This well water can be proven to be as pure and tasty as Blue Lakes water. The last test of Blue Lakes water showed contamination and it will be necessary to chlorinate all of it before use. The pumping system of Blue Lakes and the Doster Station could cost approximately \$24,000.00 per month for electricity alone for a full time operation. CAN YOU AFFORD WATER BILLS AS HIGH AS WINTER HEATING BILLS FROM NOW ON?

It must be demoralized of the City Commissioners to prove that the two existing Filter Plant wells can be increased to meet our needs which will cost less than \$20,000.00. This gamble will cost less than one month's electricity on the pumping system. If additional well is necessary now or in the future they should drill near the two good ones. Do not fear that we will face unsolvable problems in the future if we don't spend these funds now for Blue Lakes water. The Idaho Constitution XV Section No. 3 provides that the domestic use of water, such as the city of Twin Falls, takes priority over all previously filed rights when there is a scarcity of water.

These facts are true and we feel that a costly mistake could be avoided by abandoning the phase two project now. The commissioners must be contacted by the masses of people immediately. Mr. McClure will study materials now available and additions that can be made to the museum and planetarium to make it more useful in the future.

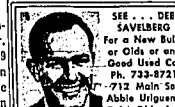

Kosygin and Wilson Fail To Make Plan

LONDON (AP) — Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin and British Prime Minister Harold Wilson confirmed today that they had failed to set up a joint peacemaking program for Vietnam but pledged to go on working for an end to the war.

A communique issued at the end of Kosygin's week-long visit to Britain reaffirmed their adherence to the principles of the Geneva agreements which ended the French war in Indochina. It added that the two government chiefs "set forth their respective views on the ways to bring about peace in Vietnam. The two governments will continue to make a close study of the situation and will make every possible effort with a view to achieving a settlement of the Vietnam problem and will maintain contact to this end."



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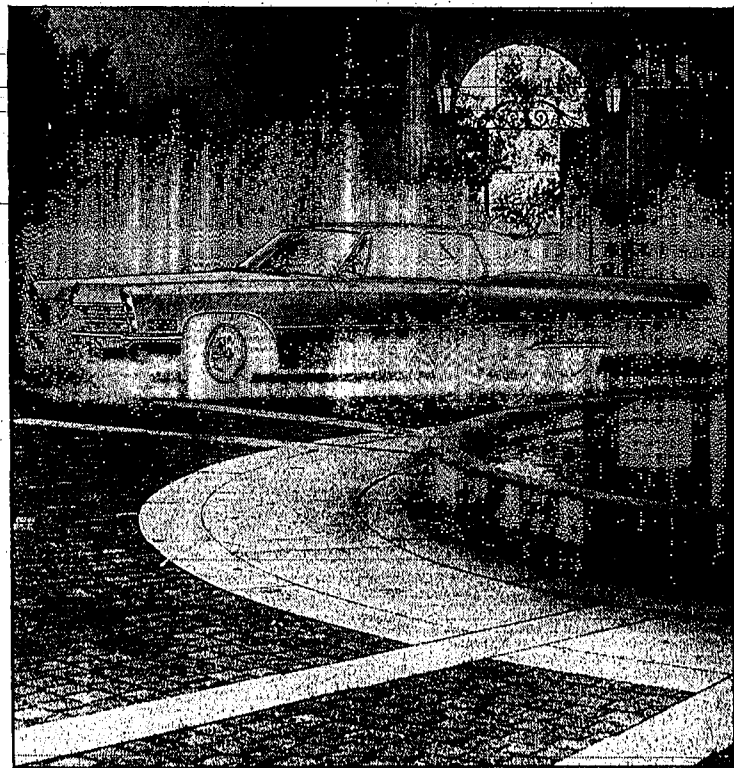

With Ted Lewis, Bob Crosby and Earl "Fatha" Hines "Muggsy" played the old tunes, the ballads, the sentimental songs, "Big Butter and Egg Man," "Lonesome Road," "Comedy Sweetheart," and "Sister Kate" with some of his memorable recordings.

BLASTS JOHNSON

South Vietnam's Constitution Is Nearing Completion

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — South Vietnam's new constitution is nearing completion in an atmosphere of restrained optimism.

By law the constitution must be written by March 27. It is now expected to be completed a week or two early.

A heated clash between the 11-member Constitutional Assembly, which is writing the new national charter, and the military government which has the final say on its implementation appears to have been avoided.

A series of private luncheon and dinner meetings this month between junta leaders and members of the assembly have lessened the danger of sharp divergence on the provisions, Vietnamese sources said.

Both sides appear to be doing everything possible to avoid confrontation. This is good politics everywhere and especially in Asia, where confrontations are to be avoided if face is to be saved.

The assemblymen resume sitting Tuesday in the refurbished French-built opera house, they will debate the proposed powers of the executive branch.

Political sources said the general rule Vietnam's assembly were unhappy with the draft articles on presidential powers. The Constituent Assembly limited the powers of the executive branch compared with those for the proposed National Assembly.

This was deliberate. Some deputies were imprisoned during the regime of the late President Ngo Dinh Diem. Under Diem the legislature was a rubber-stamp body.

"The problem before us is to have a strong, effective government and still prevent a dictatorship," Dr. Phan Quang Dan told his fellow deputies.

Lewiston, Salt Lake City Would Like To Surrender One Way Of Life

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Lewiston, Idaho, and Salt Lake City share one way of life they'd gladly surrender to any other community — if they could find a taker.

They are the "dirty air children" of Utah and Idaho, the only towns in the two states rated as heavily polluted by the U.S. Public Health Service.

It may be unfair to label them dirty, but the Public Health Service tosses that willing bouquet to Lewiston and its across-the-Snake-River neighbor Clarkston, Wash. — Lewiston-Clarkston stands in the second level of dirty cities — with 126 to 150 micrograms of suspended particulate matter per cubic meter of air.

Salt Lake is in the third category — with 101 to 125 micrograms.

What does that mean? The 126 to 150 microgram reading "means that if you look at a sunbeam you can see particles floating in it," says Raymond Smith, chief of the National Air Sampling Network Air Quality Section in Cincinnati.

"It also means . . . you will dust your home every day, change your shirts each day, paint your house more often, have less sunlight, use more electricity and probably experience more frequent respiratory illness."

Salt Lake doesn't get off much easier, according to Smith. The dusting, shirt changing, painting, sunlight and illness problem is only slightly less acute — and at times could be worse.

The National Air Sampling Network, which surveyed several hundred cities for the Public Health Service, found 61 cities in the 101-125 microgram class, 31 cities in the 126-150 microgram group and 26 communities in the more than 150 microgram category.

Missoula, Mont., and Phoenix, Ariz., are the nearest cities to Utah and Idaho on the more than 150 microgram blacklist.

Surprisingly, Los Angeles — which made smog famous — does not make the first rank in the Lewiston-Clarkston range.

Geography, certainly in the case of Lewiston — Clarkston, rates as a major factor in air pollution. The towns are in the wash of air movements from industrial complexes and floating debris is trapped by hills that flank Lewiston and Clarkston "on the north and south."

Lewiston Orchards, rising to the south of Lewiston, is relatively clear. An oblong cloud of dust, smoke and grease hugs the main part of town.

Salt Lake's problem can be traced partly to geography, the valley that traps air movement — but also can be blamed on industrial smokestacks, construction, wear-and-tear on tires and exhaust from automobiles.

No sophisticated scientific devices are required for persons going from relatively clear air to the dirty-air communities. They can notice by their eyes and nose — often sneezing is the best barometer.

And many persons believe it's much cleaner on Sunday than during the rest of the week.

"The reason is very sound," Smith says. "It usually is clean. For one thing, there is a reduction in automobile traffic, which reduces the amount of worn tire and engine exhaust matter thrown into the air, and industrial activity is also reduced.

"As a rule, it might be said that the air is 25 per cent cleaner on Sunday."

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Tattoo Artist Claims Trend Is Toward Hideous Designs

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP) — After more than 50 years in the skin trade, Gib (Tats) Thomas is an expert on the twists and turns of public taste in tattoos. Sanctity is out; satanism is in. The trend now is toward the hideous.

"The most popular design of all of them — the one that everyone who comes in here wants — is the devil."

"I put a thousand devils on them for every head of Christ. He has no room. He ran out of 30 years ago when he was a tattooed man traveling with circuses and road shows."

"Tattooing is not like it used to be," Thomas said.

In his day, he has scrawled last wills and testaments on the backs of businessmen, discreetly placed identification marks under the arms of FBI men. And that's not all.

"Amund Dietzel (his partner) and I have covered more people in the United States," Thomas claimed.

Times have changed. "A few calls is all you get today."

One of Thomas' last major jobs was on a man named Joe Jim Eddie. The raising of the flag on Mt. Rushmore is now engraved on Eddie's back.

Most of Thomas' clients are sailors on the town from nearby Great Lakes. But all kinds come. He is unimpressed by his clientele.

"Fifty per cent of the people who come in here can't spell their wife's name. They'll bring her in with 'em and around and say, 'Honey, how do you spell your name?' Even if I know, I don't tell them. That's between him and her. I'm not cupid."

Ignorance is inexhaustible, as Thomas tells it.

"A heart with a dagger through it is always a good design. People come in here and get them put on with their wife's or their girl friend's name. The heart with the dagger is a Japanese design and it means all over the country. But they don't realize that."

Thomas admits to being bored by it all and soon he'll be out of the business. Tattooing will be prohibited in Milwaukee after June 30 for hygienic reasons.

"Tattooing is not only dying," Thomas said. "But founding fathers all over the country are putting tattoos out of business. They're forcing them out of the country and it's ridiculous. If sailors don't get tattooed here, they're going to get tattooed in Hong Kong. So what's the difference?"

There will always be a demand for tattoos, he said.

But who got tattooed? "You never ask a customer why," replied Thomas. "I'm not a doctor. I'm not to judge them. I'm only to please them."

THAT THE DIAMOND MAY SPARKLE

To get a rough diamond polished can be polished to a one-carat diamond, miners have to blast, dig, crush and sort 250 tons of ore! No diamonds sparkle to begin with. Many have an oily-looking film when they come from the ground. It took centuries to find that this K'n could be polished off.

Hindu gun cutters who discovered that "only a diamond will cut a diamond" put a diamond on a wheel and cut facets here and there to reflect the light.

Cutting a diamond is a tedious task. First step is to divide the eight-sided crystal a little above the middle. Next the corners are rounded off in a lathe using another diamond as a cutting tool. Then the diamond is put into a holder and set against an iron plate coated with diamond dust. The plate rotates 11½ a second and one by one the facets are ground. If each facet is not cut at a precise angle the diamond will be lacking in brilliance.

Of the four criteria in choosing a fine diamond—carat weight, color, cut and clarity, carat weight is least important in determining a diamond's worth. A fine one-carat diamond may cost more than a larger inferior one. The higher a grade diamond is colorless, cut for maximum brilliance and has no inclusions visible to the naked eye.
