School Officials Are Concerned Over Loss Of Support For Lunch Program

A loss of support for school lunch programs, particularly in the junior high schools, and senior high school has caused major concern among administrators and may eventually lead to the demise of the lunch program.

"More pupils are bringing sack lunches to school and abnormal numbers are buying short orders at lunch stands and grocery stores," said the superintendent of Twin Falls Schools, Ernest H. Ragland said Monday. "The month of January and February, 1967, have shown a rather sharp decrease in student patronage of the school lunch program. The decrease is particularly noticeable in the junior high schools."

De Gaulle's Prestige Mauled In French Vote

PARIS (AP)—French voters mauled the prestige of President Charles de Gaulle's government Sunday and left his forces with a majority of only one to three votes in the National Assembly. Even that narrow margin was in doubt. With two of the 487 Assembly seats still undecided, the Ministry of Interior reported candidates pledged to De Gaulle had won 244 seats, or a majority of at least one in the full Assembly.

Other checks of the candidates' political labels indicated the Gaullists had won only 243 seats, while the combined opposition had 242. French political experts varied in their assessment of the situation. The action for one seat in the National Assembly was held until next Sunday. Another seat is being held for French Somaliland in case that African territory decides in a referendum next Sunday to remain with France rather than choosing independence. WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson will take off shortly for midnight Saturday on a flight to Guam to meet with his military and diplomatic advisors from Vietnam. Their conference is now regarded as unlikely to produce any sensational, spectacular developments.

Presidential aides emphasized today that it would be a regular meeting, one of a series that is being held about every six months to review the war effort. Johnson probably will take off from Andrews Air Force Base in nearby Maryland between 10 p.m. and 11 p.m. Saturday and arrive around 10 a.m. Monday.

Meredith Withdraws—Claims GOP Reneged

NEW YORK (AP)—James H. Meredith suddenly withdrew from a single Negro political leader of either major party, or today as GOP opponent of deposed Harlem congressman Adam Clayton Powell, saying Republicans had reneged on promised money and campaign help.

Meredith announced his withdrawal from the special election commanding a vote in Manhattan's Republican ward, which named him last week as that party's candidate-designee for the race, had no immediate comment on his withdrawal. Powell also had no immediate comment, but called a news conference for 1 p.m. EST, today, even before he learned of Meredith's pulling out. He was to meet with newsmen at his Blimini Island retreat in the Bahamas, where he has been living of late.

Only Sunday, Floyd B. McKissick, national director of the Congress of Racial Equality, renewed his call for Meredith to drop out of the impending April 11 special election for Powell's seat. Saturday, Charles Evers, a leading civil rights spokesman in Mississippi, branded Meredith a "victim of the system" in which political parties pit one another for votes. "He just doesn't know any better," McKissick, speaking on the radio, said. "I don't see how he can provide this community. And I see no need for Mr. Meredith in the race."

Resolution Okays Penal System Study

BOISE (AP)—The Idaho Senate approved today a resolution calling for a study of the state's penal system after a legislator said the penitentiary in Boise is "a powder keg." Sen. Art Manley, D-Coeur d'Alene, said the situation is a result of lack of adequate facilities at the prison and not poor administration. But he told the Senate that he was planning a new penitentiary on a rural site 10 miles south of Boise. The Senate approved the resolution by voice vote. It directs the Legislative Council to study the handling of persons convicted of crimes in Idaho and report to the 1969 Legislature. The resolution now goes to the House.

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Suharto Prepares For Possible Violence

 JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—Former President Sukarno, officially stripped of his powers and titles, remained in seclusion today while the new acting president, Gen. Suharto, prepared for possible violence. Potential trouble spots in central and east Java—Sukarno's former stronghold—remained quiet but word of his detour:

ment may not have reached there yet due to the chaotic state of the island's communications. The Indonesian Congress swore in Suharto as acting president Sunday to replace Sukarno, the only president the Indonesians have known since he proclaimed their independence in 1945.

There were fears that Sukarno supporters among the military and the people may stage an insurrection to keep him in power.

Suharto declined to return to Jakarta Sunday from his weekend mountain palace, but a spokesman said he may return Tuesday. Some reports said he may be forced to live in retirement at his palace at Bogor, 40 miles east of Jakarta.

Sources from Jogjakarta, the capital of central Java, said troops were patrolling the city but it appeared quiet. There have been numerous small-scale clashes and terrorist killings in the area in recent months between pro- and anti-Sukarno forces. It is considered one of the most troublesome areas for the Suharto government.

At a news conference Sunday night, Congress Chairman Gen. Abdul Harris Nasution reportedly refused to say pointblank whether Sukarno was still president in name or not. "You must understand the Indonesian way of thinking," he said.

Other members of Congress said Sukarno was out completely, but that top leaders would not say so in exact words be-

cause they were trying to maintain stability. More than 8,000 students massed at the university in Jakarta for a victory celebration. Some were still not satisfied, however, declaring Sukarno must be made to answer for the economic failures Indonesia has suffered.

Sukarno, 68, was stripped by Congress of all executive pow-

ers and barred from political activity until the next general elections. Congress also gave Suharto authority to set up a connection with the attempted Communist coup. In October 1955.

"All Together Now, 'Rah! Rah! Whoever You Are!'"

WASHINGTON — Possibly the most striking commentary on the ethical health of the Congress of the United States is offered by its attitude toward a bill which would require members of Congress, their staff members and high-ranking officials of the executive branch to make public their outside financial activities.

For the most part, our noble legislators are ignoring the bill in the hope that it will go away.

The reason for this is obvious. The bill is a good bill because it would cause a public official to stop and think of the kind of life he is leading. It is a bill which would engage the very and special attention to every Congressman.

Andrew Tully's criticism has been accepted as part of the ball game.

FIVE MEN OF COURAGE—Sen. Case of New Jersey introduced the bill on behalf of himself and five colleagues—Sen. Clark of Pennsylvania, Hart of Michigan, Hall of Oregon, Buckley of California and Tamm of Virginia. Voters would do well to mark these names. They are those of men who actually believe that something should be done to prevent the scandals which have arisen from investigation of the activities of such Capitol Hill personalities as William C. Cline of Tennessee and Sen. Tom Dodd of Connecticut. In effect, they seek to protect what might euphemistically be called the good name of the Congress.

Some of the bill's investigators are legislators, have commented loftily that no such law is needed, that Congress is fully capable of policing itself. They must be joking. History shows that Congress did not police itself. After a century of frauds, only twice in the last 100 years has the Senate elected even to censure one of its members. In the House, however, the past period scores of legislators have behaved in a manner that would have shamed a Singapore court.

DOO-FEW LOOPHOLES—Opposition to the bill seems to be based on the fact that it has too many loopholes, and says that the bill offers no sanctuary for either the liar or the petty cheat, and thus must be viewed with suspicion by politicians and taxpayers alike.

Perhaps the bill's most fellacious aspect is that it would be preventive rather than punitive. If it became law, both the petty grafter and the time-spoker would, for aye, the sugar industry, would be put on a par with the rest of the world. It would reveal his shady activities and take the consequences of lying—including going to jail.

The bill also would be automatic in its operation. That is to say, any Congressman who is filed by members of Congress would be made public, and the voters could draw their own conclusions about the man's integrity and the amount of legal fee paid by some oil company or railroad.

AFFECTS INFLUENCE PEDDLERS—Moreover, the bill would poke its nose into one of the most sensitive areas of government activity—the pressure brought by members of Congress on various administrative agencies, and on the door approaches and influence peddling in this area are on a wholesale scale, and although a number of long-time members of Congress, even a deputy, to put in a word for a constituent, the public also has the right to know what the Congressman is doing. After all, television licenses and all other favors granted by government agencies belong to the people, not to the Congressman.

But the bill remains too simple an approach for the complex Congressional intelligence. In both the Senate and House, the sentiment is to let the bill pass, but to let the House and Congress select acts hastily, especially on matters which touch on its own peculiar prerogatives. It is a matter of opinion whether the staff can do as hope no legislator gets his hands on a crowbar and decides to steal the Capitol dome.

Although diabetes is hereditary, it may appear in children who have no family history of the disease. It may be brought to the attention of the doctor because of the child's gain weight in spite of a healthy appetite or because a healthy child starts wetting the bed at night.

Once the diagnosis is made the parents are often more puzzled than the child. The rigid supervision of the child's diet, urine testing and other instructions can be a heavy burden. It is extremely important, however, that the child be kept on a diet of low carbohydrate and a minimum of fats. Too harsh a diet may lead to an extreme, debilitating diabetes.

The only make-it-harder-for-the-child-to-adjust-to-the-procedures of the diet is essential to his continued health.

Here are some of the ways to help your child:

1. First, start your child on the diet as soon as you can. You can get a diet book from the Diabetic Association (18 East 68th Street, New York, N.Y. 10021).

2. You should avoid bribing, cajoling or intimidating your child to get him to accept his treatment, painful as it may be.

Two years ago her career was nearly brought to a tragic end by three massive strokes. There was doubt that she would live. When she did survive, there was doubt that she could ever walk, talk or even see normally again.

But Sunday night, everything was perfect.

"It was beautiful. Oh, it was just beautiful," Miss Neal, 40, exulted after speaking to a dinner audience of 2,000 at a benefit for the New York Association for the Brain Injured. She was her first public appearance since the strokes.

"I did it," she said happily. "I really did it. It was good, wasn't it?"

Here to assure her that she had been a roaring success was her husband, Henry Fonda, Martin Gabel, Scotch-Irish actor, Charles Adams and Vincent Sardi.

Miss Neal spoke at the dinner because she has a brain-injured child of her own, six-year-old Otto Preminger, Joan Crawford, who was struck by a car when she was three months old. She faltered only once during her speech; and that was with emotion as she spoke about her son.

The rest of the speech came through in the strong, husky voice that movie-goers know so well. A voice that carried the stress of months of hard work to recover.

She recalled that when she returned to England after the strokes, "I saw two of everything. I remember looking down and seeing that I had four legs. And when they took me to the hospital, I discovered I had six children, instead of just three, all of them boys."

"When you keep seeing double all the time, you start thinking double as well. Then you start talking double. That's known as doubletalk, I became an expert at doubletalk."

Miss Neal paid special tribute to her husband, writer Roald Dahl, who forced her to work.

'Copter Unit Withdraws From Thai

WASHINGTON (AP)—A unit of 26 U.S. Air Force helicopters has been withdrawn from Thailand after turning over to Thai pilots the job of airlifting the forces against Communist insurgents.

Assignment of American helicopters to ferry Thai troops into counterinsurgency operations aroused some concern. Some American observers felt it might be an indicator that the United States was slipping into a Vietnam-type situation in Thailand.

U.S. officials insisted all along that the commitment of American helicopters to help the Thai forces was a temporary measure until Thailand's own pilots could be trained to handle the tasks themselves.

The Defense Department said in response to an inquiry that the U.S. helicopter unit of squadrons had been operating since Vietnam after completing its work in Thailand.

The United States is supplying some 50 Heli helicopters to Royal Thai military under a stepped-up aid program. It is training Thai pilots at the U.S. Army and Shepherd Air Force Base in Texas.

In addition, the United States has agreed to furnish 22 helicopters for use by the Thai national police who are in the forefront of the effort to control an insurgency movement in the wild reaches of northeast Thailand.

While in Thailand, the U.S. helicopter crews were under strict rules which permitted them to carry Thai troops from camp barracks areas to forward assembly points, but not into immediate combat sectors.

The terms of the agreement on the policy in Vietnam where, starting in early 1962, U.S. choppers dropped supplies to Communist ground fire in such operations.

Gaullists Reversals To Be Viewed As Annoying

PARIS (AP)—From the summit of the French political pyramid, where President Charles de Gaulle sits, the Gaullist reversals in Sunday's elections for a new National Assembly are likely to be viewed only as an annoying irritant.

De Gaulle himself is not expected to attend the assembly, and although the deputies can overthrow any Cabinet, De Gaulle does not really consider the Cabinet responsible for the assembly. He appoints the premier and all the ministers and expects them to carry out his policies without even a sideling glance toward the Parliament.

Will the defeat of Foreign Minister Maurice Coussin and the loss of almost 40 deputies from the Gaullist majority in the outgoing assembly be a harbinger of a political action in France, he believes it was the voters' intention when they voted him into office in 1958, in France's first popular election for the presidency in a century.

The policy of withdrawing from the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's integrated commands and asking all foreign troops and allied bases to leave French territory belongs to De Gaulle himself. The same holds true for his dislike of anything that would seem to be agreement for American policies. In the legislative campaign it appeared that his foreign policy had the support of almost all elements.

De Gaulle's 1963 vote of British entry into the Common Market was his own policy and not one that the deputies do or say to change his views.

Although the makeup of the new assembly is whether or not the Gaullists have a majority, even of one, is still in question as a sharp campaign for the followers of De Gaulle, it is not likely to cause insurmountable difficulties.

Joan Leacock, head of the neo-European Unity Center in London, said the Gaullist reversals will not be in systematic opposition. The main point for which he is pressing is an intensified social program, to give the poorer segment of the population a bigger share of the national income. Gaullist leaders have already said this will be their main line of action during the five-year term of the new assembly.

In case of a vote of censure on any other issue, the Center Democrats probably would not join the opposition.

If the government should be overthrown, the Gaullists can dissolve the assembly and call for new elections. In the event of another anti-Gaullist legislature, De Gaulle might resign and call for new legislative and presidential elections at the same time, with an invitation to the voters to decide between the assembly and the assembly. The present situation does not appear to be at this crisis stage, however.

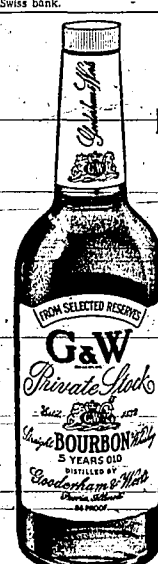

Tshombe Is Sentenced To Death
KINSHASA, the Congo (AP)—Former Congolese Premier Moise Tshombe was sentenced to death in absentia for high treason by a special military court here today.

Tshombe is presently living in Madrid, Spain.

Tshombe, now 47, on July 11, 1960, declared copper-rich Katanga independent of the newly independent nation of the Congo and himself president. He stood off attempts by the Congo to return the province into the Congo fold for 30 months. He finally capitulated Jan. 15, 1965 after U.N. forces routed his white-officered guerillas.

When he went into European exile, he was given a five-year life-out-his-life-leave. But—instead of more than a year he went to Europe for 18 months and became premier of the nation on July 10, 1964.

There was constant friction between the region made outside the Congo, however, and on Oct. 12, 1965 he was ousted and replaced by a Congolese.

It was during Tshombe's period of rule in Katanga that U.N. Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold was killed in a plane crash in Rhodesia while on a flight to negotiate a cease-fire between Katanga and the Congo.

The Katangan forces had just clashed for the first time with U.N. troops on Sept. 22, 1965.

Lt. Col. Ferdinand Tshipolpa, commander of the Katangese "Blaka" regiment, which murdered Hammarskjold, and Katangan Capt. Kalondwa were also sentenced to death today.

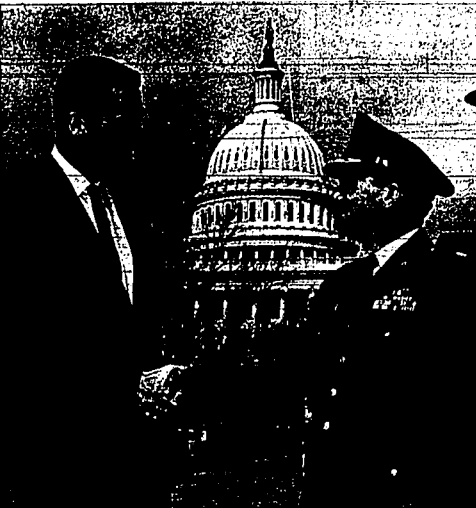

"This court has never decided that issue before," the chief justice said from the bench.

"The right to a speedy trial is as basic as any right contained in the sixth amendment," he added.

With the decision the court took another historic step toward requiring Bill of Rights guarantees in all state legal proceedings.

The 5-4 vote of the nine-justice fully subscribed to the action.

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Doctors Try To Determine If Pills Prompted Octuplet Birth

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Mexican doctors are trying to determine whether birth control pills had anything to do with the birth of octuplets to Maria Teresa Lopez de Sepulveda. All eight children died within 13 hours of birth.

Doctors at the hospital where the infants died said they are using autopsy results to see if they can find a definite link between the birth control pills taken by the mother and the multiple births.

Mrs. Sepulveda, 21, took birth control pills for about a year, but stopped taking them about eight months before the birth of the four boys and four girls last Friday.

The birth of octuplets has been recorded twice before in this century—in Mexico in 1921 and in China in 1934.

Dr. Kurt Ambrusius, Director of pathology at the 20th of November hospital, performed autopsies on the eight children before their burial. He said final results will not be ready for a week or 10 days but they apparently died because of underdeveloped respiratory systems.

The doctor also said the mother and father would be asked to submit to physical examinations next week. The father, General...

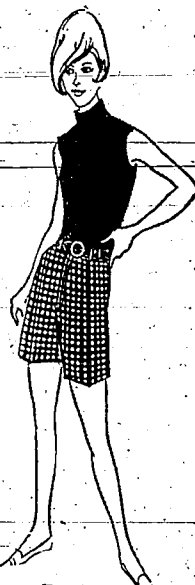

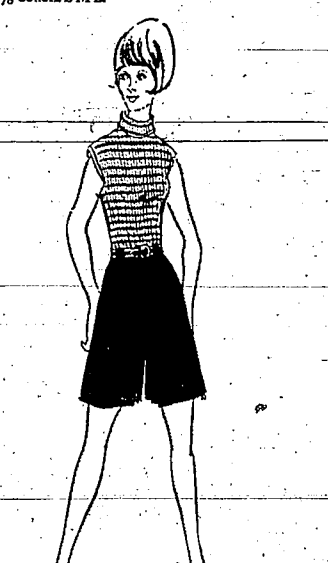

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Khrushchev And Molotov Vote In Election

By JOHN WEYLAND
 MOSCOW (AP) — Two old hands of the Soviet Union's most powerful politicians, Nikita S. Khrushchev and Leonid Brezhnev, emerged from obscurity Sunday to vote in a legislative election.

Consigned to what Khrushchev used to call "the dustbin of history," the two former advisers have been living in the secluded retirement of the Kremlin's post-Stalin leadership reserves for its political losers. Their public appearances are rare, and they are seldom mentioned in the Soviet press.

Khrushchev drew a friendly crowd of at least 1,000 at a polling station near his Moscow apartment. It was his biggest public triumph since he was ousted in 1964.

This, subdued and looking his 72 years, Khrushchev smiled back at his greeters, touched his forehead and in a familiar gesture, crossed out his reception, "It's very nice."

Asked if he had any message for the world, he said simply, "Let there be peace."

Molotov was virtually ignored as he voted at a polling place near the Kremlin. Once Stalin's right-hand man, Molotov was premier in 1930-31 and foreign minister in 1939-40 and again in 1953-64. Khrushchev ousted him 10 years ago.

Molotov, 77, smiled thinly and walked slowly. He wore his customary rimless glasses, a hat, white muffled and gray coat, and was accompanied by his wife.

Both Molotov and Khrushchev voted for Khrushchev's successor as premier, Alexei N. Kosygin, who was running for the Parliament of the Russian Federation, the Soviet Union's largest state.

Khrushchev seemed surprised by the surging crowd, which forced him and his wife, Nina, to enter the polling station by a side entrance.

They both said they were in excellent health.

Asked how he liked retirement, Khrushchev answered, "At my age it is impossible to work."

Khrushchev's 26-minute appearance was not announced in advance. But he had voted at the same place last June, and people there said, "May you live many more years," one said.

"I read, I read," Khrushchev said, when asked how he spent time at a country home outside Moscow.

New Service, New System Are Added By T. F. Public Library

The number of people using library services is vastly increasing, Mr. Bruce said, and the checkout system is one way of saving man hours so senior staff members can work with the public.

The number of services offered and books and materials also is increasing, while the number of staff members must remain constant, because of the budget, Mr. Bruce noted.

Stalin's Daughter Doesn't Want To Make Statement About Leaving Russia

 BERN, Switzerland (AP) — Swiss Justice Minister Ludwig Von Moos said today that Joseph Stalin's daughter Svetlana wishes to make no public declaration and has asked Swiss authorities to protect her privacy.

Von Moos told a news conference that Miss Svetlana, 47, was given a three-month tourist visa for Switzerland after the trip she planned to the United States "became impossible."

"She" arrived in Geneva from Rome Saturday and was whisked away to a secret hiding place in the Swiss Alps.

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Attorney General Says 38 Wiretaps Are In Operation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Ramsey Clark, who said today that 38 wiretaps are in operation today.

The new attorney general said Sunday that "he considers wiretapping justified only in cases of national security where there is a direct threat to the security of this nation."

Other uses would be "incompatible with what we want for this country."

"It is my judgment today that there are 38 wiretaps," Clark said, "there are no electronic eavesdroppers in the United States that all of these are in the national security area."

Clark's synopsis of the control admitted government involvement in government wiretapping was made on CBS "Face the Nation."

An agency that wants to listen on a telephone wire must submit a request to him, Clark said. Permission, if granted, is in writing.

Asked for comment about a report that the FBI had wiretapped a number of cases of national security during Robert F. Kennedy's tenure as attorney general, Clark said, "I am not in the business of blaming anybody."

Kennedy, now a senator from New York, and J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, have each accused the other of being responsible for these disputed cases of wiretapping.

Clark was also asked to comment on the Warren Commission's finding that Lee Harvey Oswald was identified as the assassin of President John F. Kennedy, acted alone.

"Until there is evidence to the contrary," Clark said, "I will stand with the Warren Commission."

The findings of the commission are currently being challenged by New Orleans District Attorney James Garrison.

Listing there was a conspiracy, Garrison has made one arrest and promised more. But he has refused to share any evidence he has with the government.

Thousands Of Chinese Slain By Reds

HONG KONG (AP) — Several thousand people were killed or wounded in rural areas of Kwangtung Province when Communist troops opened fire on workers and peasants who refused to go back to work, Hong Kong newspaper reported today.

Chinese-language New Life Evening Post said travelers arriving from Kwangtung, across the border from Hong Kong, reported bloody clashes between army troops and workers and farmers in Fatshan, Po An, Hung Hai and Shun Ta.

The most severe clashes, the paper said, occurred in Fatshan and Nang Hai where workers and farmers refused to go back to the production line.

One arrival said "bodies were scattered along the Fatshan highway. The casualties could run into thousands."

The paper said 100,000 troops are now in Kwangtung Province, and many people in Canton expect the number to be doubled shortly by the return of the rebellious workers and peasants.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Rock 'n' roll singer Gary Lewis goes back to marching at Ft. Ord, Calif., today after a honeymoon with his bride, Sara Jane (Jinky) Suzara of the Philippines.

Gary and Jinky, 22, were married Saturday in a ceremony attended by Hollywood celebrities, including his father, comedian Jerry Lewis.

Albania May Be Removed From 'Forbidden' List

WASHINGTON (AP) — Albania is a nation targeted against many visitors from the West, may be taken off the State Department's list of nations which travel by Americans is forbidden.

If the State Department reverses its long-standing quarantine list and the little Balkan country responds by dropping its own requirements, it will be the last East European Communist nation to be closed to the cold war travel ban.

Albania has been closed to U.S. travelers since 1952.

The San Diego Union, in a copyright story by Peter Kaye, said Erickson, as national chairman of the group, will travel around the country seeking support for the presidential candidacy of former Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Nixon was defeated by the late President John F. Kennedy in the 1960 presidential race.

Before Erickson decided to take the Nixon committee job, the Union said, he talked with Nixon in New York on Jan. 24.

The newspaper quoted Erickson as saying he had informed Michigan Gov. George Romney of his decision. Romney is regarded as a front-runner for the nomination.

Erickson, 48, a El Cajon, Calif., obstetrician completed a two-year term last January as the GOP California Central Committee chairman. While in that post he helped unify a splintered party and pave the way for the election of Gov. Ronald Reagan and others of the GOP ticket last year.

Birth Control Confronts Catholics

NEW YORK (AP) — The "most pressing" problem confronting Roman Catholics in this country is birth control, says Newsweek magazine.

In announcing the results of a survey Sunday night, the magazine said the church is split. It disclosed that seven out of 10 Catholics want the church to lift its ban on artificial birth control.

According to the poll, conducted by Louis Harris & Associates, one Roman Catholic in three wants a birth control pill or mechanical contraceptive.

The survey, prepared for the March 20 issue, also finds that 59 per cent support the church in its stand against abortion. However, the number would approve the practice for a mother of young children if her life were endangered by another pregnancy.

Half the laity oppose the church on divorce, and 69 per cent want abortion allowing remarriage for the innocent party to a divorce.

Forty-eight per cent felt premature death should be allowed to marry, but only 41 per cent approved the eating of meat on Friday.

Fifty-eight per cent of those interviewed considered the Mass the most meaningful experience afforded by their religion, and 67 per cent applauded the changes made in the liturgy recently. For example, the substitution of English for Latin during most of the Mass.

The Spring Nationals are being held in Seattle this week. In addition to the Open Pairs and the Vanderbilt Cup there are numerous lesser events and a tremendous schedule of entertainment prepared by the Seattle hosts.

You don't have to be an expert to play in a national tournament. There are numerous side games in which only a few experts compete. The experts are always trying for tips. If they are lucky they get to the main events somewhat sadder if not wiser.

Here is a hand from a 1966 side game in which an expert got his tip. We don't know just what fourth hand preemptive bid is meant to do but this one produced a raise to game from North.

West opened the device of

spades. South went up with dummy's ace in the hope of dropping a singleton king. Then he led back a spade. East signaled with the ten of clubs, and West took his king of trumps and dutifully led a club. South took his ace—drew trumps and led the "2-2" hearts. West played his trick and South paused to try things over.

Give West the king of hearts and South could rise with dummy's queen and make his contract with a "root break." That would be the normal play but expert South decided that West was not the sort of player who would be able to duck quickly with the king. In fact, West did not look like the sort of player who would ever pass up a trick. So South called for dummy's eight.

This play should have been hopeless but look what happened: West had been careless enough to have held back his nine of hearts on the first heart lead. The eight spot forced the king. South wound up losing one heart, one club and one trump for a nice top score.
