Shipwrecked Couple Tells Tale Of Three Bad Months

DARWIN, Australia (AP) — After three months shipwrecked on a tropical island and three days at sea on a submerged water-logged raft, Henri Bourdieu told his wife he was sorry but he was going to die.

"I asked him: 'Please wait for me, we must go together, and he said he would try to live one more day,'" Mrs. Bourdieu said today.

By the end of that day — Saturday — the ketch Betty-Jane had rescued the French couple and they were wrecked by a cyclone on the shores of Bathurst Island in late December.

Mrs. Bourdieu said that on Saturday her husband's face looked like that of a dying man while despite his sunburned face he "was just doing with his chin on the water when I saw that miracle," she said.

"The raft's deck was under three feet of water, and two looking men and sea animals sticking out of the water," she said.

The Betty-Jane was en route to Darwin, 75 miles south of where the raft was found.

Mrs. Bourdieu said she saw a smoke-bomb to catch the Betty-Jane's attention, and it nearly scared the boat away.

The crew first thought the raft was an artillery target but they decided to investigate.

From his hospital bed in Darwin, Bourdieu called the three-month ordeal "a foretaste of hell."

His wife said they built the raft when they were certain they were dying of starvation.

"We lived on sea snails for most of the two months after the rescue," she said.

— except for one small kangaroo-shooby-Henri, Mrs. Bourdieu said.

"That was the most wonderful meal ever. We roasted it on a spit and I made walleya tail soup," she said.

"I had to eat a thousand dollars worth of walleya tail because they would have to be hungry like us to appreciate it."

She said three days they spent a mangrove swamp on the island were the most terrible of her life.

For a while they were trapped up to the waist in mud and had to kill and eat animals fighting around them.

"I had to eat a crocodile and hundreds of snakes, sometimes wrapped together like huge worms," she said.

She saw her husband sink in his shoulders in mud and thought he was lost in quick time.

— One night they scooped out a turtle nest and slept in it for warmth.

"After they built the raft, Mrs. Bourdieu wrote a long letter to their two children in France."

"I wanted them to know what had happened to us and to cry all the time I wrote it," she said.

On the raft, chest deep in water when they were dying.

"We never saw an airplane or a boat, we saw nothing but the sea," said Mrs. Bourdieu.

"Then those wonderful meals — to do but wait for the will of God and hope He would be merciful."

"But those wonderful meals — the Betty-Jane came to us and we were aboard."

The couple were trying to sail to France, on a 45-foot yacht.

Bourdieu had bought in Singapore a 40-mile motorboat in fuel, they tried to steer for the island of Timor but ended up 200 miles to the south, shipwrecked in an uninhabited area of Bathurst Island. They didn't know that "Norman" Catholic missionaries was 40 miles away on the other side of the island.

Bourdieu's a former airline pilot and an author of several books, said as soon as they are able, they will try to resume the voyage. The wrecked yacht was not insured, they said.

Strikes And Discontent Amount To Sharp Labor Leadache For Nation

Discontented municipal employees in Philadelphia and New York, the worsening strike of television and radio network newsmen and the ominously paced pace of farmers negotiations all added up today to a labor headache for the nation.

In addition, negotiations between 10 unions and five New York City newspapers seemed to be getting no better.

Most serious of the smoldering labor fires was the threat of a strike by the Teamsters in Washington.

Washington covering 450,000 employees of 12,000 trucking firms were to continue today after bargaining until 2 a. m., had snatched some sleep.

"A strike, if it should occur, would have far-reaching effects on the nation's systems for distributing essentials such as food and fuel."

Teamsters locals throughout the country voted overwhelmingly over the weekend to authorize their leaders at the negotiations to call a strike if and when they feel further talks "useless."

The talks were reportedly down to the main issue: money.

The last report was that the union was 56 cents spread over the three-year contract period.

The industry's last reported counter to that was 37 cents.

Discussions between the nation's three principal television radio networks and the American Federation of Television & Radio Artists stopped cold late Sunday night in Washington.

Despite the opposition of spokesmen for CBS, ABC and NBC that they were willing to keep going, the chief union negotiator, Donald Conway, told his side out and said he had no idea when negotiations would resume.

"I regret greatly the inconvenience to the American public," Conway said.

There was no point in continuing the talks when management's latest offer was inferior to its original one, he said.

Without disclosing details of the management proposal, Conway called it "insulting."

"The union is demanding 37 1/2 cents a year to the year."

Mass Contract Refusal Threat By Idaho Teachers Dissolved

BOISE (AP) — The threat of a mass refusal by Idaho teachers to sign contracts for the next year appeared gone today.

The educators said there may be many who said to return.

Wayne York, executive secretary of the Idaho Education Association, said two factors supported his prediction that the state may be facing its most serious shortage of teachers in recent years.

"Lack of money to provide increased salaries may persuade some teachers to seek jobs in other states, where pay scales are higher."

"Changing all teachers into the public employees retirement system may result in many over 60 deciding that now is the time to quit teaching."

Lack of an adequate retirement program may force teachers to leave their desks as past years, York said.

The recently adopted 1967 Legislature merged the teachers' retirement system with the state's voluntary and enrolled less than half the state's educators — with the compulsory public employees' system.

Teachers past 60 can qualify for retirement under the new plan by paying the same share of contributions for a six-month period, York said.

A request that the Idaho Education Association ask for sanctions against Idaho schools who handed the organization's delegate assembly at its weekend meeting in Boise, which approved the action would have instructed Idaho teachers not to sign contracts for next year and advised educators from other states not to come to Idaho.

Novel Argues Own Case In Investigation

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Vague references to Cuba and investigations highlighted a court appearance today by a former night club operator arrested at the request of a Louisiana syndicate in the assassination of President Kennedy.

Gordon Novel, 29, remained in jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond after his appearance in Columbus municipal court on a fugitive charge filed formally by the police from suburban Gahanna, where he was arrested Saturday night.

Novel was picked up at the request of New Orleans District Atty. Jim Garrison, who wants Novel as a witness in his inquiry into the Kennedy assassination. The fugitive charge stemmed from Novel's alleged involvement in a "commit burglary which — Garrison also filed against Novel."

Novel appeared before municipal Judge Wilbur Shull without a lawyer and began arguing his own case for a few minutes.

"I used to work for Garrison, in fact, I did some of the work in this so-called plot. I've got a lot of charges of my own to make about him," Novel said.

Shull interrupted before Novel could say any more.

It was the first indication that Novel might have been part of the Garrison investigation.

Humphrey Talks Behind Closed Doors

LONDON (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey called at the British Foreign Office today, swinging into the campaign to win closed doors, on American global policies and relaying some of his findings on the situation during the first part of his "listen, answer-and-explain" tour.

Humphrey talked at length with Prime Minister Harold Wilson on his arrival from Rome Sunday night for a three-day visit.

He went first today to the American Embassy in Grosvenor Gardens, where he met with demonstrators carrying signs protesting the war in Vietnam and one man drowned over the bombing in Vietnam.

Embassy staff members crowded the low-ceilinged lobby as the vice president circulated among them.

Selection Of Jury Begins For Trial

NAPLES, Fla. (AP) — Jury selection began today in the murder trial of Dr. Carl Coppolino, accused in the death of his wife.

Defense attorney F. Lee Bailey and prosecutor Frank J. Sica had to persuade jurors to choose from in selecting a panel of 12 plus two alternates. The court made 100 extra available before the morning session began.

Whether a year after death may be the cause of the trial.

The case was shifted from Sarasota, where Carmela Coppolino died in her bed Aug. 18, 1965, after the defense and prosecution agreed that news coverage of the case made it unlikely that an unbiased jury could be seated there.

The trial will be the second in a month to be held on a first-degree murder charge. He was acquitted in Florida in 1962 for the slaying of William Farmer, a former neighbor. Bailey also was the defense attorney.

Indictments in the two states followed a statement to Sarasota authorities by Farmer's wife, who said she was suspicious of the causes of both deaths.

PARIS (AP) — Jacques Chabanol, Gaullist mayor of Bordeaux, today was re-elected president of the National Assembly. This gave supporters of President Charles de Gaulle a victory in their first test in the new National Assembly.

Chabanol won 261 votes as 214 for Gaston Defferre, Socialist mayor of Marseille.

Jury Sworn In For Richard Speck Trial

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — Jury selection men and five women were sworn today for the trial of Richard Speck on charges of murdering eight student nurses. The seating of the jurors, at the start of the seventh week of the proceedings, cleared the way for opening statement and the taking of testimony.

The six rows of jury-like spectator seats were filled to capacity by 50 men and women. Six state policemen wearing holstered pistols, guarded the hallway outside the courtroom in the new Peoria County courthouse. Two uniformed policemen and a policeman searched spectators and newsmen before they were admitted.

Joseph Matusek, father of one of the slain young women, Patricia Matusek, 20, sat in the rear row of spectator benches.

Speck, looking very serious, removed his new glasses as he entered the courtroom. He sat at his counsel's table and watched and listened to the proceedings that could possibly free him, imprison him or send him to death in the electric chair.

Evidence Of Rifle Is Revealed

PUTNAMVILLE, Ind. (AP)—A rifle of the same model as the one named as the gun used in the assassination of President John F. Kennedy was found in a Terre Haute, Ind., hotel three days after Kennedy's slaying.

Frank Riddle, the retired chief, said the rifle, a Remington-Union Model 760, was traced to a salesman from San Antonio, Tex., after 16 years as Terre Haute police chief, now is in charge of custody at the Indiana State Farm in Putnamville.

He said all his information about the rifle was turned over to the Warren Commission and the rifle was taken by Secret Service agents.

The Warren Commission named Lee Harvey Oswald as the slayer of Kennedy in Dallas, Tex., Nov. 22, 1963.

Riddle, who retired Feb. 15 after 16 years as Terre Haute police chief, now is in charge of custody at the Indiana State Farm in Putnamville.

He said investigators learned the salesman was told the weapon would sell for \$2,000. Riddle said the salesman later bought a bus from the same salesman.

Riddle was questioned by a newspaper about the incident following investigation by Jim Young, Communist League member, an expert rifle marksman. He said the salesman registered at the Terre Haute Hotel, New Orleans district House Mov. 25, 1963 and, according to the desk clerk, was carrying a "long package."

Shortly after noon on Nov. 28, he checked out without the package, the former chief related.

The rifle found by a male hotel employee in a rooming house on fingerprints, Riddle said. Two telephone calls from the salesman's room, Nov. 25, were to a store that sold ammunition, Riddle said.

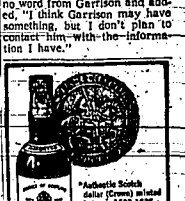

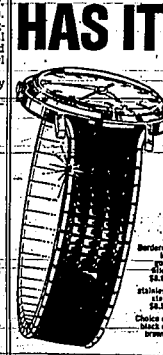

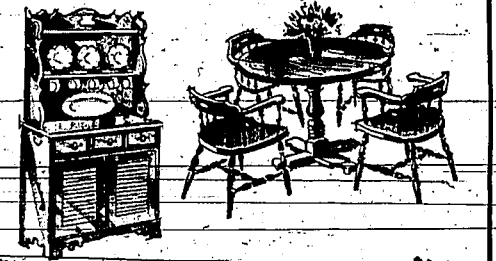

Germans Have New Policy Toward Reds

BONN, Germany (AP) — The West German government has begun a new policy of not being beastly to the Communist rulers of 17 million Germans east of the Elbe River.

It remains to be seen whether the policy will pay off. The new Bonn government has no more affection than its predecessors had for Communist leader Walter Ulbricht. His Berlin wall has long made him the man West Germans made it their duty to hate.

"It's not a question of being nice to people who aren't so nice to themselves," said Willy Brandt, the foreign minister. But Chancellor Kurt Georg Kiesinger's men believe that the way to reunify Germany is to be friendly with the Communist powers that have so far prevented it. There has been a lot of political double-talk in recent speeches, however.

One West German editorialist spoke of "beating around the bush." Editors of the news weekly Der Spiegel accused Kiesinger in an interview of giving a "sphynx-like" answer to the issue. "You have to be a sphynx of options open in politics," Kiesinger replied.

One editor suggested that a majority of legislators secretly favor official recognition of Ulbricht's government and of his border with Poland. These are major Communist demands on West Germany, and many West Germans would consider it reasonable to yield.

Kiesinger denied any such majority exists.

First Weather Watch Is Launched

GENEVA (AP) — The first world weather watch was officially launched today. More than 300 international experts began the biggest-ever study of the elements with satellites, rockets, high-speed telecommunications and a network of weather-watching ships and planes.

The "watch" was organized by the World Meteorological Organization, comprising 100 nations.

The experts are attending the fifth world meteorological congress, which will work out final details.

Farmers will be the main beneficiaries. One goal is accurate and detailed long-range weather forecasts which would assist farm planning. The United States and the Soviet Union will play leading roles in the operation.

Johnson's Wooing Of Latin Diplomats Achieves Goal

By FRANK CORMIER

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's weekend wooing of Latin diplomats in his native Texas seems to have achieved its limited goal—generating increased goodwill for the United States.

Comments from the President's guests—29 Latin-American envoys and their families—were enthusiastic.

"A thrill to come here," said Dr. Rodrigo Jacome, ambassador from Ecuador to the Organization of American States. He termed it a "well-organized weekend" and voiced only one regret—that he did not have more time for sightseeing and other tourist-type activities.

Mrs. Celso Pastor, wife of the ambassador from Peru and sister of that country's president, fairly bubbled as she summed up her feelings: "The most unpleasant weekend I've ever had. The President tried to show us a part of his wonderful state and we're so grateful."

The ambassadors said in a statement upon their departure from Texas that Johnson's initiative in inviting them to the ranch was of "special significance" coming near the April 24 meeting of American chiefs of state Punta del Este, Uruguay. They predicted the forthcoming conference would contribute to the deepening and speeding up of continental solidarity.

The ambassador said that from the moment of their arrival to the moment of departure each had a complete sensation that their visit was like being in their own homes. Some of the diplomats were particularly pleased because they had expected Johnson to try to sell them "a bill of goods." In his statements to them, he never even mentioned the hemisphere summit or, in any other way, put pressure on them, they said.

Funerals Are Held For 9 Senior Girls

JUD WIS. (AP) — The people of Juda raised a plea for privacy today as funerals began for nine girls whose senior class trip ended in death.

Hundreds of persons flocked to the small community Sunday for memorial services which preceded the individual services today and Tuesday.

Memorial services were conducted in the same school gymnasium where the girls were to have received their graduation diplomas in May.

The Rev. Melvin J. Nickel said the senior trip had ended in "the greatest adventure of all, knowing the love of the Father."

The nine girls were among 19 persons killed Thursday when a jet airliner crashed into the motel where they were staying on their pre-graduation trip to New Orleans, La.

In the front row of the high school gymnasium sat the seven surviving girls among the 26 seniors left.

Parents of the victims listened to the services section in the graduation gymnasium at the opposite end of the building.

The services were attended by an estimated 1,500 mourners, five times the population of this farming hamlet in southern Wisconsin.

A television camera watched the Rev. Mr. Nickel as he read with a plea for no more cameras, no more interviews.

Charlie Rated High As Patriotic Soldier

CU CHI, Vietnam — (NIA) — American soldiers have traditionally held their opponents in contempt. In bygone wars the habit was to belittle both the courage and capabilities of the men on the other side.

Charlie to his feet, turned him around, pointed him towards the jungle and prodded him in the back. "You lead!" he said. Charlie did as he was told. Without changing expressions he walked to the front of the lead element, took a 100-foot advantage and walked off towards the jungle.

Two medics treated him in a stony. He accepted passively. He was grumpy but awfully. Somebody asked him if he knew the booby traps were there. He said he did. He had helped put them out the night before.

The question bore no fruit. The prisoner predictably failed to answer. He didn't know why. Charlie was a soldier. And enemy or no, a good one.

But this time around it's different. Here the GIs have tagged the adversary almost sentimentally. They call him Charlie. And they are the first to admit his worth as a soldier is abundant.

Alpha Company, part of the 1st Division, ran into Charlie during a sweep-and-clear operation in the heart of a nearby rain forest.

He was captured in a small hamlet. He was the only young man in the area and he had no identification. There was little doubt as to his loyalties and he was bound and questioned immediately.

And into the woods. Then he sprung the trap. The explosion lifted Charlie right off his feet and dropped him in a heap on the earth. The American took color and when it was apparent no fight was beginning, two GIs crawled up and pulled Charlie back out of the forest.

Charlie said nothing. "Are you alone here?" Still silence. "Are we near your unit?" The prisoner was mum.

When it became clear he was not going to talk, the questioning stopped. And while Alpha Company mopped out its nest, Charlie sat in fixed posture, acting as sophisticated as possible for a bushy haired peasant dressed in tunic and sandals.

The GI's situation was not uncommon. One VC probably meant the presence of others: The question was were the others still lurking around? Or had they beat it for friendlier pastures?

The surrounding terrain gave a possible hint. The hamlet was flanked by a large clearing. Aft of clearing the jungle grew thick as great bricks.

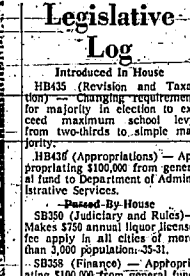

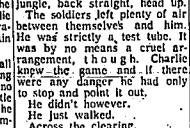
Bloodmobile To Visit Fairfield
