 MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet President Nikolai V. Podgorny and Premier Alexei N. Kosygin led the guard of honor "side" the ashes of cosmonaut Vladimir Komarov today as a long line of Soviet citizens filed past to pay tribute to the first known victim of the Soviet space program.

The urn containing Komarov's ashes was placed atop a high pedestal covered with black in the army's red banner hall. The government announced that Komarov would be given a hero's funeral in Red Square Wednesday and his ashes interred at the Kremlin wall.

Newspaper front pages displayed a portrait bordered in black of Komarov, the first Soviet cosmonaut to make two flights into space. He had piloted Vostok 1 and carried three cosmonauts into orbit in 1964.

The papers also published a decree of the Supreme Soviet posthumously awarding Komarov a second Gold Star medal. This was accompanied by the same brief description of the crash of Komarov's spaceship, Soyuz 1, which appeared Monday.

Condolences poured in to the family and associates of Komarov. They included a telegram of sympathy from the American astronaut corps.

"We feel comradeship in this last pilot because we have met several of his fellow cosmonauts," said the cable signed by all 47 U.S. spacemen. "We know that we are all involved in a pioneering flight effort which is not without hazards."

The Soviet government announced that it was setting up a commission to investigate "all the circumstances of Komarov's death, the first announced fatality in the Soviet Union's space program. In view of the fact that he has always rounded the Russian program, it was considered unlikely that Komarov's death could ever be made public."

The disaster revived U.S. proposals for cooperation between the two chief space powers in space exploration. But Western experts privately doubt that Russian assistance would be willing to share their knowledge or admit their shortcomings.

James H. Webb, administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, said in Washington Monday that President Johnson is ready to act on a cooperative basis with the Soviet Union.

King Pushes For Halt Of U.S. Bombing

NEW YORK (AP)—Dr. Martin Luther King believes a bombing halt now by the United States would bring a new breakthrough from North Vietnam.

King did not elaborate, saying only that his opinion was based on the reports of Secretary General U Thant of the United Nations and "responsible observers who have visited North Vietnam."

The Nobel Peace Prize winner's statement came Monday as he and a group of other Americans launched a new organization called "Negotiations Now." It plans to gather a million signatures on a petition calling for an end to the bombing of North Vietnam.

The petition also appeals to North Vietnam, South Vietnam and the Viet Cong to join the United States in a standstill cease-fire.

The group hopes to present its petition to President Johnson by early summer.

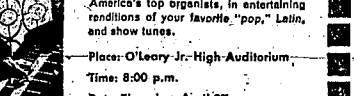

Fireworks Still Banned By City Law, Chief Says

Police Chief Frank Barnett said Monday that the city ordinance which prohibits any fireworks this summer, that they still must comply with the city ordinance, regardless of state legislation.

The police department has received several inquiries from businessmen. Chief Barnett said, concerning changes in the state law governing the sale of fireworks.

"We do not have the information on the changes or the date on which they become effective," the officer said.

"We would like to remind everyone thinking of selling or purchasing fireworks that changes in the state law do not change the city ordinance governing the sale, possession or use of fireworks," he added.

The officer quoted the city ordinance which prohibits any individual or business firm from having in their possession, selling, giving away, displaying, firing or discharging any firecracker, torpedo, bomba or fireworks of any description within the city limits.

Excluded from the regulations, he said, are toy guns, commonly known as cap guns.

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Only the most rabid segregationists could have been shocked by the news that Martin Luther King's desecration to the New Left of Stokely Carmichael, Floyd McKissick and the American Black Panther.

He has provoked a major crisis within the civil rights movement, the most dramatic movement into two warring segments whose reconciliation may be impossible.

There is no doubt that these moderates will not again make common cause with King unless he repudiates his new alliance, which has caused him to denounce American involvement in the Vietnam war as "barbaric" and no better than the Nazi excesses of World War II.

NEW HERO ARISES—Negro newspapers have countered King's speeches with a flood of editorials, urging support of Negro troops in the Vietnam war.

Meanwhile, Whitney Young has criticized King for using his high office as a civil rights leader to denounce the war, and Roy Wilkins engineered a resolution by the NAACP attacking King for joining up with the New Left. This White House spokesman has been criticized by Negro clergymen, businessmen and labor leaders praising President Johnson for his efforts in behalf of civil rights and his Vietnam position.

RIGHTS SET BACK—In between is the plain Negro citizen, who has long believed in Martin Luther King as a distinguished member of his race whose words carried prestige in both government and church.

KING'S SPEECHES HURT—Sen. Phil Hartman, manager of the civil rights division, summed up the Congressional atmosphere: "You're darn right King's speeches hurt," he said. "They shouldn't, but they have."

PURER AIR! TUNE CAR
A small ray of sunlight has pierced the gloom surrounding the automobile air pollution problem.

Resumption Of U.S. Air Strikes Ends Ban

WASHINGTON (AP) — Resumption of U.S. air strikes against military targets in the vicinity of Hanoi ends the ban President Johnson imposed last December on air strikes within about 10 miles of the center of the North Vietnamese capital.

The embargo zone was never officially announced but authorities quietly confirmed its existence months ago.

The ban ended today when U.S. Air Force F105 Thunderchiefs struck a railroad repair yard 24 miles from the center of the city and an electric transformer site 7 miles from the center.

The attacks had been forestalled Monday when U.S. planes struck for the first time two airfields serving Soviet-designed MIG fighter planes.

One of the most important elements of the policy of escalation in targeting, informants say, is the stone-wall stand which the government of President Ho Chi Minh has taken against any kind of peace moves.

In the view of some officials the Hanoi tough line on peace proposals and the newest potential threat of direct mass invasion against South Vietnam have justified Johnson's stepping up bombing pressures on the North. This in turn presumably brought reconsideration of the no-strike circle around Hanoi.

The forbidden zone was set up after worldwide uproar resulted from a mid-December strike against targets at Hanoi — a railway yard and a truck park.

Policy makers conceded after the attack on MIG bases was announced that this shift in U.S. targeting raised the question whether the North Vietnamese might now seek to base some of the MIGs on airfields in border regions of Communist China.

That in turn has raised the question which administration officials now call very speculative about whether the United States might feel itself compelled in time to attack MIG bases in China and whether this might force Red China into the war.

Up to the last few days the danger of involving Red China was advanced by officials here as the major reason why there was no need to attack the MIG fields even though intelligence reports made it clear that the number of North Vietnam's bases was growing.

Officials explaining the decision now to attack say that in the last few weeks the MIGs have become much more active against U.S. attack planes.

As recently as April 3 Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara said the decision not to bomb MIG bases "is based on

is not in slight, and we must be prepared for more bitter fighting in days to come."

His words contrasted sharply with those of retiring Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, Westmoreland's diplomatic terminus in Saigon, who told the press in earlier interviews that he thought the military war in South Vietnam would be substantially won this year and that the percentage of U.S. casualties would decline.

In line with Westmoreland's grim forecast several elements of escalation have developed in recent weeks.

The North Vietnamese are reported to have concentrated four divisions, or about 40,000 men, in the southern part of their country just across a dividing zone which is supposed to be demilitarized. U.S. officials have been worried about the possibility of a direct, large-scale invasion of the northern provinces of South Vietnam.

U.S. forces have been concentrated in "defense" opposite the North Vietnamese.

A week ago United States planes hit power plants in North Vietnam's chief port city, Haiphong. The strike marked a new step in the bombing strategy in the North, enraging the war into a strategically important town.

Seaborne supplies move through Haiphong, although main arm shipments from the Soviet Union and China are reported to move overland through China.

What some U.S. officials call the stone-wall stand of Ho Chi

Minh developed as peace probes reached a climax last January. President Johnson wrote Ho asking talks and offering terms to halt the bombing. He rejected both. The rejection did not surprise U.S. officials, though Johnson apparently had hoped that Ho would at least try to bargain and an exchange might be opened up.

The text stuck to Johnson and Secretary of State Dean Rusk came in March when Ho made his exchange with Johnson public, an act that was read here as evidence of a triumph for the "hawk" viewpoint in Ho's inner circle.

Johnson apparently wanted to refrain from attacks in or near Hanoi while peace probes were building up during the first two months of this year in the hope that the very lack of attacks would be accepted by the North Vietnamese as an evidence of how the conflict could be scaled down.

But today's attacks show the U.S. belief that this element of strategy should now be changed.

Congressman Says Powell Has Little Chance For Seat Unless He Returns

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Negro congressman said today that unless Adam Clayton Powell Jr. returns to Washington soon to work in his own behalf, he has little chance of being seated in the House, regardless of what the courts decide.

"His best friends are urging that he return immediately and initiate some action," said Rep. John Conyers Jr., D-Mich., in a telephone interview from his home in Detroit.

Conyers, a member of the select House committee that found Powell guilty of "gross misconduct," said a majority of the House members still favor the March 1 action by which he was hung in Detroit.

"And the positions are hardening," he said.

The key vote leading to exclusion of Powell from the House was 222 to 202, said Conyers, "unless he is present and competing, his friends and making it completely clear that he wants the seat and is willing to contact the members, there is no indication that there will be a change in votes."

The chairman of the select committee, Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., said Sunday "the odds are against him (Powell) still."

Conyers said it "would make a great deal of difference" if Powell mingled with his former colleagues and displayed "some degree of humility" instead of his usual "swagger."

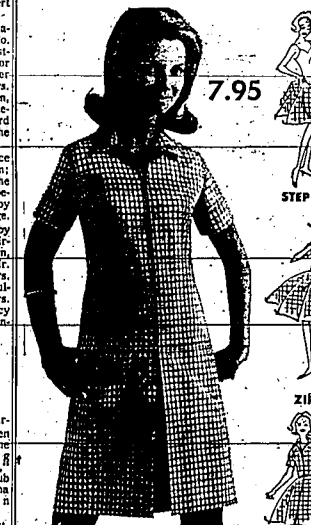

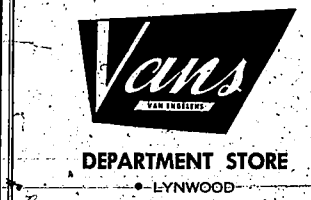

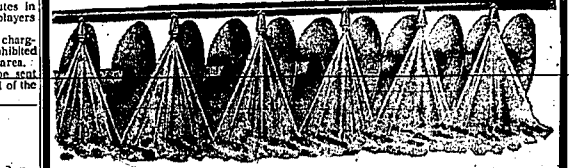

Coho Salmon Introduced To Magic Valley With Plant At Salmon Dam

Idaho's newest specie of game fish — the Coho or Silver Salmon — was officially introduced to Magic Valley Monday when one-third of a planned 350,000 fingerling fish was accomplished at Salmon Falls Reservoir by the Idaho Fish and Game Department.

The 100,000 fish, between three and four inches in length, are part of an experiment by the department through cooperation with the Oregon Hatchery and Game Commission. If things go as they could — the Coho could provide a bright new plus for anglers. The Salmon Reservoir planting will be completed by Wednesday and next on the lower Anderson Ranch Dam. Also planted are smaller amounts in Morrison Reservoir near Fairfield, Mackey Reservoir and a token plant in the Richfield Canal.

The fish started as surplus eggs from the Oregon coastal hatcheries and Idaho took its neighbor out of a million of them. These were bred and hatched at Mackay hatchery. Hatchery Superintendent Jim Dayley and Bob Atkin, fish culturist, along with regional biologist Bob Bell, presided over the first planting Monday.

All were pleased with the way the fish made the trip, hitting the water at Gray's Landing in a frenzy. A special experiment will be tried with about 5,000 of the fish being planted in Salmon Falls Creek where the reservoir in the hope that if the mature actually they could start a spawning run. However, prospects for the fish becoming self-sustaining remain a long shot. Auxiliary plantings will be at the mercy of the Silver runs in Oregon. Idaho will get only those eggs regarded as surplus.

Still, most players tend to overbid their own good hands. South certainly had a good hand and it's only overbid by one trick. Everyone overbids a trifle on occasion and this overbid worked.

West's opening lead is another matter. He carefully picked out the only suit lead that would give South his grand slam yet it was the standard lead of fourth best of the longest and strongest suit against no-trump. The lead would be correct against one no-trump, it would not have been too bad against six but against seven there is a new principle which is: DON'T MAKE A LEAD AGAINST SEVEN THAT IS LIKELY TO COST YOU A TRICK! West should have opened a heart or a diamond and waited hopefully with his two queens.

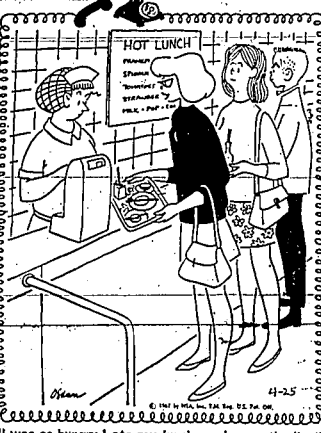

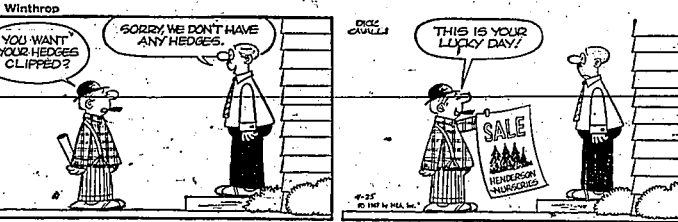
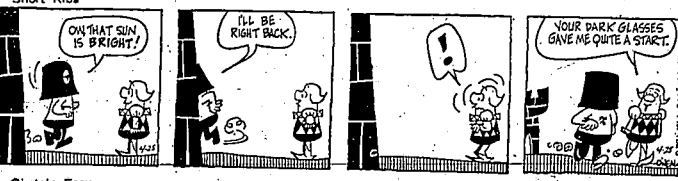

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The Amen Corner, in announcing that George Wallace would speak at its annual dinner, cited the former Alabama governor as saying: "I have no racial prejudice in Pittsburgh. You know, I don't want Pittsburgh burned down."

Wallace's appearance here Thursday was stirred sharp controversy. A city noted for low racial incidents. Civil rights organizations say they will stage a massive demonstration protesting Wallace's appearance.

Houston B. Marshall, president of Amen Corner, an organization of businessmen and politicians, says Wallace and his wife, Lurleen, the present governor of Alabama, will appear. "I don't share Wallace's view. I believe in integration," he said. "I am not stimulating evening of conversation."

Sen. George Murphy, R-Calif., is scheduled on the program with Wallace. The controversy began when Mayor Joseph Barr of Pittsburgh, acting on a request by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, took the first step to stop Wallace's visit. Barr, a former member of the Amen Corner, appealed to the group to cancel the visit which he said would be a threat to the racial peace of the city. Barr announced he would boycott the affair and was followed by the Allegheny County (Pittsburgh) Democratic and Republican chairmen.
