## Britain Wants To Join Market

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Harold Wilson announced today Britain has decided to apply for membership in the European Common Market.

Wilson told the House of Commons that the British government intended to seek to join the European Coal and Steel Community and the European Atomic Energy Agency, Euratom.

Wilson related that in November the British government proclaimed its readiness to accept the treaty signed in Rome, establishing the Common Market, but subject to certain necessary adjustments and acceptable terms.

Our discussions in the capitals of the Common Market countries have confirmed the validity of this approach," he said.

It is in this spirit that the government intends to embark on the negotiations which precede the final decision.

Wilson said the major issues which Britain would set out to negotiate in the negotiations are:

—Problems relating to the operation of the Common Market's agricultural policy—especially its effects on the cost of living in Britain and the structure of the British farm system.

—The interests of Britain's Commonwealth partners, mainly in the field of safeguarding their traditional markets in this country for primary products.

He cited the special problem of New Zealand and Commonwealth sugar-producing countries.

—The problem of the free movement of capital, which is the subject of the negotiations.

—The problem of the common rules—Britain currently controls the output of capital to protect the stability of the pound sterling.

Wilson said amid charges that the British labor party follows a policy of "no ifs, ands or buts" in the Treaty of Rome or in the practical working of the European Economic Community, which need these major important issues insoluble.

## Prize For Reporting Awarded

NEW YORK (AP)—R. John Hughes of the Christian Science Monitor has won the 1957 Pulitzer Prize for international reporting despite a jury panel's recommendation that the award go to Herbert Salisbury of the New York Times.

The award announcement Monday promptly touched off a controversy after a source disclosed the jury panel voted 41 to honor Salisbury for his dispatches from North Vietnam.

Instead the panel was overruled by the Pulitzer Prize advisory board which voted 65 against Salisbury, reportedly because his original dispatches failed to give the source of his candid casualty figures.

In turn the trustees of Columbia University upheld the board and went along with the recommendation that Hughes—

the second choice of the jury panel—be honored for his coverage of the attempted Communist coup in Indonesia and the purges that ensued.

Salisbury, a Pulitzer winner in the same category 12 years ago, commented, "I put the opinion of the editors of the Times above any jurors. If the Times thinks my stuff is good, I put that above the Pulitzer or anything else."

There was no immediate comment from Hughes on the controversy but Michael J. Ogden, a member of the five-man panel, said he stood by the majority vote for Salisbury.

Ogden said there were technical defects in the Salisbury dispatches but that their "impact and general overall effect" far outweighed—other—considerations.

Announcement of the prizes was held up 90 minutes by the controversy over the international reporting award.

The award for news photography went to Jack R. Thorne of the Associated Press for his picture showing James H. Meredith being shot while on a civil rights march through Mississippi.

Edward Albee, whose failure to receive a Pulitzer Prize in 1963 led to the resignation of the Pulitzer Prize jury, won the drama award this year for his latest play, "A Delicate Balance."

The play deals with a middle-aged couple whose lives are upset by fearful friends and mal-

adjusted neighbors. The prize jury went to Bernard Malamud for "The Fixer," written on the theme of anti-Jewish persecutions in czarist Russia. It also won the National Book Award in March.

"I'm glad to have this attention focused on the book," Malamud, 51, said in Cambridge, Mass., after learning of the prize.

This time the paper was cited for its "successful campaign to stiffen the laws against water pollution in Wisconsin."

Richard H. Leonard, editor, said in Milwaukee afterward, "The journal has long considered the preservation of our natural resources to be one of its major objectives. We will continue to fight for this cause."

The prize for meritorious public service by a newspaper was shared by the Milwaukee Journal and the Louisville Courier-Journal. It was the second award in the category for the Milwaukee paper, which previously won in 1919.

## Dairy Dispute Exhausts Milk Supply

**CHICAGO** (AP)—A dispute between dairies and their drivers caused a rush of shoppers Monday that virtually exhausted supplies of fresh milk throughout the Chicago area.

A strike by the Chicago Milk Wagon Drivers' Union against a single dairy resulted in a lack of deliveries and food workers for about 50 dairies affiliated with two trade associations.

The Chicago Milk Wagon Drivers' Union said it had an agreement with the dealers' limited deliveries to all retail outlets.

Retail stores reported depletion of milk and milk products Monday evening as efforts of store operators to spread up by limiting purchases.

If the queen of hearts had fallen on this lead, Dick would have had a parking place for his last low club but this didn't really make any difference to him. He simply cashed his last two spades and discarded two diamonds, leaving him with one club and a diamond, and Dick with king-small of clubs and the four of diamonds.

East had been squeezed out of his diamond protection and, when Dick led his king of clubs, West had to hold the queen of hearts and was squeezed in turn.

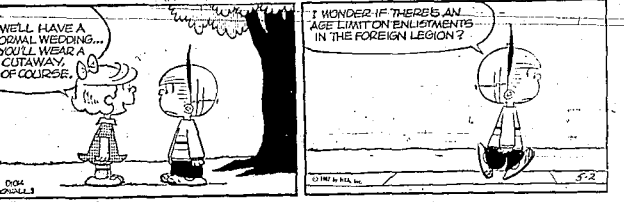

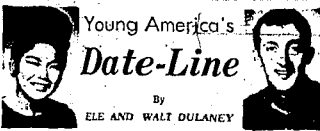

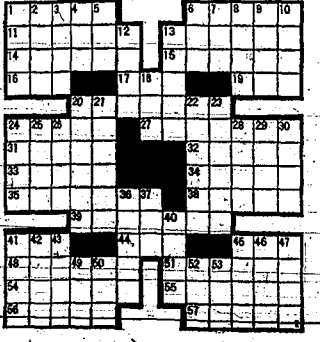
