Dodd Asks Treaty Be Held Up

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., called on the Senate today to withhold ratification of the U.S.-Soviet consular treaty unless Moscow cooperates in ending the Vietnam war. Dodd, who voted against the treaty when the Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved it last fall, said there was any less in the card war.

Using the same line, Sen. Carl E. Mundt, R-S.D., said he would seek a reservation which would keep the treaty from taking effect until President Johnson assured Congress that Soviet weapons were not prolonging the war in Vietnam. He also proposed other conditions.

Present prospects are that the Senate will ratify the treaty, but opposition from Dodd, Mundt and other senators appeared likely to delay action until next week.

Sen. W. Fulbright, D-Ark., opening debate on the treaty Tuesday, said it offered "mutual noncommittal relations with the Russians rather than 'mutual annihilation.'"

In advance of Dodd's Senate speech, Mundt announced he plans after a conference of Republican senators.

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Founding Of Unit To Check On State Departments OK'd

BOISE (AP) — Establishment of a legislative committee to check on spending by state departments and agencies was approved today in the Idaho Senate.

Backers said such an agency could provide accurate information to which the lawmakers could base their decisions.

Lack of such information was cited by Sen. James Neal, R-Boise, chairman of the Senate Education Committee. In asking that the public school appropriation bill be taken from the Senate calendar and sent to his committee.

The Senate agreed, and the measure, which had been up for final consideration during the day — the sixth overtime day of the 1967 session — was sidetracked.

Burns said it would be held until the legislative session next year.

A number of legislators have been critical of the information on public school spending. Widely varying figures have been furnished on the amount of money per student, but it now available to the school districts.

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Hoffa Will Be Just Another Jail Inmate

LEWISBURG, Pa. (AP) — James Hoffa will be just another inmate behind the walls of the federal prison at Lewisburg, Pa., according to Warden Jacob J. Barker.

Wearing a two-piece blue denim suit and black low-cut shoes, Hoffa started his first full day in the federal penitentiary today.

Parker said he had no plans to meet with Hoffa for the first few days and that, like the 1,700 other inmates, Hoffa will work to earn his spending money. He will probably be going through an indoctrination of sorts.

Parker said Hoffa's first stop was the supply room, where he turned in his business suit for a two-piece blue denim suit. Hoffa, Parker added, that the uniforms would later be "tailored to meet his needs."

Hoffa will be in the penitentiary for seven days in prison, Parker said, and to be spent as a member of an "inmate unit" undergoing physical examination and a series of interviews with the chaplain, education and vocational specialists and a case worker.

During this period he will be given a temporary work assignment, probably some kind of service-type work.

Flooding Continues As Record Cold Chills U.S. Midsection

Record cold chilled the nation's midsection today.

The mass of Arctic air headed toward the East on the heels of a 4 inches of rain and 20 inches of snow.

Flooding, continued in Pennsylvania, Ohio, Kentucky.

Low temperature marks were shattered along the cold front from Upper Michigan to northwestern Texas.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., recorded its lowest reading for so late in the winter, 21 below zero.

Low temperatures were posted in St. Joseph, Mo., 16; Topeka, Kan., with 4; Tulsa, Okla., 6 above; Amarillo, Tex., 9 above; Oklahoma City 9 above.

Thermometers registered 25 in Hibbing, Minn., -8 in Green Bay, Wis., and -7 in Minneapolis.

The natural draft from much of the flood zone, the Ohio River, was expected to reach 7 feet above flood stage by Saturday in the Cincinnati-northern Kentucky area.

There were nine inches of snow on the ground when Gov. Edward T. Breathitt visited Providence, Ky., Tuesday, but the people still wanted to know what the state was going to do about salt marsh mosquitoes, the cause of a long standing complaint in western Kentucky.

Some snowplow operators in Maine found themselves unpopular because they plowed in the snow.

Knights of Portland, Maine, said one man threw a hammer at the driver of his plow after it dumped a pile of snow in the man's driveway.

Edward J. Scarborough said another plow operator in Maine charged his plow with a shovel and started beating the blade of the plow.

In Massachusetts Robert E. Carlson, 29, an employee of the Port Authority, was drowned when he fell into the water-bulging unit of a snow melting machine at Logan Airport.

Temperatures near the zero mark around dawn in northern New York Tuesday's snow up to 15 inches in Catskills.

Harmful

MONTECAL, Germany (AP) — Beating a child on the seat of his pants can lead to later brain damage, a West German doctor says.

Dr. Felicitas Hammer, in a study on the effects of corporal punishment, said thrashings on the backside can dislodge tiny fatty particles which may subsequently cause blood to clot in the brain.

Children may then suffer from headaches, dizziness, forgetfulness and loss of concentration, she said.

Dr. Hammer was a rebel against all forms of corporal punishment. Dealing with a stick can cause a fatal shock, she said.

3 Proposals Eyed For Highway Funds

Three proposals are being considered by the House Revenue and Taxation Committee to provide money to match \$14 million in federal funds for the State Highway Department, Rep. William Lanting, R-Twin Falls, reported to the Legislative Luncheon here Tuesday.

Rep. Lanting said there is a proposal for a one-cent increase in the state gasoline tax, one to appropriate some of the general fund surplus for highway purposes and one to transfer a part of the sales tax collected on autos to the highway fund.

The gasoline tax increase would add \$5 million, Rep. Lanting declared. "Of this, \$3.5 million would go to the state, just the amount needed to match the \$14 million in federal funds."

The Revenue and Taxation Committee also is considering legislation to cope with the reduction of the utility tax brought about by the Supreme Court but that all property must be assessed at the same ratio.

Rep. William Roberts, R-Boise, said that House Bill 4, which would provide state funds to all junior colleges, is in the Appropriations Committee.

A hearing on the bill was held last Saturday with presidents of the state's three junior colleges and one was held last Friday with the trustees and administrators of Boise College.

Search Ends For Mountain Climbing Trio

TALKEETNA, Alaska (AP) — Three mountain climbers had been missing for a month since they set out on a search and rescue operation. They were reported safely descending Mt. McKinley today, but it was anybody's guess whether they got to the top.

"I'd say it's even money that they went on a South Peak," said an expedition leader who spent an eight-man party which began its search for the missing climbers on the second day of the climb.

French-born Jacques Babin, 36, also of Anchorage, was killed to fall into a crevasse.

The other four surviving members apparently did not attempt to reach the summit, but they did set a distress signal in the snow at a lower level on the mountain Sunday, apparently by using force.

They were fearful of what might have happened to the three climbers on the mountain's higher reaches.

Opponents Of Mao Arrested By Troops

HONG KONG (AP) — More than 1,000 opponents of Mao Tse-tung, most of them factory workers, were arrested by Communist army troops in the South China city of Canton Monday night, Hong Kong newspapers reported today.

Quoting travelers arriving from Canton, the papers said many of those arrested were members of the "August 1st Unkl," known as opponents of Mao's purge.

They said the troops surrounded the headquarters of the anti-Mao "Provincial Revolutionary Alliance." One prisoner said those arrested were banished from the city, but they were not known, where they were sent.

After the mass arrests, the papers said, pro-Mao Red Guards posted up wall posters urging workers and peasants to return to their jobs. The posters also said that Chen Yu, governor of Kwangtung Province, was arrested.

Organizing Bill May Clear House Soon

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chief House sponsor of the Senate-approved congressional reorganization bill predicted today the measure would clear his branch before the end of March.

Rep. Ray J. Madden, D-Ind., told a reporter "there is no doubt" the House will accept the legislation. Although he predicted fights over some of the 100 provisions.

The Senate passed the bulky bill — the first general reorganization of Congress to be considered in 21 years — by a 75-9 vote Tuesday.

Madden, No. 2-ranking Democrat on the House Rules Committee, said he was confident that panel would clear the bill soon for House floor action.

The bill, as cleared by the Senate, would require disclosure of more information about the operations of Congress, give members additional expert help to deal with the budget and other legislative business, establish a committee "bill of rights" under which a majority could act on a measure despite the opposition of the chairman, provide for an annual August recess, and tighten the present law requiring disclosure of information by lobbyists.

Gov. Reagan Proposes Big Tax Package

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Gov. Ronald Reagan proposed today a \$96-million tax package — almost four times higher than anything suggested by previous California governors.

The Republican chief executive asked for the money to help balance a budget that now exceeds \$5 billion — also a record — despite his attempts to economize.

But he offered to return \$120 million of it to residents of the nation's most populous state in direct property tax reductions averaging 6.5 percent cut. He called for \$95 million more in aid to local government, intended to be a form of indirect property tax relief.

The reception the package will get in the Democratic-controlled legislature is unclear.

Reagan earmarked these taxes for increases: personal income, sales, liquor, cigarettes and other tobacco products, and banks and corporations.

He blamed the size of his request on the "inadequacy of the financing" of the previous Democratic administration of Gov. Edmund G. Brown.

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Overpopulation May Make Mere Survival Big Concern

 PASADENA, Calif. (AP) - Mere survival may become man's chief concern in an overpopulated, underfed world, says a prominent scientist.

Dr. George Hartman, president of the Rockefeller Foundation of New York, Tuesday night told a California Institute of Technology conference on "The Next 50 Years."

"The more developed nations cannot for any considerable period of time or in any significant dimension feed portions of the world which remain static in terms of their own food production efforts."

"Unless this is clearly understood and maximum efforts are made to reverse systems of underproduction wherever they exist, survival will indeed become man's chief concern."


three Caltech professors, who wrote a best-selling book "The Next 100 Years" 10 years ago, revised their forecasts, prominently on the basis of events since then.

They reported the earth's population is growing more rapidly than expected, and that the world is likely to run into a food crisis within 10 years instead of 100.

Caltech biologist James Bonner cited a widening gap between rich and poor nations and predicted: "We will, I suspect, begin to regard the starving population of the undeveloped nations as a race or species apart, people totally different from us, as indeed they will be."

"They are just animals," he will say, "and a serious reservoir of disease. The inevitable culmination of the two cultures will be that one culture (the rich) will devour the other."





Leftists Finish Slate In France

By STEPHEN BROENING PARIS (AP)—France's usually quarreling leftists completed a single slate Tuesday night in a concerted effort to wrest control of the National Assembly from President Charles de Gaulle's party in Sunday's runoff election.

The Communists were reported to have withdrawn at least 15 candidates who received more votes in their districts than other leftists.

The Gaullists, who received just over 37 percent of the vote in the first round, expressed confidence they would retain a majority in the 487-seat Assembly.

Only 81 candidates—68 of them Gaullists—were left after 406 seats to be decided. Candidates in the runoff need only a pluralistic vote to be elected. Most of the races will pit Gaullists against the left.

The leftists made up a coalition of the Socialists and the Communists, got about 40 percent of the votes in the first round and 37 percent in the second round.

Results of last Sunday's first round showed a vote split between the Center Democratic Party, which attracted about 12 percent of the popular vote. It is expected to run about 45 candidates Sunday.

Student Unit Seeking Out Committee

WASHINGTON (AP)—The National Student Association still is shopping around for a sympathetic congressional committee to probe its one-year financial ties to the Central Intelligence Agency.

But spokesmen for the student group said Tuesday they are having trouble generating congressional interest in the controversy that erupted last month.

NSA acting press secretary Greg Moseviny said the student group would prefer a non-partisan investigation conducted by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

But that committee—while offering to accept NSA tax records—hasn't yet shown any inclination to probe the matter, said Moseviny.

He said the student group fears its records may soon be subpoenaed by a House committee. He doesn't favor an investigation. He specifically mentioned the Senate's CIA "watchdog" committee.

Some of the watchdog committee members, said Moseviny, have indicated their acceptance of the CIA's past program of subsidizing students secretly as a means to combat Communist student propaganda.

A former NSA president, Philip Sherburne, 24, met Tuesday behind closed doors with the Foreign Relations Committee but would not comment afterwards. Neither would committee chairman J.W. Fulbright.



Leftists Finish Slate In France

PARIS (AP)—France's usually quarrelsome leftists compiled a single, solid 1966y election in a concerted effort to wrest control of the National Assembly from President Charles de Gaulle's party in Sunday's runoff election.

The Communists were reported to have withdrawn at least 13 candidates who received more votes in their districts than other leftist candidates in the first round of voting last Sunday. The Red candidates stepped down in the belief that more moderate leftists would have a bigger appeal.

The Gaullists, who received just over 37 per cent of the vote in the first round, expressed confidence they would retain a majority in the 487-seat Assembly and that voters would support De Gaulle's leadership.

Only 81 candidates — 66 of them Gaullists — polled a fifth or more of the vote in the runoff. De Gaulle's party won 327 seats to be decided. Candidates in the runoff need only a plurality of a majority to be elected. Most of the races will pit Gaullists against the left.

The following are made up of the Socialists and the Communists, got about 40 per cent of the votes in the first round, 3 per cent of the Gaullists. But there was no assurance that the leftists could run a second round.

Results of last Sunday's first round showed a weakening of the French Democratic party, which attracted about 12 per cent of the popular vote. It is run about 40 candidates Sunday.

LONDON (AP) — Is Prime Minister Harold Wilson, the "master politician" losing his grip? Or has he made a calculated move to force the Labor party's rebellious left-wing into

The polling in Glasgow, South Wales and the industrial English Midlands will fill parliamentary seats left vacant by death or resignation. The Midlands and South Wales are considered safe Labor seats, but the Laborites are likely to lose in Glasgow.

Overshadowing the electoral question mark are queries raised by the apparent disarray of Wilson's party in Parliament following the almost unopposed denial of a motion last week that the prime minister gave his followers last Thursday.

The Financial Times suggested "the prime minister's savage rebuke to his rebellious followers on Thursday night was symptomatic of the government's growing sensitivity to criticism."

Of the 63 abstainers, 41 came from the party's right wing and center. The others were left-wingers. Some wondered if Wilson was reminding the leftists they have nowhere to go if excluded by the Laborites and that he can get along very well without them.

What stung most in Wilson's tirade Thursday to a party caucus was his likening the abstainers to dogs.

"Dog metaphors are usually a mistake in democratic politics," the Times later commented.

Wilson told the abstainers: "All I say is 'Watch it.' Every dog is allowed one bite, but a

Lenten Guideposts

Pinned To Canyon Wall

Hard to tell what all was going through my mind that afternoon in September, 1952, as I drove down that narrow mountain road in southern California, taking an occasional glance down into the shimmering blue canyon which lay 350 feet below.

There was a chain-link fence along the edge of the road; rather puny, I remember thinking. But really, I imagine my mind was mostly on other things.

Widowed a year before, I had begun doing ironing and house cleaning to supplement my income, and it was such a job that had taken me up the canyon this day.

How I miss Ralph! I thought to myself. I was nearly 60 and with Ralph gone my life didn't seem very important or worthwhile.

I was suddenly brought up straight in the seat when I realized the brake pedal was going way down to the floor. I pushed harder but instead of slowing down the car seemed to lurch ahead faster. It careened into the fence; the iron links snapped like a paper chain—and that's how I came to know that the car was going over the edge of the cliff.

The car turned over. My head hit the windshield. And then suddenly I was falling through the air, outside the car, tumbling down the almost vertical wall of the canyon.

I clawed and grappled but the sand, one rock, those tough little desert trees that had somehow got a grip on this rock face. One hundred and fifty feet below me was the jagged floor of the canyon.

Blood was trickling into my eyes from a cut on my forehead. My right side ached terribly. And below that, directly below me, the blood came faster.

My feet, I discovered, were wedged against a precarious sand, one rock, those tough little desert trees that had somehow got a grip on this rock face. One hundred and fifty feet below me was the jagged floor of the canyon.

Except for that exquisite but I would have plunged the rest of the way to certain death, and still would if it pulled loose. I looked up. Two hundred feet above me I could see the line where the road cut into the cliff. And below that, directly below my head, a light that made me catch my breath.

Woman Vows Fight For GOP Position

WASHINGTON (AP) — Phyllis Schlafly, passed over by a panel that nominated a California man for the presidency of the National Federation of Republican Women, hinted today she'll stage a "floor fight" to win the spot.

"This is another attempt by the New York liberals to purge from office those who wholeheartedly supported Sen. Goldwater in 1964," Mrs. Schlafly said in a telephone interview from her Alton, Ill., home.

The seven-member nominating committee Tuesday named Gladys O'Donnell of Long Beach to head the 500,000-member organization. Mrs. Schlafly, now the federation's first vice president, was not named for any post on the committee's slate.

Saying there "is no case in recent years" when a first vice president who wanted the job had stepped up to the presidency, Mrs. Schlafly said the committee's action "will, I regret to say, cause a serious split among Republican women just when we need unity for 1968."

She said she is being urged by federation members from all sections of the country to oppose Mrs. O'Donnell, but that she wouldn't decide until the convention May 5-6 whether to seek the office, which has a three-year term.

A moderate-conservative battle at the women's convention could preview the fight many expect at the 1968 Republican National Convention.

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Residents Of Northeastern U.S. Hope Drought Is Slowly Breaking

By JEAN HELLER

NEW YORK (AP) — Residents of the northeastern United States have come to expect spring without rain enough for crops, summer without rain enough for recreation, winter without snow enough to melt into parched reservoirs.

Season after season, storms and even floods have swept nearly every other area of the nation. But the people of the Northeast got rain only in sprinkles, snow only in flurries.

They suffered through one of the longest, harshest droughts in the area's history.

But now, after nearly six years, maybe — but maybe — the drought is slowly breaking. In the past five weeks, snow and rain have poured over the Eastern Seaboard, severe enough that at times it seemed the weather was trying to make up for six years in one short season.

With a few exceptions, reservoir "lets" are inching up toward near-normal. Ground-water levels are rising. Water

restrictions that have almost become habits are being lifted. But one big, overriding question remains: Will the precipitation continue?

"When you talk about a drought, you can never specify exactly at what point it ends," said New York City's chief meteorologist, Anthony Tancredi.

"Generally, drought conditions have eased," he said. "But all that means is that within a short period of time — less than two months — we've had enough rain and snow to take care of us for the time being.

"But rain this month isn't going to help farmers next month. And it isn't going to erase the deficits we've built up over the past six years.

"To help the agricultural drought you have to have rain falling during the growing season and you have to build up underground stores. You simply can't make up a six-year deficit in two months.

"But this year, at least, we have some reason for opti-

smism."

The Delaware River Basin Commission last week declared the drought emergency in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Connecticut at an end because of sustained rain and snow since last fall.

However, in Washington, D.C., a U.S. Weather Bureau specialist wouldn't make such a blanket statement. No problem exists now, he said, but it is too soon to say what may develop by summer.

"It was that same optimism (imposed by the knowledge that nobody can ever be sure what the weather is going to do that) that bred through evaluations from other weather experts.
