COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Gen. William C. Westmoreland on Wednesday praised the role of Negro servicemen in Vietnam.

"The service of Negro soldiers has been particularly inspiring to me," the U.S. commander in Vietnam told a joint session of the South Carolina General Assembly.

"They are a credit to their country, loyal and proficient in a cross-section of the technical skills."

Westmoreland, winding up a two-day visit to South Carolina, also received an honorary degree from the University of South Carolina.

He was greeted there by about 30 sign-bearing, anti-Vietnamese war pickets.

The picketing group was roundly booed by about 600 students who braved a heavy rain to applaud Westmoreland when he entered the university's Rutledge Chapel.

About 50 policemen were on hand and apparently there was no violence.

Westmoreland was to fly to Washington late Wednesday, and will address Congress on Friday and meet with President Johnson.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate has agreed to a new amendment Tuesday for the 1967 campaign financing plan. But after another round of heated debate on the issue Wednesday, the senators involved could not agree on whether Tuesday's vote finally will settle the issue.

So far, in debating a tax bill since March 22, the Senate has had four separate votes involving amendments either to repeal or uphold the election subsidy plan. Advocates of repeal won two of the tests, and proponents of the plan won two. Repeal is pending now is a motion by Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., author of the plan signed into law last year, to amend the tax bill an amendment to repeal the financing law effective July 31.

Long wanted a vote on his motion Wednesday but Republicans — who have voted solely for repeal — would not permit a roll call because six of their members were absent. Sen. John F. Williams, R-Del., a leader in the repeal fight, told Long he would be willing to enter an agreement that the battle would end with next Tuesday's vote.

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Dictatorship Lifts Curfew In Athens

ATHENS (AP) — Greece's military dictatorship lifted the curfew in Athens and Piraeus today after King Constantine broke his public silence and gave qualified approval to the regime which seized power six days ago.

The 26-year-old monarch met with the new Cabinet Wednesday, urged organization of "a true and healthy democracy," and expressed the "earnest wish" that parliamentary government would return "as soon as possible."

Life appeared nearly normal in Athens and Piraeus, where one-quarter of Greece's 8 million people live. But the 3-5:30 a.m. curfew remained in force elsewhere in the nation.

Miranda Rule Applies To Military

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court's Miranda decision, requiring that suspects be told of their right to counsel at all times and that their right remain silent — has been held applicable to military cases.

The U.S. Court of Military Appeals overturned Wednesday an earlier military appeals ruling which held that military courts need not be present at all times during an arrest or investigation.

The military decision by Associate Judge Homer Ferguson said the ruling will affect all military cases arising after June 19, 1966 — date of the Miranda decision.

The opinion involved the court martial of a sergeant in a military camp in Arizona, and a lieutenant in Tampa, New York City, convicted June 14, 1966 — one day after the Miranda decision — of taking indecent liberties with three 10-year-old girls. May 1, 1966, at Dover Air Force Base, Del.

Templa, sentenced to a bad-conduct discharge, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, and reduction of rank, appealed on grounds that he had no counsel without counsel — was allowed as evidence at this trial.

The U.S. Military Appeals Court ruled in favor of the lieutenant, a judge advocate to make available to Templa counsel during the investigation by the special office of investigations.

Templa's court martial was held at Dover AFB.

The court ordered the conviction reversed and a rehearing held.

Food Prices Decline Some During March

NEW YORK (AP) — The Johnson administration, accused by farmers of fostering a cheap food policy, look steps this week to ease unrest in the farm belt. At the same time it, held out some reassurances to food shoppers.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman raised the price paid dairymen for milk about one-half cent a quart. He said it would eliminate seasonal fluctuations and give farmers more stable prices.

"There is nothing I can see to justify any increase cost to the consumer," Freeman said.

The Labor Department reported food prices fell more than declined slightly but less than is usual in March.

It added that wholesale prices had declined further than prices consumers pay in food stores.

Beef prices are down with steaks and roasts, but there are specials across the country.

"Butter prices dropped 2 cents a pound this week. The still 2 cents higher than a year ago.

The season's first watermelons and strawberries are reaching the markets.

Fresh produce supplies are limited in the Midwest, which has been plagued by bad weather and transportation problems.

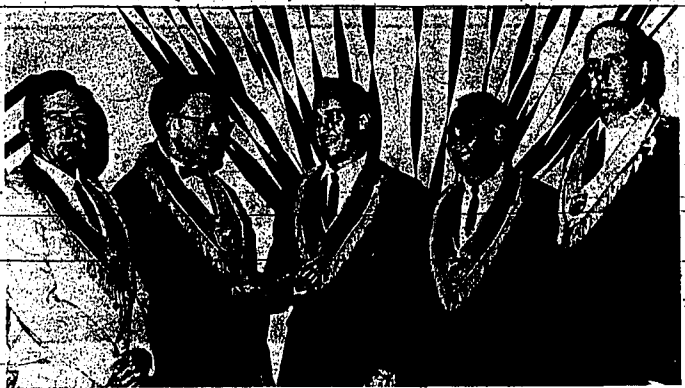
Generally there are good supplies now of potatoes, onions, apples, oranges, grapefruit and watermelons.

One MIG Base Struck By U.S. Planes Reported Empty Of Communist Jets

WASHINGTON (AP) — One of the two North Vietnamese MIG bases struck by U.S. planes was empty of Communist jets, Pentagon sources said today.

Only four MIGs were on the other base bombed by American jets Monday, the sources said.

Asked about this, a Defense Department spokesman said "we don't know for sure" how many Communist jet fighters were on the Kep and the Hoa Lac bases near Hanoi when they were bombed.

"The pilots would be too busy with their missions to count," the spokesman said.

Because of poor weather, there has been no satisfactory bomb damage assessment by reconnaissance planes.

The spokesman acknowledged that the Kep field — which sources said is bare of planes — has been undergoing extension of its runways. But he insisted that despite the construction work, the base 23 miles northeast of Hanoi is operational.

Another department spokesman disputed the report that only four MIGs were caught on the ground at Hoa Lac, 19 miles west of Hanoi. He said he had

information indicating there might have been a dozen planes there.

In announcing the raids early this week, an official spokesman in Saigon said that Kep was known to have been the base for 19 or 20 MIGs while Hoa Lac was believed to have been the home of up to nine planes. This Hoa Lac estimate has been raised to about 15.

Air Force officers in Vietnam long have argued for striking the MIG bases in the North, contending the best way to destroy the enemy air force is while it is ground-based, rather than taking on the MIGs in the air.

In the wake of the Hoa Lac and Kep raids, some critics complained U.S. American raiders should have been allowed to take out all MIG bases — particularly the most important one at Phuc Yen, some 15 miles north of Hanoi.

Phuc Yen is the base of North Vietnam's best interceptors, the MIG21s. Recent reconnaissance photography showed roughly 40 MIGs sitting on the ground there.

This represented possibly a third of North Vietnam's air force, estimated at between 120 and 150 MIG jets.

The critics said the effect of only bombing Hoa Lac and Kep was to alert the enemy to concentrate anti-aircraft guns around the other bases. This, they said, could mean heavier U.S. losses if the remaining fields are attacked.

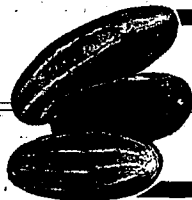

Svetlana Accuses Some Russ Leaders Of Participating In Major Crimes

NEW YORK (AP) — Svetlana Alliyeva has accused some of the present Soviet leaders of sharing responsibility for killings and other crimes which occurred during the regime of her father, Joseph Stalin.

She said her key reason for leaving the Soviet Union was the death of her Indian husband, Brijesh Singh who she said had been denied "the main human rights." This apparently was a reference to Soviet refusal to let her take him to India for medical treatment.

Another reason, she said, was the trial of writers Andrei D. Sinyavsky and Huli M. Daniel, sentenced to prison for having published their works abroad.

The trial and sentence, she said, "produced a horrible impression on all the intellec-

During the hour-long session she also described her disillusionment with communism, her conversion to Christianity and her decision to seek haven in the United States to find self-expression in writing.

More than 400 newsmen packed the conference room at the Plaza Hotel to hear Mrs. Alliyeva — poised throughout her decision to seek haven in the United States to find self-expression in writing.

She drew chuckles with her reply when asked if she would apply for American citizenship.

"Well, I think that before the marriage, there should be love. If this country will love me, then the marriage will be settled, but I cannot say now."

For most of the time, she was serious, however, and when she talked of the children, a son, 21, and daughter, 15, who left in Moscow, even somber.

"I don't think something bad will happen to them, because they don't deserve it," she said. "I don't think it (her defection) endangers them because they know nothing of my plans. They are not guilty at all. They cannot be punished for anything."

She said she was baptized into the Russian Orthodox Church in Moscow in May 1952. But, she said, there was nothing exclusive in her faith. Orthodoxy was the one "to which my parents and my ancestors belonged."

"I believe that all religions are true, and different religions are only different ways to the same God. When I am talking about God, I am just talking about happiness to live and to enjoy life on this earth," she explained.

No one, no book influenced her, she said and described finding God "as when the person who was blind, one day his eyes become open and he can see the world and the sky and birds and trees."

She spoke in a firm, controlled, low voice, but seemed most determined when she spoke — briefly — of her father.

Homicides Drop After Gun Sale Restrictions Enacted

By PETER E. BRAKMAN
PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Two years ago Philadelphia restricted the sale of rifles and shotguns as a crime deterrent measure.

Police readily admit no scientific measure is possible to determine the effectiveness of the restriction, but they cite as a gauge, however, statistics which show that homicides dropped 12.7 per cent in the nation's fourth largest city in 1955 over the previous year while all serious crimes dropped 8.4 per cent.

The gun law bars the sales of weapons to habitual drunks, narcotics addicts and persons convicted of violent crime.

Opponents of the ordinance, which provides a \$300 fine and 90 days in jail, or both, for any one caught possessing an unregistered rifle or shotgun, claim it is so rigid it is unenforceable.

Irv Jaffe, a former Philadelphia gun dealer who moved his shop to suburban Delaware County, claims the law is violated between 65,000 and 75,000 times a year by residents who sell their weapons privately without bothering to have them registered first.

The law, which requires prospective rifle and shotgun owners to be fingerprinted and photographed by police, has put 19 gun dealers out of business in the last year, according to Jaffe.

Dealers also claim the law has cost the city \$1 million in taxes lost because of the decline in the sale of guns and allied products.

The law's supporters generally take the view of Ephraim Comberg, executive vice president of the Crime Commission

of Philadelphia, a private, non-profit organization which has been a consistent supporter of gun control as a crime deterrent.

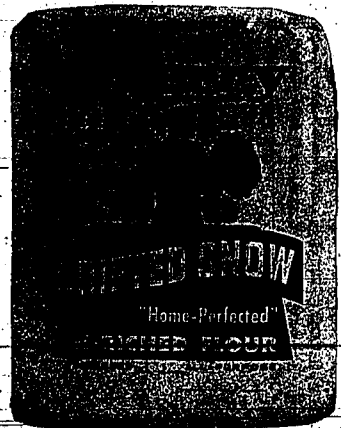

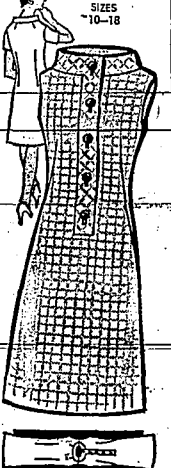

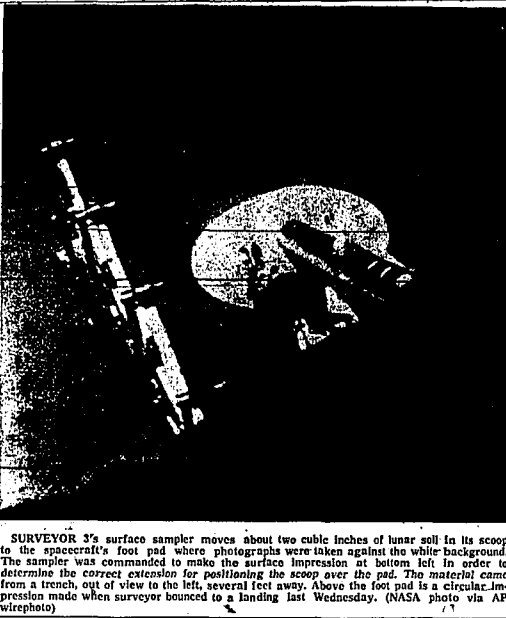

 DA NANG, South Vietnam (AP) — The U.S. Marines in Vietnam are hurting for helicopters. The Army has plenty. The shortage can be seen in many ways. The body of a dead Marine rode on a tank near the demilitarized zone for two days before it was removed. The assembly of a two-compa-

ny relief force during an intense fight at Binh Son was delayed for at least three hours. Ammunition for a battalion probe north of Route 9 arrived late, pushing back the jump-off time, two hours. Where a U.S. Army battalion leaves the field by helicopter, Marine forces often have to march. On some occasions Marine units have found themselves short of water and rations in the field. It cannot be said that a Leatherneck has starved to death, died of thirst or exhaustion, or that Marine wounded have been ignored, but the helicopter shortage has made the Marine's job a little bit tougher. The U.S. Army in Vietnam has about 2,000 helicopters, in-

cluding the 1st Cavalry, Alamo, Division's 422. Support groups parcel out "Hueys" or "Slicks," and CH47 Chinooks for supply and frequent 60- and 70-chopper assaults in such operations as Junction City and Cedar Falls. An Army battalion commander routinely has a Huey at his disposal to coordinate his companies from the air and get a

better view. A Marine colonel considers this a luxury. While the Army supports allied troops as well, there never appears to be any lack of choppers for its own 60 battalions. It is not exceptional to see an Army unit provided in the field each night with heavy weapons, sand bags, hot food and sometimes a shower. Such services in the field are available to a Marine. The Army has available one helicopter for every 15 men in the field, the Marines one for every 65. Lt. Gen. Lewis W. Walt, commander of Marines in Vietnam, says he would like more helicopters. The question is complicated by military and congressional appropriations and overall military planning. Sources put together this picture: The Marines are allowed about 1,000 aircraft. Marine planners must allow from this total their tactical jets, such as the F4 Phantom, A6 Intruder, A4 Skyhawk and F8 Intruder; as well as C130 transports, reconnaissance and liaison aircraft. The Air Force and Army face simpler choices. The Air Force has only a few liaison and rescue choppers, and the Army has only a few "hiss-wing" planes,

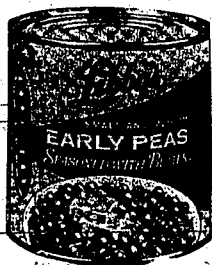
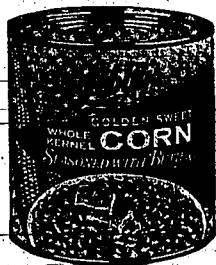

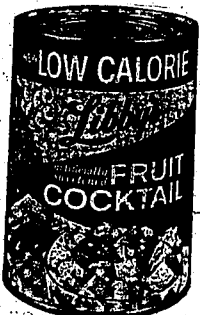

"Not me, Frank," "Hell, then," Short said, "I'll go alone."

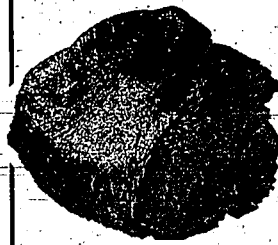
