

5 Arrested For Cross Burning

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Five persons were arrested over the weekend on charges of illegal cross burning.

The arrests were the first since Gav Mills E. Godwin initiated a crackdown Dec. 7 on cross burners. The order included a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of any cross burners.

Two men, including a state penitentiary guard, were arrested by Henrico County police after a pre-midnight cross burning Saturday at the entrance to an apartment complex in suburban Lakeside.

The pair was identified as Woodford David Taylor, 26, the penitentiary guard, and Paul C. Pitts Jr., both of Richmond.

Shortly after midnight, Richmond police arrested two men and a woman after a cross was burned near an auto repair shop in a West End business section.

Joe Junior Sammon, 33, of Glen Allen, and Wilson Ralph Price, 39, of Henrico County, were charged with burning a cross illegally. Price's wife, Nannie Jane Price, 21, was charged with being an accessory.

All three were charged with contributing to the delinquency of three of the Price's children, the oldest 9 years of age, who were in the automobile with the adults were taken into custody.

Klan literature was found in the Price car, police said, along with another cross, a 22-caliber pistol and a 30-caliber rifle.

The penalty for conviction on the cross burning charge can be one to five years in prison, or a \$500 fine and 12 months imprisonment.

Hatfield Suggests War Be Turned Over To Asians

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Sen. Robert Mark O. Hatfield suggested Sunday that the war in Vietnam should be turned over to Asians.

The Oregon Republican called for an all-Asian conference, "at which we place in their (Asian nations) hands a responsibility to pursue the diplomatic offensive."

At the same time, he said, the United States should "de-Americanize the military action to provide the Asian military question and not an American military issue to solve."

Appearing on the American Broadcasting Co. television-radio program "Issues and Answers," Hatfield said American troops should be gradually withdrawn in a way "so that we are not leaving a void but we are beginning to put the Asian troops in for, or in lieu of, the American troops. This becomes then an Asian war to be settled by Asian diplomats."

He said all Asian nations with a common cause and a common purpose should be invited to the conference, eventually including Red China, because "it is involved in the struggle in Vietnam."

Hatfield, governor of Oregon for the past eight years, has been critical of the Johnson administration's policies in Vietnam since 1964.

He said Sunday it would be unfair to criticize without offering constructive alternatives and then offered a three-point program:

1. Correlation of a diplomatic offensive for peace with military action. "When we suspended bombing a year ago Christmas for a period of time in North Vietnam, the very day that we went to the United Nations, supposedly on a diplomatic offensive, we resumed bombing. So, consequently our military policy seemed to contradict our diplomatic policy."
2. Give Asian nations responsibility for both the diplomatic and the military action.
3. Creation of a Southeast Asian common market. No single nation in the area, he said, has a viable economy. "But if we have the leadership and urged them to form a Southeast Asian common market system where by these nations join together, they could produce a viable economy."

Hatfield said the French and

How the Americans have pursued a policy in Vietnam for 20 years that had produced neither victory nor a solution.

"I don't think," he said, "that a policy that has not brought a solution or a victory in 20 years is one that they (administration leaders) have a right to ask the American people to blindly follow any longer."

Berlin Starts New Year After Reaching Another Milestone

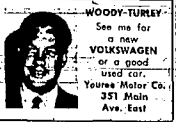

(AP)—Berlin goes into the New Year having reached another milestone at the close of the old; sole acceptance of a Christmas holiday season without wall passes. For the first time since 1963, the wall dividing the city was kept closed to thousands of West Berliners wanting to visit their relatives in East Berlin. It was a separation like the Christmas seasons of 1961 and 1962 after the Communists first built the wall. But this time the emotional impact to a large extent appeared gone out of the issue. Essentially, West Berliners backed the Western stand not to pay the price, which was this recognition of the German Communist regime or no wall passes. The Communists always insisted on recognition as part of eight previous wall pass agreements, but this time they did not back off in negotiations. The West Berlin side remained equally adamant since West Germany does not recognize East Germany, and acceptance of Communist terms would have

Retiring Highway Official Sees Changes In Program

COVNE WASHINGTON (AP) — Rex Whitton whose retirement as "federal highway" administrator has been announced by President Johnson, predicts a shift in emphasis in the nation's road-building program. "I don't see an end-to-highway building," Whitton said in an interview. "People like to drive their automobiles. They like the freedom and independence of movement." But future emphasis will shift from construction of major new routes — the interstate system — to improvement of feeder and

primary roads, he said. Whitton's career as a highway engineer parallels closely the era of modern road building. He began work on a Missouri highway survey team in 1920 when the federal-aid highway program was only four years old. For the last six years, he has directed the largest road building program ever undertaken by any nation — one that has been costing \$4 billion a year. Whitton is 68. Last Friday, when his retirement became effective, he rounded out 46 years in his career of highway work. In announcing the resignation Sunday, Johnson told Whitton "the American highway system is unequalled in the world and your share in the credit for it is large." He wished Whitton well and said he hopes to call on him from time to time for advice.

The President did not name a successor for Whitton's \$26,000-a-year post. In the AP interview, Whitton said the recently announced cut-back in the federal highway program and the impending switch of the Bureau of Public Roads to the new Department of Transportation had nothing to do with his decision to retire. He said he told Secretary of Commerce John F. Connor — the bureau is part of the Commerce Department — last January that he wanted to retire during 1966. His letter of resignation was dated Oct. 30, more than three weeks before the highway cut-back was ordered. "I want to quit while I'm still ahead of the game," Whitton said. He plans to live in a newly purchased house in Independence, Mo., and look after three pieces of farm land he owns in Jackson County. He also hopes to do some highway consulting work.

MAN IN CUSTODY

BODY FOUND
POCATELLO (AP) — A sledging outing for a Pocatello family Saturday ended in a snowbank far up a closed road—and this morning the father's frozen body was found by rescuers.

Bannock County Sheriff Hank Parker said the body of Richard Harman, 48, was found Sunday about a mile from where his car and family were stalled in a snowbank in Buckskin Basin, about 12 miles southeast of Pocatello.

Woman Heads Post Office In Germany

BERLIN (AP) — The "Light Cavalry" took charge of West Berlin's largest post office today, becoming the first postmistress in the West German postal system.

"Light Cavalry" is what her fellow workers call Eva Leitner, 41. She now bosses 346 men.

"I think I am the first woman to head a post office in Germany," the blue-eyed blonde told an interviewer.

She got her nickname, she said, "because of my quick slipping off the stone floors of the post office."

Then, too, when I started working in the office, I was really a lightweight—less than 100 pounds. Now I weigh 113 pounds.

She is also single, unmarried and lives with her 85-year-old father.

Viet Cong Use Variety Of Weapons

CHIAGO (AP) — Three Army doctors working in Vietnam said the Viet Cong are using a variety of weapons with everything from captured U.S. M16 rifles to bows and arrows.

Four of 1,180 patients treated in the 2nd Surgical Hospital during the first five months of 1966 had been shot with arrows, the physicians said.

Another "ancient" weapon which took many more casualties was the punt stick—a sharpened stick with a fire-hardened, contaminated point placed in the ground at an angle designed to puncture a soldier's foot.

There were 243 such wounds. The surgical team reported that in most cases, "punt sticks dislodge men about as long as small arms wounds."

The doctors found the bullet of the U.S. M16 rifle causes the most destructive wound to tissue.

Major Norman M. Rich, Major Edwin V. Johnson, Lt. Col. Francis D. Diamond Jr., of the U.S. Army Medical Corps, published their observations in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

T.F. Firm Makes Low Bid On Job

Asked the reasons for his dismissal, Hayer said, "They said I didn't make out reports and I told them they would have to start furnishing the paper for the reports. After 11 years, I got tired of supplying my own paper."

Producer, Raoul Levy, Shoots Self

SAINT-TROPEZ, France (AP) — For 15 minutes, the two young women waited fearfully for their film producer—Raoul Levy—pounded on their locked apartment door and begged to be let in. Then they heard a shot.

Opening the door and found him fatally wounded by a shotgun blast in the abdomen.

Police said the man who had made Brigitte Bardot an international star killed himself Saturday.

One of the women, Isabelle Pons, 23, the producer's blonde daughter, said she had asked Levy, 41, at lunch Saturday "to leave me alone. But he wouldn't listen to anything."

She said Levy again tried to speak to her as she and Linou Querou, a shopkeeper in this beach resort, walked to Miss Pons' apartment after lunch. She refused.

Police said Levy drove his sports car to a gunsmith, and rented—and loaded—a shotgun. "I'm going to get a handle," he told a friend who happened by. Miss Pons and her friend saw him drive up with the gun and locked the door in fear.

The two women had dined and visited night clubs with Levy the day before. Friends said Miss Pons had been recalcitrantly sought out by Levy's attentions. Levy's wife heard the news on the radio. She lives nearby with their 15-year-old son.

Two British Escapees Are Recaptured

ASHBURTON, England (AP) — Two more Dartmoor Christmas escapees were recaptured Saturday by the five who got away Dec. 28 from the bleak old prison on the moors; only one is now at large.

Three children gave the alarm and the capture of the Mark Owens, 32, and John Thompson, 23. The youngsters saw something moving in a stream, and called the police.

The capture was in keeping with the musical comedy atmosphere of the Christmas season escapes from jails all over Britain. During 1966 the number of escapes was 606. During the Christmas season 42 escaped. Most have either been captured or came back.

Kennedys Attend Mass In Antigua

ANTIGUA, B.W.I. (AP) — Mrs. John F. Kennedy, 9, and John, 6, attended Mass Sunday at a church about six miles from the home of their hosts, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mellon.

Mrs. Kennedy spent New Year's eve quietly at the Mellon home.

Mrs. Kennedy and her children, who arrived in Antigua Dec. 28, will leave Friday.

Businessman Dies

SEATTLE (AP) — Oliver David Fisher, founder of the Fisher Company, died Sunday in a key figure in several other Pacific Northwest enterprises, died Sunday at the age of 61.

Castro's 8 Years In Power Depicted As Slaughter Of Living Standards

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Fidel Castro's first eight years in Cuban refugee program including a daily airlift, adding "but the greatest cost— and Castro's greatest gain— lies in the human suffering which the airlift has brought to the island."

An 18-inch steel pin was inserted in the leg during a three-hour operation at Ohio State University's veterinary clinic Friday. Assisting Dr. Richard Rudy, assistant director of the clinic, and Dr. A. A. Gabel was Dr. K. Bhargana, a veterinarian from India.

Dr. Bhargana, author of a book on camels, is considered an expert on them.

Because of Clyde's youth, his chances of complete recovery are considered excellent.

Fire Engine Helps Flight Instructor Land His Plane

ELLINGTON, Conn. (AP) — There was nowhere I could go," said pilot Frank Robinson of Windsor Locks.

His small, angle-engine plane was about a dozen miles from Bradley International Airport in Windsor Locks Sunday night when his radio died.

"When that went out, so did my navigation," said Robinson, flight instructor and operator of Robinson Airways at Plainville Airport.

Clouds, ground fog and a freezing drizzle cut visibility to about 200 feet. Concerned officials at Bradley called state police.

Robinson, 38, banked his plane downward through the clouds and looked for a place to land.

Hyde Field, a small private airstrip, was nearby, but Robinson couldn't see it and didn't know it was there — it had no runway lights.

He spotted a house with lights on near a field and used it as a landmark. Then the lights went out and he lost his bearings.

Using precious fuel, he circled barely above the treetops.

Townpeople below heard the low-flying plane. They phoned the fire department and state police trooper Lionel Labreche, saying there was a plane in trouble somewhere in the woods and that it had narrowly missed several houses.

An alarm was relayed to the town's volunteer firemen. About 25 appeared at the landing strip with three fire engines.

"Dozens of townspeople drove to the airstrip to see what was happening. Firemen, Labreche and airport official Robert Hyde told them, 'Keep going and line up alongside the fire engines and shine your lights on the field.'"

The landing strip began to glow from the revolving red lights, spotlights, car headlights and even flashlights.

Above, Robinson caught sight of a speeding fire engine, its red light spanning. Thinking it might be meant for him, he followed it to the strip, where Hyde was signaling with a flashlight.

Robinson had to make several approaches to the strip because a car parked at the end of it kept blinding him with its headlights. Finally the car moved.

About 30 minutes after he had lost his radio, Robinson landed his plane without a scratch.

2 Drugs May Cause Birth Deformities

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Food and Drug Administration has added two more antiasthmatics — buclizine and hydroxyzine — to its list of drugs having the potential for causing birth deformities.

The Washington Post reported Sunday night the FDA had added the drugs to its list already containing meprobamate, cyclozine and chlorcyclizine. The products, using buclizine and hydroxyzine are sold by prescription only.

"The new additions to the FDA list are manufactured by Chas. Pfizer & Co. Inc. and its J. B. Rogg & Co. Division, and by the Stuart Co., a division of Atlas Chemical Industries, Inc.

At the FDA's request, the newspaper said, the manufacturers sent letters to physicians last May warning that products containing buclizine and hydroxyzine should not be used by women in pregnancy.

According to the letters, doses substantially above the human therapeutic range of buclizine caused abnormalities in pregnant rats and similar doses of

hydroxyzine caused abnormalities in pregnant mice, rats and rabbits.





 Some deep colored garnets are found in the Czechoslovakian area and are the chief attraction of the present jewelry still sold in Prague. Clear stones have been furnished by Ceylon, and some good stones have been found in Virginia.
 The garnet gems that are best adapted to jewelry are various shades of red, although the others furnish us with a wide and interesting range of color. 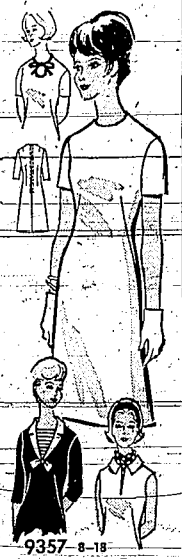

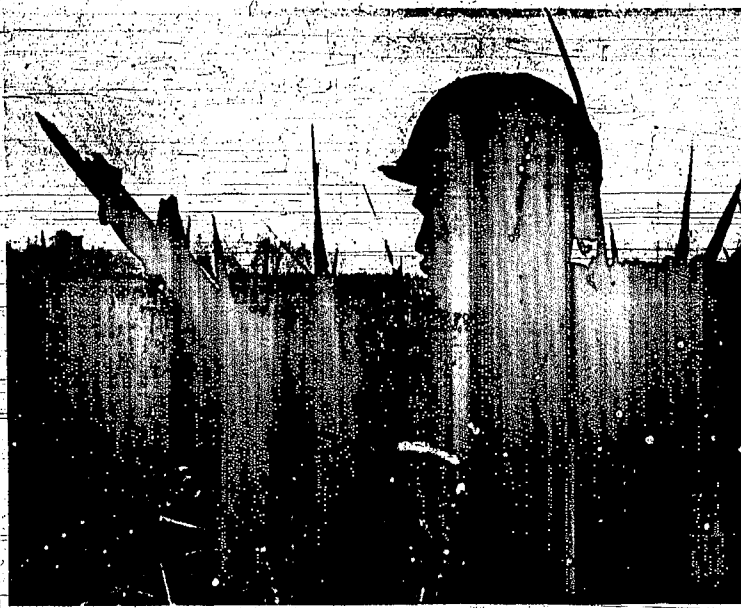

Q. Isn't it about time to enlighten the suckers as to how dividends are paid? If I deposit \$5,000 in a bank at four percent interest, at the end of a year I still have the \$5,000 plus \$200 less, I gain nothing.

But, if I buy 100 shares of stock at \$50 a share and sit with it for a year (while it drops to \$33 a share) what happens when it finally pays a \$2 a share dividend? It goes ex-dividend and automatically drops \$2 a share. I get a \$200 dividend check but my stock is worth \$200 less. I gain nothing.

A. Come on now. Fess up. What's the real reason you are blowing your stack? Is it the dividend procedure — which you should have known about — all along? Or is it the fact that your stock has taken a tumble in price — a sad experience shared by many investors this year?

Putting money into stock is not the same as putting it into an interest-bearing bank account. Your bank account makes you a creditor of the bank — which pays you interest out of its earnings.

When you buy stock, you become a part owner of a company. Each share of stock represents a fraction of ownership in the company. The company has total assets of a certain number of dollars — millions or billions. The value of each share is that total value divided by the number of shares outstanding.

Market values of stock, of course, can rise or fall — depending on buying and selling demand. No one is silly enough to claim that day-to-day market prices are pre-emptive measure-

ments of the true value of a company and its assets. Dividends — payments — are precise. When a company pays its profits to stockholders — the proceeds winds up with less money. The company then has less value and each share of stock is worth less.

— This is all adjusted for inflation ex-dividend procedure. The stock goes "ex" (without dividend) normally at the opening of trading on the third business day before the record date for payment of the dividend.

When it goes ex-dividend, the amount of the dividend is automatically deducted from the market value of the stock. Then, if the company prospers, it becomes worth more — as its profits roll in. That increases the company's real value and often results in higher prices for its stock. Very often the market value of a stock will move right back up after the ex-dividend adjustment takes place.

That, however, doesn't happen all the time. In a period of falling stock prices, it may not happen for a long time. You found that out, didn't you?

Q. I attended a seminar on financial planning and the speaker said that savings and loan association insurance is no protection against loss. I am 70 and cannot afford to lose the money I have in my S&L account. What do you know about this?

A. I would like to know what that speaker was selling. It's clear that he was straying from the straight and narrow truth. This is a subject many, many

Rockefeller Begins His Third Term

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Republican Nelson A. Rockefeller formally began his third term as governor of New York today by dedicating his devotion to building what he called "a just society."

Today's inaugural ceremony was staged in the Assembly chamber at the state Capitol to fulfill tradition. Actually, Rockefeller had taken his third-term oath at a private ceremony three days earlier in New York City.

At that time, he repeated the declaration he had made repeatedly during his uphill fight for re-election — that he never again would seek his party's presidential nomination.

In offering the "just society" concept, he said:

"And I sense the purpose — high purpose — because I have full faith in our capacity for creativity — our common resolve with God's help to build together the dream of free men of all ages: a just society."

"This," he continued, "is the dream of a society where government is courageous, power is benign, learning is abundant, prosperity is general, order is serene, law is honored, compassion is practical and brotherhood is lived."

He concluded: "It is our splendid task to make this society no dream at all — but the world for our children to live in."

Turning to the federal aid issue, Rockefeller said experience showed the federal government was too removed from local problems to dictate how federal money should be spent.

In criticizing what he called a recent "multiplication of inadequately financed domestic federal programs," Rockefeller said he was not disparaging the "high purpose" of such efforts.

The problem is, he said, that the federal government is by passing "state leadership and ability to act as a guide and catalyst." That, he said, "is both wasteful and self-defeating" and is "creating an increasingly chaotic condition" in administering such programs.

Moon Mullican Dies Of Seizure

BEAUMONT, Tex. (AP) — Moon Mullican, a pioneer star of the Grand Ole Opry and "king of hillbilly piano players," died Sunday after a heart attack.

Mullican, 57, had just finished recording an album.

Born Aubrey Mullican in Corrigan in Polk County of East Texas, he had been known as Moon since he made his first record in 1931.

Two Republican Senators Forecast War Will Run Into 1968

By JACK BELL, WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Republican senators, who support President Johnson's objectives in Vietnam, forecast today the war will run into 1968 with a telling political impact.

Sen. Jack R. Miller, R-Iowa, said he thinks that unless the end of the war is in sight by mid-1968, "President Johnson will neither be the Democratic nominee nor the next president."

Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R-S.D., a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said in a separate interview that what he called a "contradictory and confusing conflict" now seems likely to enhance GOP chances of capturing the presidency.

Miller, who won a new six-year term in November, suggested that perhaps Johnson might decide to retire. He said that if the president doesn't, "I'd expect Bobby Kennedy to be dragged, kicking and screaming, into the nomination in the cause of saving the Democratic party."

Reminded that it was difficult to defeat a president seeking re-nomination and that Johnson's record was not one of quitting under fire, Miller replied, "But he's never been under the kind of fire he's under now."

Mundt said the war in Vietnam has so many contradictions about it that the voters are in a quandary. He said U.S. grain sales to the Soviet Union had been answered with the Soviet supply of additional MIG fighters to North Vietnam.

He asked, "Did you ever see a war in which we forced an election to choose a government to supersede one with which we had been cooperating with in the fighting?"

"Did you ever see a war in which we ploughed ahead during the fighting with an aid program, digging ditches on one side of the road and blowing up everything on the other side?"

Mundt said another contradiction permits the North Vietnamese supply port of Haiphong to go un-bombed while air strikes are carried out on highway and rail supply lines.

Miller said U.S. bombing attacks should be intensified on military targets despite the uproar over civilian casualties.

"We ought to tell the North Vietnamese we are going to strike all the military targets, including their aircraft carrier placements, and warn them to move their civilians away from such areas," he said.

In a television interview Sunday, Secretary of State Dean Rusk said Washington would welcome assurances that a cessation of U.S. bombing attacks would not result in a flow

of military strength from North Vietnam to South Vietnam.

He suggested that U.N. Secretary-General U Thant try to learn what concessions North Vietnam would be willing to make in return for a halt of the American aerial attacks.

Asked on the CBS television radio program "Face the Nation" about Thant's request that the United States stop bombing a step toward peace, Rusk said his second point was a mutual de-escalation of violence by both sides. So far as we know, he has nothing in his briefcase as far as we're concerned, will be able to probe the other side to find out what the effect would be if we were to stop the bombing.

Waterfowl Counts Is Set For Jan. 3-8

BOISE (AP) — The State Fish and Game Department said Sunday the annual winter waterfowl inventory would be conducted in Idaho Jan. 3-8 to coincide with a continent-wide count of migratory ducks and geese.

Participating in the annual count will be 45 Fish and Game Department and U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service workers, who will be ground and aerial observers.

Rare trumpeter swans will be counted in the inventory, which usually turns up about 500,000 ducks, the department said.

Peak duck movement into Idaho, according to the department, was near the end of November in 1966, and recent counts had shown about 90 per cent of the ducks to still be in Idaho — at Deer Flat and American Falls reservoirs.

Workers in the United States and Canada will participate at the same time, with the Mexican inventory coming at a later date.

Schroer suffered a knee injury in Tech's loss to Georgia at the end of the season and has been unable to regain his speed since.

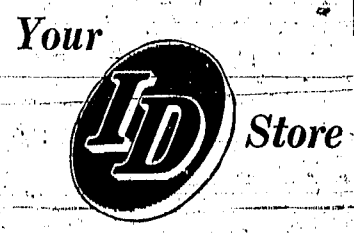

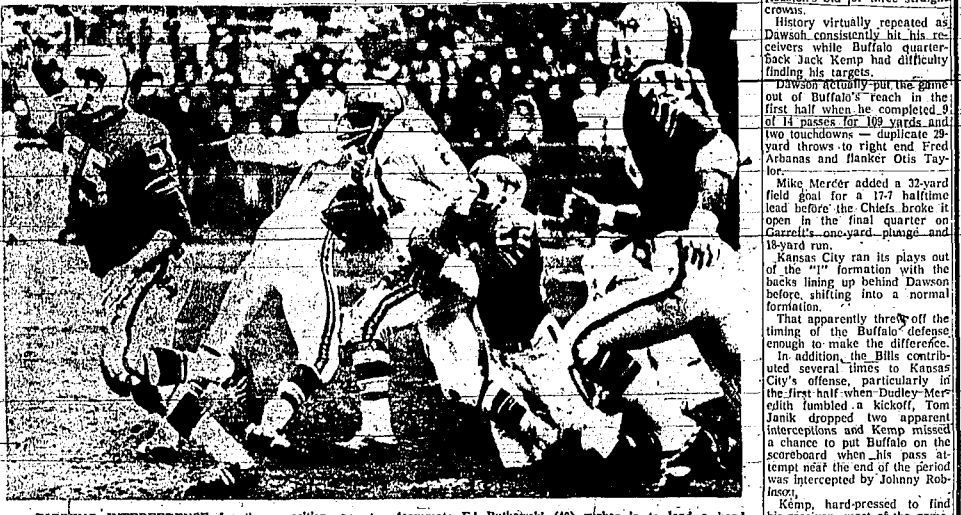

Coach Tells How To Stop Lew Alcindor

EDITORS NOTE: Everyone in college basketball is asking, "How are you doing to stop Lew Alcindor?" He's the 7-foot-10 sophomore star for UCLA's No. 1 team in The Associated Press poll. Ken Mink of the Bristol Virginian-Tennessean provides an answer in the following story.

For information on how to break a team featuring Lew Alcindor, contact Coach Morgan Wooten, DeMatha High School, Hyattsville, Md.

Wooten is coach of the team that handed a Lew Alcindor-featured team its last loss.

Alcindor last played in a losing game near the end of the 1964-65 season when his Power Memorial Academy team of New York City had its 71-game winning streak halted by Wooten's DeMatha team 46-43.

DeMatha held Lew to 10 points in that game, played before a standing-room-only crowd of 13,000 at the University of Maryland's Cole Fieldhouse.

What strategy did Wooten use?

"I put a 6-9 man in front of him and a 6-8 man behind him," explained Wooten. "I then assigned my best defensive player to Power's best guard and kept pressure on him all the way to keep him from feeding Lew. The idea worked pretty good... I only got the ball 11 times."

Does Wooten think similar strategy might prove effective against the 7-foot-10 Alcindor now?

"I would suggest that one of the defensive big men struggle a baseball bat in his Jersey someplace," quipped Wooten. "I always said Lew was the greatest even as a high school or—and he's playing a lot better now."

Jack Kuhnert, former Power Memorial Academy basketball coach who succeeded Jack DeMatino, now head coach at Holy Cross, says Power's head man, also said Alcindor has improved as a college.

"Lew seems a lot more aggressive now. He's doing a lot of things now that he didn't do in high school. He often seemed lincidental in high school. Of course, he didn't have to work too hard in high school. The better competition is making him play better."

After leading Power to 71 straight wins, Alcindor currently is riding another wicket. Power won the rest of the season undefeated after the DeMatino loss. Alcindor then paced the UCLA freshman to an undefeated season last year and guided the varsity Bruins to a 3-0 start this year.

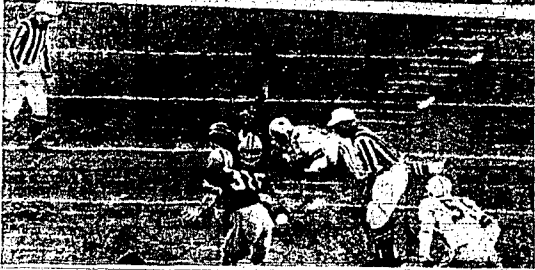

Starr's Passing, Brown's Stolen Pass Gives Green Bay 10th Title

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Bart Starr's four touchdown passes gave Green Bay its 10th National Football League title with a 34-7 victory over the Dallas Cowboys Sunday and moved the Packers into the rich Super Bowl game at the Cotton Bowl in Dallas.

The exciting comeback threatened to send the title game into sudden death overtime. The chance of a tie arose when Dan Chandler's conversion attempt after the fifth Packer touchdown went awry, apparently blocked by Bob Lilly. Instead of leading 35-20, that made it 34-20.

A quick 83-yard TD strike from Meredith to Frank Clark closed the gap to seven points and a desperate, short, 15-yard punt by Chandler gave the Cowboys another shot at it in the final seconds.

The crowd was stunned by two quick Green Bay touchdowns within 12 seconds in the first quarter to thrill the gallant comeback by the Cowboys to tie the score at 14-14.

Although Don Perkins and Dan Reeves chewed out yards against the vaunted Packer defense, it was a case of too much Starr as Green Bay pulled away to win about \$6,000 a man.

The victory put the Packers into the Jan. 15 Super Bowl at the Los Angeles Coliseum, where a winner is guaranteed \$15,000 a man and a loser \$7,500. The Cowboys got about \$6,000 each for their losing effort.

Starr hit Elijah Pitts with a 15-yard TD pass, connected with Carroll Dale with a 45-yarder and then hit Boyd Dowler from the 16 and Max McGee from the 28 to back up his claims to the most valuable player title in the NFL.

The other Packer touchdown came in the first period as Mel Renfro fumbled the kickoff when hit by Bob Brown, and rookie Jim Grabowski picked up the ball and ran 18 for the score. It came only 12 seconds after Starr had hit Pitts with his first TD pass.

The Cowboys put on sustained matches late in the first period, Reeves crashing home from the three and Perkins driving across from the 23.
