Johnson, Kiesinger Agree to Have Constant Consultations

BONN, Germany (AP) — President Johnson said today he and West German Chancellor Kurt Georg Kiesinger agreed they would have "constant, complete and full consultations" before either of the governments takes decisions on matters of interest to both countries.

The President spoke to newsmen after his second meeting with the West German chancellor before his arrival Sunday for the funeral of former Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

Johnson said he and Kiesinger had talked "no hard and fast decisions" but he hoped there would be more to announce after the chancellor visits the United States "at an early date."

The two men spent more than two hours together at Kiesinger's residence. The President said they discussed:

1. The projected treaty to check the spread of nuclear weapons;
2. Trade and monetary problems;
3. Troop deployment;
4. The security of the two nations;
5. The prosperity of their peoples.

Kiesinger, who spoke to newsmen first, put the emphasis on the agreement to consult. West German leaders have often complained in the past that they were not consulted sufficiently before American decisions.

Kiesinger said that the Soviet Union and the United States were in "atomic complicity" on the nuclear pact, to which the West Germans have strong objections.

"We will speak openly to one another," Kiesinger said, "with-

out doing anything of which the other is not informed."

Johnson referred to Adenauer as "the great man who was laid to rest yesterday, whose passing we all mourn."

"He would have wanted us to do what we have done: reaffirm the friendship between the people of the Federal Republic of Germany and the people of the United States of America," Johnson said.

He and Kiesinger, Johnson went on, would review their problems in depth when Kiesinger visits the United States.

"It was clear from our discussions," he added, "that the friendship and close relationship of two decades will be continued and that there will be constant, complete and full consultations before action by either country."

Pete Cenarrusa Is Idaho's New Secretary of State

BOISE (AP) — Pete T. Cenarrusa, a third term as speaker and Idaho rancher and veteran state legislator, was appointed today as Idaho's new secretary of state.

He was named by Gov. Don W. Samuelson to fill the vacancy caused by the death from a heart attack last Saturday of Edson H. Deal of Nampa.

Cenarrusa's appointment was announced at a news conference at which Samuelson described him as a man who "has the stature, the knowledge, the experience, the respect and the ability to become an outstanding secretary of state."

"It is significant," Samuelson said in a statement, "that he did not seek the job offered to him and asked that he accept it."

The appointment will be effective June 1. Cenarrusa had been planning to resign as a state legislator at a news conference on a section of state-owned land which he had used in his sheep raising operations.

"He said he will retain his interest in the ranch, in which he has a partnership with a brother and brother-in-law. He said much of the work is done by some husky young boys whom he said are in this country as alien-sheepherders from the former Soviet Union."

Like Cenarrusa, are Basques. Samuelson said he has asked Republican Gov. Lowell D. Glynn to appoint a committee in Cenarrusa's home district to recommend a successor for the next state legislative session.

Cenarrusa, 49, is Idaho's first secretary of state within a year.

Others have been Democrats Arnold Williams, who resigned last year as state auditor, and former state prison warden, who was named to replace him last year to win election to a full term.

Cenarrusa's appointment is the fourth in the Deal family. Deal was elected last November. It runs until January, 1971.

Cenarrusa said he most accepted the appointment as secretary of state with the intention of seeking election to a full term in 1970.

"A Republican, Cenarrusa served as speaker of the House in the 1967 legislature and was diligent in pushing for enactment of the Public Use of Land Act.

U.S. Pilots Press War Against Hanoi With Unrelenting Fury

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. Air Force pilots pressed their war against the Hanoi area with unrelenting fury today, bombing key railway and highway bridges across the Red River four miles from Hanoi.

The steel and concrete bridge carries the only rail line between Hanoi and the Red River, Vietnam's capital, the U.S. Command said.

U.S. spokesmen were unable to give an immediate assessment of damage to the bridge. They said it was a steel and concrete structure with five spans, 28 feet long, 10 feet wide, and with the center span is movable to allow passage of ships.

General's Report May Be Support Bid

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gen. William C. Westmoreland's pending report to Congress appears a Johnson administration bid for wider support as the air war against North Vietnam escalates. But it also could help create a climate for commitment of more U.S. troops in South Vietnam if President Johnson should decide such a course is warranted.

Westmoreland's speech Friday will be in the area of a military progress report, summing up where the anti-Communist effort stands today compared to two years ago when the United States began to bring its military weight to bear.

Troops Leave Most Parts Of Athens

ATHENS (AP) — Troops were withdrawn from most parts of Athens today as calm prevailed throughout Greece, but the new British government said it would not allow a full-scale withdrawal.

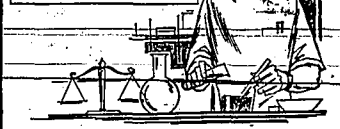

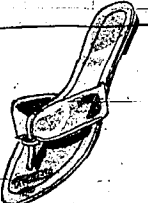

Opening Of Expo 67 Is Set Friday

MONTREAL (AP)—With its formal opening only a day away, Expo 67 already is teeming with newsmen and hundreds of others who have managed to get in for an advance look.

The Expo Express, the fair's free elevated railway, is doing a rushing business.

Some restaurants are open. Most of the concessions and La Ronde, the amusement area, will open Thursday. Several of the amusement rides are giving visitors previews.

Although Friday is opening day for the public, some 50,000 are expected to be admitted after the formal ceremonies Thursday afternoon. Concessionaires have been alerted to be ready for the Thursday crowd.

The red carpet has been laid on the platform at the Place des Nations where Gov. Renouf and Minister Lester B. Pearson and other dignitaries will sit during the ceremony.

Around the Expo grounds flags and gaily colored banners are flying and fountains are spraying water. Television networks are bringing in their big name commentators to take part in live telecasts of the ceremony.

Old Man Of Military Aviation Dies

WASHINGTON (AP) — Benjy Foulois, the Grand Old Man of military aviation, is dead.

Maj. Gen. Benjamin Delahaut Foulois, 87 — who retired 22 years ago from a military career lasting 37 years — was the first person to fly as an observer on a cross-country airplane flight back in 1909, and was the nation's senior military pilot.

Foulois was the first military man to teach himself to fly. In 1910 he became the nation's first military test pilot. He was the only person in that category to fly "Old Number One," the first plane to meet U.S. military requirements.

Those standards: The plane must be able to carry a pilot and a passenger at an average of 40 miles an hour over a 10-mile course, must have enough fuel to fly 125 miles, and must be able to stay aloft an hour.

Orville and Wilbur Wright, the first men to achieve powered flight in 1903, built the plane and won the Army Signal Corps contract in 1908. The observer board, on the final qualifying flight, was Foulois — Orville Wright was the pilot.

Foulois died at Andrews Air Force Base, Md., Hospital Tuesday after being in a coma for several months.

Until his last illness he had remained active, making speeches and military base tours.

Negro Group Upsets Meet At Company

FLEMINGTON, N. J. (AP) — A meeting with a protest demonstration and ended with a threat of racial violence.

In between, amid cries of "white arrogant" and "black power," the Eastman Kodak Co. conducted its annual stockholders meeting Tuesday.

The usual decorum of the meeting was upset when a militant Negro organization from Rochester, N.Y., FIGHT, carried its cause to this rural county seat in central New Jersey.

"Freedom, freedom, freedom, God, honor, today," disrupted the company's hiring policy.

After the meeting Rev. F.D.R. Florence, 31, president of FIGHT, announced that the next demonstration would be held in Rochester July 24, the anniversary of the racial riots that erupted there in 1964.

FIGHT contended that the corporation had the moral obligation to the Negroes in the community. Kodak argued it was doing that.

The specific controversy stemmed from an agreement signed with FIGHT Dec. 20 by a Kodak assistant vice president.

Under the accord, Kodak, one of the nation's largest corporations with 100,000 employees, agreed to provide 200 unskilled jobs to Negroes in Rochester, the company's home base. Two days later, Kodak nullified the agreement claiming it was unauthorized.

Young Hoffa Wins Bid For Candidacy

DETROIT (AP) — James P. Hoffa, 25, son of the jailed Teamsters Union president, won Democratic nomination as a candidate for the Michigan House of Representatives in a Tuesday primary.

Young Hoffa, a lawyer and now a legislative aide in Lansing, outdistanced 14 rivals in a tight voting in the heavily Democratic district.

He will meet Anthony Licata, unopposed for the Republican nomination, in a general election May 23. Primary qualification was sufficient for nomination.

Hoffa led the field with 1,428 votes. Casmer Ogonewski was a surprising second, with 1,128. Clarence Ledwith, a third, had 1,019, and Richard A.H.J. Guzowski, fourth, with 718.

The 15th District seat became vacant on the recent death of Rep. Joseph Kowalski, Democratic floor leader and former speaker.

Soviets Turn Down U.S. Request For Improving Lot Of War Prisoners

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union has turned down a U.S. request for a joint move to try to improve the lot of American prisoners of war in North Vietnam.

The rebuff from Moscow this week is interpreted in the State Department as fresh evidence of a toughening line on the part of the Soviet government in support of North Vietnam.

This marks a sharp swing away from the Soviet position in February when Premier Alex. N. Kosygin, meeting with British prime Minister Harold Wilson in London, planned an important role in getting to get peace talks started.

The peace mission failed and apparently the Soviets found the failure and their part in it embarrassing because of their rivalry with Communist China, opposing the United States and supporting Communist forces in Vietnam.

Several days ago, U.S. officials said, the United States asked the Soviet government to use its good offices with the North Vietnamese government to bring about a change in the condition of the POWs — captured American airmen held by North Vietnam.

The Soviet reply, officials said, "boiled down to saying North Vietnam is a sovereign country and the United States should take up its problem with Hanoi directly. The United States does not recognize or have direct relations with Hanoi, but officials said it already had addressed a new appeal to North Vietnam through the International Committee of the Red Cross.

The State Department figures through April 18 show 128 American airmen confined in North Vietnam. The aim of proposals forwarded to Hanoi by Kosygin then was to try to find a basis for extending the truce and beginning active negotiations.

The United States has sent a number of approaches to North Vietnam in the past for freeing or exchanging prisoners or, failing that, for allowing them to be visited by Red Cross or other representatives who could regularly observe their condition.

In effect what the United States asked the Soviet government to do was support the efforts of the International Committee of the Red Cross.

Officials said Soviet cooperation in working as an intermediary reacted its peak at the time.

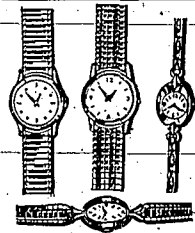

Recent U. S. Tactic Is Bomb, Bomb, Bomb

By BOB HORTON

WASHINGTON (AP) — The tactic is bomb, bomb, bomb — and U.S. planes are doing it over North and South Vietnam at the incredible rate of more than 3,000 pounds a minute around the clock.

In March, as the administration quickened its drumbeat of explosive persuasion against Communist targets in the two countries, American planes unleashed 77,000 tons of bombs — a one-month record for the war.

This total is just short of the 80,000 tons dropped in Europe during the average month of the peak year of bombing in World War II.

With the recent intensification of raids over the North and the widening of the approved target list, the April tonnage seems likely to exceed the World War II rate.

Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara often points to the bomb tonnage to show that the magnitude of air operations in Southeast Asia "is just unbelievable . . . fantastic in size against any previous standards."

The 77,000 tons in March compares with 29,000 tons per month spilled against the Japanese at the height of World War II operations in the Pacific, and with 17,000 tons a month dropped during the Korean War.

The bulk of the effort is directed at North Vietnam, although airpower is used on an unprecedented scale to support ground operations in the South.

In various configurations and sizes — from 50 pounds to one-tonners, plain impact types to delayed fuses — bombs are hitting virtually anything directly or indirectly associated with Communist operations in South Vietnam.

This includes roads, highways, bridges, railroads, trucks, boats, barges, fuel tanks — and most recently major power plants and MIG fields in North Vietnam.

Destruction is not the only reason for the bombing.

Although no administration official has ever stated publicly that U.S. planes are being used to terrorize North Vietnam, Air Force Secretary Harold Brown said pointedly in a major policy speech last December: "All of these targets are hostiles to U.S. airpower which operates over North Vietnam every day. That power can be increased to a much higher level if it is concluded, on balance, that this will contribute to the attainment of our objectives."

It is also a constant and visible reminder to the people of North Vietnam that their leaders cannot avoid the cost of aggression.

Still, administration spokesmen say the chief consideration in the selection of targets is the question of how many civilians might be killed. Policy is to avoid, or at least minimize, damage to the populace.

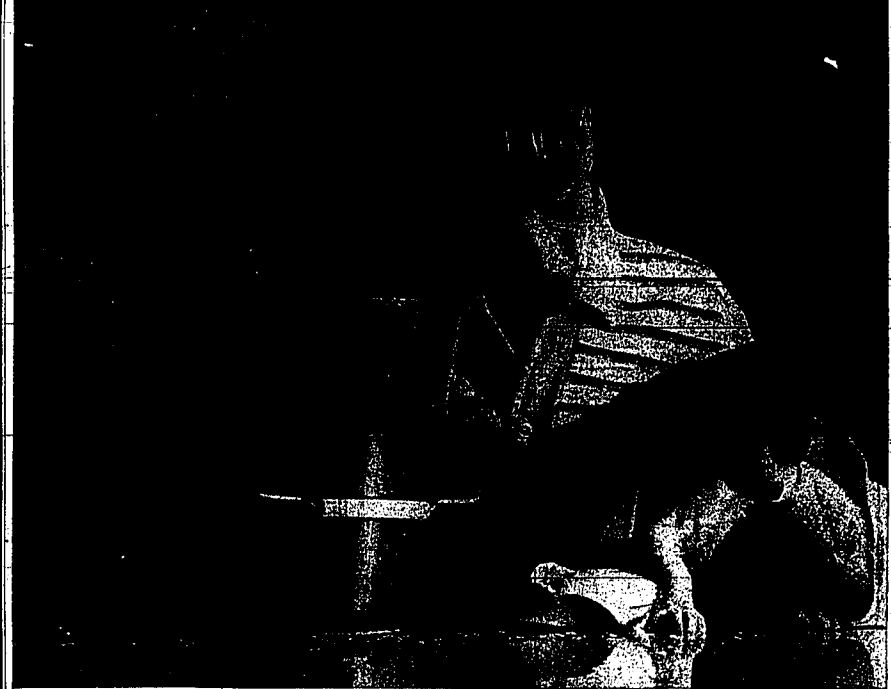

Supervisor Checks Claims At Kimberly

KIMBERLY—David Tayson, supervisor of fraud and overpayment for the Idaho Department of Employment, is in the Kimberly area this week investigating claims for unemployment benefits submitted by local residents. John F. Lehnen, local employment office manager, said Tuesday.

Mr. Tayson has his headquarters in the Boise Administrative Office of the Department. The department is now relying heavily on electronic computer analysis of claimant earnings reports in checking benefit claims, Mr. Lehnen said. When the computer indicates that possibly a claimant has failed to correctly report wages earned while claiming benefits, the fraud unit makes an investigation. Use of the computer will enable the department to maintain much closer control of wage reporting.

Mr. Lehnen explained that a claimant is required to report all work occurring during a benefit period, including self-employment. He must also report all earnings, whether in cash, credit for bills, board and room or other medium.

Serious legal consequences may result from willfully falsifying claims. Most claimants keep the department informed of their work activities and have no difficulty, Mr. Lehnen commented.

Law On Abortion Signed By Love

DENVER, Colo. (AP)—Gov. John A. Love signed Tuesday the controversial bill providing Colorado's abortion law. The governor said, however, that he will watch the workings of the law closely and "if we find defects or omissions, or abuses do occur, we shall be the first to seek changes."

The governor said, he has received about 5,000 letters and

telegrams regarding the bill, "running about 2,000 to 2,400 against the bill." It was the most hotly debated measure at the recent session of the Colorado Legislature. The bill creates new situations in which the termination of a pregnancy would be legal. Present law allows abortions only in cases of a serious threat to the physical health of the mother or in pregnancies that result from forcible rape.

Rep. Tom Beville, D-Ala., noted that Republican leaders had said the war would not be a campaign issue, but he still thinks it will. He added it could have adverse effects on Johnson's chances.

Demos Fear War Will Ruin Chances In 1968 Election

WASHINGTON (AP)—Many congressional Democrats fear the Vietnam war is no nearer an end in 1968 than it appears. If voter dissatisfaction will make it difficult for them and President Johnson to win re-election. But other believe even if no clear advance toward peace is made through 1968, Democrats who feel they believe that if the conflict shows no signs of being resolved, Johnson's chances of being re-elected will be diminished.

Thirty members of the House and Senate felt that the war would not damage Johnson's political position and 39 declined to speculate. There are 311 Democrats in Congress. Senators and House members whose seats will be at stake next year felt they had a generally better chance than the President of surviving any protest vote. Eighty-eight said the war would not affect their chances of re-election but 55 admitted it would be tough for them to hold office if the war grinds on without any letup in sight.

Some thought the Republican presidential candidate is likely to wind up supporting Johnson's Vietnam policy but Rep. Ray J. Madden, D-Ind., was not one of these. "The Republican party cannot win on local issues in this country," Madden said, "so they are now going to base their campaign on the Vietnam war. But if the Democratic party will come out on the issues of the last presidential election and campaign on those issues, we'll win."

Intermountain Regional Medical Program Funds Are Granted

should prove to be an example, which other regions around the United States may want to follow," he concluded.

The Intermountain Regional Medical Program is one of the first four such programs in the United States to be awarded funds to begin its operational phase, it has been announced. Operational grants were announced earlier for the Kansas, Missouri and Albany, N. Y., Regional Medical Programs.

The grant to the Intermountain operation totals \$944,825 and is for implementation of the first year of a three-year program. The grant includes support for a group of pilot operational projects to be carried on simultaneously with the program's planning efforts.

The project was established in 1965 by a bill signed by President Johnson. The Intermountain program was one of the earliest such programs to be granted funds for planning activities. In August, 1968, a spokesman said. The program is designed to develop, implement and evaluate new concepts of postgraduate medical and related health education within the categories of heart disease and cancer.

A pilot project in stroke has been submitted for approval, and other projects, particularly concerned with programs for training medical and health personnel, are currently in preparation.

The principal thrust of all IRMP pilot projects is education, but only as it relates directly to the care of patients. By such activities, the regional program hopes to bring to the physicians the latest advances in the treatment of heart disease, cancer, stroke and related diseases. Additionally, the program will provide some of the necessary training for the people required to fill needs for health manpower in the Intermountain Region, the spokesman noted.

The area included in the IRMP in its planning grant and pilot project grant applications encompasses all of Utah, and parts of Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Wyoming and Colorado. All physicians and allied health care personnel, hospitals and communities within the region will have the opportunity to become involved in the operational programs.

The communities directly involved in the pilot projects are those that are designated to test the feasibility of similar programs on a regional basis. Included are some operational programs, he added.

The IRMP is one of the three regional programs involved in the planning for the health needs of various sections of the Intermountain region. Each program in Wyoming, Idaho and Nevada, and in Nevada, and Grand Junction, Colorado.

According to Dr. C. Hilmon Castle, coordinator of the IRMP, "Relationships characterized by cooperation and communication have been developed among the three regions," Dr. Castle said. "Coordinators and staffs of all three Regional Medical Programs in this area—the Mountain States Regional Medical Program, based at Boise; the Colorado-Wyoming Regional Medical Program, based at Denver; and the Intermountain Regional Medical Program—are meeting frequently, and are developing methods and directions which are contributory and complementary to one another."

Officials of the IRMP are presently located at the University of Utah Medical Center. As an institution of higher learning with a growing interest and responsibility for investment in community affairs, "The University of Utah has cooperated outstandingly in the development of the IRMP," an official of the program commented.

Other universities throughout the region, including Idaho State University, have been involved in IRMP planning activities and are expected to develop greater involvement as the program develops.
