### Committee Seats Asked By GOP

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republican leaders carry to their Democratic counterparts today a demand for more seats on House committees to reflect GOP gains in the 1966 elections.

They probably will get what they ask for, or close to it.

Speaker John W. McCormack said he expects no serious difficulty in reaching an agreement with the Republicans, although it means giving up some Democratic committee posts.

Tuesday's organization session of the House indicated that the Democrats won't go out of their way to antagonize the GOP, which demonstrated that with 187 votes and some help from conservative Southern Democrats it can prevail over the numerical Democratic majority.

With the exception of three major committees, the Republicans will insist that they get 43 per cent of the positions on House committees. They apparently are willing to settle for 40 per cent on Ways and Means and Appropriations committees and one-third of the 15 seats on Rules Committee, traditionally a 2-1 setup in favor of the majority party.

The final decision is up to McCormack and his top aides and tentatively is not made by the entire House membership.

What the leaders agree to could vitally affect the course of major legislation in the 90th Congress for the Ways and Means and Appropriations committees between them originate all tax and Social Security legislation and the actual financing of all federal programs.

### Relapse

LONDON (AP) — Bob Brewis, 34, a farmhand who two months ago became the first human known to catch foot and mouth disease in Britain, is sick again.

### First 1967 Blood Drawing Set

Twin Falls will have its first blood drawing of 1967 Monday, and 150 donors are needed to fill the quota.

Mrs. Elson Basom, executive secretary of the Twin Falls Chapter of the American Red Cross, noted that Twin Falls proper has more than 20,000 residents, with probably about half of these being eligible donors.

The thing we need to do, she said, is "convince people that there is really nothing to giving blood. A person can donate and go right back to work with no ill feelings."

Several illnesses and other factors can eliminate people from being potential donors. Donors must be between the ages of 18 and 60, although unmarried people under 21 must have parental permission to donate.

Heart disease, jaundice, recent blood transfusions, skin eczema, boils, convulsions, recent immunizations or injections of pregnancy are among items which can eliminate people as donors.

Mrs. Basom said 2,911 pints of blood were used in Twin Falls County during 1966, with 1,266 of those pints being replaced. Although the yearly quo-

to for the county, 1,250 pints, was exceeded by 16 pints, residents fell down in replacing blood needed for county residents.

Twin Falls has six drawings a year. Filer two and Kimberly two. All Twin Falls quotas are 150 pints, Kimberly 100 and Filer 75. The drawings in Twin Falls are spaced so donors can donate at each one without endangering their health, since it is advisable to wait 60 days between donations.

## U.S., European Common Market Move Toward Agreement On Sharing Grain

By CARL HARTMAN BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — The United States and the European Common Market are moving toward a wide agreement on the sharing of man's basic food — grain.

Some progress may be made today at a meeting of cabinet ministers from the six Common Market countries: France, West Germany, Italy, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg. The main battle will be fought in Geneva.

If an accord is reached, it will cover the whole non-Communist world and form an essential part of the Kennedy Round agreements on trade. It will cover not only the grains that humans eat, such as wheat and rye, but the feed grains needed for raising poultry, beef, pigs and other meat animals. The deadline for the Kennedy Round is June 30.

The idea of the agreement is to stabilize price, production and markets. The United States also would like to make it a system for supplying aid to underdeveloped countries, especially India.

India's needs have absorbed a large proportion of the U.S. grain surplus, which has about disappeared. The United States wants other affluent countries to share the burden.

The Common Market opposes putting aid arrangements in the

grain agreement. The agreement, it says, should be about trade — not aid. It wants aid to be considered a different matter and handled elsewhere.

American farmers have also been worried about losing their excellent market for grain, especially feed grain, in Western Europe. The United States now sells the Common Market more than 10 million tons of feed grain a year, a large and the effort to balance U.S. international payments and stop the outflow of gold.

The United States also sells wheat to Europe, but with rising prosperity West Europeans no longer eat as much bread and they have an increasing appetite for beef—much of it fed on American corn.

The American fear is that high prices guaranteed to farmers in the Common Market will encourage France to produce more. At the same time, high duties levied by the Common Market would keep American sales down.

A system has been devised to overcome this fear. Each area in the agreement would accept a "self-sufficiency rate."

The Common Market would be treated as a single area. The rate would be roughly equal to the percentage of its own requirements that the area has been producing in recent years, the rest being imported.

If an area should exceed its self-efficiency rate, thus cutting down its imports, it would have to take remedial action.

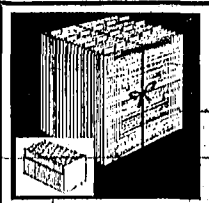

**CONVERSION MEETS**  
BOISE (AP)—The Idaho Soil Conservation Commission met in its quarterly session Wednesday and decided to ask the legislature to increase the commission's size from three to five members.

Commission members, according to administrative officer Doyle Scott, that "there is great need for broader thinking and more experience on this commission, as well as need for a geographic representation with more people to share in policy development."

The commission's request to the legislature for staggering commission members' terms so that one expires each year, Scott said.

**CONVERSION PLANNED**  
POCATELLO (AP)—Plans for a complete conversion of the Idaho State Journal from letterpress to the latest method of photo-offset printing were announced Wednesday by Journal management. Cost of the project, which will include extending the building to the present building, will be in excess of \$600,000.

"Recent developments in phototype composition and offset printing equipment have opened a wide new field of production possibilities for the small to medium size daily newspaper," Nicholas G. Ifft III, general manager, said. "We plan to invest in the latest type of new equipment to provide the people of southeastern Idaho with the finest newspaper possible."

**SUIT FILED**  
POCATELLO (AP)—A Union Pacific Railroad switchman has filed a \$150,000 damage suit against the railroad for injuries he received in a switching accident in Boise on April 8, 1966.

James Jausoro, Boise, filed the complaint in fifth district court here. The accident occurred at the Thirteenth Street crossing in Boise.

According to his complaint, Jausoro was riding a box car on a downgrade from a side-track preparatory to coupling the car onto a switch-engine. The engine was being moved toward the boxcar as a part of the coupling operation. Jausoro states the engine struck the boxcar with such force as to knock him off. The switchman suffered multiple injuries, including a broken back, his complaint says.

## State Workers Pay Hike Bill Is Introduced

**OLYMPIA (AP)**—Gov. Dan Evans said today he will introduce a bill Thursday on emergency appropriations to raise state employees pay by having a \$15.4 million bill introduced in the Republican-controlled House.

Democrats had rammed a \$9.3 million bill through the Democratic-controlled Senate on the first day of the 40th Legislative session.

Evans' executive request measure, House Bill 188, was introduced by six Republican representatives.

The measure would appropriate more than \$4.1 million from the general fund for pay raises to state employees under the State Personnel Board; \$38,678 would go for pay raises for the classified staff at the state's five major universities; \$2.4 million for pay raises for noncertificated employees of school districts.

The executive request bill would also appropriate \$9,988 for pay raises for employees of the State Highways Department; \$2.4 million for recipients of public assistance; \$1.5 million for nursing homes under the Department of Public Assistance and more than \$1 million for other jobs.

House Bill 188 would go into effect July 15, the same effective date attached to the Democratic bill, Senate Bill 1.

The Democratic bill has been shunted off to the House Appropriations Committee and a hearing is scheduled Friday.

It would appropriate \$9.3 million for pay raises for state employees; non-teaching school employees, and employees of the five state institutions of higher learning.

Also, it would provide rent help for an estimated 6,000 public assistance cases.

## Romney Eyes Financial Problems

**LANSING, Mich. (AP)**—Michigan Gov. George Romney vowed today to take no state spending action without a major vote of oversight.

In a message to Michigan's 74th Legislature, the Republican governor said financial stability is Michigan's greatest problem. He outlined recommendations ranging from taxes to time standards.

Romney's political career could ride on success or failure of his programs in a legislature in which Republicans hold a slim edge. Although he has said he is exploring the possibility of seeking the Republican presidential nomination in 1968, he has denied that he is a candidate.

Romney's 2,500-word message stressed tax action as the "No. 1 job" of the legislative session.

He told the 18 House and Senate members that the 1967-68 budget will require about \$100 million in new revenue "merely to maintain the present level" under way — merely to stave off — without making a single improvement in present programs or adding a single new initiative.

Calling for tax action by April 1, Romney told the lawmakers the central issue facing Michigan is whether needed new revenue should come from increased rates on present taxes; coupled with a variety of new taxes, or from an overhaul of the present tax structure.

"In my judgement, new revenues should be obtained in such a manner as to correct inequities in the tax system," Romney said.

## Proposal Is Heard By House Unit

**BOISE (AP)**—Members of the Idaho House Revenue and Taxation Committee heard a representative of the Farm Bureau Federation propose Wednesday a new tax plan permitting taxation of a person's property or income — but not both.

In the hearing, Clair Blaser, Madison County farmer and Ricks College instructor, said the plan would allow for the taxation of either the assessed valuation of property or income, whichever was higher.

Blaser said the plan would shift the local tax base from assessed valuation of Idaho property — \$792 million — to the much wider tax base of the estimated \$13 billion in personal and business income.

He estimated the drop in mill levies would be from the current average of about 100 to 60 mills because of the broadened base. The unpopularity of the plan, Blaser said, because the proposal would eliminate personal property taxes on all items held for sale and other items valued under \$500.

Sugar City residents, he complained, pay only \$7,200 of the \$80,000 in property tax that is collected for operation of the town's schools — but he said the town residents contribute 50 per cent of the school students.

Sen. Bill R. Wilder, said a person who owned no property would feel a sharp increase in his taxes under the Farm Bureau plan.

Chairman Tom Preston, R-Declo, said the plan would be taken under advisement.

In other tax discussion Wednesday, Preston said earlier he would oppose repeal of the alcolumargarine tax, saying property tax relief would have a "two-edged effect on Idaho industry."

He said the Idaho dairy industry "deserved" protection from competition by the lower-priced margarine and retailers would probably not drop margarine prices proportionately if the tax were dropped.

Senate President Prentiss H. Young, R-Nampa, said Gov. Don W. Samuelson had made up his mind on the State and budget messages.

The budget message was delivered to a joint session Wednesday.

## Johnson's Promise To Aid Crime Battle Wins Plaudits

**BY HAL COOPER**  
**NEW YORK (AP)**—President Johnson's promise of big-scale federal aid for states and cities in the fight against crime won plaudits from coast to coast today.

Many municipal officials said transfusions from the Treasury are the only answer to the rising cost of law enforcement.

Others declared that crime is a national problem and that Congress has an obligation to provide funds to help keep it in check.

A typical comment came from Police Commissioner Raymond Girardin of Detroit, who said "We have reached the point where the cities cannot adequately finance all police services that cities should have. I hope Congress will implement the program by making funds available."

"It's an uphill fight without it, but with this help I feel Detroit and other cities can get on top of the crime situation."

O.W. Wilson, superintendent of Chicago police, said the President's program deserves "the support of all citizens."

The President, in his State of the Union message to Congress Tuesday night, proposed a "safest and crime control act" which would provide federal assistance in three categories:

1. 90 per cent of the cost of developing state and local anti-crime plans.
2. 60 per cent of the cost of training police, tactical units and introducing up-to-date equipment and techniques.
3. 50 per cent of the cost of crime laboratories and police academies.

Mayor John V. Lindsay of New York described the President's proposal as "timely."

He added: "New York City is already developing fast-moving, tactical units and instant communications system and a modern police academy. We are very hopeful that the President's message presages significantly broader federal support for our vital law enforcement programs."

## Review Of Wild Rivers Bill Asked

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—The "Wild Rivers Bill" has been re-introduced for consideration in Congress by Sens. Frank Church, D-Idaho, and Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash.

The bill was passed by the Senate last year but died in the House Interior Committee. It also was sponsored by Church and Jackson, with 30 other cosponsors.

The bill would establish restrictions against dam construction and certain other activities on portions of the following rivers: Salmon and Clearwater Middle Fork, Idaho; Rogue, Oregon; Rio Grande, New Mexico; and Shenandoah, Cacapon and Lost, W.Va.

Signs Of Easier Credit Are Rising In U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Money remains tight in many parts of the nation but signs of easier credit are mounting.

The first sign is the 6 per cent prime interest rate that banks charge their favored customers for loans came Wednesday when a relatively small Minnesota institution reduced its rate from 6 per cent to 5.75 per cent.

Isolated action by the National City Bank of Minneapolis surprised many bankers but it was hailed by the Treasury Department.

"The Treasury is heartened and pleased at this early movement in the direction of lower interest rates that the President advanced in the State of the Union message," the department said in response to an inquiry.

President Johnson, in proposing a 6 per cent surcharge on income and corporation taxes Tuesday night in his message to Congress, said it was partly designed to keep the economy growing without new inflationary strain and to move toward easier credit and lower interest rates.

The Minneapolis bank's action, although unique, was not the only sign of an easing Wednesday.

First National City Bank, New York's largest, announced a cut in the interest rate it will pay on some long-term certificates of deposit.

The rate since last spring has been 5.5 per cent on certificates maturing in 30 days or more. First National City cut the rate on maturities of nine months and longer to 5 1/2 per cent.

Banks raised their interest rates on deposits last year in an attempt to attract new savings. In an unrelated action, the Provident Savings Bank in Baltimore announced a 10 per cent cut in the down payment required on a new home in order to obtain a mortgage, and a 5 per cent cut on the down payment for an older home.

Provident also said it is encouraging home buyers to apply for loans. Lack of money last year forced many institutions to reject loan applications.

Action by Provident followed within hours an announcement by the Federal Home Loan Bank Board that it is making \$1 billion available to mutual savings banks and savings and loan associations for residential mortgages.

The board said the money became available because of the currently better financial position of the thrift institutions.

The prime rate is a charge for loans to a bank's most credit-worthy customers, usually large corporations, but other interest rates are scaled upward from it.

The prime rate was increased three times last year, finally to 6 per cent in August.

Walter W. Heller, former chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, who suggested last month a surtax similar to the one proposed by President Johnson, is a director of the Minneapolis bank and recommended the lower rates in a year-end report.

There was little indication elsewhere in the nation, however, that the Minneapolis lead would be followed.

New Parcel Post Rates Will Go Into Effect On Sunday

New rates and a changed system for identifying parcel-post zones will go into effect Jan. 15, and use of ZIP code will make it easier to mail parcels after that date, Twin Falls Postmaster Fred Sanger announced Thursday.

This change will be particularly helpful to mailers who need to determine mailing costs and affix the postage themselves before bringing their parcels to the office.

The rate increases will average about 40 cents per parcel, Mr. Sanger said, and beginning July 1, the new law provides for a series of annual increases in the size and weight limitations on packages which may be mailed between first-class offices. Twin Falls is a first-class office, as are Burley, Buhl, Jerome and Rupert and all will benefit greatly from this new program.

Use of ZIP Code in the recipient's address will provide an easy way for the sender, or accepting post office clerk, to quickly determine the proper postal zone, and thus the postage rate, for the package. Under the new system postal zones will be based on the distance the article travels between the 552 sectional centers in the United States.

By reference to a simple one-page chart, which is available at all post offices, postal zones can be readily identified because the first three numbers of the ZIP code represent the sectional center with which the office of address is associated.

This is another one of the many ways in which ZIP code improves mail handling efficiency and replaces the old method by which frequent reference to a huge directory was necessary to determine postal zones for the nation's 3,000 post offices.

The postmaster noted that all parcels mailed between the 42 post offices within the area of the Twin Falls sectional center will be charged at the first zone rate.

The new rates are expected to provide an additional \$74 million in year for the Post Office Department. The later size and

weight increases will add another \$32 million a year. The additional revenue is to help keep parcel post rates within four per cent of costs of handling parcels as required by law, Mr. Sanger said.

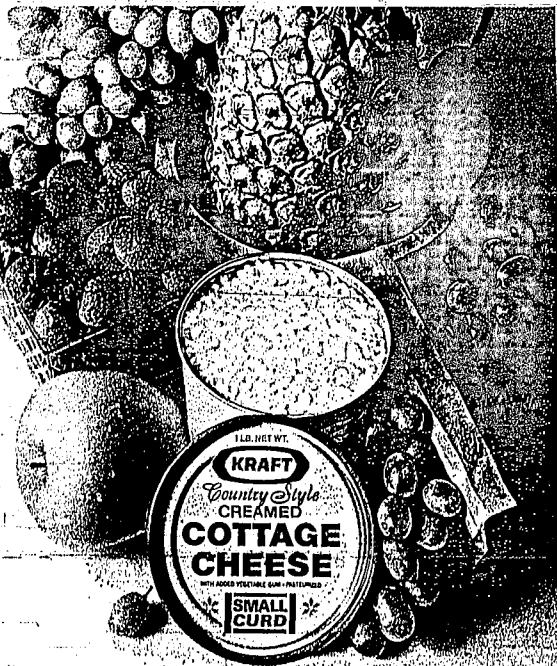

Humans May Have Heart Transplants In Future

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Some time in the not too distant future, possibly within five years, a human will receive a heart transplant, according to a report at the Medical College of Virginia.

That is a reluctant prediction of Dr. Richard J. Cleveland, one of two surgeons who have transplanted hearts from dead dogs to live ones. Some of the dogs lived more than 48 hours without additional treatment.

Dr. Cleveland's hesitancy stems from the awareness that premature conjecture might lead to false hopes by persons with chronic or terminal heart disease.

The prediction was made after disclosure that Dr. Cleveland and Dr. Richard R. Lower have successfully transplanted dog cadaver hearts.

The experiments were outlined in a paper prepared by the surgeons for a transplantation conference in Santa Barbara, Calif.

Explaining the paper in an interview Wednesday, Dr. Cleveland said that of the first dogs, eight lived more than 48 hours without treatment to combat the natural rejection reaction that occurs in humans and animals.

Other canines who received transplants from living donors have lived more than a year, he said.

The natural reaction of a body receiving a transplanted organ is to reject it, Dr. Cleveland said. The rejection rate among kidney transplants has been high. Death often results from potent anti-rejection drugs.

It's possible the heart may not be as incompatible as the kidney, Dr. Cleveland said. "This is just an impression. I wouldn't want to say this is based on scientific fact."

Consequently, efforts are centered on development of new drugs to combat rejection, and experiments to preserve cadaver hearts "for what we consider to be a prolonged period of time."

# Lodge Predicts Downturn Of U.S. Casualties In Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge predicted today a downturn in the percentage of American casualties in Vietnam this year.

"The war would be pretty nearly over," Lodge added, once success is achieved in wiping out the threat from the hard-core terrorists in Vietnamese villages. But he gave no date on when he thought this slower, pacification task might be completed.

Lodge spoke in an interview with The Associated Press prior to his departure for Saigon Saturday after a month in the United States on home leave and consultation.

He met Wednesday with President Johnson. Afterward, he told reporters U.S. forces may win military victory over organized troops this year but this would not automatically end the war.

As Lodge outlined it in his interview, there are actually four kinds of war being fought in South Vietnam — the conventional military operation against large units, wounding or terrorizing the population, a conventional political system which is under way, and the economic battle in which inflation has been successfully "staved off" at this point.

U.S. troops have been searching out Viet Cong and North Vietnamese army units. The American forces now total around 400,000 and they have been suffering about 100 killed a week.

"I believe the purely military part of the war which is what the Americans are engaged in — will make tremendous progress in 1967 and that the percentage of American casualties will start declining," Lodge said.

"The wounding out of the terrorists, however, takes longer," he added. "It is almost wholly a job for the Vietnamese."

"Until this is done and until local political institutions are constructed under which a police program and an economic and social program can be conducted, the Vietnamese cannot stand by itself and will continue to require help."

Lodge figured that a few thousand "hard-core" terrorists "are behind" some 150,000 "bank and file terrorists" and that the hard core leaders are responsible for forcing young villagers into service with the Viet Cong and the North Vietnamese units.

"If, therefore, we are successful at ferreting out and eliminating the hard-core terrorists and establishing the villagers' confidence in their government's ability to assure their security," he said, "impressment of young males would cease and the Viet Cong would be pretty nearly over."

Here are some of the questions asked Lodge, along with his answers:

Q: "What does the bombing of the North accomplish? Does it harm civilians more than the military?"

A: "The bombing of the North very severely hampers the Viet Cong line of communication whereby it supports its forces which are combatting aggression against South Vietnam. Were this bombing to stop, the Viet Cong would be more aggressive and this would result in killing and wounding many more American troops."

Some civilians are always killed in war. Regrettably some civilians are killed accidentally in Vietnam. That is tragic. But if better special attention should be made of civilians who are killed in South Vietnam, not by accident but by deliberate Viet Cong policy. This goes on week after week.

Q: "Is there a 'credibility gap' concerning administration statements on Vietnam and if so, who is to blame?"

A: "I think the statements of the United States government are believed by our adversaries,

### GMC Has 47 Out-Of-Court Settlements

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors Corp. announced Wednesday an out-of-court settlement of 47 suits seeking \$25 million damages in connection with accidents plaintiffs filed to the design of Corvair automobiles in 1965.

The settlement was reached with David M. Harney, a Los Angeles attorney handling the suits for the plaintiffs.

No payment was made in one-third of the cases, GM said. A total of about \$550,000 will be paid on the other cases.

GM said its attorneys and Harney agreed that some of the cases should be dismissed outright in exchange for waiver of costs.

Others, the firm said, would be settled "for purse nuisance value" with "nominal amounts" being paid on the remaining cases, recognizing the expenses involved in lengthy trials and the possible emotional impact on juries of some plaintiffs.

Most of the suits alleged that automobile accidents and injuries — resulted from defects in the design of the Corvairs.

Harney brought four suits to trial. GM said in two cases juries found in favor of GM. Another found against GM, but the judge threw the verdict out, saying it was not supported by the evidence. The fourth jury deliberated five days but failed to reach a verdict.

A fifth case resulted in another ruling favoring GM, the firm said.

### Problems Are Easing For Sneezing Girl

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A high school girl whose constant sneezing brought counsel from all over the country is now feeling fine, she said today.

Brown-haired June Clark, 18, still sneezes and doctors still don't know why. However, she said she sneezes only once every half hour or so and does it lightly.

Her present condition is in happy contrast to a siege of more than 150 days, about a year ago, when the girl's 128-pound body was wracked about every four minutes in waking hours by a sneeze.

Her head-and-chest-ached, breathing and eating difficulties and muscle spasms. More than once she was hospitalized. Scores of remedies were tried and many more considered.

Then a psychologist rigged up an apparatus that gave June a mild but unpleasant electric shock each time she sneezed. The shocks apparently inhibited nerves which were triggering the sneezes, and the girl's sneezing rates dropped dramatically.

"I still take a treatment once a week," the Carol City High School junior said, "but now the treatment only involves a couple of shocks."

### Taxes Hiked On Childless Couples

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Communist Romania has introduced additional income taxes for childless couples and all those over 25 who are unmarried, the Yugoslav news agency Tanjug reported from Bucharest.

The agency said the decree of the state council went into force Jan. 1. It follows another in October which made divorces difficult to obtain and which banned abortions.

Families with more than three children have special allowances.

## Masters To Reduce Sale Of Tickets

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — The Masters Golf Tournament reversed the trend of trying to attract larger and ever larger crowds to sports events, plans to sell fewer tickets to its 1967 tourney.

The Augusta National Golf Club said in a statement Wednesday that overtaxed accommodations in Augusta during recent tournaments had led to the decision to sell fewer admission credentials for this year's play April 6-9 and that the credentials would be sold only to the club's patrons.

Furthermore, said Chairman Clifford Roberts of the Masters Tournament Committee, the price of series badges will be raised from \$15 to \$20. "It was quick to add that even the increased fee still leaves us under the amount being charged by other leading golf tournaments," he said. The Masters is considered one of gold's major annual tournaments. Each year it attracts the nation's outstanding players as well as leading foreign competitors.

Thousands of fans attend the annual spectacle. The club would not disclose, however, the number of tickets sold last year. Nor would it estimate the daily attendance.

## Pairings And Sites Set For NCAA Meet

HOUSTON (AP) — First round sites were fixed Wednesday for three of the regional tournaments in the national collegiate basketball championship. Play begins March 11. The sites are Colorado State University at Fort Collins, for the West; Texas Christian University at Fort Worth, for the Midwest; and the University of Kentucky at Lexington, for the Midwest. ## Robinson Adds Laurels By Being Named 'Male Athlete Of Year'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — After being named Male Athlete of the Year, about the only honor left for Frank Robinson is comeback of the Year.

The slugging Baltimore outfielder obviously ignored thoughts of comeback honors for 1967 when he won batting's Triple Crown in the American League last season and led the Orioles to the pennant and a World Series sweep-over Los Angeles.

That performance got him selected Most Valuable Player in the league and top player in the Series. Wednesday he was chosen Male Athlete of the Year for 1966 in the annual Associated Press poll.

"It comes as a real surprise," said the 31-year-old Oriole at his home here. "I had never even thought about it. Being selected over all the athletes in the country is a tremendous honor."

When told the award covered athletes throughout the world, he was speechless.

Robinson drew 119 first-place votes and 586 points, beating out recently retired pitching star Sandy Koufax of Los Angeles, who collected 98 top votes and 501 points.

Jim Ryun of Kansas, world's fastest miler, was first on 103 ballots and had 466 points for third and quarterback Bart Starr of the Green Bay Packers was a distant fourth with 164 points.

Points were awarded on a basis of 3 for a first-place vote, 2 for second and 1 for third with 428 sports writers and radio and television sportscasters voting.

Robinson will be presented the award by the Fraternal Order of Eagles Feb. 11 in San Francisco.

The award climaxes a career of honors for Robinson, who was National League rookie of the year in 1955, Sophomore of the year in 1957 and Most Valuable Player in 1961 in Cincinnati and seven times an All-Star during his 11-year major league career.

He paced the AL in hitting with a .319 average, 49 home runs and 122 runs batted in. His two-run homer in the first game started the Orioles to their Series sweep and his homer was the only run in the fourth contest.

"The knee is not built back as it was yet," Robinson said, "but it's coming along faster than anyone thought it would. I'm running on it now—nothing fancy, just straight ahead—and I should be ready for spring training."

"They (the Orioles) have their figure and I have mine," said Robinson, who could be eyeing something close to \$100,000 after receiving a reported \$62,500 last season. "I don't look for prolonged talks, who obtained him in the 'I've never been a holdout."

## NCAA Members Vote To Retain Athletic Academic Requirement

By WILL GRIMSLEY Associated Press Sports Writer HOUSTON (AP) — The Ivy League and other Eastern colleges were soundly rebuffed Wednesday in their efforts to eliminate the 1.6 rule which puts a minimum on academic requirements for a player to compete in the NCAA's post-season championships.

The NCAA convention also voted down moves to confine the rule strictly to student athletes, to make it not apply after a student has once entered an institution, and to require all members to use a national table instead of conference or institutional tables in determining grades.

The 1.6 grade is equivalent to a D-plus average. The NCAA action is supposed to be a move to eliminate team athletes. The Eastern College Athletic Conference, comprising 146 NCAA members, was defeated despite support from the South-west and Atlantic Coast Conferences.

The Ivies have been adamant in their refusal to sign a form saying they would abide by the rule, contending it did not apply to them because they do not give scholarships based on athletic ability alone. As a result, they have been ineligible to participate in the NCAA's post-season championships.

The Ivy League schools have refused to sign a form saying they would abide by the rule, contending it did not apply to them because they do not give scholarships based on athletic ability alone.

As a Bushnell, commissioner of the ECAC, said he anticipated revolt over the rebuff. "Whether institutions conform or don't conform will be up to the individual," he said. "I only encourage now is to work for a change in the rules next year."

He said 35 schools failed to abide by the rule during the past year, among them Yale, Harvard and Pennsylvania. The other Ivies signed the paper agreeing to the rule.

## Kiesinger And De Gaulle Will Meet Friday

FRANCE HAS traditional cultural and diplomatic ties with the nations of Eastern Europe. West Germany has more goods to sell than it can absorb. The French government is ready to look on benevolently and help where they can. The U. S. government also wants better relations with Communist countries of Eastern Europe, but is hampered by the Vietnam war. De Gaulle has won regard among the Communists by blaming the United States for the war. Erhard gave the United States moral support, and gave Vietnam some humanitarian aid. Kiesinger has avoided the subject.

BONN, Germany (AP) — Kurt Georg Kiesinger, West Germany's new chancellor, met French President Charles de Gaulle on Friday for the first time in a new effort for Western European unity — this time along lines De Gaulle may find acceptable.

De Gaulle is known to want a loosely bound "Europe of the fatherlands," with each nation strictly keeping its own identity. It would be — certainly in the beginning — little more than a series of regularly scheduled meetings of top officials, who would try to coordinate policies. Probably it would be limited at the start to the nations of the Common Market: France, West Germany, Italy, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg.

De Gaulle is not enthusiastic about British participation. Ludwig Erhard, Kiesinger's predecessor as chancellor, wanted Britain in the market. He had in mind a more integrated organization than De Gaulle favors. It never got anywhere.

But Kiesinger and his coalition government are expected to establish a better rapport with De Gaulle. Kiesinger was born near France, speaks its language well.

In foreign affairs, Erhard's overriding concern was to keep on good terms with the United States. At home, his main concern was economics — a subject that does not much interest De Gaulle.

The Kiesinger-De Gaulle meeting is one of the semiannual series between the two countries' leaders set up in the treaty that ex-Chancellor Konrad Adenauer signed in 1963.

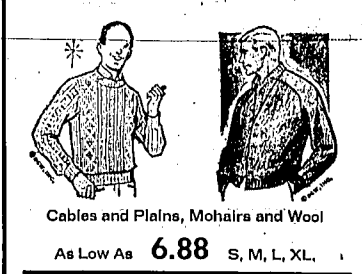

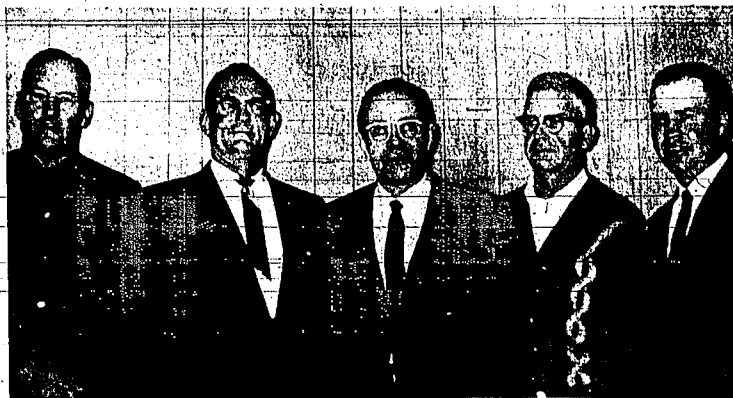

**Wholesale Food Prices Are Down Since Thanksgiving**

NEW YORK (AP)—Wholesale food prices have been dropping ever since Thanksgiving, and consumers may reap some of the harvest in the supermarkets this month.

Beef and pork are more plentiful than a year ago and egg prices have dropped 1 to 6 cents a dozen this week. And have you taken a look at oranges and grapefruit?

The lower prices aren't universal, however. And the higher prices paid for fresh meat at the wholesale centers this week may be passed on to consumers this weekend.

Lamb prices generally are higher this week, although they usually are lowest from January through April.

Whatever your family wants for dinner you may find it on special at some store in your area. It will pay to watch store specials.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture forecast the 1966-1967 orange crop at a record 181,300,000 boxes, up 28 per cent from last year.

There also are bountiful crops of grapefruits, tangerines, tangelos, lemons and limes, leading to lower prices.

Many stores are offering specials on frozen orange juice concentrate.

Carrots and mixed greens are beginning to move out of Texas, and carrots may offer a good buy in many areas.

A dense cloud blanket protected the Rio Grande Valley's rich citrus fruit crop from a snow storm this week. But a snow in Mexico raised fears that the valuable coffee crop might be destroyed.
