## Approval Given Plans For County Legal Building

Preliminary plans for a new legal building at the Twin Falls County Courthouse were approved in a meeting Tuesday by Twin Falls County Commissioners, members of the Courthouse Study Committee and District Judge Theron Ward. Plans prepared by George Ottens, county zoning administrator, will be sent to an architect for final drawing. The new building is to be erected as a separate unit on the north side of the present courthouse, Heber Loughmiller, commission chairman, said. It will measure 140 by 85 feet and will include a courtroom to accommodate two district judges and probate court. The main entrance will be on the Courthouse-South side.

## Buhl Youth's Body Floats To Surface

Volunteers who have been keeping watch on Snake River near Lakes since March 25, Wednesday morning recovered the body of George Willard, 19.

Staff James H. Benham said Warren Von Lindern, Route 3, Buhl, and Raymond Pepper, 2100 S. Main, were the first to see the river-bank about 10:30 a.m. Wednesday when the young man's body floated to the surface as a hole where the dam appeared March 26 at about 7 p.m.

He and another boy were attempting to swim from the bank to a small island just east of the Clear Lakes Bridge when he was drowned. Sheriff Benham had directed volunteers to watch the river hole in the belief the body was lodged there.

He and another Buhl man recovered the body about noon after Mr. Von Lindern and Mr. Pepper succeeded in securing it with a rope.

One of the courtrooms will be designed to accommodate the supreme court bench, first floor district court for occasional sessions.

The one-story building will also include space for a law library, prosecuting attorney, magistrates, clerk's office and a public hearing room.

Mr. Loughmiller said county officials believe now it will be possible to complete the building from a hole where the dam appeared without a bond issue and without a tax increase.

During the first year of county legal officials will be housed on something of a "get out of the way" basis. The new building on the north of the present building may be the first of an entire complex, or the old building eventually torn down and replaced by a new structure.

Only a small amount of parking space at the courthouse will be lost, explained Robert Baljelson, chairman of the Courthouse Study Committee, since the new building will be built on a hill.

Other members of the courthouse study committee attended the Tuesday afternoon meeting were Lloyd Webb, Lloyd Baljelson, R. Rayburn and R. E. Rayburn.

## Nine Persons Perish In Smoky Fire At Cornell University

ITHACA, N.Y. (AP) — Nine persons — eight students and a faculty adviser — died today in a smoky fire that swept a Cornell University residence hall in the pre-dawn hours.

Eleven other persons, eight of them girls, students, suffered from smoke inhalation, but none was considered in serious condition.

The cause of the fire was not determined. Firemen said it apparently began in the basement.

The bodies were discovered in hallways, rooms and in the lobby.

Shells dangling from modern, horizontal pane windows indicated an escape route used by more than a score of the students.

A policeman among the first on the scene said a newsmen there was no fire visible from the outside of the building but "people were hanging out of all the windows."

University President James E. Perkins was in Paris when informed of the tragedy.

"I am shocked beyond belief," he said. "This is a terrible tragedy. My sense of grief has been transmitted to the parents, a list cancelling my commitments and returning home on the earliest plane."

University Provost Dale R. Corson said that in addition to the 31 boys and 12 girls taking part in the six-year experimental course, the building houses three faculty members, a senior counselor and 24 graduate and senior women students.

The freshman students in the experimental course all had achieved nearly perfect scores on entrance tests for admission. Nearly half the students, Corson said, were valedictorians or salutatorians of their high school classes.

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## Johnson Asks Hike In Postal Rates, Federal Pay Scale

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson asked congress today for postal rate increases totaling \$80 million and for a three-step pay increase of some \$2.5 billion for all federal employees and members of the armed forces.

In a special message, Johnson recommended that the cost of the armed forces be given an all mail go to 6 cents and an air mail stamp would cost 9 cents.

The President also called for increases in all other postal rates.

Johnson proposed that the government's 2.5 million civilian employees, and members of the armed forces, receive an average pay increase of 4.5 per cent effective Oct. 1.

An additional \$100 million was called for for postal rate increases Oct. 1, 1968, and Oct. 1, 1969, for civilian workers.

Johnson said that would make federal salaries comparable with those in private industry and "with a similar increase for the armed forces, the cost would be more than \$2.5 billion per year."

The chief executive talked about the desirability of putting federal salaries on a par with private pay as soon as possible.

He added, however, "In view of the fiscal and economic conditions, my advisers inform me that a pay raise of this magnitude would not be prudent."

For that reason, he proposed the three-step increases that would not take full effect until Oct. 1, 1968.

"While inflationary pressures in the economy have lessened in recent months, they have not disappeared," Johnson said. "They could easily recur. We must therefore continue to seek restraint in private wage settlements."

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## School Budget Gets Tentative Approval

School District No. 411 trustees gave tentative approval during a Tuesday night special board meeting to the 1967-68 operating budget and set April 17 as hearing date for the budget. Estimated revenue for that term is down from \$2,876,918 to \$2,823,744.80. The expenditures, however, are down from \$2,800,000 to \$2,740,000, according to Dr. Ernest Ragland, superintendent. "It will be necessary," he said, "to restrict school expenditures in numerous areas next year and the allocations will have to be tailored to fit the income."

The tax levy to be certified for 1967 taxes is expected to be 30 mills for maintenance and operations, 25 mills for bond interest and redemption, and two mills for plant facilities. This total levy is applied to one mill of the 1967 levy. The 1967 levy is expected to be 30, 10 and two mills, respectively, for the three budget categories.

Dr. Ragland pointed out that the 30-mill levy has been the standard operating levy since 1952. Out of the past 12 years, he noted, there have been only two departures from that figure.

From 1963 to 1965 the board of trustees applied a one mill emergency levy which was dropped in 1965 when the legislature passed the sales tax.

Total levies for recent years have been 1962, 44.5 mills; 1963, 45.4 mills; 1964, 44.6 mills; 1965, 44.5 mills; 1966, 44.2 mills, and the projected 1967 levy of 41.2 mills.

The budget hearing will begin at 8 p.m. April 17 at the school administration office when taxpayers of the district can register complaints or approval of the proposed budget.

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## Mayor Daley Wins Election In Chicago

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago voters handed their three-term Mayor Richard J. Daley another four-year lease on his City Hall seat in Tuesday's election.

Daley received 784,163 votes to 772,851 for John P. Wanner in a turnout of about 65 per cent of the city's 1,772,610 voters.

Daley received 72.84 per cent of the votes, but there was a slight increase in the opposition margin of the 50-man City Council.

The lineup before the Feb. 28 primary and Tuesday's runoff included 21 candidates: 10 Democrats, 6 Republicans, 2 Independents, and 1 vacancy.

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## Prize Winning Geneticist Dies

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) — Nobel prize winning geneticist, died today at Robert Long hospital.

Dr. Muller, who won the Nobel prize for medicine in 1946, had been hospitalized several months with a heart condition.

Muller won the Nobel Prize 19 years after he demonstrated that radiation could cause mutations in chromosomes in the heredity controls of the body.

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## Nurse Points Speck Out As Slayer Of 8

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — Miss Corazon Amurao, nurse from the Philippines who survived the mass killing of eight other nurses, identified Richard Speck as the man who entered her bedroom the night before the slaying.

Miss Amurao, a petite, brown-skinned woman of 25, stepped from the witness stand in Circuit Court, walked to the defense table and pointed a finger at Speck.

"This is the man," she said. Prosecutor William Martin had asked her, "can you identify the man who knocked at your bedroom door, carrying a knife?"

There was no reaction from Speck, 25-year-old delinquent on trial on a consolidated indictment accusing him of eight murders.

Miss Amurao was the only survivor of the slayings in a townhouse dormitory on Chicago's South Side, spoke hesitatingly but in a clear, heavily accented voice as William Martin, assistant state attorney, asked routine questions of a biographical nature.

The state has been putting to rest a long-standing case of witnesses, a timetable by which it hopes to link Speck with the slaying of eight nurses, first of the slayings.

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## Hearing Set In Jerome Slaying Case

JEROME — A closed hearing has been set for 11 a.m. Friday on a petition for waiver of juvenile jurisdiction involving a 17-year-old Jerome boy.

The youth is being held in connection with the March 14 slaying of Mrs. Alta Simerly, 47.

On the Friday hearing, Judge Russell Shantz will determine there is sufficient evidence to waive juvenile jurisdiction over the youth and transfer him to district court where a criminal complaint can be filed.

Shantz said the week's James May, Twin Falls, was retained as attorney to represent the youth.

The state is withholding the name of the juvenile pending outcome of the Friday hearing.

RICHFIELD — Richfield voters Tuesday approved with an overwhelming majority a farming fire protection district.

Sixty-five ballots were cast for the measure and two against in balloting at the Richfield 100% Hall.

At present Richfield has only a volunteer fire department for the town area.

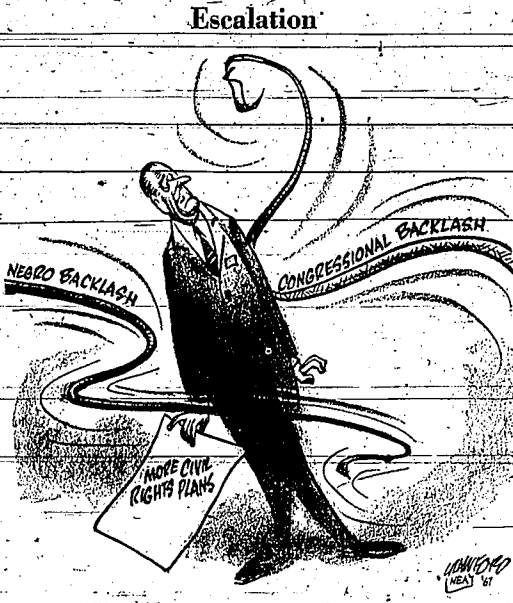

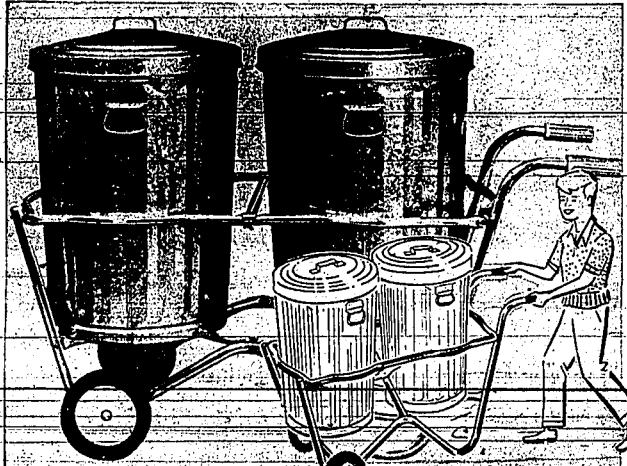

## Time For Living

By ROGERS FRANKLIN

This week I went to the funeral of one of the most dynamic persons I have known. He was dead at age 67 simply because he hadn't taken the time to be well informed.

My friend died of prostate cancer he'd known about for three years. Because he believed removal would affect his personality and character, he refused to submit to an operation.

Why is this function so mysterious that intelligent, adult men fear it?

The prostate gland is a small walnut-sized organ located at the end of the bladder—which secretes a milky type substance. This mixes with the male sperm as it passes from male to female to enhance the mobility of the male sperm and allow it to find female ovum—hence it assists nature in the reproductive cycle.

For the layman, a very real problem exists in the "old wives' tales" which surround this prostate gland.

For many years people believed prostate disease and kidney men resulted from excessive alcohol, venereal disease, or a mispent youth.

The fact is experts do not know what causes prostate enlargement. While this problem is more common among older males, it also affects young and mid-aged men.

Next to skin and lung cancer, prostate cancer is the third most common form of cancer among men who reside in this country.

How do you know if you have prostate trouble? No single clue is significant, because different cancers in many ways. The most common signal is a change in urinary habits.

For example, if a man after many years of restful sleep at night suddenly finds he must get up every night, over a period of a week or so, he could be in for trouble.

If he finds he does not eliminate all his urine without straining or that he voids smaller and smaller amounts, that could be another sign of trouble. Sometimes traces of blood appear in the urine.

Sometimes the signals of prostate trouble are not obvious.

Out of a total increase of \$23,143,184 in the 1967-68 state budget, \$20,493,743 went for education, some 80 persons attending the final Chamber of Commerce-sponsored Legislative Luncheon were told Tuesday.

The information on the cost of education in Idaho, compared to the rest of state expenses, came at Twin Falls County legislators reported to the group on accomplishments of the Legislature which has just adjourned.

Sen. Richard High noted that a group of teachers, mostly from the Idaho Falls and Pocatello areas had traveled to Boise during the final days of the Legislature to complain that the lawmakers weren't being fair to education.

He said they claimed education wasn't getting its fair share of the sales tax, which they say teachers and PTAs were mainly responsible for passing.

"This is just not so," said Sen. High. "The claim that they aren't getting a fair share of the tax monies. He noted that education is getting just about 75 per cent of all money in the general fund budget—\$18,963,583 out of \$159,134,297—and that the only way the state could afford any more money for schools would be to raise taxes.

"That's up to the people, whether they want to pay higher taxes," he declared, "not up to the legislators."

Other legislators present reported on accomplishments of their committees during the session—Rep. Jack Claiborn on the Agriculture and State Affairs Committee, Sen. John Barker on the Administration and Elections Committee, Rep. William

major accomplishments of the insurance committee were setting up over the governor's recommendations are (1) about \$3 million in increased Social Security taxes on state employees and teachers had been overlooked by both ex-Gov. Robert Smylie and Gov. Samuelson in preliminary budgeting, and (2) a sizeable appropriation was made to include Boise College in the state's system of higher education.

Rep. Lanting said the three laws he believes makes the laws more workable. Mrs. Robert Nelson, president of the League of Women Voters of Twin Falls, and William Grange, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Legislative Committee, both lauded the law for its accomplishments.

**Former Dallas Deputy Quits His Position**

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Norman Hooten, the former Dallas deputy sheriff, who says Jack Ruby made many disclosures to him, has resigned his post as a game warden.

He said he resigned under fire from his superior.

J. E. Singleton, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department, said he did not know why Hooten quit.

Hooten was a guard in the Dallas county jail while Ruby was confined there. Ruby killed Lee Harvey Oswald, named by the Warren Commission as the assassin of President John F. Kennedy. Ruby died Jan. 3 of cancer while awaiting a new trial for the Oswald killing.

The latter turned game warden says he is writing a book about what Ruby told him in jail. He also said Ruby wrote a will in jail that left Hooten several small items.

Hooten said Singleton told him he had "no business being involved in writing any book about Jack Ruby or knowing anything about the assassination or anything else."

### 9 Railroads Fined \$127,500 For Delaying U. S. Mail

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Post Office Department has fined nine railroads \$127,500 for delaying mail deliveries with delays imposed in past years because of new laws.

The fines range from \$2,500 against the Chicago & Eastern Illinois to \$55,000 against the New York Central. The latest fine was \$20,000 against the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy.

A Post Office official said the fines were imposed after the department decided to "take a closer look at train schedules in an effort to find out whether late arriving passenger trains were slowing mail deliveries.

The official was unable to say how the current fines compare with those imposed in past years because until Jan. 1, the railroads were fined by regional offices and courts were not involved in Washington. The operation now is handled at Post Office headquarters.

Under the railroad systems carry U.S. mail. Nearly all the mail railroads carry mail on passenger trains. Railroads have complained recently that the disappearance of passenger trains has been the fault of the Post Office.

The railroads charge that the Post Office has been diverting mail from the trains and transferring it to trucks. The lines say that revenue from mail of- fers means the difference between profit and loss in the operation of some passenger trains.

But the Post Office says the railroads have discontinued passenger trains leaving it no alternative but to use highway transportation for mail. The department charges that the railroads in many cases have asked the Post Office to remove mail from trains.

Other lines listed since January are: Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific \$10,000; Louisville & Nashville \$5,000; Missouri Pacific \$15,000; Norfolk & Western, \$10,000; St. Louis-San Francisco \$5,000; and Southern Pacific, \$25,000.

The department has the power to impose fines against railroads when mail-carrying trains do not meet their scheduled times.

In the Burlington case, the Post Office notified the line Feb. 10 that its trains had been arriving late for several months and that the present did not improve within the next four weeks, a fine would be imposed.

The department then made a survey which showed that 21 of 58 Burlington trains carrying mail arrived late an average of 54 percent of the time. The other 37 were late 11 percent of the time.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)—Stockholm hasn't experienced war in almost 160 years, but at first glance you'd think this vibrant capital of the north must have come under bomber attack.

Great holes scar toward the sky. Huge arcas stand level or with buildings partly demolished. Many a graceful old building has vanished. You definitely get a boom-town feeling. Outwardly at least, change is on all sides.

It strikes you with the rhythmic clang of the pile drivers sinking steel shafts for the structures of the future and for the tunnels and overhead roads which will speed traffic in the new Stockholm.

Twenty-five years ago the streets were piled high with cordwood to heat homes cut off from normal coal and oil supplies. Hot water was a luxury once a week. Bicycles and ancient cars fueled by wood gas generators puttered along the roadways.

Today there's an automobile for every four Swedes and the air throbs with traffic.

### Scientist Makes Cancer Virus Study

**By FRANK CAREY**  
PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A St. Louis scientist reported today he may have achieved an "exciting breakthrough" toward solving the riddle as to whether at least some human cancers are caused by viruses.

Dr. Maurice Green of St. Louis said he has developed a technique for detecting cancer virus "ghostly fingerprints" — antibodies which react with virus itself when applied to certain animal cancer tissues.

He said he is confident the technique can be used as the world's first direct test to determine whether one or more common disease viruses — such as those of the common cold, smallpox, chicken pox or warts — may also be among the causes of cancer.

He told about it in a report to a science writers' seminar sponsored by the American Cancer Society and held in St. Louis.

Green said the new virus-testing technique conceivably also could be applied to determining whether certain viruses occurring in animals — such as the SV40 (simian virus) of monkeys — play a role in causing human malignancies.

He gave this background: Apparent validity of the test was demonstrated by using cancer tissue from rodents in which cancers had been experimentally induced by infecting them with human adenoviruses.

These latter viruses — common causes of severe colds and other respiratory illness in man — were shown a few years ago to be the first human viruses known to be capable of producing cancer, at least in newborn rodents. But as yet there is no proof that any of some 31 known adenoviruses can cause cancer in man. The same is true for all other viruses known to cause other diseases in man.

## All-Time High Of 5,557 Viet Cong Deserted Last Month For Allied Side

**By ROBERT TUCKMAN**  
SAIGON (AP) — An all-time high of 5,557 Viet Cong deserted last month, U.S. officials announced today.

The record surge of defectors was nearly double the previous record of 2,917 Viet Cong who deserted in February under the South Vietnamese government's open arms program.

The mounting wave of enemy defections was announced as ground war in South Vietnam opened with a screening force of 40 returned to North Vietnam, curbing U.S. air strikes, after the heaviest raids in five months Monday.

United States forces reported the killing of 75 of the enemy in scattered contacts Tuesday.

Units of the South Korean Capital Command, claimed 41 Viet Cong killed in the nine patrol skirmishes and said there were no Korean casualties.

In an unusual counter-attack, two-man U.S. reconnaissance units spotted and engaged about 12 Viet Cong troops who were acting as a screening force for a larger enemy unit of about 40 men. The two U.S. soldiers, with help from the rest of their patrol, killed nine Viet Cong in a surprise attack 33 miles south of Saigon, according to Capt. Troy Hida, a U.S. spokesman said.

South Vietnamese forces reported killing 33 Viet Cong in the area.

The U.S. Air Force charged that ground fire from the middle of a North Vietnamese village brought down an F-105 Thunderchief Sunday. The loss of the plane, the 30th downed ground war in South Vietnam, had been announced Tuesday.

The followup Air Force announcement apparently was intended to show that the Communist position some of their antiaircraft guns in the center of populated areas and that civilian casualties therefore cannot be avoided.

## Dirksen Confesses He Is Not Presidential Candidate

But in his puckish manner, the Illinois senator — whose recording "Gallant Men" has made his sugary tones as familiar as his silver curls — confessed Tuesday he is not about to become a presidential candidate.

Why?

"Because of sagacity born of experience and knowing what it is to campaign and knowing my own limitations," said Dirksen. The 62-year-old senator was quick to point out that his decision didn't result from a lack of backers.

He told a news conference of a wealthy friend who told him recently, "You ought to run for president, and here's the money to do it."

"It was so big it scared me," said Dirksen.

Just back from a week's vacation in the South, Dirksen said he was surprised by "the amount of Republican talk" he encountered when he journeyed to Miami, Fla., for a speech to the American Textile Manufacturers Institute.

"These people were from all over the Deep South, as well as from New England," he said. "In a day down here I heard a lot of Republican talk."

Who were they talking about for the Republican presidential nomination?

"About me," he said, dipping his head modestly.

As a politician turned entertainer, Dirksen confided that he expects to receive some 10,000 gold record marking the sale of his one million "Gallant Men" album — a melange of patriotic utterances.

He also said he has taped a second album on religious Viet Cong defectors since the war — which he plugged as being "better than the first."

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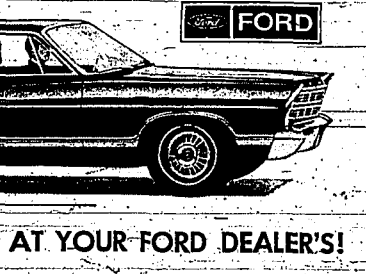

# Horse Owners To Boycott Race Track

NEW YORK (AP) — Race horse owners, irked at the New York State Legislature for failing to approve the money race program for increased purses, refused Tuesday to make entries for Wednesday and Aqueduct canceled its nine-race program with no indication when racing would be resumed.

The state, which receives two-thirds of the 15 per cent pari-mutuel tax, figures to lose between \$250,000 and \$300,000 a day as the result of the shut-down.

Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller had recommended a decrease in the state's share of the bet from 10 to 9.5 per cent with the difference going into increased purses. The State Senate approved the measure but the Assembly let it die in the rules committee Sunday when the legislature adjourned for the year.

In Albany, Rockefeller laid the blame for the owners' action on the backs of Assembly speaker Anthony J. Travia, who headed the committee that pigeonholed the track proposal.

"The Republican governor said he saw no way of allocating additional money to the tracks for bigger purses."

Travia, a Democrat, said the Rockefeller proposal was killed because the average guy couldn't see us giving \$3.5 million to the tracks when there are so many other places it could have gone.

Rockefeller's plan would have allowed the tracks to increase their purses by about \$15,000 a day.

In a meeting Monday some 300 members of the Horsemen's Benevolent Association voted not only to withhold entries but to go back to the original demand of one per cent. Horsemen estimated that one-half of one per cent would mean an increase of \$3.5 million in purses.

Industry officials said the entry box would be open again Wednesday morning to receive entries for Thursday races.

Leuthold, born in Saar, Switzerland, came to the United States at the age of 2. He grew up in Tipton, Iowa, and operated a photo studio in Fort Worth, Tex. He enlisted in the Army in 1898 at the outbreak of the war that led to Cuban independence.

"I liked Cuba, the people, the climate, everything," he explained. "So I remained."

Leuthold married a Cuban and opened a photo studio in Cardenas, Matanzas. He became a Cuban citizen. His wife, Dolores, died in 1938, a year before Fidel Castro's takeover.

### Campaign Fund Survey Shows Most Candidates Spend More Than \$5,000

By ROBERT T. GRAY  
WASHINGTON (AP) — In a hard-fought campaign in northern Virginia's 10th Congressional District, Republican Rep. Joel T. Broyhill, spent \$91,000 in winning re-election. Democratic challenger Olive DuVal spent \$125,000 in a losing effort.

Yet federal law says House candidates can't spend more than \$5,000. Senate candidates are limited to \$25,000.

Where does that put Broyhill and DuVal? Right in the midst of the large number of candidates who have found it hard to run for Congress without breaking the spirit if not the letter of the federal Corrupt Practices Act.

The race between Broyhill and DuVal was typical of hard-fought — and free-spending — 1966 House campaigns in urban areas.

A survey of campaign fund

reports required by law showed today that most candidates spent far more than \$5,000 in House races.

The limit was set in 1925. As time passed and the costs of campaigning rose, loopholes were found in the tough-sounding law.

Thus in 1964, \$193,000 was collected to finance the campaign of Richard L. Ottlinger for a House seat from New York.

A violation of the law? Not really. The federal law doesn't cover committees operating within a single state. The Ottlinger campaign funds were collected by 30 committees.

They didn't have to go far to find contributors. The total collected included \$188,000 parceled out to various committees by the candidate's mother and sister.

The report Ottlinger had to file with the House clerk to satisfy

the federal law showed no contributions or expenditures.

Another loophole is the exemptions allowed by the law.

Personal travel — expenses, meals, postage, printing, telephone and telegraph bills — are among the items not included in the spending limits.

DuVal reported that his unsuccessful campaign cost \$125,000. Of that total \$1,793 was listed under the \$5,000 limit. The remainder was lumped in the exempt category.

Broyhill reported spending \$91,000, all of it in the exempt category.

But the biggest loophole of all has been simply ignoring the law.

Congressional sources say enforcement would be the responsibility of the Department of Justice.

But a department spokesman said it has no intention of

polling Congress without a specific invitation from the House or Senate.

The reports filed in the House showed a broad range of interpretation of the law's provisions as well as widely differing attitudes toward it.

Rep. Bob Wilson of California, chairman of the House Republican Campaign Committee, listed spending of \$23,202 in the category limited to \$5,000.

Hart heard oral arguments and offered comments and questions of his own during a preliminary hearing Tuesday in Powell's legal bid to regain the House seat he held for 25 years.

The federal judge said his decision would be made public Friday morning. Four days before a special election is held to fill the now vacant seat from New York's Harlem district.

Powell was excluded from taking his seat in the 90th Congress by the House on March 1 after a special committee found him guilty of "gross misconduct" in a suit March 9 to regain his seat.

A key issue is whether the courts have jurisdiction to consider administrative actions of the legislative branch of the government.

Bruce Bromley, attorney for the House, told Hart the judge had no more power to order Powell seated than Congress had to tell him how to decide cases.

Bromley said no court anywhere has the authority to direct the way members of Congress vote.

A spokesman said the closure had no political implications.

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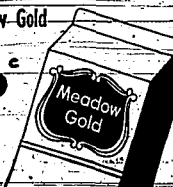
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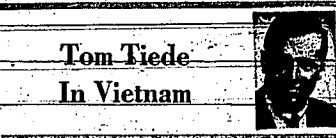
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# Young Medic Looked Like Charlie--But Wasn't

The play of many no-trump contracts takes the form of a race. The defense races to set up its low card tricks, declarer races to collect enough tricks for his contract before the defense can take over.

opening. In general, the best play is to pass. North has 11 high card points but needs a lot of help from his partner if he is going anywhere except down.

East passes and after South responds with one no-trump North raises his partner to game. West sees the queen of spades and South looks over dummy. He spots at least nine potential tricks but he has to knock out two

aces to get them and West has started the race for low card tricks with the queen of spades. South sees that West is going to win the race and collect three spades and two aces. South can count to eight tricks if he attacks hearts. He can count to nine tricks if he attacks diamonds and it turns out that West holds ace and one diamond. He leads to dummy's king, returns a diamond and plays low from his own hand. This play won't work this time because West holds ace-jack-ten. South still has a way to win the race. Do you see it?

It is a play in two suits. He wins the spade in his own hand and leads a diamond toward dummy. If West goes up, South will make four dummy tricks but West plays the ten of the jack. South wins in dummy and abandons the diamond suit in favor of the hearts. He has one diamond and one spade in and will not make three hearts, another spade and three clubs for three tricks he needs to win the race.
