Commission Sworn In; Coroner Named

Eight Twin Falls County officials, elected or re-elected in November, were sworn into office, a new commission chairman elected and one appointment made during a busy session of the Twin Falls County Commissioners Monday morning. Heber Loughmiller, Twin Falls, serving his first full term as a commission member was named chairman succeeding Morris W. Carlson who held the chairmanship the past two years. William Chancy was sworn in as the new commission member. All three received their oaths of office from County Clerk Harold Lancaster who was sworn in at 9 a.m. by District Judge Theron Ward.

As one of their first items of business, the all Republican board approved the appointment of Dr. H. Thad Scholes, Twin Falls physician and surgeon, as county coroner. He fills the vacancy left by the resignation of Dr. Luther Thompson who was elected to the office in November although he had announced he would have been a disqualifying principal in election.

Mr. Chancy nominated Claude Brown for the post of coroner but the motion was not seconded. Mr. Carlson nominated Dr. Scholes and his appointment received a unanimous affirmative vote. Five applicants were seeking the county coroner post.

Yet to be acted on is the appointment of a justice of the peace. The post in Twin Falls was declared vacant as of Monday by the commission. Al Robinson is retiring justice.

Until a justice is named, probably late this afternoon, Probate Judge Joe Ann Shauh would handle justice court routine matters, the commissioners said.

Also reappointed was Ivan Johnson, bailiff, and Commission Chairman Loughmiller said he would like to see other appointments including Weed Director Wallace Savage and various office deputies during the afternoon.

Other county officials sworn into office Monday included Michael H. Felton, bailiff, as prosecuting attorney, the only new justice of the peace, Probate Judge Joe Ann Shauh; Treasurer Ruth Jones; and Assessor Clifford Theron Ward.

Blaze Ruins Paul Potato Warehouse

PAUL—An early morning fire Sunday completely destroyed a Paul potato warehouse. Damage was estimated at \$50,000, according to Alvin Stimpson, fire chief of the West End Fire Department. Cause of the fire has not been determined. The warehouse, owned by Max Herbold, Rupert, was a wood frame structure with corrugated iron sides and roof. The warehouse manager, Frank Urigen, Rupert, had checked the building at 11 p.m. Saturday and found everything satisfactory, Stimpson said. Smoke from the blaze was unnoticed until the fire was burning out of control.

The building, located on the railroad tracks north of the Kerr Grain Co. in Paul, was isolated from other buildings in the area and the structure was not in danger at any time, Chief Stimpson said. The warehouse was approximately eight years old and contained a full lot of sorted potatoes, a tractor, four-bales-of-potato-hogs and other equipment. An investigation is continuing.

2 Teachers' Unions Reach Agreements

CHICAGO (AP)—With May or Richard J. Daley as principal mediator, two teachers' unions and their respective school boards Sunday reached tentative agreements ending on-strike and averting another.

In Cleveland, the threat of a strike by the Cleveland Education Association against four years before the Chicago settlement. But public schools still faced threatened walkouts by another teachers group and school custodians.

Mayor Daley emerged after eight hours of negotiations, to announce the tentative agreement which would end a strike by teachers at eight junior colleges.

Most of the 684 teachers at the city's junior colleges marched picket lines Friday morning when their demands for salary increases, lighter class loads and reduction in class size were rejected by the Chicago City College Board.

The Cook County Teachers Union president, Norman G. Swanson, said the contract meant "substantial gains" for instructors, who earned \$5,540 to start under the old contract, but which was "too complicated to enumerate."

A four-hour afternoon session in Chicago resulted in cancellation of the Chicago Teachers Union's threat to strike elementary and high schools. "It would have been the first such strike in Chicago and would have affected 650 schools and more than 570,000 students."

Congress Starts Taking New Look At Conflict In Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress starts taking a new look today at the war in Vietnam. Richard M. Helms, director of the Central Intelligence Agency, testified at a closed meeting of a special Senate CIA subcommittee headed by Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga. The CIA has been reported as skeptical of whether the bombing of North Vietnam targets is damaging Hanoi's will to continue the war. Helms is expected to discuss this. Next Monday, Secretary of State Dean Rusk briefs the Senate Foreign Relations Committee headed by Sen. J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark. Sen. Rusk also will be closed. But Rusk will testify before the committee in a public session Jan. 23.

Powell Loses Post In Caucus Voting

WASHINGTON (AP)—Democrats voted today to strip controversial Rep. Adam Clayton Powell of the chairmanship of the House Education and Labor Committee. Members emerging from the party's caucus, holding closed doors in the House Chamber, said a compromise motion to take the vote off Powell's party, lost on a 122-88 vote and that the vote if Powell as chairman was carried overhwhelmingly. Under the motion, made by Rep. Morris K. Udall, D-Ariz., Rep. Carl D. Perkins, D-Ky., will become chairman of the committee. He is currently its second-ranking member.

Gun Wounds Are Fatal For T.F. Man, 65

William Kermit Wolf, 65, Route 3, Twin Falls, died Sunday at St. Luke's Hospital, Boise, as a result of injuries received from a gunshot wound Oct. 29 while pheasant hunting near his home.

Mr. Wolf had been hunting with nine companions and apparently shot himself accidentally while climbing over a fence. None of his companions witnessed the accident. He was taken to a Boise hospital with extensive facial injuries.

He was born Sept. 30, 1901, at Broken Bow, Neb. In 1916 he moved to Las Vegas, Nev. In 1920 he moved to Twin Falls. He was a member of the Episcopal Church of the Ascension, a chapter member of the Elks Lodge No. 2094, Lake Tahoe, Colo. He married Bessie A. Waters, Dec. 24, 1920, in Billings, Mont.

Surviving besides his widow are a son, Kermit William Wolf, Twin Falls; a brother, Charles James Wolf, Las Vegas; two sisters, Mrs. Ella Dull, Sheridan, Wyo., and Mrs. Curtis Dickson, Indian Hills, Colo.; and two granddaughters. He was preceded in death by two brothers and one sister.

Funeral services will be conducted at 11 a. m. Monday at the Episcopal Church of the Ascension, Twin Falls, by Rev. Warren L. Howell. Final rites will be held at the funeral home. The family suggests memorial for the Crippled Children's Fund and may be mailed to Reynolds Funeral Chapel.

U.S. Dist. Court Judge Oliver Cash assembled 173 possible jurors in the big modernistic courtroom and asked that they answer key government or defense lawyers. If they or relatives were employed by the government, if they had read the National Review, the National, U.S. News and World Report, Time or Newsweek, or heard about it on radio or television.

The judge did not say why he singled out those publications.

T.F. County Parks Unit Seeks Levy

Members of the advisory committee on parks and recreation in Twin Falls County are seeking a one-quarter mill levy for a one-year period with which to acquire land and develop park sites.

Edward Heep, chairman, said the group feels action must be taken immediately. The advisory committee sites "to be obtained and if matching funds are to be utilized for development."

Two principal projects, he said, are now under consideration. Those include the Balanced Rock area near Cascadeford, and the Cedar Draw region of Snake River Canyon in the west part of the county.

Mr. Heep estimated \$50,000 would be needed but said half of it could be obtained in matching funds and the necessary land. Outdoor Recreation if the county could acquire the land, he urged action as soon as possible on both projects to protect access and obtain necessary land before it is taken up by other interests. In both cases much of the needed land is Bureau of Reclamation property.

Other members of the county's Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee said development plans of the two sites are suitable for multiple recreation use. Trails for hiking, camping and picnic facilities and other recreational activities would be possible.

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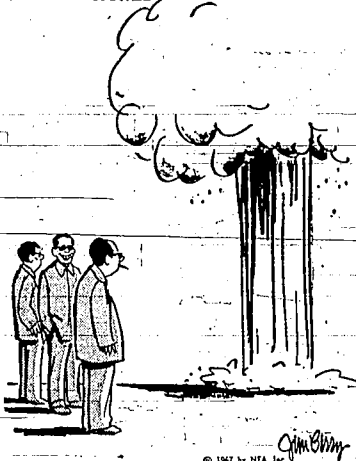
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Gov. Connally Says He Told Kennedy Dallas Trip Wasn't Good Idea

Connally made the statement in reaction to Louk Mangano's first installment of a four-part, 10,000-word serialization of William Manchester's controversial account of the assassination "The Death of a President."

2 Women Express Horror Of Injuries On Hanoi Civilians

NEW YORK (AP)—Two of four American women who spent the Christmas week in North Vietnam expressed horror Sunday night at the injuries they said are being inflicted on the civilian population of Hanoi by U.S. bombing raids.

One of the women, Mrs. Grace Newman, 39, of New York said "I was horrified at the damage to living quarters and injuries inflicted on women, children and even babies."

She said most of the injuries came from fragmentation bombs.

"The United States pilots call them 'Lazy Doves' and they are hollow bombs filled with about 300 handball-size spheres which are filled with metal shrapnel," she said.

"I talked and took pictures of one 11-year-old boy who cried as he told me that even after his operation he still has 28 pellets in his body," Mrs. Newman said.

"These are strictly anti-personnel weapons," Mrs. Newman said.

Much U.S. Aid To Vietnam Is Diverted

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—The U.S. Agency for International Development estimated today that between \$2.7 million and \$27.3 million worth of American economic assistance commodities delivered to Vietnam "was stolen or otherwise diverted" in 1966.

"AID believes that the estimated over-all loss rate of 5 to 6 per cent of U.S. aid goods cannot be regarded as highly unusual in a wartime situation as complex as that in Vietnam," said a statement issued by Donald G. MacDonald, director of U.S. AID in Saigon.

Associated Press writers Fred S. Hoffman and Hugh A. Mulligan, reported last November after a two-month AP survey that profiteering, graft and corruption were costing American taxpayers at least half a million dollars a day in Vietnam. They cited numerous examples of stolen or diverted goods and currency speculation.

After the articles appeared, officials in Saigon and Washington announced a number of measures to reduce or investigate the losses.

MacDonald's statement and highlights from a summary of AID's activities in 1966 were included in a speech he prepared for the Saigon Lions Club.

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Capital Expenditures Will Decrease In Intermountain Region During 1967

The "tight money" economic situation is predicted to cause a decrease of \$3.3 million in capital expenditures during 1967 in the Intermountain region for development, construction and equipment, according to a report contained in the First Security Bank's quarterly News Letter.

With the exception of mining and public construction, all areas of capital expenditure are expected to show decreases. The report estimates that expenditures in the region should total approximately \$56.3 million during the coming year, down from \$59.6 million in 1966. The largest single type of construction in the area will be public construction, which should account for \$12.1 million in expenditures, a \$7 million increase above last year. Other federal building is expected to be lower than last year, while public school construction and state and private colleges and university construction are predicted to show substantial gains.

Residential construction is anticipated to show a \$6 million drop over that of last year, bringing such construction to its lowest point in five years.

Public utility expenditures are listed at \$70.2 million, slightly below that of 1966. Major expenditures are for the new hydro-electric plant to be constructed by the Idaho Power Co. on the Snake River.

Idaho's manufacturing industries expect \$53.9 million in capital expenditures during 1967, including food-processing of potatoes, sugar beets, vegetables and meat. Major expansion in manufacturing will be phosphate operations alone should amount to \$50 million, the report notes, Soda Springs areas.

Public construction, according to the First Security Bank, should account for \$12.1 million in expenditures, a \$7 million increase above last year.

For the state of Idaho, capital expenditures should total \$340.4 million. This is \$4 million below that actually spent during 1966, but \$10 million above the 1965 total.

The report estimates that a total of \$15.8 million for exploration and development will be spent in Idaho by mining companies. This estimate represents an increase of some \$4 million above that spent in 1966.

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Siamese Twins Die At Age 54

HOLYOKE, Mass. (AP)—The Gibb sisters who at 54 were believed to be the oldest living Siamese twins in America, died Sunday at Holyoke Hospital.

Margaret and Mary Gibb were hospitalized eight days ago by Margaret's illness and were reported on the Tanager list Friday night.

Dr. John Appel, the attending physician, said they died of hypertensive heart disease. They were joined at the base of the spine and shared the same circulatory system. Doctors had said they could not be separated.

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Opposition To Mao Tse-tung's Purge Produces Chaos In Red China

By JOHN RODERICK TOKYO (AP) — Opposition to Communist Chairman Mao Tse-tung's purge is producing widening chaos in Red China, with Shanghai reportedly paralyzed by strikes and street fighting, and Nanking apparently still held by anti-Mao forces.

Reports of killing, torture and uprisings involving more than a million persons in the past few days suggest China may be close to civil war.

Japanese correspondents said half a million anti-Mao followers of vice premier and party propaganda chief Tao Chu were converging on Nanking. Wall bulletins posted in Peking by Red Guards supporting Mao indicated that the discord had split Mao's Cultural Revolution Committee—organized to direct the purge. They accused Tao Chu and Gen. Liu Chih-chen, vice chairman of the committee and deputy director of the army's general political department, of forming a "disloyal" group including Wang Jen-chung, another committee vice chairman and first secretary of the Communist South Central Bureau, and Chang Ping-hua.

Tao Chu rose to power only four months ago as an apparent follower of Mao.

The pro-Mao groups were led by committee chairman Chen Po-ling, Mao's wife, Chiang Ching, and Kang Sheng.

The posters accused Gen. Liu of destroying the purge in the armed forces and of issuing false orders that continued "white terror" in military schools after Mao had ordered the suppression of students' end.

The mounting turmoil reportedly followed efforts by Mao and Defense Minister Lin Biao to extend the purge aimed at strikes by thousands of anti-Red groups led by President Liu Shao-chi and Communist general secretary Teng Hsiao-ping into industries, the 21-million-member All China Federation of Trade unions and various party committees. President Liu has strong support in the labor federation and the party apparatus.

In the northern port of Shanghai, China's largest city with more than eight million persons, the Red Guards have been promoted to Army special fourth class in Vietnam where he is assigned to the 101st Airborne Division.

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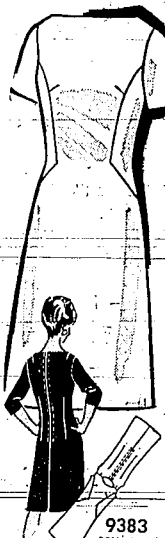

Lost Horses Rescued By Salmon Trio

SALMON—Those two saddle horses marooned since last fall in the high primitive area north of the Salmon River kept worrying Martin Capps.

So Mr. Capps, his son, Randy, and Bill Peterson, all of Salmon, took two snow machines and traveled 28 miles into Horse Creek over four-foot snow piled up at the 5,000-foot elevation.

They then hiked over the ridge into Reynolds Creek and three hours later were back at Horse Creek with the two horses.

The trio left to return to the mouth of Spring Creek on the Salmon River near Shoup about 5 p.m., Mr. Capps riding one horse and leading the other, and his son and Peterson returning on the snow machines.

The latter two arrived back in Salmon at 11 p.m. the same day. Mr. Capps spent 14 hours riding first one horse, then another, following the trail left by the snow vehicles over and down the mountain to the river. He arrived at the mouth of Spring Creek next day about 7:30 a.m.

Mr. Capps, a member of the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Licensing Board, and a local outfitter and guide who operates during hunting season in the Horse Creek area, said the horses were near exhaustion when he finally reached his destination.

Temperatures dropped to -10 during the night, he estimated.

The two horses had gotten away from Mr. Capps in November when the hunting season ended. He spent four days riding trying to locate them, then flew into the area to find their whereabouts.

He said he on Reynolds Creek apparently prevented the animals from heading home in time to escape the heavy winter snows.

Troops Learning Dilemmas Of River Delta

By PETER ARNETT

RACH KIEN, South Vietnam (AP)—Here in Rach Kien, center of the richest rice district in Vietnam, the troops are learning firsthand the dilemmas of the Mekong River delta.

They must fight a war and win over the population to the American side.

But the 2nd Battalion, 14th Regiment, is facing frustrations that reflect many fears about the delta war.

The Americans came to Rach Kien in a hurry. The Saigon government gave up the town in October 1965, because of mounting Viet Cong pressure. Then nine-tenths of the town's 3,500 population moved out, either as refugees to Saigon, 20 miles to the northwest, or into the hinterland with the Viet Cong.

Gen. William C. Westmoreland, commander of the U.S. forces in Vietnam, is known to have given his personal blessing to the scheme to put Americans in Rach Kien to force back the Viet Cong and pacify the district.

Things went quickly. The battalion flew in to Rach Kien, a few days before Christmas and encountered the first problem. There was no place to begin discussing with Americans indemnities and rents. One woman arrived from Saigon and demanded 30,000 piasters—about \$250—rent per month, exorbitantly high even in Saigon for a house of this kind.

The commander of the American unit, Lt. Col. Charles A. Gillis, Colorado Springs, Colo., paid immediate indemnity for two thatched homes knocked down by the blast from landing helicopters. One home owner received 4,000 piasters, another 1,000. That payment almost exhausted the battalion's pacification funds.

The scheme to retake and pacify Rach Kien was formulated without conferring with provincial officials. Therefore the town is not included in the 1967 pacification budget for Long An Province.

U.S. To Send More Men To Vietnam Soil

DA NANG, South Vietnam (AP)—The commandant of the U.S. Marine Corps said today that more American troops will be sent to Vietnam.

Gen. Wallace M. Greene Jr. told a news conference that Gen. William C. Westmoreland, commander of American forces in Vietnam, "is going to get more men."

The commandant did not say how many more men were coming or when they would arrive. The United States has more than 390,000 military personnel in Vietnam, including about 63,000 Marines.

Greene said that if more Marines are needed, they can be moving within an hour of notification, but he added: "We are right up against the hoops right now."

The commandant said the Marine force sent into the Mekong River Delta last week won't stay there.

"We don't have a permanent landing force," he said. "We sent in with a special landing force that we have used up and down South Vietnam. It just happened to be in the delta this time," he said.

Asked if he is in favor of knocking out the MIG jet bases in North Vietnam, Greene said: "I believe the air campaign over North Vietnam has been a very useful one—it has had tremendous harassing impact," he said.

Greene said the North-Vietnamese will continue to infiltrate through the demilitarized zone and through Laos. "We don't care what they do—we are ready to get at them whenever they make their plans known," he said.

The board will officially meet at 8 p.m. Tuesday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Freeman.

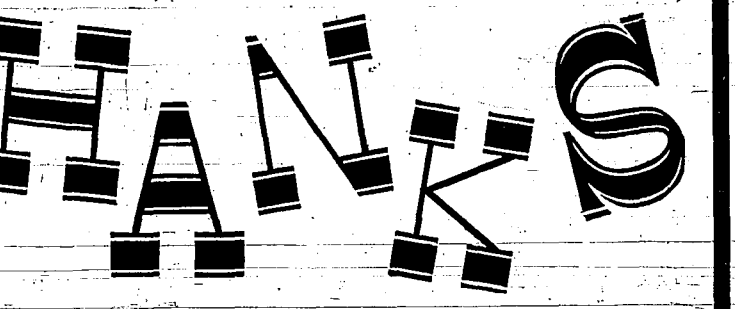

Michael J. Aubuchon, Hawk attorney, said he reached the tentative agreement Saturday after meeting with Sean Dowling, executive director of the Louisiana syndicate; the group's vice president, J.R. Kimble and their attorney, Steven R. Florio.

Kerner said St. Louis purchasers is Edward Arthur, president of the Arthur Enterprises and Amusement Co. of St. Louis.

Arthur had talked prices before, said Arthur. "My associates are interested in obtaining the Hawks as a civic enterprise, but we must be concerned with getting our money back."

Arthur said he would have to reevaluate the Hawks' money making possibilities in St. Louis.

"The Hawks made \$1,000,000 profit last season," he said. "But that amount would be wiped out just by the cost of borrowing \$3.8 million."

NCAA Slaps Probation On South Carolina, Takes Texas A-M Off

HOUSTON (AP)—The council of the National Collegiate Athletic Association put South Carolina on probation for two years and censured and reprimanded Texas Western Sunday. The policy-making body for the nation's collegiate athletic organization also lifted a probation on Texas A and M. The action against South Carolina, for violation of regulations involving financial aid to athletes, prohibits the school from participating in any post-season football or basketball games, including tournaments.

It also prohibits the Gamecocks from participating in any television program subject to control of the NCAA, meaning they won't be in any televised football games.

The action against Texas Western actually amounts to little more than a slap on the wrist and does not prohibit the school from competing for any NCAA championship.

Texas Western is the defending NCAA basketball champion and currently ranks sixth among the nation's college basketball powers.

The council cited South Carolina for one infraction involving academic standards and three dealing with financial aid to athletes.

It said that in September, 1965, a prospective student athlete was admitted to the university, contrary to regular published entrance requirements of the institution.

The athlete was not identified, but it was assumed the reference was to Mike Grosso, a star basketball player who was ruled ineligible by the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Grosso's ineligibility has been the center of a heated controversy in the conference with South Carolina appealing the conference ruling to the NCAA.

In effect, the NCAA council reaffirmed the conference action.

Grosso is a sophomore from Parkton, N.J., who reportedly failed on entrance examinations but later passed a second test which was said to be identical.

The policy making group for the nation's colleges also restored Texas A&M to good standing after 13 months on the probation list.

The council said the Southwest Conference had found Texas A&M now to be in conformance with the rules and had brought the university back into full rights in the Conference.

Texas A&M had been put on probation for violation of rules governing out of season practice and lifting grants in aid to athletes.

The action involving Texas A&M becomes effective Jan. 15.

The council said that Texas Western was being penalized for permitting 12 student athletes to participate in the Sun Bowl football game Dec. 31, 1965, while they were ineligible under NCAA requirements.

They were eligible under institutional rules.

"We feel we have been successful in this objective. Under John Woodworth, the Department has established a reputation as one of the top fish and game departments in the U. S.," Manley said.

Manley said he hoped any changes would be made with legislative approval.

Manley, president of the Idaho Wildlife Federation, said Saturday that his organization is solidly behind the (fish and game) department.

The federation would oppose drastic changes in personnel and operation of the department.

Manley's comments followed those of Bill Reynolds, Pocatello, an official of the Federation.

Reynolds said sportsmen do not want "radical changes" in operation of the department.

Samuelson told Friday news conference that operation of the department had been the source of more complaints than any other state agency.

The governor said the Department had been dictatorial and the commission had traveled too much. He said he would talk matters over with John R. Woodworth, fish and game head, after the legislature had adjourned.

Manley said Samuelson's comments had "caused a great deal of apprehension" among Idaho sportsmen.

The present Fish and Game Department was established by an initiative measure in 1938—one of only three initiatives to be approved in Idaho—for the specific purpose of keeping fish and game matters out of politics.
