## Tentative Agreement Set To End Television, Radio Strike

NEW YORK (AP) — A tentative settlement to end the 13-day strike of radio and television performers was reached early today, but pickets continued to march outside the network skyscrapers.

Terms of the agreement were still secret and yet to be voted on by the striking members of the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists.

But the industry was being speeded up in an effort to clear the way for the possible telecast of the annual Academy Awards program tonight in Hollywood by the American Broadcasting Co.

ABC said the show was "fully rehearsed" and ready to go on at 10 p.m. "once the go-ahead signal is given by AFTRA."

The union announced this morning that section meetings of its national board would be held in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles to discuss the tentative agreement.

The New York meeting was originally scheduled for 5 p.m. But a short time later AFTRA announced the New York meeting was being moved up to 10 p.m. — apparently a move to expedite a decision on the Oscar program.

The Midwest and Western sections were expected to meet about the same time, a spokesman said.

One union source said it was possible that action taken at the board meetings would lead to removal of pickets so the Academy Award telecast could go on.

Final approval by the strikers might take two days, a spokesman said.

Negotiators for AFTRA and the networks, who had bargaining in shirtnose through the night, shook hands and laughed as they announced the agreement at 6 a.m.

## Prediction

## Trucking Contract Talks Resume While Lockout Hinders Shipping Traffic

WASHINGTON (AP) — Trucking contract talks resumed today while the spreading effects of a nationwide industry lockout hampered shipments of key commodities.

Federal mediators talked with industry representatives, who would trigger a Telex-trucking for firms Saturday in retaliation to scatters Truckers Union (TULU) announced that joint negotiations would resume today.

Informed sources said Trucking Employers Inc., meanwhile, was pressing government officials to invoke an 80-day Taft-Hartley injunction, which would force its own lockout and the Teamsters' strikes.

Washington (AP) — A unique situation raised by the industry's lockout in response to a 30 small Teamsters' strikes themselves did not appear widespread enough to warrant a finding of peril which would trigger a Telex-trucking for firms Saturday in retaliation to scatters Truckers Union (TULU) announced that joint negotiations would resume today.

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An industry alone never before has been subjected to a cent-hour strike on top of their present \$3.35-\$3.00 rate. Last week the margin was cut to 19 cents of freight cost per cent of the nation's trucking. The lockout began over the weekend when Trucking Employers Inc., representing 1,500 companies, filed a charge of unfair labor practices with the National Labor Relations Board. It was said to be 35 cents apart in wages.

## Work Begun To Refurbish Old Perrine Bridge To Carry New City Water Line

It was built by the late B. Perrine in 1908 about 100 yards from the ferry that provided the first main river crossing in this area.

Even after the new high bridge was built, a number of people continued to drive into the canyon via the grade and over the old bridge, probably, Mr. Perrine says, to save money as the high bridge toll was greater than the 25 cents a day toll.

More than 500 feet in length the bridge was built over a period of about two years. It was necessary to pour the concrete in the city of Boise.

Work on the bridge will begin in the next few days. The city of Twin Falls has purchased the bridge and is preparing it for renovation and painting for its future role. ## Land Action Increasing

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. command today reported a sharp increase in ground actions throughout Vietnam with 315 Communist killed in the preceding 24 hours.

The first wave of three B-52 bombers to be based in Thailand arrived there today from Guam after dropping 150,000 pounds of bombs on a suspected Communist camp only 31 miles from Saigon.

Nine more B-52s will move to Utopao Air Base in southern Thailand later this month, cutting their round-trip time for raids on South Vietnam from hours to less than three.

## Humphrey Returns After Turbulent European Tour

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey today returned from a turbulent tour of Europe.

Before government leaders arrayed on the south lawn of the White House, Johnson said Humphrey has been "the authentic voice of America" in the council halls of our European allies.

He said Humphrey had told European leaders: "America is still the daughter of Europe."

Johnson did not directly mention the war in Vietnam, which produced demonstrations that ended in some European riots during the Humphrey tour.

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## Space Agency Criticized In Apollo 1 Fire Report

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — In a massive 3,000-page report, the board said that extensive fire damage in the charred Apollo 1 space shuttle was impossible to pinpoint the exact cause.

It said the most likely source of the blaze was an electrical arc in wiring under the space shuttle's main engine.

In a report, highly critical of space agency and contractor management, the eight-member board said the investigation of the Jan. 27 blaze also revealed "many deficiencies in design, engineering, manufacturing and quality control."

## Pentagon Issues Big Draft Call

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon today issued its biggest draft call of the year, asking for 100,000 more young men in June — all for the Army.

The June call compares with 75,000 in April and 100,000 in January, 10,000 in February, 11,000 in March and 10,000 in April. Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara has said draft cards this year will be considerably more than those of 1966.

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# Mao's Forces Make Attacks Against Liu

**TOKYO (AP)** — Mao Tse-tung's forces, reportedly bolstered by the endorsement of the Chinese Communist party's policy-making body, stepped up their attacks on President Liu Shao-chi today. It accused him of "eight serious crimes" and charged he was a "traitor."

The new attacks against Liu, already denounced as a counter-revolutionary, indicated Mao may be preparing a criminal action against the 68-year-old chief of state.

Commentators in Peking for the Japanese newspaper Yomiuri and the Yugoslav news agency Tanjug reported that the standing committee of the Political Bureau of the party Central Committee had voted 6-2 to back Liu in his struggle to wrest the party and government machinery from Liu and his supporters.

If this information is correct, it could explain the sudden explosion of open attacks against Liu. It also could mean that Premier Chou En-lai, the reputed mediator in China's strife, has swung all the way over to Mao's side.

## Government Reorganizing Done Slowly

**BOISE (AP)** — When Idaho Gov. Don W. Samuelson asked for passage of government reorganization legislation, he cautioned that it should be taken slowly a step at a time.

The 39th Idaho Legislature took time at its week 30th session and the government reorganization legislation finally approved by that body is a far cry from the original package which was presented at the beginning of the session.

What began as a 23 bill package creating a department of administrative services and department of personnel, measure creating an abbreviated department of personnel.

This "housekeeping" department consolidates the so-called "non-productive" functions of state government such as communications, janitorial, and central purchasing.

Pending approval of a constitutional amendment in the 1958 general election, the legislature shortened the ballot by at least one office — that of mines inspector.

Additional duties — and money — for the lieutenant governor were also approved by the legislature.

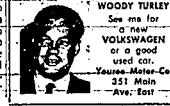

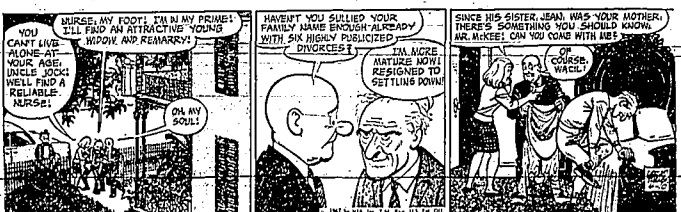

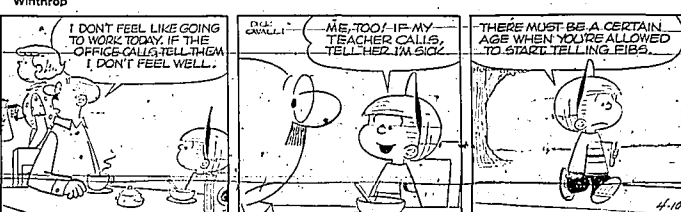
