JEROME — William Last, Mrs. Don Jacobson, Ross C. Lee, J. H. Silbaugh and Rev. John N. Garrabranti were named as commissioners on the Jerome Housing Authority at the City Council meeting Tuesday night.

The appointees will serve staggered terms of five, four, three, two and one years on the Housing Authority which was created by resolution of the mayor and council in a special session held earlier, as a first step in building low-cost housing units in Jerome.

At two special meetings last month, councilmen met with Jim Voeller of Hamilton-Voeller, engineering consultants, Pocatello, who offered a contract price of \$2,500 to initiate a preliminary survey of the sewage problem

London Times Changes Layout

LONDON (AP) — The agony column of the London Times, one of British journalism's most famous institutions, is being restored to something of its old glory — on the back page.

The new editors of the Times, which was recently acquired by press magnate Lord Thomson, announced the paper's page of classified ads would move to the back page Monday as part of a new layout.

For decades the classifieds, with the popular personal notices known as the agony column, occupied the front page of the paper. Last May they were moved to the second page and the front was turned over to the main news of the day, like most other newspapers.

Why don't you and your fiance give two church parties? Let him and his parents accompany you and your parents to your church first, after which go to some place for refreshments where you can have a family-to-be discussion, but don't discuss religion. Just try to get better acquainted.

Then, you and your parents accompany him and his parents to their church, followed by a fellowship meeting over refreshments. Here, again, do not discuss religion. Just pursue your acquaintance into the environment of friendship, if it's not high school, S.C.; Johanna Kool-

After these two valuable experiences, you and your fiance will want to get together and face the religious problem along forthrightly and honestly. You can still be friends.

You will realize that even slight differences in religion can make a marriage quite difficult. It can also disrupt your family life through the children. In planning a child's church life, they should not be sent to church, but should be taken to church by their parents. If it is to a sabbath school, the parents should remain for their classes just as the children do for theirs.

If it is a sermon service, the family should sit together. The family in church together develops security and maturity in the children while it gives them a valuable cultural environment. Surely, you would not want to rob your children of these choice experiences.

After your series of talks together, then arrange a conference with both your parents and his, and brief your discussions with them and let them know what conclusion you have reached.

Through this plan, we feel sure that whatever the result, it will be for the better interests of all of you.

About 20 Hurt As Snow Sags Church Roof

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP)—The roof of a Roman Catholic church sagged under heavy snow and collapsed with a roar during Mass early today, injuring more than a score of persons.

The fire department said 20 to 30 victims had been taken to

hospitals from the St. Rose of Lima church.

There were an estimated 100 children and 20 adults in the church in the Brooklyn Park area of south Baltimore when the roof collapsed, firemen said. All were removed from the building.

One of the children, George Feely Jr., 7, a third-grader at St. Rose School next door, escaped out the back of the church. He said he was about seven

pews from the altar and heard something that "sounded like a door shutting."

"I saw something come down," he said. "It was the ceiling of the church."

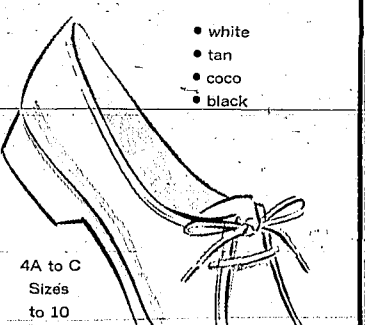
The roof collapsed following a snowfall of about 11 inches earlier this week.

The roof fell into the portion of the building housing the chapel, buckling and collapsing in the middle. The front and rear of the building remained upright.

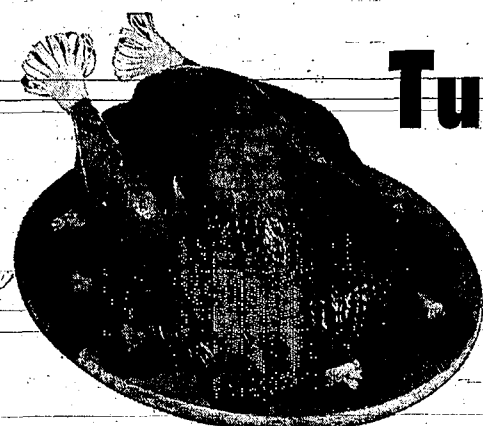

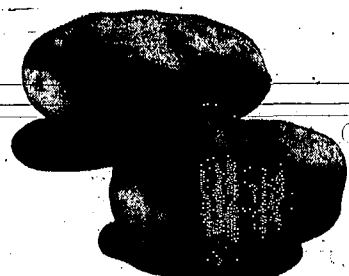

 At the first meeting of the Board of Commissioners in January following each general City election the Board of Commissioners shall elect one of its members to be designated as Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and Mayor.
 SECTION 2. TERM
 The term of office of said Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and Mayor shall be for two years, unless sooner removed by the Commission or he becomes disqualified, absent or disabled.
 SECTION 3. ABSENCE OR DISABILITY
 In the absence from the City or disability of said Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and Mayor or in any instance in which the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners is unable to act in his office during said absence or disability.
 SECTION 4. POWERS
 The Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and Mayor shall preside at the meetings of the Commission and perform such other duties consistent with his office as may be imposed by the Commission. He shall be entitled to vote on all matters coming before the Commission, but shall not exercise veto power. He shall be recognized on all ceremonial occasions, and shall not be construed as conferring the civil process, and by the Governor for military purposes. He may use the title of Chairman of the Board of Commissioners or Mayor in any case in which the execution of contracts or other legal instruments in writing, or other matters arising from the general laws of the State, may so require. He shall not be construed as conferring upon him administrative powers or functions of a mayor under the general laws of the State.

If you can't tell whether or not your partner's five-club bid is showing no ace or four aces, you really shouldn't be playing bridge.

Why can't you respond five no-trump to show four aces? You can, but if you do your partner is unable to ask about kings. For instance:

South has a mighty good hand opposite an opening bid. He expects to go to game but contents himself with a one-heart

response. North jumps to four hearts and South is definitely interested in a slam and has a perfect hand for the use of a Blackwood four no-trump. He plans to settle for five if North shows two aces and to go to six if North shows three. What will he do if North shows one ace only? Look for a new and better partner is the obvious answer.

North bids five clubs to show all four aces and how South is interested in a grand slam. The key card is the king of hearts and South is able to find out about it by bidding five no-trump.

North shows that one king and South bids the grand slam in no-trump.

Why does he bid it in no-trump instead of hearts? Because he can count 13 top tricks in either contract but there is a possibility that the opening lead will be ruffed if hearts are trump. Nothing can hurt the seven no-trump contract.

KONTUM, Vietnam — (NEA) — Like every other imaginative, adventurous six-year-old, tow-headed Tommy Banker likes to play war. Only for Tommy it's not make-believe. It's armed troops, nearby gunfire, cordite and "copper clutter."

For Tommy Banker the war is real. The boy, a three-foot tall smile, belongs to Mr. and Mrs. John Banker, formerly of Plattsburgh, N.Y., and now six-year residents of a frame home in the middle of Vietnam's disputed high country.

The parents are missionaries of a nondenominational church group who are doing educational studies among the primitive tribes of the upland regions. Currently they are printing language primers from a Jangled Montagnard dialect called "Bahnar."

Tommy, of course, knows nothing of Bahnar. He has enough troubles with English. Five days a week he sits in a single-seat classroom with his mother and fidgets with what is here a foreign tongue.

He doesn't mind, however. In both, this, not America, is his home. He has grown up without a popsicle or a malted milk, and without ever tossing a snowball at his dog.

But there are compensations. He picks bananas off trees, pals around with water buffaloes, and he has a selection of locally grown toads, spiders and snakes that any kid would envy.

Then, too, there is the war. The night fares and distant bombs which make lesser men cringe serve only to excite young Tom. And he knows nearly every combat soldier in the district.

Be careful, you guys. There's trouble ahead. Easy. Cover me, all right you people in the hood, come out with your hands in the air!

Until the school bell rings, anyway.

It's a good life for a six-year-old.

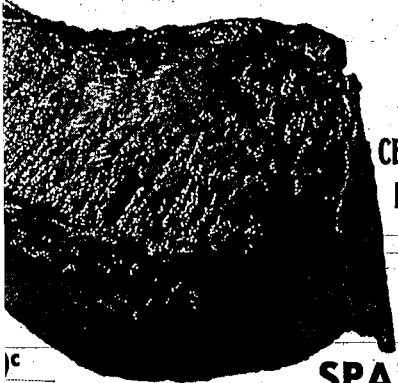

The first time I walked into the factory, I had a feeling that something there. I was asked for Mr. Funt, the plant superintendent. I was directed to a plump, red-faced man with a big cigar between his teeth. He was standing with several girls, listening to end tell a story. She finished and everyone doubled up with laughter. "You take the cake," Belle looks at me and said, "I don't know where you find them stories, but they're all dillies."



Then he noticed me. He introduced me to the other girls. "Meet Charlotte," he said, "I'm putting you in Belle's group. She's the fastest worker we got. Don't try to compete with her. Just let her show you how to do the work."

I could tell Belle was looking me over as I followed her to the assembly-line. Being so small in size and uncertain, must have seemed unfriendly, but Belle gave it a try.

She repeated the story she had told the boss. I looked blank. Belle thumped me on the back. "You didn't get it, did you, kid?"

When I still didn't respond, Belle looked at me suspiciously. The plant produced leather goods and our unit put together handmade billfolds. Belle patiently showed me how to shape the pieces of leather.

I was desperately anxious to make good because I needed extra money for my mother who was seriously ill.

I liked the work, but soon realized that the other girls were different: from those I knew in the small farming community where I had been raised. The conversation was full of dirty words which made me blush. My embarrassment and lack of response annoyed Belle. She began to ride me.

"I wanted to be friendly but I didn't know how. So one day at lunch I picked a seat in the middle of the other girls close to Belle. Researchers Are Trying To Find Out How To Handle 500,000 Volts Safely

EMERYVILLE, Calif. (AP)

Researchers tinkle and tease man-made lightning to see if it misbehaves.

"They want to find out how to handle 500,000 volts safely," Pacific Gas & Electric Co., the nation's largest investor-owned gas and electric utility, is erecting more than 1,000 miles of 500,000-volt extrahigh voltage lines in Northern and central California. It will cost \$185 million.

deserts for the new system. Crews are being trained to work on the lines when they are hot with their 500,000-volt load. Linemen wouldn't touch the 1 1/2-inch hot cables with a 10-foot pole — but they will with a 15-foot, a nonconducting plastic "hot stick" with attachments for making necessary adjustments and repairs. They become so adept at using their remote control "hands" that they can remove and replace a bolt more quickly than a house handyman can at his workbench, says W. O. (Bill) Cheney, chief of PG&E's department of engineering research at Emeryville.

Kon Zaharoff, senior engineer, demonstrates some of the characteristics of the tamed lightning. While viewers stand behind a protective wire netting, Zaharoff, wearing wire-laced coveralls, walks under a double section of 500,000-volt wires. He picks up a fluorescent tube; it instantly lights up in the highly charged air.

Eerie blue glows of corona dance over supposedly roughened areas of the wires as electricity escapes into the atmosphere. Zaharoff points a metallic finger near the wire netting, and a two-inch spark of electricity leaps the gap.

The power is slowly increased. The blue corona ghosts multiply, dance faster, crackle louder. They begin to spread onto the 1 1/2 big porcelain insulators supporting the wires. More power. And more. The blue glow suffuses the laboratory unit—Bang! A flash over of man-made lightning ends the test at a 1.1 million volts.

The extrahigh voltage line, researchers have decided,

should have a string of 27 insulators at each suspension point instead of 13.

Although many firms have contributed to research on such heavy voltages, the work on such a large project is largely pioneering.

When Congress approved a vast Pacific Coast power grid complex in 1964, Elwyn Lambert, PG&E supervising electrical engineer, remarked, "There are only three lines in the nation operating at over 345,000 volts — and they are experimental."

"If we want answers to certain extrahigh voltage operating questions, we must find them for ourselves."

PG&E is finding them.

Tests over one section of the utility firm's line at a full 500,000 volts... are scheduled for about March 1, with regular operation to begin around April 1. The system will be completed next year, linking the Pacific Northwest and the Pacific Southwest in a giant web of power production and consumption.

Electricity will flow north in the winter when the Northwest's electric heaters are turned high but south in the summer when the Columbia River is comparatively low. In summer, when California air conditioners and irrigation pumps are working away and the Columbia is strong with spring rains and snow melt, the power flow will be south.

Some 1,100 PG&E construction men are setting up 40-foot steel towers to support six heavy aluminum lines — a line weighs two pounds-per-foot — across mountains, rivers and

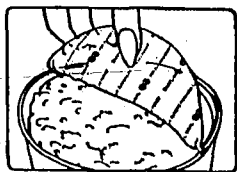
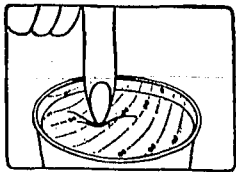
