

Treaty Of Tlatelolco Is Signed

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Fourteen Latin American governments signed the treaty of Tlatelolco Tuesday night to ban nuclear weapons from the vast territory between the United States and the Atlantic.

But before the treaty banning nuclear weapons from a populated area is binding, it must be ratified by all governments controlling territory in the zone and guaranteed by the five nuclear powers.

Only Mexico said definitely it was fulfilling the requirements for putting the treaty into force.

Seven countries within the zone did not sign at the ceremony in the Mexican Foreign Ministry building in Mexico City. For various reasons, but their delegates to the treaty-writing commission have indicated they may sign later.

Ten of those who did sign are expected to waive the requirements for putting it into force when the treaty comes up for ratification in their congresses. They are Colombia, Costa Rica, Chile, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Haiti, Mexico, Panama, and Uruguay.

Auto Maker Frank Duryea Dies At 97

SAYBROOK, Conn. (AP)—J. Frank Duryea, 97, of Madison, Conn., co-designer with his brother, Charles of the United States' first gasoline-powered automobile, died today.

The brothers worked on their car between 1892 and 1894 and in 1895 won the nation's first automobile race in it.

Frank Duryea was born in Washburn, Ill., and became a toolmaker in Chicopee, Mass., in 1891. Between 1893-98 he was chief engineer and director of Duryea Motor Wagon Co. In 1904 the brothers founded Stevens Duryea Motor Car Co., which manufactures in Springfield, Mass. Duryea served as vice president and chief engineer until 1915 when he retired.

He moved to Greenwich, Conn., in 1916 and to Madison, Conn., in 1938.

Duryea won the Cosmopolitan Automobile race on May 30, 1896, in November of the same year captured the London-Brighton endurance test in England.

Planes Hunt Space Bug Satellite

Dispute On Trading Stamp Bill Stalls Lawmaking Machinery

BOISE (AP)—Controversy over handing a bill regulating trading stamps stalled law-making machinery in the Idaho-Senate today. Sen. J. G. Sandberg, D-Blackfoot, one of the sponsors of the bill, insisted that Senate announcement be made of a hearing date. Sen. Lloyd Barron, R-Fairfield, chairman of the State Affairs Committee which has had the measure under consideration, said he would make the announcement at the proper order of business.

In the meantime, Sandberg said he would insist that all bills be read in full before final consideration. At the top of the Senate calendar was the 200-page measure entailing the uniform commercial code.

Barron told newsmen, and also told Sandberg privately, that the trading stamp hearing will be Feb. 21.

Sandberg told the Senate-Tuesday that if the State Affairs Committee had not announced a date for a hearing by the time the Senate reaches its final reading calendar, to day he would insist that all bills be read in full.

He told Barron that because he made that statement publicly he could not back down until formal announcement of the committee date was made.

Sandberg was joined in introduction of the trading stamp bill by Sen. Woodrow W. Bean, D-Cascade.

The measure would require that trading stamps be redeemed in merchandise or cash at the place of issuance, it also would ban operation of various merchandising agencies.

The Senate sent to an order of business permitting amendment, the bill entailing stringent controls over sale and use of narcotics. The action was taken because of objection to some of the powers given the State See STAMP BILL, Pg. 2, Col. 6

Meeting Opens To Streamline OAS

BUENOS AIRES (AP)—Western Hemisphere foreign ministers opened a double-barreled meeting here today to streamline the Organization of American States and pave the way for an inter-American summit conference.

In a closed-door preliminary session they elected Argentine Foreign Minister Nicanor Costa Mendez as president of the conference and set Feb. 22 as a target date for winding up the meeting.

To amend—the 19-year-old OAS charter to give new life to the organization and also want to schedule presidents' meeting for mid-April in the Uruguayan resort of Punta del Este.

"We have gone 98 per cent of the way on charter reforms," a top diplomat said today, adding that he expects no fireworks.

The proposed reforms were sketched at a similar meeting in Rio de Janeiro in 1955 and worked out in detail at conferences in Panama and Washington last year. They include increasing the political authority of the OAS Council, strengthening the power of the OAS secretary general and shortening his term.

They also include a commitment by member nations to economic development and a reorganization of the organization's branches dealing with social and economic problems.

Lionel Dean, Pioneer T.F. Aviator, Dies

Lionel A. Dean, 67, 231 Buchanan St., pioneer aviation enthusiast and pilot, and a Twin Falls resident since 1908; died early Tuesday of an apparent heart attack at the Twin Falls Municipal Airport. Mr. Dean and Harry Yaw were preparing to leave the hangar and had just boarded a Twin Falls Fliers' Club plane for Boise when he collapsed. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Magic Valley Memorial Hospital. He was president of the Twin Falls Fliers' Club, reported by the Federal Aviation Agency as the oldest such organization and because he contributed the mechanical work to keep the planes flying, was instrumental in keeping the club functioning.

Born June 21, 1899, in Quanah, Tex., Mr. Dean moved with his family to Twin Falls in 1909.

He married Thelma Anne Threlkeld, July 22, 1922, and they operated the Dean Motor Co. from 1924 until he retired in 1936.

Dean purchased his first airplane in 1928. It was the first airplane in Twin Falls. He established the first airport in the area, located on the south side of Kimberly Road between what now is Sunset Memorial Park and the Starlite Motel.

When the city built a larger airport south of Twin Falls, Mr. Dean moved his hangar and planes there and was the city's first airport operator. He had been a member of the Twin Falls Airport Commission for the past 13 years, being appointed in 1948 and serving continuously since that time.

Dean called the father of aviation in Twin Falls. He had been a member of the Civil Air Patrol since its organization and served as unit commander in 1945 and 1946. During his flight career, Mr. Dean owned eight airplanes. He participated as pilot in the first aerial fish planting in Idaho, if not in the nation. The plantings were made in August, 1938 when Mr. Dean as pilot and O. A. (Gus) Keller as assistant flew over Clear Lakes and dropped the fish from a five-gallon bucket to determine if they would survive the fall. In 1939 Mr. Dean flew his plane, assisted by Logylog Stevens, for more extensive plantings in the Sawtooth mountain range.

Idaho Power Investments Explained

Idaho Power Co. shareholders were advised during a regional meeting Tuesday night that the company invested nearly \$4 million per month in new facilities during 1966.

T. E. Roach, the utility's board chairman and chief executive, told the Magic Valley shareholders that the company will continue its expansion program this year to provide the area with "abundant" electricity.

Mr. Roach said Idaho Power's 1966 construction investment ranks as the third largest in its history. He said the expansion went into generating facilities in Hells Canyon, transmission lines across the desert, lines and substations to serve newly irrigated farm lands and services to cities, businesses and homes.

"It spells area growth and development and it's a good thing for everyone," Mr. Roach said. "It means more jobs and more income, better living and expanded economy throughout the Snake River Valley, and more tax revenues to provide local and state government services."

Another \$10 million will be spent in 1967, Mr. Roach said, which will mark the largest construction outlay planned for the area.

Idaho Power Co. Planning New Thermal Generating Facility

Idaho Power Co., just getting ready to put its new generating facility at Hells Canyon into operation, already is looking forward to establishing a thermal generating facility in the eastern end of its service area.

Albert Carlson, new president of the company, told area business, industrial and professional leaders at a luncheon Tuesday night in Holiday Inn that the eastern facility will be needed by 1972 at the latest.

The fact is on eastern Idaho, he asserted, because of the tremendous rate of growth of industry in that area, phosphate rock, basis for the prime industry of the area, now is Idaho's third most valuable mineral product, Mr. Carlson declared, and the total value of phosphate produced in the state is \$10 million.

He said both nuclear and fossil types of thermal generating facilities are being considered. "We're going to have to make a decision in the very near future."

Both Mr. Carlson and T. E. Roach, former Idaho Power president and now chairman of the board, spoke of their confidence in the future of Idaho and the continuing efforts of company officials to gain and re-

Minico Using Machines For Teaching Aid

(Continued from page 1). After finds teachers waiting at the door in the morning to get some work underway.

"You can learn to operate the machines fast," Mrs. Johnson stated, "but after that only your imagination limits how much can be done with the processes available," she added.

Included in the machines is a dry mounting and laminating press, which mounts pictures on to often used materials such as maps. It is used for making transparencies, which are placed in a plastic coat on maps, preserving them and making it possible to mark them with crayon and erase.

The laminating press is also valuable for preserving valuable papers and to give longer life to often used materials such as maps. It is used for making transparencies, which are placed in a plastic coat on maps, preserving them and making it possible to mark them with crayon and erase.

The photocopier makes copies of pictures in books and will reproduce nearly any picture. It can be printed on specially treated paper, plastic or other material.

The thermo-fax machine is used for making transparencies also, although these are in black and white only.

About 11 Diazo (overhead projector) machines are available in the school classrooms, and at least 11 additional teachers have requested them for use in their classrooms.

These projectors are set up in the classroom and project the transparencies and other pictures onto the wall giving colored enlargements for classes to study, and seating the teacher in front of the class where she can continue in charge of the discussion. She can also point out particular areas for study on the projected pictures.

The opaque projector enlarges pictures onto the wall also, and these are useful for hand-drawn enlargements when projected.

The embosser presses lettering into paper and is useful in making signs, posters and this type of material.

A headliner machine, at the center of a trial basis, is a photographic lettering process, taking pictures of letters from film and developing them in the same machine.

Two typewriters and a mimeograph machine are also included in the room, as well as a large desk for big projects and a slanted desk with light under glass for tracing.

Mr. Johnson colors many of the pictures which she makes, using transparent ink as well as stick tape.

"A little color adds a lot of effect in the classroom," Mrs. Johnson says.

Miss Nichols has prepared a presentation on King Arthur for her sophomore literature classes, and using about 15 books she and Mrs. Johnson have done research and prepared a series of pictures and posters for the personal audio-visual touch to her teaching.

Mrs. Johnson is giving lectures and instructions to teachers throughout the county in uses of the center, hoping to bring more of this personal touch to each classroom in the county.

It is hoped that eventually such a center can be located in each school. Heyburn elementary and junior high school are presently working toward some of this equipment.

Government Tries To Cut Jet Noise

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government has taken dead aim at cutting down the noise produced by jet aircraft.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced Tuesday it has ordered a \$10.5-million study aimed at significantly reducing jet noise.

NASA said it would negotiate contracts of about \$7.5 million with the Boeing Co., Seattle, Wash., and \$3 million with Douglas Aircraft Co., Santa Monica, Calif. They are the major producers of jet planes now in use by domestic airlines.

NASA's Langley Research Center in Hampton, Va., is project coordinator.

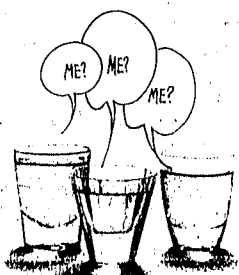

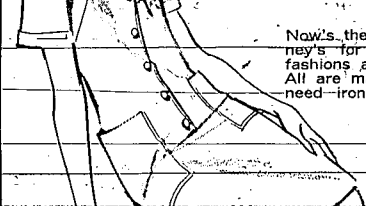

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

By ANDREW TULLY
WASHINGTON — There is a little bit of something for everybody in President Johnson's program to combat crime — everybody, that is, except the poor folks who are afraid to walk the streets tonight, not in 1977.

Congress has been asked to appropriate \$50 million for a two-year campaign. Johnson has come out against slums, unlicensed firearms, uneducated youths, unemployment and joblessness. But he has neglected to utter the two words that might have given instant relief to the citizen, to wit, "Get tough!"

Andrew Tully has a plan. If Congress in its wisdom gives Johnson the money to work with there will be less murders and muggings 10 years from now. It seems reasonable to assume that if everybody has a job and an education and it cops become smarter and the streets will be safer. But the citizen has a right to ask the President what he's going to do for him now. The guy who is permanently unemployed and who has no money to buy even the most basic necessities of life should be put to rest. He should be put to rest at 10 p.m. trip to the drugstore until 1970.

WHAT TO DO TONIGHT—Three hundred and fifty million dollars to fight crime sounds impressive, but with it we are getting the same old jazz about the causes of crime. Johnson still counts the National Crime Commission's counsel that "the most significant action by far that can be taken against crime is action designed to eliminate slums and ghettos, to improve education to provide jobs. I demand. The most significant action that can be taken is to get the slum out of the ghettos and throw them in jail. That done it will be safe to hand the problem over to the planners.

It is necessary only to cite President Johnson's own words to bring home the urgency of doing something now. Forty percent of those interviewed in a recent poll stayed off the streets at night. Thirty-five percent were afraid to speak to strangers. Twenty-one per cent used to be afraid to go to the store. Twenty per cent would like to move to another neighborhood.

LAND OF THE TERRORIZED — In other words, half the population of the land of the free and the home of the brave is scared to death. In any other country, such a situation would be a national calamity. In this country, it is the paddy wagon and the handcuffs that are the terror. The streets 24 hours a day.

I will go along with the sociologists' argument that most crime is committed by people who have never had a decent education. Robberies are seldom perpetrated by architects or Ph.D.s, and although bankers may not be North's noblemen when sitting behind their big desks, they are not in the jewelry shops at the bewitching hour of the night. The man who is a slum dweller is a Rolls Royce. The guy in the big house on the hill, has everything he wants except youth and maybe General Motors.

THE CORP'S SOLUTION — But the poor cop can't be expected to postpone trying to catch dope-pushers and footpads until some human resources expert has installed every potential criminal in a nose-covered split level. He is out every night trying to combat crime, and although he may have no diplomas on his wall he knows what to do when he sees some punk trying to get away with a car.

He knows what to do, but he also knows that unless he approaches the punk politely, feeds him a six-course dinner and then lodges him overnight with six lawyers in a chrome-trimmed limousine with hot and cold running champagne, some humanitarian judge will throw the case out of court. So what the cop does is look the other way. Why risk a busted nose or a ball in the belly when the chances are good he'll be in the morgue before a grand jury and charged with police brutality?

I guess we need a \$350 million, which is, after all, peanuts in these wild days. But I would like President for life the guy who stood on the White House lawn and roared to cops everywhere: "Go get 'em!"

Views Of Others

NONHUMAN FARM HANDS
 The researchers are doing it. They are finding ways to take down the ladders from the groves and orchards and pick the fruit without the use of human hands.

We find it striking that this trend away from human labor is evident even in so-called developing countries. A news dispatch tells us that in Thailand farmers have found possible to train monkeys to pick coconuts for them as a full-time job. Pig-tailed macaques are reported able to distinguish ripe coconuts from immature ones and to remove the husk by twisting the stem and biting it off. They then toss the coconut to a waiting worker on the ground.

The monkeys eventually learn how to demand shorter hours and better pay? Even though they don't, it seems likely that automation will ultimately take over their jobs and most of the tedious ones of the world's harvest. This we cannot regret. — Christian Science Monitor.

MARQUIS CHILDS WRITES ON WASHINGTON

Sugar Beet Growers Anticipate Price Hike

BURLEY—Higher prices are anticipated this year by sugar beet growers as well as larger crops, according to William Beck, president of the Lower Snake River Association of Sugar Beet Growers.

The prediction follows the announcement that growers have reached an agreement for a contract for the 1967 sugar beet crop after a series of meetings in the past weeks.

"In the new contract, the present line in the scale of payments has been raised," Beck said. "On this basis, assuming an \$8-net-return-per-100-pound sack of sugar, payments will range from 25 cents per ton higher for sugar beets with 15 per cent sugar content to 39 cents a ton more for beets with 16.5 per cent sugar content."

If the sugar processing company net returns remain at or above their present level of \$8.25 per sack, the results will be even better for the grower, Mr. Beck said. On this basis, the increase for 15 to 16.5 per cent sugar content beets would range from 39 to 49 cents per ton.

H. A. Elcock, Amalgamated Sugar Co. general agriculturalist, Ogden, reports higher net returns will increase the 1967 contract payments, compared to 1966, about 54 cents a ton. "When we combine the negotiated scale increase with the expected higher yields, the average payment increase may be from 83 cents a ton to as much as \$1 a ton," Elcock stated.

Mr. Elcock said "The new contract is subject to final review by the U.S. Department of Agriculture." During the meeting the past week 11 different associations in Idaho, Utah and Oregon representing more than 5,000 individual sugar beet growers held meetings to work out contracts.

Also attending the meeting on a new contract were Jack Claiborn, Kimberly, president of the Idaho Beet Growers; Leon Pickett, Marquette, president Twin Falls County Beet Growers Association; Walter Shouse, Hazelton, Lincoln; Rome and Gooding county growers representative, and Richard Blinco, Rupert, president of the Minidoka County Beet Growers.

Many Ways Cited For Husband, Wife To File Annual Income Tax Returns

By JAMES MARLOW
WASHINGTON (AP) — This deals with the 1966 income tax returns of three groups.

1. Husbands and wives.
2. Single persons who get a lower tax-rate if they can qualify as "head of household."
3. Certain widows and widowers who are permitted to use the lowest tax rate if they can qualify as "surviving spouse."

Almost always a husband and wife save by filing a joint return — which means both must sign it — whether or not the wife had income. With a joint return they, too, like the "surviving spouse," get the lowest tax rate.

If a husband files separately, because his wife failed to sign jointly with him, he can claim the usual \$600 exemption for himself and another \$600 exemption for her — provided she has no income and is not filing separately — but the tax is usually higher than if they had filed jointly.

If you were under 65 in 1966 and file a return you get a \$600 exemption for yourself in 1966. If you were 65 or older in 1966 — and an additional \$600 if you were blind.

The same rules apply to a wife if she files jointly with you, whether or not she had income; or, if she had none, fails to file jointly. A wife is not considered a dependent for income tax purposes. So the rules on wives and dependents are not the same.

If you were married or divorced as late as Dec. 31, 1966, you are considered, for income tax purposes, to have been married or divorced for all of 1966. Even though you paid more than her support, you get no exemption for a wife divorced in 1966.

If your wife had any income in 1966, no matter how small, you can not claim an exemption for her on your return unless she files jointly with you, reporting her income.

She would have to file a return, of course, either jointly with you or separately if her income was \$600 or more. If she filed separately, she would claim her own \$600 exemption on her return. You, in that case, could claim only your own \$600 exemption on your return, and none for her.

Look where falling to file jointly can lead:

If a wife had \$50 income in 1966. Since it was less than \$600, she does not have to file a return at all. But, unless she files jointly with her husband, the couple loses the \$600 exemption for her. The result is a loser on that one.

Married couples filing separate returns should remember: If one itemizes deductions, he must; if one uses the 10 per cent standard deduction, both must; if one uses the minimum standard deduction, both must. These standard deductions were explained in No. 2 of this series.

Head of household:

The tax rate on single persons and married couples filing separately is the highest. But a single person who can qualify as "head of household" gets a lower tax by being allowed to use table B or schedule No. 3.

To qualify as head of household, you must be unmarried and furnish over half the cost of maintaining a household for the entire year, for at least one relative.

Whether that relative must also qualify as your dependent or must actually live in your household depends on the relationship.

Your father or mother must qualify as your dependent and live in a home you maintain for him or her, although not necessarily in your home.

If you are paying for them in a home for the aged you can not claim you maintained a home for either of them.

Your unmarried child, grandchild or stepchild would not have to be your dependent but your household must have been the principal residence for you and that child or children in order for you to claim the tax status of head-of-household.

And, for you to make the claim for any other relative living in your house, that relative must qualify as your dependent.

Further, to qualify as head of household, you must have been unmarried or legally separated on the last day of 1966 although you could still qualify if, by year's end, you had married someone who was a nonresident alien some time during 1966.

If you file a return as head of household you must use form 1040.

Widows and widowers qualify as "surviving spouse":

If you can qualify, you will be allowed to use tax table B or schedule No. 2, which is what married couples filing jointly use, and thus get the lowest tax rate.

To qualify you must have been entitled to file a joint return with your husband or wife in the year of death; you have not remarried; you have a child or stepchild who qualifies as your dependent; and you furnish over half the cost of running your home which is the principal residence of your child or stepchild.

If you meet those conditions, and your spouse died in 1964 or 1965, you can use the joint return rates reporting whatever income you had, take a \$600 exemption for yourself, along with \$600 for each of your dependents, but not for your deceased spouse, and use table B or schedule No. 2 in making your return.

This arrangement works two years forward.

For instance, suppose your wife died in 1964. Assume you filed a joint return that year, taking the proper exemptions, including your wife's, and getting the tax benefit that goes with a joint return.

In 1965 you could have filed a return — not joint and not claiming a \$600 exemption for the husband or wife who died before — and still been able to use table B or schedule No. 2.

You could do the same in 1966 if your wife or husband died in 1965 or 1964. And, if he or she died in 1965, you'd be able to do the same again on your 1967 return, provided you still met the qualifications for surviving spouse.

Which means: If your wife or husband died in 1966 — the pro-

cedure in that case was given above — you'd still be able to use table B or schedule No. 2 in 1967, without making the return joint or claiming an exemption for the dead person, provided you still met the qualification for surviving spouse.

Then, after 1968, you may be able to qualify as head of household. If so, then you'll still get the tax break that goes with that classification which will be better than that for an ordinary single person but not as large as for a surviving spouse.

Anyone filing a return as a surviving spouse must use form 1040.

A highlight of the report was a visit by Mr. Nelson to view cave and cliff paintings made by a Pigmy tribe now extinct. The paintings are said to be many thousands of years old.

Also of interest during the program were African paramehnia Mr. Nelson secured on the tour, including several drums, a cowhide shield, and spear points.

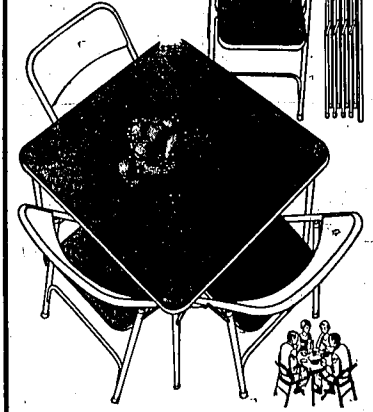

High Rate Of Negro Deaths Is Explained

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pentagon officers say the high proportion of Negro combat deaths in Vietnam is related to the high proportion of Negroes serving in fighting units.

A new Defense Department study showed Tuesday that while the proportion of Negro enlisted men among all U.S. troops in Vietnam dropped to 11 per cent last year, Negroes accounted for nearly 18 per cent of the combat deaths.

The high concentration of Negroes in combat units — up to 25 per cent in some airborne brigades — is not due to discrimination of any kind, Pentagon officers said.

The number of Negroes in such units is high, these sources said, because Negroes — Re-enlist at much higher rates than whites.

— Volunteer more readily for elite combat units such as Special Forces and airborne divisions that offer more prestige and more pay.

— Enter the service with more educational deficiencies, sharply limiting the number and type of armed service jobs available to them.

The study shows there were 39,125 enlisted Negroes in Vietnam as of Oct. 1 last year or about 11 per cent of the total military force, including units in non-combat assignments. Through the first 11 months of last year, 740 enlisted Negroes were killed in action — 17.8 per cent of the over-all combat deaths.

A similar Defense Department report last March showed that while Negroes comprised about 12 per cent of the total fighting force in Vietnam between 1961 and 1965 the Negro enlisted death rate for those years was 18.6 per cent.

Ancient Buddhist Scroll Is Found In Korean Pagoda

NEW YORK (AP) — A wooden block were used to make the inscriptions. The scroll was pretty much damaged," he said. "The first scroll in the stonework of a South Korean pagoda that is believed to be the oldest printed text yet discovered. It dates to the 8th century.

"The discovery was made last October," said Dr. Carl Ledyard, an assistant professor of Korean at Columbia. "From the Korean press reports I read and the Korean scholars I talked to in and out of New York, I have no doubts about this."

"It's possible they could have made a mistake, but I doubt it. I see no reason to doubt it. It's quite reasonable in the light of what is known about printing in Japan from around 770."

Ledyard said the pagoda was built in 761 A.D. and carries a text translated from Sanskrit into Chinese no later than 764. He said the scroll, which is 29 to 21 feet long, is believed to have been printed between 764 and 761.

Ledyard said the discovery was made last Oct. 14 but "it's a great puzzle to me" why it wasn't discovered sooner.

"The Koreans should have long ago given notice to the American press," he said. "All the embassies have cultural attaches."

Ledyard said 12 separate sheets in 688 and ruled it until 835. "I'm sure the Korean scholars in Seoul are giving the scroll a thorough examination," the professor added. "They are likely to be very proud and boastful and I think justly so."

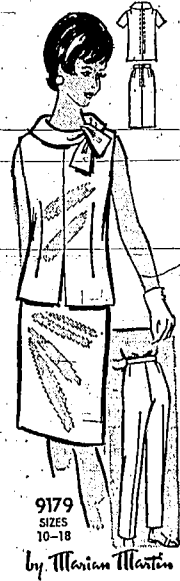

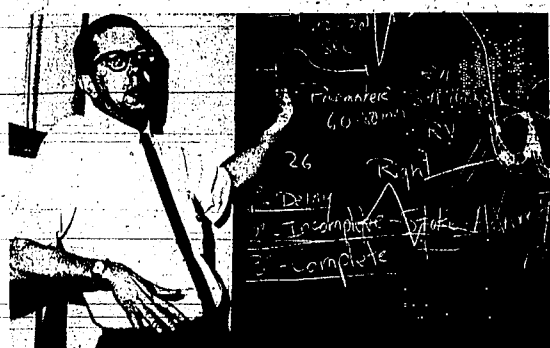

Giants Apt To Get First Pick In NFL Draft, Says Rozelle

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—"There is some validity" to one of pro football's more durable rumors—that the New York Giants will get the pick of the college quarterbacks in this year's draft, National Football League Commissioner Pete Rozelle said Tuesday.

But, that's about all that Rozelle, here to attend the American Football League's annual meetings, would admit in a news conference.

"At this point, nobody knows what's going to happen in the draft," Rozelle said. "The AFL players' position plan in draft should be. We hope the NFL will come close enough so we can proceed with the draft in mid-March."

"There is some validity to the reports that the Giants will get the pick of the quarterbacks," he added, "but we don't know now just what is going to happen. It's just not clarified."

Normally, the first pick in the draft would go to the NFL's newest franchise at New Orleans, the Saints, as the team with the poorest record last season taking second choice. The whole thing will have to be worked out, Rozelle said, after next week's NFL meetings in Honolulu.

Rozelle said 12 to 15 inter-league exhibition games would be played next summer and fall, but none would be televised nationally because of separate commitments each league has made with the TV networks.

The AFL executives reported they were working to bring the NFL players' position plan in line with that of the NFL. No inter-league trading is contemplated until these plans are synchronized.

Rozelle said the future site of the Super Bowl game between AFL and NFL champions would be taken up next spring. Played this year in the 100,000-seat Los Angeles Coliseum, the game drew 63,000, only a slightly larger crowd than the Orange Bowl drew for the NFL's runner-up.

"We're exploring sites in California, Miami, New Orleans and in Texas like the Cotton Bowl, Rice Stadium and the Astro Dome," Rozelle said vaguely.

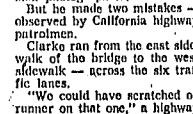

Jim: "We pointed out yesterday that the drop play will be worth only 18 extra tricks per 1,000 times used so that many players have a habit of preferring the finesse if conditions are right."

Oswald: "Unless those conditions are based on positive information about the opponents' hands these theories are worthless. There is the 'queen over the jack' fallacy which assumes the queen is more likely to be over the jack than in front of it. There is nothing to this. Then there is the 'Law of Symmetry,' which implies that if you have singletons the opponents will also. If you have a singleton, you must have a suit to compensate and someone else must have a short suit. However, if your opponents hold exactly four spades they will break 2-4 the same percentage of times irrespective of how many singletons you hold."
