Cadaver Organ Usage Urged

DURHAM, N. C. (AP)—A Duke University scientist said today that transplantation of heart and other organs from the dead to the diseased living is achievable through national effort to pass into the quest.
Indeed, said Dr. D. Bernard Amos, planning should begin now by federal, state and private agencies toward establishing a national network of organ-transplant centers to be ready for possible breakthrough in the technical field.
"It is a start; he urged that all states lacking it adopt enabling legislation to permit cadaver donation of an organ of his body for transplantation."
He said in a prepared report that encouraging results already have been achieved by American and European scientists in transplanting kidneys from cadavers into living patients. And he declared that while the transplanting of various other organs—such as the heart, liver and lungs—presents even more formidable problems, these problems can be overcome.
Dr. Amos declared that a start toward a national network of cadaver "organ banks" could be made in the kidney field. He said otherwise incurable kidney disease patients could be sustained temporarily by artificial-kidney machines at special centers while suitable potential donors of kidneys were sought among patients about to die from other causes in the same institutions.
He said this system could later serve as a source of tissues or organs for other patients.

Land Sale Dispute Sparks House Debate

BOISE (AP)—A dispute over the way in which state lands are sold and the spread of death in the Idaho House today, but champions of the status quo prevailed. Sponsors explained that financial institutions asked for legislative action to be certain the district's bonding limit would maintain the \$3 million bond issue approved by the voters.

T.F. Man Is Injured In Tractor Spill

Benjamin Lujan, 21, Route 1, Twin Falls, received possible fractures of the pelvis and spine in a tractor accident Monday morning three miles west of Berger.
Sheriff James H. Benham said Mr. Lujan was operating a tractor pulling a trailer filled with trash he planned to take to the county dump. A pole on the trailer disintegrated and swung around striking him in the back of the head. The blow forced him to lose control of the tractor which overturned, phoning him to it in a backwash by the sheriff's aid. The man had been working on the Hill Mary farm west of Berger.
Hospital attendants reported Mr. Lujan was in fairly good condition but requires emergency X-ray examinations at present.

Highway Fund Freeze Partially Relaxed

Navy Planes Increase River Attack

SAIGON (AP)—U.S. Navy planes today sowing mines in the rivers of North Vietnam started in a third week increase in military pressure to cut the flow of men and supplies from North Vietnam. In South Vietnam, the Viet Cong shelled the U.S. Air Base at Da Nang and an adjoining Vietnamese village with mortars and rockets, killing 11 Americans and 35 South Vietnamese civilians. Another 70 Vietnamese and 32 Americans were wounded and an ensuing fire burned 150 wood and tin-tin-made shacks in the village of Ap Do, on the edge of the air base.
U.S. Marines searching the area after the attack said they found 46 rocket firing positions near the base, along with 6 unused 140mm rockets and 2 rocket tubes. Military sources said they have Russian and Chinese markings.
This is the first time in the war that the Viet Cong has used rockets in a battle. They weigh 85 pounds each.
Other reports said the Communists used Soviet-made 120mm mortars in the attack. These have been used rarely by the Viet Cong.
The attack damaged 11 U.S. planes but a Saigon spokesman said the damage was light.
Marines at Da Nang said the Viet Cong lobbed 35 rounds on the base and 6 on the village.
They missed the five U.S. planes but the use of long-range artillery in South Vietnam to drop shells over the demilitarized zone into the North. On Sunday, U.S. Navy bombers shelled the North Vietnamese coast.

Speck's Trial Begins Its Second Week

That left only two who had been tentatively accepted, Gov. Dan Samuelson and another student nurse. They were selected Thursday. Scott was chosen Friday.

Garrison Probe Kept Top Secret

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP)—Bits of Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison's Kennedy assassination probe continue to pop to the surface but the overall picture remains closely guarded secret.
The late David W. Ferrie, 45, who was arrested last Wednesday, remains officially unclassified, figures in most scraps of information coming to light.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court rejected today an attempt to challenge constitutionality of the draft law.

They named as defendants President Johnson, Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, and Lt. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, Selective Service director.

24 Querried In Cheating Scandal

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP)—Twenty-four cadets at the Air Force Academy are being questioned in the latest cheating scandal after the number of resignations rose to 36. Three cadets resigned Sunday after admitting they had broken the honor code, which says "We will not lie, steal or cheat, or tolerate among us anyone who does."

The cheating centered around the passing of test information to classmates who were to take the same test later in the day. All 36 of the 36 who have resigned were directly involved in the cheating.

The five cadets not directly involved were found guilty of "toleration" under the honor code because they knew of the exchange of information and did not report it.

Rev. Francis J. Gilchrist, the Roman Catholic chaplain at the academy, told the cadets in his Sunday sermon that while the honor code is strict, it is necessary to national security.

"It is a different, difficult and honorable life," he said, "but it is lived with honorable men. The toleration of wrong is universally known as thieves' honor. Are we thieves?" he asked the cadets.

"As we are growing up we are told not to tattle on others. But there is a real difference between a runny-nosed kid and a military man," he said.

Officials at the academy say they have been unsuccessful at finding the cause for the latest honor code violations.

Production Of Kennedy Book Halted

NEW YORK (AP)—Production of William Manchester's book, "The Death of a President," was halted for several days last week to correct an error, says Evan Thomas, vice president of Harper & Row, publishers of the book.

The correction, Thomas said Sunday, resulted from Manchester's account of the actions of Maj. Gen. Chester V. Clifton Jr., military aide to President John F. Kennedy. Clifton is now retired.

Manchester had written that Clifton, after the assassination in Dallas, first called the White House and asked that Mrs. Clifton and Mrs. Kenneth O'Donnell be informed their husbands were safe, rather than the military situation involved.

Manchester had written: "The general's order of priorities was staggering. Only after his wives had been reassured could he deal with the possibility of a plot against the United States."

Thomas said Clifton, a long-time friend, informed him that the story was incorrect—that Clifton had made an earlier phone call to the White House which dealt with military and security aspects of the assassination.

Said Thomas: "When I learned that Mr. (Clifton) had done his job, I believed him. So we changed it. Once we learned the truth we were damned anxious to use it."

Thomas said the change meant removing several pages, reprinting them and replacing them in the as yet unbound books.

Thomas said that 100,000 copies had to be corrected. He said the cost to Harper & Row was estimated at between \$3,000 and \$25,000.

The original version appeared in the second installment of Look magazine's serialization of the book.

Jordan, Germany Resume Relations

BONN, Germany (AP)—West Germany and Jordan have agreed to resume diplomatic relations immediately, the Foreign Ministry said today.

Jordan and eight other Arab countries broke diplomatic ties with West Germany after Bonn recognized Israel in May, 1965, but maintained cultural and economic links.

The Arab League and West Germany have been considering a collective resumption of diplomatic relations but a diplomatic source in Beirut, Lebanon, said it was uncertain that other Arab states would follow Jordan's action.

Farley Says Speech Was His Own Idea

By GEORGE ESPER NEW YORK (AP)—James A. Farley, a former chairman of the Democratic National Committee, said today a speech he made highly critical of Robert F. Kennedy and J.W. Fulbright was not suggested by anyone in the Johnson administration.

In an address to 1,500 Connecticut Democrats at the party's Jackson-Jefferson fund raising dinner in Hartford Saturday night, Farley assailed the two Democratic senators for their criticism of the Johnson administration's Vietnam policy. He praised Johnson.

Farley, Democratic party chairman during President Franklin D. Roosevelt's first two terms, said that what he termed Kennedy's "inspiring ambition" has led him to "a foreign policy of his own."

Criticizing Fulbright for urging cessation of air strikes in North Vietnam, Farley said: "No other senator in American history except Sen. Fulbright has had the arrogance to tell the commander-in-chief that he should withhold air support from Americans fighting for their lives on a battlefield."

Farley said today in an interview that he was asked two weeks before the dinner to be the principal speaker by John M. Bailey, the party's national and Connecticut state chairman.

Farley, also a former postmaster general, said that he mailed President Johnson a copy of his speech Sunday afternoon. He said it is his usual custom to do this.

Asked what inspired the speech, Farley would say only: "I thought it would be in keeping with the occasion and of interest to those at the dinner."

Needs Help

LISBON, Portugal (AP)—Portugal has altered the requirements for being a policeman in Macao, its tiny, troubled colony in the shadow of Red China.

A primary school certificate will be the only qualification now required. The government also has agreed to let native Chinese hold police positions formerly reserved for Portuguese. Macao has had "difficulties in filling the posts existing under the present system," the government said.

Weekend Of Golf Eases Malaysia-Singapore Tension

By MERVYN PEREIRA CAMERON HIGHLANDS, Malaysia (AP)—A golfing weekend in Malaysia's Cameron Highlands eased two years of tension between Malaysia and her tiny neighbor, Singapore.

"We are friends now," said Prime Minister Abdul Rahman with a wide grin for Prime Minister Lee Kuan Yew of Singapore.

"I cannot remember when relations between Singapore and Malaysia were better," one diplomatic observer said.

Rahman and Lee reportedly discussed steps that could today pave the way for reunification of the two neighbors. Singapore was originally a member of the Federation of Malaysia when it was formed in 1963 but was forced out in 1965.

Lee's deputy prime minister, Toh Chin Chye, and his foreign minister, S. Rajaratnam, also were on hand although neither is a serious golfer.

Rahman "certainly has improved relations between the two countries," a senior Malaysian official said. "It is possible (formal) talks will follow. It is time we forgot our differences and talked."

He noted that the separate currency policy which is supposed to become effective June will present many problems to the business communities of the two nations.

Immigration restrictions which the two began mounting against each other are also hindering free movement of people and goods and building up political tension, he observed.

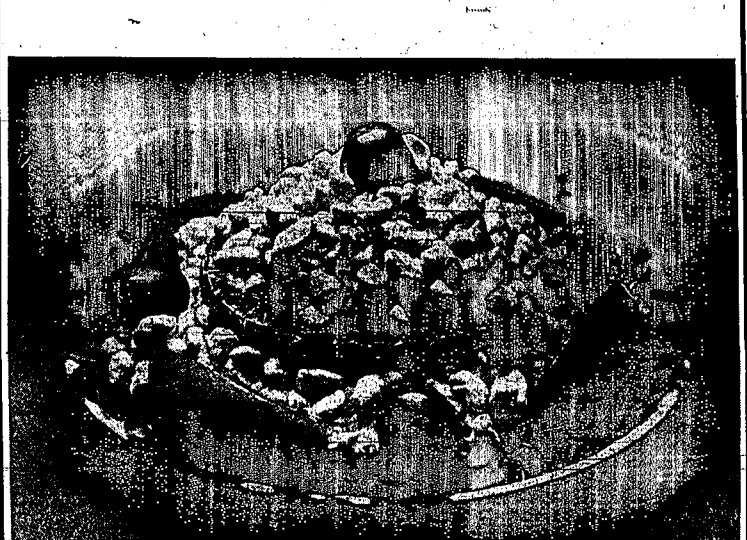

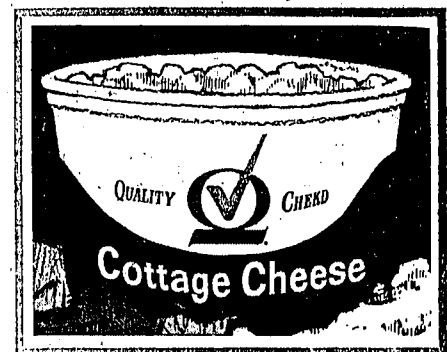

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON — Where foreign aid is concerned, it is doubtful whether the State Department is capable of catching a dropped hint, which may explain why little note has been taken of the latest doublecross inflicted on Uncle Sam by a beneficiary of his aid.

Indeed, both State and the White House seem only barely aware of Iran's agreement to \$50 million to \$100 million worth of military equipment from the Soviet Union. Admittedly, Washington is preoccupied with the Vietnam war and all the peace feelers, but someone should have taken the time to waggle a finger at our old pal, the Shah of Iran, for trading with the enemy.

This is one of those things that apparently can be explained only by the feeling of contempt engendered in have-not nations by Uncle Sam's wild generosity. Iran is a member of the Central Treaty Organization (CENTO), whose aim is to bring "the United Kingdom, the United States, France, Italy, and Turkey" together, and in which the U. S. plays an unofficial, consulting role. Until now, the U. S. has been Iran's main source of both arms and military equipment under a program which Washington since 1953 has credited more than \$1 billion into this country of only 20 million persons.

WORKING BOTH SIDES OF STREET—But the Shah, who spends money for arms, has decided he is not getting his proper share from the American trough. And, being wily as well as self-indulgent, he has decided that the way to get a few millions more is to get the Shah's tax money out of the U. S. tax payer's hands. He has decided to go to the Middle East. Like most of our ever-loving allies, he knows that Washington will do anything to get Moscow from cutting in on our Santa Claus act.

Coincidentally or not, the Russian-Iranian deal was revealed at just about the time President Johnson was giving a "kick" for the Shah on foreign aid this go-around. It was the Shah, in effect, telling Johnson he had better not cut Iran's share of the loot or Iran will be forced to start going steady with Kossygin and Co.

The deal also should have come as a shock to those politicians in both the State Department and Congress who have been telling the folks they don't have to worry about Russia any longer. Admittedly, the Kremlin appears to be interested in those East-West bridges Lyndon Johnson wants to build, but the Iranian deal is a reminder that Communists don't change their spots either. Uncle Sam, the Soviets do not give away money merely to bring a smile to the lean-face of the recipient, but to serve Soviet purposes, and this one obviously is a step in a Russian attempt to weaken the tie between the West and its Middle Eastern pals.

AID FOR THE RICH—As has been suggested frequently in this space, we should never have had the Development Bank and the World Bank's loans. Its rich in oil and other natural resources, this rather pathetic monarch has insisted on spending most of the nation's budget on 200,000-man army and 10,000-man police force, both of which are concerned primarily with protecting the Shah's perch on the throne. Land reform remains an unachieved dream, although the Iranian government allegedly has been busy with it for years.

Fortunately, the defection of some of our friends has caused Congress in recent years to take a harder look at the foreign aid program. The American people have been generally unenthusiastic about the new foreign aid program. In both the House and the Senate, there is agitation to slash the new budget to \$2.5 billion. This is good news for the poor American people, but not so good for the Shah. It should also examine the gimmicks which are not included in the foreign aid total. These include U. S. contributions to the new Asian Development Bank and the World Bank's International Development Association. When the appropriations for all these commitments are added up, it comes out that President is not asking for \$2.1 billion for foreign aid, but closer to \$4 billion.

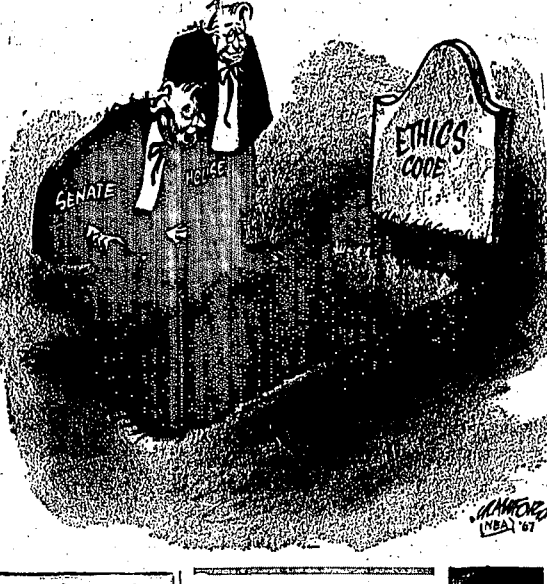

INSTEAD OF THE CANYON DAMS
In dropping two hotly-opposed dams in the Grand Canyon from the Central Arizona Project, the Johnson Administration has achieved what Secretary of the Interior Udall aptly described as "a victory for common sense." The Administration proposes that a group of 22 public and private investors build a water tunnel in the west and build a steam power generating plant from which the Government would purchase power to pump water for the Arizona project.

The water tunnel from Colorado says the compromise is not acceptable to the states directly involved and probably will not be acceptable to the House Interior Committee, of which the project has been the subject of a bill which those who are in opposition with him will reconsider. The project is too important to Arizona and to a large area of the West for any but the most substantive considerations to be allowed to obstruct what is a major engineering and public works compromise as usually inevitable. So long as they permit the broad objectives to be achieved the region will be best served by a policy of give-and-take. — St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

The Doctor Says

Group is a potentially fatal disease that is seen mostly in children between the ages 2 and 4 during the winter months. This disease is acute inflammation of the larynx, caused by a bactericidal bacteria, which is characterized by a barking cough and difficulty breathing. If the swelling chokes off the upper air passage, the three chief forms of the disease are bacterial, viral and spasmodic. The bacterial is the most common and the most dangerous because it comes on suddenly and progresses rapidly.

If your child gets croup, put him in a warm room and use a steamy bath to soothe the air. Take care that he doesn't inhale the steam directly. If he shows any signs of difficulty breathing, your doctor should be called immediately. If the doctor finds an acute swelling in the larynx he will want to put your child in the hospital because an emergency spreading in the windpipe below the awalling may be a life-saving measure.

In a recent study, this operation (tracheotomy) was necessary in over half of the children hospitalized for bacterial croup. Antibiotics are usually effective against this type of croup if they are given early enough in the course of the disease.

Viral croup is milder and does not require hospitalization, antibiotics or any operation. The child usually recovers in a few days. Attacks of spasmodic croup usually occur at night when the child is sleeping and clear up by morning. They may, however, recur two or three times a week.

The main thing for parents to do is to watch for any signs that a child's croup is causing trouble or breathing. If this happens the doctor should be called at once. If he can't be reached the child should be taken to the hospital emergency room.

Today and Tomorrow

The CIA problem is embarrassing to us today. But it is so important that we cannot sweep it under the rug and try to forget about it. For the good faith of the U. S. is at stake. The secret of the operation shielded it from suspicion in this country, and with very little questioning and argument the Congress has voted credit funds of unknown size for which there is no public accounting.

If we push deeper into the matter we find, I believe, that the root of the trouble is that the Central Intelligence Agency has been used for much more than genuine intelligence work. It has been used as a propaganda agency, a superior diplomatic foreign service, as an agency for clandestine intervention in foreign countries. The breadth of the CIA's authorized operations has not only generated the cloud of a participant over American action abroad but it has spoiled the CIA as an intelligence agency.

The CIA's present tasks are the facts that the agency has in fact done some of the things it is accused of doing everywhere all the time. It has overturned governments, invaded Panama, it has organized invasion of a foreign country in the Bay of Pigs. In the old days it interfered with money in elections in France and Italy. It has subsidized the foreign activities of students, scholars, journalists, churchmen, labor leaders; it has paid for radio stations and magazines abroad.

After the Bay of Pigs President Kennedy was urged to cut the CIA apart, separating sharply the business of intelligence from the business of propaganda and intervention. Unhappily, President Kennedy did not take this advice and, after a little tinkering with personnel and with the details, he left intact the secret conglomeration which is CIA.

There will be and there can be no solution to the problem, I believe, unless there is a surgical operation which separates intelligence work from the whole clutter of other activities. The intelligence agency should deal with espionage, research and analysis. The other activities, such as propaganda, intervention and dirty tricks, should be handled by other departments.

Percy termed Romney's west-

ern trip a "successful exploration" of the potentialities of his possible candidacy, despite one news conference in Idaho where newsmen pressed Romney to be specific in his criticism of President Johnson's conduct of the Vietnam war.

Yellow caution flags flew frequently as the torrid speeds punished machinery to the breaking point and strewed the track with metal and rubber as it broke.

Among early leaders, A.J. Foyt of Houston, Tex., Curtis Turner of Charlotte, N.C., Lee Roy Yarbrough of Columbia, S.C., Buddy Baker of Charlotte and David Pearson of Spartanburg, S.C., were all knocked out.

**Princess Margaret Denies Gossip
That Her Marriage Is On Rocks**

LONDON (AP) — Friends of
Princess Margaret and Lord
Snowdon say their seven-year
marriage has its ups and downs
but deny London society gossip
that it's on the rocks.

Talk about royal marriages,
a favorite subject in London's
Mayfair, was spurred by the
recent announcement of the di-
vorce plans of Lord Harewood,
cousin of Queen Elizabeth II.
The rumors about the Snowdons
grew largely out of stories in
foreign publications.
The royal court correspondent
of The People, a Sunday news-
paper, said Sunday the Snow-
don's friends "are convinced"
that the present rumors are to-
tally unfounded, although they
admit that there have been
times when, like most young
married couples, the princess
and her husband have had their
differences of opinion.
"In fact, there appears to be
absolutely no reason for sus-
pecting that either Princess
Margaret or her husband is con-

templating separation in the
foreseeable future."
A Buckingham Palace spokes-
man declined to comment.
The princess, 38, and her pho-
tographer husband, who as An-
tony Armstrong-Jones had been
among the Chelsea Bohemians,
are members of Britain's lively
young society. Their friends in-
clude artists, entertainers and
nobility.

Lord Snowdon has been in
Japan for nearly a month on a
photographic assignment for the
Sunday Times. One rumor was
that he left unexpectedly when
the princess entered a hospital
Feb. 1 without waiting to learn
the nature of her illness.
Actually, the Japanese trip
had been planned for weeks and
Lord Snowdon knew before he
left that his wife was to undergo
routine medical checks.
