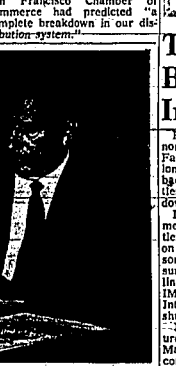
Trucks Hit Roads After Contract Accord With Teamsters Union

WASHINGTON (AP) — Trucks began hauling the nation's goods to market again today after a national contract agreement with the Teamsters Union ended a three-day industry lockout.

The three-year contract including an estimated 50-cent wage hike must be ratified by 450,000 workers in some 12,000 trucking firms—but Teamsters officials urged the industry to immediately "get our people back to work."

An exception, he said, is the Chicago area, where Teamsters are on strike, and the trucking firms are not represented by TEU.

"This has been a real case of collective bargaining. This has been no case of government pressure," said chief federal mediator William E. Simkin, who worked for weeks with 100 mediators Walter Maggioni and Gilbert Selin to win the settlement.

Powell's Lopsided Victory Confronts House With Sticky Problem

NEW YORK (AP) — For the second time in four months, the House of Representatives faces a sticky problem of what to do with Adam Clayton Powell, who won a lopsided election victory in assembly in his Harlem constituency Tuesday.

House Demo Leader Predicts Party Will Propose Changes In Programs

By CARL P. LEUBSDORF WASHINGTON (AP)—A leader of liberal House Democrats predicting today his party soon will propose changes in major administration programs in hopes of heading off Republican innovations.

Rep. James G. O'Hara of Michigan recently elected chairman of the increasingly influential House Democratic Study Group, said in an interview that the GOP strategy of proposing alternatives for existing administration programs can work only if Democrats stand pat.

"Once we propose some changes of our own, the question becomes whether to accept our changes or the Republican ones," O'Hara said.

"The important thing is to make some meaningful changes," he said.

The Democratic Study Group, an informal grouping of liberal Democrats, claims its membership includes about 145 of the party's 275 members, including virtually all Northern Democrats and its primary concern is the New Frontier-Great Society domestic program.

"Our major problem is going to be the same as the leadership's," O'Hara said. "This includes getting funds to carry out programs started in recent years, preventing erosion of past progress and trying to strengthen and build on these programs, he said."

"I don't expect any major new advances, like aid to education and Medicare," O'Hara continued. "Once you accept that, other things are attainable."

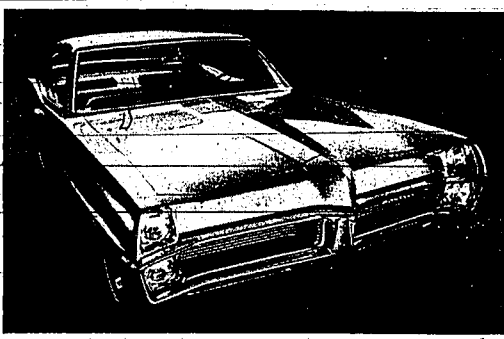

Potato Production Is Goal Of New Farming Development In Oregon

ONTARIO, Ore. (AP)—Production of potatoes by the millions is the goal of a farming development under construction on an eastern Oregon desert plateau.
 Water — 75,000 gallons per minute — will be pumped from the Snake and Malheur rivers, transported through pipe, and then distributed through 100 miles of portable aluminum sprinkling pipes to irrigate the land.
 The project is an undertaking of Solyne Farms, Inc., a subsidiary of Ore-Ida Foods, which in turn is a subsidiary of H. J. Heinz Co. The venture is Heinz' first in production of potatoes.
 More than 8,000 acres of dry land was purchased by Solyne most of it from individuals but some from the federal government. The land had been used only for grazing.
 The soil is similar to that in southern Idaho which has been developed into the most productive potato area in the world.
 Glenn Call, Ore-Ida treasurer, said potato growers in the eastern Oregon-southwestern Idaho area produce an average of 200 sacks of 100 pounds each per acre and first-year yield often exceeds that.
 If the yield is average, Solyne expects the 8,000 acres to produce 2.4 million sacks —

which would mean about one billion potatoes.
 The bulk of the farm's production will be processed into frozen or dried potato products at the Ore-Ida plant in Ontario, center of a farming area which annually produces potatoes on about 12,000 to 14,000 acres.
 Planting and harvesting of the potatoes will be largely mechanical, but Call said a 200-man crew will be employed throughout the summer to move the sprinkler pipes.
 The farm is about eight miles northwest of Ore-Ida's plant in Ontario. It is 400 to 600 feet above the level of the Malheur and Snake rivers, and about 35 miles of underground steel pipe has been installed to carry water to distribution points.
 Pumps will lift the water and put it under pressure.

Congressmen Will Attend Big Air Show

WASHINGTON (AP) — As many as 50 congressmen plan to attend the Paris Air Show next month as expense-paid observers.

Air Force and State Department arrangements to handle a delegation of that size came to light in a cable from the State Department to the U.S. Embassy in Paris May 26-27.

The cable noted that the Air Force, which has primary responsibility, had asked for help in obtaining 60 single rooms in first-class hotels, plus 30 rental cars with English-speaking French drivers.

Counterpart funds are U.S.-owned local foreign currencies which cannot be exchanged for gold or dollars, but which can be used only to meet official U.S. costs within the countries involved.

In addition, the Air Force will provide transatlantic transportation for the congressional observers. The Air Force said it does not yet know how many congressmen will make the trip.

Budget Gets Cold Shoulder From Britons

LONDON (AP) — The British government's no-change budget got a frigid reception from most Britons today, but may give the pound sterling to parity with the dollar for the first time in 13 months.

International money dealers expressed their confidence Tuesday by raising the dollar rate to a fraction below the parity level of \$2.80. Before the start of official dealings on the foreign exchange market today, the pound was being quoted at \$2.8003 in consultations between dealing-houses.

Chancellor of the Exchequer James Callaghan in the blueprint he unveiled Tuesday chose a steady-state policy for the pound sterling and ruled out any relief from the austerity of freeze and squeeze.

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Gov. Don W. Samuelson met Tuesday with Atomic Energy Commissioner Willard E. Johnson in Idaho Falls to discuss the future of the Idaho National Reactor Testing Station.

Johnson spoke in Idaho Falls Tuesday afternoon and said \$50 million dollars worth of facilities, experienced personnel and remoteness for extreme safety testing are an adequate assurance for a sound future of Idaho's NRTS.

He urged a resourceful alertness on the part of community leaders in becoming aware of development opportunities and pursuing them resolutely. He stressed the potential for capitalizing on atomic energy development opportunities through both the newly created Idaho State Atomic Energy Commission as well as a local "business-oriented" organization.

Marking To Aid In Study Of Steelhead Transplant

SALMON—Salmon and steelhead now on their way to the ocean from the upper Salmon River spawning areas have been marked to keep track of migration patterns, rate of travel and return of mature fish. Steelhead smolts now are leaving two ponds on Hayden Creek, a tributary of the Lemhi River here, at the rate of 800 to 1,000 per day. The fish, generally seven inches in size, are being caught in a trap as they leave the ponds and some of them are being marked by clipping two of their fins. More than 7,000 fish have left the ponds to date. Of the total, 3,000 fish have been clipped. An estimated 150,000 young steelhead were placed in the ponds for rearing this year. The number leaving will be less because of a certain amount of mortality during the rearing period. The migration is expected to continue on the East Fork of the Salmon, the Palisadero and main Salmon River near Salmon to permit branding of young salmon now moving downstream to the ocean. Branding of the salmon in the East Fork was begun in 1965 and continued in 1966. The program is being carried on by the Idaho Fish and Game Department and the U. S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries.

Infantryman More Likely To Be Killed On Patrol Duty

By PETER ARNETT
SAIGON (AP)—American infantryman in Vietnam is more likely to be killed or wounded on patrol than in a big battle. In two out of three cases, he is shot by rifle fragments rather than bullets will inflict the wounds.

Even in the big engagements, most allied casualties are taken in the first sudden minutes of action.

The enemy strikes when he figures he has the advantage; retreats when he can from the initial confusion of battle, then fades off as superior American firepower is brought to bear.

The wounds a U.S. soldier receives in Vietnam are remarkably similar in percentage and type to those of World War II.

These conclusions have been reached in casualty surveys conducted by the U.S. Marine Corps and the U.S. 1st Cavalry, Airborne, Division. They are borne out by estimated percentages in some other U.S. outfits in Vietnam.

About 65 per cent of American casualties are inflicted on small units, particularly in a squad from a 12-man squad to a 30-man platoon, the surveys determined.

In the central highlands the sharpened bamboo punji stake, described by one analyst as "the guerrilla's land mine," caused 2.7 per cent of the wounds of the 521st cavalrymen wounded in action from September 1965 to January 1966.

In populated regions along the coast south of the demilitarized zone and around Saigon, use of Communist land mines is increasing. About 5 per cent of all battle casualties in January were inflicted from these mines, which can be difficult to spot and are often fired in the direction of advancing troops.

Land mines, booby traps and other hidden weapons accounted for 18 per cent of all U.S. Marine injuries. Weapons in these categories killed 23 Marines and wounded 2174 in 1966.

Other American units figure they are losing to 18 per cent of all casualties from mines and booby traps, particularly infantry units. Communist War Jones D and C—in an arc—north and northwest of Saigon—against armoured vehicles and trucks.

Casualties from nonmilitary causes are lower in Vietnam than in other wars, according to military doctors, because of the high incidence of the elaborate hygienic measures taken with food.

However, malaria has inflicted a heavy toll on the cavalry. A total of 300 cases have been reported among the troopers since they arrived in September, 1965. Nine have died. The remainder have returned to duty after treatment.

Agency Born Too Late To Aid Disputes

WASHINGTON (AP)—The new Department of Transportation was born too late to get involved in current tracking and railroad labor disputes—but a future place in the U.S. labor scene is likely.

When it comes up, the 12-day-old Cabinet-level agency knows DOT will inherit the task of measuring the impact of a major transportation-related labor dispute, providing information that may determine federal action.

The department is "not going to become another novelty of the government in union disputes," John L. Sweeney, one of six assistant secretaries, says in an interview.

"We'll leave that to the Department of Labor and the Federal Mediation Board."

Instead, said Sweeney, DOT's role in transportation disputes will be to gather facts and find out how much of an impact a strike or threatened strike will make.

Eventually DOT would be able to predict at what stage a national strike could lead to crisis—such as when the local supermarket will run out of food supplies.

Sweeney said that by next year DOT will "be in a position to provide advice to the President and other interested parties on what effects a strike would have."

3 U.S. Pilots Reprimanded For Worst Bombing Mistake Of Vietnam Conflict

SAIGON (AP)—The U.S. Air Force has reprimanded three of its pilots, docked their pay and demoted one for the worst bombing mistake of the Vietnam war. About a dozen such incidents have been reported, with about 500 casualties.

A 7th Air Force board of inquiry cleared a fourth pilot who flew the two-plane strike on March 2. The strike killed 105 Montagnards—mountain tribesmen—and wounded 23 in the village of Lang Ve, in the northwest corner of South Vietnam.

Both the two-seater F4C Phantom dropped antipersonnel cluster bombs which missed the camp and fell into the nearby village. U.S. Special Forces and Montagnard irregulars in the camp fired on the two pilots, assuming they were Communist, but one of the camp's machine guns jammed.

An Air Force spokesman said the target, on which the pilots had been briefed, had identical terrain features as the Lang Ve area. He said steps had been taken to prevent recurrence of such an accident but declined to say what those were, explaining they were classified.

The board of inquiry reported that the tactical air navigation system in one of the Phantoms was not working and said the twilight conditions also contributed to the error.

The names of the pilots were not immediately available. The Air Force also refused to disclose the amount of pay lost and details of the reprimand which normally would affect promotion and future assignment of the officers—until expiration of an appeal period.

The Air Force said the three grounded pilots, who are based in Thailand, would go before a flying evaluation board in the next week for another review of the incident.

Widespread Spring Storm Hits Rockies

Laws To Aid Administration Of Idaho's Natural Resources

By EARLE L. JESTER
BOISE (AP)—More efficient administration of Idaho's natural resources is the goal of laws enacted by the 1967 Legislature which reorganize the Land Department and revise state water laws.

The water law revision is intended to provide an accurate register of all water rights. Legislators were told, during consideration of the bills, that many water rights have been established through usage without any record of them at a government office.

The revision will provide a permanent water rights record. New laws also give the state reclamation engineer more authority over drilling and operation of irrigation wells.

The reorganization of the Land Department abolishes the Office of State Forester and makes the State Land Commissioner also the forester.

The State Land Board—composed of five elected state officials—will control land and forestry work with assistance from a new natural resources advisory board.

The advisory board includes representatives from federal and state agencies and from industry groups which use timber, mineral and grazing resources.

Serving under the state land commissioner will be two assistants. One is assigned to forestry and the other to mineral and grazing resources.

The 1967 Legislature made few changes in Idaho fish and game laws. A new fishing compact between Idaho, Washington and Oregon was approved in a move intended to give Idaho a voice in fixing commercial fishing seasons in streams used by salmon and steelhead which spawn in Idaho.

The Fish and Game Commission was authorized to order an open season on wild turkeys, when flocks have been built up sufficiently.

"It Was Wrong," Says Chaplain Who Was Compelled To Fire At Enemy

 CU CHI, Vietnam (NEA)—The difference between Capt. James Pierce and the rest of the soldiers in his outfit is that he wears a small white cross on his collar, the insignia of a chaplain. But there ends his distinction. The cross gives Jim Pierce no immunities here. He is a man of God, but only a man and thus wears no special armor. He can be frightened. He can be wept. He can err.

"The other day the chaplain did it—three—At least—he says—did. And in the span of a few desperate moments he blamished his conscience with what he determined to be "an act of selfishness."

It happened during the opening minutes of a helicopter combat assault. Pierce, 26, of Memphis, Tenn., was aboard a troop-laden aircraft which was moving into the middle of an enemy sanctuary.

The chaplain was aboard as a matter of course. His duties never ended at the pulpit and he often went along on the field operations.

All was well with the mission until the helicopter prepared to land. Then, 20 feet from touchdown, the ship took several hits in the tail.

The stabilizing propeller shrieked. Passengers were asked to brace as the green bird lurched out of control.

The rear of the plane sank like a rock and the craft pitched slowly, scrambling the cargo in the mael. Chaplain Pierce was thrown out the open door to the muddy earth.

He was cut up on impact but had no time to worry about the wounds. As he looked up he saw the helicopter's great mass falling almost on top of him. It crashed with its rotor blades impaled in soft dirt, inches from the chaplain's head.

"Every man on the chopper was injured. Pierce's legs and hands were lacerated. Other men suffered bumps and abrasions. But, no one was even knocked unconscious.

Enemy gunfire erupted anew. The chaplain saw muzzle flashes from behind a thicket. A GI returned fire. Pierce grabbed a gun. He waited.

Finally the chaplain opened up. It was, of course, purely an act of self-preservation. Then, too, fire-protected two helicopter pilots who darted across an open field toward a rescue vehicle.

Pierce aimed his rifle at the enemy powder flashes. He saw no one. He fired a number of times. He was, as everyone was, terribly afraid. He didn't want to kill, necessarily, but rather to force the enemy to break contact.

"And in a few minutes the firing died away. It ended for everyone except Jim Pierce. As a chaplain, devout Methodist, and a theologian who has serious convictions about war, it didn't end for him. No one here faulted his act. Many praised it."

Yet Jim Pierce regretted it. Afterward he said he was carried away, scared, that he shot

his weapon only because he thought he could help. And surely he did help. The downed pilots made it to safety and the return fire brought enemy activity to a halt without further GI injury. But the chaplain said:

House Votes On Copyright Laws Revise

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House passed 379 to 27 Tuesday the first complete revision of the nation's copyright laws in 53 years after easing a controversial provision relating to jukeboxes.

The House also voted to take out of the bill a provision applying varying degrees of copyright liability to Community Antenna Television systems, leaving CATV under a New York federal court ruling that all of its operations are subject to copyright laws.

The bill is the first general overhaul of the copyright law since 1909 and extends copyright coverage for authors, playwrights, composers and lyricists to lifetime plus 50 years.

The bill, product of 13 years of consideration in the House and Senate, where hearings began last month.

The revised jukebox provision, worked out over the weekend with jukebox operators and performing rights societies, requires each operator to pay an annual \$8 fee for each box to the register of copyrights.

But the provision fails to spell out how the \$4 million kitty from the nation's estimated 500,000 jukeboxes will be divided, but the performing rights societies which represent the writers fail to agree a federal court referee.

There are three principal rights societies—CCA (American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers), BMI (Broadcast Music Inc.) and SESAC Inc.

In dropping CATV from the bill, the House rejected the second effort in two days, this one by Rep. Arch A. Moore Jr., R-W.Va., to override the New York decision and exempt CATV from all copyright liability.

The vote was 57 to 17, a similar move by Rep. Whitener, D-N.C., failed last Thursday, 80 to 24.

Another important decision reversed action taken last Thursday which exempted all educational-instructional television from copyright law, also eliminated from the bill several exemptions.

The exemptions covering such things as face-to-face classroom teaching, religious services and state fairs were restored to the bill, as was the committee's original language limiting educational television extension to direct instructional programs. However, a provision restricting the exemption to systems operating within

a 100-mile radius was dropped. The extension of the copyright period would take effect after 1968. Current copyrights would be extended under the bill from a maximum of 56 years to a maximum of 75 years.

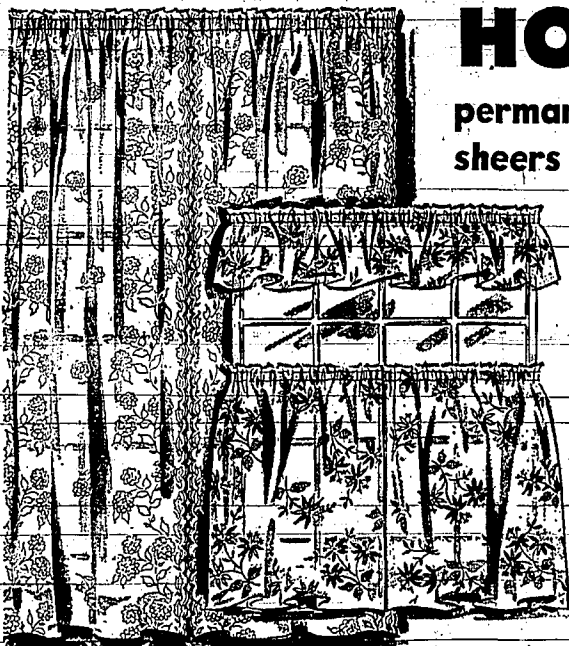

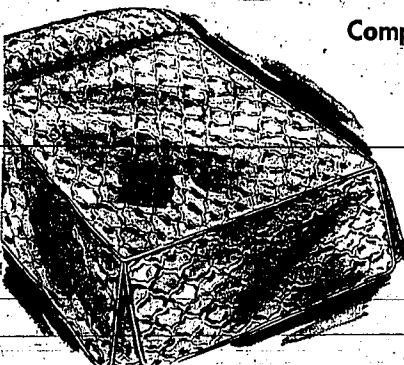

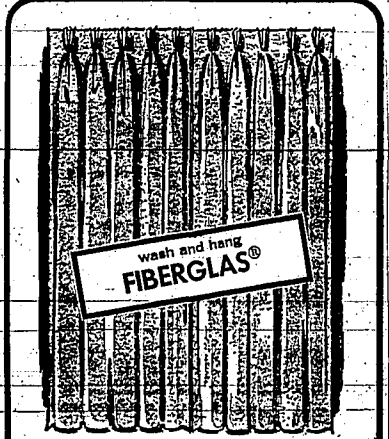

Non-Addictive Pain-Killing Drugs Found

By FRANK CAREY

MIAMI BEACH (AP)—Several scientists reported promising advances Tuesday toward production of non-addictive drugs that have the pain-killing powers of morphine.

Development of several new, potentially useful synthetic oral compounds were described in separate reports to the 133rd national meeting of the American Chemical Society.

Dr. Frank H. Clarke of the Geigy Chemical Corp., Ardrey, N.Y., reported development of an entirely new class of potential morphine substitute drugs, including one that has shown a special promise in preliminary trials in humans.

"It should be emphasized that our clinical results so far are only preliminary," Clarke said. "And we are not yet claiming the drug is non-addictive (in the long run). There have been too many false alarms in the past."

Clarke said the drug is now undergoing special, further evaluation at the U.S. Public Health Service Addiction Research Center at Lexington, Ky., where it is being tried on known addicts.

At the same meeting Dr. Ewington L. May of the National Institutes of Health, Bethesda, Md., reported development of a

Condemned Man Attempts To Take Life

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. (AP)—Aaron Mitchell slashed his left arm in his death row cell Tuesday in an apparently vain effort to escape being the first man executed in California in more than four years.

Mitchell was moved at 5 p.m. from death row to the holding cell outside the prison's green-walled gas chamber where he is scheduled to die at 10 a.m. Wednesday.

Mitchell, 37, an itinerant Negro cotton picker from Arkansas, was condemned for killing

Sacramento policeman in 1963. The transfer from death row to the holding cell came less than four hours after Mitchell had cut himself deeply below the left elbow with a concealed razor blade.

Person officials said there was indication that the attempt would delay the execution.

Mitchell's act was discovered promptly before major bleeding resulted. He was treated in the death row area and was not removed to a hospital.

Mitchell's last legal hope to escape the gas chamber vanished earlier Tuesday when Gov. Ronald Reagan rejected his plea for clemency.

Mitchell has declared that just being a Negro put "two strikes" against him.

In and out of jail since he stole a car when he was 14, Mitchell would be the first man executed in the United States this year and the first in California since January, 1963.

Kimberly To Initiate Model Guidance, Counseling Program

A stark look at the financial status of most small public schools has resulted in the formation of a model guidance and counseling program to be initiated at Kimberly High School next fall.

Because of the financial realities of the public schools, it is not possible to have several school counselors to deal with the interests of each grade level — and therefore, one counselor must serve the entire school enrollment. Particularly in small rural schools such as Kimberly, one counselor is all that is provided by the school budget.

With this view in mind, officials of the Northwest Regional Educational Laboratory have chosen the Kimberly school as the site of a small school guidance program demonstration. The program will be developed over a three-year period and will serve as a model for educators from throughout the entire Pacific Northwest who may be interested in setting up similar programs in their own communities. Complete details of the program are lengthy and as fraught with technical terms as a doctor's thesis. In general, it is based on the concept that guidance is an integral part of the total curriculum. Counseling capacities of teachers are expanded to compensate for the

lack of professional counselors and extra-curricular activities are closely related to the guidance program.

According to Mrs. Ella Hilverda, director of the pilot guidance study, Kimberly was chosen as the site of the model program because of its size, its willingness to participate and the likelihood of continuation of the program at the school. Kimberly's total enrollment is currently 343, with 200 students in the three upper grades.

Unique enthusiasm and support on the part of the community and the school board make it

ideally suited for implementation of a model project, Mrs. Hilverda said.

The Northwest Regional Educational Laboratory attempts to improve education in its area by adapting and implementing new research and technological developments for the classroom. Member schools in Idaho, Alaska, Montana, Oregon and Washington now number 62.

It has been selected by NWREL to develop an exemplary guidance program for small schools. Kimberly High School will become the focus point for the other 61 member schools,

Mrs. Hilverda pointed out. Assisting Mrs. Hilverda with the guidance program next year will be William Parenteau, currently with the employment security program in Twin Falls. Both Mrs. Hilverda and Mr. Parenteau will attend extensive summer workshops in preparation for the project next fall.

Mr. Parenteau has taught school at the secondary level and has been trained as both a teacher and counselor. As a counselor — coordinator of the project — Mrs. Hilverda will assume a much broader role in the school than is typical of

counselors in general. She will function partly as a supervisor of teachers — working to develop confidence on the part of teachers in assuming a major role in the total guidance function — and partly as a counselor of students, working with personal, educational and vocational problems.

According to Dr. Paul Ford, Portland, Ore., head of the research program for small schools, the project is based on the concept that every teacher should become acquainted with children in the counseling relationship. Success of the pro-

gram is dependent upon the guidance function becoming an integral part of nearly every school activity.

The student from a small rural community suffers from a very telling and very real kind of cultural deprivation. The students, for example, have very limited knowledge of occupational rules-at-all-levels and very little information about educational possibilities. One major function of the demonstration guidance program is to help the students become acquainted with a much wider range of vocational and educational information.

and much of this function must necessarily be carried out by the teachers. Dr. Ford commented in a news release. The ultimate purpose of the guidance program is to create conditions in which students can and will assume the responsibilities for seeking out and using information, be it academic and instruction — are interwoven and cannot be separated. "Since the basic needs for security, recognition and acceptance cannot be segregated from the learning process," he continued.

A special guidance room will be included in the floor plan of the new under construction high school building. A portion of this room will be reserved for student group meetings, another for showing of slides and films and another for private guidance sessions, Mrs. Hilverda noted.

This guidance room must of necessity be versatile, pleasant as well as functional. Furniture and room dividers will be movable to accommodate group discussions, committee work, individualized conferences and other purposes.
