## Legislature Eyes Proposed Ideas For Tax Problem

The alternative proposals include imposing of a gross receipts tax on the utility; a new measure providing for a "do-pass" measure by a committee vote.

# Total Outstanding Debt In U.S. Figured

WASHINGTON (AP) — Savors for a moment the figure \$1,239,700,000,000.

That's trillion, not billion, and the Treasury Department says it represents total outstanding debt—individual, state, local and corporate—as of last Dec. 31. The total increased \$59.1 billion in one year.

The department says there is even more to come, at least as far as the federal government is concerned.

His testimony made public Tuesday night by the House Appropriations Committee, Secretary of the Treasury Henry H. Fowler said the government will continue to run deficits at least until the end of the Vietnam war, that may higher debt.

Although the national debt is now slightly above \$300 billion, the department plans to ask Congress in May to raise the debt ceiling again, possibly as high as \$436 billion. It now is \$332 billion.

The Federal Reserve Board estimated consumer credit alone at \$24.8 billion at the end of the year, and total mortgage loans outstanding at \$33.2 billion—more than the federal debt.

Asked by Chairman George H. Mahon, D-Tex., if the administration will ever recommend a balanced budget, Fowler replied: "I do, Mr. Chairman, believe that there will be administrations that will recommend balanced budgets."

"Indeed, I would be so bold as to say that I believe there will be administrations that will recommend budgets which will provide for surpluses and some reduction of the federal debt."

Fowler said that time would probably come after the Vietnam war and the subsequent adjustment period when the economy returns to normal.

The federal debt was 133.9 percent of the total value of goods and services produced in the economy in 1946 but it is expected to be only 42.2 percent of the gross national product for the current fiscal year.

As of Dec. 31, the federal debt accounted for 22 cents out of every dollar—in overall debt compared with 58 cents in 1946, the Treasury said.

Over the same period, individual debt increased from 13 percent of the total to 24 per cent.

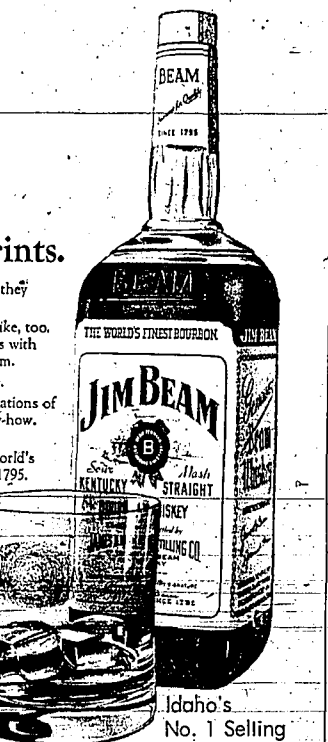

RENO, Nev. (AP) — A teenage boy and girl from Ogden, Utah, who the FBI said falsely told "being kidnaped at gunpoint," will return to their parents tomorrow.

Senior agent Carroll Nevin said the father of the boy would fly to Reno and return to Utah with both teenagers.

Nevin said he asked officers in the Reno area to be on the lookout for a gunman after the couple said a lone kidnaper forced them to drive him from Ogden to Reno Monday and then left them unharmed.

Nevin said the girl later told agents the story was a hoax.

## Call For Tax Incentives Disputed

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's call for restoration of business tax incentives has ignited a wide-open dispute in the House Ways and Means Committee, with the state of the economy and Johnson's proposed income tax boost at issue.

The committee, trying to prepare the legislation for House passage by week's end, scheduled another working session today.

Still unresolved were differing opinions on whether the administration sought the action because it fears a recession and whether enactment of the measure — estimate to slice business taxes some \$1.2 billion over a three-year span — would doom the proposed 6 per cent surtax on income tax.

## Powell's Case Viewed By House

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legal-minded House members said today if Adam Clayton Powell is re-elected and the House again moves to exclude him, it might violate the double jeopardy provision of the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution.

"That provision says no person shall be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb," it stated.

It poses one in a mass of legal questions surrounding the Powell case.

Powell has been punished once by being denied the seat he won through election. Would another exclusion vote amount to a second punishment for the New York Democrat's same alleged offenses?

Some congressmen argue that the action excluding Powell was for the two-year life of the 90th Congress, which convened in January. They say another exclusion vote merely would be a reaffirmation of the original action.

But others say the House ban relates only to Powell's election in 1956. To exclude or otherwise punish him if he again is elected, they contend, would amount to a second punishment for the same causes since no new charges have been raised against him.

The general feeling today in the House is that Powell will easily win the special election on April 11 to fill the vacancy in the 18th New York District resulting from the House's refusal to seat him.

A special committee headed by Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., held that Powell met the constitutional qualifications of age, citizenship and residency

and should be seated but punished. But a majority of the House refused to follow its leaders and decided that Alex. Harlem preacher didn't measure up to the moral qualifications it demands of its members. It acted under a provision of the Constitution which says each House of Congress shall be the judge of the qualifications of its members.

The House Tuesday hired its own lawyer to uphold its position that the courts have no jurisdiction over who does or does not qualify for House membership. Bruce Bromley, New York attorney and former judge, was given the job. His fee wasn't disclosed.

# NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—There is, of course, no such thing as a free lunch. The President and Congress can monkey with the system of federal appointments, but perhaps even improve it, if they are never going to succeed in making it popular with the masses.  
Young men who like life in the service—or think they do—know that the best way to get out of the service is to be drafted for their draft board. It has nothing to do with patriotism or lack thereof. The draft, in fact, may enjoy a higher degree of popularity than any other government program with a guaranteed pension and other fringe benefits. It is just that most draftees would rather be somewhere else than Fort Dix or Salton and look forward to the day when they'll be broken in civilian.

**BOUND TO BE INEQUITIES**—That is why there can be no such thing as a perfect Selective Service system. Whatever tinkering is done, there will be inequities of one kind or another. Neither the White House nor the Congress can persuade some youths that they are doing more for their country in uniform than they could do in a lecture hall or at a desk in a government office. And a lot of these guys will be right.  
For example, the proposed lottery system undoubtedly is the fairest possible approach to dealing with the draft. It is fair, but it is not equitable to take the same gamble unless he is a divinely student. Undoubtedly, this would be a better basis for the draft than the current educational background or training because there are so many of them. But it would be a tough break for the talented and/or trained 18-year-old, both Negro and white.  
Nevertheless, the system can stand improvement and President Johnson has made at least a start in this direction.

**BETTER THE YOUNG**—Clearly, it is the better part of logic to draft the younger men first. There is no sense to the present procedure which keeps a youth on tenterhooks until he is 25.

# New Math Challenge Described By Jerome Teachers To Board

**JEROME**—The new approach to the teaching of mathematics provides challenge, a sense of adventure and discovery, both for pupil and teacher.

Mrs. Clubb explained she is involved in teaching in a Science Research Associates on the board and heard a report from Eleanor Bodahl, state special education consultant, who has recently observed the special education classes in Jerome. Miss Bodahl commended the participation in the lunch session by the special education students.

Miss Bodahl recommended that special equipment and supplies for these classes, which she had found greatly lacking, be purchased, and that the children be put on a full-day educational schedule.

Trustees voted to offer a contract to Patricia Astolquist to teach Spanish. Miss Astolquist will be a June graduate of Idaho State University.

Travel requests were granted to a number of teachers desiring to attend various district and regional meetings, and bills totaling \$3,504.68 were allowed.

The board also read a letter from John Snider, secretary of the Idaho Teachers Association, which offered a helpful outlook concerning the financial effect on school districts of the phase-out of public utilities taxes contemplated by these reports.

# Buhl Trustees List Vacancies

BUHL — Three vacancies in the school faculty were listed today by the trustees in their monthly meeting.

The vacancies were created by the resignation of Gladys Shaffer, fourth grade teacher; Marie Watt, home economics teacher; and Ed Petersen, football coach.

Supt. Rex Engleking discussed the Junior high school curriculum as it pertains to the language arts program and recommended a schedule change so that language arts could be taught in block periods of approximately two hours.

This will provide for the teaching of reading, English, spelling and writing by a "room" teacher. He further discussed corrective reading as a part of the senior high school curriculum and recommended that the establishment of a reading laboratory through the use of National Defense Education Act money be approved.

General agreement seemed to prevail with the recommended schedule change.

Mr. Engleking said that Ted Schlemmer, a representative of the Blue Cross Insurance Co., presented an insurance program that would upgrade the present group insurance policy.

Mr. "Big" A. representative of the Prudential Co., presented an insurance program designed for consideration of the board and school personnel to replace the present Blue Cross group insurance plan.

A plan for professional negotiation was presented by Supt. Engleking and April 2 set for discussion of the plan with faculty representatives.

The board hearing was set for May 9 and the trustee election for 1956-57 was set for May 11.

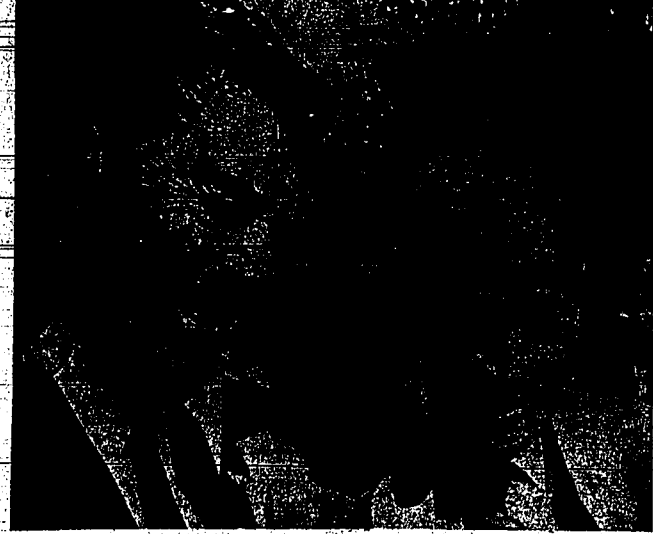
The trustees approved the establishment of a reading laboratory through the use of National Defense Education Act money.

## Kennedy's Body Moved To Memorial

WASHINGTON (AP) — The body of President John F. Kennedy was transferred without ceremony Tuesday night from the temporary grave it has occupied since his assassination in 1963 to its permanent resting place in a granite memorial a few yards away.

The bodies of two children who died before their father, Patrick Bouvier Kennedy and a stillborn infant, were placed near the president's body in the memorial.

The new Kennedy grave, like the old, is on a hillside in Arlington National Cemetery across the Potomac River from Washington.

The torch which has burned with only a few interruptions since the original burial on Nov. 26, 1963, was transferred to the outside Paris for the last time.

# Times Change For Story Of 'Ulysses'

NEW YORK (AP) — Forty-five years ago U.S. Customs officials seized and burned 500 copies of James Joyce's novel "Ulysses" and for a decade afterwards the "na" thing for American tourists to bring home from Paris was a mangled copy of the work now regarded as a major modern classic.

Times changed. In 1934 a federal judge ruled that "Ulysses" — four-letter words and all — could be legally sold in the United States.

Times changed still further and Tuesday night the movie version — four-letter words and erotic scenes intact — opened without censorship, without police interference, without public disturbance in 8 theaters across the United States.

The result? Rave reviews from New York critics and smash box-office grosses.

Threatened official action against the picture in Chicago and Maryland failed to stop it, although Maryland's Board of Censors — the last such state board in the nation — gave the seal of approval only hours before the film opened in Baltimore.

The U.S. District Court in Chicago enjoined that city's officials March 19 from interfering with the showing of the picture.

British censors were much tougher.

They granted "Ulysses" a certificate for public showing in London Tuesday but made 25 cuts. Where language was slashed out, the scene was shown in silhouette — talking but so sound is heard.

At two points the screen goes blank where censors cut out scenes they considered objectionable.

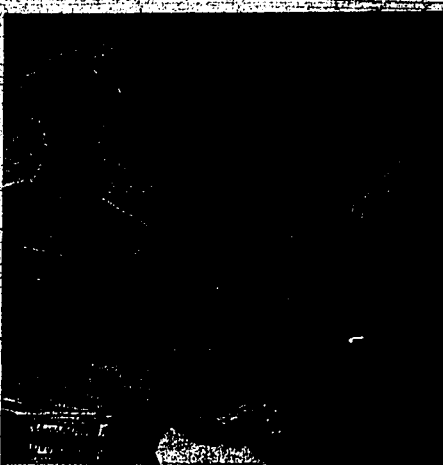
Producers said the missing dialogue and the cut scenes will be quoted or described in program notes handed out to audiences.

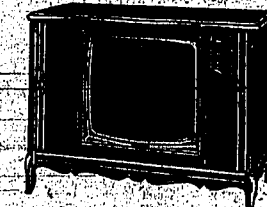
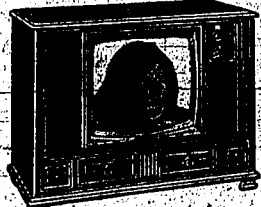

The school buses transport the children to school and a morning bus returns them home.

The special session includes an hour of free, morning snack, regular kindergarten work with crayons, scissors, glue and outdoor play, if possible. All noon are given a warm meal before returning home. The program is successful and praise are the greatest needs of the severely deprived child," Mrs. Nelson stated.

### Y Delegates Okay Plan To Reorganize

A reorganization plan for the Pacific Northwest Area Council, YMCA, was approved by delegates attending a council meeting in Boise recently. Gordon Cox and Curt Bartlett represented the Magic Valley YMCA during the meeting. The new plan will involve local associations more deeply in the planning of future area activities, Mr. Bartlett, executive YMCA director in Twin Falls, said. Council and area board members were elected during the meeting, and Mr. Bartlett was named assistant secretary of the Pacific Northwest Area Board. In other council action, the delegates approved the addition of an eighth qualification for a local YMCA to be eligible for membership in the National Council of YMCAs. This qualification requires affirmation of the group's racial integration, Mr. Bartlett explained. Mr. Cox noted that with each local YMCA being an autonomous unit, the groups in the South have been "proceeding with greater haste to drop discriminatory practices." As of last fall, the number of organizations still operating as segregated groups has dropped to less than 30, from a high of 200 four years ago, he noted. If the proposed change is approved at the National Council meeting in May, these associations still holding out will be placed on probation and have three years in which to comply with the new qualification before being suspended, Mr. Bartlett said. Harold Nussbaum, a member of the Twin Falls Beta Beta Club, was a special observer during the meeting.
