WASHINGTON (AP) — In another government move aimed at helping solve the problems of cities, Secretary of Welfare John W. Gardner announced today establishment of a center for community planning. The center will focus the full resources of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare on solving municipal problems and will work closely with the Department of Housing and Urban Development, Gardner said. He designated Lyle C. Carter Jr., assistant secretary for individual and family services, to direct the center. The center will review HUD's proposed model city projects and provide technical assistance from the perspective of health, educational and social needs.

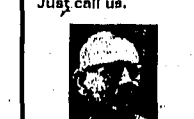
Rep. Fogarty Found Dead In Office

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. John E. Fogarty, D-R.I., collapsed and died in his office today a short time before he was to have been sworn in for his 14th congressional term. Aides found his body on the floor of his congressional office when they reported for work.

Rep. Hale Boggs, D-La., one of the first House members to go to Fogarty's office, said physicians believed death was caused by a massive heart attack. Fogarty had suffered a heart attack about 10 years ago and had had heart trouble since then.

Egyptians Claim Nasser Ordered Bombing Of Yemen

By DAVID LANCASHIRE (twent 5 and 10 a.m., when there was usually a "dead wind" in Yemen. Royalist sources in Yemen claimed Monday that President Gamal Abdel Nasser had ordered gas and napalm bombs dropped on heavy bombers killed more than 125 persons in a gas attack in northern Yemen Saturday. The two men, who appeared at a news conference in Amman, said they were Capt. Mohamed Abdul Motti Abdo and Capt. Saoud Mohamed Ali El Fadel, both 31. They said they deserted their units in Yemen last June and took refuge in Saudi Arabia, which has been supporting the royalist side in Yemen's civil war. Fadel said Soviet pilots as well as Egyptians were flying Egyptian bombers and fighters in attacks against royalist tribesmen. Abdo said that before going on the raids, the airmen were told that "gas bombs should be used to crush resistance." He said they were instructed that best-time-to-drop gas was be-

Fake Bomb Was Mailed To Senator

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. John G. Tower, R-Tex., disclosed today that a fake bomb had been sent to his office by mail in the aftermath of President John F. Kennedy's assassination by someone evidently believing political conservatives were responsible for Kennedy's death. Tower made the disclosure in denouncing criticism of Dallas, Tex., in William Manchester's book, "The Death of a President," as a city permeated with an atmosphere of hate. Police had asked him at the time not to release this information, he said. The Texas senator also recalled that in 1963, after Kennedy was slain in Dallas, he received so many threatening telephone calls and letters that he was forced to move his family away from their home in nearby Bethesda, Md., for a few days to a secret address. New Congress Opposes Tax Increase But Will Aid Vietnam War Financing

PEACOCK WASHINGTON (AP) — A sampling of sentiment in the new Congress, as indicated by a poll among the members, is strongly against a tax increase but with a reservation of readiness to do whatever is required to finance the Vietnam war. As to the war itself, the predominant view is for a greater effort to wind it up speedily, reflecting a high degree of impatience with how things are going now. Views of how to get on to a settlement ranged from far greater use of military power, particularly bombing, to a stepped up diplomatic offensive. The questions asked in the poll were these: 1. Vietnam: Do you favor present policies in the Vietnam war? If not, what do you suggest? 2. Taxes: Are you in favor of new taxes to support the Vietnam war and the home-war-on-poverty? Replies were received from about 40 per cent of the Senate and House membership; many could not be reached before Congress convened. On both subjects, the responses were usually highly qualified, so much so as to prohibit their tabulation in precise categories. —Running through many of the comments was an off-sounded note of complaint that members of Congress nor the American people were getting all the information they should about policies and intentions as to Vietnam. This reflection of the mood of the convening Congress came amid increasing indications that President Johnson will not ask for a tax increase, at least for the present, even though the last word from him was that he had not made up his mind. Congressional leaders are laying out work schedules on the assumption that a tax increase will not be among the President's early requests. There were some responses in the survey to the effect that the present situation was too "iffy" to permit a conclusion at this time as to what should be done about taxes. Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois put it this way: "We can't tell about the advisability of a tax increase yet because first it's impossible to determine yet how much of a cut we can make in the budget in fiscal 1967 and (fiscal) 1968. Whether a tax increase will be necessary then, no one can tell." On the question of attitudes toward present policies in Vietnam, the expressions ranged from unqualified support of President Johnson, as the man best informed and hence best qualified to make judgments, to sharp criticisms of him at each extreme in the hawks vs. doves argument. From Rep. George Andrews, D-Ala., one of those wanting to let the Communists have a crack there was a qualified suggestion of possible use of nuclear weapons. At the other end of the opinion spectrum, Sen. Ernest Gruening, D-Alaska, said he considered the reasons given for the U.S. military involvement in Vietnam "are utterly without foundation."

WASHINGTON — Something crazy and yet kind of wonderful is going to happen on Capitol Hill this week. Two Congressional committees will hold hearings to try to find out whether American bombing attacks on North Vietnam are maintaining too many civilians in a country whose government is sworn to kill as many Americans as possible.

Except that the war in Vietnam is an undecided one — a circumstance that must afford bitter ammunition to the American fighting it — it is clear that Congress had expressed official concern during World War II over the casualties among civilians during the bombing of Berlin in these days, anyone who suggested such an investigation probably would have been hustled off to jail, possibly because Americans were then fighting the Communist Russian ally. At any rate, a certain segment of Americans has never been quite so fierce about beating Communist aggression as it was about beating Hitler and Mussolini.

NO PRECEDENT — With that nasty crack out of the way, however, most of us who see no difference between left-wing and right-wing racials can feel good about the proposed hearings. The fact we were not asked about the German, Italian and Japanese civilians in World War II is a blot on our record, not a precedent for today.

CIVILIANS EVERYWHERE — Donne's thesis that any man's death diminishes his fellow unfortunately must be temporarily disregarded in the case of the man doing the fighting. But the death of even one civilian is cause for investigation by a civilized country. The U. S. policy is to take every possible measure to avoid civilian casualties in both the North and the South. Therefore, Congress has not only the right but the duty to inquire whether in fact that policy is being followed.

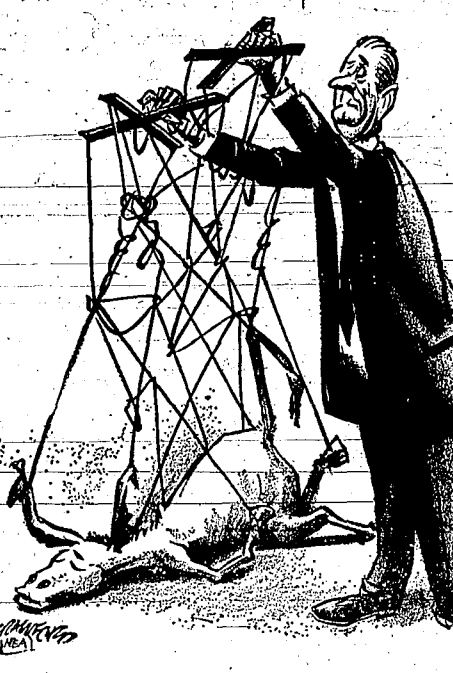

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican gains in Congress from the Rocky Mountain area include a direct descendant of two presidents and Wyoming's most recent governor.

Wildlife management has entered the phase of specialists. It is now imperative to give a bulk of effort toward perpetuating living targets.

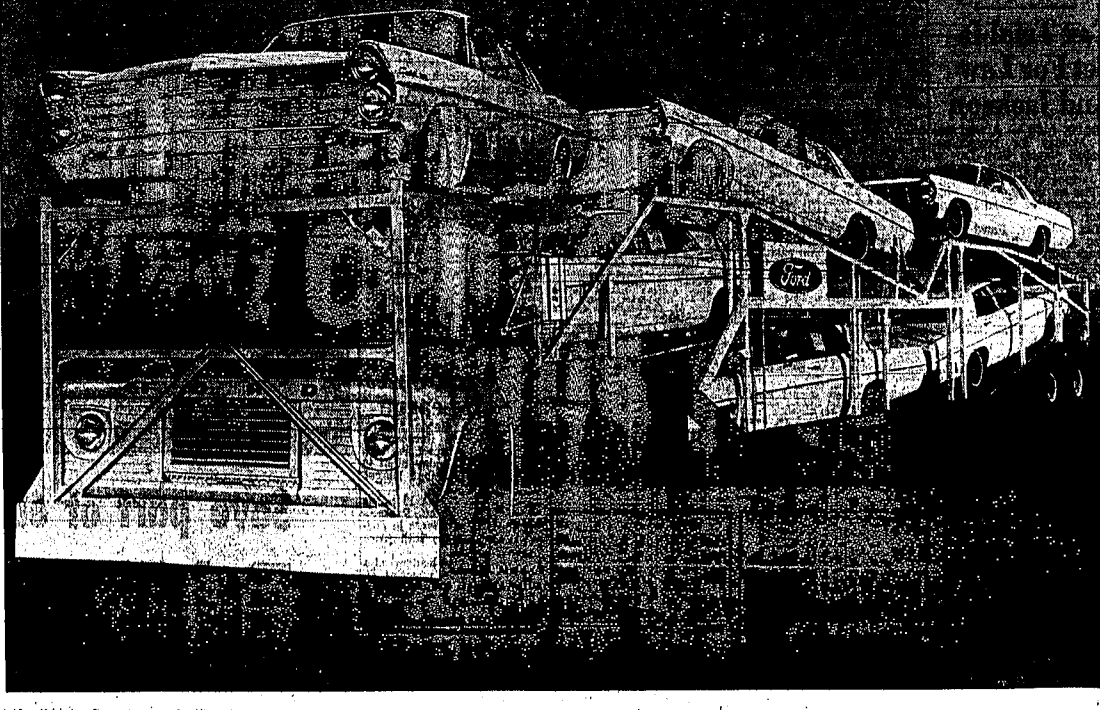
This means the nine players, including four regulars, who were suspended last Tuesday night will be eligible to play.

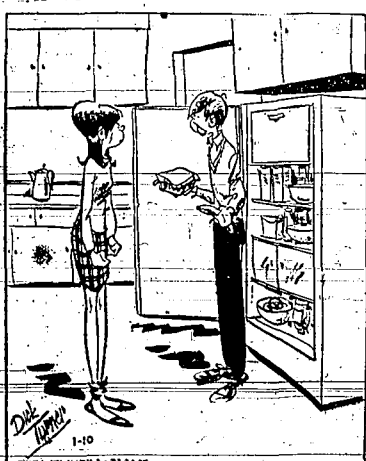

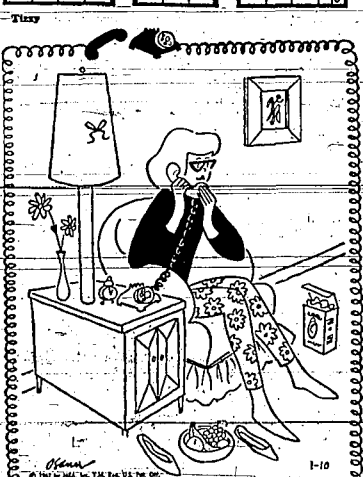
