U.S. Pilots Hit Enemy Steel Firm

SAIGON (AP)—American pilots took advantage of a break in the weather Tuesday afternoon to give North Vietnam its second worst bombing, this year, and to attack showpiece Thai Nguyen steel plant for the 10th time.

The American airmen hit the north. The steel plant was the target of the sudden upsurge indicated that the high command is ready to step up the war in the north immediately when any break in the monsoon weather permits.

American pilots flew only two missions Tuesday. The first was the 147 April 3. The record for the war so far is 175 missions flown on a November day last year.

The Thai Nguyen steel plant and yard were hit by a task force held ready for the break in the weather. When it came, the force of 2405 B-57 bombers and F-4 Phantoms streaked into the Phanomphing-Thai Nguyen triangle which is headed by an iron-ironing-of-radiation-controlled antiradar guns and Soviet-built surface-to-air missiles.

While specially equipped planes pecked off to the antiradar equipment and camouflaged SAM sites, other radars plunged through a hail of fire over the steel plant and rail yards for 25 minutes.

Patrol Keeps Fires Down At Gooding

GOODING—No fires occurred Tuesday night at Gooding, thanks to some 65 men, including officers, who patrolled the city streets throughout the night.

The posse was organized Tuesday after some dozen fires, believed to be the work of arsonists, were reported the past few days. About 150 open housing advocates attempted to march in defiance of a court order again Tuesday night but their demonstration was marked by fire.

"We feel that the patrolling definitely kept the fires down," a police spokesman said while patrolling until we either are rid of him or catch him," Sheriff James said.

Three fires occurred Monday and Sunday nights, including Lutheran church, athletic field and a vacant farmhouse.

No report has yet been received from Boise where chemically treated fire glass pieces were sent to be analyzed. The pieces were found Tuesday at the Lutheran church basement where a fire was discovered Tuesday morning smoldering in a cabinet.

A wooden bridge over an irrigation ditch was burned Tuesday night. The bridge burned one mile north of Jerome, but the fire was not believed connected with the fires in Gooding, according to Don Rupert, fire chief of the Jerome Fire Department.

He said weeds had been burned in the area earlier Tuesday and it was assumed the sparks had caused the bridge to burn. One end of the structure was destroyed. It will be rebuilt by the Good Roads district.

Was It Rain? Moisture At Murtaugh Is Salty

MURTAUGH—Anything and everything that was exposed to the weather in the Murtaugh area Tuesday afternoon was liberally plastered with what appeared to be a thin coating of muddy water.

A high gusty wind prior to rain stirred up dust and fertilizer on worked farm lands to the west and northwest of the area and the rain brought the combined mixture back to earth in a veritable splattering on everything exposed.

The theory that fertilizer could be the main ingredient of the substance which coated the cars and windows in the area most conspicuously came when one person noted that it tasted salty.

Needless to say, plenty of elbow grease will be needed to clear the muck from windows of cars and homes.

Thailand Has Bid For U.S. Air Missiles

WASHINGTON (AP)—Thailand has bid for U.S.-made surface-to-air missiles amid warnings at the SEATO foreign ministers meeting that Communist subversion is continuing in Southeast Asia.

Foreign Minister Thanat Khoman of Thailand told the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization Tuesday that since his nation has become involved in the Vietnam war, "some of our people should be protected by missiles."

Thanat and Jesus Vargas of the Philippines, SEATO secretary-general, joined in espousing the proposal.

Vargas, said Communist China, though wracked by internal political problems, still continues subversive activities in Thailand and the Philippines.

Senator Sees No Change In Voting

WASHINGTON (AP)—Foes of the presidential campaign financing plan said today they knew of no defections in their ranks despite an effort of Sen. Russell Long, D-La., to revise the scheme.

Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn., who last fall getting the Senate vote 48-47 in getting the Senate to pass the plan, told a reporter he had no plan of any changes in the vote.

Konrad Adenauer, Former West German Chancellor, Is Dead At Age Of 91

KONRAD ADENAUER, 91, died in his sleep today, plunging into mourning the nation he built up to Germany's postwar greatness. A state funeral will be held, and it is expected to draw many of the world's leading statesmen to attend, said a spokesman in Washington.

"His dauntless spirit will live on in the Atlantic partnership which he did so much to create," the spokesman said.

The funeral will be Tuesday afternoon at the Cologne Cathedral.

Former chancellor was stricken a week ago with influenza and bronchitis. His condition steadily weakened as complications set in.

The family was at his bedside in the three-story home in Muenster, a village near this capital, when Konrading was in high personal esteem and together they worked for reconciliation between their two countries, which had been enemies for centuries.

White Adenauer was chancellor, the Communists fiercely attacked him for his hard line in the cold war. Premier Nikita Khrushchev frequently singled him out as a warmonger.

One of the chief goals of Adenauer's policy was the reunification of West and East Germany, split as a result of the war. The Soviet Union balked at this, insisting that East Germany remain part of the Communist world.

Johnson Will Attend Rites For Adenauer

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson will attend the funeral of former Chancellor Konrad Adenauer of Germany, the White House announced today.

Johnson and Adenauer had known one another since the early 1950's and that the president had a high regard for the statesman, the White House said.

George Christian said details are not yet available on the presidential trip to Germany, since information on the date of the funeral has not yet been obtained. He said the president would be accompanied by a delegation of three or four other persons. He said he did not know whether Mrs. Johnson would go along.

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Moon Probe Coasts Toward Soft Landing

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Surveyor 3, equipped with a television camera and a small digging device, was reported performing beautifully as it coasted toward a soft landing today on the moon. "Everything's going fine," said a spokesman for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. The touchdown on the lunar Sea of Storms was expected at 7:04 p.m. EST. Scientists at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory reported Tuesday night that the spacecraft was maintaining both attitude and position for a proper landing. They said all systems aboard the three-legged probe were operating smoothly.

About five hours from the expected touchdown, the craft's speed is slated to drop to 2,058 miles per hour as Surveyor will accelerate to about 5,000 miles per hour. Then the firing of its main retrorocket is scheduled to slow it to 285 m.p.h. for the crucial landing phase.

Radar signals bounced from the moon back to the spacecraft will control the burning of three small gas jets which are designed to reduce Surveyor's descent as the altitude from the lunar surface decreases.

Scientists expect that about 13 days from now, as well as the probe will have slowed to approximately 3 m.p.h. and will be shut-off and three jets will be shut-off and Surveyor is to free-fall to the moon.

Surveyor launched Monday from Cape Kennedy, Fla., has the mission of scouting astronaut landing sites.

The prosecuting attorney said the jury session may last several weeks.

While a grand jury is in session, all criminal cases must be returned to the grand jury.

The savings and loan company had offices in Boise, Twin Falls and Pocatello. Approximately 28,000 shareholders had \$20 million invested in the company. It was founded in 1906 and the pilot of one was captured.

Effectiveness Of MIG Jets Is Viewed

WASHINGTON (AP)—A top defense official acknowledges that North Vietnam's MIG jet fighters and anti-aircraft missiles have cut down the effectiveness of U.S. bombing attacks, even though they have destroyed relatively few American planes.

Dr. John Foster, the Pentagon's research chief, also says the surface-to-air missile force U.S. planes into evasive patterns that make them more vulnerable to concentrations of anti-aircraft guns.

Foster's statements were buried in a 34-page outline of defense research and development programs, submitted to a House Armed Services subcommittee two days ago.

Foster's statements tend to follow a different tack than that of Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara who has discounted the importance of both the MIGs and the anti-aircraft missiles.

Coordinated Plan For Development Of T. F. Commercial Areas Needed

In 1966, two years after Twin Falls came into being as a community, there was an unexpected commotion on Main Avenue. A crowd gathered and wild-eyed horses snorted and tried to run away.

A new-fangled mechanical contraption known as an automobile churned its way through the dusty street, the first to appear in town. It had a steering wheel, a thought of problem that was going to plague the city some 60 years in the future.

THE PROBLEM IS THAT THE use of automobiles and the increase in traffic has grown far faster than the city could develop to accommodate them. This has created circulation troubles, parking woes and, subsequently, a moving of commercial enterprises away from the city center to get away from the problem.

The middle portion of the 20th Century developed into the Shopping Center Age, and the cities developed around a city heartland of retail business, began to change.

It has to be admitted that by 1967 the average resident has become accustomed to and fond of the convenience of shopping center close to his home.

Taking a realistic look at the situation—the engineers and planners who developed guidelines for the future, healthy growth of Twin Falls, came up with a plan of commercial development that encompasses both city center and shopping-center. It is a plan that will give a general commercial and office districts to complement them.

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To strengthen the city center as the principal retail commercial area of the city and encourage all types of commercial, financial, social and cultural activities to concentrate in central major projects were proposed.

A traffic circulation system should be developed which links downtown with all of Twin Falls and provides improved access to off-street parking facilities in the city center.

(Through traffic bypasses the retail core, thus reducing pedestrian conflicts.)

2. Customer off-street parking should be provided close to shopping areas. Parking should be convenient, easy to use and attractive. Walkways to the stores must be well landscaped and lighted.

3. An attractive and comfortable environment with landscaped main plazas, sidewalks and places to relax should be provided in the city center.

All efforts should be made to keep the major department stores downtown, encourage their enlargement and improvement, and encourage stores and offices with a full range of goods and services to locate in the city center.

In the plan, shopping centers were included in a "commercial center" which is the predominant use should be for those types of commerce which provide essential convenience goods, and which are primarily related to the day-to-day personal residential areas for the majority of city customers.

These areas would include food stores, drug stores, hardware and household furnishings, clothing and complementary retail services, as well as those offices, professions and services which are directly related to day-to-day personal needs and requirements of the surrounding residents.

Stores which should not be generated in this area are major retail stores, department and furniture stores, discount houses, highway related uses, motels and outdoor advertising signs.

Five shopping center areas are recommended, including three already established and two new ones. They are:

1. Columbia Street and Falls Avenue (just south of the College of Southern Idaho campus). With a projected enrollment of 5,000 students by 1985, the college will generate a need for complementary day-to-day personal needs and requirements of the surrounding residents. It should be considered an extension of the college campus with a walkway to the college. A small restaurant, a book store.

Elephant Is Treated By Surgeon

SAIGON (AP) — Quick doctor, bring your bag. My elephant has been shot.

Such was the message that came to Maj. Charles Lea of Columbia, Mo. The elephant, named Rhon, belonged to the mountain tribesman named Hira. The surgeon treats combat casualties of the Screaming Eagles, the men of the 101st Airborne Division's 1st Brigade.

The 101st's civil affairs officer, Maj. Thomas Pugh of Douglas, N.Y., thought he ought to treat the elephant, too.

Lea and Hira found the elephant lying beneath a tree, a bullet in his left front leg.

Hira mounted Rhon, and the elephant reluctantly rose. Lea approached "with great purpose," a division account reported, while Hira supervised from a distance of several feet, beyond the swing of an elephant's trunk.

The feasting wound was open inside of the leg. Probing somewhat gingerly, Lea found the bullet imbedded two inches beneath the elephant's hide in the general area of what he thought would call the upper arm on his other patients.

He plucked out the slug, cleaned the wound and applied what he hopes was enough antiseptic to kill elephant germs. Rhon being restless, the doctor left off the bandage.

At last report the patient was doing well.

Terrorism Is Big Part of War

SAIGON (AP) — A young Vietnamese leans his bicycle against a telephone pole near a tennis court in Saigon where several American servicemen are playing. He walks away and an explosive inside the bicycle detonates, injuring a U.S. officer and two Vietnamese children.

The Viet Cong shell a polling place in a primary election at Long Thoi hamlet, they abduct 12 village council candidates from Vinh The village.

The Viet Cong overrun a village of Montagnard tribesmen, shoot the village leaders, and burn the houses of the village chief's wife and daughter with flaming sticks.

Terrorists in a village north of Saigon tie three aged gill members of a government pacification team to stakes before shooting them in the back of the head.

All these are examples of the terrorism which is a major part of the Communist war in take over South Vietnam. U.S. officials report a slight increase in such Red activity—the past few months, according to U.S. officials, is designed to infiltrate voters in the village and hamlet elections now being held every weekend.

Six candidates have been killed and 30 have been kidnapped. Since March 12, authorities have reported 333 terrorist incidents related to the balloting.

According to South Vietnamese government records, the Viet Cong have carried out an average of 22,000 terrorist acts a year during the past several years. The attacks take many forms and reach all segments of the Vietnamese civilian population. Favorite targets are Viet

Earlier 50 deaths had been reported in the Gauhati area. Smallpox is also raging in Bihar State where, according to unofficial estimates, more than 300 people have died since January.

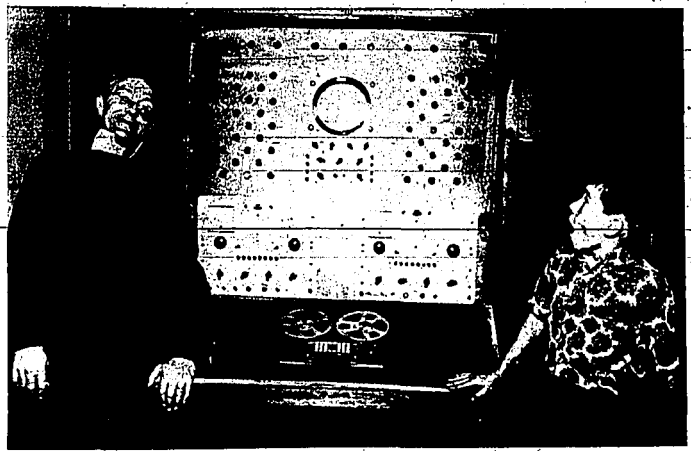

Soviet Scientists Ponder UFO's

MOSCOW (AP) — A Soviet scientist says there is a possibility of such things as flying saucers from outer space.

Soviet radar screens have detected unidentified flying objects—UFOs—for 20 years, he says.

Soviet scientists, like their colleagues in the West, are still puzzled about what such UFOs really are.

The scientist, identified only as F. Zigel, was writing in the current issue of the illustrated Soviet Youth magazine *Comrade*.

He outlined the possible explanations for UFOs, "including visitors from outer space," he called them "extremely speculative."

"But," he added, "the UFO problem has not yet been solved, and the question remains, including extremes, are possible."

The article took the lid off a subject rarely discussed in the press here.

In the 1950s the Soviet press scoffed at American reports of flying saucers as just so much cold war propaganda.

By the Soviet accounts, the Americans tried to explain away the "saucers" as some sort of new, secret Soviet weapon.

Reports of flying saucers sighted in the Soviet Union, in the Caucasus and in Central Asia, also were ridiculed here.

Then for several years the Soviet press remained silent on the whole question, the *Comrade* article showed that the UFO issue is being reopened, this time as an object of serious scientific study.

Zigel was identified as one of the editors of a book, "Inhabited Cosmos," being prepared for publication here. The book will discuss the possibility of living beings in space and efforts to communicate with them.

The editor of the book is D. B. Konstantinov, who, as a vice president of the Soviet academy of science, is one of this country's most respected scientists.

In his magazine article, Zigel said the "angel echo," a UFO detected by radar, is constantly observed by scientists at the Central Aerological Observatory near Moscow.

Similar observations, he said, have been made in the United States, Australia, India and Japan.

"The phenomena of the UFO today should be considered as ghastly," he added.

He rejected the idea that birds, insects or plant seeds could cause such reactions on radar screens.

Zigel said there could be no doubt that UFOs exist "but the

nature of these objects is still not understandable," he said.

Then he listed these five possible explanations:

1. Nonsense or invention. He said there was some truth in this, citing reports of people who claimed to have ridden in flying saucers and who threw hats in the air and they photographed "saucers." But he rejected this alternative as "ill-founded" rather than solving it.

2. An optical illusion related to the distribution of light in the atmosphere, such as a rainbow. The UFO, he said, is more complicated than that.

3. A new secret flying apparatus of one of the military powers on earth. "No one holds this view now," he said.

4. An unknown phenomena of nature, just as radioactivity was unknown until the end of the 19th century. In this context, Zigel said the speed of particles of dust in the atmosphere were given as a possible explanation. But Zigel said this does not explain the color or maneuverability of UFOs and for all:

5. Spaceships from an advanced civilization on another planet. Zigel said the speed of UFOs support this theory. So does what he called "the fact" that no UFOs were ever reliably reported to have landed.

Zigel called for "an all-sided, thorough, scientific exploration" to clear up the origin of UFOs once and for all.

Dodd Report Expected In Next Week

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate ethics committee's report on Sen. Thomas J. Dodd is expected next week at the same time unidentified friends are cranking up for Sen. Everett M. Dirksen a testimonial dinner of the same sort that helped regenerate the Dodd controversy.

Sen. John Stennis, D-Miss., chairman of the Ethics Committee, said Tuesday "we've considered virtually all the major points" in drafting findings and recommendations on Dodd, whose financial affairs and other activities have been under scrutiny for about a year.

Stennis would not say if any conclusions had been reached. Other sources said this week the committee had tentatively decided to recommend censure, condemnation or both for the Connecticut senator on various charges of wrongdoing.

Stennis said more writing and more staff work remain to be done, but that it looked as if the report would be ready next week.

FACING STARVATION OSLO, Norway (AP)—A Norwegian relief effort today at least 1,700 nomadic Laplanders in northern Norway face starvation and urged the Oslo government to let them "before it is too late."

Pope Makes Attack On Extremists

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul VI made a scathing attack on extreme liberalism and extreme conservatives in the Roman Catholic Church.

The Pope attacked both extremes at a meeting of the commission to carry out the Vatican Ecumenical Council's charge in Italy. It was one of the harshest denunciations the pontiff has ever made against the church that he considers too far in the quest for modernization or fight too hard against the council's plans to bring the church up to date.

Pope Paul told the commission he would "keep silent our bitterness over some factions and some tendencies that certainly do not favor the good results that the Church expects from the diligent work of this commission."

Then the Pope denounced what he called "episodes of indiscretion and willfulness and imprudence in some liturgical services. This reflected his off-expressed fears that some Catholics are modifying liturgical practices too rapidly and doing it without authority."

He emphasized that changes in worship can be done only with the permission of the Church. He expressed confidence that the various national and regional bishops conferences around the world would keep a close watch on changes and see that they are acceptable.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Anti-poverty officials apparently are succeeding in cutting the high and costly dropout rate of youngsters during their first 30 days in Job Corps urban centers.

Romney Says Threats Are Within U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gov. George Romney of Michigan Tuesday threatened to veto legislation for this nation "are within and not from without."

During the previous six months, 5,748 entered the centers and 1,847 left during the first month.

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League Approves Of Proposed Constitutional Changes

Passage of six joint resolutions by the Legislature calling for constitutional amendments has drawn praise from the League of Women Voters.

The resolutions were received Wednesday from Mrs. Eugene Smith, Idaho Falls, state president of the League.

The group is extending public consultations to the Legislature for this action.

Mrs. Smith noted that the resolutions provide "exceptional opportunities to increase the effectiveness of state government."

Mrs. Nelson Peterson, president of the Twin Falls chapter of the League, explained that the amendments will be submitted during the 1968 general election for voter approval.

They fall within recommendations made by League members during several years study of Idaho's constitution.

Mrs. Smith said that two of the proposed amendments, HJR 1 and SJR 3, will strengthen the legislative branch.

HJR 1, providing for annual sessions, offers the citizens, through representatives, adequate time for careful consideration of the possible solutions to current problems and long-range plans for our expanding future.

"It allows the legislators to set salaries for the legislative branch, as already is done for executive and judicial branches.

Through fluctuating limits, salaries necessarily should not be frozen into a constitution but should be determined by statutes which can be more readily altered to reflect changing times," Mrs. Smith added.

Two of the proposed amendments will extend control over the state judicial department.

Five HJR's give the citizens through the legislators, the right to decide how judges and justices are to be disciplined, removed or retired.

"Our constitution has never given us the means of removing a judge, no matter how incompetent or corrupt he may be," Mrs. Smith noted.

HJR 3 would require the governor to make appointments to the Supreme or District Courts from a list of several names recommended to him by the Judicial Council.

Mrs. Smith said that the Council's membership of lay persons and lawyers can represent a wide cross-section of interests and provide the governor with well-qualified persons from whom to choose.

HJR 4 also welcomes SJR 3. Mrs. Smith stated, since it removes the superintendent of public instruction from the list of seven electors.

"As citizens we need to concentrate our voting power on those we select to transfer our opinions into governmental policies. The removal of the superintendent of public instruction is not a policy-making one and is better filled by appointment," Mrs. Smith remarked.

SJR 3 would permit the State Board of Education to select members as appointed by the governor, to choose a person best qualified to administer our educational system according to the guidelines we set through our legislators, the League president said.

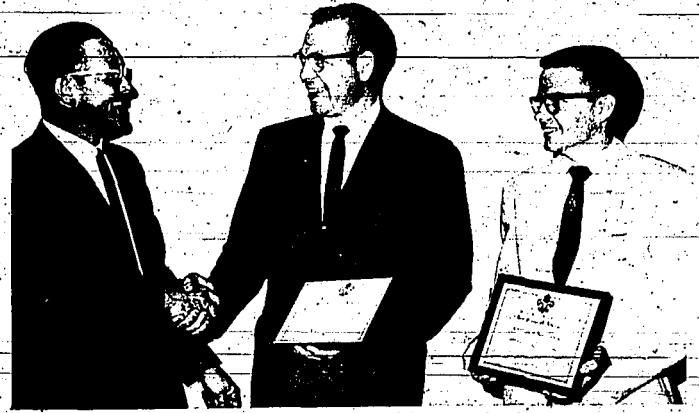
The proposed amendment with the greatest long-range importance is SJR 3, Mrs. Smith

pointed out. She said under the present procedure our legislators must present a separate amendment to change each section of the constitution, and there are some 120 sections.

SJR 3 would let us approve one amendment to change as many sections of the constitution as are needed to accomplish a purpose.

"This method can eliminate the confusion we have caused in the past when we passed amendments and not others in a related series, creating constitutional havoc," Mrs. Smith noted.

The League president concluded, "These are six choices awaiting our decision but our larger question is, what kind of government do we want Idaho to have?"

Researchers Develop Technique For Computers To Analyze Physical Health

By NELSON WADSWORTH

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—Just plug yourself in and the computer will diagnose anything from high blood pressure to hardening of the arteries.

It was bound to happen sooner or later. Automation has moved into the field of diagnostic medicine.

A group of medical researchers at Latter-day Saints Hospital have developed a technique whereby some patients can be literally hooked up to computers, monitored and thoroughly analyzed physically.

Dr. Homer R. Warner, head of the Cardiovascular Department at the hospital and the Department of Biophysics and Bioengineering at the University of Utah, predicts that within a few years every major hospital in the nation will be geared to "computerized" medicine.

Warner says it increases the efficiency of the physician and the hospital staff.

"The age of the computer in medicine is already here," the 43-year-old doctor says. "and it eliminates the need for a cardiologist and gives doctors an instant read-back on vital readings."

And with remote computer stations already set up in 120 other Salt Lake City hospitals, it is possible to conduct the same tests there via an ordinary 220-per-month leased telephone line.

For the average man on the street, computerized medicine has even greater applications, says Warner. Under a new patient screening program, more thorough physical examinations can be given to seemingly healthy people.

Those being examined would simply breathe into the spirometer, have a simple catheter inserted into the radial artery, be hooked up to the EKG and give a blood sample. From these tests, the computer would find possible defects that could lead to future trouble.

"The patient screening program would not eliminate the need for the other kind of physical examination," Pryor said, "but it would give the doctor much more thorough information about his patient... and defects might be detected in time to be corrected."

One large corporation in Utah is planning to incorporate the new patient screening program into its health insurance for employees, as part of a new labor contract.

And more than 1,000 people from the little community of Kanmas, Utah participated in a spirometer computer test recently. Asthma, emphysema and other lung diseases were detected when persons breathed into the spirometer. The results were transmitted instantly to the computer center at LDS Hospital, some 60 miles away.

It is amazing the speed with which a computer can come up with the answer," said Dr. Warner. "A man must ponder and think, but a computer makes its decision in a fraction of a second."

The time will come, he added, when computers equipped with memories fed to them by the combined medical brains of the world will be diagnosing all kinds of diseases and recommending treatment.

By use of gauges a complex system of wires and tubes, the heart is literally plugged in to the intricate computer system. Through the gauges, data from the heart is converted to volt-ages, transferred to tape and fed into the computer. A fluoroscope also picks up the X-ray picture of the heart and transmits it on a closed-circuit television screen. This in turn is fed into the computer.

The computer can reveal blood pressure and its fluctuations, the amount of blood ejected by the heart per beat, artery resistance, oxygen efficiency and even elasticity of the aorta (hardening of the aorta and arteries is often the cause of heart failure).

By inserting harmless eyes from the heart through the input catheter, doctors can also see heart defects.

Thomas Allen Pryor, another member of the research team, said a computerized electrocardiogram (EKG) needs about half as much as the old method. It eliminates the need for a cardiologist and gives doctors an instant read-back on vital readings.

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8 Ordered Out Of West Europe For Spying

LONDON (AP) — Eight men from Communist countries have been ordered out of Western Europe in the past six months for spying.

Five of them were diplomats or trade officials. Two were representatives of Aeroflot, the Soviet airline. One represented Tass, the Soviet news agency.

At least four of the men are believed to have been involved in spying against bases of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

In the same period one West European — a Belgian airline pilot — was expelled from the Soviet Union.

The first expulsions were announced in Rome and Athens Nov. 3.

The Italian Foreign Ministry ordered Kit Lemzenko, an employee of a Soviet trade delegation, to leave the country "for acts against the security of the state." The expulsion order said he was engaged in "certain illicit activities."

It was the first time in memory that a Soviet citizen had been expelled from Italy, and came in the wake of expulsions from Italy and the Soviet Union which were growing more cordial.

Lemzenko's activities were uncovered in Naples, site of NATO's southern European headquarters.

The same day in the Greek capital, a Bulgarian naval attaché was declared persona non grata and told to leave the country. Greek intelligence agents said they caught Col. Zhabari, a Bulgarian intelligence agent, in Athens. He was receiving "certain data" from an unnamed Greek officer near the Greek military command's headquarters.

On Feb. 3, an incident at a roadside eating place prompted Belgian authorities to expel Vladimir Cherston, second in command of the Aeroflot office in Brussels. Security police arrested him with a man whose identity was never divulged and held him for a day.

The Soviet government retaliated in March, expelling M. Thoinie, the Moscow manager of Belgium's Sabena Airlines. He was accused of "hostile conduct" toward the Soviet Union.

In Turin, three Italians were charged March 22 with spying on NATO military installations.

In April, the Soviet Union expelled Rinaldo, 39, a former European parachute jump champion, his wife Angela, 51, and their chauffeur, Armando Gioiardi.

Rinaldo was reported to have given Italian security men the names of 300 persons working for NATO who were involved in a Communist spy ring. The Italian government was NATO headquarters in Paris denied this, but other sources said the list was being carefully checked in Norway, Belgium, the Netherlands, Austria, the United States, Switzerland, France and Greece, France and Morocco.

Development Of Oil Shale Is Debated

WASHINGTON (AP) — Its authority challenged, a Senate subcommittee heard conflicting views Tuesday on how vast oil shale resources in the West should be developed.

Senate Minority Leader "Eugene McCarthy" (D-N.H.) and Sen. Roman L. Hruska, R-Neb., questioned whether the Judiciary Antitrust and Monopoly subcommittee has jurisdiction over oil shale problems.

However, the subcommittee went ahead with the first of six hearing sessions planned on how competition can be encouraged and monopoly prevented in the production of shale oil.

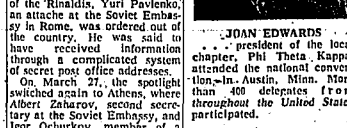

NEW YORK (AP) — What are the aims of Stokely Carmichael, the black power advocate, who is studying for a Nonviolent Coordinating Committee?

As gleaned from a series of speeches Carmichael has been making, his aims encompass a range from mass Negro resistance to the military draft to the introduction of a foreign language in Negro schools.

Carmichael also urges Negro students to be proud that they are black.

"We must stand up and say our noses are wide, our lips are thick, our hair is woolly, we are black and beautiful," he told an audience at Texas Southern University in Houston.

At a University of Texas campus meeting in Austin, Carmichael urged Negro students to form "a full strength of black power will be felt in the national elections and in at least a five-year organization."

In a speech at Florida A. & M. Carmichael called on Negro students to form "a militant and militant system."

The first few Negroes who talk their minds out will be black power. "If you ain't going, might wind up in jail," Carmichael said. "But we'd rather go to jail than have our minds get drafted."

He counseled Negro students in several of his speeches that they must "break the man's back." "If a hunky tries to shoot you, kill him before God sends him to jail."

Court Rules Teacher Can Wear Beard

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Paul S. Finot, an Abraham Lincoln or Socrates, or even John Muir, the naturalist. But he has the right to wear a beard in emulation of all three.

"But symbols, under appropriate circumstances, merit constitutional protection."

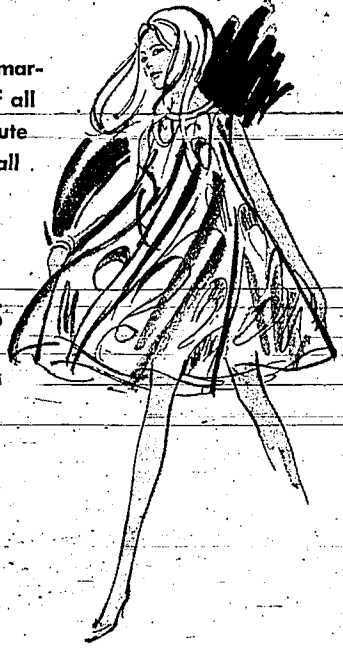

Carmichael Urges Battle On 'Hunkies'

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — Slobodkin Carmichael concluded a Florida speaking tour Tuesday night with a street corner speech exhorting Negroes to unite and fight the "hunkies."

Standing atop an old wooden building, Carmichael said: "Wherever the hunkies (whites) got injustice, we're going to tear their clothes."

The speech, the last of three in Florida, followed Carmichael's coolest reception.

He made the street corner talk after the president of Florida Presbyterian College, where he was scheduled to speak, got a court order barring him from the campus.

"You're so powerless you don't even have a church where someone can speak," Carmichael told his audience.

"Every Saturday night in our (Negro) community there's all kinds of killings," Carmichael said. "Let's talk about non-violence among ourselves and let's talk about non-violence among ourselves."

Carmichael, director of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, opened his Florida tour Tuesday night in Tallahassee at Florida A&M and spoke Monday night at Bethune-Cookman College in Daytona Beach. No disorders were reported at either city.

Ky Has Plan To Lure Defectors

By KENNETH L. WHITING
SAIGON (AP) — Premier Nguyen Cao Ky announced a new plan today to lure middle echelon defectors from the Communist ranks.

Viet Cong turncoats will be reintegrated with full political rights and will be given special jobs appropriate to those they held in the Communist bureaucracy, Ky said in a nationwide radio and television address.

He said defectors who had violated South Vietnam's laws "under Communist coercion or deception" would "enjoy all the guarantees" of South Vietnam's new constitution and the government would be "tolerant to the utmost."

Ky announced defectors would be processed under a three-point reconciliation program:

1. All those who decide to leave the ranks of the Communist Party will be given the opportunity to contribute positively to reconstruction (of the country).
2. Defectors "will be employed in accordance with their ability so that every Vietnamese citizen will have the opportunity to serve and redeem themselves."
3. The citizens who rally to the national cause, but who have violated the law under Communist coercion or deception, will be given the opportunity to put their ability and determination to use in the reconstruction of the country.

Ky made his announcement on one of Vietnam's most important holidays, National Song-dan Day, which honors Hung Vuong, the traditional founder of Vietnam 4,000 years ago.

Shareholders To Get Money In 30 Days

BOISE (AP) — Third District Court was told Tuesday that within 30 days Pioneer Savings and Loan Association of Boise hopes to have enough liquid assets to pay off all shareholders.

The institution was ordered closed last January by the Idaho Department of Finance to determine ownership of the firm. It subsequently ordered the association liquidated.

However, Judge Merlin S. Young ordered liquidation delayed to permit submission of an alternate plan by officials of Idaho Investment Corp., which owned the firm up to Sept. 1, 1966, when it supposedly was sold to William Boyce of Oklahoma City, Okla.

Ownership of the firm has been contested in Oklahoma courts and the case still is pending.

Attorneys for Idaho Investment Corp. and the Department of Finance agreed at the court hearing Tuesday that there will be no liquidation of accounts for 30 days. In that period Idaho Investment said it hoped to convert enough assets into cash to cover all shareholder accounts.

If that is not done, Finance Commissioner John D. Silva said he will authorize partial withdrawal of deposits.

Idaho Investment officials have been estimated to have \$12,000 in cash on hand and total assets of about \$102,000.

They said they are attempting to prevent liquidation because that would mean loss of the savings and loan license they now hold.

Spring Salmon Run Moving Into Idaho

BOISE—Spring chinook salmon are moving up the Columbia River and about 2,000 of them a day are being counted over Bonneville Dam in their spawning runs to headwater streams where they were hatched three, four or five years ago. Fisheries workers say that the best way to tell the differences between spring-run salmon and summer-run fish is to find out when each group or race of chinooks left salt water. In other words, the main difference between the summer and fall-run fish is the time they start up the Columbia River from the ocean.

Steelhead Run Reaches Sunbeam Dam

SALMON—The vanguard of the spring steelhead run now has reached Sunbeam Dam and a few fish are being taken there. Don Corley, Salmon fish biologist for the Idaho Fish and Game Department, also reports some action. Success from Salmon to the Middle Fork River was reported slow over the second half way to post from Middle Fork to Corral Creek. No parties fishing below Corral Creek were contacted. Corral Creek is still flowing low and clear.

A check station at North Fork was operated by Lloyd Edwards and Stuart Armstrong. They interviewed 68 anglers who caught 27 steelhead. The average catch rate was 40.8 percent per fish and 2.5 anglers per fish. The steelhead catch was good on the upper end of the Middle Fork. Three anglers reported catching steelhead on Thursday and Friday. A float party of four anglers on the lower end of the river fished four days and caught two steelhead.

The Salmon River and Middle Fork are still flowing low and clear. Figures released by James C. Simpson, chief of fisheries management for the Idaho Fish and Game Department, show that steady decline in summer fish numbers counted over Ice Harbor Dam during the past five years, and a sharp drop in spring chinook numbers until last year.

Clear water conditions throughout the Columbia River system brought the fish in from the ocean, where they sometimes wait offshore until turbid waters clear.

What fish numbers over Ice Harbor Dam for any chinook salmon run this year will be unknown at this time. Clear water conditions in the Columbia River system last year brought the salmon out of the ocean and into the migration runs on time last year. High turbidity sometimes caused a delay in migration of the rivers until water conditions improve.

Salmon mortality or other loss between dams was held to a minimum last year and this helped to get more of the big spawners to Idaho streams.

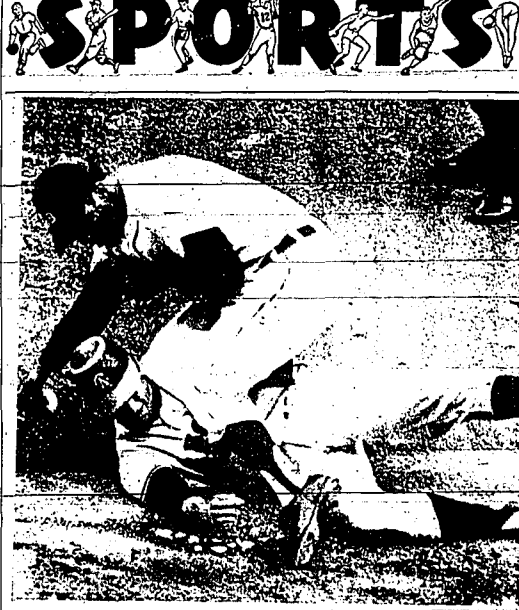

NRA Official Outlines Three-Point Plan For Future Firearms Control

WASHINGTON—Franklin L. Orth, executive vice president of the National Rifle Association, outlined for Congress Monday a four-point plan for gun control legislation.

Testifying before Subcommittee Number Five of the House Judiciary Committee, Orth recommended to Congress a "positive, specific and practicable program for reasonable and proper firearms controls" that would:

1. Provide a mandatory penalty for the possession or use of a firearm transported in interstate commerce or foreign commerce and used in the commission of a crime.

2. Prohibit licensed manufacturers or dealers from shipping any firearm to any person in any state in violation of the laws of that state.

3. Place "destructive devices" (bombs, grenades, mines, crew-served military ordnance, etc.) under the tax and registration provisions of the National Firearms Act.

4. Require that a person who orders a handgun by mail or otherwise, or in state other than his own submit to the seller a sworn statement that he is over 21 years of age, is not prohibited by federal law from receiving a handgun shipped in interstate commerce, and his receipt of a firearm is not in violation of any state statute.

The affidavit must contain the name and address of the purchaser, the type of firearm, and the name of the locality to which the handgun will be shipped, and the seller must forward the affidavit by registered or certified mail to that law enforcement officer and by a separate mail to the recipient.

The law enforcement officer must refuse receipt, and in this case no delivery will be made. The seller must wait at least seven days following receipt of notification by the law enforcement officer before shipment can be made.

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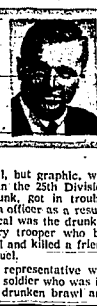
Accidental Deaths In War Will Stop When Nonaccidental Ones Do

TAY NINH, Vietnam (NEA)—The road mine had been confiscated from enemy territory earlier in the day and the young soldier, merely curious, was examining the deadly object close up.
He knuckled the mine's metal wrapping, rubbed his fingers over its bumps and blemishes, and absently wiped dirt from the underside.
Then he picked the bomb up. He juggled it. And there was an explosion.
The iron package was stuffed with metal shavings and fragments and a good lot of it embedded in the victim's stomach. The GI didn't even cry out.
He was instantly dead.
The soldier's death was cruel and ironic in a situation where death is traditionally premed-

ated rather than accidental. But it was by no means extraordinary. The same week he was killed, 15 other servicemen died here under similar circumstances.
Accidental fatalities, in fact, comprise a shocking 20 per cent of the total American death toll in every 25 fatalities.
In figures compiled to the end of 1966, exactly 1,511 Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine personnel had been killed here by what the military terms "the result of non-hostile engagements."
This means they died from airplane or vehicular mishaps, or any of dozens of less common misfortunes which are happening where more than 400,000 men are thrown together in a desperate, hasty pot-

Soldiers, for example, claim a few lives. So do out-of-control armaments. Sickness is also a killer, as is equipment carelessness, individual ignorance and even mental fatigue.
Many of these deaths are inevitable. It was nobody's fault except the victim's, recently when a GI dozed in the shade of a truck and was crushed to death when the wheels moved.
And some illness is unavoidable. For instance, there is one germ here which has claimed at least 10 lives in the past few months. Doctors call it the Vietnam Time Bomb because the disease may lie undetected for months before suddenly killing its victim.
Yet, on the other hand, medical and military people agree that a large number of the ac-

cidental deaths could be avoided. If:
Liquor was less available. Safety programs were stressed. Everyone co-operated. Of these, the first is the least noble but most important. Booze is plentiful for the majority of war troops and its excess has been indirectly responsible for hundreds of fatal mis-

adventures.
Not typical, but graphic, was the soldier in the 25th Division who got drunk, got in trouble and killed an officer as a result. More typical was the drunker First Cavalry trooper who became playful and killed a friend in a sham duel.
And most representative was the airborne soldier who was involved in a drunken brawl and

angrily, though unconsciously, killed his opponent.
Even non-prudish observers here feel that alcohol accidents should be curbed and go on to encourage stiffer safety regulations over-all with a mandatory compliance.
Safety rules, of course, are more or less in effect now. Speed limits have been established, weapons must be cleared

in garrison, and there is a military law against rowdy drunkenness.
But enforcement is sleepy. Penalties are spongy. And accidental deaths in crease monthly.
Frankly, the toll will probably continue to grow. Having enough trouble already, the military prefers to sweep away non-hostile deaths as "the natural result of unfortunate circumstances."
The language is clear.



Cancer Cases Are Listed For Jerome

JEROME — There were 15 cases of cancer reported in Jerome County during 1966, according to statistics furnished to the disease during the same period.

Mr. Pearl Utter, Jerome County health officer, reported Tuesday.

He noted that April is Cancer Crusade month and urged residents to give generously and assist in the solicitation if asked.

Mrs. Oscar Fort, service and memorial chairman, reported an increase in cancer cases among workers, that two service cases were handled in the county the past year and one in the present year. She reported \$434 was received in memorials last year.

Mrs. Worely, district executive director for the Idaho division of the American Cancer Society, noted, "There is a fact community than cancer or anything else organic and that it can't give a darn attitude."

Exchange Club Hears Talk On Alcoholism, Causes, Cure

Alcoholism, the "American disease," and all its facets, from a talk to cure, was the topic of an address by Dr. J. W. Starnes, a "burly" businessman during the Tuesday noon luncheon of the Twin Falls Exchange Club.

Mr. Starnes and his wife were instrumental, directly and indirectly, in encouraging more than 100 alcoholics to overcome their affliction and to take treatment at a special clinic in Portland, Ore.

Mr. Starnes, who explained he was an alcoholic, took his last drink in May of 1947 and was cured by the clinic. He has been sober ever since, he said, and probably could not stand the taste of alcohol if he tried.

There are three types of alcoholics, he explained. The first is the primary drinker, who is too social and his drinking runs into addiction.

Then there is the secondary, the addicted alcoholic, whose tolerance for alcohol has become so high that he has become a compulsive drinker.

The third and largest group is the simple excessive drinker, who wants to overdrink.

Whiskey Drinkers Pay More Because Of N.Y. Legislation

NEW YORK (AP) — Drinkers advance in an attempt to hold down prices.

Montana liquor prices are rising about 5 per cent, reports Curvell B. Shelton, state liquor administrator. He says the rise began last year when the Montana liquor control board accepted Seagram's request for an increase of about 15 cents a fifth.

In Dallas, Tex., a liquor store spokesman said prices of a quart per cent of the standard liquor brands have gone up in recent months, with the average about 83 cents.

In Virginia, prices are up 5 to 65 cents a bottle, with most increases on Scotch and blended whiskey. There has been little change in the price of bourbon, the big seller in Virginia.

It is Scotch that is up in Georgia.

This is because New York is a bourbon market and Atlanta a Scotch market, a Georgia revenue department spokesman said.

"The distillers were trying to create a Scotch market because of the large Scotch sales in New York, they could raise the price there. So the price in Georgia had to go up," he said.

The Oklahoma Alcoholic Beverage Control Board reports prices there recently had risen 2 per cent this year. In Illinois, a state estimated the increase at 10 to 15 cents a bottle in Illinois.

District of Columbia liquor stores have raised prices 20 to 25 cents a fifth in the last six months. They blame the increase on a tax on a gallon of wine from \$1.50 to \$2 a gallon.

Gov. Ronald Reagan has proposed raising California state tax on wine to \$1.50 to \$2 a gallon, and Maine Gov. Kenneth M. Curtis has announced he will raise the wine tax from 10 cents a gallon to 15 cents a gallon.

In Massachusetts, Gov. John A. Volpe says drinkers could save \$30 million if the state repealed its minimum price liquor law. The Massachusetts Package Stores Association opposes the change.

Guidelines Are Issued By Society Of Girl Watchers

 NEW YORK (AP) — It's molting season for both birds and girls and so the American Society of Girl Watchers issued guidelines today for its 5,000 members.

They are:

- Don't oggle.
- When passing a girl going the same direction, don't turn the head around and stare.
- Don't use binoculars—except at races.
- Don't whistle, pinch, whisper or commit any other overt act.
- Maintain eye-ball control at all times.

"We don't have any particular season," said Don Sauers of Eastchester, N.Y., founder of the society. "In fact, some of our best card-carrying members think old pants in Vermont are sexier than bikinis in Miami or miniskirts in Los Angeles."

"But this is the molting season when the girls all take off

their heavy over clothing and get closer to nature. Our spring season starts at the middle of April. At this time Fifth Avenue—between 42nd Street and Central Park—becomes the girl watchers' paradise of the world."

The society started as a gag out of the head of Sauers and grew into an institution.

Sauer, 44, father of five, was sitting around at lunch with some Madison Avenue pals about 10 years ago and a bird-swapping miss swung by the window. Sauers was suddenly struck with an idea.

"Bird-watchers have their own organization—the Audubon Society—I suggested—there are more girl watchers than bird watchers. Girls are more fun to watch. They all agreed."

The society now occupies its four-story headquarters on 35th Street just off Park Avenue. It has members in 45 states and several foreign countries.

It has its own guide book, authored by Sauers; its own theme song: "Basic to Watch Girls By," a popular ditty used by a soft drink firm; a lapel pin, just like the Elks, and a nine-article constitution.

The society is an affiliate of the Professional Sports Management Corp. "After all, there is no greater sport than girl watching," says the current president, Ray Baur, 46, of Westport, Conn., father of six.

Sauers says the purpose of the organization is to improve the climate of girl watching.

"A survey shows that 'like to be watched,' the founder added.

Sauers said one of the rules is not to watch girls in restaurants. "That's like watching birds in a zoo," he said. "They tend to be watched in their natural habitat—walking on the streets."

Airman's Lawsuit Is Dismissed

BOISE (AP) — A lawsuit by which a former airman sought to collect a quarter of a million dollars from the United States Air Force has been dismissed. Records in U.S. District Court showed today.

Judge Fred M. Taylor signed the judgment, which said there was no basis for the legal action brought by former airman Gerald M. Anderson, once accused of a double murder in Idaho.

The suit was brought against Eugene M. Zuckert, then secretary of the Air Force, and nine other men either attached to the Air Force or its Office of Special Investigations.

Only four of them, including Zuckert, ever were served officially as defendants. On their behalf U.S. District Attorney Sylvan A. Jeppesen asked for a summary judgment. It was granted by Taylor.

Anderson was arrested in April, 1962, in connection with the killing of Nancy Joy Johnson and her son, Donny. The two were found dead at their home in Mountain Home, Idaho, at a time Anderson was stationed at the nearby Mountain Home Air Force Base.

Anderson was charged with murder, but the complaint was dismissed after another man, Theodore Thomas Dickie, told authorities in Boise he killed Mrs. Johnson and the child. Dickie is serving a life sentence in the Idaho State Penitentiary for that, and another slaying to which he also pleaded guilty.

Free of the state complaint, Anderson was arrested by Air Force authorities and held in custody more than two months before he was released and given a discharge from military service.

A claim for \$250,000 damages was based on an assertion that agents of the Air Force Office of Special Investigations violated his constitutional rights by installing listening devices in the quarters where he was held. Anderson alleged conversations between him and his wife and also with a Catholic priest were recorded and used against him.
