House Plunges Into Debate On Seating Powell

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House plunged today into debate over seating and punishing Adam Clayton Powell, with Rep. Emanuel Celler urging members to reject "blinding forces of hysteria" calling for the Harlem Democrat's ouster. Celler, New York City Democrat, served as chairman of the select committee which recommended Powell be seated with a stiff reprimand, loss of seniority, and a \$40,000 fine for "gross misconduct." He urged the House to accept the committee proposal, "for the honor of the House."
The galleries were packed and the majority of members were present for the debate preceding the first test vote on the censure proposal. If the House votes then to cut off debate, and bar amendments, it is expected to approve the censure.
Powell was not present, presumably remaining in his Birmingham retreat.
Celler noted that only three House members have ever been expelled all for treason during the Civil War.
Mr. Powell's wrongdoing does not rise to the height of treason, he said. He also noted that the committee "went far beyond censure."

New Arts Unit Members All Resign

BOISE (AP)—The newly-created Commission on the Arts and Humanities has no members now, Gov. Don W. Samuelson said Tuesday. He would "revoke" any appropriation measures for the operations.
It was learned Tuesday that all commission members had resigned to help a bill through the legislature which would give group-statutory status.
It had been created last fall by executive order of then Gov. Robert E. Smylie. Samuelson has already signed the bill giving it statutory existence.
Working in the bill apparently made re-appointment of all commissioners a requisite to the commission's creation. Some legislators did not like that, so commissioners resigned.
Their resignations were also, they said, submitted to give the governor free hand in appointment of a new commission. Chairman Robert V. Hensberger, Boise, president of Boise Cascade Corp., was among the 21 resigning.

150 Viet Cong Killed In War Zone C

SATON (AP)—American planes and artillery killed more than 150 Viet Cong in War Zone C after the Communists hady mauled a company of the U.S. "Infantry Division," the U.S. military command reported Tuesday.
The six-hour battle Tuesday was the biggest to date in the week-old Operation Junction City, a 45,000-man U.S. squeeze on the Communist jungle stronghold near the Cambodian border. The company of 118 American infantrymen suffered heavy casualties, meaning it is no longer an effective fighting force until it receives replacements.
North Vietnamese regulars operating just below the demilitarized zone fired off a tremendous mortar attack in an effort to knock out the long-range U.S. artillery guns which last week began shelling across the six-mile zone into North Vietnam.

Ramsey Clark Nominated To Cabinet

WASHINGTON (AP)—Nomination of Ramsey Clark as attorney general will give President Johnson a Supreme Court vacancy to fill—the result of a family double-play.
Sen. Johnson promoted Clark to the vacancy Tuesday, Supreme Court Justice Tom C. Clark, the nominee's father, said he'll resign to avoid any conflict of interest.
Early Senate approval of the younger Clark's appointment is expected. The senators heavily endorsed the nomination, with Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., calling it "one of the finest any president has ever made."
Justice Clark, 67, a 17-year veteran of the high court bench, said he'll resign the day after he is appointed by President Johnson.
Clark was appointed by President Harry S. Truman.
— Ramsey Clark, 39, has been acting attorney general since last October when Nicholas Katzenbach resigned to become secretary of state.

Regional Airport Measure Debated, Held For Change

BOISE (AP)—The Idaho Senate debated today for an hour before sidetracking for amendment a bill authorizing establishment of regional airports. The bill, however, was kept on the floor and held for the Committee of the Whole, so it will be immediately available for action again as soon as the amendment can be drawn up.
Sen. Richardson High, R-Twin Falls, said that during the debate the committee seemed to favor the major provisions of the bill, and the only objections seemed to be in the inclusion of the Panhandle counties.
Although these counties would not be financially obligated to a Northern Idaho regional airport, they still would have had their providing-board members for the airport district.
Another bill, "Providing an alternate means of establishing regional airport districts by county option," was referred back to committee to await final disposition of the first measure.
Objections to the bill were voiced by senators from Northern Idaho, who contended that agreement never could be reached for establishment of an airport serving all the Panhandle counties. They suggested the bill be amended to permit the Lewiston and Moscow areas to join in establishment of a regional airport.
The Panhandle counties, they said, already are served adequately by the airport at Spokane, Wash.
The measure divides the state into four geographic areas.
Sen. High, floor sponsor of the bill, said some counties in the southeastern area are unlikely to use the measure because they already have adequate airports.
But he said the south central section particularly needs the regional concept. He said the area has no major airports used by commercial airlines at Twin Falls, Burley, and Malley.
Expansion of the present Burley and Hiley airports is impractical because of geographic barriers. He said Twin Falls airport location is the best of existing prevailing wind conditions.

Marchers Demand Killer Be Found

NATCHEZ, Miss. (AP)—Civil rights forces have made a gala of Armstrong-Firm-and-Rubber Co. their main target, for marches in pressing demands that the killer of Wharless Jackson be sought out and arrested. About 2,000 Negroes marched to the plant gates Tuesday night and threw them open briefly, only to close them at the insistence of their leaders. "If necessary, we'll go through those gates like a flood of water," said Charles E. Evers, Mississippi field secretary for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. He said that might happen soon.
Jackson, former treasurer of the Natchez branch of the NAACP, was killed Monday night when a bomb exploded in his pickup truck as he was driving home from work. A plant employee for 12 years, he had been promoted to a job previously held by white men.
The Natchez plant has offered a \$25,000 reward for information leading to the arrest of those responsible for the fatal bombing. Armstrong officials offered another \$10,000.
City police and the FBI searched the area for concrete clues but Police Chief J. T. Robinson said that nothing concrete has been found.
Evers charged that the plant had hired members of the Ku Klux Klan and demanded "that they be brought to justice."
Plant officials said they had no knowledge of any Klan membership.
Plant officials issued a statement deploring Jackson's death and saying that a life insurance policy would be paid to his widow.

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—Luci Johnson Nugent will give birth to President Johnson's first grandchild in Austin Tuesday, taking up the top floor of an Austin hospital.
"Austin doctor," who asked that his name not be disclosed, gave the first medical confirmation of Luci's pregnancy Tuesday.
The doctor said the top floor of Holy Cross Hospital will be reserved for Mrs. Nugent and visitors.
The White House and the Patrick J. Nugent, however, maintain a low profile in the prospect of a presidential grandchild.
The Secret Service will guard the special fifth-floor maternity clinic, the doctor said, adding that an agent will be assigned to the baby at birth.
The doctor said the identity of Mrs. Nugent's obstetrician and the date of the expected delivery were both well-guarded secrets.

Poland And Czechs Sign New Treaty

WARSAW, Poland (AP)—Poland and Czechoslovakia signed a new 20-year treaty of friendship and military assistance today directed against West Germany.

It was the first of a group of such treaties expected this month with which—Poland, Czechoslovakia and East Germany are forging a new Communist sub-bloc dedicated to perpetuating the "division of Germany."

The Polish-Czechoslovakian pact declares both nations present frontiers inviolable and said Hitler's 1938 Munich agreement against Czechoslovakia was "null and void" because force and was never valid.

The treaty said the two nations would provide each other "all assistance including military" in the event of an attack by West German "militarist and revisionist forces" or any of their allies.

Chicago Demo Group Keeps Council Hold

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago's regular Democratic organization present frontiers inviolable and said Hitler's 1938 Munich agreement against Czechoslovakia was "null and void" because force and was never valid.

The treaty said the two nations would provide each other "all assistance including military" in the event of an attack by West German "militarist and revisionist forces" or any of their allies.

Chicago's first Republican mayor Richard Daley emerged from an contested primary as a clear favorite to win a fourth term.

Daley, 64, first-elected mayor in 1955, betted his own reelection by more than 20,000 as he picked up 421,278 Democratic primary votes.

His opponent, industrialist John Wanner, 53, who seeks to be Chicago's first Republican mayor in 49 years, picked up 197,000 primary votes against minimal opposition.

Republicans blamed the rugged winter, one of the worst in the city's history, for slowing the campaign against one of the nation's most effective Democratic machines. They promised a fight to the deadline for the April 4 mayoral election.

Two factors—white backlash and militant Negro revolt—failed to produce enough votes to seriously jar the Daley organization out of control of the 33-seat City Council.

Organization Democrats were winners in 38 wards, Republicans in 4 and independent Ron Ruffo elections were forced in 8 wards.

Nearly 40 per cent of the city's 1,177,500 eligible voters went to the polls in sunny, brisk weather.

They approved by a 78-22 vote margin a referendum to increase the school tax rate—a proposal chiefly aimed at increasing teachers' salaries. The new tax rate will be increased 15 cents, from \$1.71 to \$1.86 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

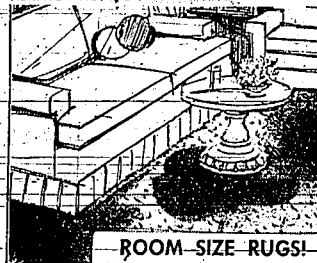

Government Optimistic On Gas Price Cut

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government sees encouraging holes in the formerly solid wall of major oil companies that recently boosted gasoline prices.

Mobil Oil Co. announced Tuesday that it would cut prices off part of the increase it put into effect last month. A similar action was taken Monday by the Continental Oil Co., first to announce a rollback.

Neither company attributed its decision to the campaign of persuasion by the Department of the Interior for a rollback, but a third company implied that this was the underlying reason.

This firm, American Oil Co., said Tuesday it would not yield to government pressure.

The Interior Department has warned the companies that it may adjust import quotas to bring prices and profits from outside the country and thus make high prices hard to maintain.

Mobil said it will cut two-tenths of a cent per gallon from the recently raised price dealers and industrial customers pay, and one-fourth of a cent from the price paid by distributors.

These same reductions were reported Monday by Continental.

The end result of the original increase and the new decrease is that the dealer price will be four-tenths of a cent higher than it was a month ago.

Undersecretary of the Interior Charles Luce looked on the roll-back as "further evidence that the effort to raise gasoline prices costs consumers pay and gas companies' profits."

"These reductions are a step in the right direction," Luce said, "but they still leave both retail prices and profits at levels above previous levels."

Humble Oil and Refining Co. with better than 10 per cent of the market, held back when other companies boosted prices.

'Operation Crossroads' Born After Policeman Slain By Two Young Men

By KENT ZIMMERMAN

CHICAGO (AP) — when a police sergeant was killed by two young men in 1965, an experiment was born to save youngsters at the crossroads of life.

The slaying was especially bitter for the workers at the Better Boys Foundation. The two men who killed the sergeant were among those the foundation was trying to help.

The incident convinced foundation workers they were failing with teenagers. The board of directors decided to try to reach the boys before they entered the streets.

Now there is hope and positive thinking by the small staff of a new program. "Operation Crossroads" is a program designed to provide positive identification through association with counselors and boys known by its residents as "kids." It is predominantly Negro, and a haven for teenage gangs.

"Operation Crossroads" is a term unknown to about 50 boys, 9 to 12 years old, enrolled in the experiment. They simply submitted applications to join the "club program."

"We felt we were failing with the older boys," Eugene Saunders, secretary, explained in an interview. "We had simply gotten the boys too late. The whole ghetto syndrome had corrupted his character."

Eugene Perkins, operation director, said the theory behind the program is that boys between 9 and 12 are at the crossroads in life.

"Kids begin to identify themselves with their friends, and they form positive identifications," Perkins said. The program is designed to provide positive identification through association with counselors and boys known by its residents as "kids." It is predominantly Negro, and a haven for teenage gangs.

Hailey Attorney Speaks On Responsibility At C. of C. Meet

Dead GI Sent Home 48 Hours After Ordeal

SAIGON, Vietnam (NEA)—The young man is a soldier. He was killed during an enemy ambush on a road near a highlands plantation. A bullet went through his steel helmet and into his head. He did not know it nor feel it.

Now he is going home.

A silver-shelled C-130 transport plane flies him from the mountains to the city. He is carried in an airless plastic bag. He is handled respectfully. The trip is brief.

A dusty panel truck meets him at Tan Son Nhut Airbase and two crisp servicemen remove him from the aircraft and lift him gently into the rear of the truck.

Shortly later, the truck swings behind a lengthy, blue-green building finished in layers of wooden plank. It is the largest such facility operating anywhere in the world.

Three men dressed in faded blue tunics open the truck doors and withdraw the soldier. A few words of direction are given and he is carried through a switch of sunlight into the building. Se'veral passersby stop to watch. They are suntanned in-

pressed khaki. They say nothing.

Inside the soldier is removed from his container and placed in a white porcelain table which is one of 17 anchored to the room's concrete floor by means of cylindrical supports.

Nice tables are in use. This is normal traffic. A dozen men move around the room. They are a portion of 106 officers, enlisted men and civilian personnel who staff the building.

North Vietnamese Officer Claims 'Viet Cong Morale At All Time Low'

PHUOC THANH, South Vietnam (AP)—A North Vietnamese lieutenant captured by South forces said today the failure of the lunar new year truce to produce peace negotiations has put Viet Cong morale at an all-time low.

"Night and day the Viet Cong long for peace," said Lt. Truong Hiep, a platoon leader with the 3rd Company, 85th Independent Battalion, a Viet-Cong main-force element. "They had high hopes for negotiation. Now they know they cannot win with our direct help from Russia or Red China," he said.

The lieutenant was interviewed through an interpreter at the wire-enclosed stockade of the Korean Tiger Division here in the central-highlands 290 miles northeast of Saigon. A Korean private captured him this week with a karate blow. The lieutenant was attempting to fire his German Walther pistol at a Korean patrol that surprised him as he was returning to duty from a Viet Cong hideout hidden in the mountains.

A North Vietnamese regular and was taken to a Viet Cong dispensary deep in the mountains. The hospital once had consisted of four buildings, but because of air strikes had been reduced to a single hut staffed by one doctor, two medics and a nurse.

"The Viet Cong are more afraid of the B52 raids than anything," said Truong, who had been only a third of a mile from a "muck strike" by the huge bombers. "Only those big bombs can collapse our tinny structures. Also, they are afraid of the F105 Thunderbolts, which are just powerful—but very, very accurate."

The lieutenant said as a cadre officer he had been told to indoctrinate his troops with the idea that a truce would soon come about with a coalition government of Viet Cong and South Vietnamese representatives ruling the country, following the immediate withdrawal of all American and other foreign troops.

Truong's special job was guarding provincial officials of the Viet Cong shadow government operating in the tactical area, being swept by Viet Cong troops. He was badly scalded in January while trying to boil water in an ammunition box.

Hints Listed For Painting Enthusiasts

SHOSHONE—“Come spring, there is nothing more enticing than a new paint brush and a can of color paint,” states Mrs. Mary-Lou Ruby, extension agent for Lincoln, Blaine and Camas Counties.

Mrs. Ruby explains that most homeowners can't wait to get at that outdoor furniture, that symmetrical picture summer ahead. “But don't dip a single brush into a single can of paint before scrubbing that surface,” she instructs.

“Just dusting furniture isn't enough to remove surface grime and dirt. Each piece should be washed with soap or detergent suds in order to assure a really good paint job and one that will last.”

The easiest place to do the scrubbing is outdoors, using a ball of hot suds and the garden hose. “Be sure to allow time for the furniture to thoroughly dry before starting to apply the bright new coat of paint.”

The paint brush can be put into a plastic bag overnight to stay soft for the next day's use. But once the painting is completed, the brush needs more permanent care.

After using thinner or turpentine to remove the paint from the bristles, wash the brush with soap and rinse it well. Hang the 100-day-dry or the bristles won't get out of shape. Finish by wrapping it in plastic or aluminum foil to keep clean.

Nation's Debt Kept Within Legal Limit

By JOSEPH R. COYNE
WASHINGTON (AP) — For the third time since 1950, Secretary of the Treasury Department has juggled the books to keep the national debt from exceeding the legal limit. The end of touch-and-go debt management appears in sight.

Congress planned to complete action today on the Treasury request to raise the debt ceiling from \$330 billion to \$339 billion, giving the department some breathing space it hasn't enjoyed for three months.

On Jan. 18, the department came within \$7.92 million of the ceiling, the closest ever. It used unusual techniques — Republicans have a list of them — gimmicks to stay within the law.

The debt would have shot through the \$330 billion ceiling Tuesday had it not been for the latest juggle. As it was officials estimated the debt rose to \$329.2 billion as of the end of business Tuesday.

Exact figures won't be available until Friday.

Since Dec. 3, the debt has fallen below \$329 billion only once — on Jan. 26 when it was \$328.67 billion.

The department normally ticks about \$2 billion in handling the debt.

Unemployment Battle In Watts Reported Gratifying

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Massive efforts to combat unemployment among Negroes in the Watts area since the 1965 riots have surprised and gratified the campaign's task forces, although much remains to be done.

A fresh report Tuesday reflected this conclusion: It said results indicated a "significant" improvement in employment opportunities for both workers and employers.

But additional prejob training for minority groups still is a major need, H.C. (Chad) McClellan, head of the Management Council for Merit Employment, said in releasing the findings of the new survey.

The council's study was conducted by the Research Institute for Business Economic Investigation, an arm of the University of Southern California's Claret School of Business Administration.

It was directed by Dr. William H. Reynolds, professor of marketing, whose researchers interviewed 100 workers and 59 firms which employed them after the disturbances.

Reynolds said they learned that one-third of the employers said they would hire more Negroes than in the past. All will hire as many as they already have.

Two-thirds of the Negroes placed in jobs between September 1965 and April, 1966, still held them. All said three jobs were better than they had before.

One-third of the one-third who left these jobs did so for better offers. The majority have had promotions and raises. In one case, a discrimination suit by those who quit.

Employers generally agreed that Negroes are much like all others in job performance. Expected problems with supervisors and fellow employees failed to materialize.

The new survey said "lack of education and low unemployment factor holding back Negro employment."

McClellan said "there are more skill centers in disadvantaged Los Angeles areas, all operating at capacity, yet in education, many Negroes can't get in. They're on waiting lists."

Shortly after the riots, the council, now representing 2,000 employers, estimated Watts had 25,000 jobs. A few weeks ago McClellan said jobs had been found for 17,839 there.

"I should be there today," said Ferry, who was in Lansing to announce last November in an effort to upset the governor's successful bid for a third term.

"Michigan's school system is teetering on the edge," said Ferry, who said Romney's tax proposals and budget are doing nothing to keep it from going into the red.

"Educators are told they must support his program. But if they support it they get nothing. If they don't, they are threatened with a 15 per cent cut."

Ferry said he saw the hope of Democrats in the legislature cooperating with the Romney administration.

The education group carried petitions, signed by some 200,000 people asking for an increase in school budget funds. After a late morning meeting, they were headed toward the capitol building to meet with Romney and representatives, and demand additional school funds.

Patrols Guarding Bases In Vietnam May Be Increased

By JOHN T. WHEELER—SAIGON (AP)—Defensive patrols guarding allied bases in Vietnam may have to be increased greatly to counter the big Soviet rockets the Communists used in the attack Monday in striking the Namang airbase at Da Nang, a U.S. military source said today.

The 140mm rockets used in the previous attack were fired from positions six miles to the south of the base. Some U.S. Marine posts extend that far from the base, but there are no conventional front-line units along the area at that distance. The 51 rockets which landed on the base and the adjoining village of Ap Do killed 12 Marines and 35 Vietnamese civilians, wounded 23 Americans

and 70 Vietnamese, slightly damaged 11 planes and hit several military buildings, including barracks, the post exchange and officers club.

Until now, plans for defense of the first-line bases have been mostly to stopping slim mortar attacks with a range of about 2,000 miles and guarding against suicide squads carrying satchel charges which attempt to breach the bases' perimeter.

These have been instances when 420mm mortars, with a range of just over three miles, were used to attack the bases. U.S. military sources said the 140mm rockets have a longer range and pack more explosive power than any mortar used by the Communists to date in periodic shellings of permanent allied

installations. They are also much lighter and easier to fire than mortars, making them harder to sneak into position for an attack.

While mortars weigh several hundred pounds, the rocket tubes can be carried with ease by a single man. Setting up mortar positions is time consuming, making the possibility of detection higher. The rockets, mounted on wooden frames, are touched off in groups by an electrical charge.

The 81mm mortar, most common of the Viet Cong's attack weapons, has an explosive warhead weighing nine pounds. The rocket warhead carries 28 pounds of explosive.

Drawbacks to the rockets are their long fire tails and lack of accuracy compared to mortars. The fiery tails of the rockets Monday allowed aircraft and gunship helicopters to spot and take the communist positions south of Da Nang.

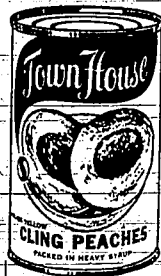

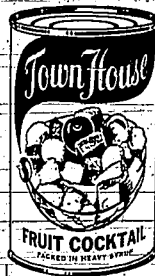

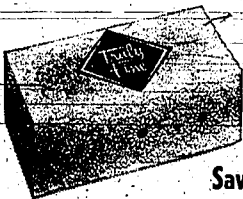

Jim: "A good play but a standard one for handling the ace-king-ten of trump."

Oswald: "South won the diamond opening and led his device of spades. West played the ten and South played the six from dummy. East took his king—he had to, and all South had to do to make his contract was to lead a second spade toward dummy's queen later."

Jim: "This is the sort of play
