## Planes Hammer Enemy

SAIGON (AP)—U.S. war planes hammered North Vietnam Monday with the heaviest raids in five months as a spokesman disclosed the loss of the 50thth American plane over the Communist North in two years and two months of bombing.

F-4E's, Navy and Marine aircraft flying under the best weather conditions in weeks blasted storage areas, bridges, trucks and cargo barges in 147 missions. It was the heaviest attack since Nov. 4, when 155 F-4E's were flown.

The 50thth plane lost over North Vietnam was downed Sunday and the pilot was listed as missing in action. So far, about 390 American fliers have been killed, captured or are missing over North Vietnam.

A U.S. spokesman reported that most of Monday's raids were in the southern end of North Vietnam, with some F-4E's and Navy aircraft striking at targets in the Red River delta.

The aerial onslaught was supported by B-52's. Fleet warships that hammered coastal targets in North Vietnam, particularly coastal defense sites and supply craft.

The ground war in South Vietnam slumped down, with few enemy contacts reported. A U.S. Army adviser, four South Vietnamese soldiers, and 30 Vietnamese civilians were reported wounded when a U.S. Air Force strike against a Viet Cong force missed the target in Quang Binh Province Monday.

A spokesman said the bombing attack was under investigation.

Improving weather and an apparent decision to step up the raids against the Communist North resulted in the heavy rain Monday, informed U.S. sources said.

## Commission Okays Airport Expansion

Expansion of the Twin Falls Municipal Airport by some 500 feet to provide ground maneuvering space for fire-fighting aircraft has been approved by Twin Falls City Commissioners and U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management officials. E. C. Woods, airport manager, said leveling of a section of land 300 feet deep and 500 feet long at the northwest corner of the present airport facilities.

Pilot James Stevens said the large B-17 or PB-1 aircraft now used by the forest and BLM fire fighting crews to drop fire retardant chemicals.

"The fire in the southfalls last year," Mr. Woods said, "brought out the need for facilities to maneuver the large planes while on the ground and while being loaded."

Cost of the improvement is estimated at \$15,000 which will be shared by the participating agencies, he explained.

With the additional space, the airport manager said, Twin Falls will become an operation center for fire fighting agencies for a radius of 300 to 500 miles. This will be the nearest point for loading operations for the planes on fires throughout southeastern Idaho, Mr. Woods said. Another such center is being set up in Elko, Nev.

Gravel and asphalt will be spread on the new area as soon as possible so the facilities can be ready for the coming fire season, Mr. Woods said.

In addition to Forest Service planes, Charles Reeder, BLM and BLM planes, the local operation of Charles Reeder will also be able to utilize the new facility.

Mr. Woods said the heavy airport use of the past few years has crowded the area allocated to private aircraft and in addition to the fire fighting facilities additional tie-downing facilities will be needed.

## Pilot Rescued After Being Lost 58 Days

YELLOWKNIFE, N. W. T. (AP)—A pilot of a plane that crashed here last week after he had survived 58 days near the Arctic Circle said Monday that when he landed, "I couldn't believe it was Sunday as if he were waiting out there to catch a bus."

Pilot James Stevens said his plane was a little grubby looking, hair long, two months growth on his head, and he was wrapped in "rags over his shoulders."

"I'm sure glad to see you boys," he said the bush pilot told him.

Gayle's small plane had run out of gasoline on Feb. 2 and he set it down on Samandale Lake, 50 miles north of Edmonton, he was rescued Saturday in fairly good health, but he had only 125 pounds of his normal 195 pounds. He will lose five to ten pounds, he said, in a Yellowknife hospital.

## Signing Of Gem Airport Bill Paves Way For Regional Cooperation

BOISE (Special)—Gov. Don Samuelson signed Senate Bill 160 Monday afternoon, providing a means by which counties can cooperate in setting up and operating regional airports.

The bill, which was drawn up, introduced and carried along by Sen. Richard High, R-Twin Falls, was backed strongly by the South Idaho Chamber of Commerce and city businessmen and individuals throughout Magic Valley.

It divides the state into five districts for regional airport purposes and provides that the counties in each of the districts may vote to join in establishing airports.

The vote would be initiated by petition from each of the voting precincts in the districts carrying names of five per cent of the registered voters.

Magic Valley has been particularly interested in the bill since it would allow the Magic Valley area to establish an airport not suitable to handle the jetliners the airline will put in operation in the near future.

The notification brought into Twin Falls was the realization that either Twin Falls would have to moderate and improve its airport, or a more centrally located regional airport would have to be established to serve the entire valley.

Considerable support developed for the regional airport as a means of improving service for the area and insure that Magic Valley would not be bypassed as a stop on the major air transportation routes.

Sen. High, informed Monday that the bill, signed at his home in Twin Falls. "This represents a real opportunity to the area for the hiring of a coordinator for the counties of Magic Valley to coordinate with the major air transportation airport that will provide this area with major air transportation service."

## Plane Search Suspended At Leadore

LEADORE (AP)—Search for this small northwestern Idaho town were bare today of aircraft which have been searching for two Boise men who have been missing in a light airplane for a week.

The search for William A. Lesh, 43, and Lewis B. Holt, 37, both Boise, was suspended Monday night until the two to three feet of new snow in the area has melted.

Director Chet Moulton of the Idaho Aeronautics Department said that the search may be resumed Thursday. The men, both employees of the Idaho Department of Employment, were last seen when they left Salmon last Tuesday in a light twin engine plane bound for Idaho Falls.

Moulton said reports that motorists had seen a two-engine plane flying low over Highway 20 near Leadore last Tuesday were the reason for continuing the search in that area.

The search began last Wednesday, was halted temporarily Friday, and resumed Sunday. Nearly 20 planes scoured the area Monday without success.

## Idaho Water Inventory Is Discussed

BOISE (AP)—Federal and state agencies concerned with water development discussed today coordinating their efforts in making an inventory of Idaho's water resources.

Dr. Paul L. Gentry, director of the State Water Resources Board, met with representatives of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation.

The Bureau of Mines and Geology has been conducting a continuing study of the ground water in the Idaho Legislature instructed the Water Resources Board to conduct a survey of Idaho lands which could possibly be valuable for geothermal energy use.

## Dairy Cows Sold At Gooding

GOODING—Deiry cattle were sold here Tuesday during a special sale in what, according to Leo Spencer, Jerome, NFO manager, called an effort to "balance production with consumption."

Seventeen dairy cows, mostly Holsteins, were sold at Gooding, Golden Valley and Armour. Price on the cattle, which will reportedly be slaughtered, ranged from \$15.80 to \$17.00 per hundredweight.

"Some members Monday expressed skepticism at how the auction will affect the total program aimed at raising milk prices paid to the farmer. One reason, Mr. Spencer said, for the sale, is "to offset the effect of foreign milk products imported."

The cattle reportedly came mostly from the Gooding and Jerome areas and have been attempting to raise prices since a holding action began in 25 states last week.

The cattle sale is the latest in a series of NFO actions aimed at raising milk prices. The NFO dairy farmers and their sympathizers claim they are not getting their fair share of consumer paid milk prices and are attempting to raise their price two cents per quart.

Asked to Mr. Spencer no more sales are scheduled for a week or 10 days while national officials of the group can tally and assess results of the sales across the country.

He noted that some cattle also have been sold at regular weekly auctions throughout the country and NFO officials want time to determine how many cows have been sold in order to plan future action.

The tanker, wrecked March 18 off southwest England, was owned by the American firm of the Union Oil Co. of California, which was registered in Liberia.

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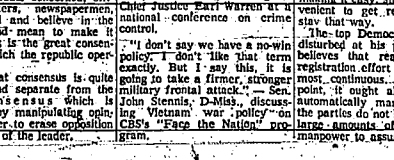
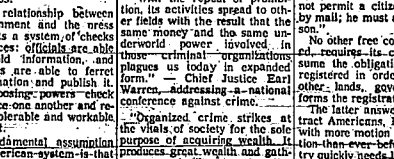
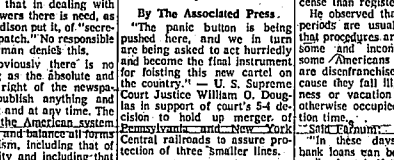
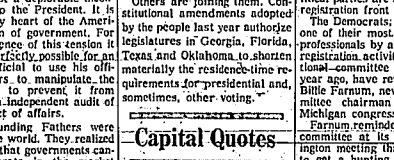
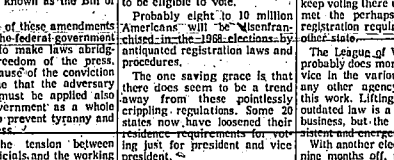
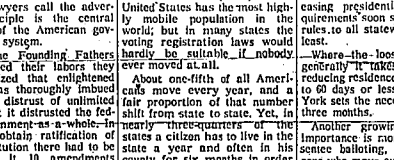
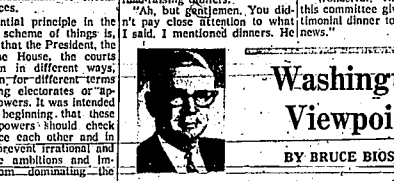
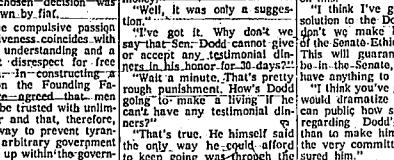
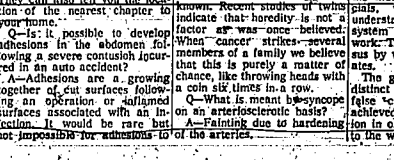
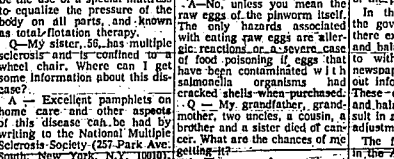
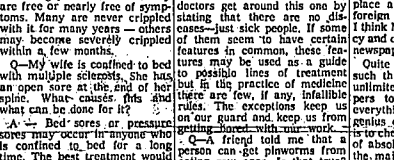
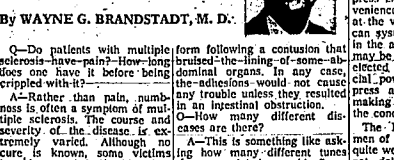
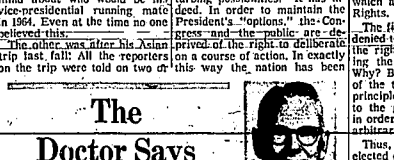
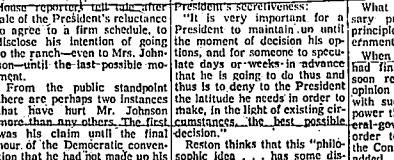
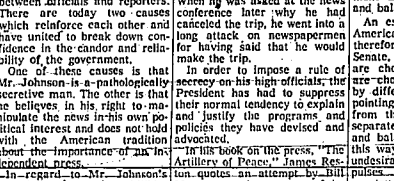
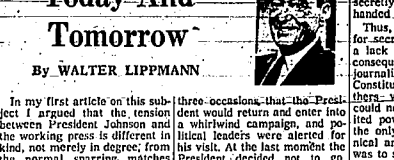
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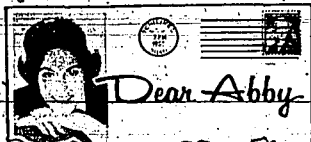
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# Dear Abby

## N. Vietnam, VC's Split Over Action

**NEW YORK (AP)** — North Vietnam and the Viet Cong are split over what to do if the United States halts its bombing of the North.

Photographer, recently returned from Hanoi, reports.

He says the North Vietnamese would see the move as a way to open peace negotiations but that the Viet Cong would consider it as having no effect whatever on stopping the war.

This division and other "significant differences" between the Vietnam war partners were reported by photographer Lee Lockwood in the current issue of Life Magazine and in interviews Monday.

Lockwood based his report on talks with Premier Pham Van Dong of North Vietnam and Nguyen Van Tien, Hanoi representative of the National Liberation Front, political arm of the Viet Cong.

Lockwood, who spent four weeks in North Vietnam in January, said Monday:

"Premier Pham Van Dong said that a halt to the bombings would open the way to negotiations about settling the war."

But Mr. Tien of the Viet Cong was clear and emphatic in saying that a halt to the bombing would have no effect whatever on stopping the war. It was his view that the war could be halted only by direct talks with the National Liberation Front — in other words, the Viet Cong would go on fighting even if the bombings were stopped.

Lockwood also reported differences of opinion on an eventual political settlement and who would negotiate it.

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# Violence Is Way Of Life For Vietnamese

GIA DINH, Vietnam (NEA) — It is mercilessly hot and sun fire sparkle from the—withering flanks of the two nervous combatants.

They eye one another cautiously. One inches with his shoulder. The other grunts and continues to circle slowly for an opening. Suddenly, a blow is struck.

Then another.

And in an instant the wild, screeching warfairs are at each other's throats, flying the striking and punching and biting in a startling flurry of instinctive hatred and savagery.

Hand-to-hand combat? Yes. Men at war? No.

It is simply a Vietnamese cricket fight.

Violence seems a way of life in this nation. Soldiers get in the guerrilla-infested jungles. Others go to the movies. ("Thrills! Blood Runs on the Screen") or, religiously, scan the monthly pulp-and-peek publications.

But for the kids it's cricket inch-long, hard-shelled bug which at times will fight with half their bodies torn away. So lustily do the bugs battle

libers are wavered (them for irritation "fau lait" the kids yell impatiently.

Unfortunately, the audience is often disappointed. Crickets are a bluff-and-buster species. They will rub their forefeet and croak loud enough but often as much that as they will.

As a stimulant, watermelon juice may be injected, but if it falls cowardly bugs always wind up under the head of some child's boot.

Now and then, though, a live-bug pair is matched. And on these occasions the spectators usually assign images for each of the crickets. A common practice is to label one of the bugs a "Vietnamese Soldier" and the other a Communist guerrilla.

Such a fight begins slowly. The Communist soldier—be pushed by the Vietnamese holds its collective breath.

And "CHAO!"... they shout. The Vietnamese soldier has a wing, the antenna on the Communist is broken in half. Three or four legs crack. It will last only a minute or two. No more. The results become obvious when one of the bugs finally backs away, floundering helplessly while the other sounds its shrill boast of victory.

In fact, that good ones will continue aggressive movements even after death. Often, an excited cricket's final living action is to grab the victor and kill it in a vise-like death lock.

Fun and games? Well, to millions of local squatters it is.

The pastime is a deeply serious one for everybody under 12 years old. Most here own at least one bug and some go for dozens of a half dozen or more. Males only, the females are worthless.

The youngsters ho-was the crickets in matchbox cartons or pockets and spend hours of every day preparing them for Friday.

Pride, of course, is contagious. My bug is better than yours!

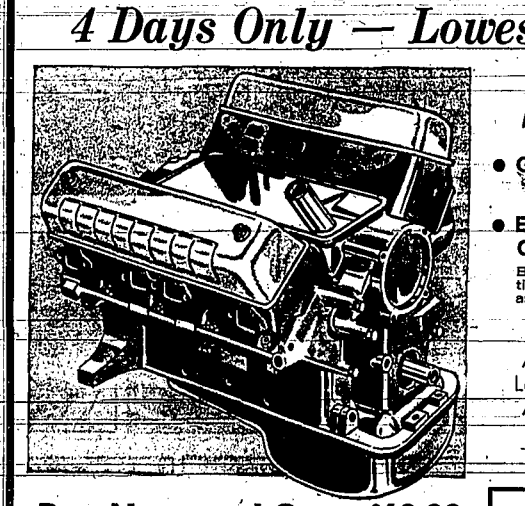

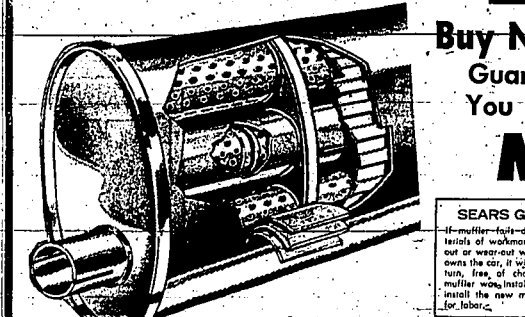
## Cronin Predicts That Orioles Will Face Stiffer Fight For Pennant

BALTIMORE (AP) — American League President Joe Cronin, optimistic and enthusiastic as ever, a week before the start of a season, predicted Monday that the Baltimore Orioles will face a stiff fight to repeat as pennant winners.

## Idahoans Will Determine Two Issues On 1968 General Election Ballot

BOISE (AP) — Idahoans will be asked in 1968 to decide on annual sessions of the legislature, electing or appointing the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and revising the form of constitutional changes. These are among eight constitutional questions that will be on the 1968 general election ballot.

The first — annual sessions of the legislature — makes its debut appearance on the constitutional ballot in 1968. Prior efforts to have the measure put to a vote have been stymied by failure of the Idaho senate to pass the enabling legislation.

To place a constitutional question on the general election ballot, a resolution must be passed by both houses of the legislature with a two-thirds majority.

In four prior attempts, the resolution calling for annual sessions attained the required margin in the house of representatives, but failed in the senate.

According to backers of the plan, off-year sessions would be limited to "local matters" and emergencies and regular affairs of state would be handled in the other.

The second question — whether to continue electing the state superintendent of public instruction — embodies a recommendation of Idaho Gov. Don W. Samuelson.

Legislation enabling the State Board of Education to appoint the superintendent has been passed in anticipation of approval by voters.

Appearing on the ballot for the second time is a change which would allow several articles of the constitution to be amended with a single vote.

Currently each article must be amended by a separate question, even though several articles may deal with the same

subject. Should the question be approved, it would allow all portions of the constitution dealing with one specific subject to be voted upon as a whole.

The plan was rejected in the general election of 1965. A pair of constitutional amendments to facilitate the portion of the judicial reform plan that would amend Samuelson's vote will also be on the 1968 ballot.

They deal with removal and appointment of judges by a seven-member judicial council which was created at this session of the legislature.

Other amendments would allow cities to issue revenue bonds to finance airport construction, limit right of stockholders to vote for directors and remove the present six-day limitation on legislators' salaries.

## Contractors For Defense Are Watched

WASHINGTON (AP) — Profits and prices of defense contractors are coming under increased scrutiny from high government officials as purchase of weapons increases toward \$40 billion a year.

A Washington official said Monday the Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara had initiated what the official termed a "sub rosa study" of contractors' profit levels.

Asked at a news conference later Monday whether "the Defense Department has started a study of the profits of the defense industry in connection with the Vietnam war," McNamara said "No, there is no substance to that whatsoever."

He said, "about five or six years ago we began a study of the profits of the defense industry which we are continuing to carry on in order to relate profit to performance."

Meanwhile, department and agency heads are reviewing procurement and property management programs of some contractors. In a little publicized memorandum last September, President Johnson ordered the examination of practices of contractors which purchase supplies and equipment for which the government must pay or which have government-owned supplies and equipment in their custody.
