

DC8 Jet Explodes Into New Orleans Motel Killing 19 Persons

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP)—A Conquest Delta Air Lines DC8 jet exploded into the rear of a luxury motel opposite New Orleans International Airport early today, killing 19 persons including 10 high school students from JUCA, Wis.

The big jet was on a training flight. It carried five pilots and a federal inspector. All died in the flaming crash at the Hilton Inn. The students were on a senior class outing, part of a group of 32 from JUCA High School who had been at the motel since Monday and were scheduled to leave today.

The bodies of nine of the students—all girls—were found huddled together in charred bathrooms of the motel. They had turned on the showers in a futile attempt to escape the holocaust.

The body of a boy student was found outside the building. The jet fell as it was banking sharply to return to the landing strip. It struck two houses, peeled off the top of a truck and began cartwheeling, spewing fuel and blistering the area.

It blew apart when it smashed into a rear corner of the rectangular shaped multimillion-dollar motel. Wreckage was scattered for a hundred yards. The nose of the craft was imbedded in the structure.

The motel erupted in fierce flames after the jet struck. Numerous rooms were destroyed or damaged. At least 10 persons were treated for injuries at a New Orleans hospital.

The surviving students, many hysterical in a daze, were placed in a rooming house. Some were bermed shorts, others were dressed in blankets. Four leaders were busy informing relatives in JUCA, a village of 300 persons in Wisconsin's dairy country, of the tragedy.

Police Capt. Marvin Leonard said the plane "spewed a sea of fuel right to those rooms where those eight kids were staying. That's what killed them. Not the impact from the wreckage."

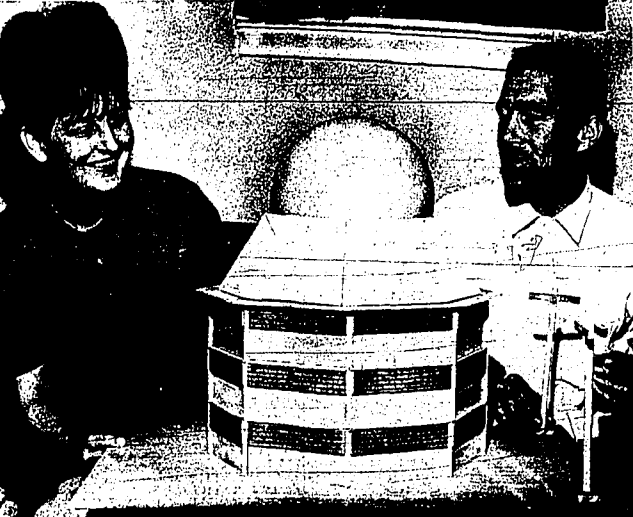

Sun Valley Stage Service Cut Approved

A routine request by the Sun Valley Stages for a reduction in bus service between Sun Valley and Twin Falls was approved Monday by the Idaho Public Utilities Commission.

According to Garth Kirkman, co-owner of the bus line, the firm annually reduces service from two round trips between the two communities to one trip during the slack season at the resort area.

Effective April 4, the PUC authorized the company to operate one round trip and to eliminate its intermediate stop at Jerome. Elimination of the Jerome stop, Mr. Kirkman said, was necessitated by the removal of the firm's Jerome agent in Jerome when the Northside Inn was scheduled for demolition. Lack of business in Jerome was another factor that prompted the request.

Full non-stop service between Sun Valley and Twin Falls will be restored when the resort opens for its summer season, he added.

Area Schools Join Regional "Laboratory"

Three Magic Valley school districts became members of the Northwest Regional Educational Laboratory with the acceptance of their applications by the laboratory's board of directors.

The schools and their superintendents are Dierich School District No. 214, Harold Sturdevant, Hansen School District No. 415, William C. Barard, and Valley School District No. 262, Tom Utterback.

As members of the laboratory, the school districts will participate in the development and demonstration of a variety of activities which will improve education both locally and throughout the Pacific Northwest, a spokesperson for the organization is. The organization is to improve education in the five-state area by adapting and implementing new research and technological developments for the classroom.

The Northwest Regional Educational Laboratory began operation last June as one of 20 such regional organizations established across the U.S.

As a member of the laboratory, a local school district participates in the development and demonstration of a variety of activities which will improve education both locally and throughout the Northwest, a spokesperson said.

"N.W.R.E.L. currently is conducting cooperative activities in four areas—encouraging the use of learning innovations in schools, improving education for culturally different children, studying conditions for effective teaching and improving education in small schools," he said.

The various laboratory programs for the execution of these goals are emphasized in research training workshops for teachers, special preparation for teachers and development and testing of language arts and vocational instructional systems.

The study of conditions for effective teaching include a survey of more than 10,000 teachers on barriers to effective teaching, use of "man-machine" systems such as games and simulation techniques in teaching and particularly good or unusual surroundings for teaching.

Sierra Leone Government Resisted

FREETOWN, Sierra Leone (AP) — Sierra Leone's new military government has shown a notable lack of enthusiasm and stiffening civilian resistance in this West African country.

The ruling National Reformation Council had announced it would name a civilian advisory board, but the council's new chairman, Lt. Col. Andrew Terence Juxon-Smith, 35, said Wednesday it was a "possibility" there would be no civilian advisers.

At least one prominent Freetown resident has turned down an invitation to advise the council of five army officers and two police officials. The new rulers have announced only three congratulatory messages, one of them from Sierra Leone students in East Germany.

When Juxon-Smith rode through Freetown on his arrival from London Wednesday, normal street crowds watched him with no show of emotion.

Many people are chagrined that the army's intervention after the general election March 21 prevented Sierra Leone from becoming the first new African nation to change governments by ballot.

The then army commander Brig. David Lansana, stepped in after the contest for parliamentary seats reportedly ended in a tie between Prime Minister Sir Albert Margai's Sierra Leone People's Party and opposition leader Sir K. M. F. Sirleaf's Peoples Congress.

The official results have not been announced. Sirleaf claims it won more seats. The popular vote was 280,000 for the APC to 240,000 for the SLPP.

Emotional Basis Seen For Illness

BY JOY MILLER
NEW YORK (AP) — Can problems of living in the 1960s really cause an acute surgical emergency such as a perforated omental ulcer? Can guilt feelings produce sore throats? Can words be removed by psychosurgery?

Dr. Heinz E. Lehmann, professor of psychiatry at McGill University, posed these questions Wednesday at a symposium on the emotional basis of illness. He then presented summaries of controlled research studies that added up to "yes" to all his questions.

In view of the mounting evidence inside and outside the laboratory, it is difficult to dispute that there are demonstrable links between human emotions and physiological illness," Lehmann said. He added that the mechanisms involved in this link are not yet clearly understood.

At the symposium some bleak statistics were presented by Dr. Augustus Gibson.

Two-thirds of all Americans go to their family doctors today for ailments that have emotional rather than physical basis.

One-third of the hospital beds in the United States are devoted to the care of the mentally ill.

At any one time about one person in twenty in this country is suffering from some serious mental or nervous disorder; one in ten will at some time be hospitalized for mental illness.

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Martin's Demo Critics Fear Tighter Money

By JOE HALL
WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic critics of William McCaskey Martin Jr., Federal Reserve Board chairman, said today they hope his continuance in office will not bring tighter money later this year.

President Johnson announced Wednesday he was designating Martin, 60, to stay on as chairman until Jan. 30, 1970.

Martin's Democratic opponents on Capitol Hill resigned themselves some time ago to this action.

They said Johnson apparently felt he had no choice in view of Martin's wide reputation as a "sound money man" among U.S. and foreign bankers.

Martin's international standing is particularly important because of the continuing U.S. balance of payments difficulties, these sources said.

The critics said they were hopeful, but not too confident, that Johnson had been able to reach some agreement with Martin that the White House would be consulted in the future before any dramatic tight money moves are made.

They noted that Martin, in his 15 years as head of the Federal Reserve under four presidents, always jealously guarded the independence of his agency.

Some leading Democrats, including Chairman Wright Patman, D-Tex., of the House Banking Committee, Chairman

Russell B. Long, D-La., of the Senate Finance Committee, and Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn., had half expected an upturn in the last years that higher money policy might be reimposed.

Gore said after Wednesday's announcement that "this is an unfortunate reappointment of a man who has demonstrated his supine affinity to special interests."

Senators will not have a chance to vote on the re-designation since it does not require any action by that body.

Martin has always enjoyed strong support from Republicans and from Democratic conservatives. But he will be ineligible for any further term as board chairman or member after 1970 since he has served a full 15-year term.

The Federal Reserve has eased interest rates in recent months as the nation's economy has slowed.

Railroad Union Sets Striking Deadline

CEDAR RAPIDS, Iowa (AP) — Railroads over most of the nation are threatened with a strike of train operating employees this weekend in a dispute over health and welfare benefits, the carriers say they will go to court to prevent a walk-out.

A strike deadline of 12:01 a.m. Saturday was set by the Order of Railroad Conductors and Brakemen, affecting about 18,500 members and 60 to 70 railroads.

Clyde F. Lane, union president, said the carriers plan to sue for their agreement with the union on hospital, medical and insurance benefits Saturday in violation of the Railroad Labor Act.

He said that unless the benefits are continued the conductors and brakemen will quit work on all railroads except a few which have their own health and hospital plans with the union.

The walkout threat was termed "unlawful" by James E. Pendergast, chief negotiator for the carriers in Washington.

Denying that the railroads plan to withdraw the union's benefits, Pendergast expressed confidence that the courts will grant them an injunction "and we will not permit them to carry a strike."

Lane claimed that the carriers are attempting to use the issue to force the union into accepting a new wage-rules contract.

"This is the first time within our knowledge," he added, "that an employer has used the withdrawal of hospital, medical and insurance benefits for employees and their dependents as a club to force them to accept an inferior contract."

Wolfe countered that "under the terms of policy contract, Travelers Insurance announced termination of the policy, giving both management and union 30 days notice of its cancellation."

Executives Fill In For TV Personalities

NEW YORK (AP) — "Good night, David, good night, Chet," is a casualty of the television-radio strike as Huntley talked but Brinkley didn't.

The familiar coast to coast television signoff was conspicuously absent Wednesday night as "Chet" Huntley, defying a strike by the 18,000-member American Federation of Television and Radio Artists, went it alone on his evening news report for the National Broadcasting Co.

David Brinkley, the other half of the NBC news team, stayed away from his microphone in Washington. He refused to cross a picket line.

There appeared to be little likelihood of a settlement before Saturday when union officials and executives of NBC, CBS, ABC and the Mutual Broadcasting System met in Washington at the offices of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service.

The strike over wages and commercial fees, the first national one in AFTRA's 30-year history, was called at 5 a.m. Wednesday in behalf of about 100 local on-the-air newscasters

whose minimums currently exceeded \$11,000 a year. Most network stars, some of whose salaries range upward from \$100,000, supported the strike, as members of AFTRA even though they had reached an agreement last January.

Frank McCoo, another NBC television and radio newsmen well-known for his description of U.S. space shots, also defied the picket lines and broadcast his regular 4 p.m. radio newscast Wednesday.

But missing from the TV screens were other well-known newscasters such as Walter Cronkite of the Columbia Broadcasting System and Peter Jennings of the American Broadcasting Co.

Cronkite was replaced by Arnold Zerner, CBS program administrator. Jennings was replaced by Daryl Griffin, an ABC producer in the special events unit.

NBC newscaster Bill Ryan used his picket sign for support to sign autographs outside the RCA building in Rockefeller Plaza where he marched with strikers.

He said he had joined the union to appear as a guest on other shows and, in his beginning days in Los Angeles, to announce a symphony program.

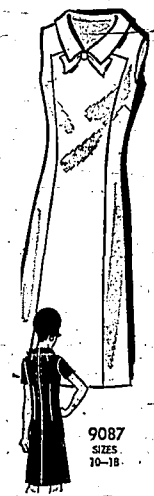

Crocheted Toys Popular For Small Children

SHOSHONE - "Crocheted toys are easy to make, handle and wash," says Mrs. Mary Lou Ruby, extension home economics agent for Lincoln, Blaine and Camas counties. She adds that any woman who likes to crochet can provide a lot of fun for a favorite baby.

Yarns come in such delectable colors that it is a real pleasure to work with them.

Babies adore soft and cuddly crocheted animals, which are easy to make. For example, rabbits, ducks, elephants and cats can be made in single crochet stitches worked in loops to give a soft effect, using a professional or improvised pattern.

The finished animal can be plumped up with cotton fill to make it look fat and sassy. Baby's mother will be able to wash it in soap or detergent safely as often as necessary to keep it safe and sanitary.

The non-crocheter who likes to sew can whip up a surprise for baby out of terry cloth, which costs little and is washable. A zipper, if it always catches, or a stitch or crochet eyes, noses and mouths onto the faces of toy animals, rather than attaching buttons or other hard trim, because anything that can be torn or chewed off presents a hazard to baby.

While on the subject of terry cloth, Mrs. Ruby notes that Esther Nyström, clothing specialist for the University of Idaho Extension Service, says allowance should be made for shrinkage in the first washing. Even though vat dyes are usually used for color - fastness, deep, dark colors should be watched for initial "bleeding." Terry cloth of these colors should be combined in a load with other colored pieces.

Just because dirt doesn't show on dark colors that is no excuse to delay washing. A specialist said. The dirt is there as the wash water will prove.

Problems With Home Dampness Are Discussed

SHOSHONE - Ways to avoid the problems of dampness in a home are suggested in a leaflet just received by Mrs. Mary Lou Ruby, Lincoln - Blaine - Camas County home economics agent.

The information is printed in the publication, "How to Prevent Moisture Damage in Your Home," printed by the agricultural extension service of the University of Idaho, Washington State University and Oregon State University as PNW Bulletin No. 9. Free copies are available at the county agent's office.

"Houses today," the leaflet says, "are insulated and tightly built to keep cold air out and heat in. But by building in this way, the escape of excess moisture is prevented. Older houses were more loosely constructed. Moist air and heat leaked out. There are means of meeting the moisture problems in houses of the new type."

As an example of what to do, Mrs. Ruby said to hold steam from cooking to a minimum by controlling heat and covering pans on the range. A ventilating fan or hood with ducts leading outside will remove much of the moisture. Avoid running steamy water in the kitchen or bath. Less vapor is given off during a tub bath than by a shower. An exhaust fan in the bathroom is helpful.

Exhaust fans in the kitchen and laundry will put the warm moist air out of the area where much of the dampness starts. Portable electric fans will keep air in motion, preventing condensation.

An open window will also improve circulation and bring in fresh air. Even though it is raining, the outdoor air is drier because it is cool and can hold more moisture.

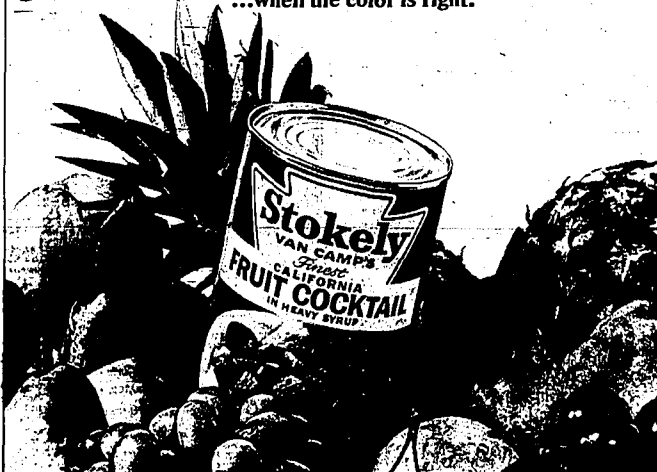

'UNUSUAL' LEAD CAUSES THOUGHT

The Lightner slam double calls for an unusual lead. When the doubler has bid a suit it becomes obvious that he wants one of the other two suits led. When the doubler has not bid at all you must choose between three suits.

East's double of six hearts shows the Lightner slam double at its best. East is certain that his ace of clubs will be worth a trick. South has bid Blackwood and stopped at six when his partner showed one ace. Obviously, South has a club loser.

Can East be sure that his partner will open a spade and not a diamond? The answer is that he can't. Nothing is certain at the bidding table. On the other hand, a review of the bidding shows that West is bound to have a lot of spades and not likely to hold many diamonds.

Then, if West is willing to unhook a spade void is evident, West will get around to that spade opening. Sure enough, East has some anxious moments. West though quite awhile but finally came to the correct conclusion and opened a spade. South went up with the ace and East ruffed. Then East thought a long while about underlining his ace-void of clubs. He would have set the hand two tricks had he done so but East was no hog. He decided to take the sure profit.

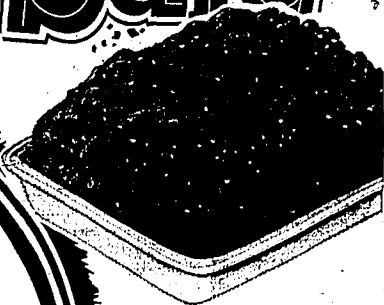
