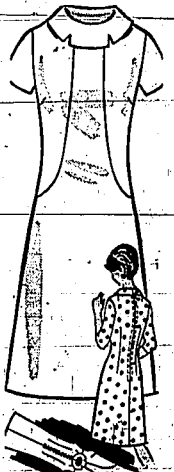

## Economist Advocates

### Surtax Use

NEW YORK (AP) — Former White House economist Walter Heller advocates a temporary surtax on income taxes, the kind of increase that House Republican Leader Gerald R. Ford says could be a "tragic mistake."

Both men put forward their positions Monday in speeches before the annual convention of the U.S. Savings and Loan Association.

"The conclusion is that it's time to loosen the excessively tight monetary screws, and lighten the fiscal screws," said Heller, former chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisors and now a member of the University of Minnesota faculty.

In suggesting a 5 per cent surtax, or tax on a tax, Heller estimated it would produce about \$4 billion in new revenues.

Ford replied: "From the business point of view, a tax increase could have its greatest impact precisely when business does not need a depressant but maybe even a pep-pill."

From the point of view of the worker, it would take an annual slice out of the pay checks of every earner already hurt by sharp price increases.

## Jet Bomber Snags Cable on Deck and Makes Noisy but Perfect Landing

ABOARD USS AMERICA (AP) — The jet fighter-bomber touched down on the aircraft carrier's landing deck, snagged a cable and screeched to a sudden stop — a noisy but perfect landing. The pilot had nothing to do with it.

The F-4 combat plane was landed safely Monday on the deck of the Navy's newest aircraft carrier, the nation's newest flat-top, by a complex system of radar and computers operated by a control center deep inside the ship.

The revolutionary "look ma, no hands" concept is being developed in a hurry by the Navy, seeking to reduce landing accidents at night and in foul weather during Southeast Asia operations.

The system, expected to undergo operations tests next spring, has a secondary purpose: to make it easier for carrier pilots to qualify for night flying and thus ease the growing shortage of carrier attack pilots in Viet Nam.

The computer sends precise commands to the plane, which is converted into signals that drive the automatic pilot for a safe "hands off" landing.

The Navy's first public demonstration of the landing system was made relatively calmly Monday by the calm seas and clear skies of the Atlantic Ocean. But officials said the device can work even in the foulest of weather, when the landing deck sometimes rises and falls 80 feet.
