103 Lives Claimed By Storm

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — Officials counted 103 dead today after two days of heavy rains and landslides in and around Rio de Janeiro, but they feared the toll will increase as more reports come in.

Gov. Francisco Negroso de Lima said at least 52 persons were killed in Guanabara State, which includes Rio de Janeiro. But shortly thereafter 11 more bodies were dug from the ruins of a house and two apartment buildings crushed by a huge boulder, tossed by the rains that crashed down a hillside in a fashionable suburb Sunday.

So far 35 bodies have been removed. After surveying wreckage from a five-story apartment building and a four-story apartment building, a police detective, Paulo Cotimara, estimated 129 persons were still buried under the huge pile of debris.

Seventeen persons have been brought out alive, including a woman and child rescued Monday almost 24 hours after disaster struck.

Another 40 persons — most of them children — were reported dead in Niteroi, capital of Rio de Janeiro State, which adjoins Guanabara. Communication difficulties with other cities kept the official toll incomplete.

Walter de Almeida Castro, mayor of Rio de Janeiro, said 2,700 persons were homeless in Niteroi and unofficial reports indicated more than 30,000 were homeless in the sheltered southern region, where the Paraisa and Paria rivers were reported rising to record levels.

City Delays Action On Water Phase

Signing of contracts on the second phase of the Twin Falls waterworks construction project was delayed Monday night by City Commissioners after a possible legal entanglement.

Howard Malinward, Boise, attorney for the Idaho Contractors Assn., said the state law under which a firm named as subcontractor complete the contract as bid. He said Home Plumbing had been listed as subcontractor in the low bidding by the City of Twin Falls.

Newell Olson and Sons, Logan, Utah, had been informed by the Utah concern they would be the only one to bid on terms in the plumbing sub-contract.

Bert Larson, representing Howard Reynolds, second low bidder, urged city officials to include in their contract that the named subcontractor carry out the work as bid.

Signing of the contract was delayed until an adjourned meeting of the commission Tuesday at 4:30 p.m. to allow time for legal study.

After discussion of the proposed contract, the commission signed the contract.

Idaho Water Development Is Outlined

BOISE (AP) — Plans to develop Idaho's water resources by federal and state agencies were outlined Tuesday at the annual Idaho Water Conference.

Selected speakers included Robert R. Lee, newly appointed director of the Idaho Water Resources Board, and Francis H. Warnick, regional project development engineer for the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation in Boise.

Lee's subject was "Water Resources Program, Responsibilities and Needs," while Warnick's topic was "State-Federal Water Development Planning."

The conference is sponsored jointly by the State Water Resources Board, the Idaho Department of Reclamation and the University of Idaho.

T.F. Schools Will Be Open Wednesday

Public schools in Twin Falls District #411 will be in regular session Wednesday, as has been school policy in recent years, Ernest Ragland, superintendent, announced Tuesday.

Long school term calling for 180 days of school work limit school districts on the days they may have a holiday, he added. PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — Interrogation of prospective jurors resumed today in the murder trial of Richard Speck and seven persons were interviewed and excused from duty.

The veniremen were questioned by the prosecution and all were excused for cause. The defense asked no questions during the early morning session.

Speck, on trial on a consolidated indictment charging him with murdering eight young students in Chicago, appeared more alert today than during the initial session Monday.

He often curled his lips in a wry smile at comments from the interviewed veniremen. He continued to stare at newsmen and often smiled at one or two in particular.

An estimated 300 Magic Valley residents saw five men receive their individual Magic-Valley Livestock-Hall-of-Fame plaques Monday night with comments that ranged from "when you get to be my age, honors don't mean as much as friends, family and reputation" to "having my name added to the Hall of Fame list makes me very proud and very humble." The Twin Falls Holiday Club banquet room was filled to the aisles for the event that brought sheepmen, cattlemen, Republicans and Democrats together in a fashion that has become traditional in the area.

Politics and business were laid aside for the moment while the 300 banquet guests saluted five men who have added honor and dignity to their chosen livestock fields.

Representing both cattle and sheep businesses were honored C. H. (Tuff) Matthews-Gakley, Ray Lincoln, Twin Falls, and Eusebio Astorquia, Gooding. Roscoe C. Rich, Burley, represented sheep operations and Lloyd Barron, Fairfield, represented the cattle industry.

Stockmen are selected for the Hall of Fame, which has been established since 1950, on the basis of their contributions to their various business endeavors as well as for their civic and community activities.

Each of them was introduced by men of equal stature, and to paraphrase one of the introductory speakers, the honored between them have field more "dollar a year" jobs than nearly any other collection of five men.

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Revenue Solving Plans Presented To Legislators

BOISE (AP) — Plans for solving the revenue problem resulting from the state Supreme Court ruling on property assessment were outlined to Idaho legislators behind closed doors today. Explained first at individual party caucuses, then at a joint caucus in the House, was a plan to phase out over 10 years the assessment of utility-owned property rated higher than other property. Other alternatives presented to the caucuses were imposition of franchise or gross profit taxes on utilities.

CSI Is Awarded Building Funds

The College of Southern Idaho's building fund became some \$300,000 richer Monday night when the Civic Auditorium Association, Inc., handed over its funds to the college. College trustee chairman Eldon Evans noted the funds will give a noticeable "boost to the whole building program." The \$300,000, along with other funds from the Civic Auditorium and some federal funds, will be used to build a fine arts center at the college. It will be among the first buildings to be constructed after ground is broken early this spring.

Dr. Harry Brumbach, chairman of the auditorium board of trustees, noted that cancellation of pledges amounts to only about five per cent of \$23,000. He said it is now the duty of the Auditorium Association to replace these donors in an attempt to get them to honor their original pledges.

He said, however, that the success of collecting pledges has been "encouraging and unexpected" and he expressed the feeling that the near reality of a fine arts facility will further encourage subscribers to complete subscriptions.

Representing the auditorium funds, David Mead, handed over the money to the college. A delegation from the auditorium then reviewed plans and drawings of the fine arts building.

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Drug Case Is Linked With Utah Robbery

Police Chief Frank Barnett said Monday that Utah authorities have identified drugs and narcotics confiscated from a Twin Falls motel room last week as having been taken in an armed robbery in northern Utah.

They were reportedly taken from a drug store in a robbery Feb. 11, officers said.

Twin Falls police found some 1,000 pills in a motel room in which a man identified as Wally A. Thomas, 60, was found dead and a companion, Chester Charles Allen, 53, unconscious.

Officers said the men apparently suffered from overdoses of drugs and alcohol. Results of an autopsy are still pending.

Utah authorities are expected in Twin Falls to question Allen when his condition permits.

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Johnson Hopes For Nuclear Pact Draft

GENEVA (AP) — President Johnson told disarmament negotiators today that failure to halt the spread of nuclear arms could mean that even local conflicts will involve the danger of nuclear war. In a message to the committee on disarmament he said he hoped that it would soon get a draft of a proposed treaty. "I have instructed our negotiators," he said, "to exercise the greatest care that the treaty not hinder the nonnuclear powers in their development of nuclear energy for peaceful purposes."

West Germans have been most outspoken in charging that present proposals for a treaty might hurt their nuclear industry.

The 17 nations participating in the United Nations Disarmament Conference hope to have the treaty ready by the last week in September when the U.N. General Assembly convenes in New York.

Unlike past sessions, this one is not expected to produce any major clashes between the United States and the Soviet Union. The main sticking point between the two is a provision for international inspection to determine whether nonnuclear nations comply with the treaty. Soviet negotiator Alexei Roschin is reported to have told William C. Foster, the U.S. representative, that the Soviet Union could not accept this provision.

Prospects of working out a meaningful treaty were also marred by the fact that two of the five nuclear powers, Great Britain and France, have refused in advance to sign it.

Johnson Aide, Labor Heads Discuss Plans

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — White House assistant Joseph Califano discussed President Johnson's legislative program with top labor leaders today, and indicated he might touch off possible new strike legislation.

"We covered the whole program," Califano said after nearly an hour in closed session with the AFL-CIO Executive Council.

With Califano was federal Budget Director Charles Schultze, who talked about Johnson's budget proposals and tax measures.

The two federal officials came Monday to the meeting with AFL-CIO President George Meany and other Executive Council members and dashed past reporters.

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Gov. Romney Talks In Boyhood Homeland

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho (AP) — Gov. George Romney of Michigan, on a political sojourn through his boyhood homeland, said today he is "in a hurry to get home" to help solve this nation's ills.

In a speech prepared for delivery at a Republican luncheon in Idaho Falls he said "four hours—10 per cent of a 40-hour week—spent in well-conceived voluntary effort at the local level could reshape America faster than federal programs ever will."

"I think usually refers to the voluntary contribution of one-tenth of one's income to a church, a Y, a Boy Scout or a Red Cross. It is a habit of mind that says 'I'll do my share' and that is the only way to solve this nation's ills."

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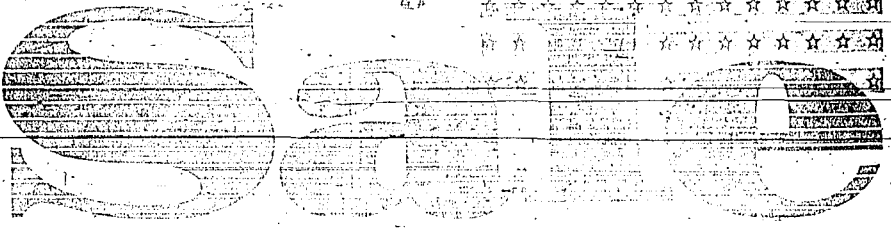
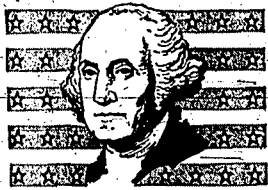

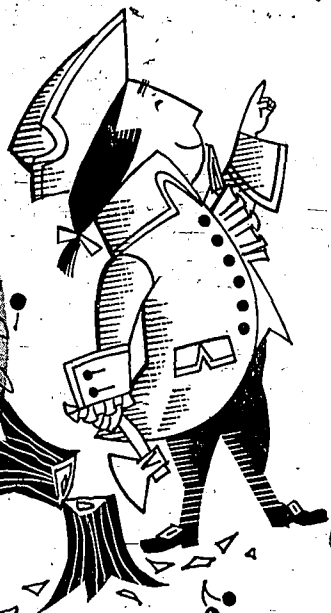

TAKEN OFF MARKET
POCATELLO (AP) — Raw milk under the brand name "Dairy Fresh" has been taken off the market in Pocatello by the Southeast Idaho Health Department because of mastitis infection in the dairy herd.

Ivan Frazier, director of the health department, said results of a test on samples taken Thursday at the herd were complete this morning and showed about half of the 40 cows had mastitis, an udder infection. Streptococcus and staphylococcus germs caused the infection, Frazier said, and are carried over into the milk.

No illnesses have been reported caused by drinking the contaminated milk, he said. Diseases which can be due to organisms in raw milk include strep throat and undulant fever.

MOTHER CHARGED
COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP) — A 19-year-old North Idaho mother was charged Monday with causing the death of her three-month-old daughter. She is in what the complaint against her termed "the heat of passion."

A voluntary manslaughter charge was filed against Mrs. Janet White of Cataldo, in the death of her daughter, Dora Grace. She appeared in Justice Court here, waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to District Court under \$1,500 bond. She remained in the Kootenai County Jail.

Death Claims Jerome Man At Age Of 72

JEROME — Martin C. Huber, 72, died early Monday morning at St. Benedict's Hospital of a short illness.

The Hatch Act makes it illegal for federal employees to engage in political activity.

In Judge McNichols' decision, he said Ramshaw had asked to have the part of his salary which was federally-paid suspended during his campaign for the Butte County sheriff's post. He lost the election.

Col. J. S. Brooks, chief of staff, said the alert was sounded at 7 p.m. By 9 p.m. he said, 77 per cent of the state's 3,381 guardsmen were on duty at armories throughout the state. About one out of the alert a year ago 72.5 per cent reported within two hours.

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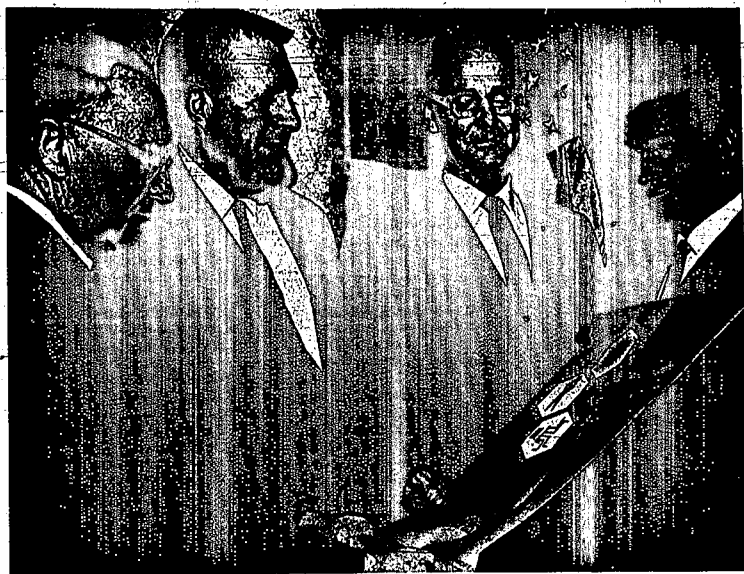

Indictment Against Man Is Dismissed

NEW YORK (AP) — A factory worker who admitted slaying his wife and five children has been freed because he was not informed of his rights as outlined in a historic U.S. Supreme Court decision last year. His confession was the only available evidence against him. "Even an animal such as this one, and I believe this is including the animal kingdom, must be protected with all the legal safeguards," said State Supreme Court Justice Michael Suarez. "It is so repulsive it makes one's blood run cold and any decent human being's stomach turn to let a thing like this out on the street."

Marla Torres, 24, had cut his leg with a knife during an argument, he seized the knife and stabbed her and the five children more than 100 times. The children ranged in age from 11 months to five years. At the time of Suarez' arrest, New York State law did not require that an accused man be advised on the points outlined in the Supreme Court decision. Thus he was not advised. The Miranda decision applied to him, however, because it was made retroactive to cover all defendants who had not yet been tried.

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Mao Extends Hand To His Foes

By JOHN RODERICK
TOKYO (AP) — Mao Tse-tung appeared today to be holding out a tentative olive branch to his foes.

The Mao-controlled Shanghai newspaper Wen Hui Pao laid down a new line — endorsed by the official Peking People's Daily — that cadres who had committed crimes but decided to join Mao's team should be given a prodigal-sor welcome.

The paper said: "The fact that a cadre who has made errors can turn from his former allegiance to the bourgeois-revolutionary line, can fight back fiercely against this line and rise up to make rebellion, shows that he has changed his stand. In this point, we must encourage this revolutionary action and absolutely not oppose it."

Japanese reports from Peking said the Communist party Central Committee has called a halt in the "prolonged struggle" against organized work-team supporters of President Liu Shao-chi and party General Secretary Teng Hsiao-ping. A Feb. 17 degree put up on the capital's walls summoned them to return to their original organizations to take part in the nationwide purge.

Reports filtering out of the mainland continued to tell of resistance to Mao.

One wall paper quoted by Japanese newsmen said Premier Chou En-lai declared recently: "At present Peking is wrestling with power seizure and the situation is tense. We must seize control in Peking first, and then we will take over the East China district, including Shanghai. Third is Tientsin, Hopeh, the Northeast and finally the Northwest and Southwest districts."

This outline of goals suggested that despite earlier claims, Mao's forces have not taken over either Shanghai or Peking completely.

Mao was said in the same poster to have sent Li Hsueh-feng, first secretary of the North-China Bureau, to Tientsin to cope with disturbances there.

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Soviet Says Missiles Will Miss Targets

MOSCOW (AP) — A Soviet missile commander today claimed that missiles fired at the Soviet Union would not hit their targets.

Gen. Pavel G. Kurochkin, head of the Defense Ministry Academy, made the claim in response to a news conference question about the Soviet anti-ballistic missile system.

Kurochkin repeated the Soviet claim that the ABM is defensive, with the implication that it represents no danger to world peace. The general declined to give details about the Soviet system but said, "If the rockets fly they will not reach their targets."

President Johnson mentioned recently that the Kremlin had members of the ABM system around Moscow and other reports have told of widespread ABM construction. Kurochkin's remarks indicated protection against enemy missiles is not limited to the capital.

"Detecting missiles in time and destroying them in flight is no problem," he said. "Interception complexes" but gave no details.

Humphrey Predicts End To War

STANFORD, Calif. (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey predicts that within a year Hanoi will recognize "the ball game is over" in the Vietnam war — "If we persevere and persist."

Addressing 1,800 Stanford students and faculty Monday, Humphrey forecast large-scale Viet Cong defections will follow South Vietnam's spring elections to establish a civilian government.

"Hanoi than will know the ball game is over," said Humphrey, unruffled by a few heckling shouts and a walkout by about 250 antiwar demonstrators from the audience.

About 300 to 400 antiwar students and supporters swarmed around Humphrey and his escort of Secret Service officers and sheriff's deputies when he left Memorial Auditorium by a side exit.

Mine Reveals New Vein Of Silver, Lead

Paul S. Bovey, Jerome, president of Liberty Gem Silver Mines Inc., Halley, has advised stockholders and directors of the discovery and exploration of a new vein of silver and lead ore which measures up to 14 ft. in diameter.

He said assay reports from ore samples show 68 ounces of silver and 88 per cent lead. At present the mine is being operated with a staff of six men and shipments of two carloads of 50 to 60 tons per car are being made per week. Ore is being shipped to the U. S. Smelter and Refining Co., Midvale, Utah, Mr. Bovey said. In excess of \$2,000 per car has been received for the recent shipments, he said.

The mine eight miles west of Halley on the old Fairfield road was discovered, Mr. Bovey said, in 1927 by Guy E. Matthews and his two sons. Although they did considerable development and exploration work, they did not operate the mine. Many mining companies attempted to purchase the property but the Matthews refused sale hoping to develop it into a family business.

Because of the drop in silver and lead prices, mining became unprofitable and the property was no longer under exploration.

In 1943, Mr. Bovey said, the mine, again under exploration, was flooded when a large body of water was struck. Nothing was done in the way of development until 1963 when the present owners took possession of the property under lease.

Mining experts, Mr. Bovey said, have termed the potential of the mine as exceptional and in line with such other mines of the area as Triumph, Silver Star Queen and others, the output of which have reached as high as \$50 million.

The unusually rich ore, at such close proximity to the surface, makes the mine a top production possibility, he said.

The giant vein discovered last summer begins at about two feet in width and increases to 14 feet. It was discovered while workers were cutting a drift at the 100-foot level for work under was there. It is 47 feet below the surface where discovered and in places 30 feet from the 100-foot level.

Silver prices, the mine president said, also hold out a strong hope for the mine's future. Having climbed from the low of 24 cents per ounce to the present \$123 per ounce, silver can now be mined profitably. It is in high demand, he said, in the photography industry, missile and spacecraft construction.

Lead prices have climbed from the low of four to 14 cents per ounce in the past few years.

Liberty Gem is not currently selling stocks, the president said. He listed other officers of the corporation as Henry Arkeny, Caldwell; Emmett Clomberg, Rexburg; Paul Roy Summers, Rexburg; John R. Detweiler, Twin Falls, and V. E. Camozzi, Jerome. Mr. Camozzi is also a mining engineer and is consulting engineer for the mining firm.

Mao Tse-Tung Plays With Fires In Forest Of Confusion And Sensation

BY JOHN RODERICK
TOKYO (AP)—A decade ago he put his hand into the flame and was burned. Today Mao Tse-tung plays with even more dangerous fires: freedom of expression and rice-roads democracy for China's millions.

The flames—in time—may consume him.

This aspect of Mao's fight against President Liu Shao-chi has passed nearly unnoticed, the tree obscured by a forest of confusion and sensation.

But for the first time since 1957 Chinese of widely different political persuasions are saying what they think, attacking whom they like in posters pasted on the apparently endless walls of Peking.

There has never been such freedom of talk—and writing—since Mao decreed 10 years ago that everyone could speak his mind. He said: "Let a hundred flowers bloom." That honeymoon lasted a month before Mao decided the flowers had turned into poisonous weeds.

Now, struggling against odds, the Chinese Communist chairman, now 73, has gone a step farther and given the Chinese masses a taste of new democracy out of an old bottle—revolutionary committees on the model of the 1871 Paris Commune.

These committees will grow into city committees, if he has his way. Membership will be

open to students, peasants, workers, soldiers, intellectuals or politicians who show revolutionary ardor for the thoughts of Mao Tse-tung.

All this is a far cry from the China of yesterday. For 17 years as a people's republic party, and for decades before as an outlawed political party, Chinese Communism's watchword was secrecy. No one ever played with the cards so close to his chest. Any criticisms were aired in secret party meetings.

Today secrets of the party committee, of past life, are pouring from the big and small-character posters and newspapers appearing on Peking's walls.

One day Mrs. Liu Shao-chi is called a slut; the next, Mrs. Mao is accused of being a "time

bomb" (talking beside her illustrious husband, President Liu and party general secretary) Tung Hsiao-ping have plotted to overthrow the government; Chou En li should be burned alive. Another day, a poster urges that those who say that should be killed.

It is bewildering, sometimes childish, but it apparently is unbridled and uncensored.

Government Is Unlikely To Prosecute Students Who Told Of Ties With CIA

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government is unlikely to prosecute the students who told of their relationship with the Central Intelligence Agency, says the general counsel for the spy organization.

Lawrence R. Houston said "these boys were pushed into a corner" by disclosure that the CIA had financed international activities of the National Student Association.

He said intent to breach national security must be shown before a prosecution can be achieved.

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Soviet-Made Missiles Score Poorly

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pentagon sources said today North Vietnam's Soviet-made surface-to-air missiles are scoring only attempts to hit U.S. planes.

Such figures prompted Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara to tell Congress the missiles "are not worth stealing in my opinion."

Beyond the direct plane losses to SAMs, however, there are the U.S. fighters which are hit by ground antiaircraft batteries after being forced to maneuver below the high-sounding missiles.

Sources report that the missiles are not as inferior as they appear at first glance.

"We are using some pretty sophisticated countermeasures against them," one officer said.

"It takes a pretty good radar operator to run the SAM system in the kind of environment that the North Vietnamese are faced with. You don't take a Hanoi high school graduate and give him the necessary training overnight."

He was referring to the advance warning American pilots get against SAM's through radar.

4.74 Per Cent Savings Note Is Unveiled

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Government today unveiled a new savings note with a 4.74 per cent interest rate that it hopes will attract up to \$1 billion in the next year to help fight the Vietnam war.

The new security will be called "Freedom Share U.S. Savings Note," and can be purchased in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$75 and \$100 and will mature in four years and six months from the date of issue.

The 4.74 per cent interest rate is the highest on the new bond issue since it was first introduced in 1951. A lesser interest rate will be paid if the note is redeemed earlier. It must be held, however, for one year.

The new note, which will be sold at 81 per cent of its face value, can be purchased only by persons who buy savings bonds on a regular basis under a plan of the bond-a-month plan.

The 4.74 investment yield is certain to stir new controversy among banking and savings and loan institutions and other financial institutions over the high interest government bond which drain deposits from them.

Hansen is winless—5 in fact working on a 44-game losing streak, Raft River has beaten only Hansen among the tournament entries.

Murtaugh would appear to hold the edge considering it will be at home while Rockland will be traveling and playing on the foreign court. But Murtaugh can worry, too. The Red Devils have beaten Rockland twice and it is too good a team to expect to win four straight.

Murtaugh bodied Rockland at home but in the second meeting at Rockland had to come from behind in the fourth quarter to win. The victory also failed to impress Rockland fans for another reason. Top gun Ron Nelson sprained an ankle early in the first quarter and didn't come back.

Against league foe Rockland scored 92 points while allowing 57. Murtaugh's conference mark was 789 for and 610 against. Both wound up with 10-2 marks and a share of the Magic Valley Conference title.

Nelson leads Rockland with a 16.5 scoring average while teammates Greg Maye has 13.5 and Harley has 12.5. Paul Warrnell lead Murtaugh with 12.4 followed by Bill Nebeker and jumping Jack Gene Rambo, who had a 10.8.

Raft River's Dana Tracy is the top scorer in the tournament at 16.7 overall. Hansen is paced by Ferris Freestones's 15.5.

On an extra good night Raft River might give the favorites some trouble but Hansen just doesn't appear capable of scoring in Rockland or Murtaugh. But Rockland and Murtaugh can score each other. Unfortunately, only one will advance to the state meet in Burley.

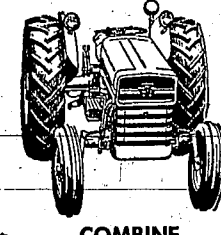

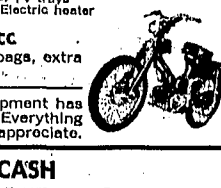

ROME (AP) — In a stamp collector's nightmare turned into reality, the Italian government is putting a match to 57 million old postage stamps worth millions of dollars.

Destruction of 255 sacks of unsold stamps, issued between 1959 to 1963, began Monday and will continue four days.

The stamps are being burned to clean out the Postal Ministry's cupboard and prevent the philatelic deflation that would result if they were thrown into the market.

Possessors of valuable Italian commemorative collections could sigh in relief that the value of their specimens was being preserved. But the stamp burning was enough to make aspirin collectors wring their hands in anguish.

The philatelic exhibition officials are witnessing the daily burning in the bank of Italy's special furnaces for destroying mutilated banknotes.

Turned to fine black soil Monday were the 1933 issue to commemorate the Rome-New York flight of Italo Balbo, the Fascist minister of aviation. They are worth \$100 per stack on the Italian philatelic market.

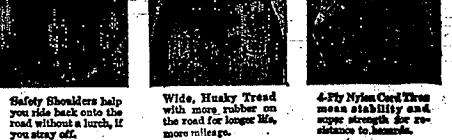

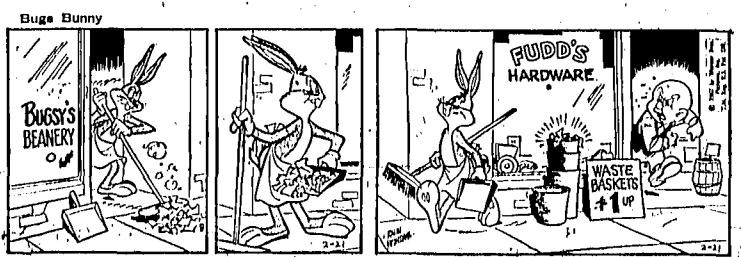
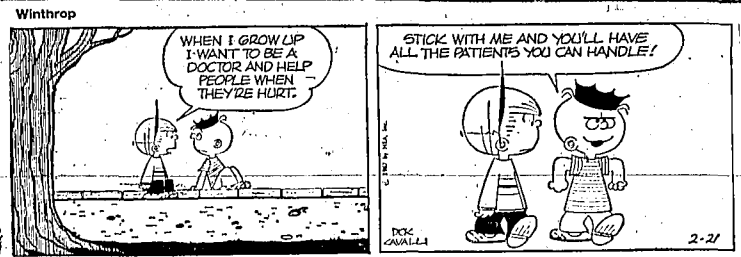

Why Does Senior Year Suddenly Turn Drear?

Just what is it that happens to high school seniors each spring? Suddenly their golden year tarnishes, the taste of honor turns to spinach, and "rah-rah!" becomes "so what?"

Why? Well, it's the morning-after an 11-year emotional binge. Since grade 1, students look forward to being a mighty senior. Each year they invest more hopes and dreams in grade 12, until finally they're looking forward to a combination Christmas-Mardi Gras-corporation! When the real thing arrives, it's bound to be disappointing and so boom! Senior Oldsmans!

The truth of course, is that today the junior year is the happiest one in high school. Students are "in" and saving the moment. By their senior year, college applications, draft problems, work and marriage quandaries, push them halfway "out" into tomorrow.

The senior has only one foot on campus. So, it's understandable that where once he'd gallop at the word "prom" or "party" now he tiptoes. "Why should I go? What's so special this time?" On many campuses, less than a third of the seniors attend affairs social, DOZENS OF DOLLARS.

Frequently seniors find themselves emotionally divorced from classmates. "I was making out college applications," recalls a university sophomore, "when it suddenly hit me that I wouldn't be going to school with the guys in my club. I saw then that we just did things together, but we'd never really been close. So I quit the club."

Perched on the edge of tomorrow, like a nonswimmer on a high-dive board, the senior is bombarded with doubts. "Will I make it to college? Will it be worthwhile if I do? Can I ever earn my living? Will my job turn me into a machine? Will I find the right mate? Will she be better than the girl I hold now?"

In this period of anguish, his

education seems sadly deficient. "In 12 years all I really learned was to psych out the teacher, and put down the right answer—his answers—so I'd get good grades. Learn to think? Don't make me work!"

Not infrequently seniors slack off studies in the second semester on the assumption that "as long as I pass, this semester's grades won't affect college admission."

Teachers and parents, who might help put things in perspective, are kept away. "You're too old to be told what to do anymore," sighs a senior male, "but you're too young to be on your own or in with college kids. This is the awkward age!"

Some seniors strike out at society. "It's your last year in school, your last year as a child, and well, you want to try everything," muses a senior girl. "You're afraid some experience will escape you. And so the seniors run a car of a cliff, break into the cafeteria and turn everything upside down, or anything else to leave a mark before they go."

Some seniors will play "os-trich." It's not "in" to be "in" in their society. But as an "in" noted: "Have you ever noticed how all those nonconformists look alike?"

Some seniors do find constructive ways of dealing with their feelings of listlessness, dissatisfaction and melancholy. Dial in tomorrow for their formula.
