

## Solons Differ On Financial Needs Of Idaho Schools

BOISE (AP)—Legislative leaders differed today on the financial needs of Idaho's public schools. The chairman of the House Education Committee said Monday's estimate by the speaker of the House was too low. Rep. Lyle Cobbs, R-Boise, educational chairman, said that he thought state aid to elementary and secondary education should be increased by \$14.5 million during the next biennium. Monday, Rep. Pete Cenarrusa, R-Carey, speaker of the House, said an increase of \$10 million should be sufficient.

## Chinese Mobs Demonstrate Near Embassy

MOSCOW (AP)—Shouting Chinese mobs demonstrated outside the Soviet Embassy in Peking for the 12th straight day today, trapping Soviet employees inside the building, the Czechoslovak news agency C.T.K. reported from the Chinese capital.

C.T.K. said the Chinese Foreign Ministry warned Monday night that the "safety of Soviet citizens outside the embassy cannot be ensured."

The agency said Polish and Czechoslovak diplomats came to the aid of the embattled embassy staff today, driving their cars through the embassy gates with difficulty to bring them food.

## Viet Cong Shell Four Airfields

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—The Viet Cong shelled four airfields in South Vietnam today in an 11th hour surge before the start of the lunar New Year festival, U.S. and South Vietnamese forces reported 143 Communist soldiers killed in ground fighting.

Simultaneously U.S. warplanes, beginning their third day of offensive against North Vietnam, got in a final day of bombing raids before the cease-fire but poor flying weather held down the number of strikes.

The truce, in observance of the Vietnamese New Year called Tet, will start at 7 a.m. Wednesday, 7 p.m. (EST) in the air for four days. The Viet Cong has declared a truce of seven days.

## New Trial Sought For James Hoffa

CINCINNATI, Ohio (AP)—Defense attorneys today sought a new trial for James Hoffa, president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, who is charged with conspiracy in the 1962 slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Hoffa is fighting an eight-year prison sentence handed down in March 1964 in federal court in Chattanooga, Tenn. The charges resulted from Hoffa's 1962 conspiracy trial in Nashville, Tenn.

Today's hearing was before the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which previously denied Hoffa's appeal for a new trial. The U.S. Supreme Court last December upheld the conviction.

Hoffa, who also was fined \$10,000, was present for the hearing today.

## East Coast Is Plagued By Blizzard

A blizzard rolled over a huge area of the Atlantic Coast today, spilling snow and hurling high winds through at least 14 states. Airplanes were grounded, schools closed and many roads were almost impassable.

What had been an unusually mild winter in most parts of the East turned into a white nightmare for anyone trying to get anywhere in an area from the Carolinas to Maine. Air traffic at New York's three metropolitan airports slowed to a near standstill. Washington's National Airport was closed and traffic at Dulles International Airport was sharply curtailed.

School closings were reported over the entire region swept by the storm.

The blizzard—defined by the Weather Bureau as blowing or falling snow, winds of at least 35 miles an hour and temperatures below 20 degrees—dumped from three to nine inches of snow on parts of Kentucky, Virginia, Tennessee, North Carolina, Washington, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Maine, Vermont, New Hampshire and Rhode Island.

By midmorning, five inches of snow had fallen on New York City and the Weather Bureau predicted that the total rainfall and snow reach 15 inches before the storm died.

The blizzard had formed off the Carolina coast and swept northeastward during the pre-dawn hours.

All of New York City's public schools were ordered shut in the first onslaught of the storm that threatened the city and served on the local school board for many years. He married Edna Mae Clifford June 21, 1933, at Hagerman. He farmed the same ranch from that time until his death.

Funeral services will be conducted at 11 a.m. Friday at the Hagerman Methodist Church by Rev. E. V. Hargreaves. Final rites will be at Hagerman, N. M. cemetery. Graveside services will be conducted by the Masonic Lodge.

## Kennedy Sees French As Good Contacts

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Robert F. Kennedy says he did not bring any Vietnam war peace feelers from Europe, but he told President Johnson the French could provide meaningful contacts with Hanoi.

White House conference with Johnson Monday, "I never received the impression that I was any real contact with Kennedy's position. ## Two "Victims" Help State Police With First Aid Course

Two young men, the apparent victims of a hit and run accident, helped live up to a first aid refresher course Monday for some 26 Idaho State Police officers of the fourth district. Meeting in the auditorium of the state police office on Addison Avenue West, the officers heard a screech of tires, racing motor and gravel flying on the roadway at the rear of the building. It staged a youth, bleeding from an artery and with a severe head laceration.

Another young man was found lying in the roadway behind a building. One "victim" was about 10 feet from the youth and he too was cut and bleeding.

When the first sound of squealing tires was heard two officers dashed to the window and obtained a license number and auto description.

"I thought it was a fake," said patrolman Larry Platt, "but when I saw the cut on the boy's head I decided it was real. It was not real enough, however, except just real enough to test the first aid skills of the officers."

Mrs. Irene Basom, American Red Cross chapter executive secretary, Twin Falls, spent more than an hour attaching 17 x 8 colored wax, complete with deep bleeding incisions, hump particles to represent a compound fracture to the two volunteers.

A small sack of blood-colored substance was attached under one of the young men's arms where he pressed it to give the appearance of a spurting artery. Volunteers for the mock accident were Tom Burnickel and Jim Milton, students at the College of Southern Idaho police academy.

Officers soon discovered the two "victims" were only wearing makeup, but they administered the required first aid and according to instructors succeeded in "saving" both men. Patrolmen Frank Mogensson and Roland Eggertson served as instructors for the eight-hour course.

## Wilson and Kosygin Make Little Progress

LONDON (AP)—No shift in the Soviet attitude toward the war in Vietnam emerged today from the opening of talks between Prime Ministers Alexei Kosygin and Harold Wilson. Informants said Wilson and Kosygin restated their familiar positions on the Southeast Asian war at the first private sessions of the Soviet premier's week-long visit to Britain.

They talked for three hours Monday in the Cabinet room at No. 10 Downing St. That was an hour more than scheduled, but there was no hint that this indicated any progress toward agreements.

A spokesman said it meant they were "usefully occupied in their time."

A news blackout was imposed on the discussions, and some diplomatic commentators took this as a good sign. However, Soviet sources said Kosygin arrived from Moscow ready to press the Communist position that the United States must stop bombing North Vietnam before any peace talks can start.

Wilson, who reportedly had consulted with President Johnson shortly before Kosygin's arrival, favors a new and prolonged pause in the bombing as a means of clearing the air for some new peace initiative. There was no hint here of the U.S. attitude.

Officials refused to disclose the nature of the exchange between Washington and London.

Kosygin and Wilson scheduled 18 hours together, which would provide ample time to work on any new initiative on Vietnam. There was little optimism that they would agree on one.

# Sergeant Picks Right War To Be Wounded

AN. KHIE, Vietnam (NEA) — Veteran Army Sgt. Jim Latham was hit with a mortar fragment here the other day and, although it may be impudent to say, he picked the right war to get wounded in.

In this one he lived. In any other he would have died.

Latham is an excellent illustration of the Medical Corps' miracles being performed all

most routinely in this continuing calamity. He owes his life to what are easily the most incredibly efficient emergency aid procedures in the whole history of combat.

Procedures of transportation. Of facilities. And of present day expertness. Latham got wrapped up in each of the procedures early the morning of a bitter First Air Cavalry flight. He was socked out of action by a mortar explosion which penetrated the upper part of his body.

A medic got to him first, slipped on a sterilized bandage and put in a hurried radio plea for a medical evacuation helicopter.

## Clinical Tests Said Substandard

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two doctors have testified that many clinical laboratory test results are substandard and erroneous and endanger the lives of thousands of patients.

"The performance in a large proportion of the clinical laboratories is largely substandard," Dr. Morris Schaeffer, director of laboratories for the New York City Health Department, told the Senate Antitrust subcommittee Monday.

"Yet thousands of such tests are performed daily and the results reported must so guide the action of the physician that the health or even the lives of certain patients are placed in jeopardy," Dr. Schaeffer said.

## Malaria Sweeps Through Vietnam

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A strain of malaria immune to available drugs is sweeping through Vietnam and has struck more than 10,000 Americans there in less than two years, according to a report by a Navy research team.

"Slow-flying planes have been spraying over friendly Vietnamese territory in an effort to kill the larvae of the mosquitoes that carry the parasitic disease, the report said Monday.

BRIDGE REOPENED RIO VISTA, Calif. (AP) — The Rio Vista Bridge on State Highway 12, over the Sacramento River, knocked out of commission by an Italian freighter Jan. 12, is open again to traffic.

Enemy fire thwarted early aid efforts to rescue the sergeant, but when it subsided (yet not entirely), a green Huey helicopter swooped down to lift the casualty out and a short while later the sergeant was being examined at an intermediary aid station 20 miles away.

Time elapsed: 1 hour, 30 minutes. Early diagnosis indicated severe internal bleeding which meant immediate surgery. Quickly, a jeep moved the patient to a nearby airstrip. A waiting cargo plane transported him hastily to a surgical hospital, another 25 or so miles distant.

En route, the hospital staff was briefed by radio as to the NCO's condition and facilities were ready when the casualty arrived.

Time elapsed: Two hours. In surgery, physicians discovered Latham in critical shape. An inch-long fragment had penetrated his shoulder, on into his chest, changed directions and shot all the way down his diaphragm.

His liver was cut in half. A kidney was shattered. He had no blood pressure. He was nearly dead.

Immediately a call went out in the camp area for whole blood (fresh blood clot quickly) and within 15 minutes 600 G donors were waiting in line. A couple dozen of them were chosen and the first 24 pints began pumping into Jim Latham's arm.

Meanwhile, physicians had opened the sergeant's chest and abdomen in attempts to control the massive internal bleeding which had drained away over half his total blood supply.

Latham's right kidney, beyond repair, was removed. Tubes were inserted into his chest to drain off excess fluid. And, with feverish persistency, the doctors managed to stop all leakage in the liver and tie it up with dozens of catgut sutures.

Time elapsed: Four hours. Major work done, the surgeons concentrated on the other, time-consuming damage—repairing of the lung, cleaning of the chest cavity, insurance manipulations against the possibility of infection.

Tubes were inserted into Latham's common bile duct, his arms and his throat. Dextrose and water, proteins, salt, etc., were injected.

Foreign fragments were removed from his opened flesh. Blood pressure was restored to normal. Regular breathing was restored.

And, finally, in the late morning hours he was swabbed, soothed, injected, sutured, plastered, wrapped up and bedded down very much alive.

Total time: Eight hours.

In another war Latham might not have been so lucky. In 1951 the blood might not have been available, in 1943 the transportation, and in 1917 neither the knowledge nor the facilities. But here and now he lived. "Thank God," he says. And the Medical Corps.

## Father, Son Are On Active Flight Duty In Coast Guard

NEW YORK (AP) — When Steve Goldhammer was 11 years old, he used to watch his father, a Coast Guard pilot, flying around in a helicopter.

"We always lived near the base and he used to fly over the house and wave," Steve recalls. "Everytime he flew over I wished I was up there."

Ensign Steve Goldhammer, now 22, is up there these days flying with his father, Lt. Cmdr. Walter R. Goldhammer, 47, among several other pilots.

Cmdr. Goldhammer says he believes he and Steve are the only father and son on active flight duty in the Coast Guard.

The father has 27 years service. The son won his wings and ensign's bars Jan. 20, a day after he turned 22.

"It was a good birthday present for me," Steve said today. "The Goldhammers are based at Floyd Bennett Field in Brooklyn. They live in the New York suburb of East Meadow on Long Island."

As a matter of routine, officers are permitted to list preferences for duty assignments. Steve put down Floyd Bennett Field and got it.

Cmdr. Goldhammer enlisted in the Coast Guard in 1930, and served as an enlisted pilot guarding convoys in World War

II. He won his commission as an officer in 1945, and has 8,000 hours flying experience in both fixed-wing aircraft and helicopters.

He and Steve have had training missions together, but Steve does not always fly with his father on these missions.

"The commander is one of several senior pilots helping Steve make the transition into the new HH52 single-engine, jet-turbine amphibious helicopter.

Steve says his father did not pressure him into becoming a Coast Guard pilot.

"It was my own desire," he explained. "When I was 11 I decided I'd like to make that my career."

Steve wanted to fly so much that he dropped out of Miami University of Ohio after two years to enlist in the Coast Guard and eventually win acceptance into the Coast Guard aviation cadet program, which was begun in 1961.

"My prime interest in enlisting was becoming a pilot," he said. "This is the only reason I quit school."

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## Tells Hopes Of Vietnamese

NEW YORK (AP)—A former Canadian diplomat says that while he was serving in Hanoi, many North Vietnamese told him they hoped the United States would "liberate" them from the "tyranny and oppression" of their government.

The diplomat, Theodore B. Blockley, was an officer of the International Control Commission for Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia.

Writing in the magazine, Modern Age, he reports:

"Many of the North Vietnamese whom I met expressed the hope that one day the Americans would again liberate them from tyranny and oppression. The previous liberation, in their minds, was from the Japanese."

(Japanese armies occupied Vietnam and the rest of Indochina during World War II.)

The control commission was set up under the 1954 Geneva agreement that ended the fighting between the French and Vietnamese. It has three delegations—Indian, Canadian and Polish. Its function is to see to it that both South and North Vietnam comply with the terms of the 1954 agreement.

The control commission not only was impotent but a "fraud," said Blockley, writing of his experience with the commission.

The word, "control," he writes, "was the height of irony—thecommission had no control over anything, not even its own transport."

As early as 1957, the diplomat said, he reported to his government about "the mounting intensity of North Vietnamese sabotage, subversion and guerrilla operations in South Vietnam, and the apparent inability of the commission to inhibit this attack."

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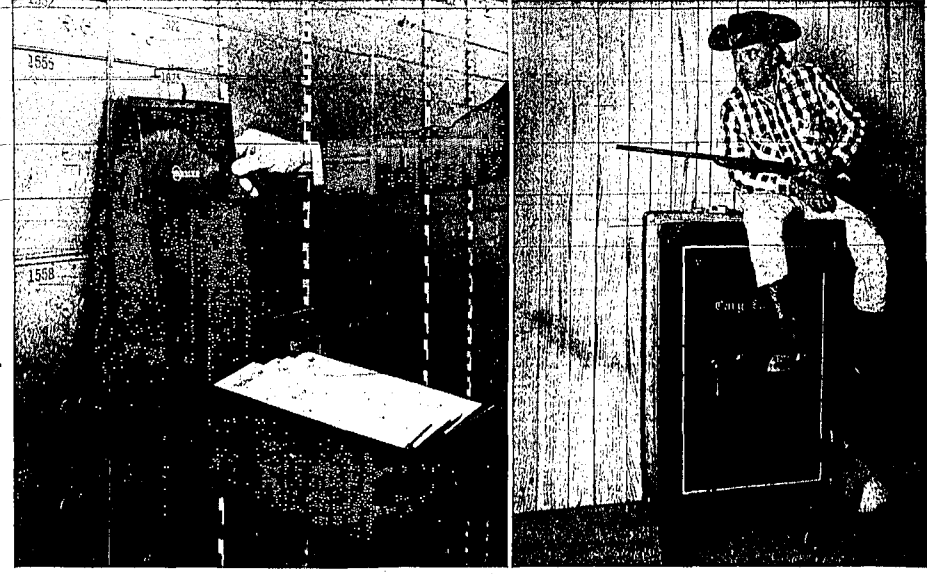

### Secretary Of Treasury, Morgenthau, Dies At Age 75

KEEPSIE, N.Y. (AP) — Morgenthau Jr., who served as secretary of the under Franklin D. Roosevelt, died Monday at the age of 75.

Truman, who had the job of secretary of the treasury, died Monday at the age of 75.

Truman said he replied that the secretary of the treasury was needed more at home than in Potsdam, Truman wrote that Morgenthau "replied that it was necessary for him to go and that if he could not, he would have to quit."

Truman said he told him: "If that is the way you feel, I'll accept your resignation right now."

In his 11 years as secretary, Morgenthau served as chief financial officer of an administration that spent more money than any other up to that time and that intervened more actively in the financial markets of the world than all of its predecessors together.

For 30 years, Morgenthau was Roosevelt's confidant. His farm adjoined Roosevelt's at Hyde Park, N.Y., and they became friends as fellow farmers. As a boy, Morgenthau had refused to follow his wealthy father into business, preferring farming instead. The father died in a stroke in New York real estate.

## Johnson Asks Space Treaty Ratification

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson sends to the Senate today his request for ratification of the outer space peace treaty.

The United States, the Soviet Union, Great Britain and nearly 60 other nations have signed the treaty to preserve outer space for peaceful uses.

Johnson described the occasion — Jan. 27 as "an inspiring moment in the history of the human race."

The treaty provides that all nations are free to explore and use outer space for the benefit of all mankind, but that no nation will place nuclear or other weapons of mass destruction in outer space or on the moon or other celestial bodies.

Signing nations waive any claim to sovereignty in outer space and pledge that no station or spacecraft landing by accident on alien soil must be returned promptly and safely to the home country. Ratification requires two-thirds approval in the Senate.

## Smallest Harris Quintuplet Dies

NEW YORK (AP) — Tiny Talitha Harris, smallest of the four surviving Harris quintuplets, died today of a cardiac arrest following complications of pneumonia.

A spokesman for the Jewish Hospital of Brooklyn said the infant died at 4:15 a.m. about 24 hours after she took a turn for the worse.

Her two sisters and a brother were reported in good condition. The quintuplets were born last Wednesday night to a Brooklyn couple. A fifth infant was dead at birth.



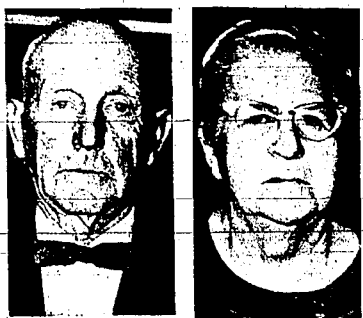

# Posthumous Award Given Young Marine

WASHINGTON (AP) — A 19-year old Marine, whose fatal act of heroism went unnoted at his funeral 17 months ago, will be awarded the nation's highest military honor posthumously today.

Secretary of the Navy Paul H. Nitze will present the Medal of Honor to God and Mrs. Caille Paul, parents of Lance Cpl. Joe C. Paul of Vandalia, Ohio.

The young Marine died in Vietnam of wounds suffered in Operation Starlight in 1955, the first major confrontation between U.S. forces and the Viet Cong.

There was no mention of heroic acts at his funeral Aug. 31, 1965.

The citation accompanying the medal says Paul displayed "fortitude and gallant spirit of self sacrifice in the face of all certain death."

Paul was a fire team leader in the 3rd Marine Division. Heavy enemy fire pinned down his unit and several wounded Marines were trapped in exposed positions.

Paul, says the citation, "boldly dashed across the firestep to place himself between the wounded comrades and the enemy and delivered effective suppressive fire with his automatic weapon in order to divert the attack long enough to allow the casualties to be evacuated."

Paul was mortally wounded. Evacuated, he died the following day.
