Demands Reiterated By Premier Dong

NEW YORK (AP) — Premier Pham Van Dong of Communist North Vietnam says his government's four-point demands in the Vietnam war are not necessarily conditions for peace talks but rather a "basis of settlement of the Vietnam problem," the New York Times reported from Hanoi today. The Hanoi premier's statement, in an interview with correspondent Harrison E. Salisbury, raised speculation that North Vietnam had shifted in some measure from a hard-line policy to a more flexible one.

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Virtual Agreement On Committees Smooths Way For 39th Legislature

BOISE (AP) — Virtual agreement was reported today on the lineup of committees for Idaho's 39th Legislature, thus smoothing the way for the beginning of lawmaking activities. Leaders said they hoped to have committee assignments completed before nightfall so introduction of bills can begin. In both the House and Senate, leaders said there appeared little support for a recommendation of a Legislative Council Committee that the number of committees be cut in half.

Noted British Speedster Dies In Hydroplane Crash

CONISTON, England (AP) — Donald Campbell, Britain's most noted speedster on land and water, crashed to his death at 310 miles an hour today in an attempt to break his own world water speed record.

His jet hydroplane Bluebird leaped from the surface of Lake Coniston, exploded and sank.

Witnesses abandoned hope for Campbell almost as soon as he was seen on the water. Campbell's oxygen mask and bits of his clothing were found floating.

He had said he would quit when he topped 300 miles per hour. His two-year-old record was 276.3 miles per hour.

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Unarmed Missile Veers Off Course Into Gulf Of Mexico

WASHINGTON (AP) — An unarmed Air Force missile fired in a test from Florida veered off its scheduled course into the Gulf of Mexico and presumably sputtered over Cuba, the Pentagon said today. A terse Defense Department announcement said the surface-to-air missile carried no warhead. The weapon, undergoing research and development tests, was launched at 10 a.m. EST from the Air Force proving ground at Eglin AFB, Fla., the Pentagon said.

Dedication Set For New Educational Wing At T.F. First Baptist Church

A new educational wing will be dedicated Sunday at the Twin Falls First Baptist Church. Featured speaker for the event will be Dr. R. Eugene Crow, Los Angeles, who served the local congregation as pastor for five years. Dr. Crow will address the 11 a.m. service and also will speak at a fellowship dinner at 6:30 p.m.

Other guests who will be introduced at the informal evening service will include the contractor, Earl Peck; architect, Neil Kolbo, Nampa; Raymond Holland, Lewiston, president of Pacific Empire Life Insurance Co., which financed the addition. The new wing provides fifteen additional meeting and classroom-in-the-three-floors-62-by-52 feet and was built at a cost of \$101,000. Clyde VanAusdin served as chairman of the building committee for the church.

Dr. Crow, who currently serves as director of the Division of Church and Community Witness of the Southern California Baptist Convention, will be returning for the first time since he closed his ministry in Twin Falls in 1958. He was formerly area director of evangelism for the American Baptist Home Mission Society for the states of Idaho, Utah and Montana, leading in evangelism and stewardship programs as well as camps, conferences and conventions.

He has served the Seminary as a visiting lecturer in evangelism and as an instructor in psychology. Drought Feared In East Oregon

PORTLAND (AP) — Despite heavier than usual rain and snow in Eastern Oregon, the region is not assured of escaping another drought next summer.

W. T. Frost, federal snow survey expert, said snow will have to pile up 25 per cent higher than usual in the mountains to save the region.

The drought emptied reservoirs and resulted in a large section of Eastern Oregon being declared a disaster area last year.

Frost said the reservoirs still are far short of desired storage.

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Thai Hasn't Set Decision On War Aid

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Deputy Premier Prapas Charusathien said today that the Thai government has not taken a final decision to send combat troops to South Vietnam.

Prapas told his weekly news conference his government may decide to send fighters to South Vietnam "today, tomorrow or next month," but at this moment the decision has not been taken yet.

He added that the National Security Council is now considering the matter and is taking into account the Communist threat to Thailand before reaching a decision. Prapas is deputy chairman of the council and commander in chief of the Thai army.

The government-controlled Bangkok radio said Tuesday that Thailand would send about 1,000 combat troops to South Vietnam. The text of the commentary was published in local papers today with additional comments attributed to Thai officials reported in it.

An unnamed high military officer was quoted as saying the government was "making preparations" to send a combat force to South Vietnam. But he added: "As to when we will send our troops, this will depend upon consultations with the authorities of South Vietnam and the United States." He said a formal request from the Saigon government for Thai troops was awaited.

Prapas said the National Security Council is considering whether it would be better to concentrate on preventing Communist insurgency from spreading within Thailand or to put down a Communist uprising outside the country before it reaches Thailand's borders.

10th Satellite Discovered About Saturn

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Astronomers have discovered a 10th satellite circling Saturn just outside the rings that are its trademark.

The satellite apparently is the closest to the planet and the rings, collections of particles that reflect light.

The Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory said the satellite is between 180 and 200 miles in diameter, but not visible to the naked eye on earth.

Saturn, about 71,500 miles in diameter, is some 88,700 miles from the earth. Its largest ring is 170,000 miles in diameter.

Dr. Audin Dollfus of the Paris Observatory reported to the Smithsonian Tuesday that he had discovered the satellite Dec. 15, but confirmation was withheld until a second sighting was reported.

That came from R. L. Walker, of the U.S. Naval Observatory in Flagstaff, Ariz., who said he spotted the satellite on a photographic plate taken Dec. 18.

The satellite is the first to be found circling Saturn since 1898.

Production Of Mining Reported

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Coeur d'Alene Mining Region produced most of Idaho's gold, silver, copper, lead and zinc in 1967, the Bureau of Mines reported today.

That region had 16 productive lode mines of the 63 in the state. Idaho also had seven placer mines in 1967. None of them were in the Coeur d'Alene region.

Idaho's mines produced 5,550 tons of lead in October, down from 5,800 tons in September, the bureau reported. Mine output of lead by all states increased about 1,000 tons to 28,000.

Deadline For Auto-Plates Is Jan. 18

Between 7,000 and 8,000 passenger vehicles in Twin Falls County are still unlicensed for 1967, County Assessor Clifford Thompson said Tuesday.

Deadline for display of the 1967 plates is Jan. 18, Thompson said. This means some purchasers will likely have to stand in line if they plan to drive after the deadline.

Approximately 15,000 passenger vehicles are licensed in the county, Mr. Thompson said, and only about half of the plates have been sold.

He urged motorists to make their purchases as soon as possible.

Pocatello Man Killed In Utah

CENTERVILLE, Utah (AP) — A Pocatello, Idaho, man was killed in a car-train crash Tuesday night just off U. S. Highway 91 near Centerville.

The Utah Highway Patrol identified the victim as Noel Dee Dunn, 22, who was alone in the vehicle.

The accident happened about 3:30 p. m. at the Parrish Lane crossing of Union Pacific's tracks. Patrolmen said Dunn was traveling on a dirt road paralleling the tracks and turned east directly into the path of a passenger train traveling north.

Gov. Babecek Proposes Sales Tax

Fires Noted

BOSTON (AP)—Fire caused approximately 12,100 deaths and some \$1.8 billion in property loss during 1966, preliminary figures by the National Fire Protection Association showed today.

The estimated death toll was up some 100 over the 1965 total and apparently equaled the record high of 12,100 set in 1954, the NFPA said.

Should the property loss total be final, the NFPA said, it will be an all-time high. The previous record of \$1.78 billion was recorded in 1963.

The first victims included about 2,100 children, the NFPA reported.

Marine Says Prayer Saved His Life

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Pvt. Ramon Escalera, the Marine who had a live rifle grenade removed from his throat, says he credits prayer with helping to bring him through his ordeal in Vietnam.

Escalera, being treated at San Diego Naval Hospital for wounds suffered in a battle near Da Nang Dec. 20.

He said Tuesday his patrol had been sent out to help another patrol which had been ambushed and that he thinks he saw the Communist guerrilla who fired the rifle grenade at him.

"He was on the other side of a stream beside the road," he said. "I didn't shoot at him because he was wearing an American-style helmet."

Escalera, 20, of Los Angeles was helped by two hospital corpsmen after being hit in the throat and leg.

"I just lay there choking and tried to keep breathing. I thought I wouldn't make it. I thought I would choke to death. But the corpsman told me to pray to God and I did," he said.

Escalera said he waited about four hours before an evacuation helicopter removed him to a hospital in Da Nang, where the grenade was removed. He said he didn't know at the time he was carrying a live explosive in his throat.

"When I woke up from surgery and found myself sitting there I was so happy that right away I gave the doctor and his staff the biggest thank-you you could—I was so glad to be alive," he said.

Lt. Cmdr. James Chandler of San Francisco was the surgeon who removed the grenade from Escalera's throat. A demolition team exploded the projectile.

They said it probably would have killed anyone in the operating room had it exploded there.

Escalera is now breathing through a hole in his throat. His jaws have been wired together as part of the repair job. To speak, he places his finger over the hole in his throat to direct air past his vocal cords.

"I'm feeling pretty good now," he said.

Couple Finds Loophole In Marriage Law

WASHINGTON (AP)—A young graduate of the U.S. had a honeymoon madp possible by their last-minute scramble through a loophole in Maryland law against racially mixed marriages.

Mrs. Manuel R. Lopez of West Hyattsville, Md., and Sally Swartz of Annapolis in Maryland, used a marriage license last Friday because Lopez' father, Cornelio Lopez, a Washington lawyer, is Filipino.

The young couple was informed he does not qualify for a marriage license under a Maryland statute which bars marriages between whites and Negroes or persons of Negro descent to the third generation inclusive and between whites and members of the Malay race.

"I hated to do it," said Deputy Court Clerk William Gray, who issued the denial of license, "but I only work here."

Most Entries Since 1960 Set For Show

DENVER, Colo.—The largest number of carload livestock entries in seven years will be assembled for the 81st annual National Western Stock Show Jan. 13-21, according to show general manager Willard Simms.

The 187 entries, which closed Dec. 15, are the most since 208 carload exhibits were judged at the 1960 National Western.

Included in the 1967 carload entries are 62 carloads of bulls, 49 carloads of feeder cattle, 20 carloads in the fed beef contest, 4 carloads and 12 truckloads of sheep and 10 carloads of goats.

The "show loads" of bulls include 78 Hereford and 16 Angus.

Although the Hereford breed has dominated the National Western carload bull show in the past, the Angus entries have shown a considerable increase in the last two years, Simms said.

The bull carloads come to Denver from 11 states—Colorado, Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, Wyoming, Texas, Michigan, New York, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

The bull entries are the largest since 1953 when 104 carload exhibits were judged. Last January there were 87 loads in the bull division.

Feeder cattle from 1966 and fed beef contest carloads are down two from a year ago.

Sheep loads are up two and goat loads are down one compared to last January.

In the carload division judging, Hereford bulls will be rated on the afternoons of Jan. 14 and 15, while Angus bulls are on the afternoon of Jan. 14.

Feeder cattle carloads will be judged on the afternoon of Jan. 16 and the morning of Jan. 17.

Tropical Summer, With Its Torments, Settles On Famous Copacabana Beach

By CLAUDE E. ERBSEN
RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP)—Down here, with the seasons reversed, tropical summer with all its torments is settling on the famous beach called Copacabana.

More than 250,000 persons flock into the strip of land behind a crescent of sand which swelter and curse the heat; the noise, the dirt and the lack of public services.

But most of them wouldn't move. If they did, thousands more are waiting to move into what may be the most crowded suburb in Latin America.

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Copacabana is built on a narrow strip between sea and mountains. It is 2 1/2 miles long and seldom more than five blocks wide. Residents and visitors jam its 2.4 square miles.

Those who live there pay as much as \$1,500 a month for a beachside apartment. This doesn't guarantee them either water or electricity. Both have been in chronic short supply in Copacabana.

More modest housing is available behind the beach. Families of five or six crowd into tiny two-bedroom apartments just for the status of a Copacabana address.

More than a quarter of Copacabana's residents live in the squalid shantytown "Favelas" precariously perched on hills overlooking the beach. They have neither water, nor sewage facilities, but the view is great.

The eight per cent of Copacabana residents who earn more than \$500 monthly give the area its glitter.

Copacabana boasts Rio's highest traffic accident rate, and one of the city's highest noise levels.

It is short on schools, and residents complain that the city is cutting into already inadequate parks and squares to build a tourist information center and other public buildings.

Recent surveys focus attention on the suburb's attractions and shortcomings.

"The entire area should be transformed," said architect Marcos Konder Netto, a Copacabana resident. "Obsolete buildings should be replaced with parks, and garage buildings should be put up."

Dramatist Carlos Uricuri, another resident, says Copacabana is simply "a large and comfortable slum."

Q. Our daughter, 13, is a devotee of William Shakespeare. She can't get into all the purchase certificates at a fine bookstore.

It appears to make her seem more childish than she is. Our attempts to widen her literary horizons have all failed. How do you suggest that we try to achieve this? M.H.R.

A. Panelists: Gayle Dana, college, Wyoming; Catherine Grant, college, Maine; Linda Melder, Montana; Russell Sangren, college, Tennessee.

No teen-ager wants to be told what to read in his leisure time. He, or she, of course, is told in school what to read, and in Sunday school, but these are in preparation for their future careers. However, we do not feel that you have any reason to be disturbed, and that you should make no effort at this time to bring pressure on her to read more than she is already familiar with.

It seems to us that a great part of the intelligence we gain comes from what we read. Educators tell us that today it is essential for young people to develop good reading habits. Your daughter has evidently accomplished this and she will probably continue it if she is not given a list of what to read. Let her read the things she wants to read as long as they are acceptable literature.

Many of us who read Shakespeare do not properly understand his language. If your daughter understands it, you should be very happy and contented about what she reads.

In reading, as in eating, a constant diet will eventually lose its appeal. When this occurs with your daughter, your job will be to see to it that she does not lose her interest in literature. Has she started her very own library? There is a young lady about the age of your daughter who was surprised a

year ago at Christmas to get a series of bookcases and some purchase certificates at a fine bookstore.

She had not previously been much concerned with literature and reading, but after receiving the nice bookcases, she soon became intensely interested in a wide field of literature and explored all of it that she could.

You know better than we if your daughter is ready for her own library. If she is, you give her the bookcases and let her choose her own books. With the bookcases, get her a good dictionary, an encyclopedia, and a few adventure books. That may take care of her transition period.

If your daughter has no eye trouble or reading faults, you may want her to find her own way in literature. Whatever you do, don't push her, but give her whatever encouragement she may need.

Nationalist Flags Hoisted In Macao

MACAO (AP) — Anti-Communist labor unions hoisted Nationalist Chinese flags in Macao today in defiance of an order from the colony's Portuguese government.

The tiny six-square-mile colony on Red China's doorstep was quiet but apprehensive. Many of its 275,000 people feared the Nationalist flags would lead to rioting between militant Communists and Nationalist Chinese.

The order forbade flying flags of any nation which Red China considers an enemy. It also forbade activities which Red China considered to be conducted by enemies of Peking and inimical to the interests of the Communist mainland.

Peking has long contended that the Nationalist Chinese use Macao as a base for subversion and sabotage.

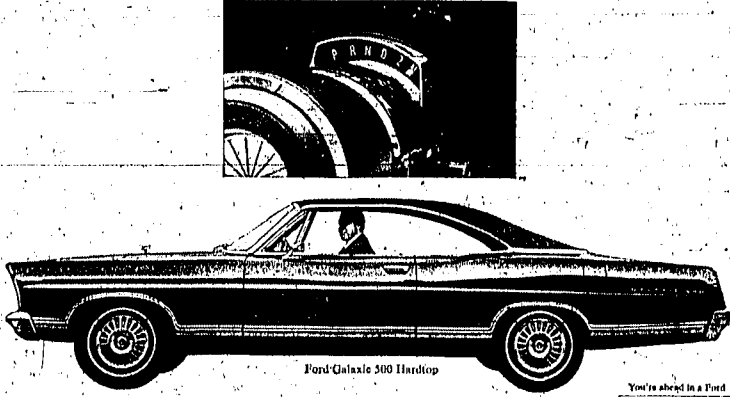
Yugoslavia Official Dies In Car Wreck

BELGRADE - Yugoslavia (AP) - Boris Krajer, 53, vice premier of Yugoslavia and a member of the Presidium of the Communist party, was killed early today when his car skidded on the icy Zagreb-Belgrade highway and hit a tree.
 Krajer's elder son, Janecz, was also killed and his younger son was injured. They were en route to Belgrade after spending the New Year holiday in Krajer's native Slovenia.
 Krajer, before World War II, studied in Ljubljana and because of political activities was sentenced to 2 1/2 years in prison. He joined Marshal Tito's partisans in 1941 but in May 1942 was captured and taken to a concentration camp in Italy. He escaped and rejoined the partisan forces.
 After the war he was minister of interior of Slovenia and later became vice premier of the federal government.
 Krajer was one of the most prominent engineers of the current economic reform program.

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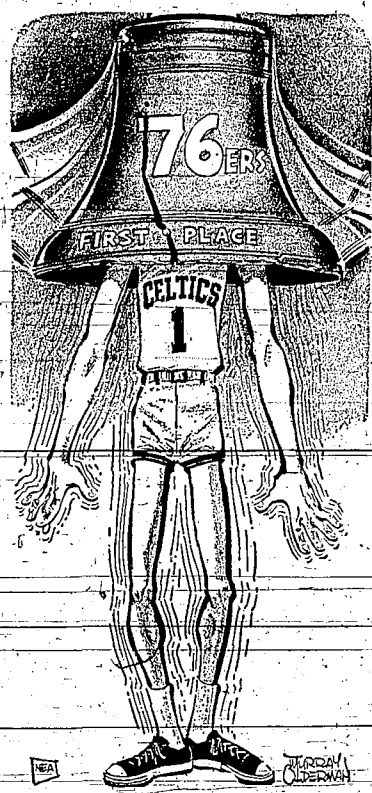

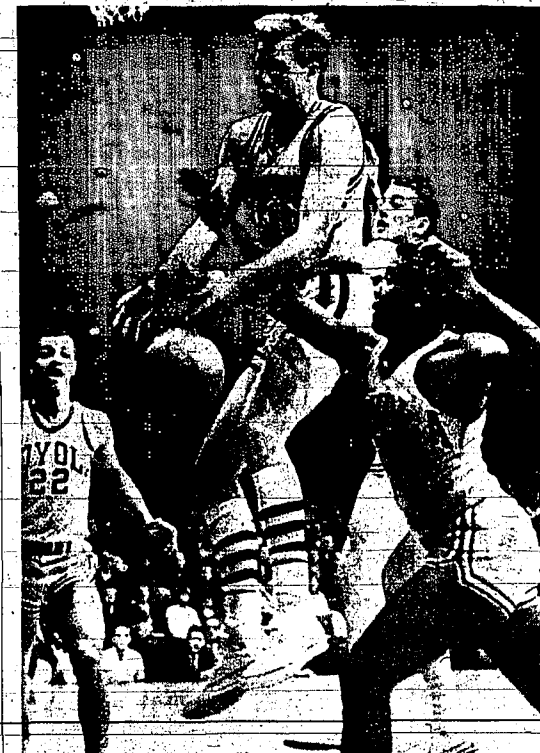

First Problem—Joint Or Separate Return?

There are rare instances where separate returns by a husband and wife may produce a greater savings than on a joint return.

But in the great majority of cases, a joint return—because of its lower tax rates—is the more economical.

Exceptions to the general rule occur where husband and wife each have an unusually high medical expenses or capital losses.

Since medical expenses for taxpayers under 65 are not deductible until after they exceed 2 per cent of income, it is apparent that a separate return by the party having a lower income would produce a bigger medical deduction.

It must be remembered that when one spouse itemizes his return the other must also itemize instead of taking the 10 per cent or the minimum standard deduction.

When a medical deduction is claimed on a separate return care must be taken to see that payment of the medical expenses is made by the spouse's own funds. Payments made by check on a separate return account for instance, will be assumed to have been paid one-half by each spouse.

The only way to make sure of a savings on separate returns is to try both methods and then file the one which saves you the most money. When separate returns are made, each partner must list all of his own income.

The exception is in so-called community property states where all earned income and all income received from property acquired after marriage is treated as community income with half belonging to each spouse.

If a husband and wife each had capital losses on investments last year they may be able to obtain greater advantage of their losses on separate returns.

On a joint return they must first use the losses to offset capital gains and if any loss remains they may apply \$1,000 of it as a write-off against other income. On separate returns they each could get full advantage of the \$1,000 reduction against other income after first reducing their gains.

A lesser opportunity for savings on separate returns occurs where a husband and wife each had income under \$5,000 and use the automatic tax tables instead of itemizing deductions. Sometimes the combined tax on separate returns using this

method is less than the tax on a joint return. In such instances the savings generally is less than \$3.

Egyptologist Tells Theory Of Nile Area

CAIRO (AP)—Ancient Saqqara on the Nile may have been place for miracles in healing. That is the theory of Walter B. Emery, a leading Egyptologist who has explored the site since 1934.

He believes Saqqara, south of Cairo, is the site of the tomb of "the Leonardo of Egypt." This was Imhotep, designer of the Step pyramid, at 4,600 years the oldest standing stone monument in the world.

Imhotep, says Emery, "was a genius. He was truly the Leonardo da Vinci of ancient Egypt—an administrator, architect, philosopher and physician."

The ancient Greeks deified Imhotep and made him the god of medicine. "He became known as a great healer," Emery says, "in his time, he practiced medical techniques which were equaled and surpassed only in the 17th century in the modern era. Under his direction, Egyptian physicians practiced brain surgery and even effected balm treatments for cancer. In the Greek and Roman era, students came from all over Europe to learn from the Egyptians who practiced under Imhotep and his descendants."

The name and the halt also came from all over Europe after Imhotep was buried near what had become a great medical school he founded.

Emery discovered other tombs of the first, second and third dynasty kings in the Saqqara area, a sandy promontory overlooking the verdant farms of the Nile delta. The site is dominated by the Step pyramid, which Imhotep designed as a tomb for the third dynasty King Zoser.

Emery, on the basis of his long research in the area, is convinced that Imhotep's shrine-tomb lies nearby.

"Later tombs of nobles and kings were built on this site, all of them underground in terraces that constantly shifts and is dangerous," Emery says. "Yet, only a few hundred yards to the west there is a natural rock, which would be a most suitable place for a tomb. There must have been a reason for the tombs to be built on the shifting terrain, despite the danger."

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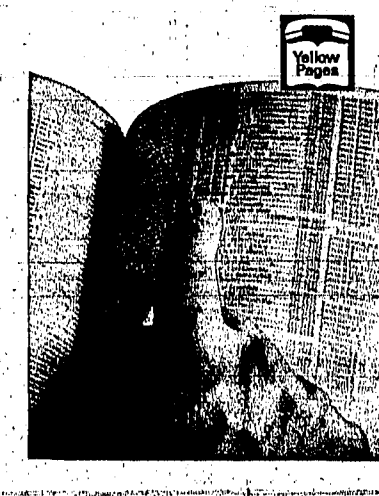

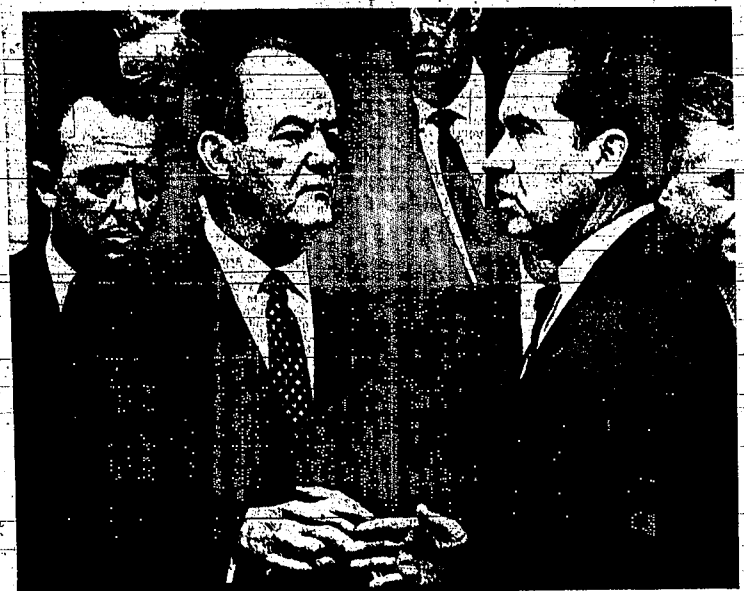

To Death, Ruby Denied Conspiracy

EDITOR'S NOTE—If Jack Ruby hadn't killed Lee Harvey Oswald, there might be little or no controversy today about the assassination of John F. Kennedy. But Jack Ruby ended any possible Oswald testimony, and he is his own death approached, begged the world to believe what many find it hard to believe, that he was part of a conspiracy to silence Oswald. Here is a report on Jack Ruby's last days.

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Jack Ruby denied it to the edge of his teeth even his family couldn't ask, because so many other people seemed to be asking, whether he really acted alone and not as part of a conspiracy, to kill the accused assassin of President John F. Kennedy.

And so, near the end, Earl Ruby asked his brother again as he had many times before: "Are you sure, Jack, there was nothing else?"

Jack Ruby answered, says his brother: "I'm not hiding anything. I'm not protecting anybody. There is nothing to hide, no one to protect. Believe me."

As he lay in his guarded room in Parkland Memorial Hospital, stricken with cancer, Jack Ruby often seemed to be begging the world to believe he would take no secrets to the grave.

He also was tormented by hallucinations in which he imagined that millions of American Jews were being slain in a program as punishment because he, a Jew, silenced the alleged killer of a president.

Ruby could be rational on certain levels and wholly irrational on others, according to those closest to him. For example, he might be speaking of a Godball game on television and something would touch him off—like a penalty. Worse is being done to the Jews, he would say, without plan or prompting, shot Lee Harvey Oswald.

"He swore that rumors of his masses will be conducted in the conference room of the killing of Dallas policeman J. D. Tippit and the slaying of Oswald," he said.

"I'm not a Jew," he said, "I'm a Jew."

These details of Ruby's last days came from his brother, Earl Ruby, a Detroit businessman, Elmer Gertz, a Chicago attorney prominent on the legal team which won reversal of the death sentence given to Ruby in 1964.

Ruby insisted that he acted alone in shooting Oswald—a slaying that was witnessed by a television audience of millions of Americans Sunday, Nov. 24, 1963.

But a broiling controversy about the Warren Report has produced various theories of conspiracies—some of which give Ruby a hidden role.

"He simply could not conceive that people could not see that he not only acted alone but that they could take this and twist it into a premise for giving him a role in a plot against the President, a man he worshipped," Gertz said.

Jack Ruby sought no forgiveness for shooting Oswald, Gertz explained.

"I don't think Jack mentioned his name more than a few times in the many times I saw him, and then it was as if Oswald was a figure beyond his comprehension. Jack saw himself as a kind of instrument. He did not have the delusion that God told him to do it—or that he was an instrument of any people, but that it happened without his conscious will."

Jack Ruby also complained that his cancer was induced secretly in jail. When he experienced difficulty breathing early in December and was taken to the hospital, it was thought that he had pneumonia. He took this as proof that mustard gas was seeping into his cell. When his condition was diagnosed as cancer, he was certain it had been injected into him.

However, his family praised the treatment Ruby received in Parkland, although they complained that his condition had been neglected or brushed off as "hamming it up" in jail.

"Jack Ruby spent his last day in a large private room which had one wall dominated by a wide window. A nurse and two deputy sheriffs were always on duty. Ruby spent hours watching television, especially football games."

Near the end his mood—according to the family—changed to one of "black despair."

And he whispered—that he didn't want to die far from home. Home, for Jack Ruby, was Chicago, the city of his birth.

One day, in December, Gertz asked Ruby: "What about Oswald?—was he ever in your night club, did you ever meet him or see him?"

"The first time I ever saw Oswald was in the jail after he was arrested. I never saw him in my club and I never met him before in my life," Ruby said.

A few weeks after Ruby, 55, was found to have cancer, he expressed a wish to take a lie detector test to prove that all he said was true. His worsening condition precluded such a test.

He had received such a test from representatives of the Warren Commission on July 16,

1964. No interpretation of the test was made, on the ground that the results were questionable because of Ruby's emotional condition.

Transcripts of the Warren interview show Ruby repeatedly saying he had more to tell, but that he would have to be taken from Dallas. He wanted to go to Washington. One critic of the Warren Report, Mark Lane, has implied something sinister in the fact that Ruby was not taken from Dallas.

"The things he said to me in utmost secrecy were things that could be said anywhere, Dallas or Washington," Gertz said. "I'm certain to my satisfaction that there was no more to tell. Jack confabulated. He tried to instigate knowledge."

"For example, when he shot Oswald, he was in a blackout. He knew he shot Oswald, but he had no real memory of the experience. The same thing is true about his explanation of why he shot Oswald. He said he did it because he wanted to spare Jacqueline Kennedy the ordeal of having to come back to Dallas for a trial. That was something he confabulated (wandering under emotional pressure). It offended his pride to be called insane, so what he attempted to do is show that he

Professional nurse positions in hospitals, public health and welfare programs, employ health units and other federal and state institutions in the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area are also open. Entrance salaries for these positions range from \$4,776 to \$17,550 annually.

Another Civil Service examination for intercultural relations specialists in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the Department of Justice and the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission has just been issued. The jobs, paying \$7,696 to \$10,927, are located throughout the United States.

These specialists will be concerned with business, civic, institutional and community relations for which the above federal agencies have detailed field opportunities are given all individuals. Employees will travel extensively.

To meet an urgent need for skilled electronics, mechanics, fire control mechanics and radio mechanics in Hawaii, recruiting for these positions has been extended throughout the United States, the commission announced Tuesday.

Reliability of Vietnamese Soldier Questioned By GIs

BY TOM TIEDE
SAIGON, Vietnam—(NEA)—The local government has recently constructed a large statue in the center of the capital; it depicts two combat soldiers, one leaning into the other.

Some Americans here think it is fitting.

It is, to them, the exact replica of an allied attack in this war: A GI trying to push a Vietnamese rifleman up to the front.

Other Yanks, though, disagree.

They insist the front figure is the GI, while the Vietnamese trooper has been purposely carved in the rear so he can hide.

Another argument the point is clear: Growing numbers of U.S. servicemen have shrinking faith in both the reliability and the responsibility of the South Vietnamese militia.

"They simply don't much like to fight," says a former U.S. Army adviser. "I remember being with one unit in the Delta and...

Don't use my name in this story."

Of course not.

"Anyway, it was late at night and we were on patrol. All of a sudden a bunch of bugles began blaring loudly from our front."

Viet Cong?

"Yes," they had a broadcast system hooked up and were scary as hell. They told my Vietnamese unit to turn around and go home.

"The unit talked it over. They turned around and went home."

The incident is not isolated. The 750,000-man nationalist armed force here is blotted with a deep-seated theory of warfare is to never do today what can be put off until tomorrow—especially physical combat.

Admits one Viet officer: "Our way is to be slow and cautious, not fast and rambunctious. Tomorrow is tomorrow either way."

Adds another: "We, too, would like to see the war end rapidly. But we want more to be still alive when it finally does."

The result of this kind of equipment has been predictable—impatient U.S. troops are fighting more and more of the war—and the native armies less and less.

And, in truth, it is probably merciful—evolution—at least. Poorly fed, poorly led Vietnamese soldiers have suffered mightily in the field. They are only so-so soldiers and the enemy knows it.

Often, for example, the Viet Cong have been able to pick whom they wish to fight—a United States outfit on, say, one side of a river or a Vietnamese unit on the other.

The Yanks will have 800 rounds per minute M-16 rifles, armor-penetrating M-49 machine guns, grenade-lobbing M-79 hand tubes, helicopter resupply, artillery support and jet fighter back-up.

The Vietnamese, conversely, will have World War II rifles, hand-made automatic weapons and shaky, often corrupt leaders.

The enemy's choice is obvious.

And the Vietnamese get pasted.

But even with such handicaps, a large part of the Vietnamese military inefficiency is indefensible. Central control is weak and far-flung officers of rank are nasty little war lords in their own domains. Discipline is so rampant that some commanders even pocket part of the government insurance allowed survivors of dead men in their outfits.

Rank and favor can be purchased.

Desertion reaches 9,000 a month.

"And for many the army is an 8-to-5 business.

All of this, to say the least, rankles some Americans serving here. They weary of seeing halfless, shoeless, rumpled Vietnamese soldiers walking the avenues. They tire of witnessing whole camps of Viet still snoozing while they themselves helicopter out to war.

"In some ways though," says a U.S. sergeant, "I can't blame them."

He smiles and adds: "I'd like somebody else to fight my war, too."

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U.S. Pilot Feels Reds Improving

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—A U.S. Air Force jet pilot with 83 combat missions over North Vietnam says Communist fighter pilots have become better fliers almost overnight.

"In fact, it — pilot ability — got better overnight about the first of December," said Lt. Col. Robert E. Wayne, 41, a native of Garden City, N.Y., whose family now lives at Oxon Hill, Md.

He described the current crop of Communist fliers as "far more aggressive."

But, Wayne said in an interview in Saigon, it is impossible for American fliers to tell anything about the nationality of the MIG pilots.

"You could be flying in formation with them and not tell who they are," he said. "They wear about the same gear that we do: helmets, face masks, visors and other stuff. Sometimes we can't even tell who is flying one of our planes beside us."

"There have been unconfirmed reports in Saigon that the North Vietnamese are getting pilots from other Communist countries, possibly Red China. In December, U.S. intelligence sources reported that about 50 North Korean pilots were in North Vietnam, primarily to train North Vietnamese pilots.

Wayne, an F105 Thunderchief squadron commander, said encounters with MIG jets have increased on the increase since the first of December. They're about 10 times as thick now."

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
