## President Asks Congress For Tax Increase To Help Finance War In Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson has asked Congress to increase taxes to help pay for the Vietnam war in which "we face more cost, more loss and more agony." Congressional reaction to a tax boost is cool. After thundering approval Tuesday night for Johnson's State of the Union declaration to "stand firm in Vietnam," Republicans and many majority Democrats said a domestic budget cutback—not a tax boost—is the way to finance the fighting.

Johnson proposed a 6 per cent surcharge on corporate and most personal income taxes to last two years or longer unless war costs drop. Married couples with two children and incomes under \$5,000 yearly would be exempt, as would single persons with incomes up to \$1,900. The President indicated he wants the increase effective next July 1. He said the plan would raise about \$4.5 billion in his first year.

His proposal would cost an extra 8 cents for every dollar paid in income taxes. As an example—a person who now pays \$1,000 a year would pay \$60 more.

The President told the Congress and the nation, "We shall continue on a sensible course of fiscal and budgetary policy that will keep our economy growing without new inflationary strains; finance the needs of our men in Vietnam and the progress of our people at home; support a significant improvement in our export surplus, and press forward toward easier credit and lower interest rates.

He also planned to send a detailed report to Congress on the situation in Southeast Asia, particularly in Vietnam.

"I wish I could report to you that the conflict is almost over," he said, "but I cannot do so. We face more cost, more loss, and more agony. For the time being, we must continue to do what we can to stand up and resist."

In his 70-minute address, the President said he has no intention of cutting his domestic aid program.

## \$152.1 Million Budget Proposed By Samuelson

BOISE (AP)—Gov. Don W. Samuelson proposed today a budget of \$152.1 million for the next two years, making possible tax reductions, he estimated, at \$8 to \$10 million. His proposed budget, he told a joint session of the Idaho Legislature, "is neither restrictive nor extravagant." He suggested reducing income tax rates "in the lower brackets; those hardest hit by the sales tax."

## Legislators View Oleo Regulations

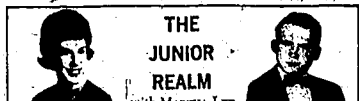

## Wears Black Governments Must OK Pact On Weapons

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A newly arrived Cuban refugee says the wife of vanished Cuban revolutionary leader Ernesto Guevara wears black "like a widow."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Frank E. Moss, D-Utah, said Tuesday the Bureau of Reclamation has scheduled nearly \$3 million worth of construction in Utah during the next six months.

LONDON (AP) — U.S. and Soviet negotiators have agreed on a treaty to halt the spread of nuclear weapons, but their governments must still approve it, qualified diplomats said Tuesday night.

The sources said the breakthrough in the disarmament stalemate was achieved last month following a series of secret exchanges in New York and Geneva.

Details of the agreement were not disclosed, but informants said the Russians made at least one important change in their position by accepting the idea of West German participation in nuclear planning arrangements set up by the North Atlantic Treaty Organization last month.

The arrangement is designed to satisfy West German demands for a say in nuclear policy and also to meet Soviet opposition to giving Bonn control of nuclear weapons, which the Soviet Union maintained was the chief bar to agreement on a nonproliferation treaty.

## Saigon Government Tries Persuading Reds To Rally For National Cause

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — American Communist planes dropped low over the Mekong River delta just before dawn. It dropped no bombs or napalm. Instead, Buddhist moral music blared from a loudspeaker mounted in the fuselage, followed by the wailing of a baby and the weeping of a woman.

"Is this your child? Is this your wife? What are you doing fighting this war?" asked an amplified voice.

Royal Viet Cong in the jungle below beat on pots and pans and shout Communist slogans to blot out such voices from above.

Two sounds from the plane and the din on the ground are concerned with "Chieu Hoi" — Open Arms.

This is the Saigon government's attempt to persuade Communist guerrillas to "rally to the national cause."

Despite serious flaws, the Chieu Hoi program has worried the Viet Cong enough to draw retaliation.

Noisemaking to blot out the loudspeaker is part of it. More important are the assassination teams who seek out those who defect. Viet Cong terrorists each month kill or abduct from five to 10 Vietnamese who surrender to the government.

Chieu Hoi is a key part of the effort to erode the Viet Cong infrastructure.

The broad aims of the program are to convert Viet Cong, gain intelligence, weaken the Communist cause and spread dissension.

Defectors are promised cash rewards, medical treatment, food, housing and jobs.

They get a bonus for each weapon they bring with them. A pistol earns \$60, a Viet Cong pistol about \$6,300. Turning in a recaptured rifle brings about \$169.

Besides loudspeakers, the defectors are attracted by leaflets tossed from planes, radio propaganda, posters, pamphlets and slogans painted on buildings and trees. Safe-conduct passes are scattered in Viet Cong territory.

Some defectors volunteer to join five-member armed propaganda teams. They visit hamlets to demonstrate how well they were treated and urge villagers to talk their relatives into defecting.

This is part of the U.S. psychological warfare called "psywar" which proves that their fears, hardships, loss of faith in Viet Cong victory statements, worries about their families, and disillusionment with the Communist cause.

Criticism of the program includes gripes by American GI's that loudspeaker planes wreck their sleep. More serious are administrative problems which have sapped its effectiveness.

In an official report, the Vietnamese undersecretary, Pham Anh, cited overcrowded reception centers, inadequate medical aid, boring indoctrination and tardiness in issuing new identification cards.

"Returns do not always receive prescribed benefit rewards for arms, operating fees, and allowances," he said.

The defectors have caused internal friction. War refugees contend the ex-Communists are better treated than those displaced by combat. A newly built village for defectors at Phu Bai, 40 miles north of Saigon, stands trim and neat next to a ramshackle refugee center.

One U.S. official conceded that defectors are sometimes better treated than refugees.

"We figure it's worth it. Every defector is one less Viet Cong shooting at us," said Monica L. Osborne of the U.S. Agency for International Development.

### Amendment Meet Poorly Attended

BOISE (AP)—Only two legislators showed up at a meeting and film explaining the so-called "Library Amendment" Tuesday night.

They left before the film ended. The measure would amend the U.S. Constitution to remove from the federal government the power to levy a tax on incomes. It would also prevent the federal government from engaging in what its sponsors call "illegal" activities which compete with private enterprise.

Seven state legislatures have passed versions of the amendment. It was brought before the Idaho senate in 1963 and defeated narrowly. Among senators voting for the amendment at that time were Gov. Don Samuelson and Lt. Gov. Jack Murphy.

The amendment is supported by the John Birch Society. Attending the meeting were Rep. Joe Preston, R-Declo, and Sen. Herbert R. Whitworth, R-Bancroft. The affair was sponsored by the Treasure Valley Liberty Amendment Committee. All legislators were invited.

### Weakness Of State Security Laws Noted

BOISE (AP)—Itinerant professional promoters are flocking to Idaho, a federal Securities and Exchange Commission official said Tuesday, because "Idaho has the weakest security laws in the United States."

James E. Newton, Seattle, regional SEC administrator, told a Senate business-and-House insurance committee members meeting in joint session that a phony stock promoter has bilked Idahoans of millions of dollars.

Newton testified "in favor of adopting a uniform 'blue sky' code, adapted to Idaho's particular needs to eliminate fast buck artists and suede-shoe boys."

He added that he helped draft the proposed legislation with the attorney general's office and the Department of Finance. He said the code would aid the commissioner of finance in protecting Idaho investors.

Newton cited cases in which literally millions of dollars were taken from Idahoans by crooked stock salesmen.

"In cases in which promoters have been convicted of fraud, some \$3,000,000 was stolen. In cases under investigation, some \$4 million is involved."

Newton said that the proposed code would benefit small companies seeking to sell stock, provide rules for the commission of finance, provide criminal penalties, require a surety bond for stock salesmen, base fees on the amount of offering rather than per value of stock and clearly define exemptions.

Sen. Orval Hanson, R-Idaho Falls, chairman of the Senate Business Committee, said former Gov. Robert E. Smylie had in a special message to the 1961 Idaho Legislature, asked for enactment of a new blue sky law, but at that time "the legislature did not act."

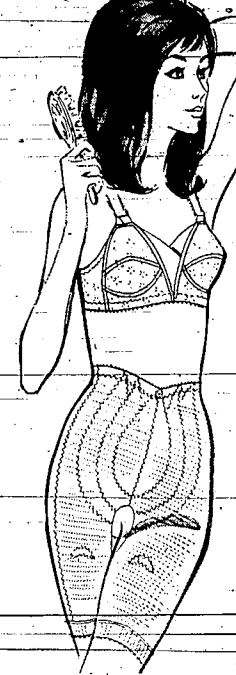

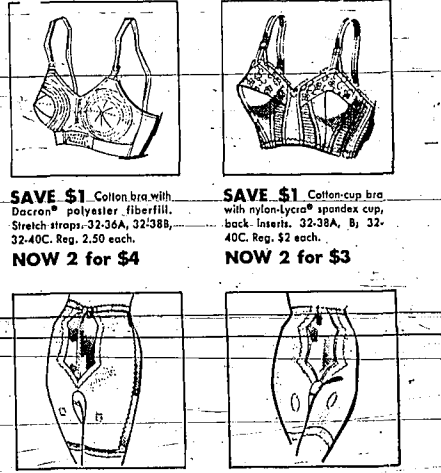

# Sick Pay Gets Special Break In Tax Return

By RAY DE CRANE, Newspaper Enterprise Assn.

If you were absent from work because of sickness or injury during 1966 and were paid by your employer while you were away, you may have a sick-pay credit coming. It depends upon how long you were out and what percentage of your normal wages or salary was paid.

If you received more than 75 per cent of your normal pay you can claim sick-pay for the first 30 days of absence. After

stepped up to the weekly limit of \$100 or actual pay, whichever is the lesser.

Whenever a sick-pay credit is claimed, a statement must be attached to the return explaining the circumstances and detailing the length of the illness, amount paid by the employer, your regular pay and whether or not you were hospitalized.

Form 2440, available from IRS, is used for this purpose.

## Population Growth Cause For Concern

WASHINGTON (AP) — A congressional study report said today Latin-American countries are showing an increased interest in the population growth situation.

The study, made by a Senate subcommittee headed by Sen. Ernest Gruening, D-Alaska, said Chile has the most advanced family planning program in Latin America.

Concern over the sharp rise in abortions since 1937 has been instrumental in establishment of the government's propped program.

Programs for family planning were reported in Argentina, Brazil, Colombia, Costa Rica, the Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Jamaica, Mexico, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Trinidad, Tobago, Uruguay and Venezuela.

### Connally Has Statement For Newsmen

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Upset by William Manchester's book on the Kennedy assassination, Texas Gov. John B. Connally has issued a statement saying President John F. Kennedy's "declining popularity" prompted the trip on which he lost his life.

Connally grimly read the 344-word statement to newsmen Tuesday. He declined further comment.

"This transparent attempt to dictate history through a captive voice is shocking," Connally said.

The first installment of a condensed version of Manchester's book, "The Death of a President," in Look magazine appeared on newsstands Tuesday. Connally said it "purports to be factual history but actually is a collection of recollections and observations collected and reflected through the prism of prejudice."

"For example," he said, "it has been reported that President Kennedy was unwillingly brought to Texas to settle a local political argument.

"To the extent that there was any significant argument prior to the trip, it was between then Vice President Johnson and Sen. (Ralph) Yarborough (D-Tex), both of whom were readily available in Washington.

"The fact is it is common knowledge that this was part of a series of political trips of President Kennedy's own planning in the wake of polls reflecting declining popularity."

Connally did not say, or permit movement to ask, if he had read the book or the magazine article or if he based his remarks on news reports. He pressed his statement this way: "I propose to read this statement and have nothing further to say."

He and Mrs. Connally, who also was in the presidential limousine in Dallas when Connally and Kennedy were shot, have refused for three years to elaborate on details of Kennedy's trip, Connally said.

Instead of authentic history, Manchester's book "turns out to be an astonishing propaganda instrument cleverly woven to reflect favorably on those who gave it birth, while rudely discrediting others involved," Connally said.

LONDON (AP)—Abolition of spanking was urged today in a massive study of England's primary schools commissioned by the government.

British public and private elementary school teachers may use corporal punishment. In England, the cane—a flexible wooden switch—usually is used across the hand, although in extreme cases, teachers apply it to a pupil's bare bottom.

Evidence presented to the committee indicated that 90 per cent of England's teachers want to keep the right to cane a child, mostly as a final sanction after other methods of punishment failed. But psychologists told the committee that they feel the cane has more disadvantages than advantages.

### Utah GOP Leadership Unveils Plans

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Republican leadership of the 1967 Utah Legislature unveiled its legislative plans today in an unprecedented "state of the state" message before a joint convention of the Senate and House of Representatives.

In the message, the GOP recommended strong legislation to combat "crime in the streets," laws to create a better tax climate for industry, a careful reorganization of both the legislative and executive branches of state government, creation of an air conservation commission to combat pollution, more money for higher education, relief for Utah's taxpayers and cost-cutting rates for Utah teachers.

The hour-long speech was delivered jointly by Senate Pres. Haven J. Barlow, Franklin W. Gunnell, R-Logan.

Barlow gave the first half of the address and Gunnell the second half.

The unprecedented move was an early indication the GOP lawmakers may choose to ignore many parts of Democratic Gov. Calvin L. Ranjip's program which was presented Tuesday in the governor's traditional state of the state message to the Legislature.

### High U.N. Official Calls For Fishing Boat Opens Fire Near Florida

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — A high U.N. official called today for bigger crops, to help avert famine and better statistics to illuminate the world's population problem.

Faul G. Hoffman, administrator of the U.N. Development Program — UNDP — told the UNDP governing council.

"I greatly increased production of foodstuffs is absolutely essential not only to avert the growing threat of widespread famine, but also to raise present low nutritional levels which impair the health and hobble the productivity of hundreds of millions of people throughout the low-income lands."

"A problem, whose overriding importance is beyond dispute, concerns the absolute necessity of bringing population growth and economic productivity into far better balance than at present."

One prerequisite for dealing with this problem is the stockpiling of more complete and accurate information on what is widely known as the "population explosion" — its size, scope, trend and impact.

Hoffman said the UNDP was making a modest and exploratory contribution by helping regional and national agencies carry out detailed studies of population trends and their implications for development planning. He also noted that it had advised India on that country's family planning program.

As for food production, he reported that the UNDP was supporting 910 agricultural projects in 104 countries and territories and that such projects constituted the largest single share of his work, done in collaboration with U.N. specialized agencies.

Hoffman, once an American automobile manufacturer and later Marshall Plan administrator, prepared his speech for the opening meeting of the UNDP's third session of the 37-nation governing council.

The development program is financed by voluntary contributions from governments. Hoffman complained that they pledged only \$170 million toward the \$200 million the General Assembly set as the 1967 target.

He has asked the council to approve 71 new projects in more than 69 countries and territories at a cost of \$185 million.

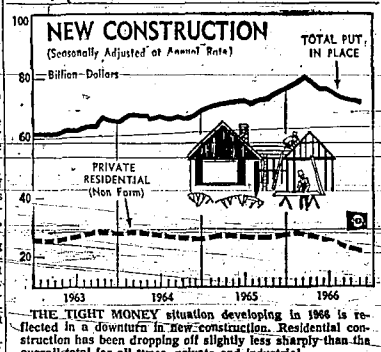

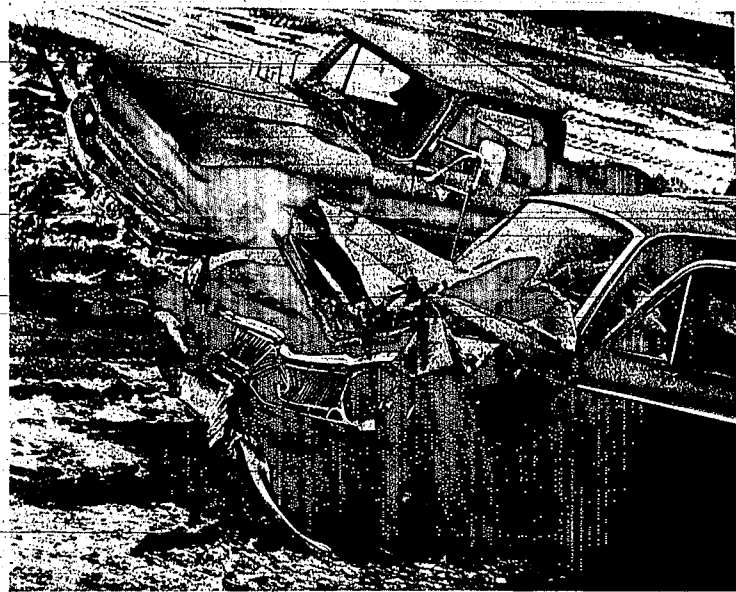

### 21-Year-Old Sets Medical History Every Day He Lives

DE QUINCY, La. (AP) — Marvin Wayne (Bud) Bryant makes medical history every day he lives.

In his 21 years of life, he has received more than 700 pints of blood. He needs it to live.

Bud suffers from Cooley's anemia — a disease in which the red blood cell production is severely curtailed. Victims rarely reach puberty. A brother and a sister of Bud's died of the disease at the age of 4 months.

—He has one brother and three sisters who do not have the illness.

The disease was discovered when Bud was only 7 months old.

—"Since that time my doctor has provided me with every hospital and medical need," Bud said.

Bud works at the hospital laboratory and assists in office routine.

Bud receives blood from inmates at the Louisiana Correctional and Industrial School, a penal institution near De Quincy.

—They have more or less adopted Bud, and to date he has received 370 pints of blood from them.

Prior to the opening of this school, Bud got blood from donors who were found with the aid of civic organizations in the area.

His father donated the first 125 pints of blood but his health began to fail, and he was forced to stop.

Bud goes to night school to continue his studies. His formal education ended in the 9th grade when he figured it was useless.

### Air Force Research To Be Expanded

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Air Force announced plans Wednesday to expand its Athena missile advanced re-entry systems research from Green River, Utah, according to Sen. Wallace Bennett, R-Utah.

He said the Air Force has added 36 vehicles to its 1967 program at the Utah site and will launch three Athena solid fuel missiles each month 470 miles downrange to White Sands Missile Range, N.M.

The Athena program simulates flight dynamics of intercontinental ballistic missiles, by propelling a variety of payloads up to 200 miles in the atmosphere at different velocities and angles.

Bennett reported that the Air Force fired 28 Athenas from Green River last year and the missions were declared successful.

### Curry Dinner Makes 'Pink' Problems

BURLINGTON, England (AP) — Miss X is 19, pretty, an efficient secretary, and everything she touched turned pink.

She touched her white blouse and left pink patches. There on her writing pad and pink on the letters she typed for the boss.

For two days Miss X put up with her pink problem at the Chrysler-Cummings works in this north England town. Then she went to see Dr. Valentine Crowley, the factory physician.

After detailed laboratory tests, Dr. Crowley came up with the answer Tuesday. It was all caused by a curry dinner.

"No wonder the poor girl was so upset," the doctor said. "A spice called turmeric in the curry was the trouble. Her system reacted against it and sent something like a pink dye through her pores."

"I have never known a case like it. The girl didn't look pink, quite normal in fact, but everything she touched went that color," he said.

Turmeric is used extensively as a dye in Asia, where it is cultivated.

Miss X's trouble is clearing up, and on Dr. Crowley's advice she is going to skip curry in future.

"We don't want to give the girl's name because she is so embarrassed," a factory spokesman said. "She can't help blushing."

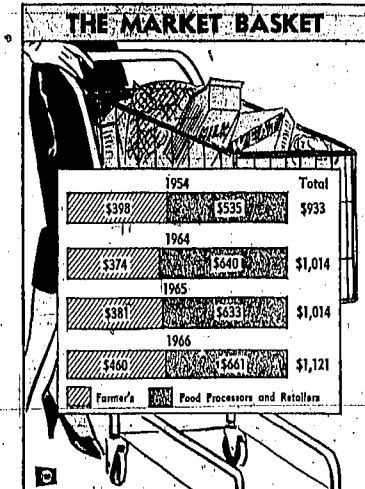

Examine your nails carefully next time you apply hand lotion. If they look as though they need repair, a good place to start would be at the cuticle. Then on to the nails. If you find you have nothing to work with, treat yourself to a new set of nails. Each time you wash your hands be sure to push back the cuticles. This practice will keep them soft and easy to manage. When you notice the skin getting rough, use cuticle cream and trim away the dead skin. Continue to massage the nails gently with the cream. Then soak the nails in warm soapy water for a few minutes. Now you are ready to apply make-believe nails. Not only do these nails make your hands look beautiful—but they also serve the purpose of letting your own nails grow stronger as they grow longer under the false nails. The "brush-on" nail is a mixture of powder and liquid that can be purchased at the corner drugstore or applied by your manicurist. It is of course, applied to the whole nail (not just the tip). Another plus for these make-believe nails is that they are good for nailbiters. They help break that awful habit. After filing and thoroughly cleaning your own cuticles the "brush-on" nails are easy to apply. Attach the silver foil form to the finger around the nail. The foil is designed in a semi-circle to shape the nail. The nail mixture is then applied to the entire nail and the silver form is left to dry for 20 minutes. After it is dry, the new nail is filed down, first horizontally to remove any ridges, and then vertically to obtain uniform lengths and shapes of the nails. Continue until all the nails are the same shape and length and there are no ridges on the nail. Polish can now be applied on top of the fake nail.

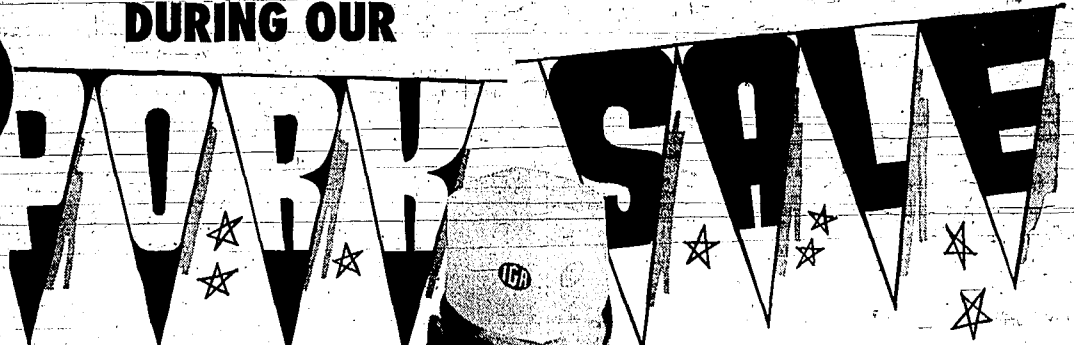

# Viet Cong Break Up Into Small Units

 DA NANG, South Vietnam (AP) — Viet Cong battalions formed to fight conventional battles now are being broken up into small units for a new Communist effort to return to guerrilla warfare, U.S. intelligence reports indicate.

American commanders have noted the change in enemy tactics particularly in the five provinces on the northern end of South Vietnam.

"For more than two months U.S. forces in South Vietnam have found only limited resistance when they made large-scale search-and-destroy operations in the area. A week in the field frequently nets less than 25 enemy dead and sometimes none.

"Their battalions (about 500 men) are being broken down and scattered out," one source said. "They are working more and more as small squads and even single men."

"We just can't find them in big numbers any more."

U.S. tacticians say there was a notable Communist effort in 1966 to cement local guerrilla squads into main-force battalions and regiments which were sent against government troops.

At that time, the only U.S. military commitment in Vietnam consisted of advisers assigned to South Vietnamese units. By mid-1966, the Communist forces had a good deal of success with such operations.

Early in 1965, large numbers of American troops began moving in and taking a hand in the fighting. Enemy losses soared.

To counter this, North Vietnam began sending regular army troops to join forces with the Viet Cong.

# Total Personal Income Rises 8 Per Cent During Past Year

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Total personal income, at a record rate of nearly \$60 billion a year, was up some 8 per cent in the past year while the rise in consumer goods prices was less than 4 per cent.

Does this mean most Americans kept a giant step ahead of inflation?

[Not at all.]

The sometimes confusing flood of figures from government and private agencies show a generally prosperous and expanding economy, but the statistics are less clear about how the individual is faring in this welter of wealth.

The term personal income, as used by the government, includes a variety of payments to individuals — wages, salaries, net rents to landlords, dividends and interest received by individuals, net income of the self-employed, and "transfer payments," mostly Social Security and veterans benefits.

Figures are available for one key group — some 14 million factory workers who, despite wage increases, have lost \$1.15 per week in purchasing power in one year.

There are no government figures on how the individual stockholder, landlord, professional man and others among the self-employed are doing in terms of income vs. inflation.

The sharp rise in total personal income — the lion's share of it in wages and salaries — means mainly that more people are at work than ever before.

But it doesn't improve the personal finances of a \$100-a-week factory worker to create another job at the same wage.

Perhaps the simplest way to gauge what inflation has done to your personal pocketbook is to look at the erosion of the value of a dollar in 1966, which saw the sharpest price increases in a decade.

Each dollar is worth 31 cents less than it was a year ago.

Thus, if you earned \$100 a week at the beginning of the year and are still making \$100 a week, you have lost \$3.10 in purchasing power. If in the past year your income has crept up to \$103.10, you are exactly even.

If it went up 8 per cent in line with the over-all increase in total personal income, you'd be making \$108, but deducting for inflation, your buying power would be only \$104.90 in terms of 1965 dollars.

The consumer price index uses the years 1957-59 as a base of 100. The dollar near yearend was worth 87.3 cents in 1967-68 terms, compared with 90.4 cents at the end of 1965.

It is important to note that these figures are based on the Labor Department consumer price index, which measures a broad range of goods and services purchased by the typical city wage earner's family.

The price index does not fully reflect the buying habits of either high income or low income families.

# Tax Increase Request Set To Cut Inflation Strains

 WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's request for a 6 per cent tax increase, which undoubtedly surprised some economists, is designed not only to raise money for the Vietnam war but also to reduce inflationary strains.

The Johnson administration came under strong pressure during the first part of 1966 to propose a tax increase as a hedge against inflation. But many economists have since changed their minds and now fear a tax boost might lead to recession.

Administration officials see the picture differently, however. "The differences of opinion," one top administration source said "when asked about the recession talk. 'Our views on the economy are to expect a healthy advance.'"

He said the instability of the economy feared by some economists is exaggerated.

"A prudent tax increase of this spot is what is appropriate to prevent a too-rapid rise in the activity and prices we had last year," the source said.

Congressional reaction to the proposed tax hike was less than enthusiastic, with a number of members saying expenditures should be trimmed first.

Earlier, an informal poll of members of Congress showed almost solid opposition to the proposed tax increase now. The Republican leadership is pledged to cuts in spending to avert the threat of higher taxes.

By proposing a July 1 effective date for the 6 per cent surtax, Johnson gives himself and Congress another six months to watch the economy.

This follows closely a plan proposed earlier this month by Walter W. Heller, former chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers. Heller said a July 1 effective date fits his projected economic pattern for 1967 — a slackening in the immediate months ahead with a pickup following.

Johnson said his administration will continue a sensible

course of fiscal and budgetary policy during 1967 to keep the economy growing without an inflationary strain, to finance Vietnam needs and the needs at home to help improve the U.S. trade balance and to help ease credit and reduce interest rates.

Administration leaders claim the surtax is fair and equitable and a levy which hits everyone proportionately. It does not become imbedded in the tax structure and is easy to remove.

"What it means is that a percentage of the \$500 in income taxes would pay 6 per cent, or \$36, additional."

It would raise \$1.5 billion the first year and about \$3.7 billion the second year. The additional collections the second year, officials explained, result from delays in payments and final settlement of tax bills.

There would be no exemptions for corporations under the proposal. Single persons with taxable incomes up to \$1,000 yearly and married couples with taxable incomes up to \$2,000 would be exempt, however.

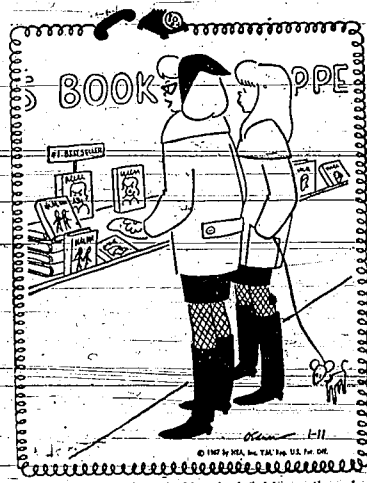

NEW YORK (AP)—Problems that might arise over an indoor track meet here in February could reopen the war between the National Collegiate Athletic Association and the Amateur Athletic Union over which group should control track and field in the United States.

## Patriots Give New Contract To Holovak

BOSTON (AP)—The Boston Patriots of the American Football League tore up Mike Holovak's contract Tuesday and reworked the head coach and general manager with a new five-year agreement at a substantial pay hike.

The new contract extending to 1971 reportedly will pay Holovak into the \$50,000 salary bracket while granting him special stock privileges.

Under the old agreement which had three more years left, Holovak's pay would escalate to \$40,000. In addition, that contract gave him 500 shares of stock, currently valued at about \$18 per share, plus an option to purchase as much more as he wished at \$3 per share.

"I'm surprised and very happy," Holovak told a news conference. "No one wanted to get into the Super Bowl more than I did this year. I think we'll make it next year if we can fill a few spots."

Patriots President Bill Sullivan said Holovak declines to disclose terms of the new contract. Sullivan noted certain regulations against a corporation disclosing a takeover before notifying stockholders. Holovak had another reason.

"If I tell you, I'll have to tell my wife," he said with a wide grin.

The action marked the third time in six years that the Patriots have torn up Holovak's contract and given him a new one.

### Proposal To Merge Labor, Commerce Units Big Surprise

By STERLING F. GREEN  
WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's proposal to merge the Commerce and Labor departments is a major surprise — and probably unexpected — to both industry and organized labor.

"It's unworkable," said one union spokesman. "Labor and business are two basically opposing forces which need the government, not as a combining force, but as a mediating force."

"The business community is astonished," said Arch N. Booth, executive vice president of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. "Offhand, the proposal appears to be contrary to the best interests of the country."

There was speculation that the proposal is intended to remove the union label from the rapidly expanding manpower and job-training programs in the Labor Department — programs in which Johnson hopes to encourage private industry's cooperation and support.

"By combining the Department of Commerce with the Department of Labor and other related agencies we can create a more economical, efficient and modern instrument to serve a growing nation," Johnson said Tuesday night in his State of the Union message.

He did not name the other agencies which might be wrapped into the package, but these might include some anti-poverty programs which the Office of Economic Opportunity has considered delegating to the Labor Department.

The proposal would reverse Johnson's policy, exemplified by the new Departments of Transportation and of Housing and Urban Development, of giving Cabinet representation to each major segment of the economy.

"For the Labor Department, the proposal would end an independent role that began on a tiny scale 54 years ago. It would restore what Congress created in 1903 as 'the Department of Commerce and Labor,' under almost the same name.

In Johnson proposed that Commerce, with a current budget of more than \$1 billion, and Labor, with a budget of \$38 million, be merged as the Department of Business and Labor.

Most of organized labor's top officials reserved comment.
