LBJ Requests Funds To Begin Rocket Engine

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson asked Congress today for money to begin the development of a nuclear-powered rocket engine, the Rover. For this and other scientific projects, Johnson asked a total of \$149.8 million for use in the fiscal year beginning July 1. In addition to the nuclear-powered rocket engine, Johnson asked funds for a physics laboratory for basic physical and biochemical research and a specialized facility for further exploration into controlled thermonuclear fusion as a potential source of electricity. "The projects will advance America's ability to harness atomic energy for the peaceful exploration of space," Johnson said. "They will also help us chart new courses in nuclear science."

Consular Pact OK'd By Committee

WASHINGTON (AP)—The consular treaty with the Soviet Union was approved today on a 10-4 vote by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Cone., who left a closed session after announcing the vote, said he was one of the four opposing ratification. The treaty now goes to the floor where Republican opponents may continue their opposition to the agreement, which is unnecessary concession to Moscow that will help North Vietnam and facilitate Communist espionage.

The city of Natchez offered a \$25,000 reward for information about the explosion which ripped through Jackson's truck April 23.

Hoffa Battle Appears All But Lost

WASHINGTON (AP)—President James R. Hoffa's four-year battle to avoid jail on a federal jury tampering conviction appears all but lost. The Supreme Court opened the way for his jailing by refusing to void a federal conviction on appeal, which Hoffa had won in 1964. The court's decision back to a second hearing on his 1964 conviction, then checked off another avenue he might have used to stay out of jail.

Watchdog Unit Spurred By House Case

WASHINGTON (AP)—Spurred by the Adam Clayton Powell case, pressure is increasing on the House Judiciary Committee to keep tabs on ethics and conduct of congressmen. Romney Plans Southeast Asia Trip

KANSAS CITY, Kan. (AP)—Gov. George Romney of Michigan plans to go back to Southeast Asia by the end of the year "to seek out additional information." He is not going to be forced into making a statement about Vietnam, he told a news conference Monday, "until I feel I have obtained all the facts."

Sen. Clark Urges Acceptance Of War Declaration Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Joseph S. Clark pressed today for Senate acceptance of his proposal to require the United States to declare before U.S. bombing attacks against the north can continue. Clark attacked a U.S. policy in Vietnam in a three-hour Senate speech Monday as President Johnson told newsmen he doesn't think new types of American attacks on the north have dimmed peace hopes. Clark, a Pennsylvania Democrat, is offering his war declaration proposal as an amendment to the administration's \$1.5-billion supplemental military authorization bill for Vietnam.

Water Fund Bill Is Introduced

BOISE (AP)—A bill carrying out Gov. Don W. Samuelson's suggestion of a state water development fund was introduced today in the Idaho legislature. The bill does not contain an appropriation, but Samuelson has suggested utilizing \$5 million of the expected general fund surplus to create the fund. The fund would be administered by the state water resource board. Money would be available to "any irrigation district, canal or irrigation company, water users' association, municipal or private corporation."

Goldberg Won't Travel To Rangoon

SEOUL, South Korea (AP)—U.S. Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg said today he is not visiting Rangoon on his current Asian tour despite the presence there of a three-man North Vietnamese diplomatic mission and U.N. Secretary-General U Thant. The chief U.S. delegate to the United Nations said he had no information about the North Vietnamese group, which arrived in Rangoon over the weekend. That is on vacation in his native Burma.

Next 2 Months Crucial In Mao's Cause

BY TORAO TOMINAGA TOKYO (AP)—Supporters of Mao Tse-tung have indicated he believes the next two months will be crucial for his struggle to resume control of Red China, the official New China News Agency said today. The pro-Mao Chinese news agency said the Shanghai Municipal Revolutionary Committee adopted a resolution at a rally last Friday apparently based on important instructions from Mao and the Communist Central Committee.

Mishap Fatal For Springdale Boy, 9

SPRINGDALE — A 9-year-old Springdale boy was the latest fatality in Cassia County this month. Mark Scholer, son of Burke Scholer, Springdale, died Monday afternoon when he was struck by a pickup truck while riding a skateboard. The Scholer boy had just finished attending primary classes at the Springdale LDS Church and was riding his skateboard on the sloping church driveway when he darted onto a county road and into the path of the vehicle driven by Candace Peterson, 18, also Springdale. Several persons attempted artificial respiration but the youth was pronounced dead on arrival at Cassia Memorial Hospital in Burley.

Marines Make End Run On Central Coast

SAIGON (AP)—U.S. Marines made an end run on South Vietnam's central coast today, part of one operation area and making a new landing—16 miles farther down the coast. The battalion landing team of 1,500 Marines met no resistance as it approached the beach. The Marines landed and set up a base on the beach. The landing team is expected to be ashore on beaches 21 miles south of Quang Nhai City.

His parents, also of Cheshire, and his brother, Henry C. Barnum of Painted Post, N.Y., watched as Secretary of the Navy Paul H. Nitze presented the medal to the 26-year-old officer.

He won the nation's highest award for taking command of a rifle company Dec. 18, 1965, and mopping up an enemy force "with complete disregard for his own safety."

Barnum is the fourth Marine to receive the medal for heroism in Vietnam.

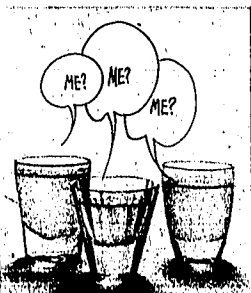
44 Brazilians' Rights Taken

BRASILIA (AP) — Forty-four Brazilians, none of them currently active in national politics, were stripped of their political rights Monday for a 10-year period. No reason was given for the measure.

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Army Cooks Are Getting Gourmet Lessons

Feb. 28-March 1, 1967
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WASHINGTON (AP) — Army cooks — who sometimes call coffee "battery acid" and oatmeal "glue" — are getting gourmet lessons from European chefs.

"We're trying to change the historical image," said Sgt. Carlton Brown of the Pentagon. "The amazing thing has been what an Army cook can do to make — mother's-basis — cooking ingredients — look like — salvage from a garbage can.

"We're not particularly interested that they learn to cook files," they don't serve them anyway," he said today. "But they do serve a type of New York cut beef, and we want them to know how to make it palatable — less like something to sole shoes with."

The battle plan, thus far limited to the Washington area, calls for a group of Army cooks to study eight weeks with European chefs in major hotels.

"Once I was hired by the Army to observe a kitchen," said chef Josef F. Schafer of Cologne, Germany. "After a week I reported in. It was fantastic. 'What are we doing wrong?' they asked. 'Wrong!' I said. 'What are you doing right?'"

"From a professional standpoint, it was disaster," Schafer recalls. "If all that had happened in my kitchen, I'd have blown it up."

But Schafer has hope. He has Spec. 5 Harold Root, 24, of Portland, Ore., and Spec. 4 Albert Johnson, 33, of Guttenberg, N.J., working in his Washington Hilton kitchen.

Root enlisted in the Army to be a mechanic. He was placed in supply school and flunked out. Then came cooking school.

"In cooking school, you don't think out," he noted. "The main thing," he said, "is that we're inspired."

WASHINGTON—The first serious split between President Johnson and Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey has resulted from Humphrey's comments in Palo Alto, Calif., on revelations that the Central Intelligence Agency had secretly financed student groups.

"The boss thought Hubert overdid it," said a Johnson aide. "The President—the Vice President—let in vigorous terms that he was unhappy," reported a Humphrey aide.

In a statement to a student and faculty meeting at Stanford University, Humphrey declared that the CIA student group was "one of the saddest times our government has had in relation to public policy." He expressed Humphrey's concern about the CIA's involvement in student organizations and said he hoped the furor arising from the disclosures would lead to tighter government control over the spy agency.

YES, BUT—It was learned from sources on both the Johnson and Humphrey staffs that the President had approved in advance "the gist" of Humphrey's comments. But the President, it was said, thought Humphrey "went too far" in expressing his views. Johnson was represented as feeling that he should have arranged for and held Humphrey to a formal statement composed in the White House.

Johnson was said to have been particularly indignant over the "saddest times" phrase because he felt it was a slur on his administration. Johnson also didn't care for Humphrey's call for tighter government control of the CIA. He said the President was pictured as being annoyed that his Vice President should imply that he, the President, had been derelict in overseeing CIA activities.

OFF KEY—Moreover, Johnson was said to feel that Humphrey was too "vehement" in seeming to wash his own hands of the whole business. "President Johnson is not a secretary," Humphrey, as a top member of the administration, should have adopted a more moderate tone and defended the administration's need to do everything possible to combat Communist influence in the White House.

"After all," a Johnson aide said, "there has been no indication the CIA ever tried to dictate to any of those groups on policy matters or to influence their ideological thinking. Humphrey made it—no one else—clear that he also complained that the student groups could have disassociated themselves from CIA if they felt that the CIA was not acting in their best interests."

"The whole idea of the Humphrey statement was to emphasize the President's concern over the situation," the Johnson aide said. "Instead, the Vice President seemed to be piling all the blame on Lyndon Johnson's administration after the fact. CIA after all, the responsibility back stops at the President. Everybody knows that."

CITES BRITISH SYSTEM—It was also learned that President Johnson personally dictated a sentence in a statement given to the Associated Press by John W. Gardner, the bona fide liberal and member of the White House staff, Health, Education and Welfare. The sentence was, "I have little respect for critics who give themselves airs of moral superiority in attacking the ways they know to be necessary."

CREDIT BILLING SYSTEM—As do taxes, consumer debt seems never, never to go anywhere but up. Total consumer credit in the United States now stands at about \$2 billion, compared to \$3 billion five years ago.

Congress and some state legislatures, looking into the mounting burden of private debt, appear to have certain installment loan and buying practices.

The Federal Trade Commission has published a proposed retail credit code. The agency asks for suggestions from both business and consumer interests.

Under the proposal, the retailer would be required to furnish customers in writing the cash price of the article, amount of taxes to be paid and the amount of the down payment. The article, unpaid cash balance, cash finance, carrying or insurance charge, amount of each periodic payment, total number of required payments, total amount of indebtedness, price of the article, and the name of the creditor, would be informed if the sales contract could be turned over to a finance company or collection agency.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (NEA)—Gov. George Romney of Michigan brought off remarkable well the real aims of his 6-day sweep through Alaska, Utah, Idaho, New Mexico and Arizona.

He was the westerner, even the country boy, coming home to places where he had grown up. He was the rugged physical specimen ready for the challenges of the outdoors. And he was the Republican presidential pick who, while widely hailed as a moderate and liberal, could offer himself as having strong strains of the conservatism the West seems to reflect so heartily.

In Alaska, he led a dog team in a race across thick snow. In a horse, he rode north from Anchorage in a vain try at seeing Mt. McKinley. In Arizona, he rubbed noses—Eskimo style—at a miners' and trappers' ball. Riding in a bus toward scenes of his Mormon boyhood at Rexburg, Idaho, Romney pointed toward the Big Sawtooth Mountains and said:

Over there is that south fork of the Salton River which, I believe, was the site of the great battle between the Mormons and the Indians. I was there when they fought.

But all this was largely a colorful backdrop for the more serious agenda of the trip. Romney, likely presidential candidate.

WASHINGTON—The distance between the White House and the marble temple occupied by the board of governors of the Federal Reserve System can be covered in about five weeks, but it will take a long time to get there.

In view of the decisions the President must make—decisions determining the future of the fed and, for that matter, the issue between hard money and easy money—the short passage has the look of a long obstacle race.

The term of William McChesney Martin Jr., as chairman of the board, expires in five weeks. The President can ask him to serve in that capacity for another two years or he can name another man in his place. If the President were to name an event Martin would resign from the board itself, although his appointment as a member runs until Jan. 31, 1970.

17 Elk Shot In Drive To Cut Numbers

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — Despite outcries from sportsmen, conservationists, governors and congressmen, U.S. Park Service rangers are shooting northern Yellowstone elk to reduce the overpopulated herd.

Assistant Park Supt. John Clay said 17 elk were shot Monday — the first day of the program. Rangers have a quota of 25 elk per day in an attempt to cut the herd by about 600 elk to preserve winter feed areas.

Clay said despite protests, the thinning will be continued unless his office receives an order to halt. That order must come from Park Service headquarters in Washington.

The park officer said the 17 butchered elk were taken Monday to Livingston, Mont., for further processing, and the meat will be distributed through the Bureau of Indian Affairs. He said he did not know exactly what tribes would receive the meat, but speculated the Indians of Southern Montana and Northern Wyoming might be in line because of transportation problems.

All three national broadcasting networks, NBC, CBS and ABC, have notified park officials they plan to send crews to the park to film segments of the shooting.

Chief Park Naturalist John Good said he doubted if the desired goal of 600 animals will be achieved, because of the warm weather. He noted that 25 elk is about the maximum to be handled by the meat processing plant at Livingston.

Good and other park officials say they believe rangers went about as far as they could in live-trapping the elk for shipment to other parts of the United States.

So far, Clay said, 1,044 elk have been sent to points in Wyoming and Montana for resettlement by game and fish officials. A number of private ranchers have also requested — and received — about 50 elk.

By **RELMAN MORIN** — NEW YORK (AP) — Lord Snowdon, emphatically denying divorce rumors, is looking forward today to joining his wife, Princess Margaret, in the Bahamas Islands for a brief winter vacation.

"How do they start?" he asked, referring to the rumors. "Then, with an infectious grin, he said, 'It's news to me, and I would be the first to know.'"

He is meeting his wife, sister of Queen Elizabeth II of England, in the Bahamas March 9. He declined to say how long he would stay in New York or where they would vacation in the islands.

Thereafter, he said, they would go on together to London.

He flew to New York Sunday night from Tokyo. He had been working in Japan for four weeks on what he called an "essay" with text and photographs of Japanese life. Lord Snowdon is

a professional photographer. He said that during his absence, he and Princess Margaret had corresponded regularly. In fact, he added, his latest letter to her was written on the airplane coming from Tokyo and mailed in Seattle, Wash.

The princess displayed no outward concern with the rumors Monday night as she attended the charity premiere of a new film version of Shakespeare's "Taming of the Shrew" starring Richard Burton and Elizabeth Taylor.

Wearing white satin-silk trimmed with white mink and diamond and turquoise jewels, she talked with Burton, actor Laurence Harvey and Mia Farrow, Frank Sinatra's wife. As she left the theater, members of the audience in the foyer applauded and the princess smiled happily.

London newspapers gave banner headlines to Snowdon's denial of the divorce rumors, coupling their front-page stories with pictures of the smiling princess at the movie premiere. The Daily Mail said Snowdon's statement "may startle the traditionalists" — because members of the royal family normally do not comment on their personal lives — but "his frank and

clear words ... (have) destroyed the rumors."

As Antony Armstrong-Jones, Snowdon married Princess Margaret May 6, 1960.

They have two children, Viscount Linley, born Nov. 3, 1961, and Lady Sarah Armstrong-Jones, born May 1, 1964.

Lord Snowdon said rumors that the princess is expecting another child also are without foundation.

Death Count Set At 51 From Quake

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — At least 51 persons were killed and about 370 injured in an earthquake that jarred the East Java city of Malang Feb. 20, the official news agency Antara reported today. Rescue crews are still looking for other victims.

The quake, which struck in the early morning, demolished more than 2,000 homes and damaged another 5,000.

The high plateau on which Malang is situated lies a few hundred miles east of Jakarta. It is bordered by several active volcanoes.

The long delay in the report was attributed to communication disruptions which are chronic because of Indonesia's generally chaotic political and economic state.

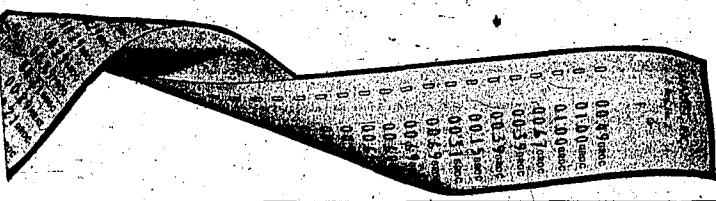

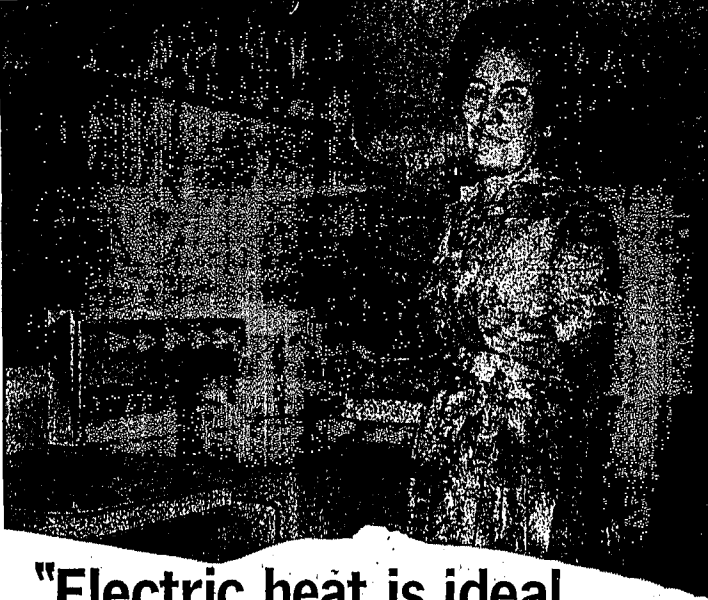

Here in the hospital I was beginning a search for myself — had submerged first as a big sister, then as a mother.

And as I discovered myself I found not less but more of a capacity to love my husband and children. Making a million things for them in the hand-crafted sessions, my heart would flood with love and concern for them.

I vowed to lessen the busyness in my housework, to lower my perfectionist standards, to spend more time simply enjoying my family. What if the cut-garments were hung without starch now and then, if it gave us time for a story before supper? Gradually a knot that had kept me under the constant conviction of duty was unwinding inside me.

None of this happened quickly or easily. Part of the discouragement that recovery comes so slowly. My impatience for a magical "instant cure" was a handicap until I accepted how my husband recovery could not be rushed.

Wait is a hard word to learn, but on that word my whole healing was built.

When I finally returned to my family I gained 15 pounds and a precious piece of paper. I still had a long way to go — complete recovery took two difficult years. Knowing how much of psychiatric therapy — but that piece of paper — was my road map.

Woman Will Appeal Suit On Rancher

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — A dark-haired German woman who lost a \$2.5-million breach of promise suit says she will appeal.

Testimony during the week-long trial that ended Monday disclosed that Beate Leber's husband had leased her in Germany to a multimillionaire American rancher for \$1,000 a month. She then went to William N. Brown's ranch at Sasabe, Ariz.

U.S. Dist. Judge John C. Brown dismissed the suit by Mrs. Leber, 34, against Brown, 65,

ruling the German woman was still married to Ralph Lebertor Heidelberg, Germany.

He ruled it was therefore legally impossible for her to accept a marriage proposal from another man.

"She is returning to Germany immediately," her attorney, Raymond Hayes, said after the trial.

"She will not go back to her husband, Ralph, but probably will enter the import-export business. She will return to the United States when her appeal is heard," Hayes said.

The Lebers and Brown met at a German nudist colony, testimony revealed.

Brown's attorney, Norman Hull, argued Monday the lease pact with the Lebers and Brown agreed resulted in "an illicit and weird relationship."

Idaho Falls Psychiatrist To Speak At Clergy Meet

Dr. David S. Burnet, a practicing psychiatrist in Idaho Falls, will speak at the Pastoral Studies Institute for Pastoral Studies from 10 a.m. to noon Friday at Magic Valley Memorial Hospital.

His topic will be "The Pastor's Role in Counseling Begins With the Pastor's Personality." The session is open to pastors of all churches in Magic Valley.

Postgraduate education of Dr. Burnet in psychiatry was at the University of Vienna, Austria; the University of Virginia, where he was a resident in psychiatry and neurology for three years, and at the universities of Minnesota, Utah, Michigan and Oregon.

For two years prior to 1956 he was psychiatrist on the staff of State Hospital South, Blackfoot.

The Pastoral Studies Institute is under direction of an independent committee of clergymen and doctors.

Gas Import Threats Cut Price Hikes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government threats to boost gasoline imports if necessary to avert a rollback in price hikes by a number of major oil companies appear to be showing results.

Continental Oil Co. announced Monday without comment that it was scaling down the increase it announced earlier this month.

So far, there has been no backing down by any of the other companies that raised prices at the same time.

It has been estimated that the increases would add one cent per gallon to the price paid by the motorist for gasoline. The Department of the Interior says all those pennies would add up to \$750 million a year for the American public.

Interior first insisted that the companies rescind 100 per cent of the increases but later took a compromise approach, asking them to take back only the portion that would serve to fatten corporate earnings.

Area Granges Prepare For Sewing Meet

A home economics conference was held recently in the Idaho Power Auditorium for all subordinate grange home economics chairmen in the county.

Mrs. Ed Schwaezler, Burley, state home economics chairman, conducted the session.

Mrs. Schwaezler stressed the rules of the sewing and needlework contests and urged each chairman to solicit as many entries in the competitions as possible, according to Mrs. Kenneth H. Poe, representative of the Twin Falls Pomona Grange.

Non-grange members who wish to enter the competition are asked to contact Mrs. Poe, Route 3, 733-1484. Girls taking home economics in the junior or senior high schools throughout the county are particularly urged to enter, she said.

The county home economics chairmen are Mrs. Don Dietz, Mrs. John Moyer and Mrs. Burton Harmon.

Judging of the sewing contest entries will take place in Meridian at the State Grange Headquarters June 4.

The competition is open to grange members in good standing and 12 years of age and over as of April 30, 1967. Non-grange members over the age of 12 may also enter.

Professionals in the field of women's fashion, including editor, teacher or dressmaker, may not enter.

Garments may be entered in class A, any type dress or suit made by a contestant 18 years of age and over for herself or another person of the same age; class B, any dress or suit coordinated with blouse and skirt made by a contestant 12 through 17 years of age made for herself or another person of the same age; and class C, any dress or suit made by a person 18 years of age or over for a person under 18, including infants and small boys.

Many of the same rules apply to the needlework contest, Mrs. Poe said. Samples may be entered in any of three divisions, including crochets, tablecloths, luncheon cloths, bedspreads, dollies and centerpieces, chair sets, vanity or buffet sets and collages—knitting or crochets, aprons, sweaters, scarves, shawls, three-piece baby sets, socks, gloves and mittens; and embroidery, group 3, tablecloths and luncheon cloths, pillow cases, aprons, set of two towels and bureau scarves.

Rivers Bill Is Eyed By Hansen

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. George Hansen, R-Idaho, said he hopes growth could be realized if safeguards were included in the Scentic Rivers bill sent to Congress by the Department of the Interior.

Under the measure, the Salmon River from North Fork in Riggins, the Middle Fork of the Salmon, the Clearwater and the Selway Rivers could all come under the bill, he said.

Hansen said these streams were favorable economic resources for Idaho and their being set aside as "wild rivers" could hurt Idaho's growth.

Mailman Wins President's Art Contest

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Carl Bieber, a 37-year-old mailman, has won first prize in a Paint-the-President contest—and may be forgiven a slight case of the jitters.

Bieber's boss, Lyndon B. Johnson, is said to have dismissed a recent effort by professional artist Peter Hurd as "the ugliest thing I ever saw."

The North Platte, Neb., postman executed his portrait in ink and enamel on a plastic background. It was judged best of more than 1,350 entries received by the Omaha World-Herald, the contest sponsor, and won a \$50 prize.

The contest was prompted by the recent White House rejection of a portrait of Hurd who had received a \$6,000 retainer from the White House Historical Association. Hurd coordinated a skirt and blouse said the president described the result as ugly, and that Mrs. Johnson didn't like it either.

Runnerup in the World-Herald contest was a switch on a famous World War I recruiting poster in which Uncle Sam pointed a finger at the viewer above the caption "I want you." In the contest reviewed by Steven McCoy, 21, an Omaha art student, LBJ replaces Uncle Sam and demands recruits for the administration's Great Society.
