"Rah, Rah Terri," She's Off To Seek Junior Miss Title

Floating over the newly-green lawn at the Twin Falls High School, the lusty strains of "Rah, Rah Terri" filled the air and Terri Thornock, this year's Idaho representative to the America's Junior Miss Pageant in Mobile, Ala., was on her way to the most exciting week in her life.
Fellow students at the high school were dismissed from classes at 9 a.m. Thursday to attend an informal pep assembly on the expansive lawn at the school. They presented Terri with a chain and locket and gave her mother a bouquet of roses. After a car caravan from the school through the downtown area of Twin Falls, more than 150 students said goodbye to the 18-year-old senior at the Municipal Airport.
Terri became Idaho's Junior Miss after the state pageant at Moscow in January and became eligible to compete with 48 other high school seniors from the United States for the title of America's Junior Miss. Terri is sponsored by the Twin Falls Jaycees, who turned out in force to send her off at the airport.
The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Thornock, 2107 Alta Vista Drive, left Twin Falls at 8:40 a.m. via West Coast Airlines. On her trip to Anaheim, she will land in Salt Lake City, Denver, Houston, New Orleans and finally Mobile. On the trip home March 19, she will leave Mobile at 12:30 p.m., landing in Atlanta, Chicago, Salt Lake City and Twin Falls at 9:30 p.m.
Terri will meet Candy Lish, Utah's Junior Miss, in Denver and they will continue together the rest of the way to Mobile. While in Mobile, she will be staying at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Metzger, 3907 Springbank Road, Mobile, 36608, with Kentucky's Junior Miss.

Jetliner Crashes In Ohio

URBANA, Ohio (AP)—A DC-10 jetliner and a second plane crashed today 50 miles from the scene of another airliner crash Sunday, the Ohio Highway Patrol said.
The jetliner crashed at a control post at nearby Piqua said it was not learned whether the planes might have collided about half a mile from here. One plane was identified as a Trans World Airlines DC-10 with 23 persons aboard. No survivors were reported.
The second plane was identified as a light private plane which crashed two miles from the DC-10.
There was no word on the fate of the occupants of the private plane.
The sheriff's office said bodies were scattered amid the debris of the plane which fell near the resort community of Meadow Lake about five miles northwest of the central Ohio city.
R.D. King, news editor of the Urbana Citizen, reported he found no survivors among the 23 passengers and four crew members.
A woman who lives nearby, Mrs. Wayne Hinchey, said she heard "what sounded like an explosion." She said the plane crashed about half a mile from her house in a rural area.
Bodies and debris were reported scattered over a four-square-mile area. The wreckage was set up not far from the crash.
Reports fixed the crash scene as near Ohio Routes 29 and 540.

Senate Votes To Repeal State Tax On Margarine

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. District Court Judge George Hart was assigned today to hold a preliminary hearing in Adam Clayton Powell's legal bid to regain his seat in Congress.
No date can be set for the hearing, Hart's office said, until House Speaker John W. McCormack of Massachusetts and the other defendants named in the lawsuit are served with summons. The U.S. marshal's office said service will begin as soon as possible.
Judge Hart will be asked to issue a preliminary injunction ordering Powell's immediate seating and to call a three-judge court which would determine whether the House exceeded its constitutional authority March 1 day when it refused the New York Negro Democrat the oath of office.
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The suit, filed by Powell's attorneys Wednesday, also asked that a permanent injunction be issued to prevent McCormack from refusing to give Powell the oath of office.
The suit charged the House action violated Powell's and his constituents' constitutional rights and "racially discriminatory practices."
The court petition was signed by Powell and 13 others, including civil rights leader A. Philip Randolph, Percy Foreman, Manhattan borough president and Julian Jack, former borough president.
On the Bahamas Island of Bimini, the fishing retreat where Powell has remained since the start of the suit, he spoke derisively of the man selected by New York Republicans to run against him in the special election, James H. Meredith, first Negro enrolled in the University of Mississippi.
Meredith, who is 37, asked the debonair preacher-politician at a Bimini news conference, "I don't know, Meredith, if I should be your opponent, Powell added he doesn't plan to campaign in person in Harlem.

Inventory Property Tax Is Repealed

BOISE (AP)—The Idaho Senate voted today to repeal the state's tax on oleomargarine, one day after it approved phasing out of the property tax inventories.
If the oleo tax repealer is approved in the house it and an inventory levy amendment will cost the state's general fund nearly \$3 million in the two-year period ending next July 1.
The oleo tax brings in about \$1.2 million in a biennium and the cost of the inventory phase-out is estimated a \$1.5 million in the first biennium.
An oleo repeal bill was introduced early in the session in the house and has been bottled up in committee. The Senate repealer now goes to the house.
Vote on oleo repeal in the senate was 25-4.
Repeal was fought earlier in the session. The bill once was defeated, revised and sent back to the Senate Agriculture and Livestock Committee. That group was forced Wednesday following inventory tax repeal, to send the bill back to the senate floor. Chairman, Sen. Mary Brooks, R-Carey, asked that it be the first bill considered today.
She said she would not vote because the dairy industry now has a monopoly, rather than a surplus, of its products.
After a three-hour debate on March 11, the Senate property tax on inventories, livestock and timber over a four-year period, the Senate approved the measure.
House members recessed to listen to the Senate debate. It will be earlier, passed 55-11 by the house.
One-fourth of the inventory tax would be repealed each year, with last revenues to local taxing units being replaced by an increasing amount of state sales tax revenue.
Sen. James C. Ellsworth, R-Leadore, was said taxing inventories. He said taxing inventories would be akin to taxing doctors and lawyers on the basis of their numbers of clients, because it would be taxing their means of doing business for a living.
Sen. Orval Hansen, R-Idaho Falls, said the Legislature would leave the sales tax to provide "a tax base that will meet the needs of the state for years to come."
"Now we are considering phasing out part of that base," he said, "and passing the buck to some future legislature."

Students Stand Fast In Boycott

ORANBURG, S.C. (AP)—South Carolina State College students, threatened with dismissal for refusing to return to classes, agreed today to "stand fast, hold our ground, and strengthen our position."
Alvin Lee Williams called the dismissal threat issued Wednesday by Gov. Robert E. McNeil, the trustees and college board a "300-hour act of terrorism" and said "I am sure another ultimatum trying to scare us."
The issue in the class boycotts was the requirement of three students who were dismissed from the predominantly Negro school two weeks ago as a result of a demonstration against student rules.

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Sunshine Satellite Working Fine

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—America's new "sun probe" satellite is working fine today as it whirled about the globe on its sun-studying mission.
The 67-pound payload carried nine scientific instruments into orbit from Cape Kennedy Wednesday to continue extending solar observations begun by earlier satellites.
The new satellite is called OSO 3 for Orbiting Solar Observatory. A total of seven launches is planned to chart all 11-year solar cycle during which solar activity ranges from quiet to a period of intense flare activity.
The satellite, built by Ball Brothers Research Corp., Boulder, Colo., will observe sun spots, X-rays, gamma rays and cosmic rays from the sun so scientists can study their effect on weather, communications and manned space flights.

Highest U.S. War Losses Announced

SAIGON (AP)—The highest American losses of the Vietnam war were announced today, reflecting the steadily rising U.S. military effort and Communist retaliation with heavier mortar attacks, mines, booby traps and hit and run assaults. The total casualties last week were 1,617 killed, wounded and missing. It included 232 dead, 1,381 wounded and four missing. Most were in the drive to the glimmering and fleeing Red Laos that have characterized the recent fighting. While the over-all total was the highest of the war, the total of 232 killed was exactly the same as in November, 1965, when 240 Americans died. But most of that dead toll came in the fierce In Dragon Valley battle, not in engagements scattered the length of South Vietnam.
The U. S. Command reported 1,736 Communists were killed last week, above average but not a record. However, South Vietnam's "open arms" program to attract defectors dealt the Reds a heavy blow. The state in the U.S. Communist weekly total of 1,168 Communist soldiers and political workers—came into allied hands waving the slip of paper granting them amnesty for turning on the Reds.
Statistics showing the open arms program is attracting defectors at twice the rate of last year.
Another sign of the stepped-up war was the lifting of security wraps on the first major offensive operation in the Mekong Delta by troops of the U. S. 3rd Infantry Division, the first big U. S. offensive since the Vietnam war.

GP's Living Allowances Will Be Cut

SAIGON (AP) — American servicemen in Saigon reacted with groans, sighs and occasional screams today to the news that they're losing \$21-million a year in living allowances. The guys out in the boonies couldn't care less — they weren't getting it.

Short-liners whose tours in Vietnam are nearly over took it casually. Others said the Pentagon was fouled up, blind, crazy or an unpalatable combination of these and other things.

The Pentagon announced Wednesday that on May 1 it is ending the cost of living allowances paid to some 31,200 servicemen in the Saigon area. The allowances — ranging from \$27 a month for privates to \$84 for generals — were intended to help men who had to live par-

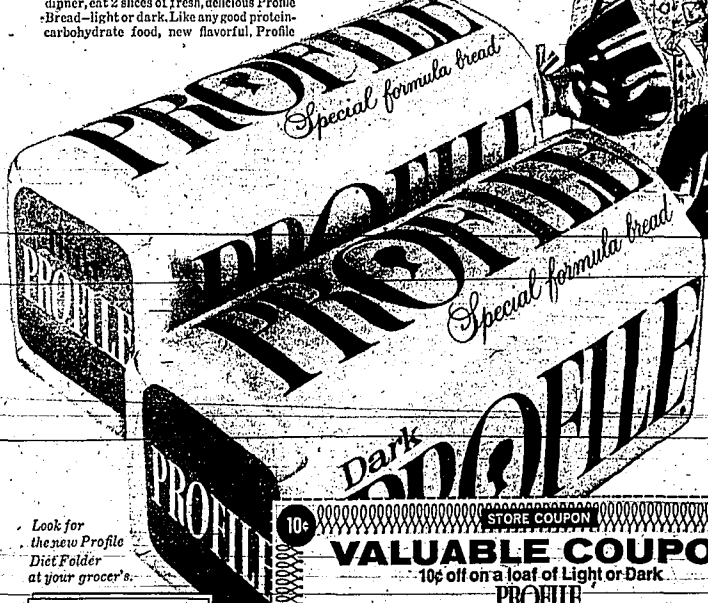

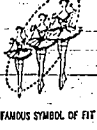

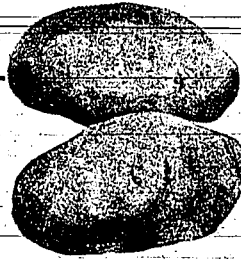

Potential Defects In Vehicles Are Reported

By JOSEPH R. COYNE

WASHINGTON (AP) — Potential defects in more than 670,000 cars, trucks and buses — most of them 1967 models — have been reported to the government by domestic and foreign manufacturers since Jan. 1.

Commerce Department records showed today that most of the recalls were by the domestic big three—General Motors, Ford and Chrysler—for a variety of possible defects involving brake parts, steering, shaft alignment and windshield wipers.

Three other domestic and seven foreign producers also are listed.

Some of the recalls have been announced publicly by the companies but this isn't required under the new traffic safety law.

Manufacturers are only required to report potential car and truck defects to the government and to inform owners so corrections, if needed, can be made.

A report to the government doesn't mean that all vehicles from that batch. He might find a few or no cars with the same defect.

Other U. S. firms which filed reports on possible defects since Jan. 1 were Kaiser Jeep, International Harvester, American Motors and Clark Equipment Co., a manufacturer of trailers.

Foreign companies filing reports included Rolls Royce, Jaguar, Porsche, BMW of West Germany, Datsun, Volkswagens and Renault.

One of the largest recalls came in January when General Motors reported possible mistakes detecting shafts in more than 200,000 Chevrolets, Pontiacs, Oldsmobiles and Buicks.

Powell Case Pushes Congress To Brink Of Drafting Rules

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Adam Clayton Powell case is pushing Congress to the brink of drafting meaningful rules to police its own conduct.

To date, more than 75 bills proposing ethical standards for representatives have been introduced in the House, most of them born in the controversy stirred by the highly lying Harlem preacher.

There were many last year, too. But they got nowhere. Still, other bills have been in-

roduced in the Senate. There, a special ethics committee set up after revelations of the wheeling and dealing of Bobby Baker — is investigating allegations that Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., converted to personal use funds raised for him at campaign and testimonial dinners. Dodd denies the charges.

The drive for some sort of ethical guidelines is being spurred on by an outpouring of words from members worried about growing public suspicion of the moral climate in Con-

gress. Chairman William M. Colmer, D-Miss., said Wednesday the House Rules Committee hopes to make a recommendation next week on what sort of committee should police ethics.

There have been no witnesses during several weeks of hearings who opposed the idea of setting up a watchdog group.

The House Administration Committee Wednesday increased the membership of its ethics and contracts subcommittee from 7 to 10 members

five from each party — and the House voted \$50,000 for the subcommittee's activities. The subcommittee is one of the candidates for ethics watchdog in the Rules Committee deliberations.

Some samples of the cries of concern — that have — echoed through Congress in recent days include:

"The public's faith in Congress is going steadily down-down-down."

"Let us clean house."

"Our linen is on the line."

"A cloud of moral suspicion is hanging corrosively over the entire Congress."

In recent years, Congress has been severe in its surveillance of the executive and judicial branches. But the public apparently believes Congress failed to watch itself.

A recent Gallup Poll asked Americans whether they thought misuse of government funds by congressmen was fairly common. Sixty per cent said yes, 21 per cent said no and 19 per cent had no opinion.

In many ways, Congress has itself to thank for the current crisis of confidence in its integrity.

Members of Congress who are bankers can sit on a committee framing legislation affecting banks.

Those who own big farms can sit on agriculture committees that draft bills for price supports on crops they raise themselves.

A congressman who is a lawyer can personally represent his law firm can represent

clients before courts or regulatory agencies that depend on Congress for operating funds.

A senator who has big oil holdings can fight on the Senate floor for legislation benefiting the oil industry.

A senator or representative can put his relatives on the congressional payroll — in fact, a recent AP survey showed that more than 50 did at some time during the past year.

Or a congressman can, with the taxpayers picking up the tab, fly off to Paris, to Rome, to

Hong Kong on official business, maybe concerned with international problems, maybe concerned with personal pleasure.

Why doesn't Congress set up strict ethical standards? The reasons, minor and major, are manifold. But a key one is this: Ethics are wonderful to talk about, but hard to define and still harder to enforce. The world of ethics is, in fact, a gray, shadowy, uncharted thicket where delicate legal and moral questions lurk.

The Powell case already has produced some reform in the House, albeit slight.

Rotarians Hear Of Radar Train

"It's a heck of a way to make a living," commented Maj. Errol Goldsbury, who has just returned from a tour of duty in Vietnam.

The major, who is currently commanding officer at the radar train located near Wendell, is scheduled to return to Vietnam in May. He touched

briefly on his Vietnam experiences and explained the workings of the temporary Air Force installation near Wendell during an appearance Wednesday before the Twin Falls Rotary Club.

"He said the 'Wendell' operation is one of a few of its kind located in the United States by the Air Force. The purpose of the train's operation is to score simulated bomb drops made by Strategic Air Command bombers.

Maj. Goldsbury has been a member of the SAC for 24 years—ever before it was labeled SAC. He said the "bomb drops" are locked onto by radar and their course and accuracy measured by this method.

The radar train has been at the Wendell spur for about six months and will be there another 15 or 20 days before it moves on. He said the Wendell site was picked because of the length of the railroad spur, the low density population of the area, and the fact that the location is relatively unimpeded by regular air traffic.

Following his comments he showed a specially prepared film further explaining the workings of such installation.

Red Guard Clash Claims 170 Dead

Pro Grid Draft Is Slated For Tuesday

NEW YORK (AP) — The American and National Football Leagues will hold their first combined pro draft in New York next week under a compromise plan which prohibits the selection of athletes redshirted by colleges. Pete Rozelle, commissioner of pro football, said in the future no player who had collegiate eligibility remaining could be chosen by a pro team until five seasons of football had elapsed since he first entered a recognized college.

In recent years NFL teams drafted redshirts in the regular draft while AFL teams held a special draft for them. A redshirted player's college eligibility left after the class in which he entered college has been three years.

The new plan, an obvious compromise to the two factions in the newly merged pro setup, gives a player who still has college eligibility left after the class in which he entered college has been three years.

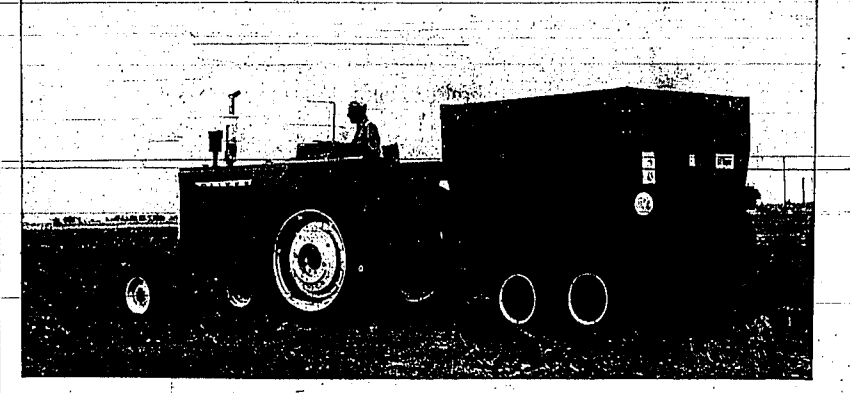

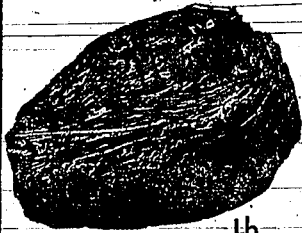

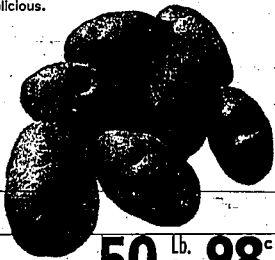

ELIMINATION PLAY TOUGH TO SPOT

In yesterday's column we mentioned that West would probably have made three spades had he played the hand.

The hand was in a Dallas duplicate. At some tables West did play at two spades. At others, West played low and

dummy, South played low and Bud, West, played his queen. North won with the king, cashed his king of hearts and led the jack and another diamond.

Bud ruffed in dummy and was ready with the magic 10 simply played ace and another club. South was in with the king and had to lead a red card. Bud ruffed in dummy and discarded his last club.

This is an example of an elimination play that could have been stopped if North had seen what was going to happen and led a club. Since he led the king of hearts, South's ten would have forced West's ace. Later, South would get in with the ace of diamonds, cash his king of clubs and get out of the lead by playing a third diamond for dummy to ruff.

This type of play comes up quite often and it was particularly hard for North to guard against it. In view of the fact that in general you just don't lead dummy's long suit.

East went to three spades after the bidding proceeded as shown in the box.

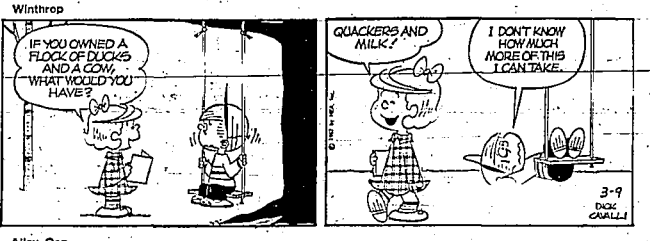
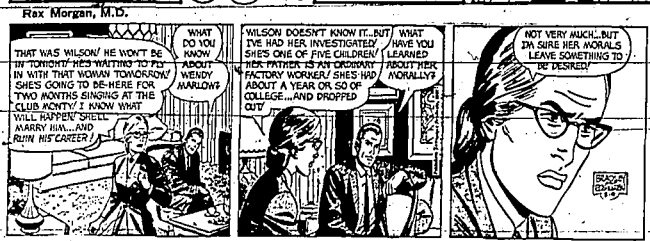
