thoughts of Mao Tse-tung to
solve all problems, they see the
golden classless future as re-
to inherit. Their movement is a

pilgrimage but the only dietary
isolation must spread to every
work, bench and rice paddy in
the land.

Apparently, all major cities
now have a similar flood of
marchers. The disruption of
working-to-feed-their-families
traffic, normal working and
foot supplies is unpaginable.

One group of 50, with bedrolls
on their backs and mostly bare-
foot, had been walking behind
their red flag along dusty routes
for four days. They said it may
be a year before they see their
village again.

Wealthy U.S. Businessmen Plan To Better Trade In Eastern Europe

NEW YORK (AP)—The Rockefeller brothers and Cyrus S. Eaton Jr., representing two of the nation's richest families, plan to build a better trade bridge between the Western Hemisphere and Communist countries in Eastern Europe.

The financial alliance, linking Wall Street and the Midwest, was disclosed Sunday and confirmed by Richard S. Aldrich of the Rockefeller-miscris.

It will involve cooperation between the International Basic Economy Corp., controlled by the Rockefeller brothers, and Tower International, Inc., headed by Eajan, a Cleveland industrialist.

Aldrich, a vice president and director of IBEC, said his organization's objective "is to improve the standard of living of the peoples of the world."

"An initiative that creates a commercial—and industrial—dialogue between the East and the West cannot help but contribute. The trade exchange plan, encompassing the United States, Canada and Latin America, brings together the enormous investment skills of the Rockefeller and the almost unique relationship the Eatons have with the Soviet bloc."

Cyrus S. Eaton Sr., long an advocate of closer ties between the United States and the Soviet Union, has cultivated some support behind the iron curtain by his trips to Moscow. He has entertained Soviet leaders, including former Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev.

In today's New York Times, a two-page Soviet advertisement stresses that ideological differences are no barrier to trade, and assures American businessmen that Soviet foreign trade organizations "are also ready to strike up relations with you."

The two-page spread, headed "Foreign Trade — Two-Way Traffic," further states that "The U.S.S.R. favors mutually beneficial trade relations with the countries and this is not a mere political assertion." The advertisement was placed by Amtorg-Trading Corp., which handles most trade between the United States and the Soviet Union.

The IBEC, organized in 1947 by Nelson A. Rockefeller, now New York's governor, specializes in promoting and developing nations. It has interests in 29 nations, but none in the Communist bloc.

Tower International has specialized in promoting and arranging the financing of projects in Eastern Europe.

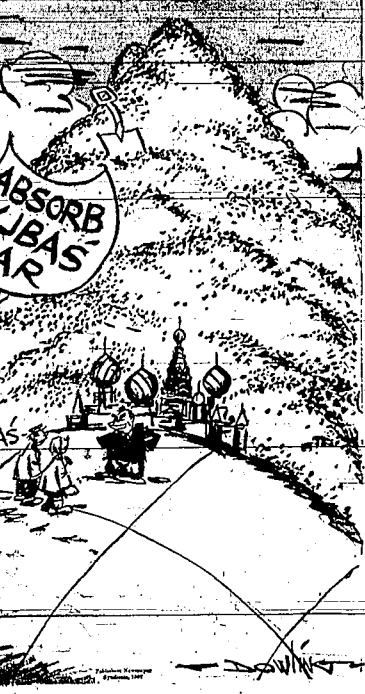

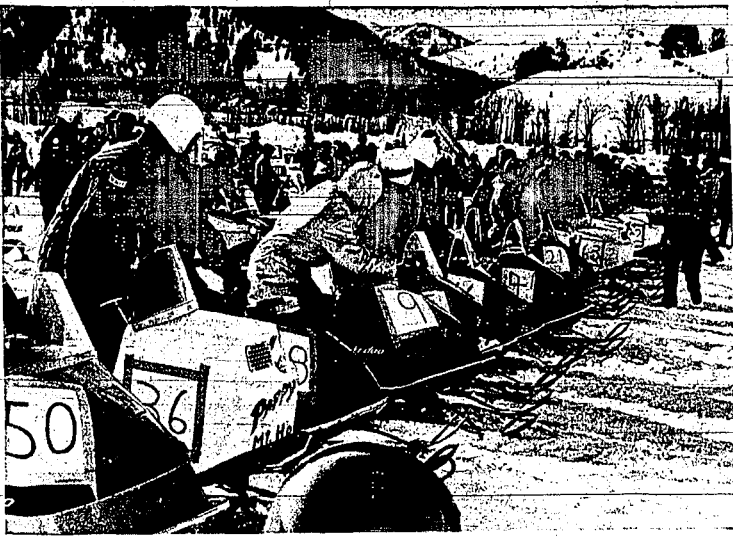

Dirksen Says Space Program Could Be Place To Cut Federal Expenditures

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, looking for ways to avoid a tax increase, says the space program could be the place to cut government expenditures.

Dirksen said "I've been looking at that space program, I don't mind telling you. Does it really make a difference whether we get to the moon this year, next year, or the following year?"

"I doubt very much whether it makes a great deal of difference," he said Sunday on ABC's "Issues and Answers." "And if we reconcile ourselves to that, then of course there is a place where you can make a very substantial budget cut."

Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., said Sunday on CBS' "Face the Nation" that cuts in federal spending are the key to the tax issue. He said there "is no economic case" for the 6 per cent income tax surcharge asked by President Johnson. Long said "I would tend to retard the economy."

He expressed doubt it would soon be approved.

Five freshmen Republican senators said on the NBC television "Meet the Press" show there was no other way to finance the Vietnam war before they would vote for a tax increase.

The five are Sens. Charles H. Percy of Illinois, Mark O. Hatfield of Oregon, Edward W. Brooke of Massachusetts, Howard H. Baker Jr. of Tennessee and Clifford P. Hansen of Wyoming.

Over the weekend, the government made public a mixed bag of economic statistics. The figures were topped by a record \$739.5-billion production of goods and services during 1966, up \$38.3-billion from the gross national product of 1965 and

more than \$17 billion ahead of the predictions made by Johnson a year ago.

But 36 per cent of that increase was chalked up to inflation.

The figures also showed increasing inventories, frequently a harbinger of economic downturn. Inventories went from \$9.9 billion in the third quarter to \$12.4 billion in the fourth quarter.

The physical volume of production during 1966 was up 5.2 per cent, slightly below the 6 per cent rise of 1965 which the government called "very strong."

The President's economic report scheduled for submission to Congress next week is expected to predict a gross national product of about \$785 billion to \$790 billion in 1967.

Elsewhere on the government's economic front, congressional investigations into the Federal National Mortgage Association and Johnson's recent highway spending cutbacks were indicated.

Chairman Wright Patman, D-Tex., of the House Banking Committee and Rep. William A. Barrett, D-Pa., chairman of the housing subcommittee, questioned whether FNMA policies reflect adequate support of the housing money market. They said it was "high time that the Congress looked into" some FNMA policies.

Sen. Jennings Randolph, D-W. Va., said his Public Works committee would begin hearings as soon as February into the effect of the 1 1/2 per cent highway cutback ordered as an anti-inflation tool.

Population Growth Makes Opportunities

YAKIMA, Wash. (AP) — A Boise, Idaho, executive told the Western States Farm Forum today a high population growth in the west has brought opportunities as well as problems.

R. V. Hansberger, president of the Boise Cascade Corp., told the forum growth of 11 western states from 1955 to 1965 was nearly four times the national average.

"The tide of growth is upon us," he said, "and we have a golden opportunity now to plan in such a way as to assure a strong economic base, conservation of our natural resources, maximum development of our people and protection against the hazards of congested population."

Hansberger emphasized the increasing importance of agriculture, and that the West's leading industry is "food and kindred products."

Redecorating Hint Plays Up Beauty Spot

One of the most difficult problems for many homemakers when redecorating is where to start. Why not start with a treasured painting or work of art? There's no law that says an accessory has to fit into a room; trying the room fit the accessory.

The most obvious and most effective way to play up the painting is with color. As the largest single area of color in the room, carpeting plays an especially important role here. Carpets of the new man-made fibers, such as Creslan acrylic fiber, would be a good choice because of the exceptional range of colors available.

Matching the dominant color in the painting creates a monochromatic effect in the finished room. For a dramatic contrast of color, select a carpet of brilliant red or emerald green as a setting for a bold black and white ink drawing. Or, you can point up a painting more subtly by choosing one of its less dominant shades as the carpet color.

Upholstered furniture and other fabrics in the room, too, may either match or contrast with the dominant colors, depending on the effect you want to create.

Walls, especially the wall on which the painting hangs, should be neutral in color so as not to detract from the focal point of the room.

The "feeling" of the painting as well as its color can be interpreted in the "decor" of a room. Of course, the clean lines of modern furniture go best with a boldly modern abstract; traditional with a reproduction of an old master. If the painting seems to radiate a feeling of warmth, play this up with a richly textured carpet and upholstery fabrics with interesting textures.

Other accessories can contribute, too. For example, if a painting is a still life—perhaps a bowl of fruit—a similar bowl of real or artificial fruit some-
