Senate Unanimously Okays Bill To Set Up 5 Airport Districts

BOISE (Special)—Idaho's Senate voted unanimously approval of a bill that will set up five airport districts in the state and which outlines the procedure for establishing regional airports. The vote was 28-0.

Sen. Richard High, R-Twin Falls, author of the bill, noted that an amendment placing the five Panhandle airports in one district by themselves apparently cleared away all opposition to it in the Senate.

The bill, Senate Bill No. 166, provides for region-wide voter approval of the airport districts. Elections to set up the districts would be initiated by petition from voting precincts in the district.

The bill now goes to the House, where it will be referred to the Transportation and Development Committee. Sen. High said he believes the bill, as amended, will meet too much opposition in the committee, and he expects it will be sent to the floor for consideration without too much delay.

Time is important in consideration of the bill at this point. The Legislature already is in an over-time session and could adjourn at any time.

Sen. High said, however, that since the Legislature is tied up on a number of other matters he believes there will be plenty of time for the bill to be acted on by the House.

Questioned about how long he expects the Legislature to remain in session, Sen. High said, "Two weeks ago they said we'd be here two more weeks. A week ago they said we'd be here two more weeks. Now they say we'll be here two more weeks. You can't say for sure."

But they declined to use specific figures to indicate when the Legislature would adjourn. See AIRPORT Page 2, Col. 5

Iowa Student Body Leader Asks Startling Changes

AMES, Iowa (AP) — Donald R. Smith, a bearded exponent of expanded campus freedom, takes office Wednesday as student body president at Iowa State University — until now a fairly placid and conventional sort of place.

A 21-year-old mechanical engineering major, Smith, who once thought highly of Barry Goldwater's politics, was elected on a platform pledged to quasi regulations on student activities outside the classroom.

He also called for cheaper textbooks and lower room rentals.

The conservative element has been alarmed both by Smith's beard — a comparative rarity among the academic young of the tall corn country — and his stated aims.

Smith, cribbing a quote from the late Adlai E. Stevenson, said he just wanted to drag JSC "kicking and screaming into the 20th century."

"With the students behind me, we can get things changed," he said.

"I cannot see how locking a woman in her room at 10:30 every night is supposed to make her better able to handle social situations. Our present practice is just a matter of stalling off maturity for four years.

"I believe we should be allowed to grow up. So what if we do make a few mistakes?"

Smith said his liberal outlook is of recent vintage.

"In 1964 I would have voted for Goldwater had I been old enough. At that time I felt the conservatives did most to further the cause of personal freedom," he said.

"Later I saw the light. When conservatives talk about personal freedoms they really mean their own, not mine."

Now, Smith said, he would go to jail rather than serve with the armed forces in Vietnam.

Smith's father runs a rural cooperative in Rockwell City.

Asked what his parents thought of his views, he replied: "They're still sending money."

Need For Business Women Is Stressed By Sen. Brooks

State Sen. Mary Brooks, R-Blaine, stressed the need for more business women in politics.

"I am a woman whose children have been reared has more time and often more ability to serve in politics and can benefit the government and her constituents."

Speaking of the current legislative session, Sen. Brooks said there are two factors working against each other.

"We conservative legislators feel the people need a tax relief which the more liberal legislators seem only to want to spend more money," she said.

She added a prediction that a tax relief measure will be passed by the senate within the coming week.

"While it may not be a perfect bill it will be the best we can do at this time," Mrs. Brooks said.

"It is necessary to be amended in the next session. As of this time the entire tax structure in Idaho is clouded by the Supreme Court ruling on equalization, utilities and the 20-20-40 bill which was passed in the previous session."

Mrs. Brooks said the legislators as a whole are working hard for the taxpayers of Idaho and attempting to provide some relief and outlined the proposed inventory tax revision to cut 25 per cent per year from this tax for the next four years until it is eliminated.

Helen Porterfield, Twin Falls BPW president, introduced the program committee including Mrs. Greta Smith, Mrs. Elizabeth Peavey and Mrs. Pearle Aldrich. Also attending was Mrs. Doris Gritsmann, Burley, district director, who outlined the aims of the district program for this year.

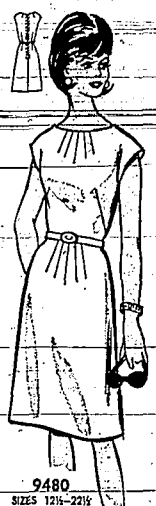

NEW YORK (AP)—A sloppy stock market firm-ed average late this afternoon to show a slight rise, both on average and statistically.

As the market encountered a similar without any stimulation from news, increased trading and investment demand kept back to give it a bit of a plus. The Dow Jones industrial average, which had been lower, emerged to the upside. Gainers exceeded losers by an appreciable ratio.

Analysis still looked upon it as a consolidation process. Gains a point or better were made by Goodrich, Raychem, High Voltage Engineering, Kellogg, United Air Lines, U.S. Gypsum and Merck. Benguet paid the list on volume and gained a fraction, U.S. steel also was active and up a fraction.

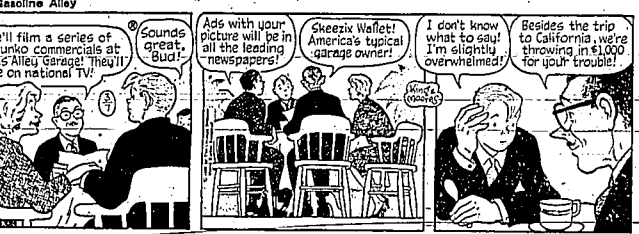

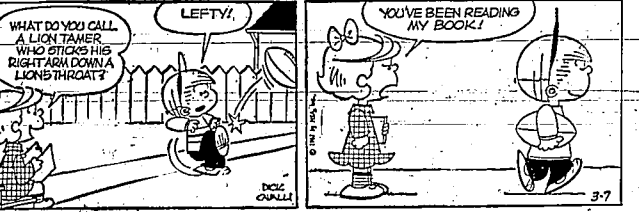

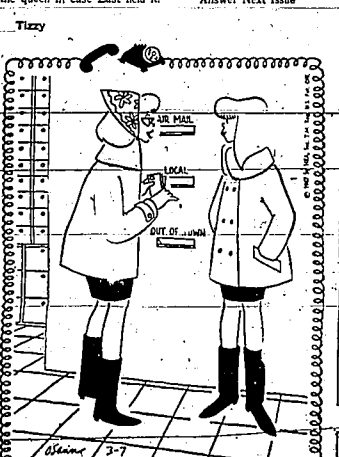

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Pope Changes Rules For Church Music



VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul VI changed the rules for Roman Catholic church music today, opening the way to use of beat rhythms and jazz for sacred services.

The new regulations, issued to implement parts of the Vatican Council's 1962 decree on liturgy (public worship), are expected to revolutionize the music of a 2,000-year-old church. They go into effect on Pentecost Sunday, May 14.

The papal document calls for more singing in services, permits translation of Latin hymns into modern languages, recommends the use of instruments native to individual countries and cultures, and authorizes a period of wide experimentation to adapt modern musical forms and compositions to church use.

Best music and jazz were mentioned specifically. But there was no prohibition against them, and the document said new musical modes should be "held in honor, encouraged and used as the occasion demands."
