We have a curious double-standard approach to history, he says. We justify our actions in Vietnam by the fact that we are "fighting for freedom" and we defend the status quo against modern revolutionary movements.

WASHINGTON—Former Vice President Nixon had his seventh crisis last week. He arrived in Moscow hoping to have another meeting with Premier Nikita Khrushchev, but no one in the Soviet government would see him.

This put a big crimp in Nixon's Presidential aspirations because he co-existed with another confrontation with the Communists as a method of getting his Re-election nomination drive underway.

Few Americans can forget that historical moment in 1959 when Nixon spent a week in a kitchen in Moscow's Sokolniki Park and debated the merits of the American way of life. This debate, more than anything else, got Nixon the Republican nomination, because the Soviet refusal to see him was "Nixon sure knows how to talk tough to the Russians."

It's no wonder Nixon wanted to return to the scene of his biggest triumph and start a new argument with the present Soviet leaders. But for some reason he was never even asked to do it, and the ex-Vice President found himself being treated as a pariah.

In a recent ceremony at the White House law he awarded a Presidential unit citation to the Third Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Group for "exceptional gallantry" in Vietnam. The President used the occasion to rebuke the press for stressing the bad news rather than the heroism of fighting men. He went on to say allied members of the Aerospace Group had faced enemy fire on the most difficult terrain and not on the White House lawn. This was taken as a rebuke to reporters who spend a lot of their time in the headlines.

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The Doctor Says

Q—What would make me see him. A woman would suggest that you should see a doctor. I have started with migraines attacks, sounds more like the doctor's usual effects. I have clear up after 20 or 30 minutes.

A—The aura of migraine is usually followed by a severe headache over one eye, then vomiting, and finally a 48-hour interval between attacks. Increases and the headache and nausea may be mild or absent.

Q—What side effects can Cafergot for migraine have?

A—The combination of caffeine and ergotamine (tartrate) (tablet or suppository), when taken at the first indication of an attack, usually effects a shortening of the attack. The drug is remarkably free of side effects but should not be taken by anyone who has coronary heart disease, high blood pressure, kidney stones, or is taking a Cafergot-P-B containing phenobarbital as an added ingredient. The phenobarbital is habit-forming.

Q—My husband has severe attacks of migraines. He takes two tablets of Cafergot, but the pain in the right side of his face persists. He has even had a nerve cut but that didn't help.

FUND CUT VIEWED
LEWISTON, Idaho (AP)—Legislative cutback of the North Idaho Children's Home, Lewiston, appropriation from the requested \$148,000 to \$125,000 may mean the home will cut back its program.

Superintendent Edward A. Burling said Wednesday the biennium's appropriation is only \$400 above the current \$122,600. State funds, which are earmarked for salaries only, are \$1,700 short of paying salaries in fiscal 1968. The additional funds were planned for adding a second social worker to the staff.

Operating costs of the institution come from the 10 north Idaho counties, United Crusade funds and private contributions.

Crippled Skier Ready For Plunge

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP) — Twelve years after Jill Kimmont was flying with the wind down a ski slope at Alta, Utah, practicing for the Winter Olympics, a tree crash and a lay in the snow — paralyzed with a broken back.

Today still partially paralyzed, Jill Kimmont is ready for another plunge. She wants to teach the children of the Watts area of Los Angeles, but may have to settle for some other position.

A Los Angeles city health regulation stipulates that a teacher must be able to walk up steps, she says. That is one thing her electric wheelchair can't manage.

Job applications were returned with sympathy but with little encouragement.

Then Dr. Max Rafferty, California school superintendent, stepped into the picture. He assigned Eugene Gonzalez, an assistant superintendent, to act as a one-man placement bureau.

Miss Kimmont, 31, had received several job offers.

A year after her skiing accident Miss Kimmont, former teacher at Bishop, Calif., entered UCLA and graduated with a major in education. Then she entered the University of Washington and earned a teaching certificate.

Now she is a residential bureau manager in a suburban Seattle school district.

When her father died recently Jill and her mother decided to return to Southern California.

"Then, there's that other reason. 'I just want to know if I can work with these kids,' says Jill. 'I think I can.'"

"The color of their skin and my wheel chair make up alike in many ways."

Senator Says Legislators Are Dawdling

Sen. Mary Brooks, R-Carol, charged legislators Wednesday with passing too many "lawyer bills" which would take power away from the people during working hours and suggested that the lawmakers be in night sessions.

She stated from the floor of the Senate Wednesday, "We have had some terrible problems in the state legislature and we have worked hard. Some of you say the people don't understand us—I don't understand us either and I am sitting here."

"We move bills on the calendar for tomorrow just as if we had 30 more tomorrow."

"We have spent a great deal of time raising salaries and giving pensions. Do you realize we are moving into a baby welfare state of our own? We are rapidly taking the power of government away from the people. We have been passing lawyer bills for weeks."

"One third of the legislation in this whole session has to do with lawyers and courts. We have passed bills that are going to make legal business for the next ten years, if not the next century such as irrigation bills, high water-mark bills and court reform bills."

"I would like to suggest we begin night sessions. Why can't we pick up the handle of the axe, suspend the rules and start chopping our way out of this session and then give the people a break and go home?" the senator stated.

U.N. Accused Of Kidnaping Red Newsmen

PANMUNJON, Korea (AP) — The U.N. Command today of kidnaping a Communist newsmen who defected at this truce village and demanded his immediate return.

U.S. Army Col. George E. Charlton, secretary of the U.N. Command, rejected the Red demand and said that Lee So-keun, 44, vice president of the official North Korean Central News Agency, had defected to South Korea of his own initiative.

"The choice of an individual to decide where to live is a basic right of the peoples in all free nations," Charlton told North Korean Col. Han Chuk-kyong.

Lee died from the Armistice Commission hut Wednesday in a car with U.S. Lt. Col. Donald P. Thomson as Communist guards fired at least 40 bullets at them. Charlton protested the guards' action and accused them of "reckless" shooting.

Col. Han retorted that the guards fired because it was an "abnormal" situation in which a Communist newsmen was being abducted.

Wholesale Food Prices Are Lowest Since November, '65

NEW YORK (AP)—Dairywomen are dumping milk in Idaho. A freeze has heavily damaged the peach crop in South Carolina and West Virginia. Heavy rains have left muddy fields in California. And blizzards have disrupted meat and produce shipments in the Northeast.

But it still should be a happy Easter in the supermarket. Wholesale food prices this week plunged the lowest since November 1965.

Ham is lower than a year ago. And egg prices are down again.

Pork prices have been dropping for months, but it may not last much longer. Hog farmers have begun to cut back production as a result of declining prices.

The National Farmers Organization attempted to raise farm prices this past week, dumping milk and buying out supermarket supplies.

In New York, a spokesman for a regional supermarket chain said milk supplies were good.

In Idaho, farmers seek a 26 per cent increase in the amount they receive for their milk. If it were passed on to the housewife, milk prices could rise from 27 cents a quart to 33 or 34 cents.

A weekend freeze destroyed at least half of South Carolina's 122-million peach crop and thinned buds in Georgia. A large part of the crop in West Virginia's eastern Panhandle may have been destroyed.

But a U.S. Department of Agriculture experimental station in Georgia reported that about 30 per cent of the original peach blooms remain — enough for another bumper crop, barring another freeze.

Heavy rains have cut into the navel oranges in California, kept apricot growers from spraying, slowed tomato seeding, delayed the asparagus harvest and left coastal spinach fields too muddy to work.

But there are more fresh fruits and vegetables than there were a year ago when Florida suffered from a severe freeze. The main problem has been getting them to market through the spring snowdrifts in the North.

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Hawk, Dove Factions Viewed In War Scene

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. officials believe the North Vietnamese government has its own "hawk" and "dove" factions.

There were five contacts between the governments topped off by Johnson's letter which asked for U.S. withdrawal from Vietnam and proposed to halt the bombing of North Vietnam.

Johnson's letter, which Hanoi made public Tuesday along with Ho's reply, was delivered to Hanoi by a Vietnamese diplomat in Moscow.

On other occasions, North Vietnamese representatives have refused to receive messages from the United States.

The series reportedly began in part as an effort on the part of Johnson and Secretary of State Dean Rusk to discover the meaning of public statements, generally construed as possible peace feelers, made by North Vietnamese spokesmen shortly after Jan. 1.

While the U.S. messages reportedly were forwarded from Hanoi's mission in Moscow to the North Vietnamese government, they drew no response until Jan. 27, when the United States learned of the meeting.

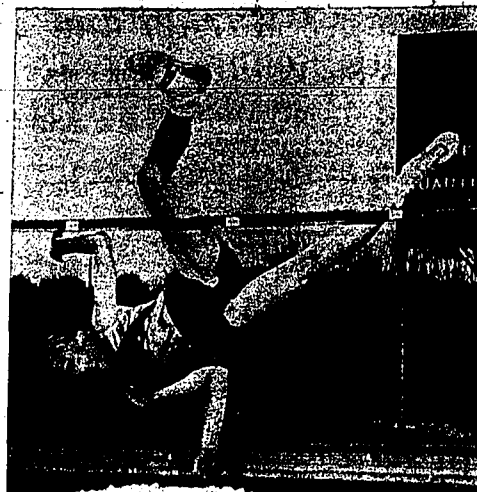

NEW YORK (AP)—The big effects of this century's most notorious slums in the first half of this century. In the first half of this century, an underground art form called jazz was nurtured in Harlem until it bloomed at places like Minton's, and entertainers like Minnie Riperton, and entertainers like Eartha Kitt won their fame first on Harlem's stages.

Tourists who come to New York every year flock to small, collar night clubs in Greenwich Village. But they never hear of the night spots where so many big-name entertainers got their start.

They gaze at photographs of buildings designed by one of America's most successful architects, Stanford White. But no one visits his elegant, yellow brick town houses that still stand in Manhattan.

The reason? All these landmarks—and many more—are in Harlem, the Negro slum area with a reputation that keeps most visitors out of a large section of Manhattan between 95th and 145th streets.

But it wasn't always so. A century ago Harlem was the equivalent of the modern high-income suburb, a spot to which the wealthy retired when they wished to get away from the noise and mud of the city, and much of the architecture re-

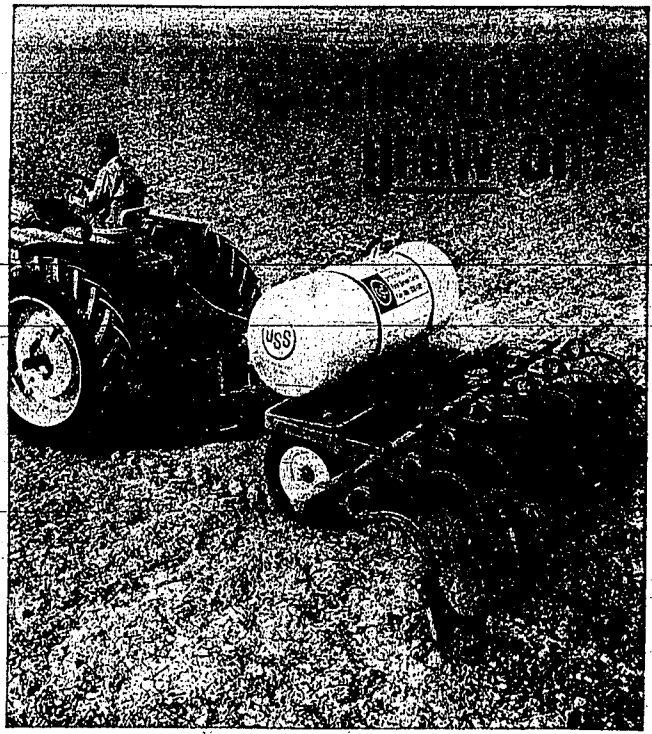
