10 Tons of Spuds Given Away As 500 Persons Assemble In Rupert

RUPERT—"Absolutely beautiful potatoes" you can't buy spuds like this in the state here—and "Ridiculous" were among the comments heard Wednesday afternoon as more than 500 persons swarmed about trucks loaded with potatoes and filled their containers. At least 25 truckloads of potatoes were distributed to the public free during the giveaway by growers who are demonstrating higher wholesale prices. It was estimated by O'Dell Smith, spokesman for the farmers who say they are not affiliated with any group, that 10 tons of spuds were given away. Most people brought their own containers, although some of the farmers even provided some in which the loose potatoes were placed. A good percentage of the people who assembled in the city block which was filled with trucks took advantage of the opportunity to get the staple without the higher wholesale price. One woman kept declaring, "This is ridiculous—just ridiculous. I remember when my husband sold his potatoes for 25 cents per hundred." Farmers currently are being offered 30 cents per hundred, and they point out this is not enough to cover cost of growing and shipping.

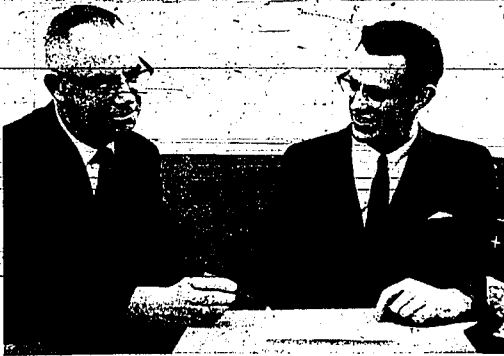

WASHINGTON — Except for a handful of die-hard liberals, Bill Fulbright and Bobby Kennedy, members of Congress are being moved by the upcoming week end festivities described as a manifestation of the anti-war protest against the war in Vietnam.

This is to say, it is difficult to get anyone of more petty importance on Capitol Hill to suggest that the demonstrations will amount to more than a simple display of passionate, boy-meets-girl myopia. The demonstrators are not changing any minds at this late date. Congress generally has hardened its attitude on the war. A majority appears to have concluded in some cases reluctantly, that the United States has no choice but to stay in the war to the end.

A HAWK VOICE — One indication of Congress' mood was a little-noticed amendment to \$12.2 billion Vietnam defense supplemental appropriation bill for 1967 which President Johnson signed under protest. The amendment prevents the Pentagon from carrying out a major reorganization of the Army, Air Force and Air Force Reserve Transport groups. Although the administration has claimed that more flexibility in these matters would contribute to the Armed Forces' efforts, it may be a reflection of Congress' attitude that nothing be done that might reduce the number of troops.

Moreover, there are now so many American troops engaged in Vietnam that Capitol Hill's opposition on the Senate side will be hesitant to take any dovish position which might seem to be undercutting our fighting men. This sort of thing is not quite cricket to legislators who are elected by constituents with sons and brothers in Vietnam.

WASHINGTON (NEA) — If jetting to live in Cuba never know from day to day what will happen to you. You may be called with no crink explanation. Your arrest will come suddenly and without warning. You won't know whether you're free. You won't know how long you're to serve. Your release may come just as suddenly.

This correspondent met the brother day a man who will call Jose Ortega. He had just arrived in the United States. We

Ortega lived in Cuba near San Diego, in a house he built himself near the beach. He was an engineer and had just completed his final examination in night school for a degree. He was 41 years old, married and with a family in Cuba. Then Ortega applied for permission to come to the United States. The night school there upon tore up his final examination without grading it and refused to give him his engineering degree. A short time later, on July 1, 1966, a military man arrived at Ortega's house on a motorcycle. The man brought Ortega, while saying he must go in the army for three years. He was supposed to report at military headquarters the next day wearing a suit and a toothbrush.

Ortega was surprised. Military service was required for men aged 15 to 27. So he went to the military office the next day and was told that he had to go. He said "Go back home; this must be a mistake."

But that night a man in a shabby suit and a guard with a rifle came to his door. It was difficult to say what he was. He said to Ortega, "You have to come with me right now to the Military Committee." This man wanted Ortega to get on the back of his motorcycle and go to Cuba. Ortega, however, said he would go himself. He went immediately to the military headquarters. He asked the man to go home. They would pick him up. They didn't say what they would do with him anything.

Growing Pains

Idaho, between now and 1975, will be suffering growing pains in agriculture, income from livestock, income from mining, personal income, per capita personal income and population.

In fact, barring the dropping of a bomb that will set everything back a few decades, farmers will eliminate everything entirely, things will be rarer for the state.

This is the prediction made in a bulletin "Idaho Will Grow" which has been prepared and released by the University of Idaho. It covers our state for the next 10 years and it made good reading. We will share some of the predictions with you.

Many factors, the booklet relates, place Idaho in a most favorable position for continued agricultural expansion. These include the rapid increase in population and expanding industrialization in the West's coastal cities.

In Idaho irrigation water, fertile soils and favorable climate assure high production of superior quality products. New agricultural enterprises are being destined to become more and more important and this trend is already being felt, the booklet relates.

Everything, for instance, points toward a continued expansion of irrigated land in the next decade. Conservatively it is estimated there will be from 500 to 750 thousand acres of new land coming under irrigation by 1975.

Beef cattle feeding has practically doubled in Idaho within the past few years. Marked increases in beef sheep and dairy products production could continue during the next decade because of many factors: High quality hay, corn for silage, and other forages along with already present possibilities of much greater carrying capacities on Idaho ranges and pastures.

In 1945 Idaho's income from crops and livestock totaled \$250 million and by 1975 this is expected to total more than \$750 million.

The state's income from value added by manufacturing which stood at \$100 million in 1950 will hit more than \$600 million eight years hence.

Personal income by 1975 is expected in the neighborhood of \$2,200 million, up from just over \$400 million in 1947. Per capita personal income should hit about \$2,800 by 1975 against the figure of \$2,200 then and just over \$1,200 in 1947.

The population of the state by 1975 should be in the vicinity of 850,000, the booklet estimates. It has increased over 520,000 since 1947 and stands at about 740,000 today.

In a forward, Ernest W. Hartung, president of the University, points out that the first edition of "Idaho Will Grow" was published in 1958. At that time it was considered by some to be too optimistic in its forecasts.

Actually, President Hartung writes, it is accurate in most instances to be startlingly accurate.

The predictions made in this new edition of the booklet hold much promise for the future.

It cannot help but feel that the experts at the University of Idaho are right.

Putting it on the line, we who live in Idaho are really lucky people. So hang around and enjoy the future. You'll be glad you did.

Views Of Others

BY DEMOCRACY CRUMBLING?

Historian Arnold Toynbee expresses alarm about tensions in the United States created by the Vietnam war. He says they could be the cause of a new world war.

Mr. Toynbee is a distinguished scholar and presumably qualified to make such judgments. But we believe his fear is overdrawn. The war in Vietnam is a sign of a healthy democracy, not a sign of its decay.

One of the things that disturbs Mr. Toynbee is the power in Congress exercised by the administration. But the effect of the election was to diminish that power and there are indications that it will be further diminished in 1968.

Mr. Toynbee's comments suggest that some of the criticism in the United States is in error in Vietnam.

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KIDS' BILLS FIRST

A Phoenix, Ariz., bank has a disquieting word for the parent generation: College kids are better risks than Mom and Dad.

President of the Valley National Bank, Robert M. Golberg, vice president of the Valley National Bank, Phoenix, which has experimented with issuing credit cards to students without parental guarantee of payment.

As President Johnson meets the Latin American presidents in Punta del Este, he will be doing so with the inconvenient and sometimes embarrassing fact that under the American flag in the United States, but he cannot fully commit it.

He is in position to propose — in this case, that our aid to Latin America be increased up to approximately \$15 billion during the year 1967. But under the Constitution, the power to dispose of the President is not to make a final financial pledge at Punta del Este.

The verdict of history, in short, says Prof. Edwin S. Redkey, "is that the failure to determine the substantive content of American foreign policy is a dividend of the fact that the share falling usually, though by no means always, to the President."

There have been several ways of dealing with the problem of divided power which aim to improve the situation where the President negotiates with a foreign government only to have his own Senate reject what he has agreed to advance.

One method has been for the President to use his pre-negotiation power of leadership to build up support for his proposals. He proposed commitment which he has negotiated. This was the method used in the case of the recent consular treaty which was ratified only after it had received great popularity.

Another method of dealing with divided power in international affairs is to appoint as members of the negotiating commission influential leaders of the opposite party in the Senate. This has been the case of the cholera and a retired Republican diplomat instead of a Republican.

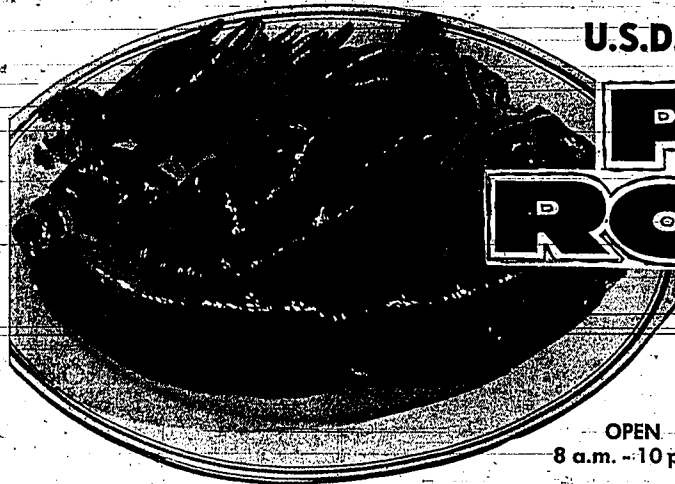

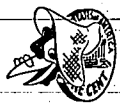

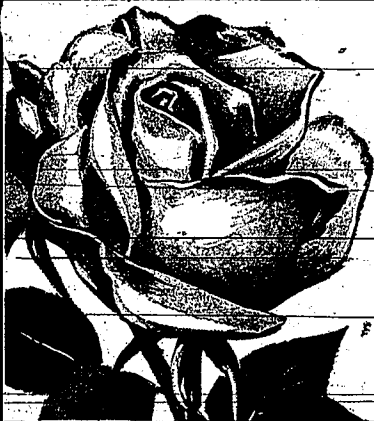

"I mean, you ACTED all right, didn't you?"

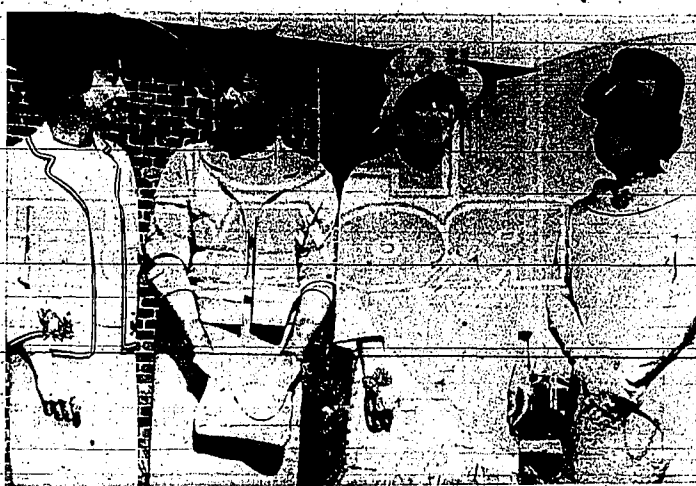
"I think Stu will ever have any faith in me. However, I am not going to tip at him that way any more."
