Johnson To Ask Drafting Of Younger Men Under New Lottery-Type System

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson told Congress today he will order younger men drafted first under a lottery-type system as part of an overhaul of Selective Service. His announcement of actions to come within two years—mostly without need of congressional approval—follows months of study and controversy over the national draft system.

The President said deferments for fathers, men with essential occupations and graduate students will be ended. But in a special draft message sent from the Texas White House, he postponed indefinitely a position on whether to end undergraduate student deferments. Family hardship deferments will be continued for a time.

He asked Congress to extend for four years the draft law expiring June 30.

He made it clear that some features of the revised draft system he has in mind would be adopted for months—perhaps not until 1969.

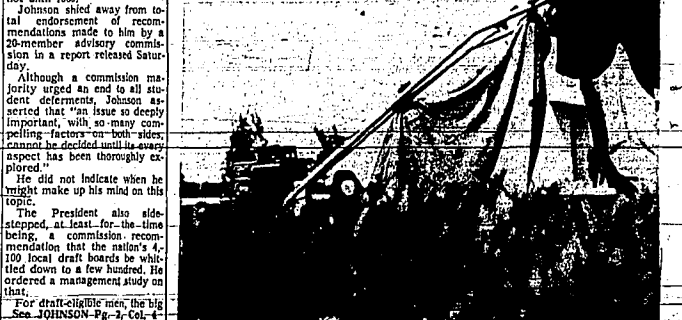
Johnson shied away from endorsing the system of recommendations made to him by a 20-member advisory commission in a report released Saturday.

Although a commission majority urged an end to all student deferments, Johnson asserted that "an issue so deeply important, with so many complex and conflicting sides, cannot be decided until its full aspect has been thoroughly explored."

He did not indicate when he might make up his mind on this topic.

The President also sidestepped, at least for the time being, a commission recommendation that the nation's 4,100 local draft boards be whittled down to a few hundred. He ordered a management study on the subject.

U. S. Bombs Petroleum Installation

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. planes bombed a petroleum installation 12 to 14 miles south of Hanoi on Sunday. The object was to weaken North Vietnam's chief fuel source.

A U.S. spokesman reported a high-altitude bombing in the raid on the Do Son depot, the highest of a day of air attacks against the North, hampered by worsening weather.

In South Vietnam, a Viet Cong mine exploded under a bus 40 miles northwest of Saigon, killing 37 civilians and wounding 15, and the U.S. Command announced that 24 Americans were killed in the past 48 hours. Six U.S. Army and Marine helicopters were reported downed by enemy fire.

A total of 48 enemy dead was reported by U.S. forces.

Appeals Court Denies Hoffa's Plea To Remain Free On Bond

WASHINGTON (AP)—The U.S. Court of Appeals denied today the plea of Teamsters Union President James R. Hoffa to remain free on bond instead of surrendering a two-year prison sentence for jury tampering. Hoffa's attorneys were expected to go immediately to the Supreme Court with their request for a habeas corpus order to permit Hoffa to remain free pending motions for a new trial.

U Thant Tells Conditions Set By Hanoi

NEW YORK (AP) — U.N. Secretary-General U Thant says that Hanoi is prepared to withdraw its support from the Viet Cong if the United States will draw its support from the Saigon government.

U Thant is scheduled to surrender to the U.S. marshal's office here Tuesday morning unless he can win a stay from the Supreme Court.

McGuire's denial paved the way for Hoffa's hearing before the appellate court.

While fighting to stay out of prison, Hoffa, 54, has made arrangements to keep his grip on the Teamsters as secure as possible if he goes behind bars.

Two Airliner Crashes Claim 94 Lives Sunday In Ohio, Liberia

KENTON, Ohio (AP)—Investigators digging through snow and ankle-deep mud today found two recorders carried by the Lake Central airliner that exploded from a stormy sky Sunday night, killing all 38 aboard. Federal investigators said both the cockpit voice recorder and the flight recorder were found in the wreckage of the airline's first fatal crash. The voice recorder was expected to yield a tape of the crew's last half-hour conversation. The other type was to record altitude, heading, speed and other information throughout the flight.

Wreckage from the Convair turboprop plane scattered over farm fields near Marcellus, a town of 170 residents in northwest Ohio.

About 150 law officers and volunteers joined in the search for bodies most of which were found in a bean field where the main part of the fuselage fell.

The bodies were hauled in tractor-pulled farm wagons to a temporary morgue in an unincorporated elementary school.

Investigators team up with the airline's headquarters in Indianapolis and the Civil Aeronautics Board moved in to probe for the cause of the first major domestic air tragedy since a crash near Portland, Ore., took 18 lives last October.

Five minutes earlier the pilot, Capt. John Horn, had radioed he was climbing from 8,000 to 10,000 feet, apparently to avoid storms which swirled alert and snow over this area.

"Horn said the Lake Central plane since the line's first flight Nov. 12, 1949, gave no indication of trouble, but residents told of more reports.

"It sounded like an awful combustion and we thought there had been an automobile accident," said Irene Heckathorn.

"There was no fire, no light on the plane, I even heard the engines after the first explosion. We still heard the engines after the second explosion," said Robert, found a small girl's body in his yard.

Budgets Discussed By Legislature

BOISE (AP)—The executive and legislative branches of Idaho's government conferred on budgets today as the Idaho Legislature began its fourth overtime day of the 1967 session. Republican leaders from both House and Senate met with Gov. Don W. Samuelson and are scheduled to meet again Tuesday on the budget. House Speaker Pete T. Conrarsu, R-Carey, said the talks were "fruitful," but said no conclusions had been reached. He said the governor did not indicate whether he would veto bills appropriating more than \$2 million more than he recommended for Idaho's two universities. Samuelson has said he would veto appropriations substantially above his figures.

Conrarsu said the conflict between the legislature—which wants to fund the state budget figure of from \$155 to \$157 million—and the governor.

Noted Singer, Nelson Eddy, Dies At 65

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Nelson Eddy, the world's best-selling singer in the 1940s, died today, he was 65.

Eddy, who collapsed Sunday night while singing to a group of persons at a restaurant, died at 8 a.m. He had been reported in fairly good condition earlier in the day.

Mount Sinai Hospital said Eddy had suffered a mild stroke.

Eddy, who teamed with the late Jeanette MacDonald, for eight popular musical comedy movies in the late 1930s and early 1940s, was playing at the Sands Stock Hotel when he was stricken.

Love For Old Farmhouse Is Proven

NEW YORK (AP) — Mr. and Mrs. Sven Bernhard love their 18th-century farmhouse, and Sunday they proved it. They had the house moved from its original location five miles past Manhattan's towers to the tune of \$1,300.

The couple had been living in the house at York Avenue and 71st Street, since 1910, but did not own the house. The site must be cleared for a new home for the aged.

Churchgoers and apartment dwellers gaped and stared as the home atop a giant steel dolly hauled by a flatbed truck rumbled through the city streets Sunday en route to a vacant lot between Swedens Street in Greenwich Village.

The Bernhards, commenting on the \$500 cost to move the home, said, "We liked this house, we wanted to keep it."

The Swedish-born Mrs. Bernhard said the moving began about 8:30 a.m. clipped her hands and cried "I'm saved."

Bernhard works for a Swedish travel agency, while his wife is a department-store buyer. They currently are living in an apartment.

The couple's architect said the Bernhards had to get the permission of about 10 city agencies. Approval came after Manhattan Borough President Percy Sutton wrote Mayor John V. Lindsay about the Bernhards' effort to save the "unique and historically valuable building."

After the house was at the new site, Sutton told the couple, who had followed their home by car during the 2-hour journey: "I tried to catch you on the route. I asked three policemen if they saw the moving house and the last one said to me, 'If I didn't know you, Mr. Sutton, I'd think you were batty.'"

Struggle Foreseen In Union If Hoffa Goes To Prison

WASHINGTON (AP) — When and if James R. Hoffa is locked away in prison, there surely will be a struggle over the powers he wielded through the Teamsters Union.

Employers would like to see some of that power clipped away.

There are labor men outside the union who believe Hoffa's imprisonment could present opportunities for a new kind of union-in-the-labor world.

And there is always the possibility of factional struggles within the union.

Hoffa, although turning the reins of the union over to General Vice President Frank Fitzsimmons, intends to fight on from behind bars while keeping the title and \$100,000-a-year salary of Teamsters president.

"We're not going to put in another president until all Hoffa's appeals are exhausted," a Teamsters spokesman said.

Hoffa, 54, is under court order to surrender Tuesday to begin serving his eight-year term on a busy tampering conviction while his lawyers continue their last-ditch series of appeals.

The AFL-CIO, which kicked out the Teamsters on corruption charges 10 years ago, and the many industries that deal with the union are watching closely for signs of disintegration in the house that Hoffa built.

Many in the AFL-CIO would like to pick up the added strength of the 1.3-million-member Teamsters Union, especially in view of the threatened accession of Walter P. Reuther's I. U. of Auto Workers.

Some major employers would like to break up the concentration of power Hoffa gathered through a series of nationwide contracts.

However, sources inside the Teamsters see no drastic move against the 58-year-old Fitzsimmons, Hoffa's longtime Detroit ally and hand-picked successor.

And "it's too early" to talk about replacing the AFL-CIO, one Teamsters source said.

Some AFL-CIO sources predict a palace revolt against the Hoffa carefully laid in hopes of retaining power.

But even those in the union who want Hoffa replaced permanently see no sudden, dramatic move to oust Hoffa and Fitzsimmons.

A Hoffa-dominated Teamsters' convention last July wrote the union's constitution so neither Hoffa nor Fitzsimmons could be forced to resign.

Other Teamsters vice presidents reportedly will wait to see how Fitzsimmons runs the union. If Fitzsimmons should measure up, the worst that probably might happen immediately would be a gradual drifting back to the pre-Hoffa days of decentralized power centers in the union's Eastern, Western, Central States and Southern conferences.

The AFL-CIO, too, will wait to see how the new Teamsters leadership shakes out before inviting the union back, informed sources said.

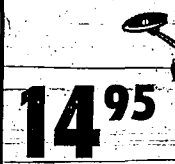

Republicans Attack War On 3 Sides

WASHINGTON (AP) — Three potential Republican presidential candidates have come down on three sides of the Vietnam war.

Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon said Sunday as he departed for Europe that a bombing of North Vietnam — or even talking about it — would prolong the war.

Sen. Charles H. Percy, R-Ill., however, said "I think we can take any calculated risk in order to try to bring the enemy to the conference table and negotiate an honorable settlement."

Michigan Gov. George Romney said he is going to have to determine whether the outside aggression or civil war sparked the conflict before he can pass on the moral right of the United States to fight in Vietnam.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield called for a general cease-fire and peace negotiations applying to "all areas and all participants."

There was other congressional comment, but it too brought no marked changes in the lineup of opinion on what the Johnson administration should do about the war.

In other related developments:

125 diplomats reported a sharp cutback in visits by North Communist ships to North Vietnam in recent months.

United Nations Secretary-General U Thant returned to New York after talks with North Vietnamese representatives and said the war "is going to be prolonged and bloody."

U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations Arthur J. Goldberg, speaking at a news conference in the Philippines, accused North Vietnam of refusing to accept the principle that nations should be left alone to settle their problems.

U.S. State Department spokesman Robert F. Kennedy's proposal of Thursday that the United States halt the bombing and press for immediate negotiations. The Johnson administration repudiated Kennedy's plan.

WASHINGTON (AP) — It agreed to discuss 'holding the might have been just a presidential coincidence, but the timing was too good to ignore.

Later in the day a newsman told Johnson's press secretary, George Christian, "some supporters" wondered if Johnson had not called the news conference and made the war statement to take the play away from Kennedy.

'Generation Gap'

"Youth is disintegrating. The young people of the land have disrespect for their elders and contempt for authority in every form. Vandalism, rifle- and crime in all kinds rampant" among youth. The nation is in peril."

These alarming words were not taken from the report of the President's Commission on Crime, although they might well have been. They were recorded by an Egyptian priest about 200 B.C.

Socrates, 1700 years later, is also said to have lamented that youths no longer obeyed their parents or respected their teachers. Similar complaints have been expressed in every period of human history in the 2,300 years between Socrates and the present—in every generation.

So far, obviously, all such pessimistic pronouncements about the imminent collapse of civilization have proved to be exaggerated. Nations and empires have risen and fallen, to be sure, and whole societies have disappeared down the corridors of time. But mankind itself is still around, and the virtues and ideals which the Egyptian priest and the Athenian philosopher feared would not outlast them are still very much in operation.

The "generation gap" about which we hear so much lately is nothing new. Parents have always regarded their children with as much suspicion as pride, forgetting that their own parents were equally dubious about transferring the safekeeping of society and the nation into their hands. Today's young are no longer in revolt in their turn but tomorrow's rigid guardians of the status quo.

This is not to say that the problems of our own time are not unique and very real and that we should adopt a Pollyannaish attitude that morals will take care of themselves.

The paradox of young subjects, after all, did not have motorcycles or zippers; Socrates' students were not tempted by LSD or marijuana. Social and cultural changes brought about by technology seem to be accelerating at a pace that leaves most of us unable to keep up. Comprehensive, accepted morality is being challenged by youth as never before in the nation's history.

What the "generation gap" really tells us, however, is not that the younger generation is about to abolish everything that the older generation has built up as necessary and good. It is questioning, testing, searching, attempting to arrive at a set of values it can call its own.

What it eventually finds will not be so different from what it is seemingly rejecting as many people fear. It is when the younger generation finds that the old is "new morality" and passively accepts its inheritance of the old that we will have reason to worry.

TRIGGER FOR WORLD WAR III?

The United States has pledged to stop shipments of military equipment to the present modest arms sales to Morocco for purely defense purposes," explains the State Department.

The justification given is that large-scale weapons deliveries to Algeria from the Soviet Union now give Morocco a North African neighbor a three-to-one arms advantage.

May a stranger be excused for asking what business either of us has to sell, lend or give weapons to either country? We were not aware that sandy Morocco posed a threat to sandy Algeria, or vice versa, or that either one had a lot of money to spare for war toys.

It is not clear to us what strategic advantage the U.S.S.R. sees in arming Algeria, beyond the limited propaganda value attached to aiding a fellow socialist government. There can't be any more rubles in it.

Do we understand how our determination to maintain a one-to-one armament parity between Morocco and Algeria contributes to the stability of that part of the world?

The Soviet Union has indicated that it is interested in signing a treaty banning the spread of nuclear weapons to the new nations in the Kremlin as are genuinely pragmatic as they seem to be, it might be a very good idea—if and when we sit down with them to discuss the dangers of nuclear proliferation. — to talk about the only slightly less urgent need to stop the spread of conventional weapons as well.

That does not only for Algeria and Morocco but the whole of the Middle East, where a group of hothead midget powers who have been armed to the teeth by us and the Russians almost daily threaten to stage a simultaneous prelude to World War III.

THE PEOPLE SPEAK — "They voted with their consciences," said Rep. Henry Collins of New York. Clark has never been more right. This latest proof of what does not cause a cold is finding in a "new study, reported in the medical news section of the Journal of the American Medical Association." Chilling under normally encountered conditions, said the report, has no effect on the common cold.

This steadily growing fund of knowledge on what does not cause the cold is more valuable than the limited information that does cause it. It is the nature of scientific research to eliminate, first, all the apparent causes, then to seek out the actual cause. Thus, in this case, one by one the causes that were commonly held by the way, leaving us only with the doctor's admission to "get plenty of rest, and drink lots of liquids."

The encouragement to conduct scientific research should not decline, even when it produces apparent negative results. The only point at which we will take issue with these researchers is when and if they "discover" that the hot toddy has no medicinal value. — Lewis (Idaho) Tribune

U.S. Infantry Buildup Near Completion

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has just about completed its buildup of infantry-type forces in South Vietnam, military officials said today.

They said these forces should be sufficient to neutralize Communist main force units.

Further increases in U.S. arms strength in Vietnam will be concentrated in support and combat support elements, they said.

These will include more artillery to back up the more helicopter companies, more ground transportation units, more supply handling units and a wide variety of outpost detachments.

The helicopter fleet, key to U.S. military mobility, will strike far and wide, will go from the present level of about 2,000 choppers to perhaps 4,000.

The pace of the overall U.S. buildup has slowed as the leveling process sets in.

About 11,000 replacement men landed in South Vietnam last month, compared with 15,000 in January and 27,000 in December.

Total strength Feb. 25 was 415,000. The planned buildup due to Feb. 25 is about 470,000 by the end of this year.

These projections hinge on the expectation that there will be no dramatic changes in the character of the war, officials said.

They also hope that the South Vietnamese armed forces will start shouldering their full load of local Viet Cong guerrillas and guerrillas, they added.

A senior military officer said he is going to lead the "search and destroy" campaign against main force North Viet names and Viet Cong elements.

At the next level, coping with local Viet Cong platoons and companies, he said, "is just going over the top of the hill."

"But in the battle against the guerrillas, this general said, "we are not doing very well."

"During the past year and a half, my family and I have made substantial transfers of property and money to Utah Savings and Loan in our effort to build and strengthen the company during a period of nationwide stress for financial institutions."

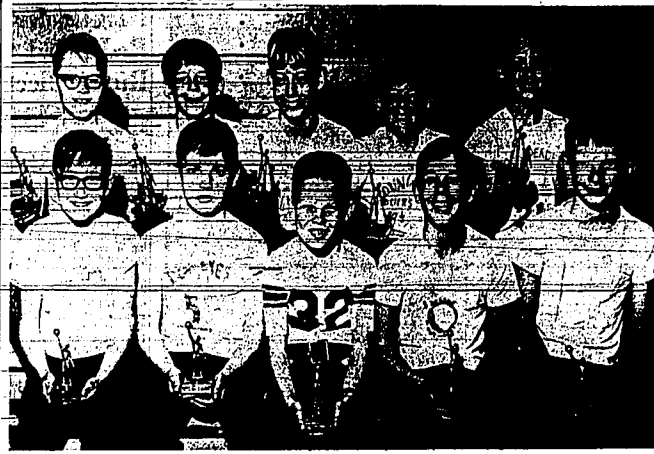

Farm Product Flow Drops In Irish Strike

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP)—The flow of cattle and fresh vegetables to Irish markets dropped abruptly today as farmers began a one-week strike to protest government farm policies and the jailing of farmers who oppose them.

Milk was the only major commodity not affected, but butchers said they had a backlog of meat. There also was no shortage of potatoes and other less perishable vegetables.

Sean Healey, general secretary of the 120,000-member National Farmers Association, said the farmers planned "intimidation of any kind" and did not intend that consumers should suffer in any way.

Wholesale food centers were picketed.

The government wants to reorganize the farms into larger production units. The strikers want bigger subsidies for small farmers. They are also protesting the jailing of nearly 100 farmers who refused to pay fines for blocking traffic during a demonstration in January.

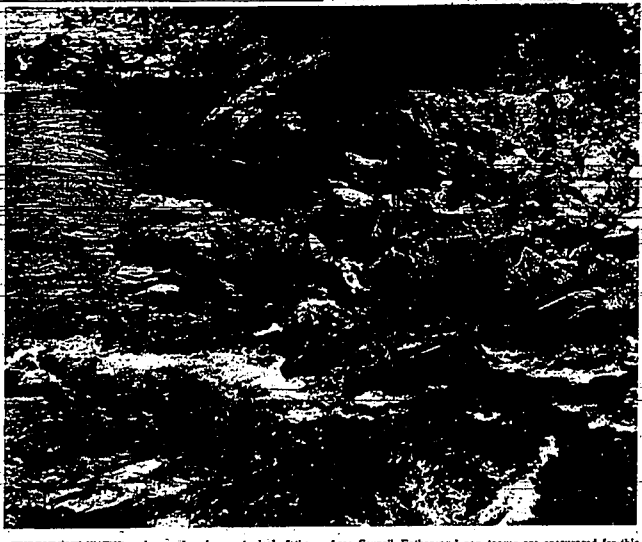

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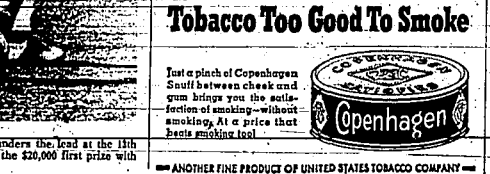

Mantle's first day at his new job attracted more newsmen and camera crews than Roger Maris did the spring after he hit the home runs. The photographers followed Mantle like it was the opening day of the World Series in the old days when the Yanks used to be in the Series.

"I felt everybody was waiting for me to miss one and go home," said Mantle. "I wanted to be the first to hit a homer but there were all those photographers behind me and I was afraid the ball would hit one of them."

The reason for all the excitement was the decision, announced in late January, to switch the 35-year-old Nick from the outfield to first base. Joe Peplone, the incumbent first baseman, will shift to Mantle's old job in center field until the final returns are in on the experiment.

During the first trial run, Mickey waved Peplone in from the outfield.

"What's the matter with you, you're kidding," said Peplone. "All I wanted was for you to ask 'I didn't want to come running in on my own.'"

The reason for the big move were favorable. The infielders did their best to throw strikes to first base. Frank Crosett, the coach who hits ground balls to the infielders, bounced easy rollers toward first base. Mantle never missed, although one did run up his wrist before he grabbed it.
