
## Astronauts Paid Final Honors

WASHINGTON (AP)—The three Apollo astronauts who perished in a spacecraft fire went to their resting places today. President Johnson, Vice President Hubert M. Humphrey, and all other leaders did them homage.


In separate ceremonies on a wintry hilltop overlooking the country's capital, Air Force Lt. Col. Virgil I. Grissom and Navy Lt. Cmdr. Roger B. Chaffee were buried side by side in Arlington National Cemetery. Meanwhile, Air Force Lt. Col. Edward H. White II was interred at the U. S. Military Academy, West Point.

At Cape Kennedy, Fla., scene of last Friday's tragedy, a group of men in white robes, some of them in military uniforms, stood in a line. They were the three men's lives. A bright sun shone as rifles volleyed and taps sounded.

The study, prepared by the Lovelace Foundation for Medical Education and Research, Albuquerque, N. M., was part of a series on space cabin fire and blast hazards. It suggested that the ease with which scientists had involved previous fire threats in handling oxygen in space cabins may have created a "false sense of security."

It was previously reported by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration that the last words, from an unidentified voice, were: "Fire in the spacecraft."

## Second Craft Fire Kills One

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—A flash fire similar to the one that killed the three Apollo 1 astronauts Friday raced through a space cabin simulator today at the School of Aerospace Medicine, killing one airman and critically burning another.

The fire burst 9:04-8:45 a.m. in a Boeing Air Force Base spokesman said. He said the airman were performing maintenance in a 100-cubic-foot space cabin simulator in an experimental environment in an experiment designed to study the effects of pure oxygen on the crew of a space shuttle.

# NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—For Dick Nixon, the thing some never seems to be quite right. If the Republican convention were held tomorrow, the mechanics of the party are completely wrong. Nixon would get the Presidential nomination but they are gloomy about his prospects 18 months hence.  
These nuts-and-bolts men put down in states abolished in the Nixon column—today, they include two big electoral states, Texas and California, and 15 other states whose support reflect Nixon's strength in the South and West—Florida, South Carolina, Arkansas, Colorado, North Carolina, Georgia, Virginia, Alabama, Tennessee, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arizona, Oklahoma, Idaho and Wyoming.  
In short, Nixon is as safe as he could reasonably expect to be in what is rather arbitrarily described as Goldwater Country. A contributing factor to the success of the conservative governors were elected in Wyoming, Idaho, California and Oklahoma last November.  
A COMPETITIVE NOTE—But in the long meantime, Nixon is likely to have the states, he must carve himself a slice of what is now regarded as Romney territory, to wit, the populous eastern-northern tier. A fact of political life is highly significant in this respect, for it is not in Goldwater Country that the four presidential primaries will be staged but in four northern states—Wisconsin, Oregon, Nebraska and New Hampshire. Even with solid support from the Goldwater-southern area, Nixon's hopes would still be dashed if George Romney knocked him off in these early primaries.  
It is for that reason that the Nixon camp has decided, characteristically, to let Romney do the heavy lifting in many respects, while he is strictly conventional in an important way. Like all his predecessors, he wants history to record him as a superior president.  
To quit after one full term, with so many major national challenges still to go or only briefly faced, would be to acknowledge failure on the job and suggest strong fears that he could not win in 1968.  
Admittedly, public opinion polls showing him with less than half the voting populace in support of his present program may stir such fears. But polls change. And, anyway, few leading political figures allow their decision to run or not to run to be guided principally by opinion samplings.  
The late Arthur Schlesinger Sr. demonstrated in one of his historical writings that wanting to stay on the job as long as possible was an occupational ailment of the U.S. presidency.  
He discovered that the old pre-FDR "no third term" tradition was not so much an honored principle as a reluctantly accepted fact of political life by men who actually aspired to go on and on. James K. Polk was one of the few presidents who sternly limited himself not just to two terms, but to one.  
The motivating force in the drive to stay on in the White House was always the deep-felt notion that the experienced incumbent had important unfinished business to conclude—and in any event could do the job better than anybody else on the horizon.  
Lyndon Johnson, the man who ascended to White House power with more than 30 years of experience in the federal government under his belt, hardly strikes his friends as one likely to depart from this commonly held attitude among presidential incumbents.  
Furthermore, he has another powerful motive for wishing to run and win again in 1968.  
For two years now, he has been listening to wise types say that he won big in 1964—only because he had an incredibly weak Republican adversary in Barry Goldwater and was riding a huge wave of sympathy for the late John F. Kennedy, whose assassination thrust him into power.  
There is evidence that Johnson would like to show he can win well under different conditions — and particularly against stiffer GOP opposition.  
All the current indications are that he would get a far tougher race, since polls continue to show Michigan's Gov. George Romney ahead of Johnson by substantial margins.  
This being the prospect, and LBJ being governed by the standard presidential compulsion to win the verdict of history, his friends have always been convinced of his intent to make another race.  
The fading Washington cocktail-circuit reports that he would howl out seem to have been in large part the product of unhappy liberals, for whom the wish was father to the thought. Many men said it in the hope that Lyndon Johnson would begin thinking what they said he was thinking.  
Even at the height of the rumors, however, the more professionally minded Democrats were wary. Parties are not in the habit of dumping "one-term" incumbents, since it amounts to heavy party self-criticism. After the Democratic governor-ant-LBJ blast at White Sulphur Springs in December, it was significant that many quickly tried to separate themselves from the harsh tone of that assault. They have to live with the man who gives their leader until 1973.  
It seems appropriate that the biggest state in the Union should have the biggest travel folder. The Alaska Travel Division has just produced a two-foot-by-three-foot full-color brochure depicting the 49th state's attractions.

**SOUR IT IS**  
So many people have written asking Mr. Spectator for various Sour Dough recipes that the old boy was in the dog house. His cook's answer all the many letters and telephone calls—heretofore—the letters sent to us will be considered answered by this reprint of the sour dough items. So here goes:  
**OLD TIME STARTER**  
2 cups unbleached flour  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 tablespoon salt  
1/2 cup water  
1/2 cup vinegar  
Combine flour, sugar and salt in crock or bowl and mix well. Add water and beat until smooth. Add vinegar, cover with cheesecloth and place in warm place until thoroughly sour. Tell by the smell in about 12 hours.  
**MODERN STARTER**  
2 cups warm water  
2 packages or 2 tablespoons dry yeast  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 cup flour  
In large crock pour warm water. Add dry yeast. Stir until dissolved. Add sugar and flour. Let rise in crock overnight in warm place if you want to use it next morning. Future use: Use in your sour dough. Use in warm place overnight before using. Always save at least 1/2 cup sour dough as a starter for your next batch.  
Build up starter by occasionally adding water, sugar and flour as given in recipe.  
**SOUR DOUGH BISCUITS**  
1 1/2 cups sifted flour  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup water  
Sift dry ingredients. Cut in butter. Add starter and mix. Turn dough out on lightly flour-boarded surface. Roll out with a rolling pin to 1/4 inch thick. Roll out and place on well greased 9x9x2 inch pan. Brush with melted butter. Let rise in warm place for one hour. Bake in hot oven, 425 degrees for 20 minutes. Serve hot. Makes 12 biscuits.

# TODAY AND TOMORROW

Compared with last year's budget, the present one is a refreshingly straightforward piece of estimating and accounting. Gone is the absurd assumption that the President would have a pause for the re-examination of the welfare programs.  
On the explosive question of attempting to construct a nuclear defense, the President has proceeded with prudence, starting from the fact that, while it may conceivably be possible to invent and construct a reliable antimissile defense, no such antimissile defense actually exists today, here or in Russia.  
He asks for \$421 million for further research and development in this field. But he devotes firmly to the tested and proven defense against nuclear attack a standard agreement on nuclear defense against missiles. This would be to prevent another upward spiral in the costs and dangers of the nuclear conflict. Here the President has acted with understanding and good sense.  
The reassuring characteristic of the budget is that it is realistic and modest in its claims and promises. There are some who are interpreting this change of mood to mean that the President has finally resolved to pursue military victory and to abandon the quest for a negotiated settlement.  
Without wishing to know what the President has in mind, I see no reason why realism and candor about the war itself are not compatible with, indeed necessary to, realism and candor about the purposes and prospects of the war.




