





## British Aide Ends Talks With Smith

LONDON (AP) — Commonwealth Secretary Herbert Bowden returned from Rhodesia today and said rebel Prime Minister Ian Smith had made "some minor concessions" toward averting a final split between Britain and the breakaway colony.

Bowden would not say whether his meeting with Smith had brought agreement nearer. He went at once to report Prime Minister Harold Wilson and the Cabinet.

BOISE (AP) — An Idaho state coordinated for federal public education, establish such pilot projects as special classes for exceptionally bright students and for emotionally disturbed ones, and set certification requirements for special education teachers.

Standardize cost accounting and operation of school bus transportation throughout the state.

Establish a new municipal code standardizing government-

and turning the state's villages as well as first and second class cities into cities governed by mayor-and-four-or-six-councilmen. City manager government could be chosen by a public vote.

Establish a uniform commercial code designed to bring Idaho commercial laws in line with those of other states with which Idaho merchants do business.

Reduce the state legislature's standing committees to six from 15 in the Senate and seven from 14 in the House to free legislators from excessive committee work.

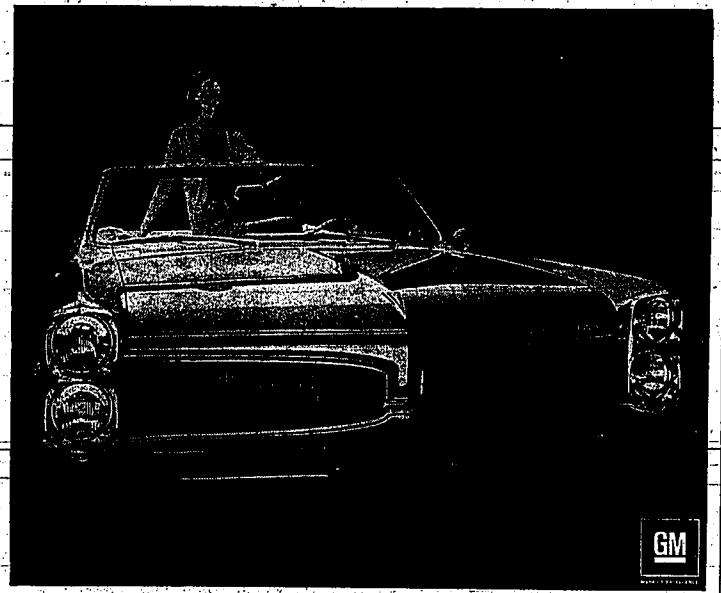

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)**—A second uranium boom is building up in the arid, nature-sculptured salt-dome lands of the West—Wyoming, Utah, Colorado, New Mexico and Arizona. This is an encore to the fabled uranium boom of the mid-50s, which produced millions of dollars for one and a number of large-outer-the-millionaires—like Charlie Sica who discovered the Mill Mine in southeastern Utah.

**Missionary Is Released By Cubans**  
ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — A Baptist missionary sentenced to 30 years in prison in Cuba has been released conditionally, so that he may receive medical treatment, the Southern Baptist Home-Mission Board announced today.

The Rev. Herbert Caudill, 62, of Omega, Ga., was among 23 Cuban-Baptists sentenced last year.

Dr. Arthur B. Rutledge, executive secretary treasurer of the Home Mission Board, said Caudill had been freed from the prison to receive medical treatment at his home in Havana.

"I believe the condition is that he will not leave Cuba," Rutledge said.

The Rev. David File, 31, of Waynesboro, Ga., sentenced to six years in prison, remains a prisoner.

Rutledge said Caudill suffered a detached retina and is blind in one eye and is having difficulty in seeing with the other.

He has been treated in a government hospital and a clinic, but they have not been able to help him, Rutledge said.

He will be permitted to live at his home in Havana and receive other treatment.

Rutledge said Baptist officials here talked with officials in Havana today, and were assured that Caudill has been released from prison.

The Baptists were accused of spying for the United States.

The coins will differ from existing coins in size and weight, and manufacturers estimate it will cost about \$33 per machine to adapt them to the new coins. There are an estimated 300,000 machines in Japan dispensing food, drinks, cigarettes and other items.

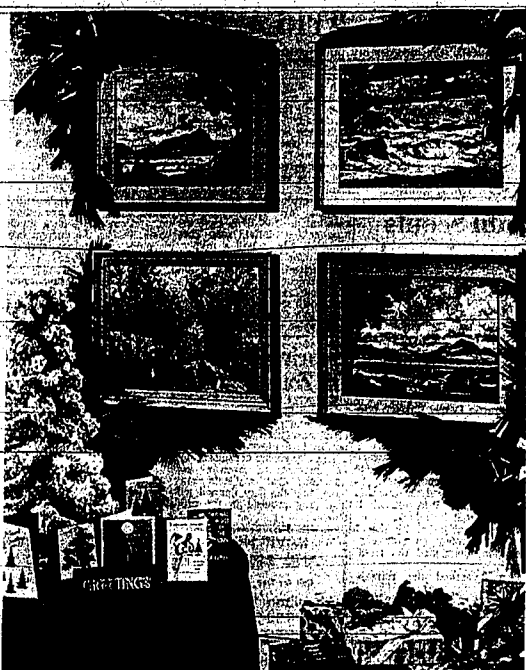

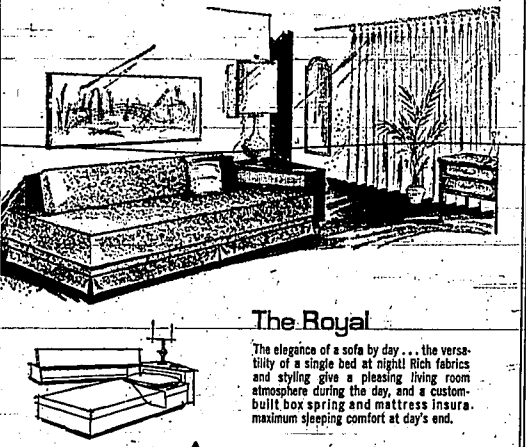

SAIGON — South Viet. Nam (AP) — The Vietnamese military spokesman today displayed a man it said was the highest ranking Viet. Cong. to defect. He was identified as Lt. Col. Le Xuan Chuyen, alias Thinh Son.

Government military spokesmen said the 37-year-old man gave himself into government hands on Aug. 2 because "he was not satisfied with his assignment as well as the Communist-political stand."

Wearing a white, short-sleeved shirt and blue-gray trousers, Chuyen was presented to newsmen at the regular military Vietnamese military briefing. Spokesmen said he had been a member of the Communist party 20 years, but he explained he had joined when the organization was known as the Indochinese Workers party.

A government statement said Chuyen joined the Viet Minh army in 1945 and in 1950 was promoted to lieutenant colonel and named commander of the 8th Regiment, 39th Viet Cong Division.

It added that in March 1966, he became ill "and taking the opportunity, he asked to be nursed at Miss Hiep's house in Suoi Klot of Hoai Duc District until April 1966. He married this girl who rallied to the government of Viet Nam together with her."

## Franco Raises Question Of Who Will Succeed Him

By HAROLD K. MILKS  
 MADRID, Spain (AP) — Gen. Francisco Franco has raised two intriguing questions: who will be named as his successor under the new organic law, and who will pick as the new premier the government's successor.  
 There was much speculation on these two points even before Franco presented to a special session of the Spanish Parliament last Tuesday his new organic laws giving Spaniards greater representation in government. Since then the speculation has increased tenfold.  
 Few expect the man who has ruled Spain for three decades to suddenly step down. They believe his successor as chief of state — either a king or a regent — will not be named until either death or critical illness forces the 74-year-old Franco to leave.  
 The selection of a premier or head of government will certainly come much quicker, perhaps soon after the national referendum called for Dec. 14 ratifies the constitutional changes Franco proposed in the new organic law.  
 Franco now rules as both chief of state and head of government.  
 The field of possible candidates to head a constitutional monarchy in Spain under Franco's amended laws is sharply limited by the requirements that the man must be a Catholic, a Spaniard of royal blood at least 30 years of age, and acceptable to the council of the realm, the Cabinet and the Franco-controlled Parliament.  
 There appear at the moment to be no new, probable candidates. Of these, Don Juan de Bourbon, the exiled Spanish pretender and the third son of Spain's last monarch Alfonso XIII, appears eliminated because of Franco's opposition to his return as king.  
 The pretender's son, Prince Juan Carlos de Bourbon, the apparent choice of Franco to head the restored monarchy, is only 28. He would have to rule for at least two years through a regent if the choice should fall on his head now.  
 Married to Princess Sophie of Greece, Prince Juan Carlos enjoys little personal popularity among the average Spaniards and little more among officials of the regime who would have to ratify his selection.  
 A third prospect is Prince Alfonso, Duke of Calabria, who has been reduced to "small skirmishes" in the past two years because U.S. bombings have reduced their flow of supplies.  
 But he ruled out the Venetian government's ability to close the Adriatic Sea and the Venetian Fleet to depend for their sustenance "because we simply don't have the military means,"

NEW YORK (AP)—Carlos Ortiz of New York is a 2-1 favorite to retain his lightweight title in a 15-rounder with junior lightweight king Flash Elorde of Manila at Madison Square Garden Monday night.

Gentile currently is on the roster of the Portland Pacific Coast League club, while Belinsky is on the San Diego Padres roster. Either can be grabbed by a major-league club for the established \$25,000 draft price.

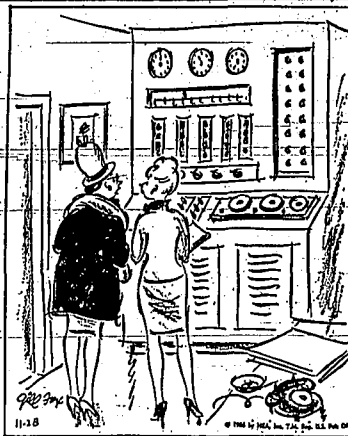

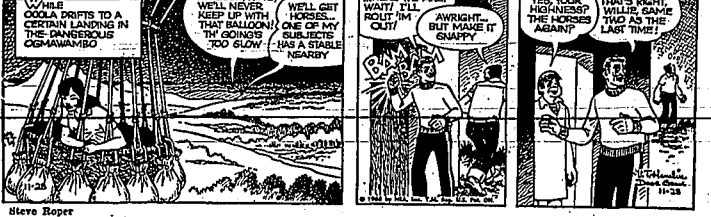
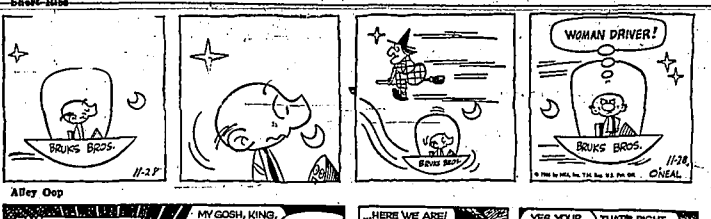

# Effect Noted On Cutback In Highways

WASHINGTON (AP) — The  
satisfactory cutback in the  
federal highway program will  
reduce the actual value of new  
road building contracts to \$1.5  
billion in '61, but seven states  
and the District of Columbia.  
In some states, the cutbacks  
could be substantial when com-  
pared with the actual volume of  
contracts awarded during the  
fiscal year which ended last  
June 30.  
Some states ate heavily into  
their backlog of contract au-  
thority which they had accumu-

gram, the Bureau of Public  
Roads cutback order also

actual cutbacks are to be made.  
The bureau anticipates that  
some projects will be postponed  
and others stretched out.  
The Bureau of Public Roads  
actually committed \$1.5 billion  
for highway construction from July  
through October — the first four  
months of the current fiscal  
year — at a slower pace than  
called for under the cutback.  
The bureau emphasized that  
the cutbacks are temporary and  
could be rescinded with a  
further cooling in inflationary  
pressures.  
The cutback in this year's  
program for \$4 billion to \$3.3  
billion is part of President John-  
son's effort to cut nondefense  
spending as much as possible  
without harming essential pro-  
grams.  
The reason some states will  
be able to award more contracts  
this fiscal year than last is that  
they failed last year to get a  
substantial part of the contract  
authority they had already ob-  
tained from the bureau.  
An attempt to spread the
